## Urban renewal gets go-ahead

The Quebec Housing authority has been authorized by the provincial government to enter into an agreement with the City of Westmount for a cost-sharing study in preparation for an urban renewal program in the city, it was announced at Monday's meeting of city council.

Under the agreement, the Quebec Housing Authority will pay 75 percent of the estimated \$76,000 cost of the study. The remainder, or \$19,000 will be paid by Westmount.

The study, actually near completion, was begun under an agreement with the federal housing agency, Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, in 1966, before the creation of the QHA.

Current work is on revisions and additions to the existing plan drawn up by Town Planning Consultant Gordon Sunderland.

The cost of the study was first estimated at \$45,000 in 1966, of which Westmount was to pay half, or \$22,500.

But, what is urban renewal?

Assistant City Clerk John M. McIver, a member of the administrative planning committee for the program, explains that is one of orderly rehabilitation and development of the section of the city bounded by Atwater avenue, St. Catherine street, Glen road, the CPR right-of-way, Hallowell street and St. Antoine street.

The two key words are "rehabilitation" and "development".

Rehabilitation involves the retention and improvement of buildings and other

features of the area that are considered desirable. Development, generally, means replacement of the undesirable with new facilities.

As foreseen by the planners, the city's role in the overall urban renewal program is one of providing an atmosphere, an incentive and assistance for rehabilitation and development of the area, in co-operation with private enterprise.

The Sunderland report deals with many aspects of the matter, architectural and structural, sociological, aesthetic, commercial, and position within the greater island community.

The first physical work to be performed by the city under the program is likely to be in the areas of streets and lighting, Mr. McIver said.

Among possibilities discussed in the report are such nice touches as cobblestones and green areas with benches for the ends of some cul de sac streets.

Other first efforts will probably include the burying of more electrical wiring in the area and possibly the extension of Wood avenue between St. Catherine and Dorchester.

Generally, however, the city's work will depend upon proposals received from the private sector on development of the area, within the framework provided by the Sunderland plan.

Public housing has been discussed, but is seen only as a possibility at this time. Here, too, a number of factors come into play.

## We Say

### St. Jean Baptiste day holiday for us all

Monday, the festival of St. John the Baptist, is a holiday for all Québeckers.

It should be celebrated as such, regardless of our origins, not only because it is officially Québec province's annual fête but in honor of our fellow citizens who since the early years of the colony which became Canada made this the popular national day of the French-Canadian people.

Indeed, as Canadians we have far more reason to mark this peculiarly Canadian feast than we have the transplanted days of St. George, St. Andrew and St. Patrick - which properly belong to England, Scotland and Ireland; or, for that matter, St. Denis of France.

Last week, in a fit of pique, our stablemate *The Monitor* caused a bit of fuss by urging its West End readers to ignore the St. Jean Baptiste parade on Monday. The reason: the sponsoring Société St. Jean Baptiste de Montréal's insistence on calling Sherbrooke street "Lionel Groulx boulevard."

The name change, proposed by the society, has been turned down by the City of Montréal - not, we noted at the time, because Abbé Groulx has less cause to be remembered hereabouts than Sir John Sherbrooke but to change the name of such a main, world-known artery would cause great confusion and complications. (Not forgetting it runs through the City of Westmount as well as Montréal!)

The trick, however, of promoting usage through unofficial use is a fair game: *The Monitor* itself once, when the editorial policies of that paper and this were entwined, took to using "Loyola University" to promote the cause of Loyola College for

the status it deserves. The institution itself, still fighting that battle, simply proclaims "Loyola of Montreal."

Much time, effort and pride goes into the St. John the Baptist parade; there is nothing to match it in Montréal each year. To boycott it is silly, specially if one considers that Ludger Duvernay founded the society in 1834 to defend and promote the institutions and the language of the French-speaking people in North America.

Thus the Société St. Jean Baptiste de Montréal has a legitimate role, even if one cannot always agree with its bluntness and the way it pursues some of its policies.

Rather than condemn and shun, those of us not of the French tongue should seek to understand and, where we can, support the great and the good contributions which this unique culture makes to Canada.

If we do, we can celebrate Canada's 101st birthday a week later with considerably more pride and meaning.

### Why single out us for bingo crackdown?

The "technical difficulties" which delayed the opening by one evening last week of the Westmount Rotary Carnival were questions about the conducting of a bingo and other games of chance.

Presumably the concern was with provincial authorities.

Which makes no sense.

All over the province, bingo is a big thing. It provides great pleasure to many, and raises impressive sums for causes both good and sometimes uncertain.

The good works of the Westmount Rotary Club can use all the funds it can legitimately raise.

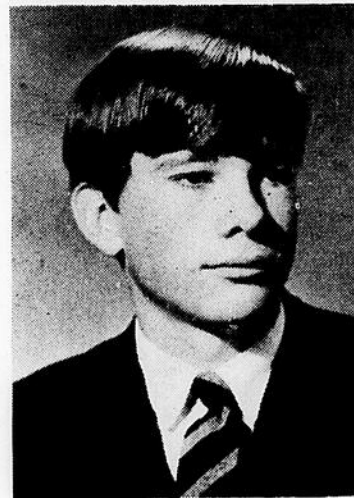

## Bulletins from Birdland Flycatchers arrive

Now that fly season has come again, the many birds that live on flies are returning to Canada. The members of one little group actually going by the name "Flycatchers" show many similarities.

The Great Crested Flycatcher, more often heard than seen, has a far-reaching "wheeeep" call familiar in our summer woods. Rather smaller than a Robin, this handsome bird is noted for its fine, reddish tail. The upright position when at rest, common to all Flycatchers, helps to exhibit its yellow underparts. A habit unique to the Crested is dragging a snakeskin into the nesting hole. Whether this is for the purpose of beautifying the home or frightening intruders is unknown.

## Scotland on the move Westmount Rotarians told

Scotland is at present investigating the possibilities of increased trade with Canada according to Edward W. Craig, O.B.E., Treasurer of the Scottish Trade Union Congress and a member of the Scottish Trade Mission to Canada, at present touring Canada. The prominent visitor addressed members of the Westmount Rotary Club at their regular weekly luncheon held in Victoria Hall and in his remarks emphasized the progress at present being made in the industrial life of Scotland.

Ten years ago, he said, Scotland had an infant electronics industry, employing fewer than 10,000 people while today there are 70 firms involved in electronics employing more than 30,000 workers. Scotland is now one of the great centres of computer production with companies such as IBM, International Computers Ltd., Honeywell, Burroughs, National Cash, Ferranti with headquarters in Scotland and this branch of the electronics industry has been growing so fast, that within a few years, it will rank in size alongside shipbuilding and marine engineering.

Less colorful, but with two distinguishing marks, is the Olive-sided. A white tuft of feathers is visible just behind each wing, and the "unbuttoned vest" appearance is caused by the olive sides on otherwise white underparts. The whistled song has been translated, "hip-three-cheers".

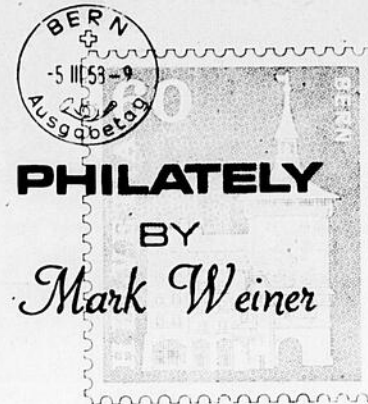
Somewhat smaller than these two is the Phoebe, which says its name plainly and has a special love for old bridges. There, on some low beam, the nest is often made. This bird is a typical Flycatcher in looks: greenish grey on head and back, and white underneath.

Quite similar in appearance is the Wood Peewee; however, it prefers woods to manmade structures, and distinctly calls "pee-a-wee".

There are four very small Flycatchers, three of them almost identical. Even experts have difficulty in telling them apart. Actually, location and voice are the best distinguishing marks. Dark above and light below, they have conspicuous white eyerings and two white wing-bars.

"Wee-see" and "peet" are the call notes of the Acadia, a bird of deciduous forests and wet, swampy woodlands. The Least says "che-pec" and is found around open woods. The common note of the Alder (or Traill's) is "pep" or "pit", and its breeding place is swampy thickets.

Not quite so difficult to name is the Yellow-bellied Flycatcher, as eye-ring, underparts, and wing-bars are yellow instead of white. It says "per-wee" and is found in boggy, coniferous regions.



The former United Nations Pavilion from EXPO 67 is now known as the Pavilion of Philately, whose theme is "Education Through Stamps" and in addition it is now classified as a museum by the City of Montreal. The directors deserve considerable credit for their arrangement and operation of the Pavilion. Due to the careful thought given to its planning the visitor will never be bored or tired with the exhibits, regardless how frequently the Pavilion is visited as the exhibits will be completely changed approximately every three weeks.


Two souvenir cacheted covers are in the process of preparation and should be available to the public within a few days. One depicts a picture of the Pavilion, while the other depicts the theme "Education Through Stamps". Both are being printed by multicolor offset process. The Post Office has agreed to open a small counter in the Pavilion, where the visitor will be able to mail these cacheted covers and have them cancelled with a special handstamp reserved for special use only in this Pavilion.

Once again "Costumes" are in the fore! A March 14 issue from East Germany, the third in the series "National Costumes", has rejuvenated interest in this topic. This last issue from Germany comprises four stamps printed by multicolor photogravure depicting Sorbian ceremonial national costumes, with the text appearing on the stamps in both the German and Sorbian languages. This set has been well received and has started a chain reaction, with collectors seeking out some of the earlier "Costume" issues from Hungary (Michel 1330-37 and 1527).

Those who still insist on buying the attractive labels from supposedly Bhutan, will find the following report from Dr. K. Ramamurti of interest. Dr. Ramamurti is the Indian director of postal research and planning, who at the present time is on loan to Bhutan as postal advisor in Paro. "The world's first three-dimensional stamps, issued by Bhutan last October, were designed by a Japanese printing company and then peddled to foreign governments. Bhutan quickly signed up for them. But local patrons of the postal service seldom see these stamps, or the gold coin and other exotic designs, printed in Japan, Britain, Spain, Switzerland and Indonesia. Most letters bear the dull two-toned stamps from the Government Security Press in Nasik, India. Dr. Ramamurti explains that the mail would never reach its destination if the pretty stamps were used, as they would be snatched away. Most of the special issues go directly from the printers to the Bhutan Stamp Agency in Nassau, reportedly owned by B.K. Todd of Ligonier, Pa., a close friend of Bhutan's Queen. The agency sells to dealers, supervises the execution of themes, and the destruction of plates after printing. After paying the printers and covering its own interest, it remits the balance to Bhutan."

# English CEGEP plans fluctuate, reports school commission

A newsletter from the Westmount Protestant School Commissions says the subject of the CEGEPs has aroused much interest in this community, and as it is one of the more important changes to come out of the Parent Report recommendations we

will review the subject here, for those who may not have been able to attend the public meeting.

In the Parent Report a new 'institute' is described, an intermediary between high school and the university, and a prerequisite for university entrance. In February 1965 the first meeting of the Comité de Planification de l'Enseignement, pre-Universitaire et Professionnel (COPEPP), consisting of 35 representatives, met to establish a plan for a network of Institutes for the Province, both French and English. One of the acts of this committee was to change the name of the Institutes to Colleges, and the name became Collège d'Enseignement Général et Professionnel (CEGEP).

After the change of government in 1966 this committee ceased to meet. Meanwhile a sub-committee of English language educators, reporting to COPEPP had drawn up several pertinent recommendations, but this committee expired when COPEPP ceased.

Under the new government, the Mission des Collèges was set up, charged with the same duties as COPEPP, but with different personnel. A French program of a possible 70 courses was drawn up for the CEGEPs.

In March 1967 the Department of Education drew together 56 English representatives from

industry, business and education to form an organizing committee for an English language CEGEP, and this committee, the College Organizing Committee for Metropolitan Montreal (COCMM), presented their brief in the fall of 1967, requesting a charter.

The proposed CEGEP, to be called Dawson College, was to open in the fall of 1968. By March 1968 all hopes for establishing the college by the fall vanished, as the Ministry had not presented the recommendation for the charter to the cabi-

net. In April an emergency meeting of the organizing committee was held, echoed in many communities by public meetings, and the English-speaking community hoped that a charter would be granted in time to

## Bludgeon attacker sentenced 20-year-old gets two years plus

Bludgeon attacks on two young women, occurring within 20 minutes of each other, one in Westmount and one just outside the city limits, resulted in a penitentiary term of two years and three months for 20-year-old Alexandre Dube. Sentence was given yesterday.

Dube, a resident of Dezery street in Montreal East, struck the two women across the head with an iron bar the night of February 8. He was later arrested by Westmount police and first appeared in court March 1.

The first attack, just outside Westmount, occurred on Atwater avenue, near Cote des Neiges, February 8 at about 11:30 p.m. A

20-year-old student nurse was struck on the head by Duke, who was apparently working on a stalled car.

The second victim, a 23-year-old woman, was attacked and struck down in a similar fashion on Holton avenue, in Westmount, about 20 minutes later.

Although the young woman

was suffering from concussion and lacerations to the head requiring 20 stitches, she was able to provide a good description of her assailant, Westmount police said.

Police reported at the time that there was no further assault on either of the women, nor was anything stolen.

make plans for the first English language CEGEP to open in the fall of 1969.

In September 1969 nine new French CEGEPs will be opened, bringing the total to twenty-four, offering free, comprehensive college programs to more than 35,000 French speaking students.

In the past few months another English speaking college organizing committee has been formed in the Lakeshore area.

Meanwhile the government has proposed to McGill and other English Universities, that these institutions should offer college level courses in the academic subjects during a transitional period. This, however, would not include those high school graduates wanting technological or vocational education. The conception of the colleges will undoubtedly present a new set of problems for the universities, and will mean reorganization of the present university courses, and probably a new set of standards for many professional degrees.

Although some educators wish to retain the status quo in English language education a greater number recognize the need for change and are working to make these changes mean an improved system offering a greater range of educational opportunities for a greater number of our young people.

### RETIRING TEACHERS

As always this is the time of the year when we learn that some of our teachers will be retiring from service in our schools. This year, thirteen teachers will leave active teaching. Of the thirteen, the five who have taught for the longest period of time will have a total combined service of 165 years - a rather startling statistic!

Mr. D. N. McRae has served as Chemistry teacher, History teacher, Vice-Principal of West-

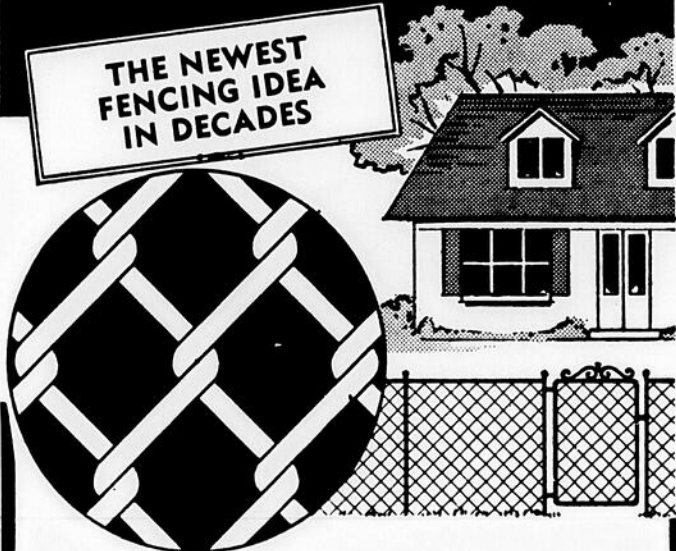

**Drury, the multi-ministerial man**

You may conjure with names like Donald Gordon or C. D. Howe when attempting to illustrate the capacity of one man for many simultaneous tasks successfully undertaken - but the record, in the opinion of a great many experts - must go to Charles M. Drury, the man currently contesting Westmount riding for the Liberal Party.

Many a man is well known for his achievements in government, business, the public service or military service; Bub Drury has blazed trails and set records in all four areas, and frequently in two or three at the same time.

He has only been in government as an elected member for a half dozen years, and now holds down three major portfolios - Industry, Trade and Commerce and Defence Production.

This may sound like exaggeration - but so far we have but barely scratched the surface of the man's records and achievements.

Looking more closely at the various breakdown sections of the departments Bud Drury heads, we find he is responsible to parliament for the National Research Council, the Emergency Measures Organization, Polymer Corporation, Dominion Bureau of Statistics, the Canadian Wheat Board, and a number of other Crown Corporations and Agencies.

Thus it is difficult to cast around in any direction of governmental administration without contacting some phase of operation that in the last analysis works its way into the realm of Mr. Drury.

You've read of governmental organizations like PAIT, IRDIA, or BEAM.

The first is the program for the advancement of industrial technology - to assist industry in the development of new products or processes; the second is the industrial research and development incentives act, and the last, BEAM, is a program that has been established to encourage increased productivity and efficiency in the manufacture and use of building equipment, accessories and materials.

**MORE**

All three come within Mr. Drury's Industry portfolio, along with a great many others - including an area development program, the automotive program, industrial research institutes, a shipbuilding assistance program, a program to develop and sustain the technological capability in the Canadian Defence Industry, a general adjustment assistance program (Kennedy Round), a machinery program, and an industrial design program.

Mr. Drury added the federal Department of Trade and Commerce to his already mammoth responsibility, April 20, and in so doing became responsible to parliament for the administration and operation of the Canadian Wheat Board, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, the Canadian Government Travel Bureau and the Export Credits Insurance Corporation, among others.

The Department of Trade and Commerce has a dual responsibility of promoting Canadian foreign sales and of improving the conditions under which Canadian goods enter foreign markets.

The department is also responsible for Canada's representation at World Fairs and Trade Fairs in other countries - this year participating in Texas at the HemisFair and planning already for 1970 in Osaka, Japan.

**BIG BUYER**

When he is wearing his Defence Production Department hat, Mr.

Drury is the biggest purchaser in the country, operating the central purchasing agency of the Canadian Government. It serves all departments of the government, and belying its name, is active in the area of civilian supplies.

To handle much of this responsibility, Mr. Drury has created the

Canadian Government Purchasing Service and the Canadian Government Supply Service.

As Minister of Defence Production, Mr. Drury is also responsible to Parliament for a number of Crown Corporations, including the Polymer Corporation, Crown

Assets Disposal Corporation, Canadian Arsenals Limited and the Canadian Chemical Corporation.

How does he do it all - who knows?

How did he prepare for the multi-sided responsibility?

### A NATIVE

C. M. "Bud" Drury was born right here in Westmount in 1912. He was educated at Bishop's College School, Royal Military College and McGill University. He also pursued post-graduate studies at the University of Paris in France.

Bud Drury served overseas with the Canadian Army in World War Two and attained the rank of Brigadier, was awarded the Distinguished Service Order and was made a Commander of the British Empire for his service.

For two years after the war he was chief of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Association mission to Poland. In 1947 he returned to Canada and for the next two years served with the economic division of the Federal Department of External Affairs. In 1949 he was appointed deputy minister of the Department of National Defence, a post he filled until 1955.

Mr. Drury then entered the world of business, where he played an important role in some of this country's construction, transportation and electronic industries. Among other things, he served as president of Avis Transport of Canada Limited, and for a term was president of the Montreal Board of Trade.

In 1962 Mr. Drury was first elected to a seat in the House of Commons for the riding of St. Antoine-Westmount. He was re-elected in 1963 with the second largest majority in the constituency's 30-year history, and was appointed Minister of Defence Production. Later the same year he became Canada's first minister of Industry.

In 1965 he was again re-elected with a substantial majority.

Amazing as it may appear, Bud Drury also finds time for a number of outside interests. He is a former president of the United Nations Association of Canada, and of the Canadian Centenary Council, and a former chairman of the Montreal Branch of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs. He has also served as a member of the Northwest Territories Council.

## Adams blasts Trudeau's defence policies

Professor Jeff Adams, NDP candidate for the Westmount riding, recently accused the Trudeau government of continuing the "embarrassing Pearson policy of not wanting to offend Washington".

In an address to a group of voters in the NDG area, Professor Adams said that Trudeau has declared that flow of arms via the U.S. to Vietnam might place our whole economy in

jeopardy and threaten even more unemployment.

"Have the Liberals no other way of coping with our present highly complex economy except through arms production?" he asked.

Professor Adams, head of Loyola's History Department, said that there are alarming signs that unless Canada changes course soon, we will continue to be "tangled up with U.S. military policy".

"The NORAD agreement, linking our air defence of the Canadian north to U.S.-controlled joint command, was signed ten years ago when some people felt

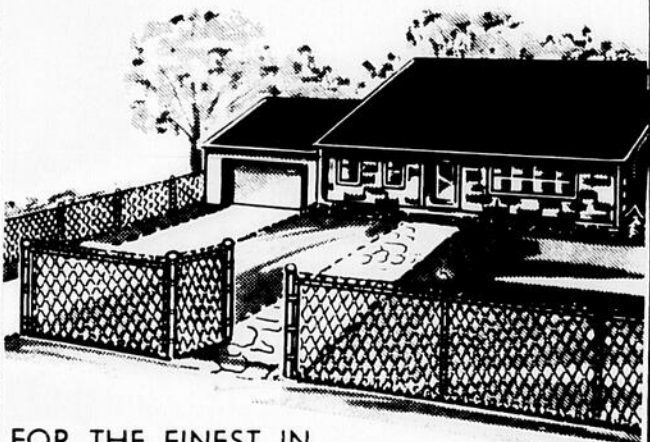

anything, be ready for any hurried change in plans, organize and follow through with all the necessary minutiae in the hectic pace that surrounds even the home life of a cabinet minister, particularly that of a campaigning cabinet minister. Mrs. Drury comes from an active and energetic family, the Counsells of Hamilton, Ontario. Her brother John is the founder of the Canadian Paraplegic Association in which he has been active ever since the war. Her sister Elizabeth is Mrs. Walter Gordon.

Her husband served overseas and became known as the youngest Brigadier in the Canadian Army. Their first two children were born in Toronto where Mrs. Drury went to stay with her mother. Leith, the second daughter, born in 1943, has just completed the first year towards her post-graduate degree, Master of Social Work at the University of Toronto.

No sooner was the war over than the two little girls were picked up and carried (one picture them literally one under each arm) over to Warsaw where Brigadier Drury was Chief of the UNRA Mission in Poland. Mrs. Drury says two years now followed where she suffered "from a perpetual emotional lump in her throat". Her admiration and respect for the Polish people know no bounds. Just through six terrible years of war, they

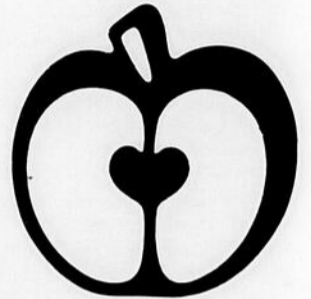

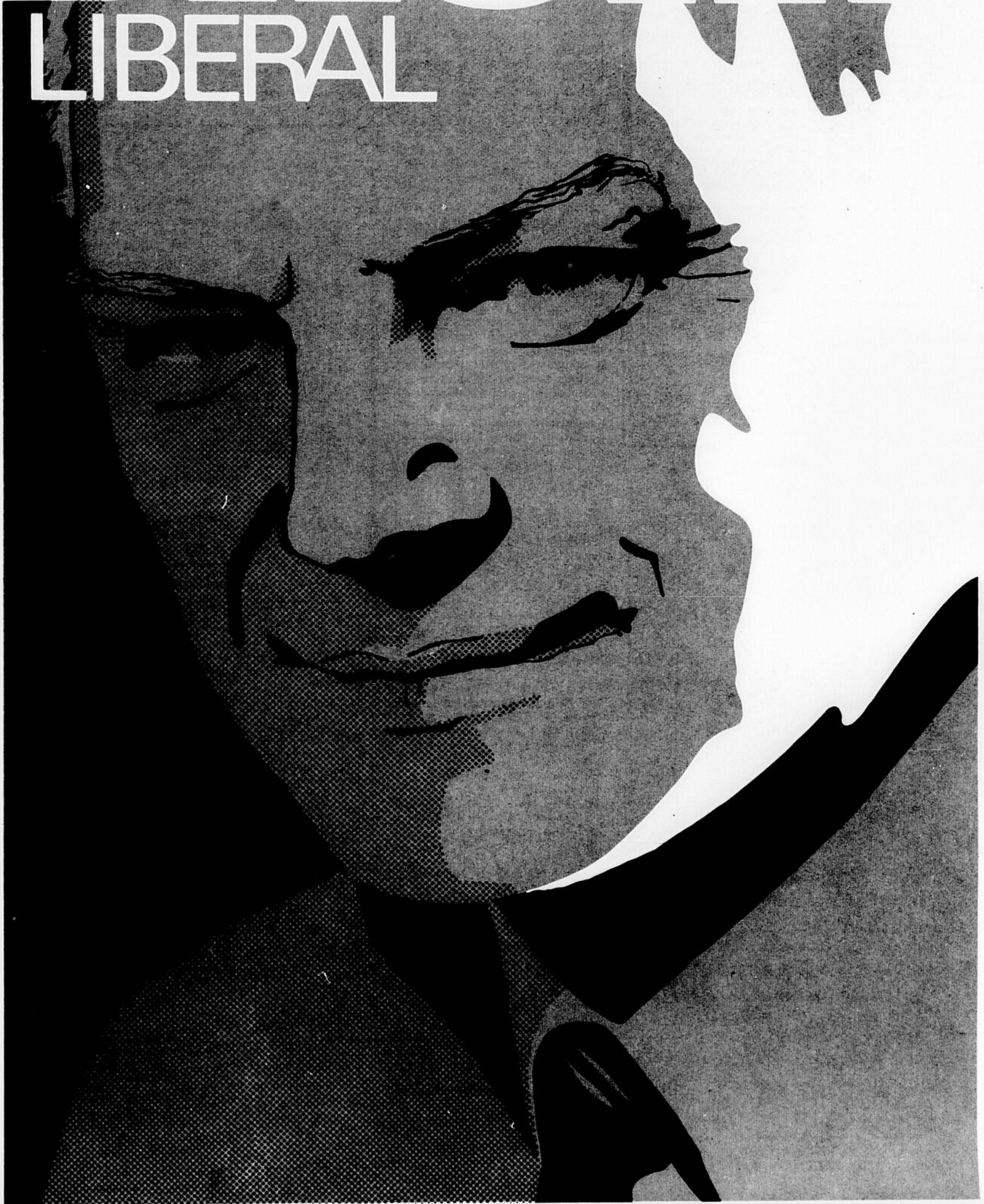

never complained or mentioned the troubles and suffering that every family had undergone. Gratitude to the point of embarrassment was shown to the UNRA representatives wherever they went.

After two years in Warsaw the Drurys returned to Canada and Mr. Drury was appointed deputy minister of national defense in 1949, a position he held until

1956, when he returned to his home in Montreal to enter private business. The Drury's two sons were born in 1947 and 1948. The Women's Liberal Association of Westmount was influential in persuading him to run for Parliament in 1962 - and so it was on the move again for Jane Drury. Pack up, and back to Ottawa and goodbye once more to private life.

During this interview which took place at lunch hour the two boys, both in university, arrived home from their summer employment, Victor with Baker, Weeks and Co. and Charles Gibbons (Gibb) with Lafferty, Harwood and Co. Leith was answering the telephone, and the door. A few minutes later, the candidate himself, accompanied by his executive assistant arrived in from Winnipeg and while Mrs. Drury left the room to get papers, letters and telegrams and telephone messages which had accumulated during his absence, the children were helpful in adding details of their mother's personality. "Always a welcome at home for our friends" said Leith "at our farm near Wakefield, Que. there are sleeping-bags ready for extra visitors we may bring". One of the boys added, "she wielded a mighty disciplinary action in the form of a wooden spoon". They all went to Rockcliffe Park Public School, "and mother was on the school board, which was a bit of a strain for us" added Leith. Asked what they felt about their father being in politics, they were all most enthusiastic. "He enjoys hard work, the scope this type of work gives him and the great challenge" ... said Leith. "Mother also feels that it was a great idea for him to enter politics and she is always ready to do everything necessary at a moment's notice". At this minute Mrs. Drury returned and Leith left to see about bringing us lunch. Somebody else had arrived from Ottawa so that there were about nine people in the room and the minister had to leave in a few minutes to attend various meetings, all of which seemed to allow for no travelling time in between.

When Mrs. Drury was asked what her main interests were she said "I think I have an interest in the sociological field". She brushed aside a mention of the fact that she is a very good bridge player and talked about a few of the activities she had been engaged in during her time in Montreal. She served on the board of Summerhill House, the VON, the Church Home, Marriage Counselling Bureau and the budget committee of Red Feather. Her latest project was to take a course with the Visiting Homemakers Association in Ottawa. This course is sponsored by the department of manpower and is under the auspices of the Ontario board of education. It is the brain-child of Mrs. Evelyn Hunter.

"All the committees that I worked on in Montreal showed that many of the problems that occurred in the every day life of individuals could be traced to the fact that there were so few trained reliable people to take over when a mother was sick, either mentally or physically. Dedication to the idea that

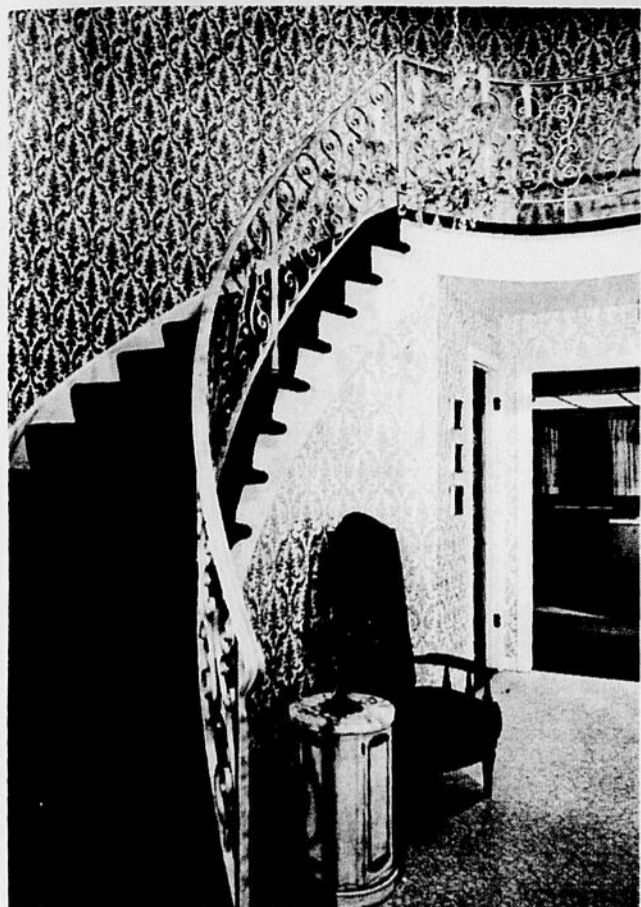

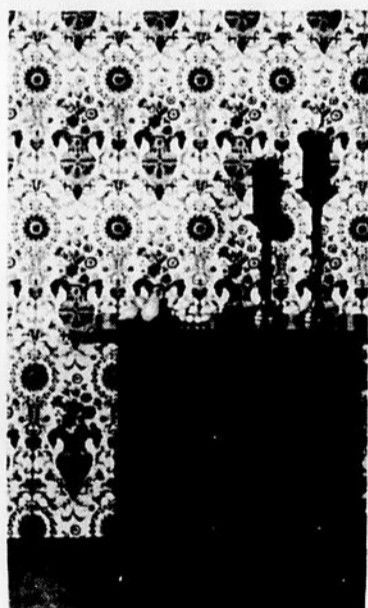

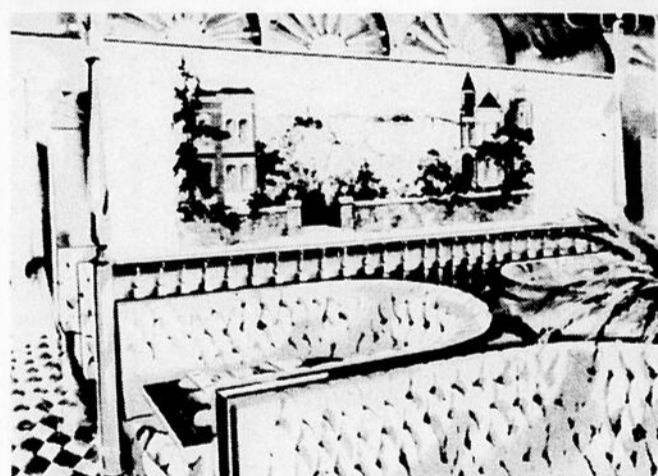

**Convent school**

By Stephen Schofield

GUERNSEY, C. I., British Isles: Although these Channel Islands are British, they are only a few miles off the West coast of France.

It is hard to believe I am here to see my daughter, Elaine, 10, who is attending a Roman Catholic convent school, Blanchelande College. Though none of our family is Roman Catholic, my wife and I decided to send her here; and we are very pleased with our selection.

In search of good teaching, hard-working and happy girls, my wife and I and Elaine inspected seven or eight boarding schools.

**BIG ONE**

We almost chose an enormous one in Sussex, typical of many, which is organized to a T: classes, sports and outings, all function zippity-zip. Two young women are fully engaged in finding jobs for graduates. The atmosphere is brisk and efficient. Zing! But we never saw a girl smile.

Blanchelande College contains several grass tennis courts, a most proper chapel and a fairly good classroom building. Otherwise it is commonplace and poor in parts, externally. About half of the girls are Roman Catholics. The others attend their own churches in the village.

The teaching is tip-top because in order to survive the school must compete with top standard English schools. All the teachers are lay teachers who do not live in the school. Two Blanchelande girls have just been accepted by London University, which is more difficult to enter than Oxford.

**NUNS**

To us the dominant factor is the nuns. As cook, laundress, charwoman, secretary, headmistress, sports and music teacher, it is obvious that they have long since directed their incessant efforts, first, in obedience to the Lord. And they effuse an aura that traduces mere chattels and equipment.

In almost everything the girls do, hiking or tennis, the nuns participate, and take great care of the little ones. For girls from Africa, the Bahamas, Hong Kong, France and Jordan as well as England, the nuns make the school a home. Old girls always return with their boy friends for appraisal.

I have become quite friendly with Sister E, aged 76, who was the first nun to receive her M.A. at Oxford. She was then a novelty and some students amused themselves by making sketches of her headdress. And one morning, in quest of a lecture on Erasmus, Sister E. asked the Merton porter where she could find Erasmus. He said: "Dunno, Miss, 'e ain't 'ere."

**ORGAN**

When Blanchelande needed an organ, Sister E. heard that a local church were installing a new organ and wanted to sell their old one. Alas, the minister told her this was not true.

"Well," she said, "if you ever hear of one, would you please let me know."

He never did. But there happened to be a workman in the church who overheard their conversation and some time lat-

er he told her of a local church installing an electric organ and wanting to sell their old one.

Sister E. queried this church and discovered that they wanted £900 for it. "Oh, well," she said, "that is quite out of the question for us." And it was.

An old friend of Sister E's subsequently died in Liverpool, bequeathing her £300, which she immediately offered for the organ, and got it. And this old or-

gan, actually worth £1,000, is 20 feet high, and fits into the loft with barely two inches to spare over the highest pipe.

She plays it every day for services; and for me she played and sang Schumann's Traumerei such that I feel I must learn it on the piano. And I will.

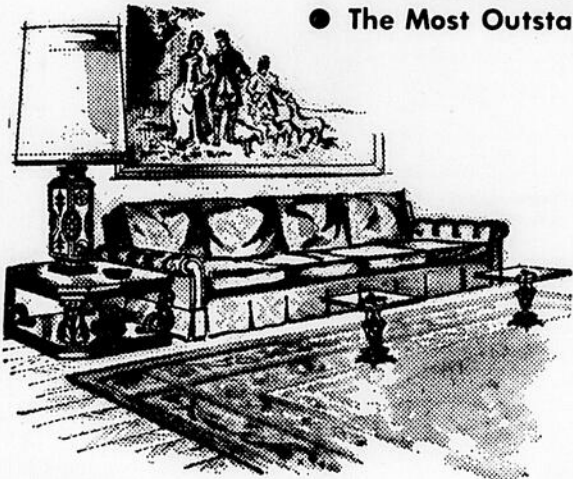

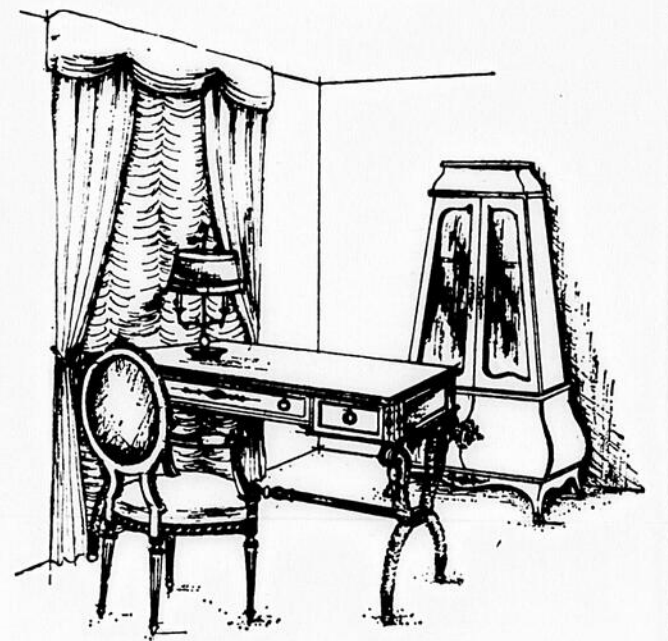

## Urban renewal

Present thinking about public housing and urban renewal is that families displaced in such a program should be given an opportunity to choose public housing.

Public housing rentals, however, are scaled upward, and rather sharply when the family income surpasses \$6,000. The rate, at the \$6,000 level, is approximately \$150 a month.

The idea, apparently, is to discourage the occupancy of public housing units by persons who could afford to accommodate themselves in other ways.

With the demolition of Selby street for the trans-Canada highway, and former occupants now housed elsewhere, the question arises as to how many people are left in the area who would wish to have public housing.

Other contributions by the city towards development of the area include the acqui-

sition of blocks of land so that these can be made available to developers. This is to save a large scale developer from having to negotiate to purchase small lots from perhaps dozens of individual owners and possible unreasonable costs due to speculation.

One direction that development could very well take in the view of the planners is towards large, fairly integrated apartment complexes, with small stores and other facilities serving residents of the building more or less exclusively.

Pools, meeting rooms and other recreation facilities would be provided on the property, as well as open park-like areas for the residents.

But, say the planners, this is just one possibility. Urban renewal is the framework. The pattern will be determined by the people.

## Westmount gets 'sitting' industry

Babysitting, an industry once dominated by your friendly neighborhood teen-ager and grandmother, has become big business with the establishment of an international babysitting

agency which last week opened offices in Westmount.

The U.S. firm, "We Sit Better," boasts 75 offices throughout the U.S.

The local office is located at 310 Victoria avenue in Westmount, and is managed by Mrs. Shirley d'Angelo, a transplanted Australian. This week, she was learning the ropes from Miss Virginia Mead, one of two home office representatives who oversee the opening of new branches.

As Miss Mead explained, the Millingtons started the service in 1965 because, as parents of six young children, they knew there was a need for such a service.

long-range Soviet bombers with nuclear bombs might come in over the Arctic.

"No one believes this now," he said, "in the age of nuclear-powered submarines which have made bombing attacks an anachronism. Yet, in the dying days of the Pearson government this NORAD agreement was very quietly renewed, thus compromising our nation's role as a mediator for peace."

He said that Canada's contribution at this stage in history could be to rebuild the influence and power of the United Nations, but that Canada must rescue a reputation for impartiality by detaching itself not only from American involvement in Vietnam, but also from NORAD and NATO.

Professor Adams said that Canada should set to work with other middle-sized nations in building up a genuine international armed force under the UN as a basic instrument for peace.

"It's all there," he said, "under Article 43 of the UN Charter. Let's act on it!"

The Liberal government got some praise from the NDP candidate for agreeing to review Canada's China policy.

"It's something we in the NDP have been pressing the Liberals to do for years. At least the government seems ready to recognize that the Peking regime is here to stay and that flattering the illusions of Chiang-kai-chek scarcely contribute to peace and serenity in the Far East.

"The Chinese have a high regard for our people, symbolized very dramatically by their respect for Montreal's Dr. Norman Bethune who spent the last years of his life in the 1930s helping the embattled followers of Mao set up scientific medical methods.

## STINGS

If your child is bitten by any animal, report it to your doctor at once. While waiting for him, treat it as a small cut, says the federal health department publication, *The Canadian Mother and Child*.

If the baby is bitten by an insect, remove the stinger, if any, with tweezers. Apply ammonia, diluted with equal parts of water, or a solution of baking soda and water, to neutralize the acid causing the pain.

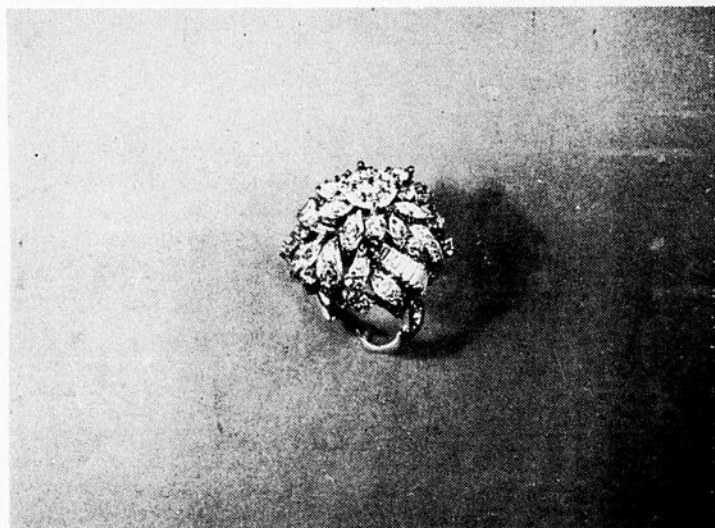

own sister on a trip to Jerusalem. She says the site of the crucifixion is sadly spoiled by tinsel and other accretions; but the garden of Gethsemane, where Judas betrayed our Lord, is exactly the same, and the beach by the sea of Galilee, where He

taught by parables, is absolutely unchanged.

This afternoon the girls and nuns are going on a hike. First the girls are cooking their own lunches on open fires. They are feeding the fires as fast as they can gather sticks. Others hold frying pans containing a mess of

sausages and potatoes. This in fact smells delicious.

Our own little girl, is elated to come out to a hotel and dine with me. She sits straight, elbows in, and her speech, though I know she makes an effort for me, is exceptionally clear and full. Her principal interests are ponies, music, wild flowers and philately. She keeps a scrapbook and plays tennis. And I am told she is bright in class (of course this comes from her mother).

**CANADIAN TEACHER**

My wife is a Canadian who has taught at schools in England and in Canada. She claims Canadian girls grow up too soon.

"For girls to succeed in Canada", she says, "they must have attractive faces, good figures and above all a Saturday night date. The Canadian girl is forced into competition for popularity and a go-with-the-crowd whirl".

The cause of this, my wife says, is, in part, mothers over-anxious for their daughters to be a "success"; rather too keen about their first dates and first high heels, and consequently apt to push their daughters over the threshold of youth.

Another cause, she claims, is the North American advertiser. "Slick copywriters peddle umpteen shades of lipstick and fill girls' heads with all sorts of alluring ideas. Beauty aids. Exquisite perfumes. Our young lady receives the full treatment. The pedestal is made for her. No wonder she dreams of her knight in shining armour.

**ART CATALOGUE**

Unesco has just published the eighth revised edition of the *Catalogue of Colour Reproductions of Paintings prior to 1860*. Each of the 1249 paintings listed - 200 more than in the previous edition - is reproduced in black and white, and information is given in three languages (English, French and Spanish) on the original work of art (name of painter, title, date, size and medium of painting) as well as the process used in the reproduction, its size, publisher and price.

Apart from its obvious usefulness, the catalogue makes for tantalizing browsing; the pictures illustrated and described from prehistoric cave-paintings from France, Australia and Africa, to delicate Turner water-colours and an early Pre-Raphaelite painting by Holman Hunt. In between are masterpieces from China, Ancient Rome and Egypt, Turkey and India.

Unesco started collecting colour reproductions in 1949 with the assistance of the National Commissions of its Member States and the co-operation of publishers throughout the world. At regular intervals, two committees of experts decide which reproductions should be included in the two catalogues published by Unesco - the present one, and the catalogue from 1860 to date (which last appeared in 1966). Their decisions are based on three criteria: the fidelity of the colour reproduction, the significance of the artist and the importance of the original painting.

The final selection for this volume was made by Sir Philip Hendy, until recently Director of the National Gallery, London; Dr. A. van Schendel, Director of the Rijksmuseum, Amsterdam; Mr. Charles Sterling, Curator at the Louvre Museum and Fine Arts Professor at New York University; and Professor Giorgio Vigni, Inspector-General of Fine Arts, Rome.

## The 'Youth' election is view at Liberal campaign centre

Election '68 will be remembered above all else for its appeal to the youth of Canada. This, at least, is the impression

an observer receives at the various committee rooms of the Westmount Liberal candidate, C. M. Drury, minister of trade and

commerce. The under-25 group completely dominates all but the most senior functions.

Once an election is called, how is the campaign machinery put into operation? Who establishes co-ordination between the various levels of a campaign? How are volunteers obtained? The answers to these and many other questions were provided after talking with various volunteers and observing them at work.

Mr. Drury's Liberal campaign headquarters are situated in a two-story white brick building on St. Catherine Street, facing the Westmount Armouries. Here is the nerve-centre of the campaign. Instructions and all directions originate here. Material and literature are distributed here. Canvassers and volunteers are sent out from here. Door-to-door walks begin here. This, is not to say there is no decentralization within the organization. There most definitely is. But in any operation, no matter what the size, there must be a focal

point where all queries can be answered, where times and places can be ascertained; in short, where all can converge. So it is with the Liberal campaign in Westmount.

The campaign manager is Kalman Samuels, who is a very busy man and of course, very difficult to locate. He usually

devotes 15 hours a day solely to the campaign in addition to his law practice. He was Mr. Drury's campaign manager in the 1965 federal election.

Mr. Samuels outlined the various responsibilities of the organization. At headquarters, the central committee organizer

young people of the vicinity. Whenever a canvass is to be done, the volunteers are telephoned. A new concept for this election is the "blitz" card. A "blitz" card is simply a handwritten invitation which is distributed 24 hrs. prior to a meeting. The night before Mr. Drury is to meet the constituents, volunteers are sent out with 1000 to 5000 of these "blitz" cards to apartment buildings and homes in the area. The volunteer presents the invitation card to each resident. The purpose of the "blitz" card is to create spontaneity and individual participation among the voters. The era of the super-organized mass rally is over. Prime Minister Trudeau has often said with regard to the "Just Society" that it can only be realized if the people become actively aware and preoccupied with the problems facing Canada. Mr. Drury has emphasized this point in the manner he approaches the public.

He cannot devote as much of his time to his constituency as he would like. He holds three cabinet portfolios: trade and commerce, industry and defence production. During the election, he must still carry on the daily administrative work that his ministries demand, and participate in Cabinet meetings. He also makes extensive tours of the country both to explain Government policy on certain key issues and to build up support for local Liberal candidates. When he is free, he must use his time judiciously.

Here is a typical schedule:  
Morning: 10:00-12:00 Door-to-door walk in N.D.G.; Afternoon: 2:00-2:30 C.B.C. Television taping; 3:00-4:00 Coffee Party; 4:30-6:00 Door-to-door walk in Westmount; Evening: 7:30-8:30 Meeting with Students on University Street; 8:30-9:30 Meeting with voters of Cote des Neiges area.

As the minister cannot possibly hope to meet all the 50,000 eligible voters in the course of the campaign, other means must be found to make the people aware of their Liberal candidate. If money were no object, gimmicks could be contrived, celebrities could be enlisted, and extensive paid television could be used. In the circumstances there is but one recourse - the volunteer. This is the indispensable element in an electoral campaign. No matter how efficient the organization is, it cannot function without volunteers.

**SAFE TO EAT**

Are you worried at all about eating fruits and vegetables that have been sprayed with chemicals against bugs and disease?

There is no need for worry, if the chemical has been used according to manufacturers' instructions, says *The Consumer's Handbook*, a publication of the federal health department. If the chemical has been applied in too strong a concentration or too close to harvest, a residue may remain on the marketed produce. Small amounts are not considered harmful as long as they remain within the limits set by the food and drug directorate.

However, it is a wise precaution to wash and wipe all fruits and vegetables thoroughly before eating, regardless of whether or not they are to be cooked, the publication says.

mittee has some 30 full-time volunteers and over 300 part-time volunteers. The former work 10 hours a day, six or seven days a week. The only pay they receive is appreciation and thanks. The part-time volunteers are used for canvassing, distributing literature, and tacking up posters.

**Red Cross Youth plan  
leadership study centre**

The City of Westmount has been chosen by Red Cross Youth for a three-day regional leadership study centre, beginning June 26.

Meetings will be at Westmount Park School, 20 Academy Road, from 9 a.m. on Wednesday to 3 p.m. Friday, June 28.

Delegates, as well as the public at large, will be guests of the City of Westmount Recreation Centre Thursday evening at 8 p.m. for a water safety demonstration. This will take place at the Westmount swimming pool, corner of de Maisonneuve Boulevard and Lansdowne Avenue. Senior Red Cross water safety instructors will give demonstrations in drownproofing, survival swimming, reaching assists and rescue breathing (mouth-to-mouth). Young leaders will be invited afterward to don their bathing suits and trunks for a practice session and a swim.

The purpose of the centre, say Red Cross officials, is to give an opportunity to representatives of Red Cross Youth of Montreal and surrounding district to develop their own projects and plan their activities for the coming school year. Another purpose of the gathering will be to find means of developing mutual assistance at home; to study aspects of RCY programme; to inform delegates of blood transfusion service and to promote participation in the service.

The delegates, who are executive members of their school's Red Cross Youth Council, will also evaluate the possibilities of increasing Red Cross Youth assistance abroad; special help project to developing countries and cultural exchanges. They will take part in workshop procedures and exchange suggestions for school projects.

Delegates will be from Grades 10 or 11. Delegates from out of town will be guests of other Red Cross Youth members residing in Westmount and other cities on the Montreal Island.

Teacher sponsors of Red Cross Youth program are invited to attend the Centre.

**Holiday  
tragedies  
forecast**

The Canadian Red Cross forecasts a bleak out-look for St. Jean Baptiste and Dominion Day holiday weekends, which will be marred by an increase in drowning fatalities.

According to last year's Canadian Press survey, 40 persons drowned during the Dominion Day Weekend in Canada. "If good weather prevails over most of the country, we expect there will be more drownings this year than in 1967," said A. W. Thiesen, National Director of Red Cross Water Safety Service.

There were 291 drownings in the Province of Quebec last year by comparison to 361 in 1966, which was the highest number of tragedies in the Province for six consecutive years.

Causes of tragedies were attributed last year in this province to: swimming (68); non-powered boats (61); unsupervised children twelve and under (49); falling into water from stationary object (32); unknown causes (29); wading (19); power boat (15); falling into tanks, ditches, excavations (15); and other causes.

A demonstration of this course will be included as part of a three-day Junior Red Cross study centre, June 26 to June 28. 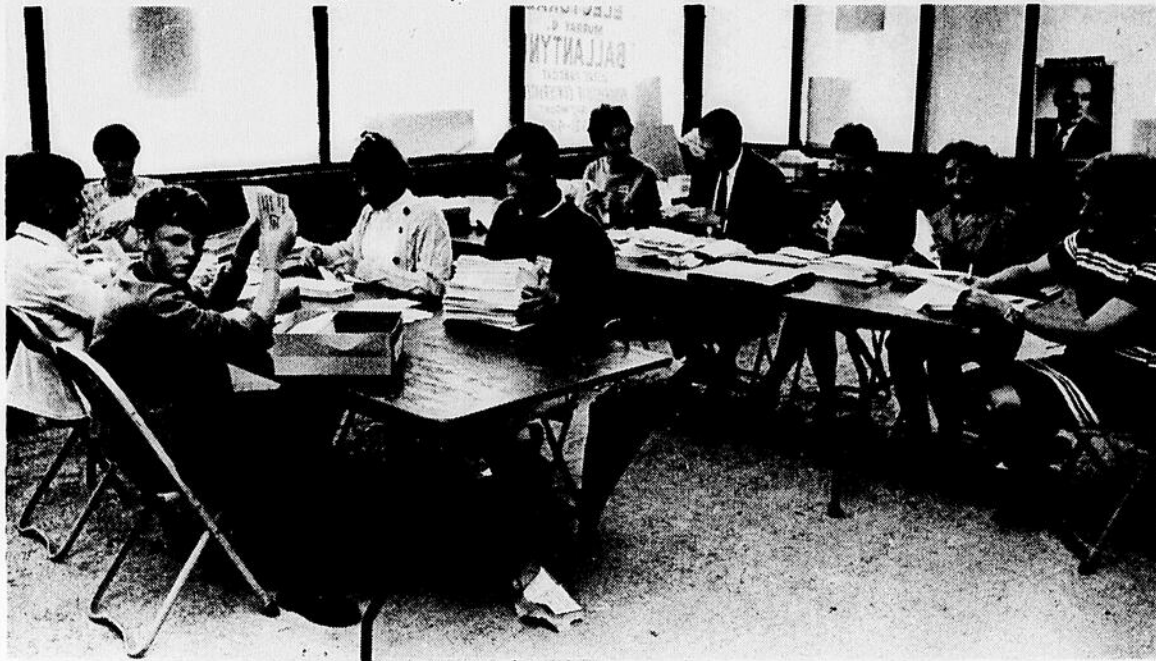

## Young PCs spark venerable association

The Westmount Progressive Conservative Association is really a very young organization in its present form, but in tracing back to earlier roots an interesting history emerges.

The present constituency of Westmount contains the greater part of the old riding of Montreal West, and from 1867 to 1896 this riding faithfully returned Conservatives. Sir Richard Leonard, as president of the association, saw the Hon. T. D. McGee, the Hon. John Young, M. H. Gault and Sir D. Smith successively elected during 29 years, with a four-year break.

By 1896, a separate division called St. Antoine was established, and another long period of Conservative representation began. The association, chaired usually by Leslie G. Bell, was successful in the elections of T. G. Roddice 1896-1904; H. B. Ames 1904-1921; and finally, Mr. Bell himself who sat from 1925 to 1935.

Quebec's Conservative contingent for all these years was even smaller than at present, and the consistent re-election of Conservatives indicates the great vitality of the association.

R. S. White became the Conservative MP in 1935, winning by some 5,500 votes. The depression, however, hurt the association, which dwindled away to only 74 members by 1942.

By 1945, with a Liberal representation in Ottawa in the person of the Hon. D. C. Abbot, the Conservatives nearly defeated him. The Liberals held on, however, with steadily decreasing majorities, until 1958.

The election of Conservative Ross Webster in 1958 was the result, in a large part, of an extremely active Young Progressive Conservative group, led by Murray Ballantyne's present campaign manager Brian Gallery. Supported by stalwarts such as Gavin Ross, Michael Dennis and Michael Megher, the association became one of the most active on the island.

party was a featured event, with more than 1,000 attending in 1958. YPCs organized the first blood drive in the City of Westmount. A cup was donated for the YPC hockey team, which played other teams in NDG and Montreal West.

The Diefenbaker days saw much unhappiness within the party, and the association shrunk almost out of sight by

1963. However, under the leadership of Brigadier John Price and Fred McCutcheon, son of Senator Wallace McCutcheon, and with the efforts of leaders like Mme. Basil Codellan and Mrs. Ivan Winsor, both men's and women's groups now flourish. The combined mailing lists total well over 1,500, and a strong association backs up Mr. Ballantyne's bid for election June 25.

# Ballantyne campaign - how it grew: conviction, concern and bus stops

"When a candidate feels a strong motivation, it's contagious. His whole organization catches the excitement." That's how Brian Gallery, campaign manager for Murray Ballantyne, accounts for the very rigorous campaign emanating from three Westmount Riding committee rooms on behalf of the Progressive Conservative standard-bearer.

Ballantyne himself explains it this way: "I'm running because I really believe my lifelong interest in English-French relations has fitted me to do a good job for Westmount at this crucial time. So the only way to run is - hard". His pace has been non-stop every day of the campaign, from bus stops in the morning rush-hour to TV talks at night.

## DOGS, DOORBELLS AND COFFEE

"Don't let our country go to the dogs," pleads a poster on the busy street corner, as the candidate, surrounded by the wagging tails of four bumbling pooches, greets the passers-by. "There's so much you'd like to say to every person you meet. But you just have to hope that a few words and a handshake - or just your being there at all - conveys a message." Then it's on to a coffee party with a group of homemakers - "They're sharp!" - and then some doorbell-ringing, speech-writing and a radio interview to round out the afternoon.

## NEW APPROACHES

"On Channel 12, again tonight by popular demand! Murray Ballantyne, the man with the answer for English-speaking Quebec!" This fifteen-minute TV show has created a lot of interest. It's a shortened version of the speech that opened Ballantyne's campaign last month, at a brass band rally in Westmount High School.

In this talk the candidate set forth his policy on "The most important issue facing Canada and Westmount today" - the question of French-English relations. It was termed by many the best approach to the problem so far, and since that night Murray Ballantyne has never looked back. On the headquarters wall, a chart of his speaking engagements testifies to a long line of platforms mounted and thousands of Westmount voters reached. "You can feel it, when

an audience is with you. That's why it's not as tiring as it all seems."

## 1,000 VOLUNTEERS

Headed by energetic organizers nearly all under 35, a thousand volunteers have thrown themselves into the challenge of trying to unseat a seasoned politician. Workers include mini-skirted co-eds, political science students, housewives, businessmen. They have divided the riding into 210 polls, each with its captain. Every poll has conducted a door-to-door canvass of voters, distributing literature, answering questions, assessing reactions.

"Our candidate has the convictions, he has the ideals, and he has the drive," says Brian Gallery. He glances around the bustling committee room. "Do you feel it? Man, that's victory in the air!"

# Duff defends 'deux nations' in Westmount

"The Canadian government has to stop practicing a policy of confrontation and start creating one of consultation". This is what Duff Roblin declared at a press conference previous to a recent electoral meeting at Westmount High School for the constituents of Westmount and its candidate Murray Ballantyne.

Mr. Roblin was at that time answering a newspaperman who had asked him the classical question about the two nations in Canada. Mr. Roblin was clear in saying that he considers there are two nations in Canada in the cultural and sociological sense of the word, but that there is only one in the English sense, in the political sense.

The Winnipeg, Manitoba candidate, one of the most important political figures of the Progressive Conservative party added that Manitoba, like Que-

bec, has enjoyed a particular status since the signing of the British North America Act and that Manitoba even had, like Quebec, international relations with other countries. On this point he answered a newspaperman that one should not condemn Quebec at this particular time, since consultations will have to start after the elections on the international role of the provinces. For Mr. Roblin, there is no doubt that there is only one external personality in Canada, that is the federal government. But, he said, there must be rules and regulations found so that the provinces can communicate with strangers.

Mr. Roblin, talking in French and in English, depending on the questions that were put to him, said he believed the Progressive Conservatives could take a working majority of seats if Quebec helps sufficiently.
