Bertrand postpones bill

QUEBEC (CP) — Premier Jean-Jacques Bertrand, bowing to nationalist pressure within his party's caucus, Wednesday announced that a government bill on controversial linguistic rights would not be tabled in the legislative assembly this week.

The premier, who had promised that the bill would be introduced Tuesday, told the house that the government will "certainly bring in" the bill before the end of the present session.

His change of plans, announced after a three-hour caucus of Union Nationale MLAs, was greeted by enthusiastic desk-thumping applause in the government benches and laughter on the Opposition side.

The proposed bill to guarantee parents the right to educate their children in the official language of their choice has encountered strong opposition of several nationalist and separatist groups, including the St. Jean Baptiste Society of Montreal.

HAD DOUBTS

Mr. Lesage said in an interview on the legislation: "I have never believed it could be done by the Union Nationale because there are too many separatists in the party, both ministers and members."

One source said the Union Nationale caucus discussed the possibility of holding a free vote

on linguistic legislation to free nationalists like Cultural Affairs Minister Jean-Noel Tremblay from party discipline.

Asked if he favored a free vote on linguistic legislation, Mr. Tremblay answered by saying the question is hypothetical because there is no linguistic legislation before the house.

In the house Wednesday, Mr. Bertrand said he had announced that the bill would be introduced if not discussed and adopted this week, because of the urgency to solve the problem in St. Leonard where English-speaking Roman Catholic parents remain deprived of the right to have their children educated in English at the Grade 1 level this year.

The premier said his government had been unjustly accused of electioneering by promising to introduce the bill prior to the Dec. 4 byelection in the predominantly English-speaking riding of Montreal Notre-Dame-de-Grace.

He said there is no connection between the pledge to introduce the bill and the byelection, but Opposition Leader Jean Lesage broke into laughter saying that Mr. Bertrand was making contradictory statements.

Mr. Bertrand continued a prepared statement:

"I say that we not only don't have the right to indulge in electioneering on a question like

this, but we shouldn't even be suspected of doing so.

"That's why we have decided not to present the bill this week. We shall certainly introduce it before the end of the present session."

"It shouldn't be hidden. It's a delicate and difficult problem, a problem that involves what is most dear to me—their language and their culture, a problem where emotional reactions can sometimes overcome cold reason."

"Already the rumors are multiplying and even before the bill is introduced, and its real nature is disclosed, we are being accused of having all sorts of intentions which we never had."

Delegate is vague on view of Nixon

MONTREAL (CP) — A North Vietnamese delegate to the Hemispheric Conference to End the Vietnam War was non-committal Wednesday on the subject of Richard Nixon's election to the presidency of the United States.

Hoang Minh Giam, North Vietnamese minister of culture, was asked at a news conference what effect he thought Nixon's election might have on possible termination of the war.

He replied that the U.S. president-elect has not yet clearly stated his position on the war.

Mr. Giam heads the four-man North Vietnamese delegation to the conference whose organizers expect about 2,000 delegates.

Meanwhile, a U.S. Roman Catholic priest said the United States is creating several potential jungle wars by its exploitation of Latin American countries.

Rev. Blaise Bonpane, expelled

from Guatemala last year for organizing the peasant population, told a group of McGill University students that revolutions will erupt in several Latin American countries unless they are allowed to develop socialist economies without foreign control.

Father Bonpane, 39, a delegate to the conference, said the U.S. has exploited the people and the natural wealth of Latin America while supporting puppet governments or ruthless oligarchies.

Registration for the conference is to begin tonight with keynote speeches Friday and workshops Saturday.

The conference lists 64 Canadian and 53 U.S. sponsors, including individuals, some of whom are identified as members of religious and anti-war groups or as labor or student leaders.

Sponsors also are listed from

Argentina, Guyana, Peru, Panama, Costa Rica, Brazil, Colombia, Chile, Venezuela and Mexico.

'THREAT NOT LIFTED'

Mr. Giam said his country does not feel the U.S. threat was lifted with the cessation of bombing raids.

The Tories are thwarted over debate on grain problem

OTTAWA (CP) — The Conservative opposition tried without success Wednesday to get a full-scale Commons debate on the wet grain problem.

Speaker Lucien Lamoureux said damp western grain from the fall harvest was a "continuing emergency," not a "sudden emergency" as required by the rules for an emergency debate.

More successful than the Conservatives was a woman in the gallery, who tossed an empty plastic men's lotion container on to the Commons floor.

The container, in the shape of a small green Buddha, knocked over a glass of water on the table of Alistair Fraser, the Commons clerk.

Security guards hustled the middle-aged woman out of the gallery, and she was later released. A confused note attached to the container described Prime Minister Trudeau as a "stupid innocent."

Despite this diversion, it was wheat day in the House. There was a climax of sorts as Eldon Woolliams (PC—Calgary North) angrily charged that Parliament had fallen to pieces.

PRODS FOR NAUGHT

His outburst followed unrewarding Conservative attempts to prod the government into statements on how it planned to help western farmers dry millions of bushels of damp grain on the fields and in grain elevators.

"What kind of government is this?" he shouted.

In the absence of Agriculture Minister Olson and Trade Minister Pepin, Otto Lang, a minister without portfolio, fielded many of the wheat questions in a non-committal way that angered the Conservatives.

Earlier, Richard Southam (PC—Quebec) accompanied his plea for the emergency debate with the claim that 250,000,000 bushels of damp wheat could be lost through spoilage unless properly dried. It was worth \$300,000,000.

Mr. Southam charged there had been "a catastrophic failure" in government wheat policies. The government should provide grain-drying equipment to farmers on farms. In a few months the farm-stored grain would be beyond saving.

Alf Gleave (NDP—Saskatoon-Biggar) agreed the situation was desperate and the third opposition party, the Creditists, also supported the Conservative motion which the Speaker eventually rejected.

Under sharp Creditiste questioning, Mr. Trudeau advised that the government had received an invitation from the African French-speaking country of Niger to attend a cultural conference of French-speaking countries.

The invitation, he said, included the advice that Quebec had been invited independently. The government hoped to send a delegation that would represent Canada as a whole.

There was no indication from Mr. Trudeau's remarks that the dual invitation would blow up into the kind of diplomatic dispute involved in the bypassing of Ottawa at two earlier French-speaking international education conferences this year.

Negotiations were reported going on behind the scenes between Ottawa and Quebec City to reach an agreement on the delegation makeup. Quebec's separate attendance at the earlier conferences was seen by federalists as a blow to national unity.

Transport Minister Hellyer assured the Commons that any changes proposed for Air Canada's corporate structure will be discussed by Parliament beforehand. Various forms of structure were under consideration for the publicly-owned airline, but a change in ownership was unlikely.

Dismantle bomb

MONTREAL (CP) — A bomb was discovered and dismantled by police a few hours before it was set to explode near parked police cars at an automobile sales and service company Wednesday.

A police spokesman said the bomb—discovered by employees of the automobile company in the northwest-end of the city—was made up of four sticks of dynamite, a detonator and a clock.

Explosion

MANNINGTON, W.Va. (AP) — Another explosion thundered through the deep coal mine today where 78 men have been trapped for more than a week. Flams and smoke spewed from one of the big mine's entrances.

Company spokesmen termed the 2:38 a.m. blast a "major explosion." It was the 15th to wrack Mountaineer Coal Co. No. 9 mine since the first blast trapped the men early Nov. 20. The other 21 men on the shift with them escaped.

Seize booze

OTTAWA (CP) — The RCMP made 285 raids during the recent Quebec liquor strike and seized 4,004 gallons of liquor smuggled from the United States, the Commons was told Wednesday.

The information was in a written reply from Solicitor-General George McNeil to a question by Roland Godin (Creditiste—Portneuf).

Black panther

SAN FRANCISCO (CP) — Police hunted Black Panther Eldridge Cleaver as a fugitive Wednesday, amid speculation he may have fled the United States, after the Negro militant failed to keep a date for return to prison.

The 33-year-old author and Panther minister of information was declared a wanted man in an all-points arrest bulletin 1½ hours after he was due to surrender as a parole violator.

Pigeon, broom

MONTREAL (CP) — Romaul Delaroche, 40, pleaded not guilty in municipal court Wednesday to a charge of killing a pigeon with a broom handle.

Judge Maurice Johnson expressed surprise, saying: "He's charged with killing what?"

"A pigeon, your honor," he was told.

"That's what I heard but I couldn't believe my ears," the judge said.

OTTAWA (CP) — A crippled boy in Saskatoon has offered John Diefenbaker a purebred poodle pup to take the place of the former prime minister's dog Happy, killed last week by a car.

Mr. Diefenbaker got the offer in a letter from the boy, Randy Kleckner, 14. He called Randy's mother, Mrs. Edward Kleckner, Wednesday to talk about it, and

plans to call her back today when he makes up his mind whether to accept the dog or not.

Mrs. Kleckner told reporters in Saskatoon that Mr. Diefenbaker said to her he would like to accept the dog, but he would not like the boy "to be out of pocket."

The dog, a miniature white French poodle, seven weeks old,

is valued at \$125.

Randy said in his letter to Mr. Diefenbaker that he raises poodle pups and usually sells them for "pin money."

Randy has cerebral palsy and is unable to speak. He moves about in a wheelchair, and communicates by means of an electronic typewriter and an electronic word board devised at the University of Saskatchewan.

French leaders see rise in living costs

PARIS (CP) — French government leaders believe the new austerity measures to save the franc from devaluation will raise the cost of living 1.5 to two per cent, but some businessmen and union leaders say it might go as high as three per cent.

The Gaullist-controlled Chamber of Deputies today approved President Charles de Gaulle's austerity program by a vote of 391 to 91.

The bill adjusts taxes and charges to favor exports and restrict domestic buying so that France can pay its way in international trade and not be forced into devaluation.

The lower house, the Senate, also will vote on the measure but its power can be overridden by the Chamber of Deputies, where the Gaullists and their allies control about 353 of the 486 seats.

Premier Maurice Couve de Murville, who introduced the

program in the National Assembly Tuesday, requested that it be voted on as a whole to eliminate article-by-article debate and amendments.

EFFECT NOT CLEAR

What effect the measures would have on the general public was not clear. Newspapers predicted a rise in the price of luxury goods and said currency restrictions would force millions of Frenchmen to give up vacations in Spain and Italy.

Strict controls were being maintained at all border crossing points and airports to make certain that travellers do not take more currency than officially authorized out of the country.

French residents are permitted to take 700 francs—\$140—worth of foreign currency out of the country on tourist trips. Businessmen get a higher allowance.

Common's missile was lotion bottle

OTTAWA (CP) — Tightened Commons security measures in the wake of a Parliament Buildings bomb incident 2½ years ago didn't deter a woman from flinging an object on to the Commons floor Wednesday.

The missile turned out to be an empty plastic men's lotion container—with a cryptic message to Prime Minister Trudeau.

The Commons was mid-way through debate on a motion for an emergency debate on western wheat when the missile whistled over the heads of reporters in the press gallery, at the north end of the House.

The green container, shaped like a tiny Buddha, knocked over a glass of water beside Commons Clerk Alistair Fraser and broke into two pieces which landed on both sides and in front of the chair of Commons Speaker Lucien Lamoureux.

Few MPs noticed the incident and the debate never faltered. Former prime minister John Diefenbaker, on his feet at the

time, apparently didn't notice the interruption. Prime Minister Trudeau left the chamber seconds later, then returned within minutes. It is not known whether he left because of the incident.

The middle-aged woman who threw the bottle was not identified by Commons guards, who hustled her from the public gallery. She was released after a brief interrogation.

Attached to the bottle by a string was this message: "Because of you, Mr. prime minister, the philosophy of the gods is filling the land. You stupid innocent; you know not what it is that you do. I will strangle the gods who put the way of death before my people. I will help Israel for his mouth is to be found the philosophy for life."

A peekini

SYDNEY (AP) — Australia's contribution to the seethrough look is a peekini, a strapless bra made of transparent plastic with a bright little plastic flower on each cup.

Five pairs of different flowers come with each bra. "A girl can change the flowers in a second," designer Gerard Doube of Melbourne said today.

Paul Joseph Chartier died May 18, 1966, when a homemade bomb he apparently intended to toss into the Commons exploded prematurely in a washroom near one of the public galleries.

Leaflets and a container of animal blood have also been hurled into the chamber.

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Safety-wise man is honored

A certificate of Merit of the "Wise Owl Club of Canada" was presented to Romeo Lapointe, employee at the S. W. Hooper Co. of Sherbrooke, by Maurice Campeau, field secretary for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Sherbrooke District, on the occasion of the annual meeting of the Provincial Industrial Association for the Prevention of Accidents.

Mr. Lapointe won membership in the Club and a Wise Owl certificate because he ward-

ed off tragedy in an on the job accident. Charles Shepard, safety director, S. W. Hooper Co. Ltd., announced that Mr. Lapointe saved his eyes from injury or blindness through conscientious use of safety eye wear.

Mr. Lapointe, an assembler, was helping a welder to cut a piece of metal. The torch became too hot, causing the melted steel to strike his face.

"Had he not been using eye protection," said the safety director, "he would have lost the sight of his eyes."

The Wise Owl Club of Canada is sponsored by the prevention department of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. CNIB took over the administration of the former Wise Owl Club of America from the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, New York.

The Society inaugurated the Wise Owl movement in 1947. Membership in the Wise Owl Club of Canada is made up exclusively of industrial employees and technical students who, like Mr. Lapointe, have saved one or both eyes by wearing protective lenses. What this has meant in terms of production, purchasing power and family welfare is incalculable.

Today the Wise Owl Club of Canada has 2,800 members in 816 firms across Canada.

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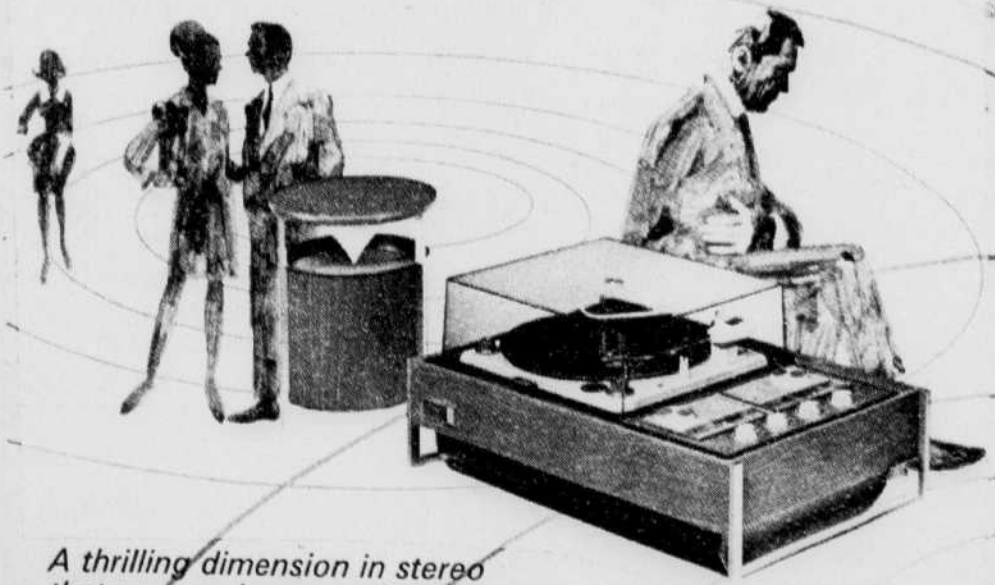

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Minister seeks seat Liberals hopeful in NDG, even Bagot as byelections near

Campaigning for next Wednesday's provincial bye-elections in Notre Dame de Grace, Montreal, and Bagot holds the centre of the political stage for the coming weekend, with special interest being shown in the outcome in Bagot, the riding represented by the late Daniel Johnson for 22 years.

Although the Union Nationale government forces are making a strong effort in Notre Dame de Grace it is doubtful if they seriously expect to win this riding made vacant by the resignation of Liberal Eric Kierans to enter the federal field.

In 1966, Mr. Kierans was elected by an overwhelming majority, receiving nearly 20,000 votes to about 3,000 rolled up by his nearest opponent, an Independent Liberal. The Union Nationale entry was third in a five-man race with barely 2,000. The combined vote run up by two separatists was just over the thousand-mark.

Not even the entry of Premier Bertrand in the NDG campaign is expected to boost the Government stock enough to overcome the smashing Liberal lead of the last election.

On the other hand the Liberals are reasonably optimistic of their chances of capturing Bagot, on the edge of the Eastern Townships, where Education Minister Jean-Guy Cardinal is carrying the Union Nationale banner.

Then Opposition Leader, Daniel Johnson was returned in 1966 by a majority of 2,074 over the Liberal candidate with

two separatists polling a total vote of 303.

Fielding what they believe to be a stronger candidate, Henri Boisvert, Mayor of Acton Vale, the largest town in the riding, the Liberals say that rural dissatisfaction with the taxation and education policies of the Union Nationale may produce a changeover.

In a last-minute effort to bolster the Liberal hopes, Opposition Leader Jean Lesage has scheduled a meeting for Sunday afternoon in Acton Vale at which he will be the principal speaker.

In addition to the major party candidates, there are two other entries — representing Youth Power and the Socialist party of Canada. Neither expresses any hope of victory in an essentially rural riding, admitting they are in the fight to provide advertising for their causes.

PELLETIER IN SHERBROOKE — Gerard Pelletier, secretary of state in the federal government, will visit Sherbrooke Monday, December 9.

The highlight of his visit will be an address before the Riche-lieu Club followed by a reception and public meeting at the Reform Club in the evening.

Lennoxville's ex-chief Smith to testify today

Ex-chief of the Lennoxville Police department, Grant Smith, takes the witness stand today as the third day of the Quebec Police Commission's inquiry into Mr. Smith's firing as chief of police continues.

During the first two days of the inquiry, over 30 witnesses had testified.

Yesterday, ex-constable Yvon Paquin testified he enjoyed working for ex-chief Smith and said he was well treated by him.

Last week, Mr. Paquin resigned from the force because he charged that the present chief, Russell Wells, insulted him.

The commission, comprised of the president, Judge Roger Gosselin and Commissioners Gerard Tobin and R. Courtemanche, will decide whether or not the Town of Lennoxville was justified when it fired ex-chief Smith.

Yesterday, director-general of the Domtar plants in both Windsor and East Angus, Raymond Pinard, said the four men were "the best qualified men" to conduct the inspection.

Two of the foremen testified yesterday that they had been spat at and intimidated and threatened when they inspected the buildings August 31.

Roch Aubin and Frank Reed corroborated Mr. Girard's statements made on Wednesday.

The chief of police in East Angus, Andre Phaneuf, testified that strikers followed his car, when he drove the four foremen home August 31.

Stan Mair, 33, an East Angus Domtar superintendent, said he too was involved in the strikers' fury that day.

Mr. Mair said he drove by the guardhouse August 31 and saw the large group of strikers waiting for the foremen to come out.

He said he parked down the street to watch the proceedings. Before that however, as he drove by the guardhouse, a large rock was thrown in front of his car.

He did not see who had thrown the rock but said it came from the group's direc-

tion.

As he watched from his parked car, another car raced up, with two strikers in it, and was parked facing his car, a foot from his car's bumper.

He backed his car up and the other car followed.

He tried to pull his car out and leave and it scraped the other car.

He kept on going.

Later, he was visiting the East Angus Domtar manager's house when Mr. Mair noticed the strikers around Mr. Girard's house.

When the strikers noticed Mr. Mair standing down the street watching, they came after him, yelling at him to get in the house and calling him hit and run driver. They demonstrated at this house for five minutes before dispersing.

Windsor hospital remains shut today over Pelchat issue

WINDSOR — (Staff) — Despite a meeting yesterday between representatives of striking nurses and general service workers and representatives of the St. Louis Hospital Corporation, the Health Department and the Quebec Hospitals Association, the nurses and workers at the St. Louis Hospital here still refuse to return to work.

Last week, they went on strike to add strength to their demand of the hospital officials to relieve Miss Odette Pelchat, the hospital's director of nursing, of her duties.

At the meeting yesterday, the nurses and workers' representatives said they resented Miss Pelchat's attitude at the hospital.

No solutions were reached at yesterday's meeting which was described as a meeting to gather information on the causes of the strike.

The request to relieve Miss Pelchat of her duties is not new and the situation was once settled by Judge J. L. Pelquin who suggested that the problem might be solved by trying to establish as little contact as possible between Miss Pelchat and her staff.

However, the resentment flared up again last week and the strike began. Officials of the hospital have had several meetings in Wind-

sor and in Quebec to try to solve the problem.

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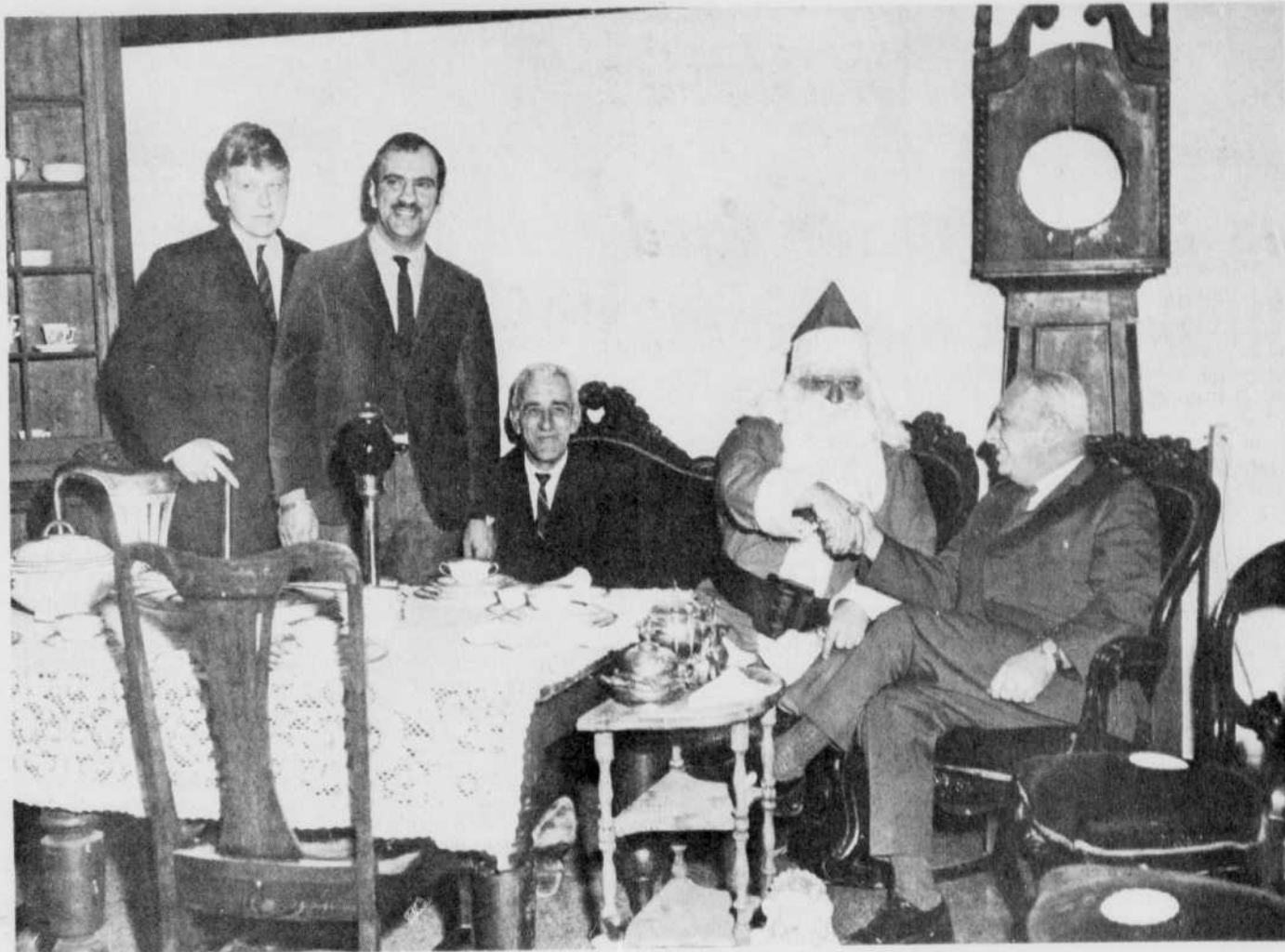

Time bombing outrages proof of diseased mind

One of the difficulties facing the police in their investigation of the series of bombing outrages in the Montreal region in recent weeks is determining just what type of individual would engage in such acts of violence directed against the public.

A few of the incidents might have been glossed over as an excess of enthusiasm by disputants in a labor war. Others might have been explained away as warnings from fanatically minded separatist groups to some of their opponents.

But the placing of a time bomb in a department store or a crowded railway station concourse comes under neither of these categories.

They are nothing else than the acts of amoral madmen, regardless of what position their perpetrators hold in the community; acts of terrorism aimed at innocent bystanders who can have little direct or indirect interest in either the labor or linguistic disputes.

And, unfortunately, the very simplicity of the bombs increases the menace.

All that is required — an old alarm clock and a few sticks of dynamite and blasting caps stolen from a construction shanty — can be easily obtained and little skill is required in its assembly.

It is to be hoped the close co-operation promised by federal, provincial and municipal police forces will bring an early end to the menace.

Anyone who doesn't believe in witches hasn't seen our neighbor's wife.

Fanning race hatreds

One of the problems of the democratic system is that by its very nature it must permit the establishment of any form of politico-religious movement, even when the new group is dedicated to the overthrow of the democratic system itself.

This freedom to organize has given rise to some rather queer political set-ups in all parts of Canada, the Province of Quebec being no exception, as the events of the past few days prove.

Latest entry into the political pot-pourri of this province is Le Mouvement Celtique whose bid for power is based on a mixture of proper diet, racist supremacy, anti-Semitism and religious intolerance generally.

Its anti-democratic principles are obvious from a statement by its Supreme Chief, Dr. Jacques Bauge-Prevost, a naturopath, who claims he strongly disapproves of elections because "90 per cent of the people are too ignorant to vote anyway."

Furthermore, the Supreme Chief declares that if he fails to achieve his ends by peaceful methods he is prepared to resort to violence to gain control of the province.

The Nazi-type parties are nothing new in this province although none of them have made any substantial progress in the past and probably Le Mouvement Celtique will find little more support than its predecessors.

But its appearance at the present time is particularly unfortunate as it will only serve to further complicate a delicate situation.

MILK PRICE INCREASE
Maybe the most lively topic in these parts is the price of milk on the Montreal market. Consumer groups are up-arms over the proposed increase of two cents a quart and are urging their members to use skim milk powder. Just where they think skim powder comes

from is not quite clear. While it is true that some of the surplus milk shipped to the Montreal market from the inspected fluid milk-shed might end up as butter and skim milk powder, yet we have a suspicion that most of it comes from milk produced outside the inspected fluid milk areas where the farms and cows are not subject to the rigid inspection of the Montreal Board of Health. Fortunately, our Quebec Minister of Agriculture is firmly supporting the milk price increase so that the inspected milk shippers to the fluid milk market are likely to receive the proposed increase of 50 cents per hundred pounds.

WHAT ABOUT OTHER INCREASES?

Just why the consumer groups complain so bitterly about the increase in milk prices when, so far as I am aware, they ignore the increased postage rates, the increase in cigarette prices, the prices of automobiles and other things I could mention.

I suspect that few, if any,

of the complaining consumers were brought up on dairy farms and, therefore, do not realize that cows have to be fed, cleaned and milked twice daily, seven days a week and, at this time of year, before daylight in the morning and after dark in the evening. Then, too, they have to be officially tested for T.B. and Brucellosis by Government-appointed Veterinarians, all at the expense of the owner.

Another upsetting event is the demand by certain railroad employees asking for a substantial increase in pay. So far, the consumer groups have not voiced any opposition. As a matter of fact, it's a dull day in the Montreal area when there is not a new threat of a strike, a bank robbery, a gangland slaying or some other act of violence.

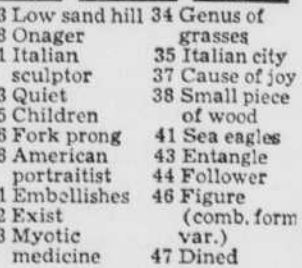
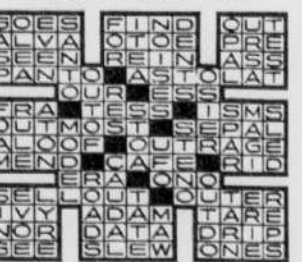

OTTAWA — (TNS) — Once more back to Munich.

After 30 years, during which countless books have been published on the subject, I thought the meticulously documented story of the ultimate disaster of appeasement policy which made World War II inevitable was so well known that retelling it would be a waste of time, space and effort.

So, dealing briefly with the historical background of the current ominous events in central Europe, I skipped over the Munich betrayal of Czechoslovakia by the Western democracies in one sentence.

Last week a letter to the editor, signed by C. B. Pyper, echoed the old Nazi propaganda calumny of prewar Czechoslovakia and portrayed the Munich pact as "a hope of peace."

Said Mr. Pyper: "To justify his talk of 'betrayal,' Mr. Zink would have to show that the Czechs were blameless, that the Germans and Slovaks had no cause for complaint, that Czechoslovakia could have been saved from destruction and that Europe should have been plunged into war to keep 3,500,000 Germans under the domination of 6,500,000 Czechs."

To avoid suspicion of bias on account of my Czech origin, I'll answer Mr. Pyper with quotations from the writing of Sir Winston Churchill and British historian John W. Wheeler-Bennett.

But first a word about the use of the word "betrayal" in connection with the Munich pact.

Czechoslovakia had a treaty of mutual assistance with France which stipulated that "in the event of Czechoslovakia or France being attacked without provocation, France, or reciprocally Czechoslovakia . . . will immediately lend aid and assistance." When the chips were down in 1938, France not only reneged on her treaty obligation but together with Britain forced Czechoslovakia to submit to the Munich diktat.

What else can anyone call it but betrayal of an ally?

A memorandum submitted by the British National Council of Labor to then Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain called it "a shameful betrayal of peaceful democratic people." In his book Munich — Prologue to Tragedy, Wheeler-Bennett says of the Munich pact: "It was the climax of the betrayal of Czechoslovakia" (page 166) and: "threatened, traduced, betrayed, they (the leaders of Czechoslovakia) were now compelled to submit utterly" (page 175). G. E. R. Gedy wrote a book

called Betrayal in Central Europe.

Dealing with the prewar calumnies of Czechoslovakia, Wheeler-Bennett says: " . . . among responsible people in London, there began to be repeated what had so long been an insistent refrain of Nazi propaganda, namely, that Czechoslovakia was a ramshackle state . . . a mere collection of mutually antagonistic races held together by force. This offered an obvious solution to those who, on these grounds, contemplated the placation of Germany . . ." (page 63).

In his broadcast to the people of the United States on October 16, 1938, Winston Churchill said: "Here was the model democratic state of central Europe, a country where minorities were treated better than anywhere else. It has been deserted, destroyed and devoured." (Churchill: Blood, Sweat and Tears, page 84).

No one has ever suggested that Czechoslovakia had no problems after its formation in 1918. As Wheeler-Bennett puts it: "Recently released from Austrian tutelage, the Czechs were lacking in experience necessary in shouldering those burdens of senior partnership in a state of many nationalities, burdens which Britain herself, with her long tradition of administration, still finds onerous and full of difficulty." But "the leaders (in Prague) were not unaware of the imperfections which existed in the structure and had done their best to correct them" (page 31).

Doing the best was, however, of little avail once Hitler decided to use the Sudeten Germans for the destruction of Czechoslovakia whose fortifications and 40 superbly equipped divisions stood in the path of Nazi conquest. He also used the separatist elements among the three million Slovaks who, speaking practically the same language as the Czechs, joined the republic voluntarily in 1918.

Can Mr. Pyper imagine what problem Quebec separatism would present if, instead of the U.S., Canada had as its mighty neighbor an aggressive, totalitarian France headed by some French equivalent of Adolf Hitler?

On March 14, the day Hitler ordered the setting up of an "independent Slovak state," Winston Churchill remarked: "We have seen exactly the same methods used as were used in September (in the Sudetenland). Disturbances have been fomented in Slovakia . . . at the instigation of the German Nazi Party."

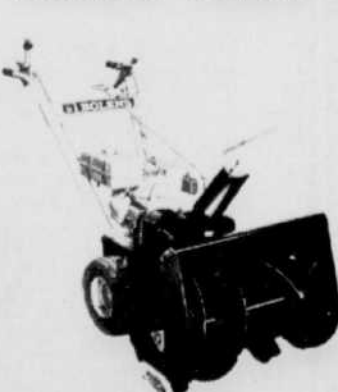

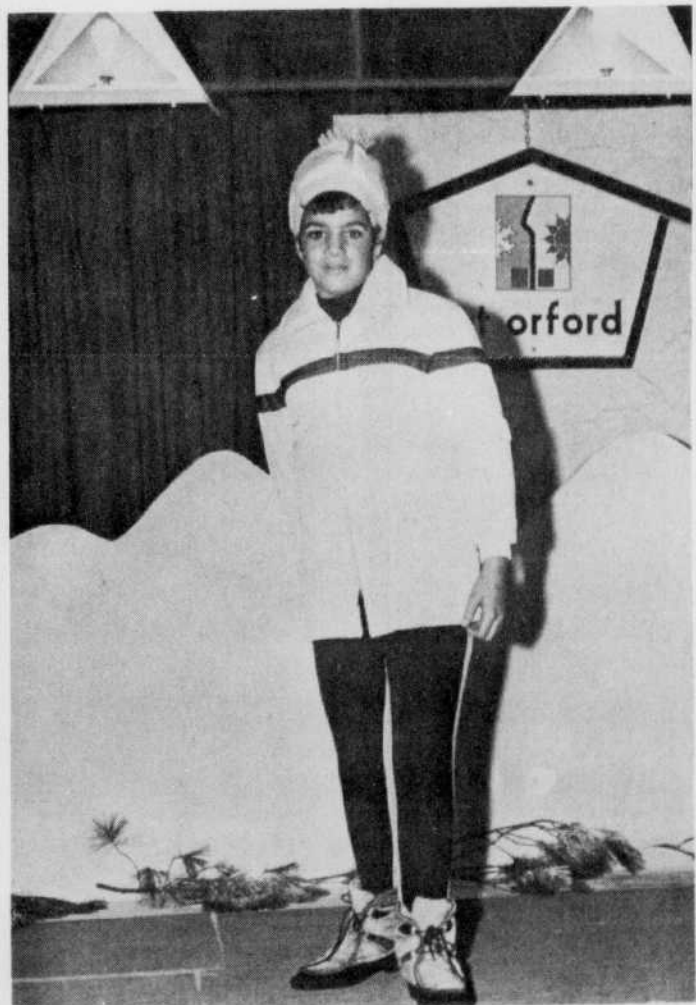

Montrealer is hooked on teaching in NWT

CORAL HARBOUR, N.W.T. (CP)—The Friday night movies are old, it's 10 miles by snowmobile to the Saturday night dance, and Jennifer Mills' Eskimo pupils often come visiting at 10:30 p.m.

But the 23-year-old Montrealer is hooked, in a quiet way, on teaching in the Northwest Territories.

"At the end of last year I was ready to go for a vacation," she said. "But I didn't want to leave."

"It's the friendliness of people here—they're all very close."

The pastel-painted classroom and its familiar primers might belong to any Grade 1 in a southern city. But Coral Harbour's school year starts in August and ends in May so the boys can join their fathers in the sleds for seal hunting before the ice breaks up in June. The community of about 300 is at the north edge of Hudson Bay.

Jennifer came north in 1967 after two years at McGill's Macdonald College and three years of teaching at Lachine, Que.

"I felt like a change and a bit of a challenge," she said.

School starts at 8:30 with cocoa, biscuits and chewable vitamin tablets for everyone.

LEARN WITH PICTURES
The 24 children are in two grades: seven-year-olds doing the usual Grade 1 lessons and six-year-old "beginners" who spend their first year learning English.

"It's mostly done through pictures because you've got no other way of getting through to them," Miss Mills said.

"Once the children understand the words you're using, they're all right."

Earlier, in the classroom, the pupils put on paper crowns with their names printed on them.

"What is your name?" the teacher would ask.

Hands flailed the air.

"My name is Tonocheyuk."

"My name is Dorothy."

"My name is Moses."

Jennifer said Eskimo children are "far better behaved, really" than their southern counterparts.

"They're very good-natured children—very friendly. When

I started (last year) with kindergarten in Baker Lake, they were just like my own children, hugging me, wanting to come up and hold my hand."

SOCIAL LIFE LIMITED

Classroom assistant Veronica Bruce teaches science lessons in Eskimo. There are two other teachers: Sylvia Gaudry, 23, of Moose Jaw, Sask., who has Grades 2 and 3, and principal Fred Carnew for Grades 4-7.

Social life in Coral Harbour means church on Sunday at either the Roman Catholic or Anglican mission, games in the recreation hall and Friday night movies that are not new—"more like what you'd see on television."

On Saturday nights Eskimos and whites pile into a truck or snowmobile for a dance at the department of transport installation 10 miles away.

Toronto University course gives new hope to the handicapped

TORONTO (CP)—Stuttering and difficulty with articulation are two handicaps which can block a man from promotion in his job or cause a child undue anxiety in his schooling.

The diploma course in speech pathology and audiology offered by the faculty of medicine, Uni-

versity of Toronto, gives new hope to the handicapped by offering therapy sessions.

Jean Ward, assistant professor of the course, said stutterers have to face the fact that they stutter and realize "they have to do double work mentally and physically to control the handi-

cap."

Interest in rehabilitation for speech defects has increased since treatment for speech following larynx surgery has become a regular part of prescribed care, Miss Ward said. "But things are a bit more tricky when we deal with a person with a defect."

She said an adult faced with a recording of his voice for the first time "puts us on tricky ground because he will likely be upset and angry and embarrassed."

"It's necessary to talk the problem out—help him to accept therapy that must be given quickly and intensively so there is little disruption in his way of life."

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The group is trying to rid home and school associations of their tea-party image where parents beef at teachers and do nothing but organize bake sales and raffles to raise money.

Lionel Orlukow, a researcher at the Ontario Institute for Studies in education, says the home and school's program is finding a new role for itself. To help this, he has launched a general study of community involvement in the schools and is looking closely at the association.

He says a person becomes interested in home and school usually to help in the education of his own child.

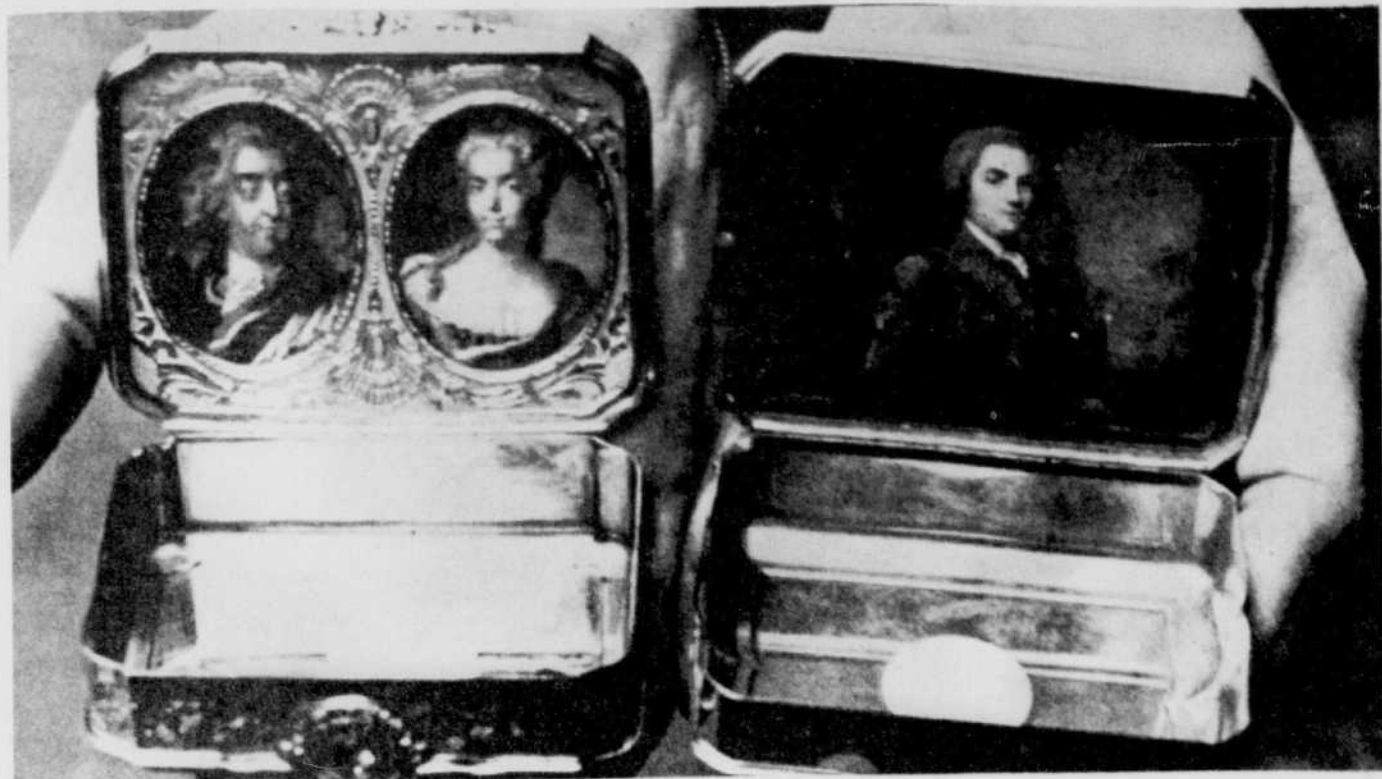

QUEBEC SCENE

Seafarer gets another three years

MONTREAL (CP) — A spokesman for the Seafarers' International Union of Canada says Leonard (Red) McLaughlin of Montreal is assured of another three-year term as SIU president in Canada with the majority of returns now counted.

The spokesman said only 400 votes from the West Coast region—remained to be counted Wednesday night, and Mr. McLaughlin held a 600-vote margin over his opponent, Rod Heinekey of Vancouver.

Mr. Heinekey, national executive vice-president of the union under Mr. McLaughlin from January, 1965, to October, 1966, when he resigned and returned to his former union post in Vancouver, heads a three-man opposition slate of candidates seeking to unseat the present SIU administration.

But the spokesman said Wednesday night Roman Grawlewicz and John Royce, incumbent executive vice-president and secretary-treasurer respectively, are in no danger of losing their posts to Norman David of Vancouver and Angus Cameron of Halifax, both on the Heinekey slate.

FOUR UNAPPOSED
He said four other men have been acclaimed to their respective posts of the 10-member national executive board of the SIU, which includes six regional vice-presidents, a director of contract enforcement, the executive vice-president, the secretary-treasurer and the president.

Those acclaimed were: Roy Willis, formerly of Port Arthur, Ont., and now living in Vancouver, as West Coast vice-president; Ray Doucet, as Quebec City vice-president; Fred Outhern of Halifax, as Atlantic region vice-president; and Bill Glasgow of Thorold, Ont., as director of contract enforcement.

Voting in the SIU elections took place over a six-week period from Oct. 1 to Nov. 15.

The SIU in Canada has about

8,000 members, but only 4,500 sailors were eligible to cast ballots under provisions of the union's constitution.

The spokesman said about 3,200 ballots were cast across Canada, but sufficient returns had been counted since Nov. 20 to allow him to say that none of the incumbent members of the national executive board will lose.

A full and official count would be available early Friday.

There were 234 names on each ballot for a total of 19 different posts within the seafarers' union.

Mr. McLaughlin has been president of the SIU in Canada since 1962.

Little progress

MONTREAL (CP) — An open meeting of striking political science students and faculty representatives at McGill University Wednesday produced little progress, a student spokesman said.

Meanwhile, students belonging to the Committee for a Free University at nearby Sir George Williams University were organizing a sympathy march on McGill.

The Sir George students were planning to march on the Stephen Leacock building at McGill, the fourth floor of which has been occupied since Monday when political science students voted 319-179 in favor of a strike.

Great success

MONTREAL (CP) — Flushed with the success of his satirical musical revue called Squeeze, longest running show in Canadian history, comedian Dave

Broadfoot of Vancouver already is thinking of a sequel—and it may be Squeeze Again.

Broadfoot says Squeeze, played five days a week in the cabaret-style basement of a popular Montreal restaurant (Martin's), is in its 37th week. As such, it is a record run for a show from a single Canadian stage.

The record is being marked tonight with a special performance that will feature a huge cake, to be distributed piece by piece to those in the audience.

"Other shows may have run for a longer over-all period but they were touring," Broadfoot said in an interview Wednesday. "Before Squeeze, the longest run from one spot was by the show Charlie Brown at Toronto's Playhouse Theatre. It ran 34 weeks."

Squeeze pokes fun at things Canadian. Music and skits are written by Canadians.

CAST SMALL
With Broadfoot also producer and director, only three actors appear on stage—Broadfoot, Peggy Mahon of Halifax and Ted Zeigler, a Chicago native who has lived in Montreal for eight years.

Why its success? "It was good fortune getting Peggy and Ted," says Broadfoot, an "intense Canadian nationalist" whose mimicry and comedy are known coast to coast and who refuses to move into United States show business.

Makes bomb

QUEBEC (CP) — A 14-year-old student used ingredients purchased from a drug store for a bomb that damaged a Bell Canada building in suburban Sillery last Monday, Police Chief Leo Gagnon of Sillery revealed Wednesday.

Chief Gagnon said in a statement the youth would not be charged in connection with the explosion that only lightly damaged the building. No one was injured.

He said the youth had studied books to make the bomb, using \$15 worth of ingredients purchased about a month ago from a drug store.

Police found ingredients in the boy's room that had been used to make the bomb. They included gun powder, sulphuric acid, nitric acid, sulphur, potassium chlorate and glycerine. Also found were 11 pieces of pipe.

Lower rates

MONTREAL (CP) — Lower rates on telephone calls from Canada to Hawaii, Israel and Italy were announced Wednesday by the Telephone Association of Canada.

Effective Dec. 1, the new rates were negotiated between the system and the foreign telephone organizations involved.

The cheapest call to Israel or Italy, Sunday station-to-station call, will cost \$6.75 for the first three minutes. A similar call to Hawaii will cost \$5.70 from British Columbia, Alberta and the Yukon, \$6.50 from elsewhere in Canada.

Expansion

MONTREAL (CP) — Melchers Distilleries Ltd. Wednesday announced a \$6,000,000 expansion of its plant at Berthierville, Que., and said that studies are under way for eventual expansion to the west coast.

Sarto Marchand, president and managing director, told the 40th annual meeting of share-

holders that 75 per cent of the expansion program would be completed within the next eight months.

Involved is the enlargement of the plant with the addition of a new bottling and administration building as well as two 20,000-barrel warehouses.

He said the company's expansion would be national in scope.

The executive committee "now is studying the establishment on the west coast of Canada of a new plant which is absolutely necessary if we want to draw nearer to this most prosperous and promising market."

Topped highs

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal stock market averages topped 1968 highs for the second consecutive day this week as advances outnumbered declines 92 to 58 at the close of active trading Wednesday.

Across-the-board gains sent the composite index up .75 to 181.77. The previous high was 181.02.

Welcomes halt

MONTREAL (CP) — Hoang Minh Giam, minister of culture of North Vietnam, said Wednesday his country welcomes the cessation of United States bombing raids against North Vietnam but still feels threatened by American "aggression."

Mr. Giam was speaking at a news conference preceding the opening Friday of the Hemisphere Conference to End the Vietnam War. He heads a North Vietnamese group of four delegates and a translator who arrived here Tuesday night.

Dismantle bomb

MONTREAL (CP) — Police were called in Wednesday night to dismantle a bomb planted near one of five Montreal police cars parked at an automobile sales and service company outdoor parking lot in the north-west section of the city.

Sgt. Robert Cote, head of the police technical laboratory, said the bomb—made up of four sticks of dynamite, a detonator and a clock—was discovered by employees of the automobile company.

A spokesman at the automobile company lot said the police cars, all 1968 models, were at the lot to be serviced.

Sgt. Cote said the bomb, set to go off at midnight Wednesday, was neutralized at the scene and then transported to a nearby park where it was dismantled.

Face hearing

TROIS-RIVIERES, Que. (CP) — Marcel St. Germain, 25, of Drummondville, Que., is to face preliminary hearing here Dec. 4 on a non-capital murder charge arising from the fatal shooting of Michel Prince.

Prince, 19, was shot last Friday as he pursued a bandit who had robbed the family grocery store at nearby St. Leonard d'Aston.

At arraignment Wednesday, Judge Leo Girard ordered St. Germain held without bail for preliminary hearing.

As a boy, Don wanted to be a doctor and he's still interested in medicine. He is currently reading everything he can on the subject of prolonging life, and says it won't be long before man lives to an average age of 120.

That may be long enough for him to take all the offers now coming his way. One that excites him is the possibility of doing a film with Alan Arkin, from a Nat Hiken idea.

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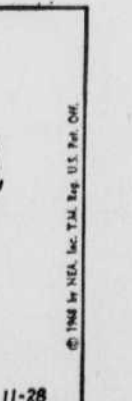

Plane-shy Gumper and Sam Pollock to meet today

MONTREAL (CP) — Sam Pollock, Montreal Canadiens general manager, hopes to meet with his plane-shy goaltending veteran Lorne Gump Worsley today to discuss the reasons why Worsley left the club in Chicago Tuesday night after a bump flight from Montreal.

The Canadiens were en route to Los Angeles for a Wednesday night engagement with the Kings when Worsley, 39, made his decision to return home by train.

Worsley, who has won almost every goaltending award available since his first two pro games during the 1949-50 season with New Haven of the American Hockey League, has watched his aversion to flying increase over the last two seasons. The National Hockey League's expansion program requires extensive air flights to the distant league cities.

Previous to expansion, Canadiens made most of their trips by train.

Pollock said Wednesday he had only spoken to Worsley for "a minute" from Chicago's airport and could not ascertain whether the fear of flying was

Worsley's only worry.

TOP NETMINDERS

Last season Worsley and his partner Rogation Vachon combined to win the Vezina Trophy as top netminders in the league.

When the night from Montreal arrived in Chicago, Worsley advised coach Claude Ruel that he was returning home as he could not face the additional four-hour flight to Los Angeles.

Ruel and team captain Jean Beliveau both talked to Worsley, but were unable to change his decision.

"I tried all the arguments there are to talk him out of going home by train," Beliveau said. "It was no use. We know what he has gone through on some of our flights and while some of us have been anxious, Gump has been in agony."

Pollock said Worsley is not suspended and there is no question of a suspension. Meanwhile, Canadiens called on Tony Esposito from Houston Apollos to back up Vachon Wednesday night against Los Angeles.

Calgary begins long-awaited sojourn to Grey Cup, Toronto the good ready

CALGARY (CP) — Calgary Stampede were talking about fast backs when they left Wednesday for Toronto and Saturday's Grey Cup game.

They were discussing the merits of Bo Scott, Vic Washington and Ron Stewart in the Ottawa Rough Rider backfield.

Calgary head coach Jerry Williams and his players feel speed is Ottawa's most important asset, with quarterback Russ Jackson a close second.

"They have a lot of speed in all their running back, and excellent receivers," Williams said, referring to flanker Whit Tucker and end Margene Adkins.

"Their receivers are faster than ours, and then there's the threat of Jackson on the roll-out option."

Don Luzzi, a defensive tackle who has been with the Stampede for 13 years, said "Jackson's fantastic faking can fool the heck out of a defence."

"He may fake to Stewart, then toss out to Scott, or fake to Scott then pass."

EXCEPTIONAL BLOCKER Luzzi said Stewart is an exceptional blocker. "Maybe it's his size. He's hard to spot because he's small. You lose sight of him and then suddenly there he is coming in low."

Wayne Harris, Stampede's great linebacker, said Jackson "hides a ball better than any quarterback I've seen. It's hard to find."

Frank Andruski, a defensive halfback, said Riders will give him a tough time because of such players as Tucker, Scott and Washington.

On defence, Williams anticipates Ottawa coming at the Stampede with a three-man line similar to what Edmonton Eskimos employed unsuccessfully against Calgary in the WFC semi-final. Calgary won that one 29-13.

Quarterback Peter Liske expects Riders to constantly vary their defensive combinations.

"They won't just try to go with one thing," he said. "They're a good team to play. They'll be in a zone defence and they'll be blitzing."

It will not be a simple matter of dropping back and passing, said Liske, who has thrown 71 touchdown passes in the last two Western Football Conference seasons.

"We have to come off with other things... a run, screens, draws... if you don't the defence just winds up and comes."

Liske said Calgary does not rely on one man, "although one may stand out in a game because he happens to be in the pattern we use against a certain type of defence."

He spreads his passes around. This season Herm Harrison caught 67, Terry Evanshen 63, Bob McCarthy 58, Gerry Shaw 48 and Dave Cranmer 34.

Luzzi said Stampede will also be adjusting their defence constantly.

"A few years ago you could set in a four or five-man line for three-quarters of a ball game. But now if you stay in one defence more than a couple of series they'll pick you apart."

Calgary has a special play designed to block punts. It worked against Saskatchewan Roughriders last Wednesday, with Dick Suderman blocking in the end zone and Andruski falling on the ball for a touchdown to start Stampede on the way to a 25-12 victory and the WFC title.

"We simply overload one side of our defence," Suderman said. The objective, Luzzi said, is to pick off certain opposing personnel and clear a path for the blocker.

A number of Stampede are on the limp after the tough Saskatchewan series but only Cranmer, the club's leading rusher in 1968, is a doubtful starter with a cracked bone in his right leg.

Cranmer will be replaced by Rudy Lintnerman, a 20-year-old rookie whose primary task has been to return punts.

Hull continues to lead NHL top ten scorers

Bobby Hull of Chicago Black Hawks scored one goal and added two assists Wednesday night to maintain his lead in National Hockey League scoring.

The three points, gained in Chicago's 4-2 win against New York Rangers, gave Hull 36 for the season—seven more than runner-up Gordie Howe of Detroit Red Wings.

Howe scored two goals and picked up an assist in Detroit's 5-2 victory against Philadelphia Flyers to bring his point total to 29.

In third place with 28 points is Jean Beliveau of Montreal Canadiens who scored a goal Wednesday in Montreal's 4-2 triumph against Los Angeles Kings.

Augusta, Ga. (AP) — Race has never barred any qualified golfer from being invited to play in the Masters Golf Tournament, officials of the golf classic say.

In an unprecedented statement Wednesday, officials of the famed Augusta tournament replied to charges by Charlie Sifford that he has never been invited to the April event because he is a Negro.

"Every U.S.A. golfer, regardless of his racial background, has an opportunity to qualify for a Masters Tournament invitation," the committee declared.

However, no Negro has ever played in the Masters.

The committee said: "We doubt that anyone seriously expects us to change these qualification regulations in order to accommodate one particular person."

In its reply to Sifford's complaints, the committee said there are complaints each year

from golfers not invited to the Masters "and we understand their feelings and normally make no response."

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
