Only a few years ago it was a howling wilderness—now it is a thriving town. The main reason is that all of the citizens pull together, and there are not so many barnacles on the wheels of progress that unfortunately exist in many other communities.

### News from the Shanties.

Mr. O'Neill, foreman at Messrs. Booth & Gordon's shanties on Kaskanan lake, says the *Free Press*, has arrived in Ottawa for a few days. He states that there is snow to a depth of 28 inches between Kaskanan and Boisfranc. The ice took well enough but the heavy snowstorms have made it very rough. There are fifty eight men altogether employed at Booth's & Gordon's shanties and cutting is going on very briskly. Up to now about 40,000 logs, principally white pine, have been cut.

### Death From Exposure.

An Ottawa paper says: Particulars of a very lamentable affair have just reached the city. About a week ago a well known resident in that locality named Mr. J. Ryan left home with a horse and cutter to visit some friends along the Gatineau road. His long absence from home caused great anxiety amongst his family and friends, and a search for the missing man was instituted. After a long and tedious drive through the mountains the searchers came across a horse and cutter which was standing alone in the middle of the road. The horse was not owned by Mr. Ryan but was attached to his cutter. This in itself was enough to satisfy the searchers that something unusual had occurred. Following up the tracks the searchers came across the prostrate form of Mr. Ryan. He was still alive, although unconscious and badly frozen. No time was lost in returning home with the unfortunate man to whom restoratives were promptly administered. Gradually Mr. Ryan grew worse until death came to his relief. It has since been ascertained that some unknown individual took advantage of Mr. Ryan and palmed off an old horse on him for his own valuable animal. Mr. Ryan was highly respected in the vicinity in which he lived and much sympathy is felt for his bereaved family.
