PUBLIC NOTICE.

THE suspension of specie payments by the Banking Institutions of New York has induced the Directors of the undermentioned Banks in this City to take into consideration the effect which that measure will produce on the currency of the country. After the most mature deliberation, they can come to no other conclusion, than that it will operate as a drain of specie from the Canada to the United States; and as the only means in their power to prevent such a ruinous effect, and to avert the disastrous consequences to the Commercial and Agricultural interests of the country which must inevitably ensue, and involve alike the Merchant, the Mechanic, and the Labourer.—They find themselves compelled to adopt a similar course, in which they are borne out by the unanimous opinion of the Mercantile Body, expressed in Resolutions adopted at a public meeting held this day. The Directors do therefore now give notice that payments in specie will be discontinued from this time. The Notes of the undermentioned Banks will be received as usual in payment of Debts due to said Banks, and in Deposit, and as the present course is, imperatively forced upon the Directors, not with a view to require gain for their respective institutions, but from an anxious desire to avoid a public calamity, they entertain a confident hope that the Notes of these Banks will pass current as usual, until such a change shall take place as may render the resumption of payments in specie practicable. 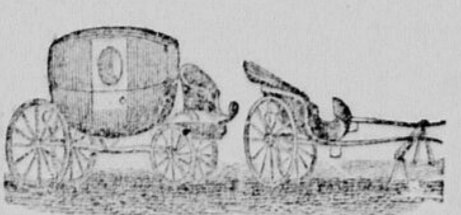

MISCELLANEOUS EXTRACTS.

METEORIC SHOWER OF NOVEMBER, 1837.—The fact of an occurrence of an extraordinary exhibition of meteors, or shooting stars, on the morning of the 13th November, every year for six years past, afforded a sufficient reason, independently of every theoretical consideration, for watching the heavens attentively, on the night of the recent anniversary. The result has justified our anticipations.

No shooting stars were observed until five minutes past one o'clock, when they began to appear at considerable intervals, emanating as usual from the head of Leo, which constellation was then ascending the eastern sky. The meteors gradually increased in number and brightness until day-light. Nearly all, as they darted forth, left visible traces of their paths. Some of these were brilliant, and all must have had a high degree of brightness to have overcome so strong a moon-light. Indeed, in such a state of the sky, it is rare on common evenings to see shooting stars at all. These traces were in most cases to be regarded, not as trains, arising from the deposit of luminous matter, but as mere lines of light, owing to the velocity of the meteors, which was so great that a continued impression was left on the eye, like that of a stick ignited at the end and whirled in the air. Trains remaining after the extinction of the meteors, (which made a conspicuous figure of the meteoric shower of 1833,) are rarely luminous enough to be visible in full moon-light.—Only two were observed on the present occasion.

The whole number counted during the night was 266. Of these, all but ten or twelve either radiated from a point in the head of Leo, or moved in lines which, if continued, would have passed through that point. Yale College, Nov. 14.

We rejoice to find in the list the name of that illustrious officer Captain Ayscough.—Naval and Military Gazette.)

SURVIVORS OF THE EXPEDITION OF LA PEYROUSE. The Journal de la Marine et des Colonies states, that an American Captain, named Morell, has written to inform the Société de Géographie, that in the course of his voyages in the South Seas, he has found two of the children of the surgeon attached to the above expedition; and the minister of marine has desired to be furnished with every particular collected concerning them, together with the precise latitude and longitude of the Island in which they were found.

FRENCH POSSESSIONS IN AFRICA.—We have been favored with a Malaga paper of the 14th ult. which contains the following intelligence:—"By a vessel arrived to-day from Bona we learn that the French had taken possession of Constantine, notwithstanding the immense means of resistance prepared by the Bey Achmet.—(Courier.)

A FATHER'S ADVICE.—Some small accounts of yours have come in. This is wrong—you ought never to leave a country without clearing every penny of debt, and you have no apology for doing so, as you are never refused what I can afford.—When you can get a troop I shall expect you to maintain yourself without further recourse on me, except in case of extraordinary accident, so that, without pinching yourself, you must learn to keep all your expenses within your income; it is a lesson which, if not learned in youth, lays up much bitter regret for age.—(Sir Walter Scott to his son Walter.)

LUMBER.—Besides the large amount of lumber manufactured by the saw-mills in the city, or brought by teams from neighbouring saw-mills, above four millions of feet have reached Rochester by rafts down the Genesee River, or in vessels from the Canadian shore of Ontario, since the opening of navigation. The improvements of the season have resulted in more boards than is generally imagined.—(Rochester Daily Ad.)

Governor Ritner has issued his proclamation offering a reward of 200 dollars, and the Sheriff of Luzerne County, another 200 dollars, for the arrest of Cornelius Fagan, charged with having been concerned in the murder of a man by the name of McCombs, who was a laborer on the Lehigh Slack Water Navigation, in Luzerne County, and was to have been tried for murder at the Court of Oyer and Terminer, this month, who, on the night of the twenty-ninth of October last, broke the jail of the said County, at the borough of Wilkesbarre.

Mr. Lovejoy, who was killed in the riot at Alton, is a native of Maine, and a graduate of Waterville College in that State. His widow, according to the last accounts, remained senseless, with but little hopes of her surviving the shock. (Evening Post.) Bricklayers are getting 3 dollars 50 cents per day in Grand Gulf, Miss. The editor of the Advertiser says, he is authorized to say that fifty to one hundred bricklayers could obtain immediate and constant employment.

UPPER CANADA.

SYMPATHY FROM WITHOUT.

[From the Brockville Statesman.] Militia Training.—On Thursday the 16th inst., the Rear Division of the 2d Regiment of Grenville Militia under the command of Lieut. Colonel, Henry Burritt, were assembled according to order, near the residence of the Col. on the Bank of the Rideau Canal.

Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather 600 men attended, who went through the different Military Manoeuvres as well as could be expected, under the commands of their respective Captains. Captain Hurd was particularly active in drilling his men, his company is not so numerous as is that of Captain Bottom.

After the business of training was over, the men formed into squares, and Col. Burritt took occasion to ascertain their opinions on the present political state of excitement in the Sister Province, by putting the following interrogatories, after a gentlemanly preface to all present:

1st.—All those who are willing to march to the front, to meet a Foreign Foe, and repel invasion or to go to the Lower Province, if needed in order to crush the Rebellion anticipated there under the auspices of Monsieur Papineau and his adherents, were ordered to march forward: on the contrary, all those who were ready to assist Monsieur Papineau and his followers in the Lower Province in resisting the Laws and severing themselves from the Mother Country, (Great Britain), were ordered to stand firm in their ranks.

These words were scarcely delivered when the division with one accord marched forward, while loud shouts of defiance ran through the ranks, accompanied with a discharge of muskets.

Three times three cheers, were then given, for our interesting young Sovereign, and the British Constitution, and three for Col. Burritt, who is deservedly popular among the men, each cheer was accompanied with a discharge of muskets, after this the men were dismissed, each apparently gratified in the opportunity afforded him for a display of loyalty to his sovereign, and love for his country.

The writer who happened to be present on the occasion as well as some others, were much surprised at beholding amongst the men, some of those who have hitherto acted rather a conspicuous part in the opposite ranks, manifesting such loyalty and zeal to Great Britain and its Institutions, with a firm determination to put down Papineau, Rebellion and Sedition. The truth is, those loyal persons were misled by designing demagogues, and whatever difference may have arisen in some minor political questions, the Upper Canadians may be said to be against separation to a man; it was no vain boast when His Excellency exclaimed "In the name of every Regiment of Militia in Upper Canada let them come if they dare."

From the Bathurst Courier.—We understand that the Perth Artillery Company, under the command of Captain H. Graham, have, "to a man" volunteered to go to Lower Canada, if their services should be required, to assist in curbing the revolutionary proceedings of the Papineau faction there, which has recently become so alarming. The Captain, by a letter, conveyed the sentiments of himself and "patriotic" Company, to A. McMillan, Esq., Colonel of the 1st Battalion Lanark Militia, to which Regiment they belong, that through him, Sir John Colborne might be informed that they were at his service, and only awaited his command.

This Company is well drilled by their 1st Lieutenant, David Hogg, who is an old regular at "shrapnel shells and spherical case shot." The ordinance is three Pounders, with good horses and drivers, trained for Brigade exercise.

A meeting of a portion of the 3d Leeds Militia was held yesterday, at Pike Falls, the Colonel commanding (G. H. Reade, Esq.) being present, for the purpose of being drilled, and ascertaining what portion of them would volunteer to assist to crush the rebellion in Lower Canada. Colonel Reade, we are informed, addressed the corps in a very patriotic and loyal strain of language, on the occasion, after which 95 privates and 5 officers volunteered. Three hearty cheers were then given for the Queen, after which they were dismissed.

A muster of those in Elmsler, belonging to this corps, takes place to-day at Jibb's Creek for a similar purpose.

We regret not being able even to give the substance of Colonel Reade's speech on the above occasion, in this number, from a crush of matter. It shall have a place in our next.

LOWER CANADA.

Montreal, 29th Nov.—At a meeting of the citizens of Montreal, of American origin, the following Resolutions were submitted and passed unanimously:

Moved by C. D. Day, Esqr., seconded by J. A. Perkins, Esq.

1. Resolved.—That in the present disturbed state of this Province, it is a duty imperative upon all lovers of good order, zealously to maintain the authority of the laws and Her Majesty's Government, and to counteract by constant and earnest effort, the designs of the treasonable and seditious.

Moved by W. Lyman, Esq., seconded by Logan Fuller, Esq.

2. Resolved.—That the leaders of the revolutionary party have endeavoured to excite the sympathy, and secure the support of the inhabitants of the United States, to their desperate enterprise, by comparing the situation of this Province to that under which the older Colonies sought a separation from the British Empire, and have pretended to draw a parallel, which this meeting as well from a knowledge of the political circumstances of the two Countries, derived in the one case from the page of history, and in the other from personal observation, as from an experience of the mild and equitable character of the local Government, are enabled to declare totally unfounded and perversely false.

Moved by J. E. Mills, Esq. and seconded by Charles Gates, Esq.

3. Resolved.—That this meeting composed of British subjects of American birth and origin, impelled by the obligations of their allegiance, and a

desire to preserve the harmony happily subsisting with the neighbouring United States, feel themselves called upon to prevent to the utmost of their power—the practice of a gross and wicked imposition upon the citizens of that country to the prejudice of this; and they accordingly now express deliberately and solemnly, their conviction, founded on long observation and experience, that no just cause for disaffection exists in this Province—but on the contrary, its Government is calculated to secure the attachment and support of every honest man; and that the attempted revolution is to be ascribed solely to the false representations and treasonable designs of a few ambitious and unprincipled leaders.

4th. Resolved.—That with the opinions and feelings above expressed, we will promptly and fearlessly stand forward in defence of our adopted country in the hour of need—and we now declare ourselves in readiness by every means in our power, by our councils, our influence, and our physical strength, to aid in enforcing obedience to the laws, and in restoring peace and good order under Her Majesty's Government throughout the land.

5th. Resolved.—That copies of the foregoing Resolutions together with the requisition for the meeting, be transmitted to New York, Boston and Burlington, for publication in the respective newspapers of those cities.

Montreal, Nov. 30th.—At eleven o'clock this morning, the whole of the troops under Lieutenant Colonel Wetherall, including two companies of the 32d, and a party of the Montreal Cavalry, were landed in town by the steambark Victoria from Laprairie. They had about thirty prisoners, taken at St. Charles, along with them; and a poorer or more wretched set of rebels never took up arms against lawful authority. They also carried along with them the pole and cap of Liberty which had been raised at St. Charles; and, upon landing, were heartily and enthusiastically cheered by the people on the wharf, and as they proceeded along the streets with their prisoners.

Three companies of the 32d Regiment, including the two flank companies, one of the 53d, and detachments of Artillery and of the Volunteer Cavalry, all under the command of the Hon. Col. Gore, proceeded to-day, in the Varennes and John Bull steamers, to Sorel, supposed to be on their way to St. Denis.—(Gazette.)

TO THE EDITOR OF THE MONTREAL GAZETTE.

SIR,—The accounts which have reached us, within the last few days, show most clearly that there can be no longer a doubt, that the leaders of the revolution in Lower Canada, have so far succeeded as to have persuaded their deluded countrymen to take up arms, and openly and publicly attack Her Majesty's loyal subjects, and although we are convinced that these infuriated and misguided men, can never effect more than harassing and attacking the loyalists, as well as Her Majesty's troops, throughout the Province, when they find them unprepared to defend themselves, and that they will, in a short time, be made sensible of their error, and of the folly of their attempting to wrest these Provinces from the British Government, while the power of that Government is aided by the loyalists of both Provinces; still we feel that our fellow-subjects in Lower Canada, have not only a right to our sympathies, but a claim upon our services, in support of our common cause, the maintaining and upholding the British Constitution in these Provinces, and our connexion with the British Empire. In order, therefore, that we may be enabled more effectually, to render them that assistance, and to defend ourselves and our country against the rebels, we have applied to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of this Province, for arms and ammunition, and have stated our proximity to Lower Canada, as rendering it more necessary, that His Excellency should give a favourable consideration to our application.

We feel satisfied that His Excellency will do every thing in his power to render the Militia Force in this Province as efficient as possible, to meet any exigency that may arise. And we can only add, that we have the fullest confidence in the loyalty and attachment to the Government, of the several Regiments which we have the honour to command, and to express for them and ourselves, our determination never to resign but with our lives to the Revolutionists in these Provinces, our birth-right as British subjects, the enjoyment of the blessings secured to us by the British Constitution, and our allegiance to our Queen.

We are enabled to state that the Hon. Lieutenant Colonel Bell, commanding the First Battalion of the St. Maurice Militia, called upon the officers and non-commissioned officers of the battalion to meet him at the Court House at Three Rivers, on Tuesday last, to join him in taking the Oath of Allegiance to Her Majesty the Queen. This is an example well worthy of being followed by all the officers commanding battalions of Militia in this Province; and we trust that, where the propriety and necessity of the measure are not spontaneously felt and attended to, positive instructions may proceed from authority, for imposing it as a duty upon all Colonels of Militia.—(Ib.)

Mr. Labalmondiere, 83d Regt. returned last evening via Boston, from Halifax, where it will be recollected, he carried despatches relative to the movement of troops in this Province.—(Ib.)

At a highly respectable meeting held at Kingston on the 14th inst. of those persons favourable to the formation of a St. Andrew's Society, the Right Rev. Bishop Macdonald being called to the Chair, and John Richardson Forsyth, Esq. requested to act as Secretary, Articles of Association nearly similar to those of the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal, were drawn up and adopted, after which all the gentlemen present enrolled themselves as members, and since then a number of new names have been added to the list.

At a meeting held in the village of Berthier, on the 28th instant, for the purpose of devising the most proper means to continue the peace and quietness which exists in the County of Berthier—the Honorable Jas. Cuthbert, Esq. being called to the chair—the following Resolutions were unanimously carried:—

1. Resolved.—That this meeting, composed as it is, of the most influential persons from the different parts of the County, thinks it expedient that each and every one of the members present, do use his utmost influence to dispel and quash all false and malicious reports, that may tend to sow discord in the public mind, destroy the peace of families, and thereby interrupt the harmony and good will existing between persons who may entertain different political opinions.

2. Resolved.—That this meeting does most sincerely deplore the unfortunate collision that has ta-

ken place between a portion of Her Majesty's Canadian subjects, on the south shore of the river St. Lawrence, and a detachment of Her Majesty's troops.

3. Resolved.—That this meeting trusts that no circumstance will arise in this County of a nature to excite the people to a breach of the laws.

The last Kingston Chronicle furnishes us with the following answers of Lord Gosford and Sir John Colborne to the Resolutions of the Kingston loyal meeting:—

Part of the corps may be usefully employed immediately in garrisoning Kingston, as Sir John Colborne purposes removing the troops at present stationed there, into the Lower Province. At a meeting of the loyal inhabitants of Lower Lachine and Côte St. Paul, of British and Irish origin, held on Monday the 27th November, at the former place, the following resolutions were agreed to unanimously:—

1st.—That the present alarming state of the country calls on every loyal and well disposed subject not only to unite in maintaining the existing institutions of the country, but to organize themselves for the protection of their lives and properties.

2d.—That an association be now formed for the aforesaid purpose, to be called "The Lower Lachine and Côte St. Paul Loyal Association," and that application be made to the proper authorities for a supply of arms and ammunition.

3d.—That a committee consisting of Messrs. Begly Fraser, Somerville, Newman, Dunberry, McNaughton, Jackson, and Thiery, are hereby appointed to carry the resolutions already passed into effect.

A Company of sixty individuals has been formed to carry the above resolutions into effect, and arms, accoutrements, and ammunition have been granted to it by the Commander of the Forces.—(Herald.)

The last steambark for Whitehall left St. John's, we understand, on Sunday last. A good deal of ice is reported for some miles below St. John's, and no more boats can therefore be expected to arrive there this season.—(Ib.)

Montreal, Dec. 1st.—The late accounts from Grand Brulé and its neighbourhood are of a character to demand a full share of public attention. On Saturday last, a muster of some hundreds of the rebels took place at Grand Brulé, and on Sunday a second was held, at which we have been credibly informed that no less than 2000 men were in attendance. For some time past, we are assured they have been at work upon entrenchments of one kind and another, for the defence of Grand Brulé, from an attack in either direction, whether from Montreal or from the back country.—An American gentleman who passed through the place about noon on Tuesday last, informs us that he was stopped there and examined, by a body of about 150 armed men, who appeared to be acting as a regular guard under the command of a man named Coursoles. In the course of his examination, he was told that they had been keeping such a guard there ever since the Saturday before, and were determined to allow no communication but such as they might think unobjectionable, to take place through their district. While detained, our informant saw a man who was stated to be a prisoner make his escape from the house of a Mr. Brazeau, just by. He was instantly pursued by a mounted party, and doubtless retaken. After some delay, our informant himself was allowed to proceed, but he was assured by the mail-carrier who overtook him at St. Martin that evening, that the rebels regretted afterwards that they had not made him prisoner.

On Wednesday, we learn that the mail-carrier was himself stopped on his return, and his mail taken from him. The same day a party of 100 or more proceeded to visit and disarm most of the loyalists residing in that quarter. Some days before, individuals had been thus visited, but this time the movement was made general. A large proportion of these disarmed loyalists came into town yesterday with their families, and we are assured by individuals of their number with whom we have conversed, that the whole of them will immediately follow.—It is time the leaders in this quarter were set to be confident a complete victory has been gained over Col. Wetherall at St. Charles. We fear that nothing short of a speedy visit from that gallant officer, with a strong brigade, will suffice to undeceive them.—(Courier.)

The return of Colonel Wetherall and his gallant troops from Chambly yesterday, was an interesting sight to the hundreds who crowded on the wharf to

witness it. The Cavalry landed first, two of them carrying the liberty pole and cap erected at St. Charles at the meeting of the six Counties, with its wooden tablet bearing the inscription "A Papineau, par ses conceptions reconnoissans." The former fragment of the spoils looking sadly like a fool's cap on a barber's pole.—The Artillery followed, with the two little guns taken at Pt. Ouliviere, in addition to their proper armament. After them rode the Commanding Officer, followed by the Band of the Royals and the Infantry,—the first company of whom escorted the prisoners, 32 in number.

From the information we have been able to collect from those who accompanied the expedition, we are enabled to re-assert the general accuracy of the account we have already given of its proceedings.—The length of the action was perhaps somewhat greater than was reported, and the prisoners actually taken after it was over, were only 25, instead of being sixty, or more, as our report had made it. The stockade did not include much of the village, but only a space of a few acres round Mr. Debartzch's house. After the action, the troops spent the night in that part of the village which lay to the north of it. They found the village deserted.—The next morning the Priest returned, and received his orders to attend to the burial of the dead. Among those who are positively stated to have been in Mr. Debartzch's house at the time of the attack, were C. Drolet, R. Desrivieres, and Dr. Beaubien. Papineau is declared to have crossed the river to St. Marc just as the troops came up. T. S. Brown, according to the prisoners, rode off at the very first of the fire, telling the poor fellows posted in the entrenchments that he was going to bring up a reinforcement he pretended to have got at a little distance, but was not seen or heard of afterwards. The report of his previous misconduct appears to be confirmed. Among the prisoners, whose names are given in another column, three are of some note; Duvert, the Notary, Duracher, a merchant with some property, and Lemire, his clerk, all of St. Charles. The soldiers wounded in the action were left at St. Hilaire, with a guard, in charge of Dr. Sewall.

We are informed that two 24 pounders had been mounted within the entrenchment on the south side, where the attack was made. They were spiked and committed to the safe keeping of the river Richelieu. A hundred stand of arms, or more, were also taken and destroyed. The fort was well provisioned. The oral report first brought of the quarter in which the attack was made; was incorrect. The defenders of the fort, we understand, were about 1500 in number at the first, and most of them fought with a spirit worthy of better leaders and a better cause. The survivors, we hope, have learnt a lesson which they will not soon require to have repeated.—(Ib.)

MILITARY MOVEMENTS.—The John Bull and St. George steamboats came up yesterday forenoon from Quebec, with about 6000 stand of arms and accoutrements complete.

The Varennes steamboat left yesterday morning for Sorel, with two field-pieces, a good supply of Congreve rockets, and a detachment of Royal Artillery, under the command of Captain Howell.

The John Bull also left for the same place, with the light company of the 24th, under Captain Maitland, three companies of the 32d, under Captain Brown, one company of the 53d, under Captain Emsley, and a detachment of the Montreal Volunteer Cavalry, under Cornet Sweeney,—the whole force being commanded by the Hon. Colonel Gore, Deputy Quarter Master General.

The force already at Sorel consisted of one company of the 32d, under Major Reed, and two of the 66th, under Captain Crompton. With the reinforcements just sent down, the whole will form a pretty strong brigade. Its precise destination is of course unknown. We are not sanguine enough to expect that any regular opposition will be attempted, whatever it may be.—The rebels will hardly be fools enough to act St. Charles and Pt. Ouliviere over again, within the six Counties.

Yesterday morning, the brigade under Lieut. Col. Wetherall landed from the Princess Victoria, having returned from Chambly, via St. John's and the Railroad line. The brigade consisted of the five companies of the Royals who were at St. Charles, (the remaining Company of that gallant regiment being left as before at St. John's) a detachment of Royal Artillery with two guns, under Capt. Glasgow, and a party of the Cavalry under Capt. David. The detachment of the 66th which shared in the expedition to Saint Charles, remains as before in garrison at Chambly. The two Companies of the 32d under Captain Britwhistle, which joined the Colonel on Tuesday, returned with him.

A detachment of the 24th Regiment, under Lieut. Young, arrived yesterday from Kingston.—(Ib.)

In addition to the above, C. S. Cherrier, Esq. M. P. P., and Toussaint Pelletier, Esq. Advocate, were yesterday committed to goal, on charges of high treason.—(Courier.)

Montreal, Dec. 2nd.—We believe there is no question that the Magistrates of this city and neighbourhood, last Monday, resolved that many parts of this District were in such a disturbed and rebellious state, as to demand the proclamation of Martial Law as the only means of accomplishing the more speedy punishment of the guilty, and preventing the spread of the revolution which has begun; and that a communication to that effect was made to the Executive Government of the Province.—(Gazette.)

On Tuesday last, a person named Chartrand, a respectable mason, residing at St. John's, and a loyal volunteer, left his house to collect a debt due to him, a few miles out of the village, by one Roy, and on his return he was arrested by five men with loaded muskets, who set him up against a tree and fired at him. One ball pierced his heart, and several others showed the deadly aim which his savage murderers took. We have conversed with a gentleman who saw the dead body. In consequence of Chartrand's not returning to St. John's, fears were entertained that he had been taken prisoner by some of the rebels, who have scouts over all the neighbourhood, and Mr. Macrae with twelve of the Dorchester Volunteers set out in search of him, when they learned the particulars of his untimely fate.—(Ib.)

[From the Sherbrooke Gazette.]  
November 30.—Mr. Hawley, who conveys the mail between Granby and St. Cesaire, was first arrested on his route by one Joseph Marcoux, and the him after about three hours detention. Proceeding on his journey a few miles, he was again stopped by a mob headed by one Léon Ducharme, who called himself Captain, and said he seized the mail and courier by the authority of Mr. Papineau, kept prisoner there for about fifteen hours, and then allowed to come on to Granby with the mail, but he was told that they should not allow the Majesty's Government.

Guards are stationed at Granby, to cut off the retreat of the rebels.

PROGRESS OF THE MOVEMENT.—Since our last, a public meeting has been held at Granby, the probability was most numerously attended by all classes, and was addressed in a most feeling speech, by W. S. Chaffers, Esq. of St. Cesaire, whose residence and stores have been converted into the headquarters of one division of the rebels, under the command of Captain T. H. Goddard.

On Tuesday evening last, Col. Heriot, C. B. and Provincial Aide de Camp to His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief arrived in this town, invested with full authority from His Excellency to make every necessary arrangement for arming Volunteer Corps throughout the Eastern Townships. During his tour upwards Col. Heriot has authorized the levying of several corps of one hundred men each. That at the command of Captain Matheson, late of the 79th Highlanders; that of Durham, under Captain Brady, late of the Royal Scotch Fusiliers, and another in Shipton and Kingsley, under Captain Cox, of the latter Township.

Yesterday a very large meeting of the most respectable inhabitants of Sherbrooke and its vicinity, was held at Swords' Hotel, where Colonel Heriot explained at some length the mission upon which he was engaged.

He begged to intimate that a corps of one hundred men was to be raised in Sherbrooke, to do duty in its vicinity, and to be under the command of Lieut. John Moore, R.N. and Member for the County of Sherbrooke. Mr. Moore, who had been during the night sent for to Eaton by express, arrived, ere the meeting closed, and accepted of the command—an appointment as judicious as it is universally popular. These Volunteers will receive regular pay and allowances. The subaltern officers are not yet named.

Col. Heriot left yesterday for Stanstead, for the purpose of organizing similar corps in that vicinity, and will probably visit Sherbrooke ere he returns. It is understood that he will remain in command of this District during the winter.

We have received no New York papers of a later date since Friday.

The Albany papers of Monday last, say, that there was then six inches of snow on the ground and the canal still open.

The Kingston papers of the 24th Nov. and all those published lower down in Upper Canada, show that the militia, generally, is volunteering to serve in Lower Canada, the moment that orders are received from the Lieutenant Governor Sir Francis Buxton Heath.

Some of the Township Militia, in Lower Canada, and Volunteers, have actually marched in the rear of the disturbed Counties.

The rebels are still in force on the rivers Chambly and Yamaska, and in the County of the Two Mountains.

The force under Lt. Col. Wetherall which routed them at St. Charles, returned to Montreal from Chambly with the prisoners, on Thursday last. It appears that B. A. Gray, Esquire, of this city, accompanied Lt. Col. Wetherall's force from Chambly to St. Charles, as a volunteer, and returned with it to the city.

The Populaire, of Friday, states, that Lt. Weir was killed by the rebels, but that it was on his attempting to escape. It also asserts, that the death of Mr. OVIDE PERRELLT is certain. Capt. Markham is reported as likely soon to recover from his severe wounds.

The Ami du Peuple, of Saturday evening says, that it had been raining at Montreal for several days, and the roads nearly impassible.

Among the passengers in the St. George, arrived on Saturday afternoon, were Messrs. Lafontaine and Leslie, members of the House of Assembly, and Mr. Wm. Walker, Advocate, of Montreal.

It has been rumoured that Messrs. Lafontaine and Leslie are on a political mission, and some have joined Mr. Walker with them, which is not the case.

We hardly, indeed, believe that any one could have any delegated authority for a political mission at present; certainly not from any who are under arms against their Sovereign, or under accusation of high treason.

The Halifax papers of the 22nd Nov. are without interest.

The following is all that we find about the movement of the 43rd Regiment:

Saint John Nov. 23d.—Owing to the nervous movements in Canada, the 43d Regt. stationed here is under orders to proceed to that place. A detachment under the command of Capt. Bell, left here for that place last Thursday; the other companies are to proceed in a few days. An Address from the Mayor, Alderman, and Commonalty of this city, and an Address from the young Men, with the replies, we are obliged to omit for want of room—but both the Addresses evince that filial affection to the Mother Country, for which New Brunswick has always been pre-eminent.—Addresses presented at a time when the gallant soldiers comprising this Regiment are about to leave for the protection of the loyal inhabitants in Canada, cannot fail to inspire the Regiment with redoubled vigour for their arduous and fatiguing march.

Fredericton, Nov. 22.—ARMY MOVEMENTS.—One division of the 13d Light Infantry, under command of Captain Bell, left town on Thursday last, on their way to Head Quarters by the Nerepis Road. The remainder of the Regiment in this Garrison and Saint Andrew's, we understand, are likewise to proceed in the course of next week. From Fredericton, after being properly equipped, the whole, with the exception of a few invalids, are to march by divisions to Quebec.

A Company of the 85th Regiment, stationed at Prince Edward Island, is ordered to Fredericton, to proceed by Shediac, &c. and the remainder are arriving from Nova Scotia, and are to remain in this Garrison, for the present.

Five Officers and ninety Men of the 55th, arrived

Thursday evening, by the steamer Gazelle, from Windsor. (Saint John Courier, Nov. 18.)

We can state on the best authority that the rumors respecting disaffection at St. Thomas, are unfounded. The whole south shore is well affected, and instead of being ill-disposed towards the troops...

The following is from a Maine paper of the 29th November: "We understand that a Quebec gentleman was arrested and brought before Justice Lyon at Waterbury a few days since, on the charge of stealing a cod fish, a cod fish and a lady's shirt, and sentenced to sixty days confinement in the Augusta Jail."

A letter from Sorel of Thursday evening last, says that the troops there under the Hon. Colonel Gore were to march on Friday morning for St. Denis, and we understand that they had marched when the steamer St. George, which left Montreal on Friday morning, passed Sorel. Some loyalists, who were prisoners at St. Hyacinthe, had been enlarged.

Montreal, Saturday evening.—I have heard of nothing new to-day that will not be in the Gazette. One of the murderers of Chartrand has come in, it is said, and given himself up and will give evidence against the others. A report is in circulation that things are growing much worse at Grand Brûlé and St. Eustache.

COUNTY OF QUEBEC PUBLIC MEETING. An advertisement calling a meeting of the inhabitants of the County of Quebec to express their fidelity to the Sovereign, and attachment to the United Kingdom, appeared in the newspapers published in the French language on Friday and Saturday, and was afterwards circulated and posted.

The following is His Excellency's answer to the St. Roch Address, which was presented this day. It was subscribed by about 700 names:—

GENTLEMEN.—I cannot receive but with pleasure, at a conjuncture like the present, this public avowal of your loyalty towards our Most Gracious Queen, and of your attachment to the connection so advantageously subsisting between this Province and the British Empire.

While deploring with you, as I do most deeply and sincerely, the criminal acts that have led to the calamitous and desolating scenes which have so recently taken place in another District, it is to me a source of great satisfaction to know that so large and respectable a portion of the urban population of this District disapprove and disavow the illegal conduct and proceedings of the authors of such acts, and are resolved zealously to second the firm determination of the Executive Government to restore and maintain, by every means at its disposal, the public tranquillity, and that harmony and good feeling between all classes of Her Majesty's subjects so indispensable to their happiness and prosperity.

By cultivating and widely disseminating the sentiments and principles which you have this day spontaneously come forward to declare, you will best advance the objects that all true friends of the community must have at heart; and be assured that the only real security that society possesses against the horrors and miseries inseparably from intestine commotion, is a ready and respectful obedience to the Laws.

They dined together afterwards, when mirth and good fellowship, loyalty and brotherly union, detained many till a late hour, and sent home all hearts, more strengthened in loyalty, for that could not be, but firmly resolved to stand "shoulder to shoulder" with John Bull and Paddy in putting down Rebellion, and maintaining the supremacy of our young our adored Queen.—(Mercury.)
