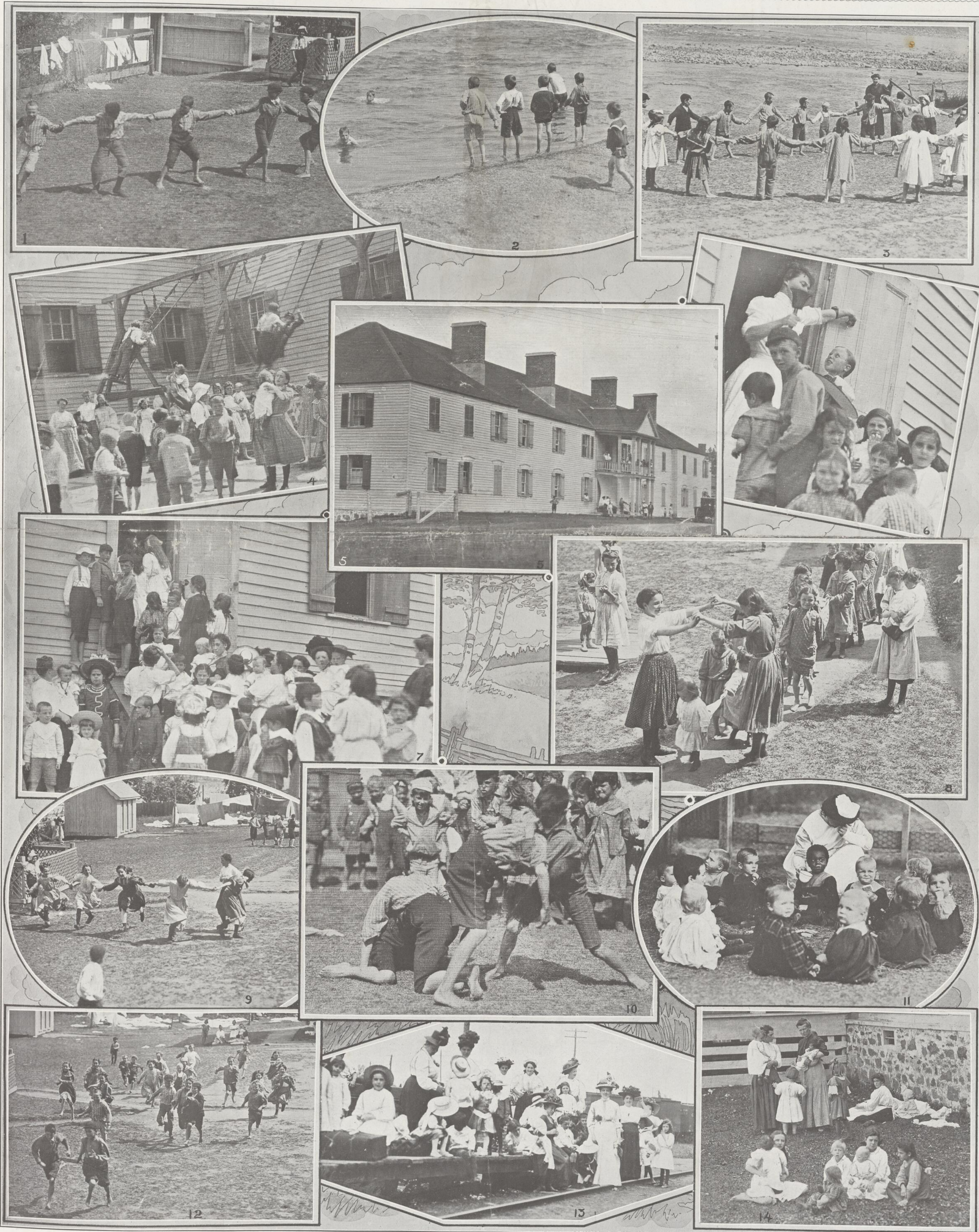

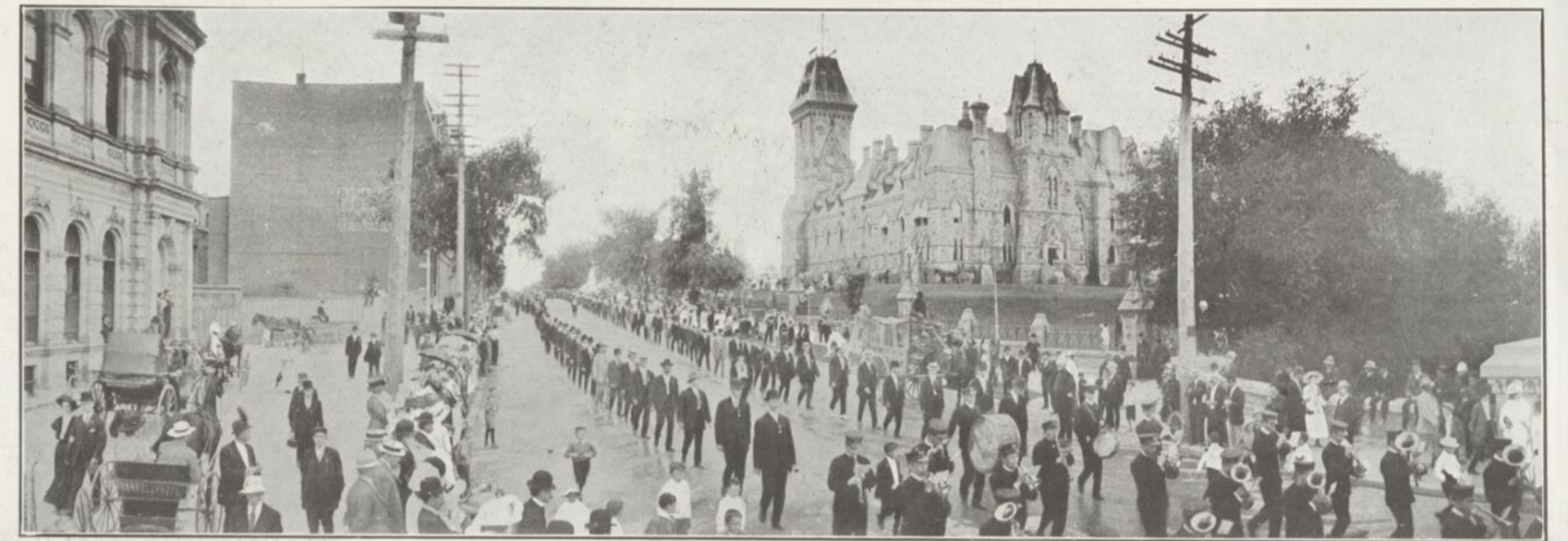

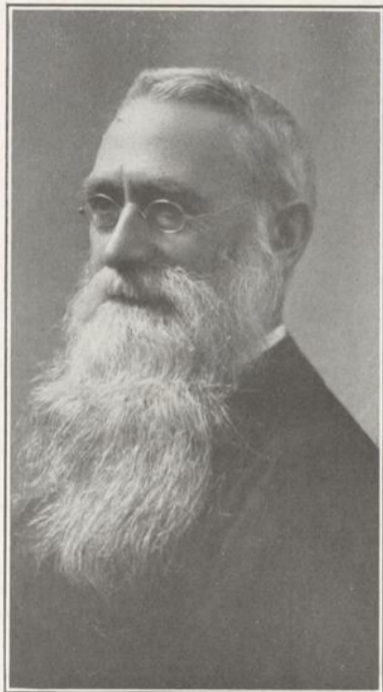

A Leper Missionary from Canada.

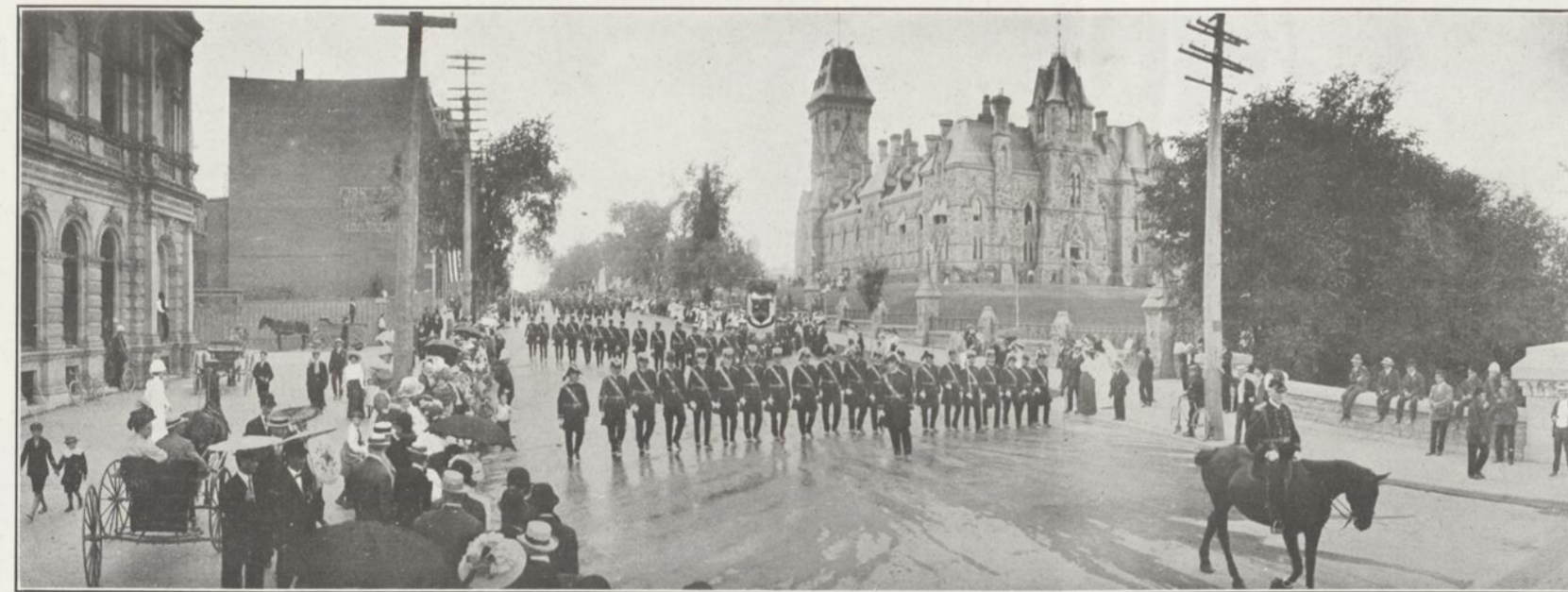
THE many friends in Montreal and elsewhere of the Rev. Father Conrardy will be interested in hearing of his work among the afflicted lepers of China, to whom he has devoted the remainder of his life. The reverend gentleman has never ceased in his labors on behalf of those suffering from this disease, having spent many years with the lepers of Molokai, Hawaii, where he assisted the Rev. Father Damien up to the time of his death, being with him during his last moments, and continuing the charge for seven years afterwards, until their welfare was well assured. He then took up work amongst the Chinese, where he was first some thirteen years ago, as he found they were the most neglected of all the lepers of the

world, and that there was no Government help available for them. To obtain funds he undertook a tour through many cities of Europe and America, lecturing and preaching to the charitable and sympathetic of all races and creeds, never wearying and never sparing himself, though frequently he had much to contend with in the way of coldness, jealousy and misunderstanding. Through all he persevered, and finally feeling he had obtained sufficient funds for the time being at least, he, about two years ago, went to his old field of labor in Canton, China.

some manner it be made known the disposition he has made of the funds they assisted him to collect. At the time of writing the reverend gentleman was convalescing in an hospital from an attack of acute bronchitis, resulting from a drenching got about two months previously in walking from the leper village. He was not well able to resist the attack, having last January dislocated his left shoulder in a fall he had in the dark while going a long distance upon his mission duties. This accident, however, did not stop him in his work, which he persevered in until

cases I had before my eyes. Three or four lepers in each little room. These have a door, but no window and no air, and where I had to stay near these miserable human beings, some of them lying on the bare ground, and no one to attend upon them. The most of people have a blue fear of leprosy. I was often called "Ma Fung" (i.e. leper). So would cry the children seeing me coming, and would run away from me. I was told by some I would do well to remain altogether with the lepers, no matter if I was to die in a few weeks. I find it strange that incessant fear of

would allow me 2 1/2c. per day for the lepers in my charge. I have spent over one-third of the money I collected for the purchase of the land, the buildings and the improvements, so I will have only \$1,000 a year income on the money I have left at 5 per cent. The United States—San Francisco—have only 22 lepers—mostly Chinese—to which the States gives \$6,000 a year. In Massachusetts—New Bedford—5 lepers; cost, \$9,000 a year. Louisiana, 50 lepers; cost, \$24,000 a year. In Molokai, \$75,000 for less than 800 lepers, and here I could keep each 1,000 for \$6,000 a year.

From the several cities he visited on his collecting tour he forwarded to the Bishop of Canton the moneys given him, which amounted to about \$30,000—the net result of two years' hard work. This sum he counted upon having invested at 5 per cent., and from the proceeds hoped to be able to do something towards helping in a small but permanent way the poorer lepers.

he got drenched with rain, which finally subdued him. On his arrival in China he was well received by the Viceroy and high officials. He went to a leper village which he had visited thirteen years before, and found there over 600 lepers. He began work at once, under unfavorable circumstances. First a leper-house was given him, but no furniture, and he had to do the best he could in dressing the wounds of the afflicted. The reverend gentleman in his letter says:—"My work every day increases. I had some cases of bubonic plague and also of cholera. Oh! what sad, sad

leprosy, which accounts for the cold attention to the afflicted. I am not well, but I hope God will give me a few more years to work for the lepers. I just had three lepers who came to see me. Oh! I wish I was well to do them good. I bought an island 60 miles from Canton up the river, and caused houses to be put up. Twenty lepers were already there, and forty upon the shore. I could have now, God knows, over 1,000 lepers to care for. If only I can live five years more, I have well begun. It would be easy now to go ahead. I have to see the Viceroy to see if he

having no salaries to pay, no physicians' fees, nor superintendence, but I do not know if I will be able to control hundreds of lepers. Among them there are bad characters; but if they do not obey I will send them away. I have 12 Chinese soldiers for protection against the pirates and bad lepers. If I was only 40 years old—then I feared

no one and nothing. I have trained two lepers—a boy and a girl—as helpers. The three of us often work ten hours a day." It would appear that the work to be done amongst the lepers of China is enormous, and the workers and means are totally inadequate for even a small part of it. The task voluntarily undertaken by Father Conrardy is one that

cannot fail to excite the admiration of all humanitarians. On leaving Montreal Father Conrardy arranged with Mr. C. S. J. Phillips, No. 115 Notre Dame street West, Montreal, and Mr. P. M. Wickham, No. 55 St. Francis Xavier street, Montreal (P.O. Box No. 2421), to receive contributions for his work. These gentlemen will forward any donations to him at Canton, China.

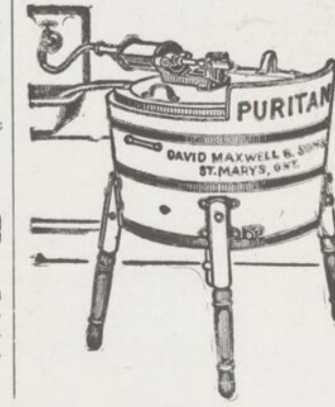

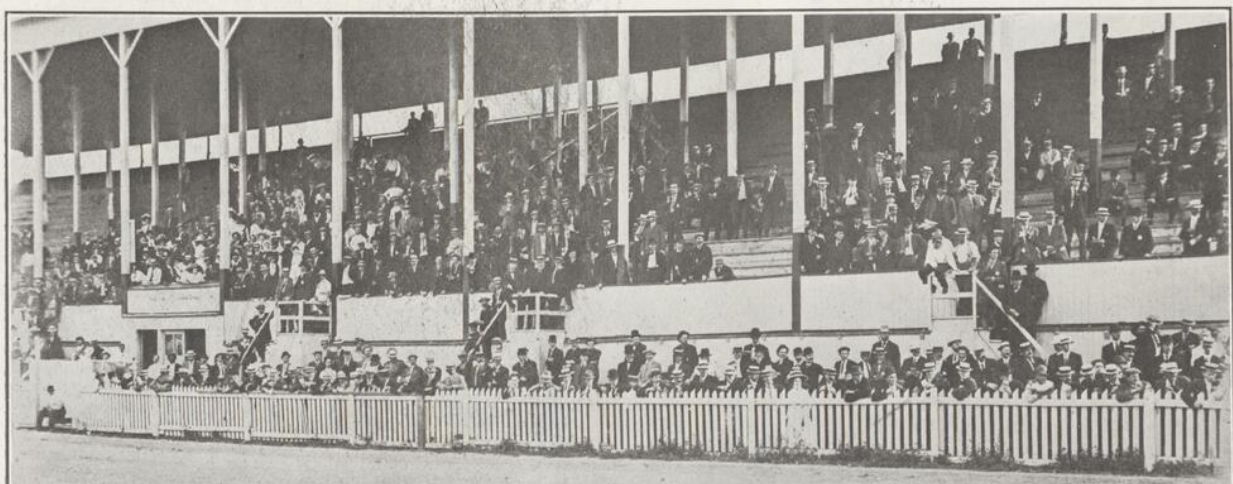

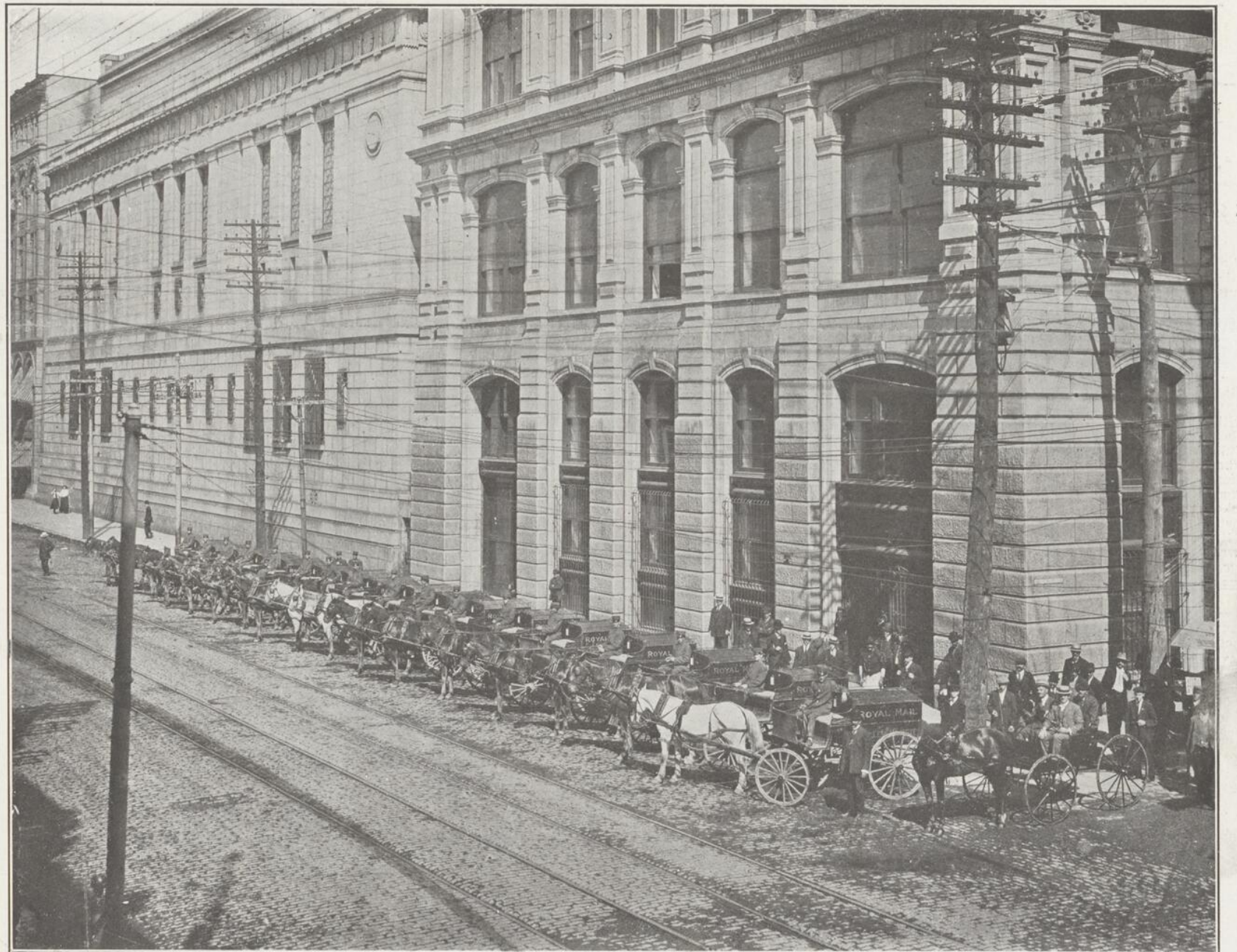

deur of environments of the Yellow-head Pass are being brought into light. One of the special and most interesting features is Mount Robson, towering 13,700 feet above sea level, and which can be seen from the train as it will proceed through the Yellowhead Pass. Although this mountain has long been known, its height had never been determined until recently, nor was it supposed to be particularly notable in that respect; but now, since the height of so many mountains in the Canadian Rockies has been proved to be great-

ly exaggerated, Mount Robson has the distinction of being the highest known peak in the Canadian Rockies, and the highest mountain in Canada.

Mr. G. Horne Russell, the well-known artist of Montreal, has executed a painting of this mountain looking from the valley of the Grand Fork, which portrays its wonderful grandeur and gives an idea of the scenic wonders that are in store for the traveller over the all-Canadian route. This noted picture will be on display in the Grand Trunk exhibit in the Railway Build-

In no way, perhaps, is the growth of the city, financially and numerically, during the past twelve years more clearly shown than by a comparison of the street letter box service of that day and this. In 1897 the Montreal Postal Service was confined to the city proper, and throughout the whole city there were but twenty sub-post-offices. To-day the Montreal service includes also the municipalities of Cote des Neiges, Cote des Neiges West, Westmount, Delorimier, Outremont, Mile End, Maisonneuve, Verdun, St. Paul and Boulevard St. Paul. There are fifty-one sub-post-offices, besides three postal stations, "E", "C" and "D". Twelve years ago, one hundred and eighty-four letter-boxes and eighteen parcel receptacles sufficed for the street service of the city, whereas we now have three hundred and eighty-one letter boxes and a hundred and forty-six parcel receptacles. In those days six postal carts gathered all the mail from the street boxes to the central post-office. Now it requires seventeen rigs-

They all live with her in Paris, where she has what she calls her school. **AUSTRALIA'S POPULATION.**

The population of the Commonwealth of Australia on December 31 last was 4,275,000, of which 2,352,000 were males and 2,023,000 females. The distribution was as follows: New South Wales, 1,591,000; Victoria, 1,271,000; Queensland, 552,000; South Australia, 407,000; Western Australia, 267,000; Tasmania, 186,000. The birth rate for the year was 28.25, and the death rate 10.97 per 1,000.

**NEW ORGANIST AT TRINITY CHURCH.**

To-morrow Mr. Brewer will preside at the organ in Trinity Church for the first time. He received his musical education from Mr. P. J. Hilsley, of this city, and attended the McGill Conservatorium of Music during the sessions of 1905 and 1906, studying piano, organ and theory of music. It is expected that the work of the choir this year will compare favorably with that of any church in the city.
