Western Park Bus Terminal Is Approved

While city of Montreal decision to go ahead with a tram and bus terminal at Western Park affects Westmount only unofficially — there is little if any even unofficial dissent to the plan, a check here reveals.

Some city of Westmount officials see it as "the only logical move."

Buses are scheduled to replace trams on St. Catherine street, and a new route will be inaugurated from the Western Park terminus next summer.

The plans of the Transportation Commission, as approved by the city of Montreal executive committee Tuesday (4 to 1) are amended from the originals to save five trees that stand within the park. The loading platforms will take three feet off the park on St. Catherine street and five feet on Closse street.

The sidewalk on the east side of Closse is to be narrowed by six feet, while the pavement eventually will be 30 feet wide instead of 41 feet. The street itself will become one-way for southbound traffic between St. Catherine and Tupper Sts., as it is above St. Catherine.

These changes will be made to provide two 11-foot wide driveways, separated by a 24-foot sheltered loading platform. Fences will run between the inner driveway and the park and between the outer driveway and the street.

The sheltered loading platforms on St. Catherine and Tupper Sts will be 15 feet seven inches deep and will provide 14 feet of clear space, making allowance for the supporting columns.

There will be no more embarking or disembarking for Verdun-LaSalle bus passengers on the Atwater Ave. side of the park.

When the terminus is completed, this, according to tentative plans, is what will happen:

Buses coming along St. Catherine from the west will turn down Atwater, east along Tupper, then up the inner driveway on Closse to St. Catherine, where they will turn back west again.

Buses coming along St. Catherine from the east will turn left down the outer driveway on Closse, east along Tupper, north on Fort St. to St. Catherine where they will turn back east again.

(Passengers wishing to continue their journey east or west would merely have to cross the platform between the two driveways.)

Buses coming along the new Dorchester St. route from the east will turn north onto Atwater east St. Catherine, down Fort to Dorchester where they will turn back east again.

(Platform for this route will be along the St. Catherine St. side of the park.)

Westmount is contemplating the widening of its stretch of Dorchester St. and connecting it with St. Catherine at the western limit. Should this be done, Montreal would widen

Local Manual Workers Granted 8 cent increase

At an estimated annual figure of some \$60,000 Westmount has agreed to an eight-cents-an-hour increase in pay for its manual workers, all

across the board, effective January 1.

This increase will go into effect for all workers, irrespective of trades, city manager Tom Hughes told The Examiner yesterday.

While Westmount has

no contract, as such, with its manual workers, the civic authorities operated as they usually do through meetings with representatives of the workers, and the eight cents an hour increase was decided upon

with a minimum of delay.

About 200 workers are affected, on the average, although the size of the labor force in the municipality coming under the head of 'manual' varies with the seasons.



Chartered Accountants Examinations Results

Memorial Service For Rev. W. H. Garth

A memorial service was held Tuesday, for Rev. William Henry Garth, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry W. Garth of Westmount, at Trinity Memorial Church. A retired priest of the Diocese of New York, he died on Christmas day, aged 87.

He then went to New York, where he served as assistant to Dr. Rainsford at St. George's church. For 10 years, he was special preacher at St. Bartholomew's Church and at the same time was rector of St. Mark's Church, Islip, Long Island.

In 1903 he married Irene Emerson Ransom Trask who died 10 years ago. He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Louisa Whitehead, of Montreal.

Burial took place in New York Tuesday.

All Things New
 By Rev. Canon R. Kenneth Naylor
 Rector of Trinity Memorial Church

We always come back to some hopeful thought like this title at the beginning of the year. We look back on the past year and we find that the shadows are pretty grey, the disappointments at times almost overwhelming. I know that in the economic side the picture is bright and yet there are two things about it that are unwholesome; on the one hand we sit enthroned on a billion bushels of wheat which the world will not have at the artificial price we have set on it. The same is true of our butter surplus. But on the other side of the picture we find a larger number of elderly people actually suffering want than we have known since the 1930's. There is one other very unhealthy phenomenon in our own city; in the past year we have suffered two riots which have been due to the weakness of the city administration, and they have blackened the reputation of the city in the eyes of the rest of the Dominion.

Those are some of our public

discontents; but they do not affect us very deeply, because we can always blame someone else for them. In fact, we get a certain enjoyment out of our righteous indignation. But our private affairs are another matter. They are the sorrows and losses which we have undergone in the past year. Some members of the community have lost loved ones in the course of the year. We try to sustain them with our sympathy, but the hurt and the loss remain, and the suffers find it hard to face a New Year. Those who have suffered illnesses, on the other hand, look forward with eagerness and hope.

But what of the other kind of sorrow and frustration, where we have allowed ourselves to grow slack and careless in our Christian lives? We think of the end of the year as a time of spiritual stock-taking and we ask ourselves whether we have gone forward or backwards. Of one thing we can be sure, we have not stood still. Do we look forward then with hope or without? If all depends on ourselves. Some of us do not want to hope, because hope implies effort on our part, and we would rather drift. Some of us have realized that hope is an essential part of our Christian life, and the determination and effort that go with hope.

So we welcome our Lord's

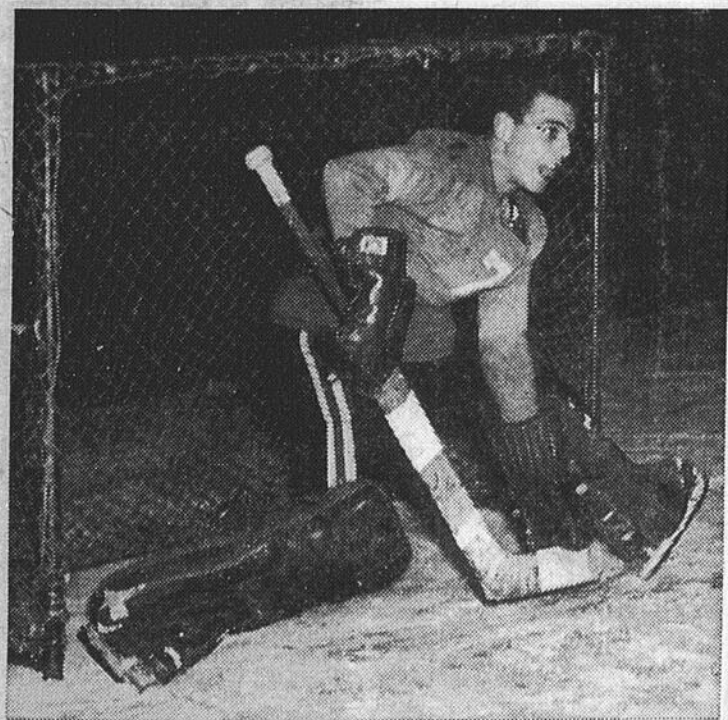
