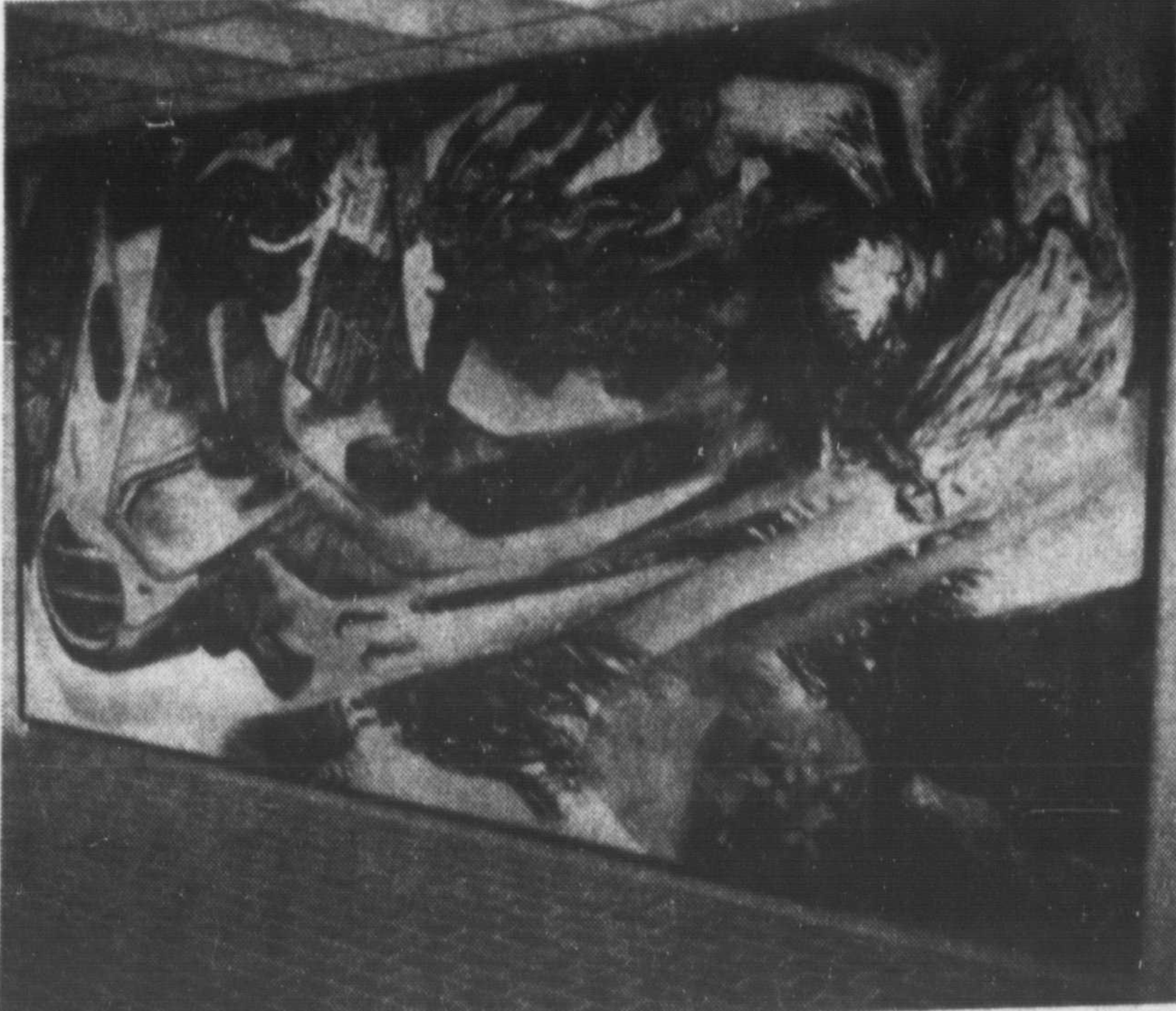

## More wardens, more police trees for manor, French TV and better road plowing

At County Council on Wednesday, December 11, the Mayors of Pontiac passed a by-law to authorize the Council to impose all future rates of taxation within its jurisdiction by resolution.

A recommendation by a Recreational Committee submitted in September was adopted. This recommendation was in respect of distribution of sales tax recovery from unorganized territories. The disbursement will be \$500 to municipalities receiving less than \$2,000 in sales tax recovery, \$300 to those receiving between two and three thousand and two hundred dollars to all other municipalities.

The poor maintenance of Highway 8 in winter had been brought to the attention of the Minister concerned after the September meeting of County Council and in replying the Minister had implied that improvements would be made within his budgetary means. The Council felt that no improvement had been shown although the maintenance contractors are generously reimbursed. Council recommended that specific directions be made to the contractors to move out with plows during and after storms, not several days later and that in future years winter road maintenance be provided by the Department of Roads men and machines.

Council expressed its gratitude to Quebec Provincial Police Sgt Lapointe for making arrangements for ambulance services in emergency cases with the St John Ambulance in Pembroke when commercial service is not available.

A motion was passed requesting nine more men on the Campbell's Bay Detachment of the QPP for more effective policing through the County.

A discussion of County roads revealed that there are none in Pontiac. Roads between municipalities are shared equally by those municipalities concerned for maintenance purposes.

A request was authorized to Mr Larivee of Hull for trees to improve the grounds at St Joseph's Manor, Campbell's Bay.

Council congratulated Warden Bill Burke on his appointment to the Board of Directors of the Union of County Councils. He attends their meeting in Quebec City this Thursday.

Mayor Edgar Lance of Campbell's Bay and Mayor Eugene Pigeon of Calumet Island moved that a request be made to the French network for a relay station to better serve television viewers in West Pontiac and the Council carried the request which was subsequently made.

Council also requested the Department of Fish and Game to bring the County Staff of Wardens up to strength, on

Motion of Mayor Francis Devlin of Bryson and Mayor Ken Bronson, South Onslow. They also requested a Dept of Fish and Game office in Campbell's Bay.

The secretary, Art Labelle, was instructed also to write to the Department of Lands and Forests to find out who owns islands 80 and 81 in the Township of Sheen.

Valuation rolls are examined and it is moved by Cr K. Bronson seconded by Cr P. Dontigny that the rolls be adjusted and equalized on the following basis:

1. The guide shall be one half of the factor established by the school boards for 1968
2. If rate established by local municipality approximated that of school equalization it will be accepted.

## Night school classes start here in January

Adult education will be available to the extent that it is desired starting in January 1969 and being increased in September, 1969. Using the rooms and facilities of the new Pontiac High School in Shawville adult education classes will be held during the evening hours through the week.

To discover what courses are wanted a committee has been set up and anyone interested in taking a course or in teaching a course may contact one of the committee members who are: Mrs Bretzlaff, Mrs Elliott, Mrs Crawford, Mrs Steeves and Mrs Dickson.

If enough people want a course it will be given. As soon as some courses have been applied for they will be listed in THE EQUITY and an effort made to recruit enough members to make up a class. Already one request has been made for a class in speed-writing and it is hoped that others will sign up for this course.

Other suggestions are typing, bookkeeping, high school subjects, English for French people, French for English

people, sewing, cooking and nutrition, art, drama, physical fitness, carpentry, auto mechanics, Spanish, Russian, German, drafting, metal work, public speaking—you name it and the committee will try to provide it for you.

The adult education program will be administered by the Protestant Regional School Board of the Ottawa Valley and is open to anyone who wishes to enrol.

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## MISUSE OF WELFARE

The Unemployment Insurance Commission is making a big effort to clean up the abuse of its services. This is good news to people who get very worked up about the fact that some folks draw unemployment checks and also are employed or employable but prefer to do nothing and live off the hard work of others.

The big push on the part of the government has found overpayments where statements made in claims were wrong amounted to 412,908.00 during four months of 1968. The average overpayment detected was \$99.00.

In June, 1968, five prison terms were imposed for abuses by claimants and investigations are continuing with extra staff, to protect the honest worker and taxpayer against these abuses.

In some cases it might be better for the welfare of a man's family for him to draw unemployment than to work part time at a low paid job. When it is purely a matter of dollars and cents the man will naturally wish to do whatever brings in the most money. So it does happen that everyone who is on unemployment insurance isn't just lazy. But the idea of doing nothing for a living because doing nothing earns more than working is repugnant.

So why not attach some kind of work to the system of receiving unemployment insurance? The money comes from the government treasury which means the money belongs to the tax paying public. There is work that can be done for the benefit of the public which recipients of unemployment cheques could do. This would keep them fit and able to take on regular employment as soon as a job becomes available, and it would also give them a part to play in the community, and would remove the temptation to draw unemployment insurance while actually drawing wages.

A gang of young men left here last week in charge of Foreman James McCord to work in a lumber camp for the Geo Gordon Co in Northern Ontario, at high wages. Among the bunch were James and Auley Black of this village.

Mr Armen Dagg will have charge of the rink again this winter. Bristol Corners is to have a much better and larger open-air rink this winter than anything heretofore attempted in that line, and the lovers of hockey in that rising burg will doubtless see to it that they will have a team on deck to compete with other towns.

December 13, 1888

A by-law will be submitted to the ratepayers of Pembroke in a few weeks by the Town Council asking for authority to raise by way of a loan the sum of \$50,000 for the purpose of constructing a system of water-works for that town.

Mr Somerville will soon have the rink completed. The building will be more commodious than last year's structure in consequence for the absence of centre posts.

A new post office has been opened in Bristol, at Smiths station, on the PPJR. Mr J. Bell merchant is post-master. The name of the office is Maryland.

School boys will ever be in mischief. There comes a report from Bristol, to the effect that two boys of No 2 about a mile below Maple Ridge post office, one day last week had a great desire to see the effects of a cartridge exploding on the hot stove and with this object in view placed a cartridge on the stove. The children were all standing round the stove, and the teacher, Miss Stevenson, thinking the youngsters were warming themselves, never dreaming for a moment that anything so fraught with danger was about to take place, paid no attention to them until the explosion occurred. The result was that all who were standing round the stove—between 12 and 15 children were more or less injured, but fortunately none seriously. Had the operation worked successfully the boys had intended putting two or three cartridges in the stove at dinnertime and a few more on top of the stove. They are now so fright-

### Telephone complaint

Ladysmith, P.Q.  
15 Dec., 1968

Dear Editor,

On behalf of my neighbors and myself I would like to complain publicly about the treatment we in the Ladysmith area have been getting from the Pontiac Rural Telephone Company.

Since Bell took over the company last Spring we have been hoping for an improvement in the appalling service we have been getting. But not until the beginning of November were we put in the dial system. This may sound like an improvement, but the fact is that we are still hitched up to the old lines, which are in some places lying on the ground for half a mile, with the result that reception is marred by a constant roaring noise (which becomes deafening every time it rains) and the telephones are out of order many days each month. Also there are still ten people on each line.

The telephone company said they would have the new lines installed by December 15 and that the delay was being caused by the Hydro having to put up new poles—there is always someone else to blame of course. At any rate, no new lines have yet been installed.

Of course the telephone company is in a good position, as there is no competition to force better service out of them. I suppose they feel that as we in the Ladysmith area have had bad service for so long, we can put up with it a while longer.

It is shocking that within 50 miles of the capital of one of the most technologically advanced countries in the world, people cannot even count on an adequate telephone service.

Apart from the inconvenience of having to shout at friends down the telephone, having conversations listened to by half a dozen other people and not being able to make long distance calls because of impossible reception, there are two main grounds for com-

## COURT REPORT

Court was held at Campbell's Bay with District Judge Avila Labelle presiding.

Fourteen hunters pleaded guilty to a number of infractions of the Game Laws and between them were sentenced to fines amounting to \$1,455. Fined \$200 each plus court costs were Gilles Seguin, and Liberio Gentile, Montreal who were caught hunting moose in the LaVerendrye Park Reserve without a permit to do so. Gilles Gauthier Ville d'Anjou, Quebec and Andre Larose rue Ste Marie sur Le Lac who were both accused of hunting moose before the open season. Jean Piche, Montreal paid a total of \$225 for hunting moose in the La Verendrye Park Reserve without a permit and for illegal possession of a rifle equipped with a telescope, on a Crown land erected as a Game Reserve. Fined a total of \$50 were Real Dion Laval des Rapides and Roger Faucher Ste Therese de Blainville who were caught by the Game Wardens in possession of rifles in the La Verendrye Park without permits and for transporting a loaded rifle in a motor vehicle. Fined \$25 each plus the Court costs were Robert Faucher Ste Therese de Blainville and Clifford Dawson Millesles, Allan Dawson Millesles who were all caught in possession of rifles in a Provincial Game reserve without a permit to that effect.

Also fined \$25 was Onil Charon Ste Therese de Blainville who was charged with transporting a loaded rifle in a motor vehicle. Fined a total of \$225 was Dr Yvon Rivest of Montreal who pleaded guilty to charges of hunting moose one hour after sundown and one hour before sunrise, jack-lighting and transporting a loaded rifle in a motor vehicle. Gilles Guerin Montreal paid a \$5 fine plus court costs for hunting in La Verendrye Park without a special permit to do so.

Gerald Plouffe, 47 Campbell's Bay charged with impaired driving on the 7th of Dec, 1968 on a public road at Thornby was fined \$100 plus Court costs. He was prohibited to drive a motor vehicle in Canada for a period of three months.

A Pembroke man, David Dreibit, 35 was fined a total of \$125 plus court costs for taking a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner, and impaired driving. The court was told that the accused took a pick-up truck parked on main street in Chapeau and due to his advanced state of inebriation drove it only for a short distance before being involved in a car accident.

Raymond Gervais 33 of Fort Coulonge who was accused of disturbing the peace in a Davidson Hotel, assault on a Peace Officer and resisting arrest was fined a total of \$45 plus court costs. The QPP reported to Judge Labelle that they were checking a Hotel in Davidson in order to find out if all patrons were of age, when they came upon the accused who was drinking at the place. Gervais did not seem to appreciate the presence of the officers in the hotel, interfered with their work called them all the dirty names he could think of and when put under arrest for causing a disturbance he assaulted one of them. When asked for time to pay his fine he was refused but was able to raise the money from his friends and thus avoided the jail term.

Leo Durand, 44 Lac a la Tortue, PQ was fined and paid \$100 plus court costs when he pleaded guilty to a

charge of impaired driving. Guy Poirier, 23 of Ste Therese de Blainville was given a suspended sentence by having him post a personal bail bond of \$200 to keep the peace for a period of one year after he pleaded guilty to stealing tools valued at \$265 from a tow truck. Tools were recovered by the QP.

Leonard Richard of Renfrew who caused a disturbance in a Portage du Fort Hotel was fined \$50 and ordered to reimburse \$50 to the Hotel Management for damages caused in the Hotel plus \$21 to the bartender to pay for his torn clothes, besides paying 68.65 for court costs. He was ordered to post a personal bail bond to keep the peace for a period of 2 years.

Lawrence Sparling, 60 of Campbell's Bay was fined \$100, plus court costs when found guilty of impaired driving on No 8 highway at Bryson on the 27th day of November, 1968. His driver's permit was suspended for a period of three months.

It was Christmas 1943—25 years ago. Our hospital, No 2 C.C.S., RCAMC was stationed in a large family house in a village between Lewes and Haywards Heath in Sussex.

Many of the patients had been discharged to their units in time for the holiday. Very few of our personnel were on leave and we had arranged a party in a large empty ward. We were to be hosts to our English neighbours. All enjoyed the Canadian atmosphere.

Shortly after eleven o'clock carols were sung.

Towards midnight the Roman Catholics went to the nearby Knights of Columbus hut for mass.

We had all things ready. After the floor was swept the Altar was set up. The hymn, "O Come, all ye faithful," began the service of the Holy Communion, with Canadian soldiers and their English friends participating.

The CO read the words of the Prophet Isaiah: "Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Emmanuel."

"Unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given." This was a Christmas Celebration with people from every province there. Each would have a different mental picture; the potato farm in P.E.I., the bean crop in Western Ontario and the mining town in B.C.

The padre whose home town was the Hamilton Tigers, realizing something of this, at the Offertory asked for prayers for our homes. Together we joined in singing our national anthem, "O Canada".

To the people of Sussex these words and music were new and, maybe, a little strange. But they caught something of the feeling contained in them and were stirred.

Later a worker in the village canteen told me quietly that it brought tears to her eyes.

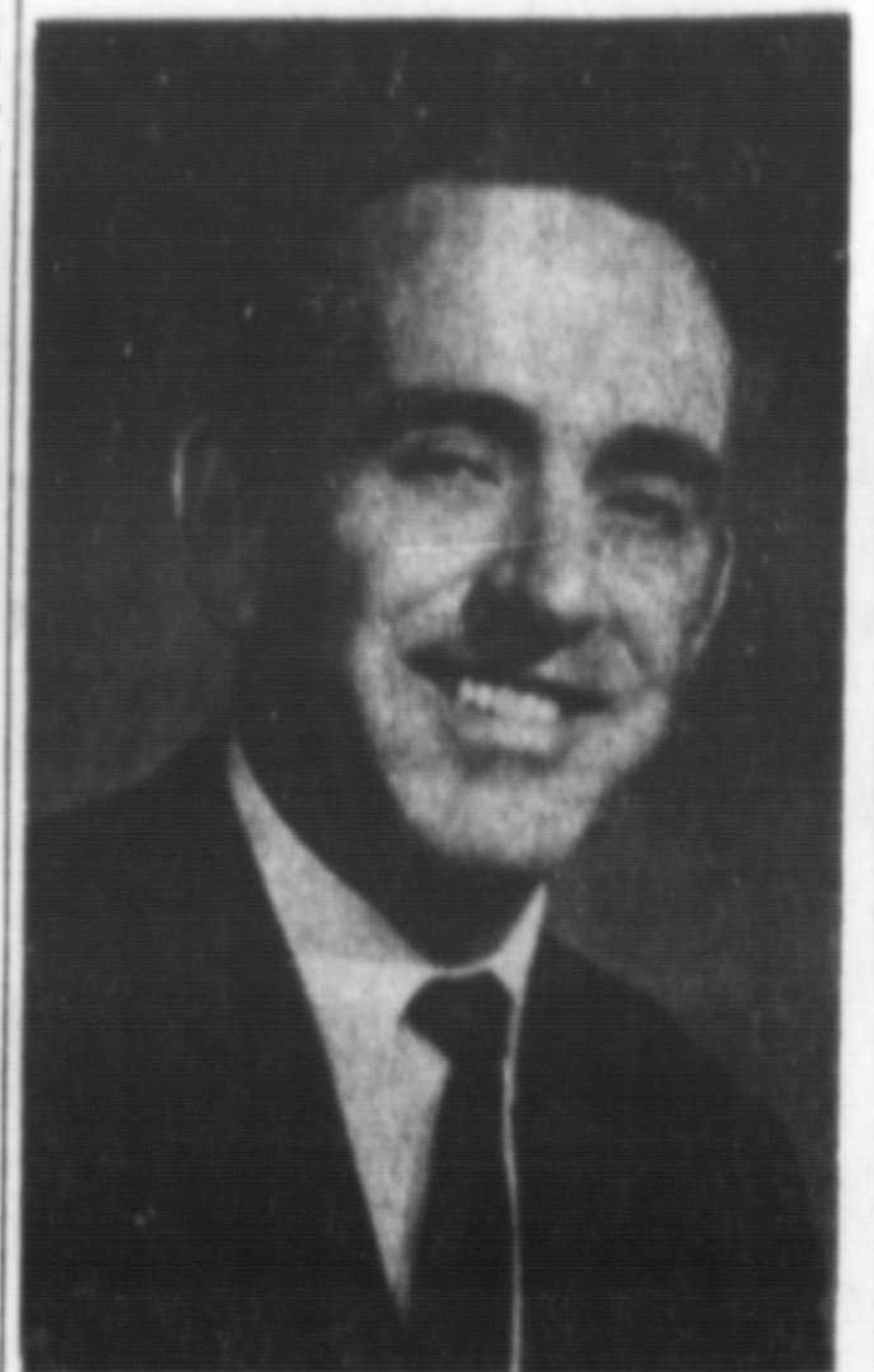
