## GERMANS AGITATE FOR BIGGER NAVY

### Naval League Conducting a Campaign for More Ships

Berlin, Oct. 3.—Hardly have the sounds of the salutes fired by the English fleet on its departure from Danzig ceased to reverberate than the systematic agitation carried on by the German Naval League for the strengthening and increase of Germany's naval power is renewed with increased vigor by means of a series of articles in the official and semi-official press. On this occasion it is not only an increased fleet which is being aimed at, but the construction of ships of greater displacement, enabling heavier armor and guns, which is being advocated, for, strange to say, the British fleet failed to create the overbearing impression upon the general public which the adherents of the league fondly hoped. According to various disparaging criticisms made by the English press during the visit, the German navy has nothing of importance to learn from the English navy, the German fleet series being a match for its British rival except in numbers and the size of its ships. The German sailors, it was stated, are better clothed, better housed, better fed, more amenable to discipline and of better physique than their British comrades, the relationship between officers and men is stated to be better than in vessels better equipped and kept in a better condition.

The size and armament of the English ships were however superior, and it is to this point, which cannot be gainsaid, that the league is calling attention through its various agencies. It is stated that the lessons learned in the Russo-Japanese war conclusively prove that Germany must increase the size of her battleships in order to keep up with other leading naval powers. Up to the present the largest German battleships are those of the Braunschweig class, which do not exceed 12,200 tons in displacement and which possess a draught of 7.8 metres. All the objections hitherto urged against the construction of larger ships have been based on the insubstantiality of increasing the draught of ships, whose main task in time of war would be to manoeuvre in the shallow waters of the Baltic and North seas in defence of the German coast. It is stated, that the following programme has been formulated:— 1. Construction of six new armored cruisers already officially announced. 2. Construction of seven new torpedo boat divisions (already officially announced). 3. Increase in the displacement of the battleships to be constructed. 4. Substitutes for the ships of the Bayern class, to be built in 1906 and 1907. 5. Substitutes for the Aguir type, to be constructed in 1907. 6. Substitution of armored cruisers for six obsolete protected cruisers.

## DOMINION NEWS TOLD IN A LINE

### One Day's Record of the Latest Happenings in Canada.

Charlottetown, P.E.I.—The P. E. I. exhibition of 1905 was concluded with fine weather. The total attendance for the four days was in the vicinity of 12,000 much smaller than last year, owing to the wet and cold weather of the entire week. North Sydney, N. S.—Two accidents are reported from New Campbellton, Victoria Co., one of which proved serious. Mrs. John McNeil was thrown from a wagon and killed instantly while John Clarke fell from a horse and dislocated his shoulder. Toronto-Victoria University has purchased the residence of Mr. John Bryan, which adjoins the grounds of the institution. It has not been decided whether the government will purchase the place. It is possible it will be converted into a museum or library. Moncton, N.B.—The well boring car, recently secured by the P.E.I., will be put in operation along the road, as it is the intention to sink more wells and construct some half a dozen new tanks. Some of the tanks are to be connected along the "Canada-Electric" recently acquired by the government. Glouce Bay, N.S.—There is a rumor afloat just now, which although it lacks confirmation from any authoritative source, is credited by many. If there is any truth in the rumor, the day is not far distant when there will be a merger of the two companies operating the largest coal mines in Eastern Cape Breton.

Toronto—At a special meeting of the Toronto and Niagara Electric Development Company this afternoon an agreement was made with the Toronto and Niagara Electric Railway, granting to the latter permission to construct an electric railway between Toronto and Niagara on a portion of the right-of-way of a power line. Niagara Falls, Ont.—The lottery outfit which was seized at Fort Erie by the provincial police a short time ago, and for operating which Hunt Island, P. E. Island, a committee was appointed by the convention to examine all available text books on Canadian history with a view of securing a new one.

Frederickton, N.B.—The University of New Brunswick, reopens on Monday for the term, and the indications are that the University will have a large number of students, a number of whom will enter for the second year. The total number of students enrolled last year was 1,500 and the University is expected to reach that number by the end of the term. North Sydney, N.S.—It is feared that the schooner My Beauty, Captain Roberts, started with a freight of lumber left this port on August 6th, with coal for Twillingate, Nfld., and has not been heard from since. She should have arrived at her destination within ten days at the latest. It is feared she was lost in the terrific gale of August 28th.

Sydney, N.S.—One of Sydney's oldest residents passed away recently in the person of Capt. Charles McFadden, who had reached the advanced age of ninety-one years. Capt. McFadden was a resident of Sydney for 70 years during the whole of his lifetime, excepting, of course, when he followed the sea, an occupation which he pursued for a great many years, having commanded a schooner owned

by himself up to the time of his retirement some years ago. Charlottetown, P.E.I.—At the closing sessions of the Provincial Teachers' convention, a resolution was passed recommending the government to appoint a commission to examine the school system with a view to suggest the needed amendments, the convention to be represented on the commission. New text books on botany and agriculture were recommended, the former to be written by a native of P. E. Island. A committee was appointed by the convention to examine all available text books on Canadian history with a view of securing a new one.

The principal question under consideration was the meeting of the Legislature, and with regard to this it was decided that unless exceptional circumstances arose to necessitate a change of plans, the House will be called together about the middle of January.

Such was the purport of the announcement made by Premier Gouin at the close of the meeting. As to the business that will engage attention it is too early to make a definite statement, but it is understood that the question of colonization will have a prominent place in the discussions of the House.

Mr. Rodolphe Forget, Conservative M.P. for Charlevoix, has been asked to resign his seat in the Dominion House because he has failed to keep any of the promises made by him in his election manifesto.

Mr. Forget signed by his constituents bids Mr. Forget remember the solemn obligations he made last November, when he spoke of his millions and his earnest desire to do them for the benefit of the people of Charlevoix.

Mr. Forget's reply has not yet been received. And if I do not fulfil these engagements, if the railway is not completed by next July I give up my word of honor that I will resign my office.

SENTENCE DAY IN KING'S BENCH

To-day was sentence day in the Court of King's Bench and His Honor Mr. Justice Tremblay passed sentence on six prisoners, convicted at recent sittings of the court.

The former sentence was given to 10-year H. Duce, the post office clerk convicted of stealing money from registered letters.

Before proceeding with the business of the day, Judge Tremblay delivered a brief address to the members of the press.

He wished to make a few remarks with regard to the press and the impartiality of the judges who preside in this court.

He said that the press should be maintained in this court as in all other courts, and that proper confidence in the impartiality of the judges should be maintained.

# WOMAN AND HER INTERESTS

### OUR LITTLE PEOPLE.

EVERYONE has noticed the difference between children who come from a cultivated, art-loving home and those of more commonplace environment which concern itself alone with the sense of considerations of shelter, food and raiment. Parents, so many of them, feel that their duty to their children is done when they have clothed and fed them, sent them to school, and to church, and given them a plain, comfortable home. They may be starving the imagination and the artistic sense of those children and never know it.

A child who has been taught to appreciate the loveliness of life and the glory of color has more meaning and significance does his life assume as he grows older. The child who is allowed to read his fill of fairy tales and mythology has a whole world opened up to him which his companions, whose home library consists of a few volumes of assorted trash, brought from wandering agents, must ever dwell with. It is of real help at school, too, let me tell those practical-minded persons who aver that a child would better be less well educated than better read. The child who has read a book of the mythological stories, will find his Latin and Greek much easier, as the various allusions will be understood at once. His story, too, will seem more like a continuation of a delightful tale-reading, rather than a dull chronicle of people he never heard of before. His compositions, his sketches, his, and composition-writing, that dread of the unimaginative child, will not prove impossible through lack of fancy.

The child who loves books and pictures and every-day ethics discussed at home will be unconsciously interested and influenced. Let us give our fathers and mothers have nothing to tell each other but neighboring gossip, or sharp recriminations about household expenses and personal inclinations, will also be influenced, and by the attitude of his parents which would serve to give him a stimulus in the direction of intellectual attainments. Home influence, home environment—these are the things that make or mar the child, though parents sometimes try to lay the responsibility on teachers or companions.

### POCKET MONEY FOR CHILDREN.

A question that is really of great importance to mothers, but which is treated very lightly, if given any thought at all, is the subject of pocket money for children. Mothers in moderate circumstances who find it difficult to make their expenses conform to their income, are naturally inclined not to allow a fixed sum to a child without serious inconvenience. And too often they ignore the wants of their offspring in this respect. The instinct of emulation is great in nearly all children, and when they are intimately associated with those who have pennies or nickels to spend they become discontented and consider themselves ill-treated. This is foolish and detrimental. No matter how small the amount may be, every child of eight

years and over should have a certain apportioned sum every week or month. If the mother thinks it advisable she should require some slight service in return, or the child may be allowed to purchase ribbons or handkerchiefs or school supplies. But it cannot be impressed too strongly on every woman that her child or children should be given a fixed amount at regular intervals. It is wise to have a fixed rule that no additions will be made to this regular allowance and that all expenses must be conforming to and regulated by it. The systematic habit of expenditure which this will develop in young girls and boys is really remarkable. The child who is used to a fixed allowance very seldom develops extravagant or slipshod methods in his or her accounts.

### For the Cook

#### GLUTEN WAFERS.

Mix one-half cup of sweet cream and one teaspoon of salt. Stir in gluten and roll out very thin. Cut in rounds and bake a delicate brown on an ungreased tin. These are more wholesome for children than many of the sweet cookies and are especially suitable for those who need to avoid starchy food.

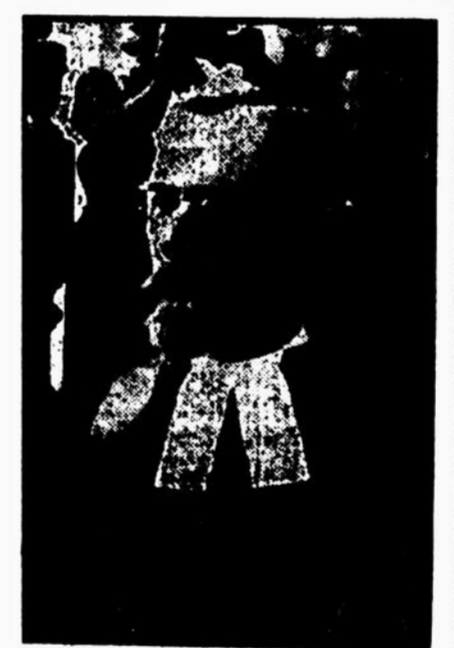

## CHURCH RE-OPENING AT THREE RIVERS

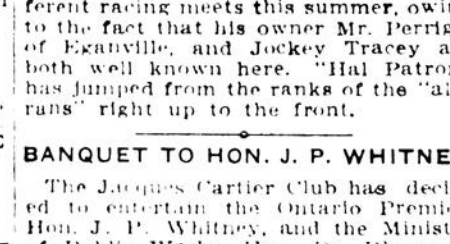
