



The year's increase of customs reaches to \$1,493,000. The stamp duty of all kinds to \$117,000. Of this sum the proceeds from bill stamps alone were \$83,000 ; and the law stamp duty for Upper and Lower Canada returned \$34,000. In the expenditure one of the most remarkable features of the decrease is to be found in the enormous sum charged against Legislation for 1863, for which year this item stood at \$627. 377. In 1864 the charge is \$379,958, o nearly two hundred and fifty thousand dollar less. It is observable also that the Militi ins cost less in the past year than in the one receding it by \$170,000. There has also decrease in the expenditure for Ocean and River Steam Service to the extent \$123,000. In the item of Public Works and Buildings we find the only really large increase of expenditure, the figures standing respectively for 1863, \$474.712, and for 1864 at \$733,489, or about \$340,000 more than was expended upon this branch of the service in 1863. It is presumable that this additional outlay was due to the prosecution of the Public Buildings at Ottawa, and conse aently unavoidable. Upon the whole the comparison affords ground for gratulation and indicates that our commercial prosperity is still progressive, notwithstanding the baleful inace which our n-ighbor's troubles have un questionably exercised upon the trade and com merce of the Province. 
