OH THAT PLUMBING !

There ought to be a law against plumbing that don't plumb. Twice during the past three years we've had to call in one of those gents with a rubber helper in order to get our sewer to function properly. It so happened that we had a different plumber on each occasion. Both did what he was supposed to do, and both, in an unsolicited testimonial to the quality of the plumbing, said in effect that the original job was lousy. Both expressed the view that the pipes had been installed by rank amateurs, or at least unskilled professionals, with corner-cutting on joints one of the prime causes of blockage.

Now, we don't know whether to blame the construction company that hired the plumbers, themselves, or the government for ever giving them licenses to plumb, but the fact remains that we, the home-owners, have to hold the bag, or rather the pipe.

If you build a house with your own two hands, there are certain jobs you cannot do yourself (unless you happened to be licensed in the particular trade called for.) One of these jobs is electrical wiring, another is plumbing. Any handyman worth his salt, however, could surely do a much better job than the so-called professionals who were let loose in many of the homes hereabouts.

MIRACLE GARDENING ?

We dropped across an invaluable little pocket book with this title the other day. Even if you think you know everything about the subject, you'll find hundreds of useful little hints, and all for 35c.

Among one of the intriguing suggestions, which we're about to try out, is the spraying of

various plants with a solution of gibberellic acid, an amazing by product of one of the recent wonder drugs. It apparently increases the plant's capacity for food; you then proceed to give it liquid plant food, and presto, your spindly little geranium is suddenly a green giant, smothered with huge blooms. (The book, for obvious reasons, does not mention products by brand name, so to save you the trouble of hunting down the miracle spray, we'll pass on the information that gibberellic acid is available at garden supply houses under the trade name "Gibrel". You can get it in concentrated form, or in a ready-to-use aerosol bomb.)

250 New Homes Under Construction

Mr. Gerard Bruchesi, member of the Federal Parliament for the Beauharnois-Salaberry constituency told the SUN that during the first four months of 1961, January, February, March and April, the construction of new homes in this area has been excellent.

Mr. Bruchesi noted that in the Chateauguay area, where there is a great amount of activity, this is mainly due to the large number of new homes which have been started since the year.

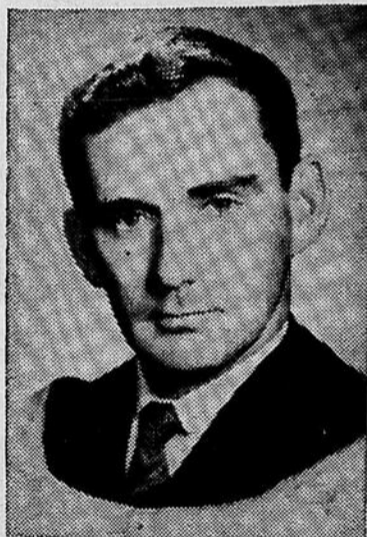

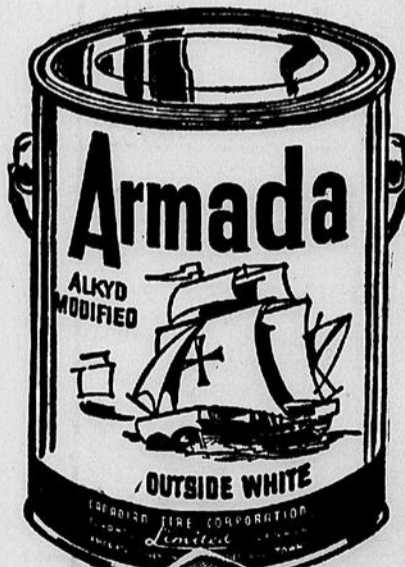

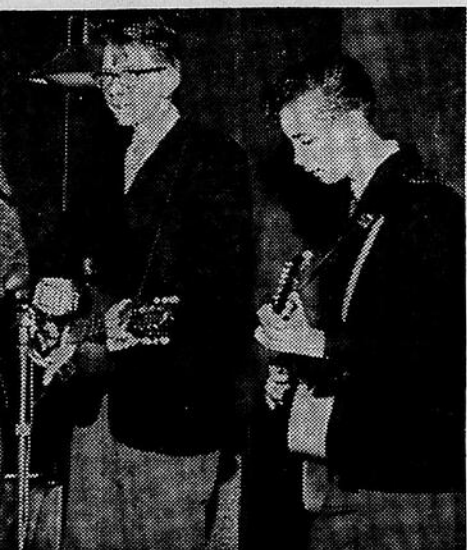
