Lesage Promises Rural Roads Grant Increase

Premier Lesage yesterday announced that his Government has decided to increase grants towards the cost of keeping rural roads open during the winter.

In the past the Government paid \$250 a mile towards the cost of keeping regional highways open during the winter months. It paid \$175 a mile towards the clearance of rural roads.

Mr. Lesage said that hereafter the grant of \$250 a mile will apply to rural roads as well as to regional highways. Approximately 2,300 miles of rural roads would be affected.

The Premier made his announcement at a political rally as he continued his campaign for re-election in the Quebec Nov. 14 general election.

Shawville U N Meeting

As the old saying goes, all is fair in love and war (and politics) and so it was at the Union National meeting in the S. H. S. auditorium last night when the candidate for re-election in Pontiac, Raymond Johnston and his fellow speakers Edgar Allard, Chas. Imison, Lee Hodgins and George Pirie stood up to defend the records of the U. N. party from 1944 to 1960 and to re-hash the Liberal reign of the last 27 mos. Chairman Carson Hodgins introduced and thanked the speakers.

First was Edgar Allard, Campbell's Bay Lawyer who spoke on the subject of nationalization of electricity in the Province of Quebec. "We, of Quebec, still believing as democrats, enjoy free enterprise and wish to continue enjoying it," he said.

"In 1944, 19% of the people in this province benefitted from electricity and in 1960, 98% of the population partook of its benefits. The Liberals insist that if expropriation is carried out, power costs will be cut to the consumer and new industries will be encouraged. But, we of Quebec already have the lowest rate of power of any province of Canada with statistics to prove it. This applies to cities, villages and rural communities. So it is not because of the power rates in

Quebec that new industries do not venture into this province. Nationalization will scare other industries away because the Liberal party is already speaking of expropriating the mines, pulp and paper mills and telephone companies."

Another issue in the Liberal campaign scored by Mr. Allard was that if they nationalize these mills, companies, etc., we will be masters of our destiny. "We fear the Minister of Hydraulics, Mr. Levesque is steering us down the road, to put the Government of Quebec in full control, so that this province will be an entirely socialistic state and separate us completely from the other nine sister provinces said Allard. Speaking of the cost of the expropriation, the quoted \$800,000,000 is really a rather conservative figure he said. Reminding us of one of the Liberal promises of the last election, that there would be no tax raise, and then managing to raise 19 new ones as well as borrowing millions of dollars. Mr. Allard said the Lesage government does admit that they may be obliged to raise the taxes again if we go along with the expropriation scheme.

Second speaker was a former Mayor of Shawville Lee Hodgins who spoke of the financial assistance received by the Munic-

ipality of Shawville from Ray and his government during his terms of office as well as during the terms of the late Emmerson Cotie and his council, of the road widening projects and winter snow ploughing first initiated in the rural communities, so that all country folk had accessible roads during the winter months.

George Pirie spoke of the certainty of the U. N. voters when they nominated only one good man, knowing that that was all they needed and they had him in the person of Ray Johnston.

He said Liberal uncertainty is seen right up the ladder to Quebec City.

George continued by saying that the Liberal party had not done the great things for agriculture that the U. N. party did while in power. "Of course they did cut the premiums on farm produce and degraded our livestock" said George, "and few improvements have been made in local communities in the last 27 months." "We know of no colonization grants in the Bristol Community" he said.

Charles Imison, fourth speaker of the evening asked why the Quebec government should call an election when it has the mandate for four years, after having completed only 27 months of (Continued on Page Eight)

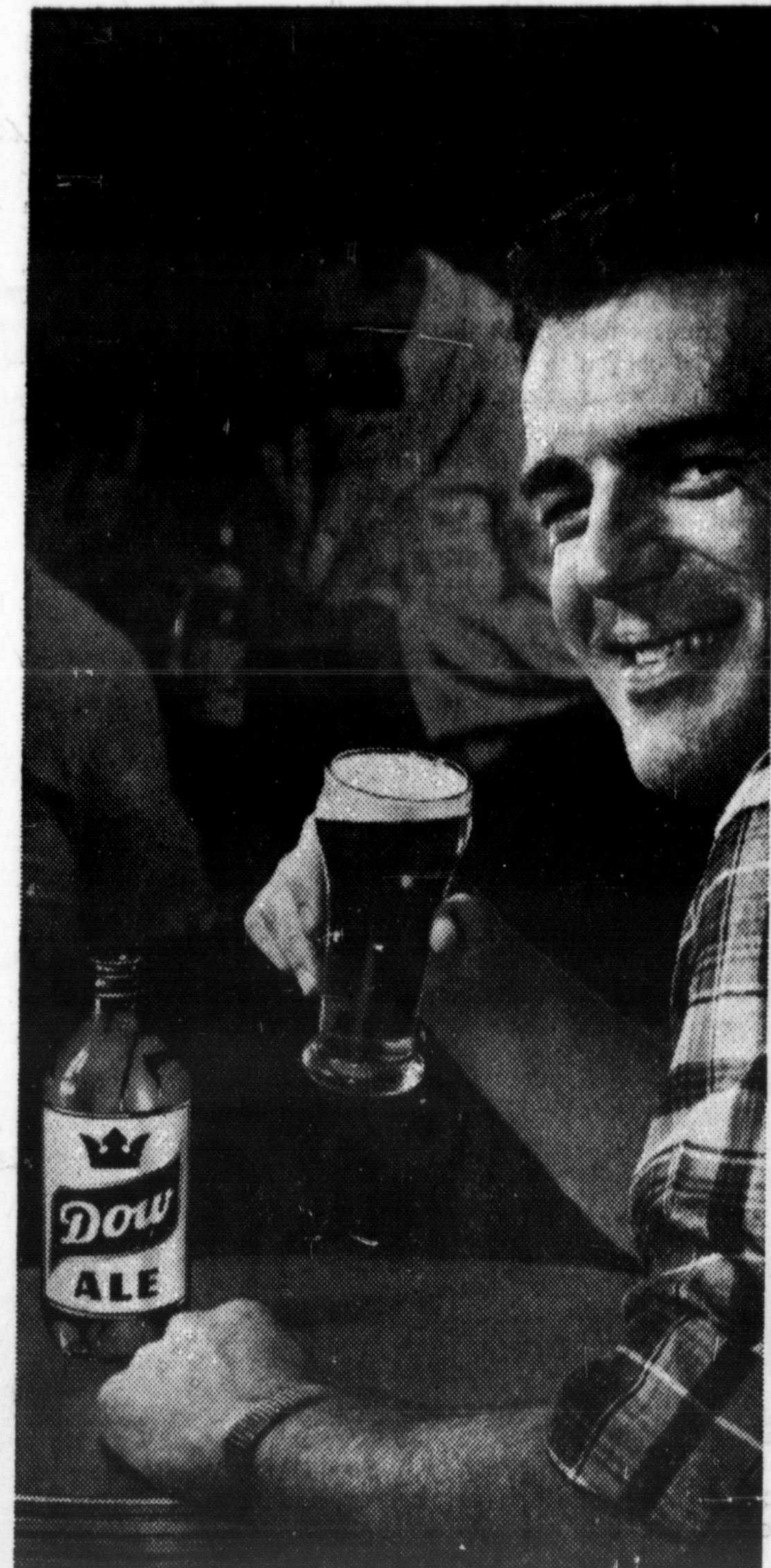
So goes a good evening entertainment for another year, and it must be noted that the lack of rowdyism at this party was very obvious!

this?" Elections cost money and now the Liberal government comes to the people with the single issue — expropriation of

the power companies, when just one single act of legislature could pass it, without calling an election. This issue, he said, is only a smokescreen.

The Liberal government he continued, has gone on record as one of delays, contradictions, misadministration of Quebec's affairs

excessive taxation, etc., and now we are asked to vote for and re-instate this government for another four years! The excessive taxes spoken of, to mention just a few of the 19 new ones are, increases in Income tax, retail tax from 2 to 4%, increase in Corporation tax of 4%, increase tax on electrical installation and even a tax on electrical inspection, taxes doubled on power bills and telephone bills, hotel licences increased, hunting licences, hospital tax on all beverages served in hotels, even including milk and to top everything off, an increase in a marriage licence from \$8. to \$20. "If re-elected, Ray would no doubt be a cabinet minister", prophesied Charlie Imlison.

On taking the floor as the main speaker of the evening, Mr. Johnston told of his reaction on hearing the Sept. 19 radio news flash on announcing the Nov. 14 election.

Immediately the newspaper people began telephoning to ask him his opinion of the rather startling newsflash. "Was he surprised?" was the main question. The very simple answer was "Not at all, we, the UN representatives were expecting it shortly, taking into consideration the way that this Liberal government was conducting its affairs, and a second session still not having been completed." UN members clearly saw the trouble the Liberal Gov't. was encountering. The Lesage government was borrowing millions of dollars and was having internal trouble within its own cabinet, stemming mostly from the expropriation issue. "The main argument of the Liberals being that they could save \$15,000,000 corporation tax which goes to the Federal Gov't. at Ottawa each year. But at the fantastic amount of at least \$30,000,000 interest per year on the money borrowed to pay off the huge principal, the Liberal

gov't. would still be behind \$15,000,000 besides not having lowered the principal. We simply must understand now the impossibility, carrying this purchase through, especially when these power companies are operating efficiently and with satisfactory rates" said Ray.

Ray spoke of the extensive work accomplished under the U.N. rule, of its road building in Pontiac, new schools, bridges and assistance to hospitals, new pensions.

At the word "hospital" every-

one in the audience just waited to hear Mr. Johnston tell of the deplorable situation that this government has allowed the Quebec hospitals to sink into all over the province. Ray also reminded us of the complete stand still of the construction of the Fort Coulonge hospital, so badly needed in that area, also of the promised addition to Chapeau, still not done. He said also that tenders from Montreal, Deschenes and Montreal were given our local job of the one mile stretch of highway being rebuilt above

Waltham, the C. Bay-Otter Lake Hill (plans already set up for this under the last U.N. gov't) and several other examples. Outside tenders got the job for a higher tender to leave all our local contractors sitting idle.

Ray asked his listeners to read the program that has been sent to everyone by mail of the U.N. record from 1944 - 1960, to compare and check it 4 years from now and see how many of its promises will have been fulfilled after this U.N. Gov't takes over again on Nov. 15th.

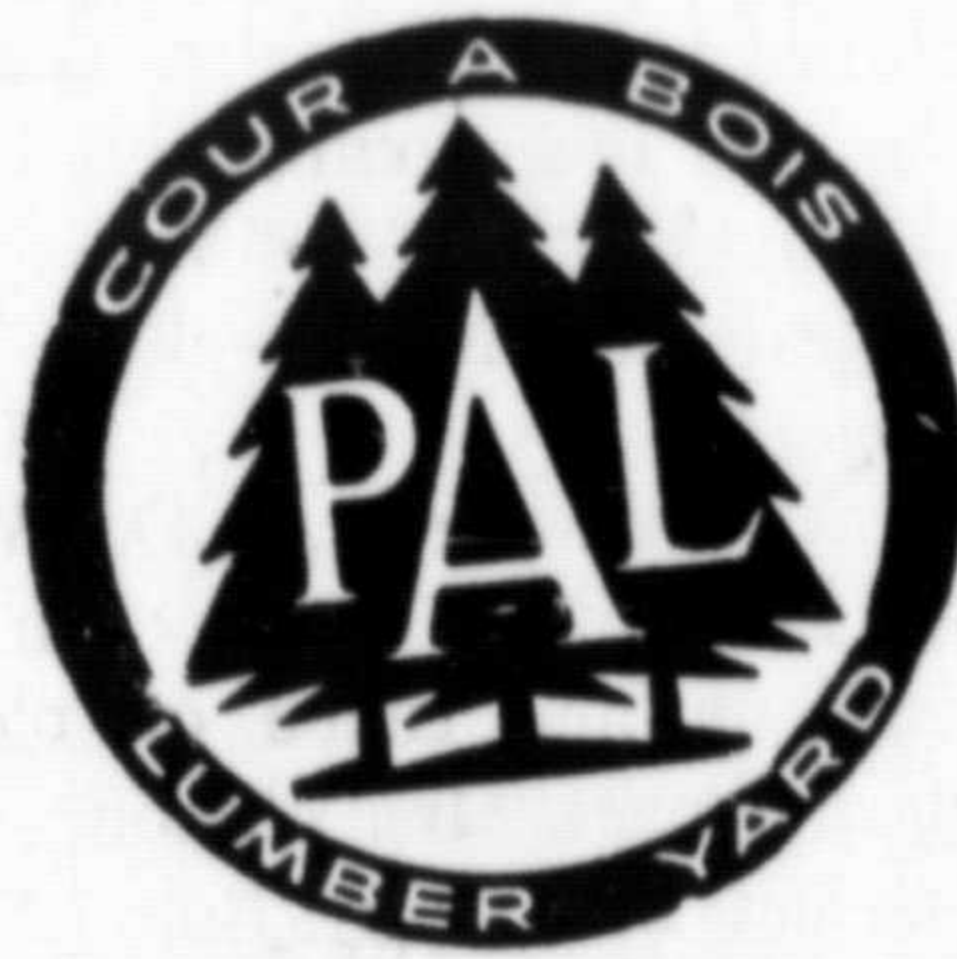

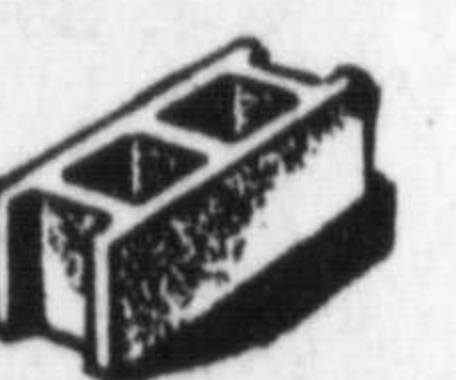

ELECTRICITY and PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

THE NEED

Public ownership of the electricity generating and distributing system is an economic necessity.

Quebec needs —

- ★ Cheap power for industrial development;
- ★ Greater direct investment in industrial expansion;
- ★ Lower consumer power rates in many areas;
- ★ New jobs in new industries for a growing population.

A responsible government must act to achieve these objectives. In the past 18 months, the private companies, through no fault of their own, could not supply the demands for stable, heavy loads of cheap electricity of a new zinc smelter at Valleyfield, a new stainless steel mill near Sorel and a new newsprint mill at Chandler in Gaspé. All three are now served by Quebec Hydro.

THE SOLUTION

The future of Quebec demands that the problem be solved. New jobs are needed. A larger home market for our goods and services is essential. How can this be done?

- ★ Industrialization;
- ★ A single integrated electricity system;
- ★ Greater buying power through higher employment.

Only through public ownership of the electricity system can these objectives be realized. Quebec Hydro can finance modernization and expansion at reasonable rates of interest. The savings in Federal taxation and the payment of dividends can be employed in lowering power rates.

AN UNDERTAKING

Fair play demands that public ownership of our power facilities must be achieved in a climate of good faith and honesty. There must be—

- ★ Fair treatment of shareholders;
- ★ Recourse to the courts;
- ★ Protection of employee rights and jobs.

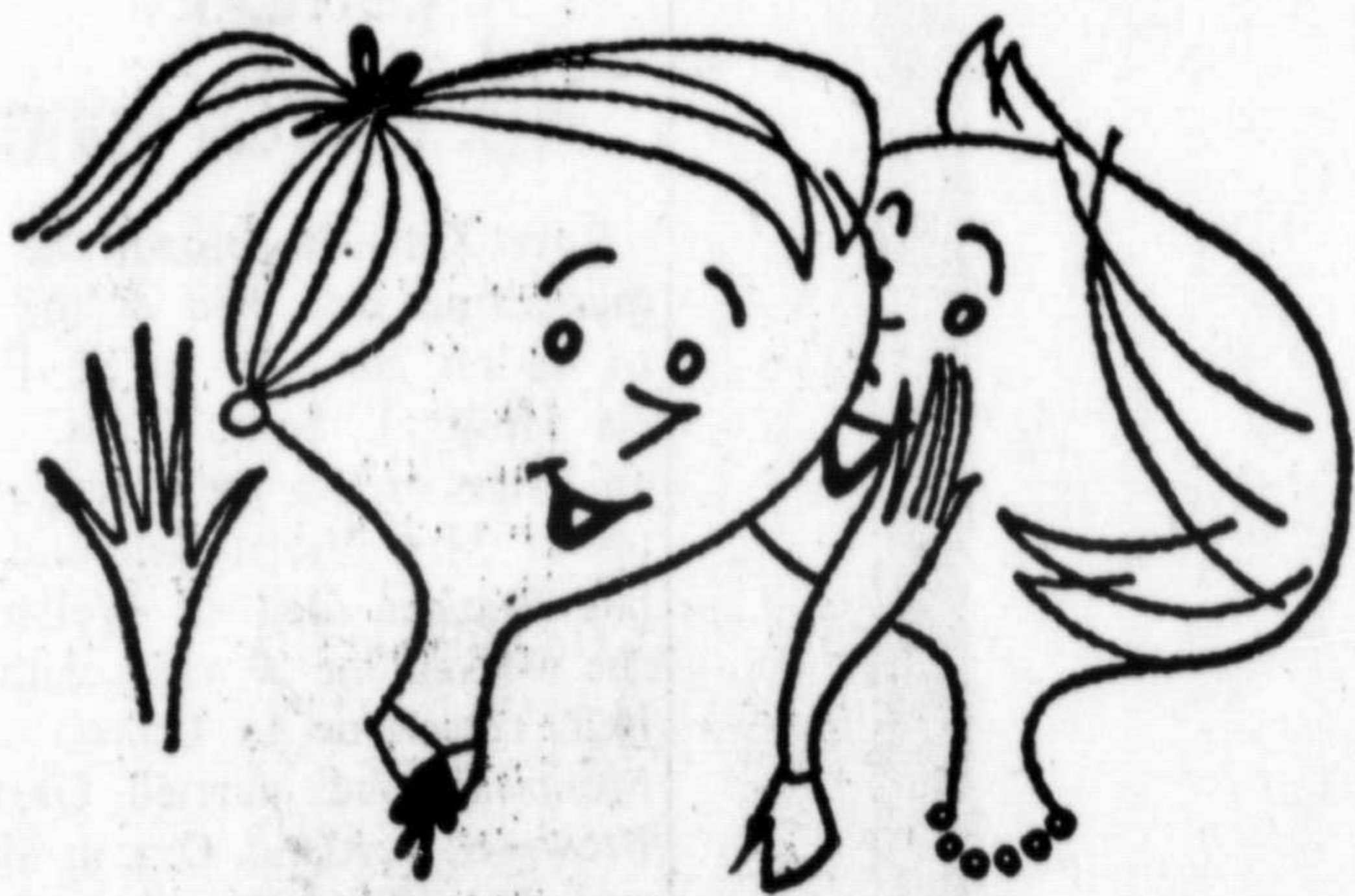
