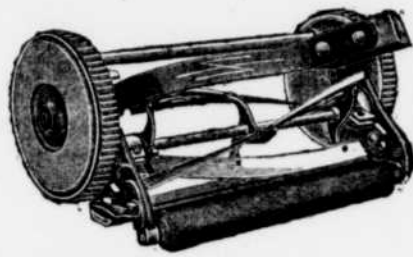

## MAFEKING HAS BEEN RELIEVED!

### WAR OFFICE CONFIRMS REPORT.

### KRUGER HAS NOT SUED FOR PEACE.

### BULLER'S ADVANCE DELAYED.

### RAILWAY HAS BEEN DESTROYED.

### Hunter Pushing Forward With Supplies to Mafeking.

London, May 21.—220 p. m.—(Special)—The War Office confirms the story of the relief of Mafeking.

There is no truth in the report that President Kruger has sued for peace, and no communication from him on the subject is expected in the immediate future.

London, May 21.—2 p. m.—(Special)—The War Office has received the following message from Lord Roberts: "Kroonstadt, May 21—Buller reports that his advance will be delayed a few days on account of the way in which the railway has been destroyed.

"Rundle reports that Ladybrand has been occupied. Hunter is pushing up the railway with supplies for the Mafeking garrison, and is arranging an hospital train for the conveyance of the sick and wounded to Kimberley. Methuen has left Hoopstad to co operate with this force."

London, May 21.—The British have occupied K'erskorsdorp, in the Transvaal, with out fighting. General Buller reports that Clerj has moved to Ingogo, and Dundonald to Laing's Nek.

### DEWET OFFERS TO SURRENDER.

London, May 21.—A special despatch from Kroonstadt says that Commandant Dewet has sent word that he is prepared to surrender conditionally with his entire commando. He stipulates that the men should be allowed to return to their farms. Lord Roberts replied that the surrender must be unconditionally.

### ENTIRE FORCE REPORTED CAPTURED.

London, May 21.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Lorenzo Marques, dated Sunday, says: "On Thursday the entire Boer force around Mafeking, including the guns, was captured by the British."

### MAFEKING RELIEF COLUMN.

London, May 20.—A Cape Town account of the composition of the relief column, which entered Mafeking, May 16, says that it consisted of 2000 men of the South African Light Horse the Imperial Yeomanry, and the Kimberley Horse. It left Kimberley May 4, with thirty-five wagons, containing stores and ammunition, with four guns of the horse artillery and two Maxim's, and moved west along railway without meeting opposition. At Kraai Pan the Boers fell back when attacked.

A special despatch from Cape Town says that the relief column, as it approached Mafeking from the south, was attacked by a strong force of Boers who were repulsed. The rear guard continued in action for some time. The British casualties were slight. The relief force entered Mafeking unopposed, the siege having been already raised.

The relief column passed the Taung and Vryburg districts without encountering the Federas column. It had three Maxim's. The force reached Manitz river, twenty miles south of Mafeking, May 11.

Colonel B. T. Mahon, who, it is understood commanded the relief column, served in the Dongola and Nile expeditions with General Kitchener.

The Cape Town Argus says that 80 of Eloff's patrol were killed, and that an Irish-American brigade was greatly cut up at Mafeking and Kroonstadt. The Boers are turning against the French and Germans.

### FORCED THE BOERS TO DECAMP.

London, May 18.—9.16 p. m.—Mafeking has been relieved.

Pretoria, May 18.—It was officially announced to-day that when the laagers and forts around Mafeking had been severely bombarded, the siege was abandoned, British force taking possession of the place.

President Steyn left here for the Free State yesterday evening. Addressing a crowd on the platform, he urged them to be of good cheer.

It is reported that 5,000 British troops have surrounded Christiansburg, and that the landroost and other officials have been taken prisoners. Mr. James Milne, the correspondent of the Reuter Telegraph Company, who has been a prisoner here, was liberated and escorted to the border this morning.

### REJOICING IN LONDON.

London, May 19.—There had been no interruption up to noon to-day of London's celebration of the successes in South Africa; in fact the enthusiasm increased as the day proceeded. The omnibuses are crowded with men and women waving flags, and every cab cart and carriage and nearly every house is decorated. Every one from the newsboys in the street to the most dignified business man is wearing a rosette of the British colors. Traffic is practically suspended, great crowds surrounded

the Mansion House and all the public buildings, shouting and cheering.

Lady Georgiana Curzon this morning telegraphed her congratulations to Col. Baden-Powell and to her sister, Lady Sarah Wilson. She informed Colonel Baden-Powell that she had made an urgent appeal on May 12, already amounted to seven thousand pounds.

### CONFIRMATORY STORIES.

London, May 19.—A despatch to the Daily News from Lorenzo Marques dated Friday, says that the reports of the defeat of the Boers at Mafeking have been confirmed. Eighty of the German corps were killed.

It is reported at Lorenzo Marques that the Volkskern of Pretoria, accused Col. Baden-Powell of hoisting a white flag, thus bringing on the disaster. The Volkskern adds that the Boers will now be justified in blowing up the mines. The despatch adds that the passenger reports that the Irish-American ambulance corps are now fighting with the Boers. The Boers are preparing to retire to Lydenburg.

### PREPARING FOR EVENTUALITIES.

London, May 19.—The Times correspondent at Lorenzo Marques in a despatch dated May 17, says that in anticipation of the closing of the railway from Delagoa Bay to Pretoria the Boer agents are buying all the available provisions and forwarding them with all speed to the Transvaal. Extraordinary efforts have been taken to hasten the despatch of these supplies.

### ARE WELL-KNOWN FENIANS.

### THOROLD CANAL DYNAMITERS AGENTS OF ANTI-BRITISH CONSPIRATORS.

Toronto, May 18.—When Dullman, Walsh and Nolin, the men accused of trying to blow up the Welland canal, face the jury at the Assizes which begin next Tuesday they will discover that the case against them is far more complete than any one has heretofore suspected. Careful inquiry by the Ontario criminal investigation officers in a number of cities of the United States has established that the prisoners are the agents of anti-British conspirators. The three are all well-known Fenians, Dullman's real name being Rowan, Nolin and Walsh are from Dublin, and have made several trips to the United States. In November of last year Walsh, Nolin, Rowan and a man named Merna came out to Philadelphia on the steamer "Greenland." Shortly afterwards Walsh and Nolin went on to New York, and while there were initiated members of the Napper Tandy Club, a Fenian organization meeting at a hall at the corner of Sixteenth street and Third avenue. It was understood that they were ready to do any work placed in their hands. Merna went to Washington and secured a place as a bar tender. He was accidentally shot there in March, according to the police records, and Nolin, who had been working at his trade as a machinist at Richmond, Va. went to Washington to attend the funeral. He returned to Richmond, and on April 12 was written to and instructed to come north through Washington and pick up Walsh, who was then there, and proceed to the Reading station in Philadelphia, where he would meet someone with instructions. The man at the Reading station had been well acquainted with their appearance. He accosted them, and gave Nolin and Walsh \$100 each and the tickets to Buffalo telling them when they got there to register at the Stafford House as Smith and Moore, and they would be called upon by a confederate. They did so, and Dullman called, went up to their rooms and it is believed outlined to them there the work expected of them. Witnesses to prove the essential facts will be forthcoming in the trial.

It is stated that within the last fortnight bankers of Paris have, through the Bank of France, negotiated a loan of \$15,000,000 from New York bankers. This money is needed to finance enterprises incident to the Exposition year in Paris.

Brent Good, president of the Carter Medicine Company, yesterday received a telegram from his lawyers in Chicago, Messrs Lowden, Estabrook & Davis, informing him that a final injunction, with costs had been granted against the Chicago Label and Box Company. This company makes a specialty of manufacturing labels, boxes, etc., for druggists. The Carter Company has been following them through the courts for two years on the complaint that the label company was making simulations of the labels of Carter's Little Liver Pills. They have now obtained a final injunction, with costs, and the costs are very large, as the case has been submitted to a Master in Chancery for a final accounting.

The Carter Medicine Company has been the first and only one to prosecute printers or engravers who have prepared such labels and wrappers. It marks a new departure in infringement cases, and their victory is one of great importance to the whole "proprietary trade," and also of interest to retail druggists.—New York Press, May 2, 1900.

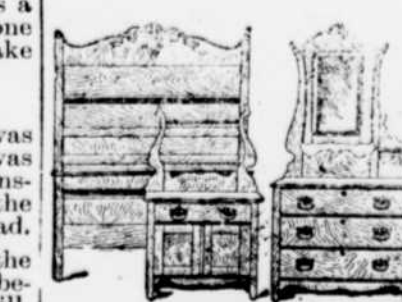

On June 9, 1866, Private S. O'Hea, of the 1st Batn. of the Rifle Brigade, was one of an escort under Sergt. Hill in charge of a railway van containing 2,000 rounds of ammunition, en route from Quebec to Kingston for the use of the militia on the frontier. On reaching Danville the van was found to be on fire, and was hastily pushed down the line away from the station, the inhabitants of the neighboring houses flying in terror.

O'Hea ran down to the van, burst open the door, tore away the covering from the ammunition, and extinguished the fire.

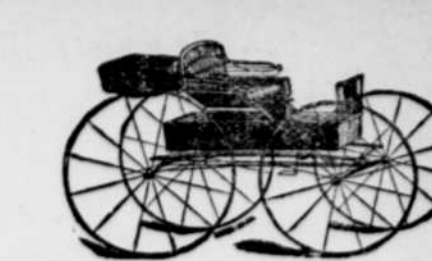
