CANADIAN INTELLIGENCE.

LONDON, March 18-The Indian budge shows that for the fiscal year ended ch last there was a surplus of five millions. For the year ending this March there will be a deficit of £3,500,-000. The budget dwells upon the depreciation of silver, the lowness of exchange and the gloomy prospects which at present threaten the Indian future.

Thousands of colliers in the south-west of Yorkshire have been notified of ten per cent. reduction of wages.

The arrangement between England and Germany in regard to the occupation of territory on the western coast of Africa meets with considerable opposition from the Baptist missionaries. They claim that nearly all the work of surveying and civil-izing in some important stretches of territory has been done by the missionaries, and they object to the parcelling out of that country between Germany and Eng-land, solely in the interest of trade. In an interview on this subject this evening with Mr. Alfred Baynes, secretary of the Baptist Missionary Society, Mr. Baynes said that his society had felt it necessary to protest against the ceding of Bata to Germany. The British Government, he said, had no right to split the territory, and should take the whole or none. If it

would leave the whole country alone, the eiety would gladly transfer its rights to the United States, which could develop the country into a free State after the fashion of Liberia. The approaching visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales to Ireland has caused the most serious differences in the ranks of the Dublin Nationalists which have confronted their leaders since the party was formed. The apology of the Lord Mayor was the first wedge driven into the solid body of Parnell's followers' corporation. Since that unexpected shock schism has been growing. Mr. Mayne, M. P., when putting a resolution at a secent private meeting of Nationalist members of the Corporation, declared that the Prince Royal and his mother were nothing more than puppets in the matter, and that the address moved would really be to Mr. Gladstone and Lord Spencer. He warned every man in the Corporation of Dublin who should take a course other than that Ireland demanded and expected from him that he would lose his seat in the Corporation and be simply annihilated at the polls. Meanwhile the vast majority of wealthy and responsible citizens, who are greatly amused at the efforts of the Nationalists, are quietly and thoroughly preparing a re-ception, all the better for the absence of the Lord Mayor and Corporation. Edward Juinness and the younger brother of Lord Ardilaun, both brewers, lead the Citizens' Committee. Mr. Guinness' position as High Sheriff strengthens his hands and enables him to assume the leadership of "Loyal Citizens" with great dignity and power. Acting with Mr. Guinness is a mittee of 150 citizens of all creeds and politics. The requisition on which the Committee has been appointed was signed by thousands of names in a few days Few anticipate that even the sulky attitude of the Nationalist leaders will prevent the great mass of the people who usually follow em from turning out to witness the brilliant pageants, reviews and ceremonies. DUBLIN, March 18-On the Cork and Southern Ireland Railway, to-day, were found the bodies of two men, who had been frightfully hacked to death with mangled beyond recognition. The victims had evidently been engaged in a terrible struggle with their assailants. The tragedy is surrounded with mystery, but the police think the men were passengers in a train and were murdered for the purpose of robbery, their assailants having secured seats in the compartment with them, and that the latter after having been fatally stabbed were thrown out of the car. 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



HOUSE OF COMMONS. LONDON, March 18-In the Commons this

afternoon Mr. Childers said the convention which was signed by the powers for the set-tlement of the Egyptian financial question provided for a loan of £90,000,000 which was internationally guaranteed by the six powers, who were responsible jointly and severally in the sum of $\pm 396,000$ yearly sinking fund. The debt would be the first charge on the Egyptian revenue. THE AMERICA CUP.

LONDON, March 14-To-day's Saturday Review devotes a column and a hal editorial to the America Cup contest, in the course of which it compliments Mr. Schuyler on his "very sage and courteous advice." The article thus concludes :-"No race in English waters, however, no matter how many are the competing ves-sels, or how deftly handled by professionals or amateurs, will excite one tithe of the interest which will attach to the race for the America Cup. It is not easy to be very hopeful about this contest, and the highest admiration must be felt for the adventurous spirit of the owners who intend making every effort to bring that much-coveted cup back. "The conditions laid down for the con-test are indeed very strongly in favor of the American competitors. The English yachts must cross the Atlantic, and must, therefore, be seagoing vessels. The Ame-rican yacht, which has to go through no such ordeal, may be a mere racing machine. such ordeal, may be a mere racing machine. If the challenger and the challenged can-not agree as to the conditions of the con-test the former has the not very valuable right of claiming to have one decisive match sailed, while the latter will be en-titled to name the competing yacht on the morning of the battle.
