## Westmount Nears \$6,300,000 Goal In Victory Drive

Retail Sale and Special Names Subscriptions Total \$5,626,000 Last Night Following Week of Intensive Drive — Officials Confident Objective Will Be Surpassed by At Least \$1,000,000

An intensive drive by canvassers during the past week has paid off as far as Westmount's part in the nation-wide Victory Loan campaign is concerned, and today the local committee stands on the threshold of achieving its \$6,300,000 objective.

Further gains are expected within the next few days and when final estimates have been made it confidently is expected Westmount will be over the top by at least \$1,000,000.

A statement on the campaign thus far was released last night at headquarters in Westmount Y.M.C.A., by W. J. Lucas, chairman of the publicity committee, who said:

"What Westmount has really done in the matter of buying Victory Loan Bonds can be readily judged by the amount subscribed through the retail sale and by special names.

"These subscriptions tonight total \$5,626,000. Thus far, \$3,087,000 has been subscribed by the special names and it is confidently expected this total will jump rather impressively during the next day or so.

"There seems to be a good deal of complacency on the part of the public even at this late date to put off signing subscription forms.

"Every man and woman in the community who is able, should buy a bond. It might be wise to point out that considerable attention has been focussed on the installment privilege. All can secure this concession from any bank.

"It is the earnest hope of the Westmount Victory Loan Committee that next week we may be able to report that the Loan has been oversubscribed in Westmount by at least \$1,000,000.

"This is possible if everyone does his or her part."

## FORM NEW UNIT TO AID VICTIMS OF NAZI RAIDS

Lord Provost of Glasgow Will Be in Charge of Distribution

The recently-organized Glasgow and West of Scotland War Relief Association has been formed to give relief and assistance to victims of bombings or other circumstances caused by or resulting from the war.

It had been thought to confine the effort to the area designated, but members decided at a meeting held last week to leave the distribution of goods sent, to the discretion of the Lord Provost of Glasgow.

The organizers state that donations of used clothing, boots and shoes, knitted garments, etc., will be welcomed, but stress the fact that clothing must be clean and in good repair.

First Shipment Soon

A transport committee is functioning with a representative in each district for collection of donations, and members feel confident that their objective of first shipment will be reached by the end of June. Working groups for sewing, knitting, etc., are also getting under way in the various districts.

## V. B. CORBETT IS NAMED TO LEAD FIGHTER UNIT

Westmounter Promoted to Squadron - Leader in R.C.A.F. Overseas—Succeeds Sqdn.-Ldr. McNab

Vaughn B. Corbett, son of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Corbett of 760 Upper Lansdowne avenue, has been promoted to the rank of Squadron-leader in the Royal Canadian Air Force and now commands No. 402 Canadian Fighter Squadron overseas, it has been learned. He takes over command from Squadron-Leader Ernest McNab.

A McGill graduate in the faculty of law, Sqdn.-Ldr. Corbett attended Upper Canada College and then the Royal Military College at Kingston. And upon his graduation he was appointed a pilot officer in the non-permanent force of the R.C.A.F. in Montreal. Meanwhile he studied law at McGill and on graduating became associated with the Canadian Aviation Insurance Managers.

Sqdn.-Ldr. Corbett was called for active service when war was declared and took his training at St. Hubert, going overseas in June 1940, as a member of the now famous No. 1 Fighter Squadron commanded by Squadron Leader McNab.

He got the first taste of air fighting in the Battle of Britain last August and was shot down August 31, his plane in flames. Before he could bail out, Corbett suffered severe burns and spent three months in hospital, returning to his squadron for more action against the enemy.

Sqdn.-Ldr. Corbett has three brothers serving in their country. Capt. F. J. B. Corbett with the Royal Canadian Artillery stationed in the east, Lt. Dawson now overseas with the 48th Highlanders and Keith (Casey) C. B. Corbett with Queen's University C.O. T.C.

Westmount Man, Flying Officer in R.A.F., Killed Monday in England on 24th Birthday

A member of the Royal Air Force since the fall of 1938, Flying Officer Kenneth Malcolm Laird was killed in a flying accident in England on Monday—his 24th birthday—his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Laird, 723 Upper Roslyn avenue, have been informed.

FO. Laird was born in Toronto, June 16, 1917 and moved to Montreal with his family and took his junior matriculation at Westmount High School. And it was at Westmount High that he displayed much interest in sports, particularly tennis.

On graduating, FO. Laird joined the Canadian Bank of Commerce staff where he was employed for four years until he left to join the Royal Air Force. Attached to a bomber command, he did much instructional work.

Aside from his father, superintendent of the Canadian Bank of Commerce's Quebec branches, and his mother, FO. Laird is survived by two brothers, LAC. Douglas Laird, R.C.A.F., Victoria, B.C., and Howard, Montreal, and a sister, Peggy.

## DR. J. B. COLLIP HONORED WITH MICKLE AWARD

McGill Biochemistry Professor Given Fellowship By U. of T. for Services To Medical Field

Dr. James Beiram Collip of Westmount, professor of biochemistry at McGill University, has been awarded the Charles Mickle Fellowship by the University of Toronto, for his contributions in the study of the physiological effects of pituitary hormones.

The fellowship is an annual affair, being awarded to a member of the medical profession considered to have done the most during the preceding 10 years to advance sound knowledge of a practical kind in medicine and science.

Appointed to the chair of biochemistry in McGill's medical faculty in 1927, Dr. Collip had graduated with special honors in physiology and biochemistry from University of Toronto in 1911, shortly afterwards entering graduate courses in these subjects. He received his Ph.D. in 1914.

Lecturing at the University of Alberta, he obtained his doctorate in science from that institution and later was appointed to a professorship. He then obtained his M.D. and was elected to a fellowship in the Royal Society of Canada. His subsequent career has been punctuated with awards for outstanding achievements in his field.

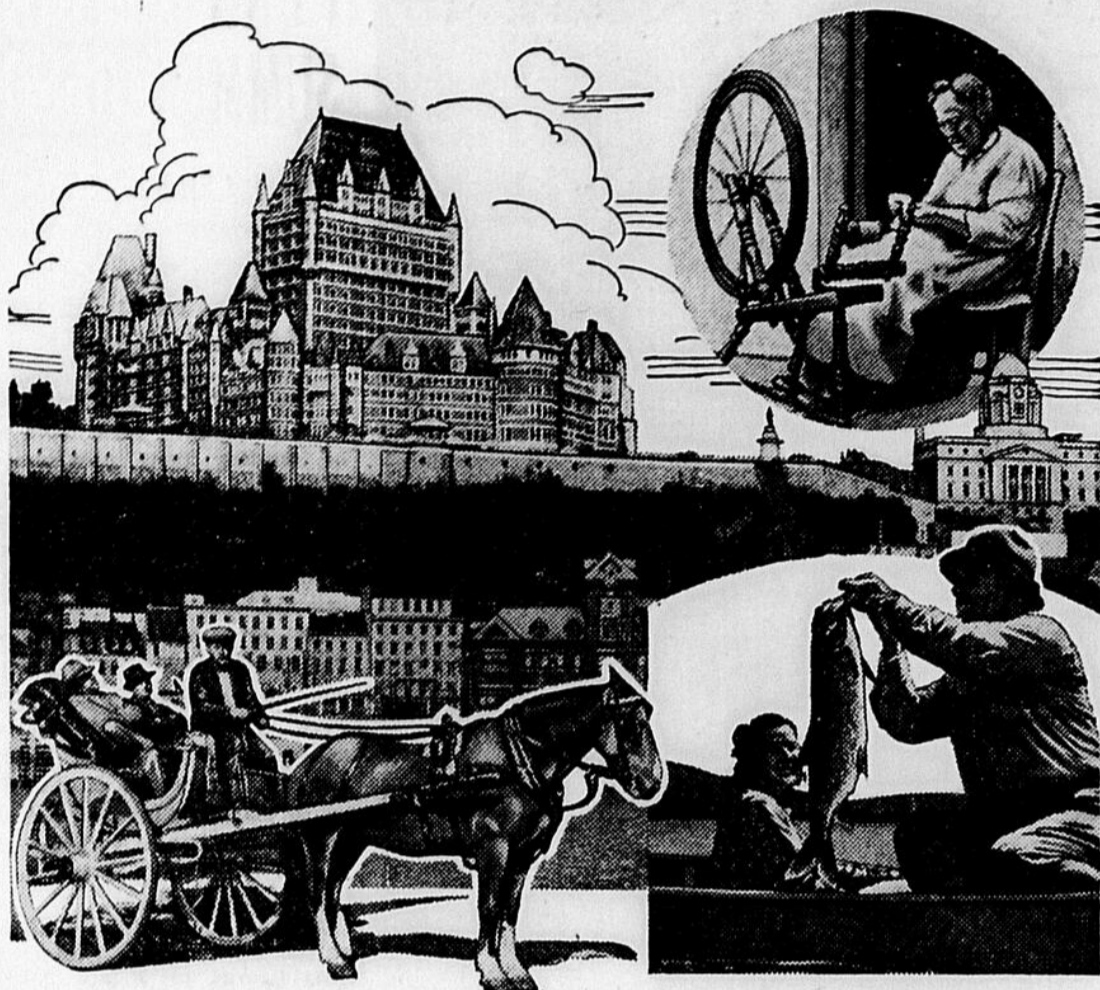

Long before coming to Montreal, Miss Wray knew of the Queen's Canadian Fund, and said that when she was asked to help the fund by appearing at the fair, she had answered immediately, "Of course!"

Mrs. R. M. Macaulay, president of the Westmount Women's Club, spoke of the work being done by the club's 400 members, anxious to aid the cause of freedom by working throughout the summer.

Miss Alfreda Wallace, talented young Montreal actress who has been touring the United States and Mexico in plays for young people, appeared briefly on the platform and was introduced to Fay Wray. The guests of honor at the fair also met Miss Wray, and the actress signed many autographs to comply with the requests of school children crowding around the platform.

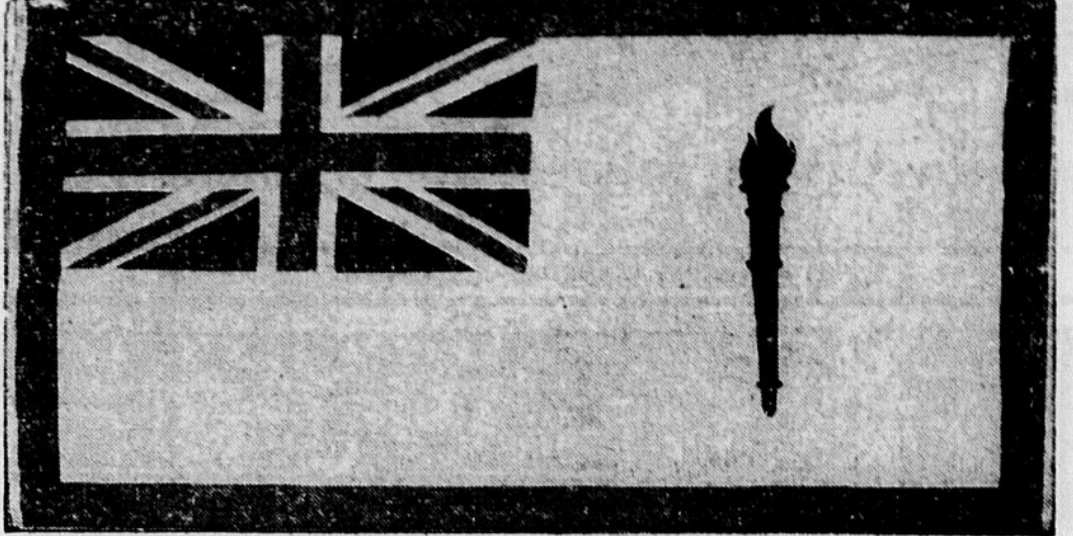

# THE PLEDGE FLAG



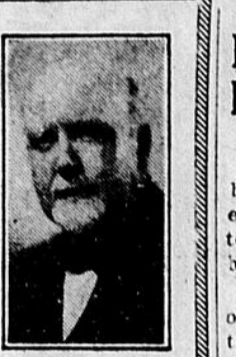

The earliest known census took place in Babylon in 4000 B.C. which anti-dates by many years the ill-fated attempt by King David to number the Hebrews in 1017 B.C. Credit can be claimed by Canada for the first modern census which was taken by the Colony of New France in 1666 when 3,215 persons were recorded. Sixteen to seventeen thousand enumerators will soon be at our census soon to be taken of every human in Canada. Answers to the questions to be asked will give an accurate picture of Canadian life when tabulated by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics by ingenious machines into many and varied classifications.

Evidently Marian Anderson, golden-voiced Negro contralto has a heart as golden and as beautiful as her voice. The \$10,000 Philadelphia Annually given to her as the person who did most during the past year, Miss Anderson has given to help "poor, unfortunate, very talented people" realize their artistic ambitions.

Churchmen of British Columbia are deeply exercised about temperance, which increases with military and naval concentrations. Canadians still spend \$200,000,000 a year for liquor. Paraffine Companies Inc. (Pabco) of California had a company union, although its conditions of work were as good as or better than any in the industry. Yet when the workers signified through a secret ballot arranged by the company that they wished to be organized in bona fide Labor unions, Pabco dissolved the company union and allowed union organizers to carry on their duties. Now there are 18 A.F. of L. and C.I.O. unions in the plant, all cooperating amicably because of the liberal policies of the Company. The principle of the closed shop is observed and the agreements with the unions are termed Class A—model agreements. Recently Pabco instituted a Labor Relations College open to factory bosses and union officials. Teachers are industrialists, Labor leaders, College professors, newspaper editors, persons who are socialists in some phase of Labor relations. Now students from outside points attend. Over 200 attended the first classes held during the past spring. The cost of running the College is borne by the Company. Increased efficiency has reduced production costs in spite of increased wages. Profits have increased. Since 1929 the selling prices of Pabco products have dropped 20 to 30 per cent while basic wage rates have risen 50 per cent.

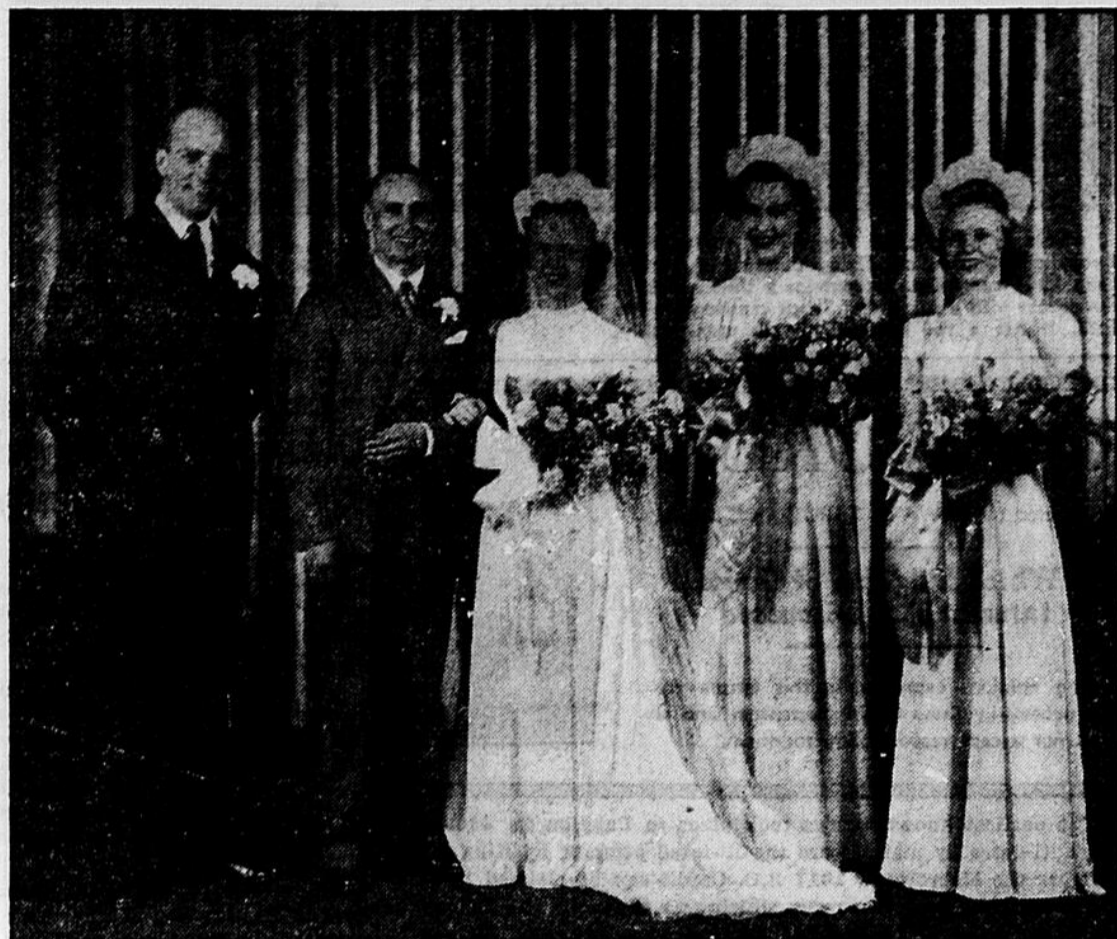

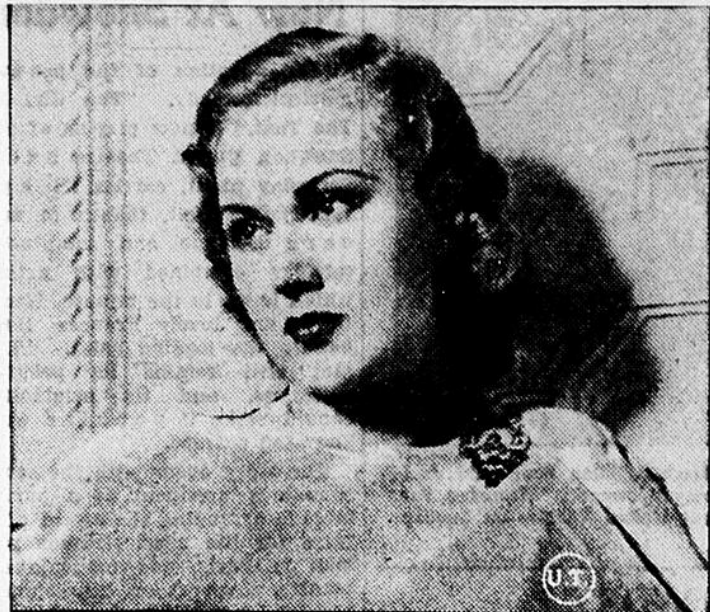

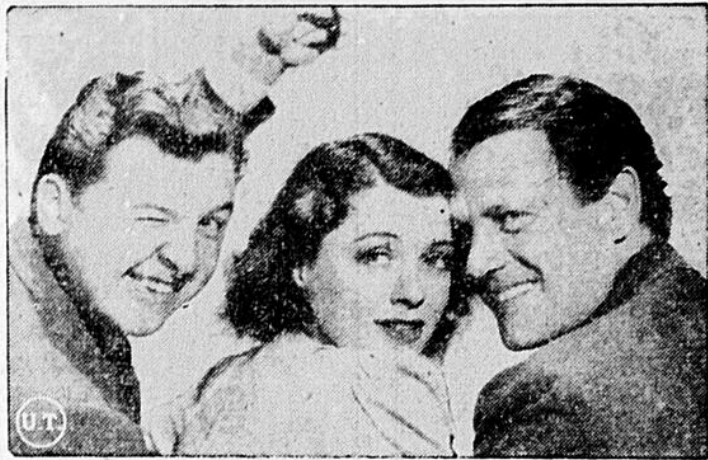

### MAIDEN SPEECH

Mrs. Cora T. Casselman, newly elected Member of Parliament for Edmonton East, showed her nice judgment by the subject which she chose for her first speech in the House of Commons. It was a plea for consideration of wives and children of disabled veterans.

This speech will be taken as the keynote of her personal policy. She chose a subject of special interest to women, and yet one that is of some public importance. It was one on which, even in her inexperience, she could claim every right to speak.

Her interests will, probably not be restricted within this narrow sphere. As time goes on, she may be expected to branch out into discussions of weightier problems. As her first contribution to the public debates, however, she could not have done better in her selection of a theme.

### LET'S HAVE A FLAG DAY

Saturday was Flag Day in the United States. We should have one in Canada.

Let us set aside one special day in the year, when each citizen shall be encouraged to study the make-up of the Union Jack, and the significance of its component parts, and the

proper method of flying and displaying it on all occasions. It should be a day for addresses, to both children and adults, instructing them in these things, and a keynote should be devised in the form of an oath of allegiance to the flag as impressive as the one which the Americans use.

Thousands of business men and others are sold annually on the idea to spend good money on subscriptions to Letters, Comment, Digests, Forecasts, and so forth, that promise to give them inside, advance, exclusive, and confidential information. The price ranges anywhere from ten dollars to a hundred dollars for fifty-two letters a year. These letters might give a man a feeling that he knows as much as the other fellow, but when you stop to think of it, what sources of information have these self-styled insiders got that aren't accessible to the Associated Press, Canadian Press, United Press, and the correspondents of the leading financial and metropolitan newspapers? Being irresponsible, they can relate rumors and gossip, and thus occasionally call a strike before it crosses the plate, but they are wrong far more often than right.

### ART FOR ART'S SAKE

Inasmuch as millions of people cherish the idea that authors of books derive enough money in royalties to support their families, we think that we may be performing a public service by calling attention to a statement by Quincy Howe, who knows whereof he speaks because he is in the book publishing business. Says Mr. Howe: "There are not half a dozen writers in America who make a good living exclusively by writing books." Successful book authors make big money from lectures, movie rights, advertising, and allied fields. Unsuccessful book writers are almost totally dependent on other sources of income and must regard their book writing as purely a sideline.

### Tulips Require Careful Pruning

After-blooming care of tulips is very important if you wish to assure satisfactory bloom for the following year.

Whether you intend to allow the bulb to remain in the soil throughout the season from one year to the next, or whether you dig and replant your bulbs each year, this after-blooming care requires the same procedure.

First, remove all faded flowers that have not been used for cutting. This will prevent seed development; the energy that would

otherwise go to the production of seed is thereby diverted to the better growth of the bulb.

Allow the foliage to remain intact until it has ripened and died down, as the foliage is necessary to manufacture food stored in the bulb for next year's bloom.

Feeding is very necessary at this period, too, for the tulip is a gross feeder and must be supplied with an abundance of plant food if the bulbs are to give satisfactory bloom for several years.

This feeding not only benefits the tulip bulbs, but will also provide nourishment for the flowers which will follow the tulips.
