## THOUSANDS ASSEMBLE ALONG ROYAL ROUTE HERE

### Business Association Meeting Monday

#### SESSION IS POSTPONED DUE TO DELAY OF ROYAL VISIT; OPEN TO PUBLIC

Fine Program Arranged for Meeting Taking Place in Victoria Hall — Door Prizes Will be Awarded Lucky Ticket Holders — Children Will Now be Permitted to Attend as Main Hall Has Been Engaged

Owing to the two-day delay in the arrival of the King and Queen, the "Citizens' Night" meeting of the Business Association of Westmount has been postponed until Monday evening, it was announced by officials of the organization yesterday.

However, the postponement will, in no way, dampen the spirit of the occasion as the attractive program of entertainment has been considerably augmented and all residents are assured of a particularly worthwhile evening.

Facilities have now been arranged to accommodate the largest crowd ever to assemble at a meeting of the local business body as the large upstairs auditorium in Victoria Hall has been booked for the event.

The original ruling banning minors from the session—due to insufficient seating capacity in the lower hall—has been lifted and those planning to attend the function are invited to bring their children.

The committee in charge of arrangements announces that a number of excellent prizes will be awarded to those holding winning door tickets.

Officials of the association have had a busy week arranging final plans for the meeting, but report that everything is now in readiness for a gala night on Monday.

The original date set for the session was postponed as it was felt that persons planning to view the Royal procession would be too tired to attend a meeting of the association that same evening.

Mayor Walter A. Merrill, K.C., W. R. Bulloch, M.L.A., and Miss Harold Mills, president of the Westmount Women's Club, have been invited to occupy the platform.

An important feature of the event will be the installation of a public address system that will make the voices of all taking part in the program, clearly heard from all parts of the hall.

The deputation will be headed by Canon Ausan Phelps Stokes of Washington, D.C., chairman of the Stokes Foundation, one of the largest philanthropic endowments in the United States. He will preach in the church of St. James the Apostle. Rev. Dr. Leslie Auman will preach at St. Andrew's church, Westmount, and Rev. Victor Mills for Dr. Leslie Pidgeon in the church of St. Andrew's.

Dr. Vruivink, of the Fort Washington Collegiate Church, will be the guest preacher at St. Andrew's church. Dr. A. B. Cohoe will bring greetings from American Baptist to the First Baptist church, of Montreal, and Dr. Alfred Walton will represent Congregationalism in Emmanuel Church.

The Unitarians will be represented in the church of the Messiah by Dr. J. H. Lathrop, who will exchange with Dr. Lawrence Clare. The Jewish community will be represented by Rabbi Dr. Harry Stern.

Similar pulpits exchanges are taking place all along the International Border. They are arranged by the World Alliance for International Friendship through the churches of which Mr. Harry Holmes of New York is executive secretary.

#### EFFORT MADE TO SAFEGUARD CITY'S HEALTH

**Dr. F. M. A. McNaughton Issues Instructions on Extermination of Rats**

In an effort to maintain a high standard of public health in the City of Westmount a series of articles explaining necessary measures that should be taken by residents is currently being released for publication by Dr. F. M. A. McNaughton, head of the municipal health bureau.

The second in the series, giving hints on how to exterminate rats, follows:

The brown rat is a most prolific animal — so much so that under ideal conditions, a pair could multiply to over 1,000 in a year.

Rats always frequent places affording good shelter, food and drink.

The first preventive measure is strict cleanliness of premises and removal of all edible refuse or food supply from their reach.

**A Few Don'ts**  
 Don't throw out slices of bread for birds as the rats get most of it and are encouraged to remain about the premises.  
 Don't leave garbage unwrapped or in an uncovered can.  
 Don't fill garbage cans too full — have the cover fit tightly.  
 Don't spill garbage on the ground outside.

#### MANY ATTEND ANNUAL Y.M.C.A. MEETING HERE

W. E. Cooper Paid Special Tribute to Special Work Accomplished

Nearly one hundred members of the Y. sat down to supper on Friday evening, to take part in the twenty-seventh annual meeting of the Association.

Wm. E. Cooper, chairman of the Board of Management in his report; paid tribute to the splendid work done throughout the year by the group of voluntary workers, making special mention of the Women's Auxiliary. He closed his remarks with a quotation by Eugene Barnett, of the International Committee: "To keep alive in Youth a sense of their dignity and spiritual beings, to awaken their faith in God as the source of their human faculties and potentialities, to point them to Christ as the pioneer of life at its best, and to do all of this through proved methods which youth can understand — this is the business of the Y.M.C.A."

Col. Irving P. Rexford, alderman of Westmount, was the speaker of the evening. He spoke of his recent trip to the Mediterranean and especially about Gibraltar. In closing Col. Rexford stated that all Montreals should take pride in being British subjects on Thursday when the King passes, because of the part that Britain plays in world peace. Let us have a feeling of pride as we see the procession pass.

"Think what it means to be British, probably more than we can properly appreciate. Take pride in what Britain stands for, and the part that Great Britain and particularly her Prime Minister, play in the cause of world peace."

The secretary, W. H. Spearman in delivering his report, stated that almost 2000 different boys had been served through the activities of the Association during the year just closed. Employment was obtained for 35 young men during the year, 130 Westmount boys attended Camp Kanawana, during the summer.

Swimming proved to be a popular activity over 15,000 persons using the pool.

## THROUGHS GATHER TO VIEW PROCESSION; DECORATIONS REFLECT FESTIVE SPIRIT

Local Residents and Thousands From Other Points Assemble at Early Hour — Police Face One of the Busiest Days in Their History — School Children Given Souvenirs

Thousands of local residents, their number augmented by countless others from Notre Dame de Grace, Montreal West, points along the Lakeshore and Verdun, assembled along the route of the Royal procession in Westmount to welcome the King and Queen.

The air of festivity that pervades the entire country manifested itself to a high degree here. Municipal buildings, private residences and business houses were gaily decorated for the occasion early in the week and were in full readiness.

The desire of the general public to catch a glimpse of the King and Queen and to demonstrate their allegiance to the Crown was testified to by the fact that thousands of persons sought vantage points on the route long before noon hour.

Police were prepared at an early hour to face one of the busiest days in their history. All vehicular traffic was barred from the area bounded by Sunnyside, Grosvenor, and Western avenues from 10 a.m. in order to give pedestrians an opportunity to make comparatively rapid progress along the streets.

The past week has been an active one for municipal officials, the two-day delay requiring a number of alterations in original plans.

In order that they may long remember the historic event all children attending public schools were presented with attractive souvenir letter openers and book marks on Monday by the City Council.

The presentations were made by: Mayor Walter A. Merrill, K.C., at Roslyn School; Ald. C. K. MeLeod, Westmount High School; Ald. I. P. Rexford, King's School; Ald. Douglas Lorimer, Queen's School. The ceremonies were conducted at 2 o'clock.

Ald. B. Panet Raymond made the presentations at St. Paul's Academy and St. Leo's Academy, at 2 and 2.30 o'clock respectively.

Last week, Captain Richardson presented three lanyards to boys who have undertaken special duties and carried them through for a period of six months. ## A ROYAL WELCOME!

Montreal has been ablaze with flags and bunting these last few days in anticipation of the visit of Their Majesties, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth. At no previous time in this city's history have our streets been so gaily or so extensively decorated — we are truly giving our Sovereigns a royal welcome! So great has the enthusiasm become that traffic was at a standstill on the royal route last Sunday as tens of thousands of motorists attempted to drive over it to view the pageantry, and so blocked the streets that special details of police had to be put on traffic duty. Everywhere one sees patriotic emblems — illuminated glass crowns, coloured lights and flares, flags, bunting, crests, photos and paintings of Their Majesties — on automobiles, buses, tram cars, trucks, bicycles, buildings of all descriptions, telephone poles.

Truth to tell, many Canadians are surprised at their own enthusiasm. We are a phlegmatic people, and it was generally believed that we would give The King and Queen a warm and sincere, but undemonstrative welcome. But our hospitality became more expressive as they set foot on our soil, the whole country was ablaze with colour and enthusiasm.

## QUEBEC WOMEN DON'T LAUGH!

Two hundred years ago, in Britain, women were discriminated against almost as much as they are today, in Quebec. For instance, in the Year of Grace 1700, the British Parliament enacted the following choice legislation: "That all women, of whatever age, rank, profession, or degree, whether virgin, maid, or widow, that shall from and after such act, impose upon and betray into matrimony any of His Majesty's loyal subjects, by means of scents, paints, cosmetic washes, artificial teeth, false hair, Spanish wool, iron stays, hoops, or high-heeled shoes, shall incur the penalty of the law now in force against witchcraft and like misdemeanors, and that the marriage shall, upon conviction, stand null and void."

People today laugh at the ridiculousness of such laws, as they laugh at anything that smacks of burlesque. But the women of Quebec don't laugh, for there are on the statutes of this province many laws equally as vicious

as that quoted above. For example, there is the case of the man who deserted his wife and young children. Many years later he returned, broke and disreputable, to find that in his absence his wife had made a success of the farm and was educating the children and putting a little money away. He sold the farm at auction, seized her savings, and deserted her a second time, leaving her and the children absolutely destitute except for the charity of the neighbours. That is one example of scores that could be mentioned Only in Quebec are such things legally possible in this country. How long, do you imagine, such laws would be tolerated, once women had the right to vote?

## GREAT BOOSTS FOR CANADA

For the past quarter century the interest of British business leaders in Canada has been somewhat superseded by the Americans, due in some measure at least to the much greater publicity this country has had in the United States than in England. Because we have been better known among Americans than among the British, the former have been more active in taking advantage of the opportunities this country affords to investors. The visit of The King and Queen to Canada has been made the subject of a special edition of The London Times in which the opportunities open to British business men in Canada are stressed. The edition is quite the best of its kind yet published in the Old Country on the subject of Canada, we are informed, and a glance through its pages makes that statement easy to believe. Excellent views of various parts of this country, together with maps, accompany the articles. A greeting from the Canadian Prime Minister, and articles by Hon. Vincent Massey, the High Commissioner in London, and by Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett on some of his Canadian experiences, open the edition. There are also articles by Hon. Fernand Rinfret, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Leon Mercier Gouin, and others on various aspects of the Canadian scene and our relations with the Motherland; an article by Mrs. Pierre Casgrain on Women's Work in Canada; an article by Hon. Robert Manion, and one by Hon. Ian Mackenzie. Canadian business and finance are also dealt with at length, while there are articles on the railroads by both Sir Edward Beatty and Mr. Hungerford. The format of the issue is such as to present the material in most attractive style. Some two million copies have been distributed in Great Britain — publicity of inestimable value to Canada.

The delay in the Royal Party reaching Canada is unfortunate, but understandable. It is probable that when the Empress of Australia left England, no one outside the ship's officers and the officials of the Admiralty knew what course she would take, and there were no doubt good reasons for sending her far north of the route the commercial lines are taking at this time of the year.

## PITY THE POOR RUG, KEEP IT CLEAN

I have always pitied the poor rug. It seems to me it is treated with great disrespect. Yet it is such a rugged individual! Year after year it is walked on, scuffed by shuffling feet, Tommy drags his toys across, Sussie in a tantrum kicks it, Towser's sharp claws dig into it, a careless guest spills the contents of his glass upon it and many other indignities are heaped on it. No wonder I say "Pity the poor rug!"

But to my mind, the greatest burden of all that the rug has to bear is sheer neglect. Year in and year out it is dashed over with a carpet sweeper or touched up with a vacuum cleaner. Both good friends of a rug, but inadequate, like a sympathetic neighbour who dutifully applies surface treatment when your sickness is inside and what you really need is a doctor. This all set me to thinking about my rugs. They showed no signs of wear but they looked dull and insipid. Once they glowed with life, but over the years they seemed to have lost their school-girl complexion.

I spoke about it to a friend who said "Wash them, you silly. You wash your curtains, you wash your clothes—why not wash your rugs?" "But how do you wash a rug?" said I. "You don't," she said. "It's done for you and it is really inexpensive. Go down to Morgan's Beaver Hall Factories and see how the trick is done. Or don't go," she said, "if you are not interested in the process, but are only interested in the results — just call them." I was curious, so I went to the factory and here is what I saw:

I was taken to the carpet-cleaning department where I saw a great pile of domestic and oriental rugs waiting to be cleaned. Morgan's incidentally, is a member of the Certified Rug Cleaners' Institute, a body of experts that has made a deep study of the whole question of rug care.

I saw one of the carpets put through the beating machine. It was fed through rollers on a flat smooth steel plate, perforated with numerous small holes, as it proceeded through the machine it was beaten, gently but thoroughly with a series of flexible leather straps. The dust thus loosened fell through the hole into the lower part of the machine from where it was carried away by a suction fan into a central dust collector. The amount of dust and grit removed was amazing. After it was beaten it was spread flat on the sloping concrete wash floor where a special rug soap was applied to the rug in such a way that the soap solution would penetrate thoroughly. The heavy lather, soft and creamy, is worked right into the rug with a special machine. This soap gives a lovely softness to fabrics. It renews wool fibres, that, due to loss of their original oil, have become harsh and dry. Then comes thorough rinsings, floods of water, until the water runs clear.

Next — immersion in a tank of clear water to make quite sure there's no soap or dirt left, and then the rug was fed flat and square into one of the biggest wringers I've ever seen, and it came out glowing like new again. Then the rug goes to the drying room, where it is hung fair and square just like the others drying there. After it has been dried, it is steamed and brushed and inspected. — Any that are to be repaired or repaired are sent to the repair department, those that need sizing are resized and are made ready to be sent back to its owner, glowing with refreshed beauty, "a thing of beauty and a joy forever," rejuvenated and ready for the extra years added to its life span by regular and expert cleaning.

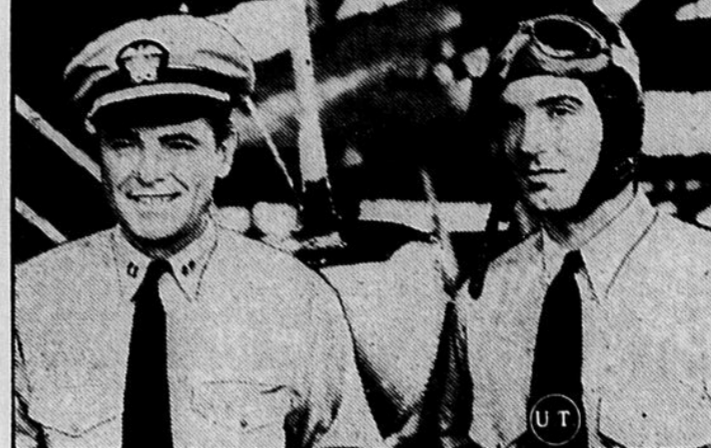

Horse Is Star And He Demands Special Trailer

A trailer, fit for a king, was built for a race horse at a motion picture studio.

Out of fifty-seven animals tested at Hollywood Park in Inglewood for the role of the race horse in "Stablemates," which starred Wallace Beery and Mickey Rooney, and now playing at the Snowdon United Theatre until Saturday, a three-year-old mare, Maiden Brave, was picked.

The owner, Herb Row, was willing that the horse should work at the studio, but when he heard of location trips to Malibu, San Diego, Balboa and other points along the Coast, he balked at the idea.

Row explained that he had to keep his horse fit for the Del Mar meet. In order to change his mind, Director Sam Wood had a special trailer built.

The trailer contained enough room for two horses. This was done because Maiden Brave is less nervous when traveling in the company of another animal. It was air-cooled by means of a noiseless machine and could also be heated in case of cold nights while the company was enroute to a far-off location.

After many tests, the mechanics found that regulation plane tires, such as are used on Mainliners, would eliminate all bumps and shakes. Next to the horse, on either side, were padded walls in case of sharp turns.

## Asters Which Resist Wilt Easiest Variety To Grow

If you have trouble growing asters, why not try some of the wiltresistant strains this year? They are a family of asters which have been grown in soil infected by the wilt disease (most common ailment of asters) and have shown ability to throw off the disease and survive where others die.

They have exceptional vigor, and seem to overcome all difficulties better than the standard bred strains. They are not resistant to any specific disease except wilt, and where the yellows disease is prevalent, not all the wilt resistant plants will escape. But some will, and in general it has been found that those who have trouble growing asters get far better results with the resistant strains.

Nearly all the types and colors are now obtainable in wilt resistant strains.

A succession of asters may be obtained in two ways—by starting the latest types early in the house or in a frame and making successive plantings until they may be sown in the open ground, or by sowing early, mid-season and late types at the same time.

The giant branching type is one of the most satisfactory and the showiest of the asters. It makes a beautiful bed, and is fine for cutting, its huge, delicate blossoms being as soft and finished looking as the florists' cut flowers. They grow up to three feet in a wide range of colors.

The ostrich feather, or crego type, with their plume-like heads, resemble the chrysanthemum, and are almost as large. The petals are curled and twisted into a soft ball of delicate color, supported on a straight stem, which makes them ideal for indoor decoration. Like the rose, a single bloom will show off well in a vase.

More sensational is the California sunshine type, with its daisy-like contour which belies the aster heritage. Their loosely placed outside petals usually contrast in color with the creamy yellow or blue centres, and they grow up to three feet tall.

The seed should be sown thinly to make transplanting easy and save waste of plants in spindling, over-crowded seedlings. They should be transplanted from the original seed box or pot one inch apart as soon as the first true leaves are formed and grown until ready to set into the open ground.

## Floral Color Is Important

In our small gardens, classifications tend to disappear. The orthodox types of garden design become strangely mixed. The formal and the informal, the natural and architectural, often mingle, and, strange to say, the effect may be delightful.

It should be said that the controlling purpose of modern garden design is to display the beauty of the flowers and plants which grow in the garden. There can be no beauty in a garden greater than the beauty of its plants; and the design is good in proportion to its success in displaying at their best the natural grace, form and colour of the garden's horticultural treasures.

This trend toward simplicity of garden design is in harmony with dress design, interior decoration and other branches of the decorative arts. And like the others, the garden relies for much of its effect upon the studied use of color.

There are still to be found in our formal gardens geometrical beds and bi-symmetrical grouping of ornaments which might have been copied from mid-Victorian models; but nowhere nowadays, except in public parks and railway station grounds, sadly out of date is the carpet-bedding fashion followed, in which plants were required to surrender their individual charm and become merely pigments with which a gardener embroidered curious patterns on the lawn.

Patterns which would have been recognized as commonplace or ugly had they been woven in textiles were supposed to acquire merit from the fact that to make them hundreds of beautiful plants were sacrificed. Formal beds now do not call for stiff and formal planting, but in them flowers are grown in their natural grace and beauty, so arranged, as to both form and color, that the feeling of balance essential to any good design is preserved.

Such arrangements are dependent upon skilful color grouping for their major charm; and where can be found a greater opportunity for the pleasing use of color than in a garden?

Flowers are color. They afford an infinite range of material ready to the hand of the artist who would combine them in a picture. It is not strange that the wave of color consciousness which has spread over the world and so strongly influenced our fashions in dress and decoration should focus in our gardens.

Don't let spring get too far advanced before reseeding the bare spots in the lawn, and applying plant food.

If your perennial border was straggly and barren in spots last year, plan ahead of time for annuals to fill in the dull places.

Make your garden habit a hobby by specializing in a few flowers and vegetables.

**On Sowing Carrot Seeds**

Years ago carrots were only thought of in connection with soups or as a vegetable dish, but today, with their increasing popularity for jams and pies, they should be included in all vegetable gardens.

If you are planning to grow carrots for exhibition purposes, you will want them long, tapering and smooth, without any deformities from stony soil. After cultivating the land, push an iron bar into the soil for about two feet. Remove the bar and fill this hole with sifted soil. Next place a few seeds in the hole. Later thin the young plants, leaving but one plant in each hole.

Carrot seeds should not be sown if the soil is wet enough to cling to the tools, or just before a rain. If a heavy rain follows sowing it beats the soil down so hard that the seeds are not apt to sprout.

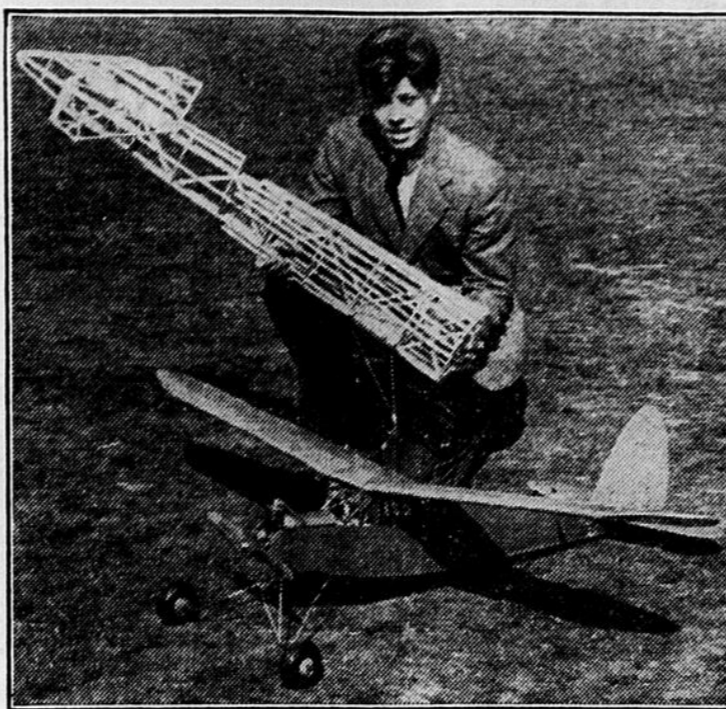

Illions, who incidentally has several concessions at the Frisco World Fair and the New York World Fair, has moved "Bozo" to a more prominent spot on the midway opposite the Magic Carpet.

Rex Billings, Jr., in the promotional department of Belmont Park announces that even at this early date 64 picnics have been booked, including several big ones, and including the Notre Dame de Grace Businessmen's Association days, which will be held in July. There are several other picnic bookings in the offing, and organizations are learning the wisdom of making arrangements early.

Feature outdoor attractions for opening week will be Eric the Great, a high perch artist, working 240 feet in the air. Eric the

## MILLION SOUGHT FOR CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL FUND

Campaign for Worthy Cause Will be Launched On June 5th — Need is Great

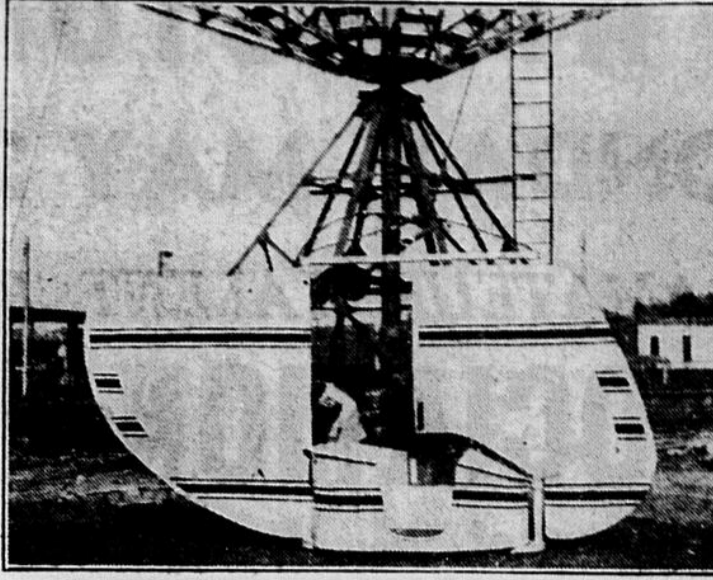
One million dollars is the objective of the campaign in aid of the Children's Memorial Hospital, which will be held from June 5 to June 13, it was announced today. "The million dollars is needed to complete the hospital and to include a new wing which will provide more adequate operating rooms, kitchens, store rooms, dining rooms, laboratories, X-ray department, lecture room and class rooms. Present buildings must be remodeled and additional equipment, which is badly needed, purchased if the institution, founded in 1903, is to function properly; while the laundry must be enlarged and supplied with new equipment," the official announcement stated.

Over and above the cost of these extensions and improvements \$105,338 is required to pay off accumulated operating deficits and \$202,662 to meet estimated deficits for the next three years.

**6,000 Patients a Year**  
"At the present time, more than 6,000 patients pass through the hospital every year and over 25,000 through the out-patient department, but the hospital is badly handicapped by lack of sufficient space.

"For instance, the hospital only has one small operating room and

if an emergency case comes in while a patient is being operated on, the emergency case must wait. "A separate room for administering anaesthetics to patients before operation is also urgently needed as well as a room for nurses and surgeons to scrub and sterilize their hands before approaching a patient awaiting operation.

"The hospital also needs more space for their laboratories, which are now mostly in the basement, sharing space with offices, autopsy room, plaything-storeroom, etc.

**Need More Accommodation**  
"More accommodation must be provided for physiotherapy, occupational therapy, recreational

therapy, all very important to children recovering from sickness. The hospital needs an entirely new X-ray plant, and more space for it an daisio for kitchens, laundry and other services. More ward space, to permit dividing the children into groups of six or eight, must be provided, so that segregation can be assured when contagious cases are discovered.

"This is a hospital which helps children of all classes, races and creeds without question. Last year in 93 per cent of the cases, the hospital treated the patients free of cost because of their inability to pay, or received the Quebec government grant of from \$1.00 to \$2.00 a day, which in these cases alone left a net daily

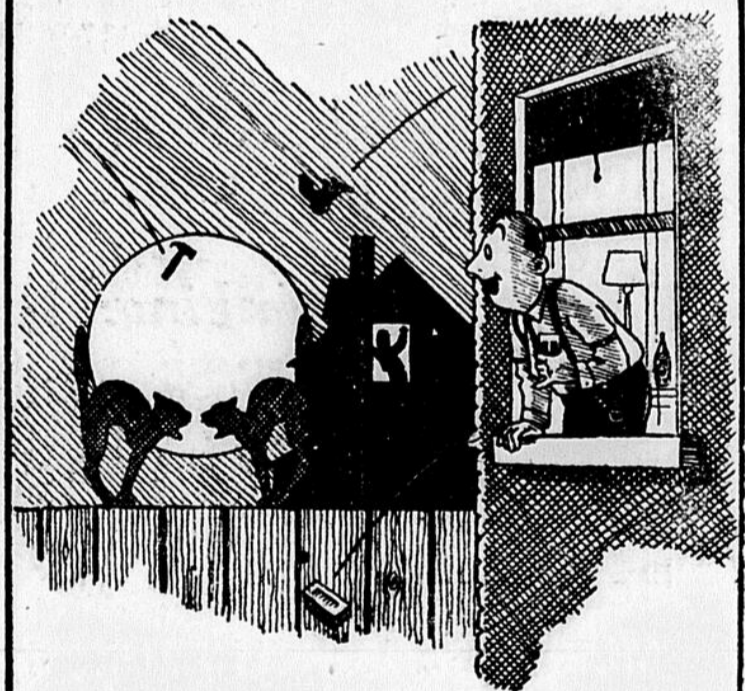

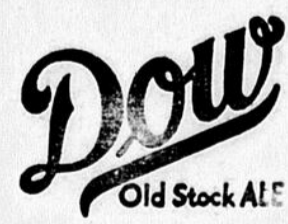
