CANADIAN DESPATCHES.
Personal Words of France.
OTTAWA, September 5.—Capt. McRae,
of London, has been recommended by
Lord Melgund to His Excellency to go
third in command to the Nile with the
Canadian voyageurs.
Mr. Alphonse Lusignan has received a
private letter from General Boulanger,
commander-in-chief of the French army
of occupation in Tunis, and from Captain
Chartrand, 3rd Zouaves, stationed in
Algiers, commending in words of great
praise on the clever writings of Mr.
Lusignan in his new book, "Eystrokes
and Penstrokes." Captain Chartrand is
the only Canadian holding a commission
in the French regular army.
The Laval University—Vice-Royal Hall
—She is No Good—The Laval Election
Case—Municipal Bequests—Hy-
menal.

QUEBEC, September 5.—Rev. Mr.
Hamel, rector of Laval University, goes
to reside in Montreal for one year to
superintend the erection of the new
branch of Laval University about to be constructed
there. He will be replaced here by
Mr. Methot, and the latter will be re-
placed as Professor of Divinity by Mr.
O. Ryan.
Cards have been issued for a ball at the
Citadel on Thursday evening next. This
is the first public ball given by the pre-
sident Vice-Royal party.
The woman who recently ran away
with one of her husband's clerks but
was subsequently forgiven and returned home,
has again disappeared.
Mr. Belleau, recently unseated for
Levis, has decided to take his case to the
Supreme Court. This move is probably
made for the purpose of gaining time.
The late Mrs. Naine bequeathed \$1,
000 to the Young Men's Christian Asso-
ciation, and \$400 to the Women's
Christian Association.
A brilliant wedding was celebrated at
the chapel St. Louis yesterday morning,
the contracting parties being Mr. Al-
phonse Pelletier, son of Mr. Thos. Pel-
letier, of Trois Pistoles, and Miss
Bellevue, of this city. Mr. Simon Leveillé,
brother of the bride, supported her,
and the groom was attended by his father,
Mr. Thos. Pelletier. The newly married
couple left for Niagara by the 9 o'clock
train.
Injunction Refused—The Famous
Church Case—A Row in a Theatre—
The Scientists in Toronto—Impor-
tant Cases Against the Grand Trunk—
The Scott Act Campaign—Reform
Demonstration—New Cheese Market.
TORONTO, September 5.—When the
curtain dropped upon an operatic per-
formance at the pavilion, Horticultural
Gardens, last night, two young dudes,
under the influence of liquor, named B.
C. Cronan and Edward Everé, jumped
upon the stage and demanded to see "the
girls." They were ordered off, but re-
fused and a free fight ensued, during
which the stage manager and others were
severely handled. Everett's morning
was fined \$15 and costs or 40 days, and
Cronan \$10 and costs or 30 days.
About 10.30 a.m. to-day the members
of the British Association were driven in
cabs from their respective hotels to the
City Hall where the mayor and alder-
men had assembled. The mayor, on their
arrival, read an address of welcome,
which was replied to by Sir Richard
Temple, Lord Rosse and Major-General
Laurie. They were then driven to vari-
ous points of interest in the city. At 4
o'clock they attended a garden party at
Government House, which closed to-
day's official programme. To-morrow
they will go on different excursions to
Guelph, Niagara Falls, Muskoka and the
Rockies.
TORONTO, September 5.—At Osgoode
Hall to-day a motion by the Canada
Electric Light Co. to continue the in-
junction restraining the city from
executing the lighting contract with the
Toronto Company was refused.
The motion to have been made at
Osgoode Hall to-day to strike the cele-
brated church case, Langtry and DuMon-
lin, off the list, was by consent adjourned
till after the meeting of the St. James
vestry on Wednesday next.
The Court of Appeal delivered judg-
ment to-day in the important cases,
Vogel vs. the Grand Trunk and Morton
vs. the Grand Trunk, in each of which the
Queen's Bench division had awarded
damages to the plaintiffs for loss of freight
resulting from defendant's negligence.
The railway company fought the cases on
the ground that plaintiffs had agreed by a
written contract that the company should
not be liable even for negligence. Four
of the judges disagreed, two on each side,
so that plaintiffs retained their verdict.
The Supreme Court will be appealed to.
A change of time table on the Ontario
Division of the Canadian Pacific Railway
goes into effect on Tuesday next. The
times somewhat shortened between here
and Montreal by the night express trains.
Kingston, September 5.—The Reform
gathering at the Crystal Palace grounds
to-day, was addressed by Hon. E. Blake,
Hon. G. W. Ross and a number of local
gentlemen. The weather was fine and the
attendance large.
COMBINSVILLE, Ont., September 5.—
At an anti-Scott Act meeting held by E.
King Dadds, Rev. A. M. Phillips, the
only temperance speaker was allowed
only half an hour to speak. Dadds, amid
cheers, was compelled to retract his state-
ments. The meeting was then unanim-
ously for the Scott Act, and the liquor
party were completely routed.
LOCKPORT, September 5.—An enthusi-
astic meeting of the Reformers of South
Bruce was held at Riversdale to-day for
the purpose of taking action regarding the
Mowat demonstration. An address to
Mr. Mowat was adopted and delegates
appointed to attend the demonstration.
TILSONBURG, September 5.—The first
cheese market was held here to-day.
Thirty-one factories offered 10,283 boxes.
No sales, sellers holding out for eleven
cents.

LATEST BY CABLE.
IRISH AFFAIRS.
The Limerick Town Council on its
Dignity.
DUBLIN, September 5.—The Lord
Limerick recently notified the Town
Council of Limerick unless it levied the
rate for extra police duty within a month
the law would be rigorously enforced.
The Council yesterday passed resolutions
disregarding the notification. It is ex-
pected if the Council continues resistance
the members will be imprisoned.
The Duke of Edinburgh Abused.
DUBLIN, September 5.—The Irishman
newspaper, referring to the Duke of
Edinburgh's recent visit to Dublin Har-
bor, calls him "The fiddling fool of the
Georgian race," and "the embodiment of
all Ireland abhors."
Extending Germany's Colonies.
HAMBURG, September 5.—The German-
African Commercial Association has been
formed here. Its object is to extend the
commercial relations of Germany on the
East Coast of Africa and found colonies.

The London American Exhibition.
LONDON, September 5.—The American
Exhibition in 1886 will probably be lo-
cated at the new Albert Palace at Battersea.
Constant accessions to the leading men on
the list are being made.
Mr. Gladstone and Scotch Disestablish-
ment.
EDINBURGH, September 5.—Mr. Glad-
stone told to-day the ministers of the
Free Church of Scotland that if the
majority of Scotch members to the Com-
mons at the next election were pledged to
disestablish the Church of Scotland the
Government would carry out the popular
will.
Anglophobia in France.
PARIS, September 5.—The irritation of
the French press against England is
spreading to the people. A journal
called the Anti-Anglais is selling in large
numbers on the Boulevards.

EGYPT.
Rebel Defeat Near Kassala.
SUAKIM, September 5.—The rebels
attacked Kassala in great force and were
defeated with heavy losses. The rebel
attacks lately on the town have been
feeble.
Osman Digna Descended.
CAIRO, September 5.—Osman Digna
has only 2,000 adherents. His numerous
defeats will result in the opening of the
Berber road.

MISCELLANEOUS DESPATCHES.
SCIENCE.
The Citizens of Philadelphia Reception
PHILADELPHIA, September 5.—Over
3,000 people were present at the Academy
of Music this evening to participate in
the reception tendered by the citizens of
Philadelphia to the American Association
and the visiting British scientists.
An International Science Association.
PHILADELPHIA, September 5.—The
American Association for the Advance-
ment of Science is considering a propo-
sition to form an international association.
The Blaine Scandal.
INDIANAPOLIS, September 5.—Blaine's
attorneys have filed an answer denying
the truth of the *Sentine's* allegations.
The next step will probably be a de-
murrer to the interrogatories of the de-
fence.
A Mastodon Discovered.
GRAND RAPIDS, September 5.—In Al-
pine Township yesterday the skeleton of a
mastodon, 12 feet in height, was returned. It
is the largest ever found except one by
Prof. Warren. The largest rib found
measured four feet, and one tooth with
enamel perfect weighed 3 lbs. 10 1/2 inches
International Courses at Newport.
NEWPORT, September 5.—This after-
noon President Arthur returned the call
by Admiral Commaire on the British
Regatta Northampton. He received a
right royal welcome, the yards were
manned and the marines in full uniform.
The American flag was run to the peak,
and a salute of 21 guns fired. This was
replied to by the Tennessee.

THE CHOLERA.
Terrible Suffering Caused By
Popular Ignorance in Italy.
The Plague Spreading Rapidly.
Spain, France, Switzerland and
Italy Affected.
Horrible State of Italy.
ROME, September 5.—An advocate and
public official of Campobasso, who fled to
Chieti, has become insane through fear of
cholera. A decree has been issued sus-
pending from office all prefects and syn-
dics, who have instituted arbitrary local
measures against cholera. The Pope has
sent 2,000 lira to Naples to be distributed
among the sufferers. The populace there
are now exciting themselves with the sus-
picion that the Archbishop is in com-
plicity with the physicians to poison
them. At Spiez in the past 24 hours
there were 37 fresh cases and seven
deaths.

The Deaths.
TOULON, September 5.—There were
three deaths from cholera last night and
four at Laseyne.
NAPLES, September 5.—In the past 24
hours there were 122 fresh cases and 57
deaths.
MADRID, September 5.—There are six
fresh cases and four deaths at Novelda, 10
fresh cases and four deaths at Monforte,
and two deaths at Villanova.
ROME, September 5.—There were 44
cases of cholera and 123 deaths in Italy
the past 24 hours. The epidemic is most
severe in Naples and Spiez.
MARSEILLES, September 5.—There
were five cholera deaths to-day.

The Anarchy in Italy.
ROME, September 5.—The Mayor of
Spiez has succumbed to the cholera.
King Humbert has postponed his visit to
Naples. There were popular demon-
strations to-day at Campobasso and Ancona
against the decree relating to the cholera.

and America do not participate.

OUR ARTILLERYMEN.
The Annual Meeting at Quebec—What
the Aymer Men did.
QUEBEC, Sept. 5.—This was the second
day of the Dominion Artillery Associa-
tion meeting. The Richmond field
battery, under command of Captain
Stevens, proceeded to the island at an
early hour, and as is customary were put
through the drill of dismounting and
mounting pieces previous to firing. An old
veteran, who was present, claims that
they performed this drill in the short
space of one minute and ten seconds,
which is counted in military circles as
a marvellous time, more especially
when it is taken into consideration
that the men present had not been prac-
tising over a year. Captain Stevens
commanded in the absence of Major
Aymer, who is at present confined to his
room through illness. The team is prin-

THE BRITISH TEAM.
What Col. Ray Has to Say.
To-day your correspondent called on
Lieut.-Col. Ray, commandant of the Brit-

one week before sailing none of the men
had previously met, and consequently

FRANCE AND CHINA.
American Mediation Is Again
Suggested.
Movements of the French Fleet.
Heavy Fighting Between the
French and Chinese in
Tonquin.
HONG KONG, September 5.—The
French are shelling Keelung again, and it
is presumed they intend to occupy the
place. Its possession will be of no value
as it will absorb all their available land-
ing force without affording a correspond-
ing advantage.
The French Fleet's Plans.
PARIS, September 5.—It is said the
French squadron is cruising in the
Chinese waters to destroy the remainder
of the Chinese fleet. The *Journal des*
Debats declares the French fleet is totally
insufficient for a great war.
The Attack on Keelung.
PARIS, September 5.—It is believed
Admiral Courbet with his fleet is near
Hainan making such repairs to his ships
as the engagements at Keelung and Foo
Chow rendered necessary. The attack
on Keelung was prompted by a desire to
obtain possession of the coal mines which
would prove extremely useful in case war
was declared and the neutral ports closed.
The Chinese frustrated the scheme by
flooding the mines and destroying the
pumping machinery.
He is not Degraded.
The *Temps* states that the reports that
Li Hung Chang has been degraded are
untrue. He still retains his official posi-
tion in the Chinese government.
Heavy Fighting in Tonquin.
HONG KONG, Sept. 5.—Heavy fighting
in Tonquin between the French and
Chinese is reported from Chinese sources.
American Mediation Again.
PARIS, September 5.—It is reported
that Mr. Morton has, with the knowl-
edge of Mr. Ferry, intimated to Wash-
ington that the time is opportune for
American mediation between France and
China.

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OUR PARIS LETTER.

Anglophobia Raging Badly!

The Swedish King "Doing Paris"—
"Up in a Balloon"—Steering Balloons
at Pleasure—Gau and Abbey in a
Dilemma—Crowning the Rosters at
Stains, Etc., Etc.

PARIS, August 22.

The tone of the French press grows constantly more and more hostile to England. The papers attribute to "Perfidious Albion" every sort of evil feeling and machination against France. It would really seem that M. Jules Ferry, not having enough on his hands in Tonquin, China and Madagascar, were secretly inciting the Republican press to work up angry feeling against Great Britain, so as gradually to habituate the public mind of France to the idea of a war with England. The movement has begun, as just remarked, by incessant complaints of English arrogance, greed, jealousy and underhand dealings, all the world over, to get hold of all the desirable regions of the earth's surface, with the unscrupulous determination to keep all other nations in general, and France in particular, from obtaining a "colonial empire." The Republican press has been openly suggesting a continental coalition against England's colonial empire, declaring that the British have grown too fat and puffed up with the sun, and that a determined onslaught on the obnoxious supremacy of Britannia would be speedily followed by the downfall of a power which has ceased to be anything more than a bubble, and the winds of peace would dissipate into thin air. The proposition now is for France to abandon the English alliance and enter into intimate unity with Germany; after which these two Powers, who would be speedily joined by all the others, would attack England by land and by sea, at home and abroad, reduce the giant to a pigmy, and partition among themselves the Colonial Empire, on which the sun never sets. Already the violence of the attacks on England have begun to call forth a few considerations from the least violent of England's traducers as to the reasonableness of the present moment for beginning the splitting-up of Great Britain and her colonies; a few timely suggestions concerning the necessity of making due preparation for such an undertaking before entering upon it, have also been put forth; but the main fact of the moment is, that the specific mischief of M. Jules Ferry's action in the East, and the steadily increasing bitterness of French feeling towards Great Britain and her people.

Oddly enough, with

his TROUBLESOME ORIENTAL WARS

on hand and every prospect of a great

struggle with China, M. Ferry has

entered on negotiations with the Paris

Municipality, in view of the Universal

Exhibition which the French Govern-

ment has determined on getting up in

this city, in 1889. As in 1875, the city

will be called upon for its contributive

quota towards the expenses. As the

present head of the French Government

could hardly hope to do much in the

way of "exhibitioning" if he were

engaged, with all other powers, his allies

and partners, in the disruption and ap-

propriation of the British Empire, it is to

be supposed, either that he expects to have

finished the mobilization of "France's

seemingly antagonistic" before that date, or

that he will prudently defer the demoli-

shing of England until after the exhibi-

tion which is to celebrate the centen-

ary of the grand movement of the

national mind in 1789; a splendid awak-

ing of the best impulses of the French

people, doomed, alas! to degenerate into

the hideous saturnals of 1793.

The mania for statue-building and for

re-naming thoroughfares is still rampant

and the latter is threatening mischief, as

not even policemen and cabbies can keep

pace with the constant succession of new

names inflicted on old places. Less ob-

jectionable is the zeal which is putting up

memorial plates on the fronts of houses

in which illustrious people were born,

died, or resided.

Chateaubriand, Moliere, and others, are

about to be thus "remembered in stone."

It is to be hoped, however, that the public

mind will not be often misled by erro-

neous statements of the kind, such as have

recently been shown up by critical com-

mentaries in regard to the inscriptions

concerning Voltaire and others.

THE KING OF SWEDEN

has made good use of his stay in this

city, having diligently visited a vast num-

ber of interesting institutions and objects; his

Swedish Majesty has been very accom-

modating in his gifts to the people with

whom he has been most in contact, not

only handsome donations in money, but

splendid articles of jewellery having been

the advice of the best medical and

lightness. The French Government,

ELECTIONEERING SCANDALS.

The Presidential election in the neighboring Republic is being most disgracefully conducted. The accusations against the personal character of the candidates, involving the ruthless invasion of the domestic hearth and the destruction of the reputation of women, have been of the most revolting description. It has seemed as if the partisans on either side had set out to outdo each other in this abominable work and had spared no pains to drive the iron into the souls of those whom they wished to destroy. A more wicked and abandoned mode of warfare was never practiced in any country, and it reflects shame and disgrace upon the American nation. The charges against private character commenced with the Republicans and were levelled at Mr. Cleveland. The religious press, to its shame be it said, was the most zealous in the work of besmirching Mr. Cleveland's private character. Then came the Democratic innings, and the reputation of Mr. and Mrs. Blaine for chastity, was assailed and the most atrocious statements published. Mr. Blaine has made the mistake of noticing this disgusting accusation and is taking his accusers into court. The libelling journal pleads the truth of its charge, and the election may be over long enough before the public mind will be settled on the subject. The whole business reveals a low moral tone. It is a remarkable fact that the nation has not risen as one man to protest against a system of warfare which might disgrace the Digger Indians. It must be admitted that the American people are doing themselves great injustice, especially in the eyes of strangers, and the sooner they decide to drive vulgar libellers and scandal mongers so far out of public life as to prevent their laying down lines for party action the better for the country's reputation abroad.

THE EXHIBITION.

Yesterday was the day fixed for the opening of the Dominion Exhibition, and it was actually opened, but the public having some notion of the state of affairs carefully remained away, so that the attendance was mainly confined to exhibitors and their attendants and workmen. This is a state of affairs which we think should not be allowed to pass without notice by the press and which fairly calls for remonstrance and condemnation. It is very evident that the plan of having exhibitions open late in the week in the hope that every thing would be in its place on the opening day has been an utter failure, and that some other means will have to be resorted to for the purpose of inducing exhibitors to be more prompt. It is certainly very surprising that men who are fully informed as to the exact day of opening, and who are not pressed for time, should postpone the placing of their goods in position to the very last possible moment and allow themselves to be caught unprepared when the actual opening takes place. For a week past the Exhibition Buildings have been ready for the reception of goods, yet how few were ready with their exhibits before the opening!

Apart from the delay on the part of some of the exhibitors we think that the present exhibition will prove a success and have good results. Exhibitions are great public educators, making known as they do, by actual sight, the resources and industries of the country, both to its inhabitants and to visiting strangers and giving to both broader and more enlightened views in respect to these great elements of national prosperity. No one can visit the present exhibition without becoming convinced of the great progress that Canada is making in the industrial arts as well as from an agricultural point of view. We have not only better produce and better stock than we had formerly, but we have also made great strides in textile manufactures and have long passed the period of infancy in that particular. It is very evident that Canada's future prosperity must be largely along that line and therefore the evidences of advancement which the present Exhibition exhibits are the more welcome.

ANGLOPHOBIA is spreading in France more rapidly than the cholera when at its height. Our Paris letter makes special reference to it and the telegrams in today's issue say that from the journals it is spreading to the people, a new journal called *Anti-Anglais* having a great run on the Paris boulevards. The Parisians have "spells" of this kind. They are easily worked up, and when they find their suspicious groundless they calm down quite as quickly. France has no just cause of complaint against England, and when convinced on this point Anglophobia will disappear.

HONOR TO WHOM HONOR IS DUE.

Now that the meetings of the British Association are over not a little discussion of a quiet kind is going on as to the party who is to be credited with the honor of inducing the society to visit Montreal. If the remarks of the Governor-General were correct they would put the matter beyond question, but the members of the Association most conversant with the facts entirely dissent from the opinion of His Excellency.

Said Sir Richard Temple: "Captain Bedford Pim first moved, in the matter; his motion failed, and he came to me. I moved next and it succeeded. Captain Pim pulled the strings and I was the instrument."

Said Mr. Alfred Kinnear, the London Central News agency's representative, and now en route to the North-West: "We all know on the other side that Captain Pim is the man who began and conducted the agitation to a successful termination for the meeting of the Association in America."

Lieut. Ray's testimony was to the same effect: "To Captain Pim we must give the honor of bringing the Association to Canada."

We have not the space for a score of opinions from prominent members to the same effect and of others cognizant of all the circumstances. We are sorry that anything should have been said or done that could possibly have been construed into a desire to deprive the worthy old tar of his honors, and he may safely leave his reputation in the hands of Canadians, not fearing that they will care quite as well for it as he himself in a distinguished career has cared for his honor. To the man who rescued McClure, the bearer of the sad news of Franklin's fate, we owe a double debt. To this he now adds that of the undoubted honor of beginning and pushing to a successful termination an agitation for the British Association's meeting in Canada. That this meeting has been productive of great results to Canada no one will deny, and the Dominion Government as well as the city of Montreal should not be slow to acknowledge Captain Pim's great services to this city and country.

SIR JOHN AND THE LADIES.

Sir John Macdonald has again managed to draw to himself the attention of the ladies. At an age when most men cease to be attractive to the ladies, save in the circle of their immediate friends, Sir John has become, as it were, a magnet to attract to himself the admiration of a very considerable proportion of the female world. As a prophet has been said not to be without honor save in his own country, so in this case Sir John may be expected to take heart of hope and count upon the endorsement of the women of Great Britain not being without its influence, in a political sense, upon the women of Canada, who are expected to be benefited by the passage of his bill. It is true that in Canada comparatively few women express any strong desire to handle the ballot box or take an active part in political elections. If the honor be given to them they will take it; they will, no doubt, feel grateful to the public man who had manifested this amount of confidence in their governing capacity; and they may not use the right in any great numbers after all. There has been in Canada nothing worthy of the name of an agitation in support of woman's rights, and if the franchise be conferred upon women, or many of them, through the efforts of Sir John Macdonald, it will not be because of any pressure put upon Parliament or the politicians, but because the thing is right in itself. That women should be allowed to vote cannot be successfully gainsaid in countries where tens of thousands of males not so well qualified by intelligence or moral character are

placed on the electoral lists without question. As for a property test, under which it is hoped to exclude the most of Canadian women, it will in time either be abandoned or women's right to her own earnings will be more clearly established, and then she may not need to fear a property or any other test.

The Opening Yesterday.

No Ceremonies and a Small Attendance.

Some Account of the Industrial Exhibits.

How the Agricultural Department Looked.

Yesterday morning the Dominion Exhibition of 1884 was opened to the public, but without any ceremonies whatever the only difference from the previous day being that the public had to pay twenty-five cents for the privilege of getting in. The exhibition was by no means ready for opening, nor can it be this morning, for incredible as it may seem, at a late hour last night there was more than one exhibitor who had not placed a single article in position. This refers to the main building, which was the most advanced of any and which will undoubtedly present a fine appearance when everything is in its place. It is estimated that 3,000 persons visited the grounds yesterday but very few of them went through the turnstiles.

All day the work of arranging the exhibits went on without pause and by night much had been done, leaving still, however, very much for to-day. The Art Department was in a very incomplete condition, but probably all the pictures will be in their places to-day.

Tessier is particularly elegant, as indeed is all her work, and she has a large amount on exhibition. Some elegant work is displayed by Mme. Limoges of this city. It consists of various articles, such as a number of toilet sets. The work on these articles is perfectly exquisite, and the materials and blending of colors are very perfect. Miss Greece, of Longue Pointe, exhibits some very elegant work, amongst which is some tatting, which, for fineness of texture and beauty of appearance, would be almost equal to the work exhibited by Miss F. Fowl, of St. Andre, is very pretty, a wreath of white and palest pink roses and a bunch of white lilies being particularly lovely. There is a great amount of cone and paper work in the shape of pictures, pictures of ducks, geese and turkeys, etc.; it is very good. Two wreaths, one of fine wire and the other of hair, are very beautifully done. They belong to Miss Minnie McLean, of this city. Mrs. P. Gervais has on exhibition some fine white cashmere baby garments, embroidered with white floss. These garments are almost covered with the embroidery, in a fine beautiful pattern. The work is very fine. Some Berlin work by Dame Elex. Bussiere is very good. Delle Lacombe exhibits some very pretty embroidery for underclothing. The show of very fine work on embroidered plush banners by Mrs. Smith, of this city. Mrs. P. Foley exhibits some elegant ladies' underwear, babies' garments, and dressing gowns, all beautifully trimmed with embroidery. A picture made of Berlin wool, in very pretty arranged colors, is especially worthy of notice. It belongs to Delle Marie Louise Condon.

Witness had not reimbursed the amount borrowed, and refused to say whether he intended to do so or not. In answer to Mr. Mercer, Mr. Power stated that his firm had not been deducted from his wages.

Justin Lambert owned up to having voted for Mr. Tansey as Francis Roumagaht at the request of A. Sabourin. Received \$2 from Tansey for his vote.

At 2 p.m. yesterday the case was continued.

Mr. Joseph, President of the City Gas Company, was examined and said that when the money was handed to Power, there was no candidate in the field for St. Ann's Ward. The company was interested to have an alderman favorable to its interest. The money was lent to Power to enable him to qualify as a voter, and the company's men as voters. Did not remember the company furnishing money to qualify its employees as voters at any other time. The clerks of the company informed witness that Power had returned the \$60 this week. There was no interest charged. The company was not in the habit of lending money to its hands.

MONTREAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY AND FRUIT-GROWERS' ASSOCIATION.

A visit was paid yesterday afternoon by a HERALD reporter to the grounds of the above association at the corner of St. Catherine and City Councilor streets. Mr. Evans and his assistants have certainly got through a large amount of work in a very short time, as the arrangements are all completed with the exception of a few minor details. In the way of entries and variety of exhibits the show this year promises to be the best that has ever been held. The grounds and tents will be illuminated by 25 electric lights, which, no doubt, will have a beautiful effect on the display of the different plants. The first thing that strikes the eye on entering the grounds is a large tent 130x42. In this tent will be exhibited the several different varieties of plants. Near the entrance is a large table which will be occupied by a collection of plants and rare palms, and by a prominent exhibit. The other tables in this tent will be occupied by groups of special plants. Immediately adjoining the first are two other tents, each 40 feet square, which will be filled with bouquets of floral designs, hot-house grapes, peaches, strawberries, pears, plums, etc., and all round the different sides of the enclosure are two other tents. The first one contains the apple table, 200 feet long, out bloom table, 150 long, and a table for outdoor grapes, 50 feet in length. Immediately after the out bloom table comes one devoted to the higher kind of vegetable, such as melons, etc. In the second tent are placed tables devoted to plants grown by amateurs, and a table 200 feet in length for the reception of all the various kinds of vegetables. Space has been spoken for by exhibitors from Quebec, Knowlton, Huntingdon, Abbotford, St. Joseph du Lac, Hudson and other places.

Propeller California is due here at noon to-day from Chicago with passengers and freight. She leaves again on Tuesday.

The Rover left Ottawa on Thursday with twelve lumber barges for the States. The Ivy arrived on Wednesday with four, two of which were for Quebec.

They are now talking of big cargoes since the Glenisla left. The Ross-shire broke on her last voyage 8,000 quarters maize, 410 standard deals and 600 bundles staves.

Mr. Burdard considers the Cedar rapids by far the worst of all, owing to there being so many cross currents, the Lachine and Long Sault having a swift but straight current. His companion of Mr. S. R. Stoddard, of New York, in his memorable trip in the "Atlantis" from Long Island Sound to Portland, Me., when they were wrecked off Portsmouth. Mr. Burdard is a most enthusiastic canoeist, and is justly proud of his last achievement. He speaks of the most enthusiastic manner of the scenery along the route, which he considers unequalled.
