Engineers Make Scale Map Of City

Started in 1929 by city engineers, a scale map of Westmount showing every building, streets, parks, tramlines, etc., has now been completed. The maps are at a scale of 50 feet to the inch and are bound together in volumes. They show every foot of the 59.5 miles of sidewalks and 31 miles of streets here and are referred to daily in planning snow removal, the route of garbage collectors, etc. Houses on the maps bear their street number and are thus easily located.

ENTHUSIASTIC AUDIENCE SEES SCOUT DISPLAY

West End Troops Give Good Account of Themselves at Forum

"The future of the Dominion of Canada is safe, if left in the hands of the Boy Scouts," Sir Gerald Campbell, K.C., M.G., High Commissioner in Canada for the United Kingdom, told the 2,000 scouts and a large audience at the Annual Scout Display held in the Forum Saturday evening. Sir Gerald congratulated the Scouts on their fine display, and exhorted them to "always play the game the British way." The guest of honour described Scouting as a blood transfusion infused into the veins of a care weary world.

The display was thoroughly enjoyed by the 6,000 and more spectators, although hardly up to the standard of some previous exhibitions. Although the individual items were excellent and showed a high standard of proficiency, the show suffered through lack of stage management, and the tempo had not been as carefully planned as other parts of the show.

Due to the huge proportions that the Scout Movement has now grown, it was impossible for the younger editions of the organization, the Wolf Cubs, to take part in Saturday's show.

Troops of the Westmount District followed the Cubs with a demonstration of the observance of traffic regulations, in an intersection marked out on the floor. Meanwhile repairs of bicycles, instruction of beginners took place in other parts of the arena. These were followed by a spectacular bicycle ride by thirty-two Scouts of the Second Westmount Troop.

Rover Sea Scouts of Montreal furnished the next item speedily constructed their three masted "land ship" completely rigged, and were visited and properly "piped aboard" by the guest of honour. Looking more like Sea Cadets than Boy Scouts in their long trousers, the Rovers show was well received.

Business Association To Hold Open Meeting May 18

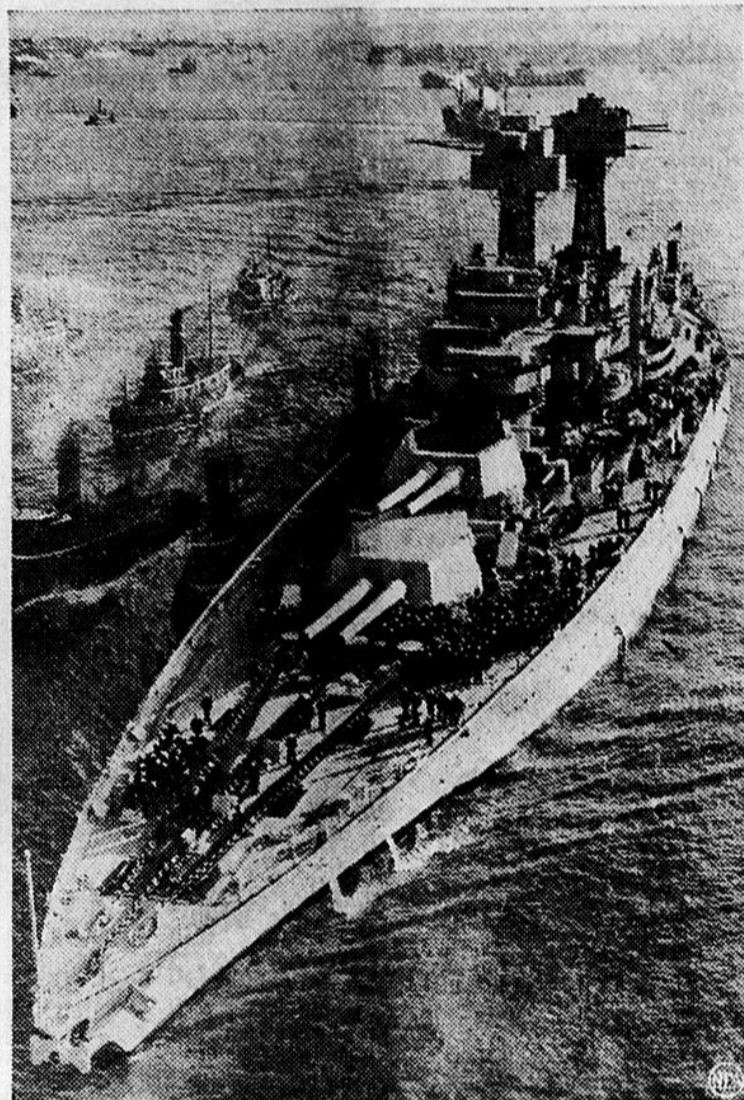
The executive committee of the Business Association of Westmount is currently arranging plans for the open meeting scheduled to be held in the main lower auditorium in Victoria Hall on May 18.

PRICE PAID FOR LIBERTY CITED BY DR. JONES

Calvary Church Pastor Addressed Meeting of St. Paul Women's Club

Using lace 75 years old and lavender picked long ago in an Oxfordshire garden to illustrate his theme, the precious heritage of religious and civil liberties which are enjoyed here today after many centuries of struggle, the Rev. T. W. Jones, D.D., spoke to the annual luncheon meeting of the St. Paul Women's Club, Friday at the Queen's Hotel.

In this lavender and old lace, the speaker said, exhibiting a pillow lace fashioned by his grandmother and the bobbins with which it was made, as well as the old lavender, were reminders of the precious memories and the wonderful elements in the heritage we enjoy. They remained as samples of the times when great price was paid in the struggle for the liberties which are still with us today, so that individuals and groups might meet and talk freely.

Dr. Jones mentioned having been in Pittsburgh lately, when he heard people from Europe describe the awful conditions present there today. In Soviet Russia, for illustration, he said, the last free Protestant Church was recently closed, and but a handful of Orthodox churches remain open. It is now forbidden for a traveller to carry a bible across the Soviet frontier today, he added, and he wondered if people of Canada, where all churches remained open, appreciated the freedom they enjoyed.

Referring to the forthcoming visit of the Royal Family in Canada, Dr. Jones urged "we should pray that nothing may intervene to prevent their Majesties' coming. When their Majesties come, leaving the little Princesses behind, let us have them in our hearts."

Dr. Jones concluded by urging instruction to boys and girls and those coming from other lands so that they might grow to know and love Canada as we do, and things of beauty and sentiment be preserved and extended.

REVEALS TOTAL SALES OF ELECTRICITY HIGHER; MANY TRAFFIC ARRESTS MADE

Police Department Issued 3,759 Tickets to Traffic Violators — Communicable Diseases Greatly Reduced — 97 Building Permits Were Issued — Population is Now 24,736

The annual Westmount municipal report, showing that electricity sales had increased, a new record for the number of traffic arrests established, that there was a drop in the number of communicable diseases from 1,259, to 146, was released this week by P. E. Jarman, City Manager.

The Police Department, under Chief W. Gough, issued 3,759 tickets to violators of traffic laws, an increase of 1,106 over 1937. Almost two thousand persons were given warnings for failing to obey traffic regulations.

Arrests made during the year totalled 4,613, an increase of 1,106 over the preceding year. Of these 4,340 were brought before the Recorder's Court. Over fifty per cent of the persons arrested on criminal counts were under 21 years of age, the report shows.

A total of 97 building permits were issued during the year, 15 less than in 1937. The permits represented a total turnover of \$515,077, as against \$549,718 for the previous year.

More than 264,000 cubic yards of snow were removed from city streets and 4,696 tons of roughing material were spread on sidewalks and roadways.

The population of the city is now 24,736 and there are 6,184 one-family dwellings, the report reveals.

Of the 4,613 arrests made convictions numbered 4,315, dismissals 46, withdrawn 15, sent to Montreal Court 18, and pending at the end of the year 52. The remaining 221 received cautions.

During the twelve-month period fire losses totalled \$48,373, an increase over 1937 of \$27,132. Fire calls responded to totalled 209, of which 22 were false alarms.

Less Disease Reported During the year the health department dealt with 154 cases of accident and 4 cases of illness in connection with city employees, these cases requiring 420 treatments. The number of cases of communicable diseases was greatly reduced. The total number this year was only 146 in comparison with 1,259 in 1936.

In the report of the parks department, which maintained the extensive work at the parks and in the municipal greenhouses, there was a lengthy report of the supervised recreation of the city, which includes the work at the Westmount Athletic Grounds and at the various parks.

Nine small slides were maintained in the parks for skiing and tobogganing among the younger children. Seven softball diamonds were maintained in the city parks. Free tickets for the 18 tennis courts maintained in the city were issued to 4,125. Attendance at the various tennis courts totalled nearly 100,000.

Various supervised athletic and recreational activities included the Westmount track and field club, children's weekly sports days, cricket, soccer, rugby, lacrosse, stamp club, model yacht club, swimming, angling, putting, play.

NOTED JEWISH WORKER DIED HERE MONDAY

Mrs. M. Tannenbaum Passes in 81st Year After Illness of Two Weeks

For more than 52 years, a resident of Montreal, Mrs. Morris Tannenbaum, 80, a native of Poland, was buried yesterday from the home of her daughter, Mrs. A. Cohen, of 4324 Sherbrooke street, where she had passed away Monday evening, after an illness of two weeks.

Interment was made yesterday in the Shaar Hashomayim cemetery, The Rabbi Abramowitz officiated.

Mrs. Tannenbaum, the former Augusta Israel, came to New York with her parents at the age of 14. She married there, in 1878, Morris Tannenbaum, a native of Lithuania, and three years later they moved to Montreal. Mr. Tannenbaum was for many years in the ladies' tailoring trade here. He died in 1937.

Mrs. Tannenbaum had been a member of the Shaar Hashomayim congregation for more than half a century, and had belonged to the women's auxiliary of that congregation. She was also active in the work of the Jewish General Hospital.

Mrs. Tannenbaum is survived by two sons, Dr. David Tannenbaum, of Montreal, and Isidore Tannenbaum, of New York; three daughters, Mrs. A. Cohen, of Westmount, Mrs. J. F. Krokyn and Mrs. D. Sain, of Brookline, Mass.; two sisters, Mrs. Henry Osborne of Portland, Ore., and Mrs. L. J. Danziger, of New Rochelle, N.Y.; and by eight grandchildren. Two children, Laurence Tannenbaum, N.P., and Mrs. Theodore F. Ross predeceased her.

IMPORTANT ROADS CLOSED

As this is written, past the middle of April, Montreal motorists wishing to visit Ottawa, are compelled to go the long way round via Morrisburg, because the route via Rigaud is impassable with ice. This is a serious reflection upon the way the roads are maintained here. A full month ago, a friend of ours took a motor jaunt down to the lower end of Lake George, returning through New Hampshire and Vermont, and found the roads all cleared down to the pavement, and in excellent condition from the time he crossed the border. An important highway such as that from Montreal to the Canadian capital should be kept open at all times.

DUTCH SETTLERS

The vanguard of a proposed quota of 250 Dutch families which plan to settle in Canada has reached Prince George British Columbia. They are to settle some 200 miles northwest of that port, land having been picked for them in the Smithers district. These are the kind of settlers Canada wants and needs. The Dutch who have emigrated to this continent down through the years have provided some of our very best citizens. Thrifty, industrious and honest, they have been self-supporting and have made a valuable contribution to those districts in which they have made their homes, and to Canada and the United States in general. Furthermore, while they keep a natural love for their homeland, they have always been loyal citizens of their adopted country. They get along well with older Canadians and are rapidly accepted into the life of the new land. There need never be any fear about the value of the Dutch as immigrants. They have abundantly proven themselves.

ORDER OF LEAVING MOTOR CAR

With court etiquette worrying so many persons who want to do the right thing in the proper manner when Their Majesties come to town, we have been observing how the King and Queen go about matters. A recent series of news pictures showed the British Royal Family arriving for a ceremony. They came in a closed motor car. Princess Elizabeth, the next in line for the throne, got out first, was spoken to by the official greeters and walked on. Princess Margaret Rose, the younger daughter of Their Majesties, got out second. King George stepped out of the car next and walked on. Queen Elizabeth got out last. Perhaps that is not always the order of precedence, but that's the way they did it that time.

RESURRECTING MUSSOLINI OF 1915

The enemies of the Nazis have a new stunt in Germany. They are going back to the writings of Mussolini of 1915 and spreading copies of his theses among German officers. Nazi police have discovered junior officers in the German army have been reading avidly what Mussolini had to say against Germany. Here is one extract that has been going the rounds in Berlin. It is copied from a 1915 issue of *Popolo d'Italia* and says: "In the name of the innumerable victims of the war, unleashed by the exuberance of German bestiality, we must destroy Essen that city of cannons. Only at a later date will those German murderers and brigands have the right to join the human community. "It is the duty of Italy to strike a mortal blow at Germany and liberate Europe from the nightmare of Prussian militarism." The Nazi leaders don't like their army officers reading that tirade against the Reich. They are afraid it will undermine the German faith in Italian sincerity.

Is it just a coincidence that jitterbug dancing should be all the rage at a time when everyone, even those who don't dance, has the jitters?

The expression, "Hands across the sea," used to be recognized as a slogan of international amity. The dictators have altered it to "Hand across!" and "Seize!"

The Chipping Sparrow

Did you ever have the unusual experience of recognizing your own hair in the lining of a bird's nest? That is what happened to a member of our family. The Chipping Sparrows had found it, and by twisting it round and round spiral fashion, had made a lovely hair mattress — softer than the customary one of horse hair. The nest little nest of rootlets was in a young spruce tree beside the steps, and there four fine children were reared.

This sounds as though we could watch everything that went on; yet it was not as simple as all that. True enough, we could see into the home quite comfortably by standing on the steps, but first we must lift up a branch that not only grew directly over it, but pressed down like a lid on a pot. Every morning one of us peeped in to see how matters were progressing. The tiny bluish green eggs, speckled around the large end with blackish brown, were laid on four successive days, so they hatched in that order about ten days later. At first, the babies, not much bigger than large peas, were featherless, with skin very nearly orange coloured. The little bills opened wide whenever a parent arrived with a diminutive caterpillar. Later downy brown feathers appeared, and whenever the cover was lifted black, beady eyes looked up. The twelfth morning after the first egg had hatched, we found the nest empty. 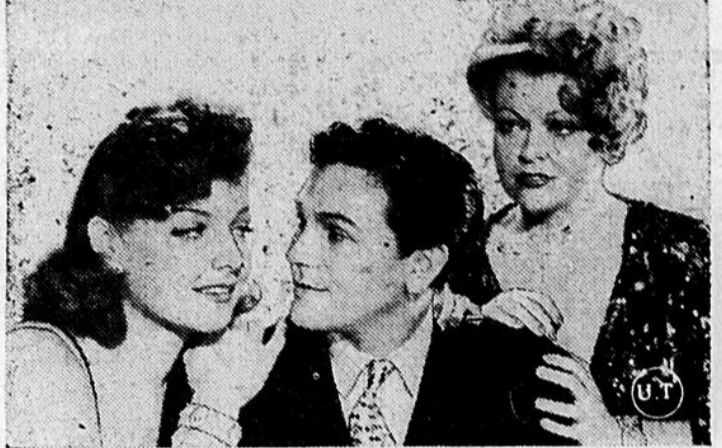

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DOUGLAS DROPS EASTERN CAGE FINAL TO WINDSORS

FERRARO STARS AS MONTREAL IS NOSED OUT IN TWO GAMES; LOSE SERIES ROUND BY 86-68

Ontario City Alumni to Meet Victoria for Canada Championship — Lanthier, Ferraro Again Pace Montreal Quintet, But Windsor Pass Attack Gives Them Edge in Series — Jeffrey, Thomas Also Score for Montreal — First Game Score Was 44-42, Second 42-26

Dominion Douglas was nosed out of the Canadian men's senior basketball final with Victoria, B.C., Dominions when they went down to defeat before the Windsor Alumni 41-26, in the second game of the Eastern Canada finals at Windsor Saturday night.

Windsor took the two-game series with a total score of 85-68, having won the first tilt Friday night 44-42, and thus maintained the record set up by Windsor teams of never having been defeated in an Eastern Canada final game on their home court.

Douglas ran into a surprise Saturday when a revived Windsor outfit showed a marked edge over the whole play. Windsor's crisp passing plays clicked from the start and after the first few minutes were never headed.

Montreal's playing coach, Johnny Ferraro, again paced the Douglas attack, and his strong forcing play in the first few minutes of the game, gave the visiting team a slight advantage, which, however, they were unable to hold for long. Despite the loss of their captain and star guard, Red Wiseman, after three minutes of play, they led 21-13 at the half-way period and drove their way consistently to the final victory.

Ferraro and Edgar Lanthier, who had starred in the Friday night clash, paced the Montreal

quintet with nine points each. Douglas' weak shooting of foul shots, which lost them the game Friday evening, when they connected with but four of 19 throws, was much improved in the second tussle, 10 out of 17 free tosses being rung up for points.

Montreal's high, lobbing pass, which Friday had bothered the Windsor team, proved not as effective Saturday, and the Douglas defence could not cope as effectively with the Windsor Alumni's short, speedy passing attack.

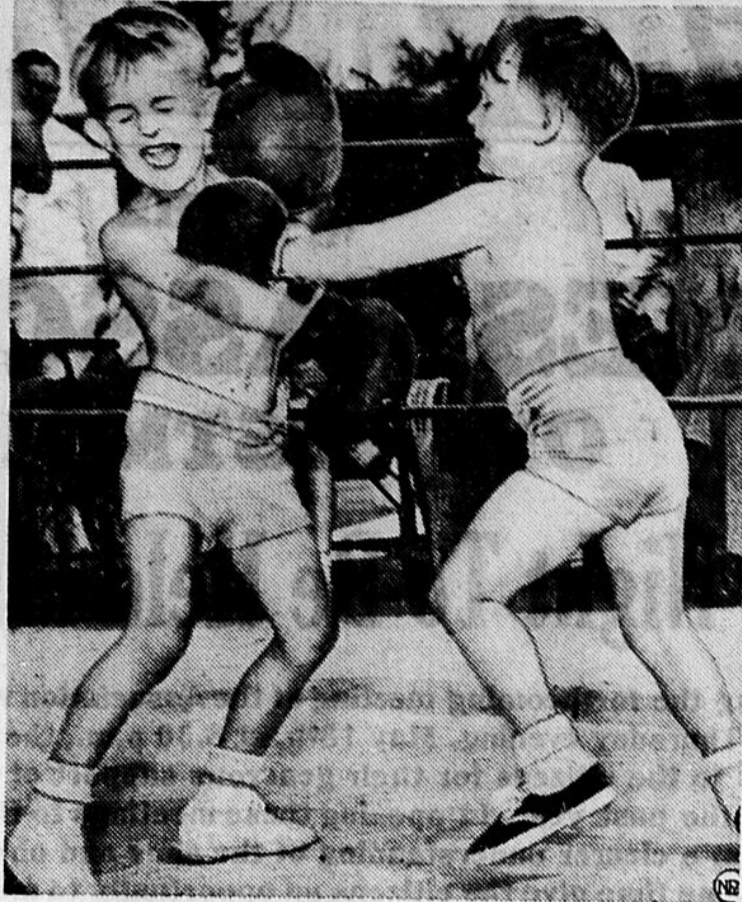

CLAIMS HITLER APES MARXISTS

Rabbi Stern Says German Moves of Concern to Canada in Temple Emanu-El Address

Dictator Adolph Hitler's persecution of the Jews in Germany as being responsible for Germany's shortcomings derives from the Marxist method of achieving unity and power from choosing a single enemy and persistently pounding him brutally Rabbi Harry Stern said in an address at the Temple Emanu-El Sunday evening.

By placing the onus on the Jews for the fact that they as well as Czechs and Slavs had some say in the government of Austria under Emperor Franz Joseph and thus prevented Germans from benefiting from the unity of Bismark's empire Hitler had gone further and ascribed to them alone the blame for Germany's defeat in the war and had thus brought into focus a single element on which to vent the Germans' hate, the speaker said.

The German Chancellor, in his autobiography "Mein Kampf" claimed to be following the English system of propaganda. Rabbi Stern continued, and had realized that the best way to apply it was to concentrate on the masses at night when they were tired from their day's work and susceptible particularly to bloodthirsty and passionate appeals. The German people thus made an easy instrument for Hitler's anti-Jewish propaganda.

"The German leader's plan," summarized Rabbi Stern, "consists of five parts: first, purity of the German race; second, a thirst for land in order to expand the 'chosen people' (the Aryan race), this necessitating a move to the east; third, the extermination of France as it constituted the main barrier to this expansion; fourth, war to attain this end; and, lastly, world domination, with Germany enslaving the rest of the civilized powers."

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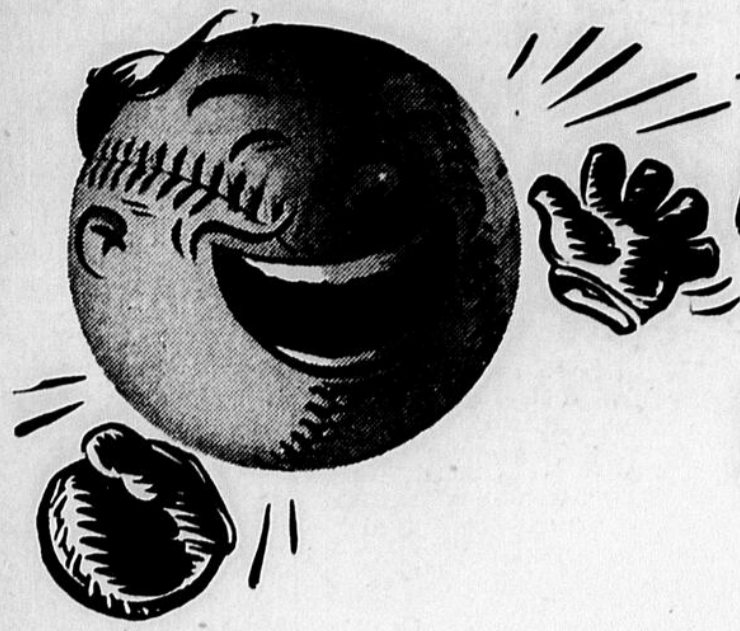
