In the Senate yesterday, the Deceased Wife's Sister Bill passed its third reading on a division of 11 to 34.

A despatch from Stuttgart, Germany, says: The statement that the King of Wurtemberg has been converted to Catholicism is officially denied.

The sale of the west section of the Provincial Railway was passed to a third reading, by a vote of 39 to 11, last evening in the Assembly. The Council will be more evenly divided. On the question of the Speakership of the Legislative Council, the Government were supported in that body by a majority of only one—the vote standing 11 to 10. Mr. Starnes voting with the Government. If this is the state of parties in the Council, the railway bill will barely pass.

The changes in the Tariff, made this session, are numerous, and nearly all, except the abolition of the duties on tea, coffee, and tin plates, are increases of taxation. Salt for dairy use is now to be taxed.

There will be no military review at Kingston this summer as anticipated. The Militia Department wisely applies the \$15,000 that the review would cost to the purpose of the regular drill.

Japan sets a good example to Christian governments. The Government refused to hold a lottery in order to dispose of such articles as remained unsold at the National Exhibition, and went to the expense of purchasing all the goods themselves, in order to avoid the risk of an immoral example.

A marriage is said to have been arranged between Rev. Edward Carr Glyn, Rector of Kensington, and Lady Mary Campbell, daughter of the Duke of Argyll.

Colonel R. W. Butler, V.C., C.B., C.M.G., half pay late 69th Regiment, has been placed on the paid establishment of aide-de-camp to the Queen in recognition of his services in the recent campaign in South Africa. His many friends in Canada will be pleased to hear of his promotion.

Captain Dagmore, a Land Leaguer who has been imprisoned in Ireland for refusing to give securities for future good behaviour, is well known here, having been for years an officer in the Royal Canadian Rifles stationed at Kingston.

The Lottery Bill has been introduced at last. Mr. Champagne is its champion in the House, and as he sits immediately behind the Premier and introduces most of the measures in which a prominent and influential circle of political speculators are interested, who are usually found hovering all around the Throne, there is little doubt that the bill will find powerful supporters. As it is not yet printed, there is not much known about it, but the rumor explains that the promoters merely desire to raise funds for encouraging colonisation.

Referring to Queen Victoria's recent visit to Beaumont College, the London Tablet (Roman Catholic) says: "The visit is one which will long be remembered at Beaumont and cherished with grateful affection by Beaumont boys. The great kindness of Her Majesty in thus honoring a Catholic college, and accepting the heartfelt expression of their loyalty and love, will encourage the Catholic subjects of the Queen in fidelity to the Crown and personal attachment to her."

MAPLE SUGAR.—This article was selling on the Montcalm Market this morning at twelve cents per pound. The manufacture in this vicinity has been so far a partial failure this year.

DUCK SHOOTING.—The Consul-General of France and a party of friends have gone on a duck-shooting expedition to Isle Verte.

The Gulf is full of ice between New foundland and Cape Breton. There is a very heavy jam all round the coast and very heavy north, with prospects of a late season. The sealers are arriving slowly with a moderate fishery.

It is a good suggestion of an American paper that there should be some organization in New York to help Irish immigrants, most of whom are from rural districts, to get on to the land instead of staying in the great cities. The best use of money for the benefit of immigrants, is not to spend it in uprooting them from their old homes, but in planting those who are adrift in now.

There is no use trying to get out of it. The Chief of the Statistical Bureau at Washington reiterates the correctness of his statement that 125,000 Canadians emigrated to the United States during the past year.

The youthful depravity of New York has been attracting the attention of one of the judges, who referred to the subject in open court. The three causes assigned are: 1st, vile roading; 2nd, the pool rooms and policy shops, and 3rd, the low theatres.

At a meeting of the National Slave Exchange, held in Toledo, Ohio, a series of resolutions were adopted relative to the duty on barrel staves. The action of the United States Government in restoring the duty to 20 per cent, the old figure—after having reduced it to 10 per cent is cited, and attention is called to the efforts now being made to induce the Dominion Government to impose an export duty on stave bolts and heading bolts of \$1 per cord, and on elm logs of \$2 per thousand feet. If the latter course is pursued a demand is to be made on Congress to increase the import duty on stave headings, and hoop timber to more than offset the effect of the Canadian export duty.

BY CABLE THIS EVENING

Paris, April 15. A Cairo letter says war has been openly declared against all Europeans engaged in official functions in Egypt. Arab papers advocate the absolute expulsion of Europeans from the public service.

Madrid, April 15. The Protectionists hope to defeat the adoption of the Commercial Treaty with France and obstruct other portions of the Free Trade policy of the Liberals in the Senate.

London, April 15. It is understood that the stock of the New American Railway, amounting to millions of pounds, will be introduced on the London Money Market to day. Arrived, as Alsatia and Egyptian Monarch.

THIS EVENING'S TELEGRAMS.

Washington, April 15. One of the latest rumors is that Lowell will be succeeded by Lincoln.

Chicago, April 15. A triple lynching is reported from Kirbyville, Missouri. There are no particulars.

Mount Carmel, Pa., April 15. John Richard spent all his money in drink and then deserted his family. His wife became frantic and saturated her clothing with oil, set it afire, and was burned to a cinder.

Katanning Pa., April 15. Jonathan Aultman, aged 84, while being taken to penitentiary for arson, took some poison in his gin and died in five minutes.

New York, April 15. Stocks irregular; cotton blank; flour better.

Panama, April 6. Piorola, arrived on the first inst. from Lima en route to Paris. His inveterate enemy, ex-President Prado, arrived on the 30th March, and it is said will go to Lima and endeavour to get Peru, out of its difficulties. Of 9,000 Chilean troops in Lima 2,300 are sick, six hundred died in a single month.

Two children named Havens residing at Hamilton, were taken seriously ill a few days ago and medical aid called in. The physician pronounced it a case of poisoning through eating mushrooms taken from poisonous plants. They have about recovered from its effects.

From Montreal this Evening

Montreal, April 15. The stock market opened weak but closed strong and higher to day; Bank of Montreal sold at 209 1/2.

The Allan mail to Newfoundland arrived at St. John, Nfld., at 3 a.m. to day.

From Ottawa this Evening.

Ottawa, April 25

At one o'clock this morning Mr. Blake rose to speak on the Disallowance amendment and kept the floor until 3:30, when Sir John Macdonald followed, speaking for nearly two hours. The debate was continued by Messrs Casey, Cameron (Victoria), and Mills till six o'clock, when the members were called in and Cameron's amendment defeated on a vote of 50 to 110. The house then went into Committee of Supply and was the cause of a good deal of wrangling and bad temper until 7:30 a.m. when it rose and reported progress, having passed only one item. In consequence of the protracted sitting last night only one or two filed an appearance till past noon to-day.

A young man named Blondin while crossing the Ottawa yesterday, near Lochaber, broke through the ice and was drowned.

From Toronto this Evening.

Toronto, April 15.

There is no change to note in the labor movement.

Thirty-five striking shoemakers left for Chicago, St. Paul and Rochester, and a number leave to-day for the other side.

At a meeting of the Labor Council last night, it was decided to ask contributions to sustain the strikers from workmen throughout Canada.

From London, Ont., this Evening

London, April 15.

The time for receiving entries for the races on the 7th and 8th of June, when the Queen's Plate will be run for, has been extended till May 10.

A couple of roughs attacked a guest at a wedding party on Ridout street on Thursday night and gave him a beating. Several of the other guests then pursued the roughs and literally wiped the streets with him.

The Globe's special North West correspondent in his letter throws light upon the exaggerated stories of insufficient accommodation for immigrants at Winnipeg, and attributes the source of complaint rather than unwillingness to pay the extravagant prices asked for lodging than to actual inadequacy of sleeping accommodation, such as it is. Another source of complaint lies in the inadequacy of the city postoffice to the necessities of the business. Many immigrants are arriving, but are unable to start west until the snow disappears. He recommends farmers to delay shipping live stock until the blocked traffic on the railways has been worked off.

The wedding of Colonel Wellesley, the presumptive heir of the Duke of Wellington, and Miss Williams, sister of Colonel Owen Williams, who for several years commanded the Blues, took place a fortnight ago at Temple House, Colonel Williams, placed near Marlow. Col. Wellesley, although only thirty-five years of age, is in very delicate health, and his bride, an amiable and accomplished woman, is unfortunately a cripple for life, owing to an accident when she was a child. She cannot stand without help, and has to be moved from room to room on a chair with wheels.

A gentleman from Winnipeg states that there are now on the line between St. Paul and Brandon three thousand cars loaded with the luggage and effects of emigrants to Manitoba and the Northwest.

The German Union Telegraph Company has completed the laying of a new direct cable from London to Valencia, for direct communication between Germany and the Anglo-American system.

NORTHWEST LANDS.

It is understood that the Government is reconsidering not only the question of colonization but also the propriety of leasing large tracts to ranchmen for range occupation. The present plan has not worked satisfactorily. It is impossible to keep a herd within the bounds of even a 10,000 acre range without a larger body of herders than it is desirable to employ. The small stock-rangers are also disposed to resent encroachment upon their rights. They claim that they first demonstrated the capabilities of the country for stock-raising. It is proposed that an arrangement might be made to let all the stock of one district run together, each owner contributing his share of the cost of herding.

The deadlock in the British Columbia Legislature has been broken after a block of four weeks.

Cardinal McCabe will take possession on Sunday of the Church of St. Sabino, Rome, from which he derives his title. The English community will present him with an address.

The French indirect taxes produced in the first two months of the year \$5,200,000 more than the estimates, and \$1,000,000 more than in the same period of 1881.

Numerous cases of the suffocation of coal passers on ocean steamers are reported from insufficient ventilation of the hot places where they are compelled to shovel coal into the furnaces hour after hour.

The Premier said at Ottawa that no less than 20,000 people have settled in the Northwest since January. It must not be forgotten, however, that a large proportion of these come from the older provinces.

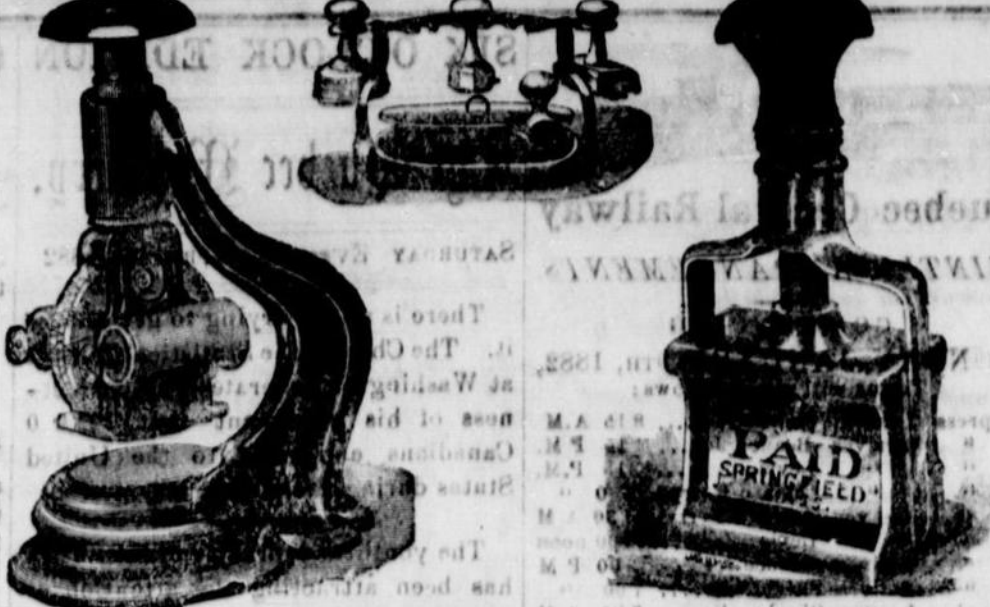

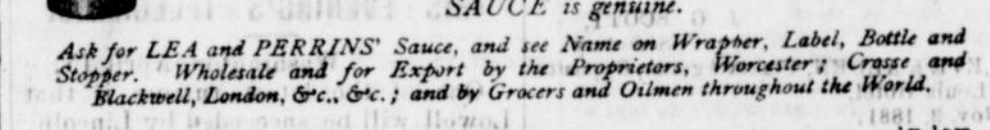
