Severe hail storm at Denver, Col. Toronto is troubled with an outbreak of rowdiness in the suburbs.

A number of members of the Dakota Legislature have been indicted for bribery.

The German Reichstag has rejected the Government bill increasing the wool duties.

The wrecking steamer "Cousins" has sunk in the St. Lawrence near Waterville Island.

170 deaths have occurred from glandular phlegm in the neighborhood of Cincinnati and Hamilton.

The preliminary trial of Congressman Thompson, for killing Davis, commenced at Hartford, Ky.

The Chicago City Council have decided to allow district telegraph poles to be erected in the streets.

Two children have died from blood poisoning on West 17th street, New York, caused by inhaling sewer gas.

It is estimated that the exhibit from America at the Fisheries Exhibition exceed those of the whole of Europe.

The fourth biennial convention of the Catholic Knights of America opened at St. Louis on the 20th.

Prussia's response to the last demands of the Papal Secretary has created an unfavorable impression at the Vatican.

Mr. Hepburn, late Superintendent of the Bank Department, was yesterday elected President of the Savings Bank.

A London firm of outside operators which has been doing an extensive business in Grand trunk have been indicted for bribery.

Ray Terrell, a well-known aviator, of Oberlin, Ohio, is making wonderful progress in his flight over the lake.

The Court of Chancery at Toronto has set aside the sale of four hundred acres of land on the ground of fraud on the part of the vendor.

Ben Crooks' friends are apprehensive lest in undertaking his authorized expedition into Mexico he has rendered himself liable to be court-martialed.

Brien and Carret, radicals, have been elected to the Executive Committee of the Ontario Republican Association.

Lord Carlisle has refused the request of the English Government to send a commission to investigate the case of the importation of opium from America.

The first attempt to duplicate from Silver Hill reports that by the boiler explosion in April a man was killed and a number seriously wounded.

It is stated that Mr. Gordon Brown, late manager of the North-West, is to be appointed to the position of Registrar of the Surrogate Court in place of H. W. Carver.

Mr. Leont, Commander of the Corps of New York, who recently entered the ship building business, says he can construct ships at a price low enough to run in competition with the Government.

The Excise Board of Jamaica, N. Y., declared the limited license yesterday by granting 10 licenses in possession of 1000.

There was a sensation at San Antonio, Texas, over the capture of a Major Watson, paymaster, alleged to be a rebel, on a train near Fort Worth.

The Law and Order Committee of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., have resolved to form a ward organization for the purpose of improving the streets, and enforcing the Sunday law.

The English treaty with Madagascar conveys the right of the Madagascar Government to levy the highest duties upon all imports of spirits that are not British.

Mr. Trevelyan, the Irish Secretary, has recommended that the Government should propose the loan of £1,000,000 in exchange for the settlement of the company, unless the company greatly modifies its terms.
