

FRENCH KEEP UP STEADY PRESSURE IN CHAMPAGNE

Heavy Cannonading Continues on Both Sides. Active Fighting in the Trenches South-East of Tahure. Trenches of Enemy Between Argonne and Meuse Shattered by French Mine. Australians Make Progress on the Gallipoli Peninsula.

Paris, Oct. 8, 2.33 p.m.—(Special)—North of Arras last night the cannonade continued with both sides taking part, according to announcement made by the War Office this afternoon. There was also artillery activity in the region of Roye and to the north of the River Aisne. In the Champagne district there was violent bombardment on the part of the German artillery, with very energetic replies from the French cannon. There was also active fighting in the trenches southeast of Tahure. The text of the communication follows: "The cannonade continued last night, both sides taking part, to the north of Arras, in the direction of Souchez and its environs, as well as in the sector of La Folle and near Hill No. 140. "There was also considerable activity on the part of the artillery of the enemy, together with answering fire from our guns, in the region of Roye and to the north of the River Aisne, in the direction of Tracy-le-Val, and at the forest of St. Mar. "In the Champagne district the Germans violently bombarded our positions between the roads running from St. Hilaire to St. Souple and from Souain to Sommepey. Our batteries everywhere replied to this fire with great energy. "Active fighting took place in the connecting trenches to the southeast of Tahure in the direction of the But-de-Masnil. "Between the Argonne and the Meuse one of the French mines, in the forest of Malancourt, shattered some sapping works of the enemy. "The night passed in relative quiet on the remainder of the front."

AUSTRALIANS MAKE PROGRESS AT GALLIPOLI

Paris, Oct. 8.—(Special)—A despatch to the Havas Agency from Athens, dated Thursday, says: "A Mitylene despatch received here asserts that a French seaplane bombarded Alvali, Asia Minor, Wednesday morning. "The Australians have made important progress in the Suvla region of the Gallipoli Peninsula and on the southern frontier there."

FRENCH ARE GAINING UPPER HAND

Paris, Oct. 8.—(Special)—Soldiers wounded at the capture of Tahure, now arriving in Paris, are all of the opinion that the French are gaining the upper hand, not only through their artillery, but because of the gallantry and dash of the infantry. "At the rate things are going," said a wounded sergeant-major, "it will be a long time before the Germans are in a position to think of a counter-offensive. Our heavy artillery sprays their rear formations, paralyzing the bringing up of reinforcements and supplies to such a degree that the last prisoners captured at Tahure had not eaten in more than 48 hours, and had no cartridges in their pouches."

RUSSIAN SHIPS BOMBARD PORT OF VALNA

Amsterdam, Oct. 7, via London, Oct. 8.—The Cologne Gazette reports two Russian cruisers actively bombarding the Bulgarian port of Varna.

TEUTONS OPEN CAMPAIGN TO SAVE TURKEY

London, Oct. 8.—The long threatened Austro-German offensive in the Balkans with the added menace of Bulgaria, has begun in earnest. At the same time, with the rupture of diplomatic relations between Sofia and the Entente Powers, an Austro-German army, estimated weight of men, with an enormous weight of heavy artillery, started to attack Serbia from the north and west, and according to the Berlin official report crossed the Drina, Danube and Save rivers at many points and firmly established itself on the Serbian side. The Anglo-French troops, which were landed at Salonika with the tacit consent of the Greek Government, are being hurried northward to assist Serbia and, if possible, keep the Bulgarians from capturing the Salonika-Nish Railway, the only source by which the Serbians can be fed with munitions of war. The hoped for support from Greece has not been forthcoming, King Constantine, by the dismissal of Premier Venizelos, having shown that, while his country sympathizes with the cause of the Allies, he is not prepared to go against the Central Powers or to fulfil the obligations of the Greco-Serbian treaty of alliance, which provides that one ally must go to the assistance of the other in the case of attack. A new Greek cabinet composed of men of pro-German and pro-Ally sympathies, has been appointed, and the expectation now is that unless public opinion forces the

KEY TO THE SITUATION

Semi-Official Paris Paper Says it is in the Hands of the Entente Powers

FACTS ALONE COUNT IN THE BALKANS AND PROMPT MEASURES MUST BE TAKEN
Paris, October 8.—The semi-official Temps sums up French opinion of the Greek "coup de theatre" in a phrase: "The difference of views between the King and Prime Minister Venizelos may have considerable consequences for Greece, but cannot impede our Macedonian expedition, which is proceeding." It is considered that the presence of the allied forces gives the Entente Powers the key to the situation, as the Temps continues Greek acceptance of virtual collaboration renders their protest of no effect. The Allies are on their way to help Serbia. If they disembark in sufficient numbers—as it is asserted they will do—the possible opposition from the King can be ignored. The Temps concludes: "The expedition is now a fact. Facts alone count in the Balkans. If we proceed promptly and strongly the crisis shaking the whole peninsula will terminate in our favor."

NO CONTRABAND FOR BULGARIA

Roumania, However, Will Allow All Other Goods to go Through Territory

Milan, Oct. 8, via Paris.—(Special)—In reply to protests filed by the German and Austrian Ministers against obstacles being placed in the way of shipping goods to Bulgaria, the Roumanian Government replied, according to a Bucharest despatch to the Secolo, that it would take every means to prevent contraband of war from passing over Roumanian territory, but would place no difficulties in the way of the transit of other goods to Bulgaria.

CANADA OFFERS MEAT TO BRITAIN

Minister of Agriculture After Investigation Offers Supply For Army And Navy

SHOULD STEADY AND STIMULATE THE CANADIAN LIVE STOCK MARKET.

Ottawa, Oct. 8.—Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, after a careful investigation of the live stock situation, has forwarded to the British War Office an offer of canned meats for army and navy purposes. The offer covers the entire possible output of Canada and consists of monthly supplies for the next six months. It is hoped that the prices quoted are such as will receive favorable consideration. Negotiations have been under way for some time in regard to shipping dressed beef and an announcement may be looked for shortly. If the War Office accepts the offer for canned meats and also finds it practicable to place orders for dressed beef, there will be created in Canada a great demand for supplies that should steady and stimulate the Canadian live stock markets.

CANADIANS IN ACTION

Casualty List Shows That Several Units of Second Division Took Part in Operations

Ottawa, October 8.—The list of casualties posted last night includes 29 names, and takes in the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 7th, 13th, 16th, 20th, 21st, 25th, and 28th, Princess Pats, First Field Artillery Brigade, Divisional Ammunition Column and Canadian Army Medical Corps. Montrealers named are Harry Lukka, of the Second Battalion, of 275 Bleury Street; William J. Oakman, Third Battalion, of 107 St. George Etienne Cartier Street, wounded in the shoulder; James Wilson, 25th Battalion, 451 Notre Dame Street, Lachine. The list shows that a number of battalions of the Second Canadian Division have been in action, the 20th, 21st, 25th, and 28th. The casualty in the Army Medical Corps is that of Captain William J. Enright, of Port Daniel, east, County Bonaventure, attached to the 22nd Battalion (French-Canadian), commanded by Lieut.-Col. Gaudet.

CAUSE OF CRISIS IN GREECE

King Refused to Allow His Army to go to The Assistance of Serbia

DETAILS OF HISTORIC INTERVIEW BETWEEN M. VENIZELLOS AND KING CONSTANTINE.

Paris, Oct. 8.—(Special)—What purport to be details of the historic interview between King Constantine and Eleutherios Venizelos, which resulted in the latter's resignation as Prime Minister of Greece, are printed in the Greek journal Kairos. After agreeing to mobilization as a precaution involving no change of policy, the King asked the Premier what was the object of the concentration of such a strong army on the Macedonian frontier. M. Venizelos answered that the object was twofold: first, to defend the country, and, second, to go to the aid of Serbia in case she were attacked by Bulgaria.

The King then remarked that he agreed with Venizelos so far as defending the country was concerned, but could not see that Greece was called upon to help Serbia. The Premier recalled the obligations imposed upon Greece by her treaty of alliance but the King retorted that when Greece asked Serbia's aid against Turkey in May, 1914, it was refused. To further arguments on the part of Venizelos, the King replied that the Premier was contradicting himself, for when the Allied Powers asked Greece to assist Serbia at the time of the Austrian attack Venizelos made a promise of such assistance conditional upon the armed cooperation of Roumania and the benevolent neutrality of Bulgaria. These conditions not having been pledged, the King pointed out, he refused to join Serbia at a time when the Austrian forces arrayed against her did not exceed 150,000 and Bulgaria was not hostile.

"But to-day," added the King, "the Austro-Germans are a half-million, to whom must be added 300,000 Bulgarians, and the retreat of the Russians prevents the Roumanians from doing anything for Serbia."

DIFFERENCES MAY BE SMOOTHED OVER.
Paris, Oct. 8.—(Special)—Serbia believes, says the Matin's Nish correspondent, that Greece will not abandon her ally and that the differences between King Constantine and M. Venizelos can be smoothed over. It is maintained that the interests of Greece are quite as much at stake as Serbia, as both are equally threatened. Attention is called also to the fact that Austria hitherto has claimed rights to the port of Saloniki.

OPPOSITION WILL NOT OPPOSE NEW MINISTRY.
Paris, Oct. 8.—(Special)—The supporters of Former Premier Venizelos, who constitute a majority in the Greek Chamber, it has been learned on high authority, says a Havas despatch from Athens, will not oppose the new ministry, so that additional complications may be averted at a critical period. The overthrow of the Zeaimis Cabinet would involve the dissolution of the Chamber, which is considered extremely hazardous, as the Greek Constitution does not permit fixing a date for elections during mobilization of the army.

"BENEVOLENT NEUTRALITY" TOWARDS ENTENTE POWERS.

London, Oct. 8, 12.30 p.m.—(Special)—A message to the Times states that the Greek Government has decided to issue a declaration of its attitude of "benevolent neutrality" towards the Entente Powers.

FIVE KILLED IN NISH BY AVIATORS' BOMBS

Nish, Oct. 7, via London.—(Special)—An aeroplane coming from Bulgaria this afternoon dropped numerous bombs on Nish, killing five persons and wounding two others. It then returned safely to Bulgaria.

SUPPLIES OF FRENCH ARMY ARE ADEQUATE

COMMISSION SATISFIED THAT TROOPS WILL BE SHORT OF NOTHING DURING WINTER.

Paris, Oct. 8.—An official announcement states that the senatorial commission on the army have finished their inspection of the winter commissariat. After inspecting the stores and depots and having examined the returns of existing stocks, the commission is satisfied that the French army will be short of nothing during the coming winter.

DEFENCE IS COMPLETE DENIAL

Witnesses For Eva Kingsley on Perjury Charge Give Strong Evidence in Rebuttal

CASE PROCEEDING IN COURT OF KING'S BENCH BEFORE MR. JUSTICE GLOBENSKY.

The trial of Eva Kingsley for perjury was continued yesterday afternoon before Mr. Justice Globensky in the Court of King's Bench. A considerable portion of the time was taken up with the objections raised by counsel for the Crown and defence in regard to certain questions which were put to the various witnesses by counsel on each side. Ethel Barron, of Sherbrooke, was the concluding witness for the prosecution. She told of complaints which she swore the accused had made to her as to her uncle's conduct, and she related certain occurrences which she swore she had witnessed. Witness also stated that the handwriting in some of the letters produced resembled that of the accused. She denied having said to her brother (who instigated the present charge of perjury) "If we had not perjured ourselves for you you would have been in jail now."

Witness took issue with Mr. Cabana, the defending attorney, over certain questions put to her, and which she considered irrelevant, and was told by the judge not to have any discussion with the lawyer, but to answer the questions unless objected to.

EVIDENCE FOR DEFENCE.
James Kingsley, father of accused, stated that his daughter had lived with her uncle and grandmother since she was two and a half years old. Witness' wife was dead. He worked out most of the time, but every Sunday and at intervals when he did not work, he spent his time at his mother's and brother's with his daughter. The latter had never made any complaints to him nor to her grandmother in his presence, neither had he observed anything wrong. Witness was unable to express any opinion about the letters, as he could neither read nor write.

John Kingsley, Mrs. Frank Kingsley, Mrs. Irwin Rogers, Jennie Ward and Arthur Gilbert also gave evidence in rebuttal of the charge, and the depositions of prisoner's grandmother taken at the preliminary hearing were put in on behalf of accused. This witness was prevented, through infirmity, from attending court.

The only writing which any of the witnesses for the defence recognized as in prisoner's handwriting was an envelope addressed to Barron.

CASE PROCEEDING.
The hearing of witnesses in the case was continued this morning.

Augustin Kingsley was called for the defence and Ethel Barron and Ernest Barron were re-called for the prosecution. No new material facts were adduced.

All the petit jurors, except those engaged in this case, were discharged until Tuesday morning, the 12th instant. MOTION TO QUASH INDICTMENT.
Mr. C. O. Cabana, the defending attorney in the case in which Dr. Veronneau, of Coaticook, is accused of perjury, made a motion to the court this morning to quash the indictment on the ground that D. S. Bachand, who laid the complaint, had done so with the object of getting Veronneau out of Coaticook and not in the interests of justice; also on the ground that complainant was a member of the grand jury who returned a true bill in this case, and that Bachand had attempted to influence another grand jurymen.

In replying for the Crown, Mr. J. Nicol, K.C., stated that Bachand did not adjudicate when this indictment was before the grand jury, but even had he done so it would have been quite regular, as he was not now the prosecutor (but the King), and that he had a perfect right to be heard as a witness before the grand jury.

Placed in the witness box by the Crown, Dr. Veronneau stated, under pressure, that one Archambault had told him that Bachand had tried to influence a member of the grand jury.

PROMOTION FOR COLONEL LOOMIS

Ottawa Report Says He is Likely to be Made Brigadier General

Ottawa, October 8.—Lord Brooks, who was to have commanded the first brigade of the first division, has been transferred to the corps troops under General Mercer where he will command a brigade made up of the 42nd, 49th R.C.R., and Princess Patricia's. Col. Smart's brigade of mounted infantry are also under General Mercer. Col. Rennie is likely to command the first brigade of the first division and will be made a Brigadier-General.

Col. Loomis of Montreal is also likely to be a Brigadier-General. It is learned that Larrigans will be supplied to the Canadian troops in France and England this winter. Tenders are being called for.

RUPTURE BETWEEN SERBIA AND BULGARIA COMPLETE

Berlin Dispatch Says Manifesto Has Been Issued in Sofia Declaring That Bulgaria Would Commit Suicide if She Did Not Align Herself With Germany, and That She Must Fight at the Victor's Side.

Nish, Oct. 8, via London.—(Special)—The diplomatic rupture between Serbia and Bulgaria is complete. The Foreign Office has handed his passports to the Bulgarian Minister.

BULGARIA WITH CENTRAL POWERS.

Berlin, Oct. 8, by wireless to Sayville.—(Special)—The Frankfurter Zeitung asserts that the Bulgarian Government has issued a manifesto to the nation announcing its decision to enter the war on the side of the Central Powers. This manifesto, as quoted from the Frankfurter Zeitung by the Overseas News Agency, states that Bulgaria would commit suicide if she did not align herself with Germany and her allies.

The manifesto, as given out here, follows: "The Central Powers have promised us parts of Serbia, creating an Austro-Bulgarian border line, which is absolutely necessary for Bulgaria's independence of the Serbians. "We do not believe in the promises of the Quadruple Entente, Italy, one of the Allies, treacherously broke her treaty of 33 years. We believe in Germany, which is fighting the whole world to fulfill her treaty with Austria."

"Bulgaria must fight at the victor's side. The Germans and Austro-Hungarians are victorious on all fronts. Russia soon will have collapsed entirely. Then will come the turn of France, Italy and Serbia. Bulgaria would commit suicide if she did not fight on the side of the Central Powers, who offer the only possibility of realizing her desire for union of all Bulgarian peoples."

The Government is prepared to take stern measures to crush all domestic attempts to impair Bulgarian unity. Public opinion, it is declared, is not entirely unanimous in support of the King, and reports indicate that the mobilization is being carried on with difficulty.

"For Bulgaria's glory and Macedonia's freedom," the old battle cry, is written across the new flags which have been unfurled by the mobilizing army. The official Bulgarian newspaper Norodny Prava reminds Ferdinand of his words to the army two years ago: "Furl the glorious flags for better days."

"These says," says the paper, "have now come. The sword must prove it stronger than the intrigues of the enemy. Citizens, your longings will be accomplished. The signal for departure will not long be delayed."

NO FORMAL DECLARATION OF WAR.

Nish, Oct. 8.—(Special)—Although there has been no formal declaration of war, the cordial reception by Bulgarian officers at Sofia of the German aviators who dropped bombs on Belgrade and Nish yesterday is regarded here as tantamount to the commencement of hostilities against Serbia by Bulgaria.

ROUMANIA TO MOBILIZE.

Geneva, Oct. 8, via Paris.—Information reached Geneva by way of Munich yesterday from a source which is regarded as reliable, that Roumania will issue a decree for general mobilization within the next twelve hours.

WHOLESALE ARRESTS OF AGRARIAN PARTY.

Budapest, Oct. 8.—Wholesale arrests of the leaders of the Agrarian party in Bulgaria, one member of whom recently told King Ferdinand he was putting his head in hanger, are reported from Sofia.

LACHINE CHURCH BURNED DOWN

Incendiary Fire Destroyed Parish Church, L'Anglaise des Saintes Anges

EDIFICE WAS VALUED AT \$250,000—ENTIRE NEIGHBORHOOD WAS AT ONE TIME THREATENED
Montreal, Oct. 8.—Fire of incendiary origin, the third to break out in as many days, last night destroyed the Lachine parish church, L'Eglise des Saintes Anges, and for a time threatened the entire neighborhood, including St. Joseph's Hospital, from which the patients were removed to places of safety. The edifice was established in the early sixties, and, including additions and improvements was valued at \$250,000 only part of which is covered by insurance. Ugly rumors are current in Lachine concerning the origin of the fire of last night, and the two outbreaks which were caught on Tuesday before they had gained a dangerous start. No accidents were reported.

YAGUI INDIANS MASSACRE U. S. CITIZENS

Douglas, Ariz., Oct. 8.—(Special)—Twenty-three inhabitants of La Colorado, a mining town in the Hermosillo, Sonora district, were massacred by Yaqui Indians, who captured the town this week, according to reports received here last night. Women and children were beaten to death, it was said.

MASKED MEN HOLD UP TRAIN AND SECURE BOOTY

Wheeling, Va., Oct. 8.—(Special)—Two masked men early to-day held up and robbed a Baltimore & Ohio express train from New York to St. Louis, two miles west of Central, W. Va. Their booty was taken from mail cars, according to reports received here, and was believed to be large.

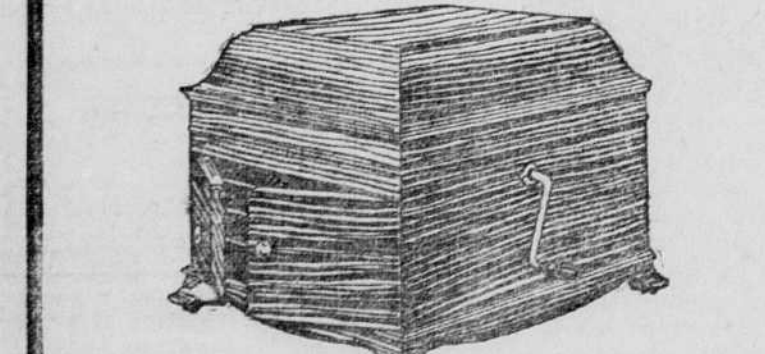

Farwell Tendered Rev. Rural Dean Jeakins
And Mrs. Jeakins on Eve of Their
Departure

REFERENCE MADE TO GOOD
WORK ACCOMPLISHED IN
THE PARISH DURING
THE 17 YEARS.

Waterloo, Oct. 8.—(Special)—A
large social gathering of the con-
gregation of St. Luke's Church met in
the Church Hall, Waterloo, on Wed-

farewell to the Rev. T. B. Jeakins
and family. The chairman of the

The opening address was given by
the venerable chairman, who review-
ed the rectorate of Mr. Jeakins for

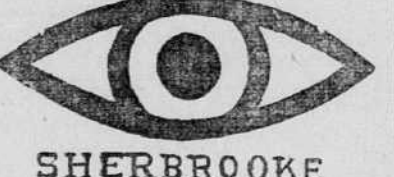

with "Comforts" not provided for by
the Government. Two Conven-
ers, Mrs. De Lottinville and Mrs. Ar-
thur Fraser were elected by the Gen-
eral Committee of the S. P. A.,
with power to elect any other officers
or members they might think neces-
sary for the successful carrying on of
the work. At present the Work Com-
mittee consists of two conveners,
Mrs. De Lottinville and Mrs. Arthur
Fraser, Secretary, Miss Florence
Hunt, Treasurer, Mrs. Arthur Fraser
Elected member to the Executive,
Mrs. J. P. Wells, A. Sub., or "Work
Committee" of four members, viz.,
Mrs. James Robertson, Mrs. John
McKechnie, Mrs. E. O. Grundy and
Miss Annie Elkins, who with a faith-
ful band of "workers" comprise a
very harmonious whole.

Although we commenced our work
on a very small scale we have gra-
dually increased our efforts, and since
some of the business men of Sheri-
brooke have come to our rescue, and
financed us for our regular expenses
by generously allowing us \$150.00
each month, our work has gone on
very smoothly and uninterruptedly.

Reports re "Comforts" sent at
first to our men at Valcartier, and
Christmas gifts to Salisbury Plain,
together with several donations to the
Navy have already been published,
so we will not repeat here.

Since the Canadian soldiers have
been at the "Front" we have shipped
regularly one or two large packing
cases of "Comforts" (chiefly) socks
every month to the Canadian War
Contingent Association, London,
England, who ship them directly to
the "Front," as the Canadian Offi-
cers requisitioned the. So there is
no waste or overlapping and we have
the satisfaction of knowing that our
efforts are appreciated by a number
of letters received from the Head Of-
fice in London, England, and which
we publish from time to time in the
local papers. Over 7000 articles
have been made and distributed to
Canadian Soldiers during the war.
These figures do not include tobacco,
cigarettes, soap, chewing gum, etc.,
which have been sent in every box
each month.

Our very grateful thanks are due
to the Gentlemen who have relieved
us of our great burden "raising
money."

To local merchants who have given
us goods at wholesale prices, pro-
viding packing cases, loaned their
teams for carting etc. To the Presi-
dent and Officers of the Sherbrooke
Patriotic Association, who have al-
ways been "behind us" in any effort
we have undertaken. We also wish
to thank most heartily all the kind
friends in and out of Sherbrooke,
who by their loyal support, donations
money and knitting have helped us
to successfully accomplish the work
we have done during the past year.

OFFICERS BUSY AT THE LINE

Seizures Made at Rock Island
During Week

A \$6000 CAR TAKEN FROM PROMINENT MONTREAL DOCTOR.

Rock Island, October 8.—(Special)—The customs officials have been rather busier than usual this week, the big haul being a \$6000 car owned by a prominent Montreal doctor. The doctor claims that he understood the duty had been paid on the car, that he called at the customs office to report but finding no one in, drove along to Stanstead where he met the customs officer who seized his car.

Stories are current of numerous other seizures, one being of a car from a neighbouring town which crossed the line without reporting. It is said that a party of young ladies from one of the local schools were lined up in the customs office with sundry small parcels, and duty collected.

The days of the imaginary line appear to have past. The line is now very much in evidence.

The Stanstead Journal referring to the seizure of the \$6000 car noted above says:

MOTOR CAR SEIZED.

"On Monday one of Canada's foremost citizens was subjected to a very humiliating experience in this place. A professional man of highest standing in the Dominion, he had purchased a new Pierce Arrow car in the United States with the understanding that the matter of duties was to be arranged by agents of the company through the Montreal customs house. He was accompanied by two daughters and passed the customs house at Rock Island. On the street at Stanstead he made some inquiry about the matter and stopped for dinner at the Stanstead hotel. While at the meal a messenger notified him that he must report at the Rock Island customs and upon arrival there he was informed that his car was under seizure and that he would be allowed to proceed with it upon payment of \$6,000. The contention that he was trying to smuggle the car can hardly be maintained. The alleged impossibility of the passing Rock Island customs agency without noticing it has been suggested, and it is said that the occupants of the car failed to recognize some sort of a 'stop signal' after they had passed. The Main street customs office is very noticeable when you know just where to look for it, but to the stranger, and especially to the city man, passing through we fancy it would look quite as much like a second-hand auction room as anything else, especially if the flag be wound on the crude staff as it was on Monday afternoon. Then again city folks are not likely to be gaping about if they happen to hear a noise. The fact that the party stopped at Stanstead for dinner should convince any reasonable man that they were not trying to get away. Is it reasonable to expect that anyone would knowingly disregard a government 'challenge' and then stop to eat within a mile? The procedure may not have been altogether business-like, but it is quite possible that the man had given no thought to the business details. The half-dozen men in his class on this continent are so absorbed with their efforts to relieve suffering and save human life that they have few thoughts of 'business.' They may receive large fees from those who are abundantly able to pay, but the bulk of their labors are given for the benefit of mankind. It frequently happens that the man who is most clever in his profession may be most careless in business matters. He may even be so absorbed in his work that he gives no thought to business. The gentleman in question had visited this place professionally upon rare occasions, but the villages were not familiar to him.
