## ANALYSIS

### OF THE

#### PLANTAGNET SALINE SPRING.

THE MINERAL WATER OF THE PLANTAGNET SPRING is strongly Saline, and contains a considerable quantity of the Carbonate of Magnesia and Sulphate of Magnesia, which is of great medicinal value. the amount of Carbonic Acid which it contains, but

it appears to be considerable.

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GOVERNMENT NOTICE. EXTRACTS from the Standing Orders of the Legislative Council of Canada.
