PARLIAMENT REFUSED TO PLACE A BAN ON TITLE HONORS IN CANADA

Vote on Near-Straight Party Lines Resulted in Labor Member's Motion Being Turned Down by 113 to 94—Progressive Members Offered Chief Opposition to His Majesty's Rewards to Canadians for Distinguished Public Service—One Liberal Member Voted With Government and Two Conservatives With Opposition.

Ottawa, March 15.—Canadians who rendered distinguished public service should receive recognition from the King in the form of titles and honors, the House of Commons has decided. In rejecting a new move to ban titles in Canada, the House yesterday upheld Premier R. B. Bennett's view that titles are not out of place in the Canadian scene.

The vote taken yesterday was the largest of the session and resulted in the rejection of the resolution of Humphrey Mitchell, Labor member for Hamilton East, that "the Prime Minister should not recommend Canadians for titles." All the Conservatives present but two to a number of 113 voted against the resolution, and all Liberals, Farmers and Laborites but one to the number of ninety-four voted in favor.

The Conservative bolters were George Spotton, North Huron, and Dr. I. D. Cotnam, North Renfrew. On the Liberal side the only titled member, Sir Eugene Fiset, of Rimouski, voted with the Government.

The debate was remarkably short for such a contentious matter. Opposition members generally accepted the suggestion of Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, that they refrain from speaking in order to make sure an early vote was recorded. Mr. King declared the people of Canada were opposed to titles and wanted to know where Parliament stood on the matter.

Defending the Government's stand in naming several Canadians for honors at New Year's, Mr. Bennett told the House the conferment of honors was one of the earliest acts of governments of which there was any record. Persons who rendered unselfish service to their country deserved some recognition. The bestowal of titles, he claimed, did not create class distinctions.

All men were not equal, Mr. Bennett said. Some were endowed with qualities others did not possess. Recognition of this fact was no negation of the principles of democracy.

"Big men have refused titles and little men should not be given them," declared Mr. Spotton in announcing his difference with his party leaders. Mr. Spotton charged Mackenzie King with inconsistency and with seeking to gain political advantage from the issue. He said Mr. King had refrained from opposing a motion to send the titles question to a committee in 1929.

Miss Agnes Macphail, Progressive member for Grey South East, declared good deeds and public service brought their own reward. Any person who performed public service for the sake of an honor or a title was unworthy of any recognition.

Robert Burns was called into the debate as an authority on the title question when E. J. Garland, Irish-born U.F.A. member for Bow River, quoted from the Scottish poet:

"The rank is but the guinea's stamp, The man's the gowd for a' that," and other passages in support of the anti-titles move by the English-born member for Hamilton East.

"Burns knew his home," said Mr. Garland. He declared he and Mr. Burns came from countries where titles were a curse. It was for this reason they did not want them foisted on Canada and objected to the Government's policy, which he described as "going back to the dark ages."

Reports throughout the country that the Senate had passed the sweepstakes bill when it had only given it second reading were protested in the Senate yesterday by Rt. Hon. George P. Graham, one of the leading opponents of the measure. The Upper House was not yet through with the bill, he said, and it has still time to turn it down.

Today the House of Commons continues with government business and will resume the consideration of the estimate of the new legislation may also be introduced.

SENATE PROBE OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS IS SUGGESTED

Ottawa, March 15.—Hon. C. W. Robinson, Moncton, N.B., moved in the Senate today for the setting up of a special committee with wide powers to inquire into the public accounts and report of the Auditor General of Canada. Senator Robinson's resolution was as follows: "That a special committee be appointed to take into consideration and report from time to time upon the public accounts of Canada, the reports of the Auditor General, together with current accounts, and the estimates for the fiscal year 1934-35, with power to call for persons, papers and records; to employ counsel, clerical and stenographic assistance as required."

A HEATED DEBATE CAUSED BY TRANSLATION MEASURE

Ottawa, March 15.—The translation bill, which had a stormy first and second reading in the House of Commons, precipitated a warm discussion when it came before the civil service committee yesterday, ending with the withdrawal of E. R. E. Chevrier, Liberal for Ottawa. Mr. Chevrier led a request by Liberal members of the committee for the right to call certain witnesses whose opinions had been quoted by Hon. C. H. Cahan, Secretary of State, when the bill was in second reading. The witnesses proposed, Canon Emile Chartier, Vice-Rector of University of Montreal, and Paul de

SAMUEL INSULL VANISHES FROM ATHENS HOUSE

Athens, March 15.—Mrs. Samuel Insull, Sr., admitted today that her husband, former Chicago utilities operator, had fled from Athens, but declared she did not know where he had gone.

The police detained two maids and one man servant for examination. Previously in the day Greek government officials had declared Insull had to leave Greece before midnight.

CITY WRECKED AND MANY DEAD IN EXPLOSION

La Libertad, Thirty Miles from San Salvador, Mass of Smoking Ruins Today, With at Least One Hundred and Fifty Dead.

San Salvador, El Salvador, March 15.—Much of the city of La Libertad is a mass of smoking ruins today, leveled by fire which spread after a port explosion in which about 150 persons were killed.

The blast, which could be heard here in the capital about thirty miles away, occurred when dynamite exploded as it was being unloaded from a ship at the docks.

Flames spread quickly to buildings and swept over many blocks. The city hall and a church were among the important buildings consumed.

Hundreds of firemen were rushed from San Salvador along with scores of relief workers whose automobiles dashed in and out of the danger zones, carrying the injured to hospitals here.

Today, National Guardsmen and Red Cross workers were joined by officials in directing remaining rescue work. The President and high government officials rushed to the scene yesterday.

In all, it was said about 250 cases of dynamite went up in the explosion. Officials said they believed sparks from a locomotive set off the blast.

It was said that not one man of those handling the explosives escaped death. Four customs agents and a telegraph operator died also. It was feared other deaths might follow among the injured.

La Libertad—the most important port of entry for the capital—is linked with San Salvador by a modern asphalt highway. It has a population of approximately five thousand. It is a vacation resort and many visitors were there, although it was reported most of them were out on the beaches.

FUNERAL CORTEGE HALTED BY NON-SUPPORT CHARGE

Prominent New Yorker Arrested on Complaint of Wife While Attending Funeral of His Mother—Left Substantial Legacy.

New York, March 15.—Socially prominent Elisha Payne Jewett Burgess will receive the income from \$100,000 under the will of his mother whose funeral was halted while he was enroute on a non-support charge.

The funeral of Mrs. Ruth Payne Burgess was delayed and rerouted yesterday when a warrant officer who had been seeking Burgess for a year stepped into a mourners' coach and arrested him.

The cortege went to Children's Court and Burgess was arraigned on a complaint by his wife, Mrs. Annette Burgess, that he had not supported her and their eleven-year-old daughter for three years.

Burgess was paroled in the custody of his attorney and the funeral proceeded. Later his mother's will was probated in Newport, R.I., disclosing the bequest.

Mrs. Burgess, a painter, was the widow of Prof. John W. Burgess, founder of the School of Political Science at Columbia University. Her forty-eight-year-old son is a mining engineer.

The warrant officer said he served the writ because he would have been without authority had he followed the funeral to a New Jersey crematory.

STATISTICS ON CANADIAN WHEAT TRADE MADE PUBLIC

Canadian Wheat in Store on March 9 Amounted to 228,337,000 Bushels Compared With 229,325,000 Week Before.

Ottawa, March 15.—Canadian wheat in store on March 9 amounted to 228,337,000 bushels compared with 229,325,000 the week before and 223,453,000 on the corresponding date of 1933. Canadian wheat in the United States amounted to 8,873,000 bushels, of which 3,041,000 were at Buffalo, 2,072,000 at New York and 2,759,000 at Albany. This compared with 7,482,000 on the same date last year, of which 5,556,000 were at Buffalo, 284,000 at New York and 905,000 at Boston. United States wheat in Canada was shown as 2,229,000 compared with 6,524,000.

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING MEASURE TODAY'S FEATURE IN LEGISLATURE

Bill Providing Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council With Authority to Bind All Concerns in Same Industry on Working Hours and Wage Rates Distributed to Members—Modification of Restrictions on Sale of Wood from Colonist Lots Demanded.

Quebec, March 15.—The precedent-setting bill giving the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council power to bind all concerns in the same industry to collective agreements between groups of employees and employers today was studied by Quebec Legislative Assembly members.

The redrafted form of the bill, sponsored by Hon. C. J. Arcand, Minister of Labor, was distributed in the House yesterday in preparation for its formal presentation in the Assembly. As originally drawn up the bill provoked criticism from many sections of labor bodies. After delegations had been heard, the bill was redrafted by Mr. Arcand.

The bill provides that if a collective agreement on working hours and wage rates has been made between an employees' association and employers, the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council—the Cabinet—is empowered to rule, at discretion, that the agreement shall be binding on employers and employees in the same trade or industry. A board of examiners would rule on a dispute of the agreement which would govern all individual labor contracts in connection with the trade or industry.

The measure takes into account inter-provincial and foreign countries competition in relation to a company operating under a collective agreement. If the cabinet is of the opinion a firm is liable to suffer "serious injury from such competition," application of the provisions of the Act may be refused.

Colonization provided the main feature of the sessions in the House yesterday, with Hector Laferte, Liberal member for Abitibi, proposing adoption of a code similar to the N.R.A. in the United States and permission for colonists to ship cut wood to the United States.

For the welfare of the colonists and lumberjacks the setting up of a code of consideration by the Government, he declared, in speaking on his motion for production of certain documents concerning colonization. As the Canadian forestry industry was not in a position to buy wood at such a reasonable price, colonists cutting wood on their own lots should be free to ship it to the United States, he stated.

Edgar Rochette, Liberal, Charlevoix-Saguenay; Medrie Duval, Liberal, Montclair, and C. A. Paquet, Liberal, Montmagny, spoke on the motion, debate on which was adjourned by Premier L. A. Taschereau.

During the evening session, Hon. Hector Laferte, Minister of Colonization, Game and Fisheries, defended the Government's policy on colonization and declared there were vast impressions being propagated concerning the attitude of lumber companies to colonists.

Part of the central span and finishing work on the approaches had yet been completed, the Minister said.

Maurice Duplessis, leader of the Opposition, engaged with the Minister in a long debate regarding the cost of different bridges in the province, referring particularly to the new Saguenaw bridge, in connection with which he was told it would cost altogether about \$2,600,000—about \$400,000 less than the original estimate.

PROVINCE READY TO AID TRI-FLUVIAN OBSERVANCE

Quebec, March 15.—The Quebec Government has not entered into any negotiations with the Federal authorities regarding grants for the forthcoming tercentenary celebrations at Three Rivers, but it still prepared to contribute \$100,000 towards the city's foundation anniversary, provided the Ottawa Government will do likewise, declared Premier L. A. Taschereau.

Renewed interest had been taken in the matter as a result of questions by Charles Bourgeois, Conservative M.P. for Three Rivers, in the House of Commons. Mr. Bourgeois asked if there were any negotiations between the federal government and the Quebec government regarding their contributions to the tercentenary celebrations; and was told by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett that the answer was in the negative.

The Premier recalled that recently the Legislature passed a bill authorizing expenditure of the \$100,000 mentioned on the condition that a like amount was contributed by Ottawa.

IRELAND SEEKS TO RETAIN ITS NATIVE TONGUE

Dublin, March 15.—To discourage the use of the English language in the native-Irish speaking areas of the west and south, the Free State government has decided to provide for payment of an annual bounty of ten dollars to parents in respect of each child under the age of sixteen years.

Only parents who can produce evidence from local clergymen and school inspectors that the use of the English language is completely prohibited in their homes will receive Mr. De Valera's bounties. It is also stipulated that the children should be diligent attendants at the schools where Irish is the language of instruction.

The Department of Education feared the deaths of the older native-Irish speakers would inflict severe blows on the language revival and that the districts would be "corrupted" by the visits of purely English-speaking tourists.

There is little doubt the effect of the holiday-at-home movement is felt in the Irish-speaking areas. City dwellers from the eastern coast have little knowledge of Gaelic, and their presence during the summer months has gone a long way to making the simple "fisher-folk" feel their language is, perhaps, slightly unfashionable.

In the "Gaeltacht," as the districts are called, the inhabitants for the most part eke out a livelihood fishing and gathering kelp from the sea, and though they are very poor their families are the largest in the country. The average number of children in an Irish speaker's family is about eight, so that Mr. De Valera's decision to award bounties is certain to be well received.

MURDER THREAT IS CARRIED OUT BY KIDNAPPERS

Snatchers Blind-folded and Shot Down Their Victim When Their Demand for Ransom Was Ignored.

New York, March 15.—Kidnappers of Max Kasoff called members of his family last week demanding \$5,000 ransom "or we'll send him home in pieces—an ear first."

Altogether there were four phone calls. The last one on Sunday night said: "So you notified the police, eh? O.K. We fix."

Today members of the family went to Rockville Centre, Long Island, to identify Max Kasoff's body. He had been blindfolded, shot twice in the head and once through the neck, and there was a deep head cut where he had been struck, probably with a length of pipe.

The body was found early yesterday in front of a billboard on Oceanside, Long Island. It was frozen and was nearly covered with snow. The medical examiner fixed the hour of Kasoff's death as early Monday morning—a few hours after the telephone call in which the kidnappers announced: "We fix."

Kasoff, who was thirty-seven years old and well-known in the automobile rental business, disappeared from home last Thursday night. His family did not take seriously the first demand for ransom because of Kasoff's reputation as a practical joker.

The receipt of a letter calling for payment of \$5,000 and the receipt of calls with threats of murder convinced the family, however, that this was no hoax. They reported Kasoff missing, but did not tell the police of the kidnappers' threats.

This was the first kidnapping for ransom in many months in New York, so far as police records show, and one of the few cases in which the failure to pay ransom was followed by the murder of the host.

PROGRESS BEING MADE IN OPENING CHANNEL IN ICE

Government Icebreaker, Forcing Way Through Ice-Choked St. Lawrence River, Last Night Dropped Anchor Off Berthier-ville.

Quebec, March 15.—Forcing a passage through the ice-choked St. Lawrence river with ease, the government icebreaker N.B. McLean last night dropped anchor off Berthier-ville, at the foot of Lake St. Peter, and practically opposite Sorel.

In the last few days the government icebreakers in the upper sections of the river have made considerable progress in opening up a channel in the ice. Last year the Mikula and Saurer arrived at Pointe aux Trembles, Montreal, on March 21, and despite the severe winter it is hoped to equal the early date of last year.

DISADVANTAGE OF MARRYING A POLICEMAN.

Chicago, March 15.—It would be entirely incorrect to assume that when Policeman Jacob Cramer allegedly hit, choked, and kicked his wife, Edna, snapped a pair of handcuffs on her and then looked her up in a cell, that he was angry.

"It was just this way of practicing to be a sleuth," she explained a suit for separate maintenance. "He uses me for his laboratory work. It's funny, though, he never made an arrest in real life."

ESPIONAGE PROBE CENTERS UPON LOCK OF BROWN HAIR

Lock of Hair of American Woman Held by Paris Police Being Compared With Two Blonde Hairs Found in Envelope Containing Mysterious Camera Film.

Paris, March 15.—A lock of the light brown hair of Mrs. Robert Gordon Switz, American held with her husband on espionage charges, was being compared today with two blonde hairs found in an envelope containing a mysterious camera film.

Police experts examined the hairs under a microscope in an effort to determine if they are identical. Other experts were trying to solve the mystery of the films, believing they contain the cryptograms of a secret code.

SUPPORTERS OF SEAWAY PACT ARE PREPARING TO STAGE A COMEBACK

Rejection of St. Lawrence Treaty by U.S. Senate Yesterday Has Left Its Supporters Undismayed—Proposal Promises to Be Lively Issue in November Senatorial Elections—President Intimates Revised Treaty Will Be Submitted to Next Senate.

Washington, March 15.—Disappointed supporters of the St. Lawrence Waterway Treaty prepared today to carry the issue into the November campaign.

Hope was expressed in some quarters that the administration also would go to the public on the question and renew negotiations with Canada for some modification of the treaty terms.

Rejection of the treaty by the Senate yesterday left its supporters undismayed. The defeat had been conceded for several days.

President Roosevelt, knowing the treaty's fate an hour before the Senate voted, indicated that a revised pact, with some interpretive reservations, perhaps, would be submitted to the next Senate.

In the November elections half of the body that yesterday rejected the pact must stand for re-election.

Senator Key Pittman, hardest worker in the Senate on the treaty's behalf, predicted the instrument would be re-submitted to the Senate next session, and that it would be ratified.

"The treaty is not dead," he said. "You will recall it took seven years to get the Boulder Dam proposition through and that it has taken years to bring about many other important propositions."

At his press conference yesterday, President Roosevelt said he felt that if the United States failed to ratify the pact Canada would go ahead by herself, concentrating on the navigation features of the project, rather than on the power sources.

RUBBER TRADE TO COME UNDER COMMONS PROBE

Retail Merchants Charge Six Customers of Canadian Companies Given Special Discounts by Manufacturers.

Ottawa, March 15.—Independent retail merchants can compete with chain and department stores if the big organizations are required to cease unethical business practices such as selling goods below cost as loss leaders, misleading advertising and forcing manufacturers to give trade discounts, in the opinion of A. G. MacKay, secretary of the Alberta Retail Merchants' Association.

With Mr. MacKay's presentation of the retail business picture on behalf of the Alberta merchants before it, the Stevens committee on mass buying and price spreads today hears J. Cuthbertson Doyle, secretary of the Nova Scotia Retailers, continue the attack on department and chain stores.

Unless the unfair tactics of the big merchandising units were curbed, Mr. MacKay said yesterday, all small competitors would be forced out of the retail business.

As an outcome of the Alberta merchants' testimony the committee decided to investigate the rubber not getting fair prices for their product due to a lack of competition among the buyers.

Quebec and British Columbia retailers have yet to be heard before the committee, and their representatives may join the Nova Scotia officials in making presentations today.

RESTORATION OF MINIMUM WAGE ANNOUNCED BY FORD

Means a Twenty-Five Per Cent. Increase in Minimum Wage Rate for 3,453 Factory Employees of Ford Plants in Canada.

East Windsor, Ont., March 15.—Restoration of the five dollar-a-week minimum wage for factory employees in the main plant and branch assembly plants of the Ford Motor Company of Canada was announced by Wallace R. Campbell, the president.

The announcement means a twenty-five per cent. increase in the minimum wage rates of Ford factory employees. The former minimum was four dollars-a-day. The increase was made effective at once.

The increase affects a total of 3,453 factory employees of Ford plants in Canada. The increase in the Ford minimum wage rate in Canada is concurrent with the action of Henry Ford, who announced a similar increase for the employees in his United States plants.

The action of the Ford Motor Company of Canada in increasing minimum factory wage rates from four to five dollars a day signalsizes an emergence into better conditions," Mr. Campbell said in making the announcement.

U.S. TRADE IN FRANCE FURTHER RESTRICTED

Paris, March 15.—United States trade in France today was further restricted by the extension of import quotas to agricultural machinery, typewriters, metal products and silk stockings, much of which comes from the United States.

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BRITAIN PLANS NEW SYSTEM IN HIGH SCHOOLS

**Five-Year Course Starting at
Eleven Years of Age Foreseen
by Dr. Cyril Norwood, New
President of St. John's College,
Oxford.**

London, March 15. — Dr. Cyril Norwood, headmaster at Harrow, as already announced, is to become president of St. John's College, Oxford. Dr. Norwood's visit to Canada a few years ago will be well remembered by many in the Dominion. Probably there are few headmasters who can declare with him that they have never birched a boy.

"I regard such punishment as totally unnecessary," said Dr. Norwood. "There is today a great deal less punishment than there was thirty years ago; boys today respond more by keeping discipline themselves."

Dr. Norwood compares modern schools with "the rather barbaric institutions" of Tom Brown's school-days. "The present generation of boys and girls in the schools are undoubtedly as good, and in my opinion, better than any generation that has gone out before them," he says.

"The educational system in general is on the eve of considerable changes. The education given to 500,000 boys and girls in secondary schools is incomplete, being merely the foundations of an advanced education at the universities. The change I envisage is a five years' course, which will be complete in itself. This will start at about eleven years of age in the secondary schools."

**SERIOUS TROUBLE SAID TO
THREATEN AUTO INDUSTRY**

**Predicted Trouble Attributed to
Effort to Compel Workers to
Belong to Company Unions.**

Washington, March 15.—William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, told a United States Senate committee today the automobile industry "is on the verge of one of the greatest strikes in the history of the nation."

He made this statement as automobile makers, facing strike threats from their employees, presented their side of the story to the National Labor Board meeting downtown.

At the same time railway employees and managers sought a solution of their pay dispute. The employers want to reduce the basic wage another five per cent, in addition to the ten per cent now in effect. The workers oppose this. Appearing before the labor committee to support the Wagner labor bill, Green warned of the danger of a widespread strike in the auto industry. He said it would be "traceable to the effort to compel workers to belong to company unions."

**BILL WOULD TAX INCOME
OF LIQUENT-GOVERNOR**

**C. C. F. Want of Confidence
Motion in British Columbia
Legislature Defeated.**

Victoria, March 15.—An amendment to legislation passed in 1924 which would permit a tax levy against the income and personal property of the Lieutenant-Governor was sought in the British Columbia today. The request was made by H. E. Winch, C.C.F., Vancouver East. The present Lieutenant-Governor is Hon. J. W. Fortham Johnson.

A Co-Operative Common Wealth Federation want of confidence motion regretting the budget had not given due consideration to the promise of "work and wages" was defeated in the Assembly last night by a vote of 34 to 11.

**SENATOR WAGNER'S LABOR
CONTROL BILL CRITICIZED**

**Provisions Declared So Drastic
"as to Make Further Efforts
and Sacrifices on Part of In-** dustry in This Emergency Seem Futile."

New York, March 15.—Leaders of the American iron and steel industry have issued a statement criticizing Senator Robert F. Wagner's labor control bill, contending its provisions are so drastic "as to make further efforts and sacrifices on the part of industry in this emergency seem futile."

"Its provisions hark back to the old and thoroughly disproved philosophy," the statement reads, "that the interests of employers and employees are more antagonistic than mutual. It seeks to regiment class and to regulate their intercourse exclusively in terms of warfare."

The statement was issued after a meeting of representatives of plants employing seventy-five per cent of the workers in the industry. "The bill is designed to control all labor matters by political rather than economic forces and to destroy the friendly relationships between employers and employees," the statement said.

**ARROT FEVER RE-APPEARS IN
GERMANY**

Leipzig, Germany, March 15.—Pittacus, or parrot fever—a disease which broke out in Germany in 1930, 1932 and again last year—has re-appeared.

Authorities announced today that two persons have died of the malady here and that four more suspected cases are under observation. The Leipzig cases have been traced to local parrot dealers.

PARLIAMENT REFUSED TO PLACE A BAN ON TITLE HONORS IN CANADA

**BENNETT WILL COMMENT ON
DEFEAT OF SEAWAY SCHEME**

Ottawa, March 15.—Official Canada received with interest, but with little comment and little indication of surprise the word from Washington that the United States Senate had failed to ratify the St. Lawrence Waterway Treaty.

Beyond a statement Prime Minister Bennett is expected to make in Parliament shortly, no official notice will likely be taken of the action of the U.S. Senate. The Waterways Treaty has not yet come before Parliament as the government long ago decided it would not ask for its ratification here until favorable action had been taken at Washington.

There appears little prospect of Canada venturing on the project alone, at least not for many years to come. One of the chief objections raised by opponents of the scheme in Canada was the heavy cost at a time when the government is hard put to make revenue cover expenditures. If this country had to bear the whole cost the outlay would be considerably greater than if the United States shared it.

**REJECT PROPOSED CHANGE
TO INSURANCE REGULATION**

Ottawa, March 15.—Attended by the spectacle of the Government leader in the Senate, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, arrayed against the Federal Department of Insurance which George D. Pineloyson is the superintendent, the Senate committee on banking and commerce yesterday by a vote of three for and sixteen against defeated the amendment moved by Senator W. A. Griesbach which would have effect of requiring foreign insurance companies to segregate their Canadian deposits for the protection of Canadian policyholders. The other two voting for the amendment were Hon. Raoul Dandurand, Liberal leader, and Hon. Walter E. Foster.

"This bill is a bill of fortification against a constitutional attack," declared Senator Meighen in summarizing his objections to the Griesbach amendment. "Our position is strong in either situation but we would have more people arrayed against us when the day of battle comes at Phillips

ONTARIO'S SURE SIGN OF A GENERAL ELECTION.

It will not be necessary for the Hon. Howard Ferguson to return to Canada to tell Ontario when the provincial elections will be held. Premier Henry has declared a surplus. That settles the date for this summer.

The effluxion of time forces the issue, for the last election was on October 30th, 1929.

There will be a reduction in members from 112 to 90, or 22 less than at present.

A four-year term is usual, but the election waters have been so cold for the Conservatives that Premier Henry was averse to taking the plunge, and the present session is the fifth of the eighteenth Legislature.

Handicapped by indifferent leadership though the Liberals are, the present administration has accumulated more errors than the world's worst baseball team, and there is promise of a very close contest in the early summer.

Adam Aires, so named that he could always be at the top of the want ad columns, will repeat in Carleton County, which since Confederation, has never been known to elect a Liberal. But down to the "Y" in the Yorks, the Liberals have a fighting chance.

The City of Toronto elected fifteen members in the last House, but a few of these will be demoted.

THE FORTY SINNERS IN THE SENATE: WHO THEY ARE.

Complaining that they were not given sufficient work to do the Senators have on two occasions initiated a bill to legalize and to revive lotteries in Canada, the chief reason being that "the people will gamble anyway." It is a negative reason. Nor will the passage of the bill in the Senate tend to promote the idea that more bills should be originated in the Upper House.

LOTTERIES ARE DENOUNCED BY DR. WATT SMITH

Scotstown Minister Strongly Criticizes Efforts to Legalize Sweepstakes Under Pretence of Charity.

Scotstown March 15.—Strong denunciation was voiced by Rev. Dr. Watt Smith, pastor of the Scotstown Presbyterian Church, at the attempt being made to legalize lotteries in Canada a movement which has met with the approval of the Premier of the Province of Quebec.

Speaking on the subject of "Wealth," Rev. Dr. Smith took as the text of his address, "Better is a little with right than great revenue with injustice."

Dr. Smith said he felt certain most people in the Dominion of Canada were under the belief that the conditions of the masses of toilers were generally fairly comfortable, even during the time of depression, with the exception of those in the west who had suffered from the long continued drought.

"They had," he said, "got a rude awakening to find that we were still in the days spoken of by Thomas Hood in his 'Song of the Shirt' and the sweating which prevailed in Britain in the Victorian days. It was necessary that Christian men should have clear ideas as to what wealth is."

He asked them to consider what is the scope of the interests of a Christian man. "Taking the Bible as their guide, of course, they found that the first place was given to their salvation; but they were also taught to think about the wider range of duty to our fellows and to the state which is beyond the mortal life. When they came to look at the town, the county, the province, the Dominion, and at money they also had guidance from the Book of Proverbs, which was so spiritual it always had its feet on the earth. The fact that the Book of Proverbs was included in the sacred canon kept that before them," the preacher said.

Dr. Smith held that Christian men should be able to think clearly as to the legitimate possessions of a Christian. "They must have food if they were to live; they must have clothing if they wished to be civilized, and they must have a certain margin of leisure and comforts if they were to live effectively. The attitude of St. Francis of Assisi, who gave up everything could not be a universal practice," Dr. Smith thought.

Dr. Smith remarked that great revenues had a great temptation. "If the proposal of those legislators were carried into force they would produce a race in which honest toil would be at a discount. They had sufficient evidence of its effects already. The most salubrious place in Europe is on the Riviera, and the most agreeable climate in that area is at the Casino. Every year 'hush money' of a million francs is paid to the press, chiefly of Paris, to keep back from publicity the results of lotteries and gambling, and those were chief in the appalling number of suicides which are collected. Any system which brings life to a premature and dishonorable end is a self-condemned," he remarked.

The speaker knew of no "better discipline for those who were agitating to introduce this course into this country than a continued and intelligent study of this Book of Proverbs, with its wise instruction in the best rules for life, in that it tells that "Wisdom's ways are ways of pleasantness and all her paths are paths of peace."

REVEALS HOW PRICE LEVELS ROSE AND FELL

Were High in 1867 Following American Civil War and Austro-Prussian War of 1866 and Rose Again in 1872 After Franco-German War.

Ottawa, March 15.—Price levels were high in 1867 following the American Civil War and the Austro-Prussian War of 1866, and rose again in 1872 after the Franco-German War, says the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in its report on prices and price indexes from 1913 to 1932.

From 1873 to 1897, a period of declining prices occurred, marked by a notable disparity between the growth in the world's supply of gold and commodities. It was also a time of disputes and political unrest in debtor communities, culminating in the case of the United States, in the free coinage of silver dollars in 1896.

Following the discoveries of new gold fields in South Africa and the cyanide process of recovering gold from low grade ore, the world's supply of gold increased, with the result that the general trend of prices was upward from around 1890 until the outbreak of the Great War. In consequence the index rose from a low of 75.6 in 1897 to 102.3 in 1914. From 1915 prices climbed at a progressively increasing rate to a peak of 243.5 in 1920, due to the combined influence of monetary inflation and scarcity of commodities. Then followed a drastic collapse which caused the index to drop to 152.0 in 1922 and with the exception of a minor recovery, which reached a maximum of 160.3 in 1925, the trend of prices has been steadily downwards since that time. In 1930 this movement was accelerated, and the index fell from 149.3 in 1929 to 135.3, and then to 112.3 in 1931. Still further recession in prices in 1932 brought the index to 104.2, the lowest level since 1914.

Mr. Borlase took no active interest in public affairs. FIRE DESTROYS A LARGE BARN AT TOMIFOBIA

Four Cows, a Horse and Quantity of Hens Perished in Fire Which Destroyed Barn on Farm of Frank Hibbard.

Tomifobia, March 15.—Four cows, a horse and a number of hens perished in a fire which late last night destroyed a large barn on the farm of Frank Hibbard, situated at Macks Mills, about one mile from the village of Tomifobia. Farm implements stored in the barn were also destroyed.

The cause of the fire is not known. About ten-thirty o'clock last night Mr. Hibbard returned to his home from Tomifobia, and when he retired everything was all right in the vicinity of the barn.

About an hour later he was awakened by the shrieks of the animals in the barn, and looked out to see the barn a mass of flames.

Efforts to save the building were unsuccessful, and it was only with difficulty that the volunteer fire-fighters managed to save Mr. Hibbard's house from destruction.

COSTS OF RAISING CHILD FORM SUBJECT OF REPORT

Costs No More to Raise Six Children and Give Them Average Schooling Than to Raise Seven Completely Illiterate.

Ottawa, March 15.—It costs no more to raise six children and give them an average schooling than to raise seven completely illiterate. More is spent on clothing a child than sending it to school, twice as much is spent on nourishing it and nearly three times as much on housing it. The money devoted to its formal education can scarcely be considered a very formidable fraction of the total sum involved in bringing a child to the age of self support. It would no doubt seem smaller still if seen in comparison with the amount that it adds to the earning power of the child, and perhaps insignificant when considering the wider mental life that an education opens up to the individual.

These and other observations are contained in a report on "Expenditure for Schools as a Factor in the Cost of Raising the Canadian Child" which will be issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics shortly.

Father Marcotte has in the Seminary museum four specimens of the "Golden-eye." The Iceland species is very rare, and there is but one specimen in the museum.

PLUCKY GIRL IS NOT PERTURBED BY DEPRESSION

Lonesome, Destitute Twenty-Five-Year-Old Girl Caring for Her Aged Mother in 1931 Is Now Engaged in Flourishing Business.

Slate River, Ont., March 15.—Susie Ulrich, twenty-five year old farmerette of this little Lakeside hamlet, surveyed her snow-covered ten-acre market garden here and laughed in the face of her one-time bugaboo—depression.

A lone destitute girl caring for her seventy year old mother in 1931, Susie, by dint of hard labor and perseverance is now a well-to-do market-gardener with a flourishing little business.

In the spring of 1931 Miss Ulrich moved with her mother to a little four-room cottage in Slate River Valley, fifteen miles west of Port William. She rented it for twenty dollars, payable at the end of the year.

A stove was given to her and she fashioned a table, benches, beds and a bookcase from poplar poles and rough boards. Next she turned her attention to the surrounding four acres — matted and tangled with twigs and grass. With an old scotch-shovel, some scrap iron and poles she made a plough of sorts and used old railroad spikes as teeth for a cultivator.

Using a horse which she obtained by promising to keep it well fed, Susie dragged a log over the ground to cover her potato seed; and, by working one day a week for neighbors, earned enough money to buy eggs and enter the poultry business. Lacking hens, she got an incubator on the promise to pay ten pullets in the fall.

The second year Susie broadened her operations, but in the spring of 1933, the breaks started to come her way. She moved to a ten-acre farm, broke the land, bought 150 baby chicks, and sowed three acres of alfalfa and strawberries. The girl had an old automobile by this time. The machine was given to her by its former owner, who thought it never could be made to run again. But Susie proved herself to be a mechanic, and soon the ancient hauler hauled her produce to Port William.

In addition to being comfortably installed on a handsome market garden, Susie has netted a tidy little profit in hard cash. Crowning her achievements she won a prize last fall in the Slate River ploughing match and several awards at the Horticultural Show here.

OLD CARVINGS OF RARE VALUE ARE UNCOVERED

Important Specimens Discovered by Reitz Party Believed to Be of Great Antiquity.

Bloomfontein, Orange Free State, March 15.—Col. Denys Reitz, Minister of Lands in the South African Government, reports discovery in the Boshof area, about seventy-five miles northwest of here, of important specimens of Bushman rock carvings, believed executed by members of the short-statured race many centuries ago.

On information supplied by his father, Francis William Reitz, former president of the Orange Free State, Col. Reitz, his brother, Johannes, and two newspapermen uncovered what they described as a Bushman art gallery containing carvings representing numerous animals, a symbolic representation of rainfall and numerous tribal signs. The fact that the rock on which the carvings appeared had been polished smooth by the elements led them to believe the work of great antiquity.

The carvings showed a Bushman hunting an eland, a well-drawn rhinoceros, snakes, a wild pig, dingy dogs and several other animals. Nearby were remains of an out-croft workshop in which Bushmen had manufactured flint implements and weapons.

The Bushmen, one of the most ancient existing races, are believed to have brought the primitive culture of the old stone age to this country, either from North Africa or Europe. Their carvings are similar in many respects to those found in caves of Eastern Spain. Authorities have estimated there are not more than 26,000 of these little people now in Africa, although their nomadic life and lack of social organization renders it difficult to compute their numbers.

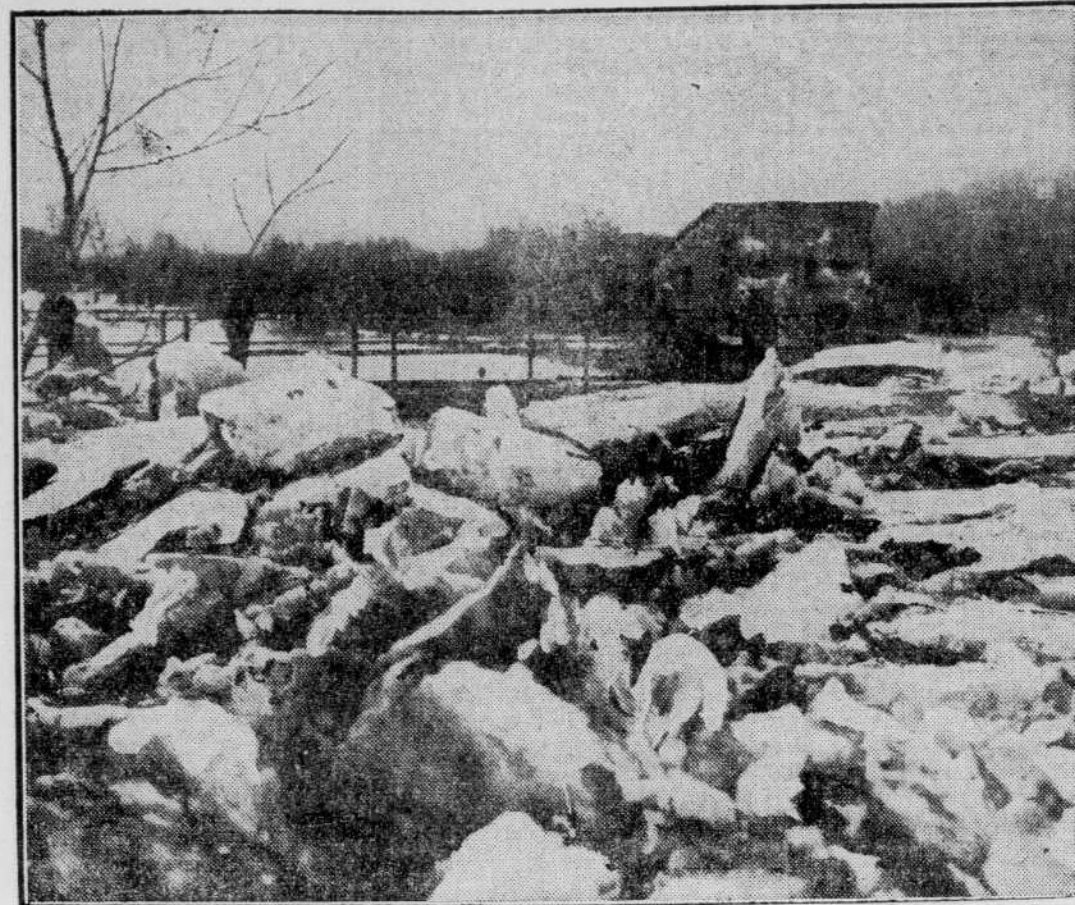

TORONTO LEAFS PICKED TO WIN DOUBLE HONORS

Toronto Favored to Capture Stanley Cup After Winning National Hockey League Championship, a Double Feat Accomplished but Twice in Five Years.

Toronto, March 15.—Since the present complex and profitable National Hockey League play-off system was devised some time between the playing seasons of 1928 and 1929, only two teams have won the Stanley Cup after winning the N.H.L. championship. There has been, in three cases out of five, a dividing of the spoils and in all but one instance it has been an international split.

So difficult has it been to win the National Hockey League title in a five-game series and then win the Stanley Cup in another series of the same length that it has come to be regarded as a somewhat remarkable feat, to be accomplished but seldom. That is the only reason they didn't hand over both prizes to the Toronto Maple Leafs last mid-season.

The Boston Bruins and the Montreal Canadiens of 1931 were mighty teams that put over double triumphs in the post-schedule classics. Lester Patrick's New York Rangers never generated quite enough power for this job and the Leafs missed by a little but last spring, unquestionably the class of the circuit, the Leafs are back for another try.

The way it stacks up, Conny Smythe's great team will have to eliminate the Detroit Red Wings in a five-game series for the National Hockey League championship. This is likely to be the most important series because it all depends in what manner the Red Wings behave when the Leafs will be fresh for the Cup tests.

Last spring the Toronto team was leg-weary and sleepy when they stayed up too late with the Boston Bruins by the time they had qualified to meet the eager Rangers. The Boston series was a corker from start to finish, four of the five games going into overtime and the fifth lasting 104 minutes, 46 seconds of extra time.

When the Leafs finally bagged the winning goal around two o'clock in the morning, they raced for a train to New York and played the Rangers in the first Stanley Cup game that same night. So the hockey world was inclined to give the Bruins as much credit, at least, as the Rangers for beating the Toronto club.

On the eve of the 1934 play-off campaign, there are no whisperings that Detroit has as strong a team as Boston had last season. There is no Eddie Shore on the line-up and the Red Wings do no such heavy body-checking as the Bruins of 1933 were accustomed to mete out.

These are reasons why the Leafs might reach the spring, if a team without being groggy. Even five games with the United States section leaders should not unduly tire a team that has three complete forward lines—all of them effective. And there will be plenty of money on the line here and there that the series will not go the limit.

It has only been done twice in five years, but the Leafs will start strong favorites from one end of the circuit to the other in both National Hockey League title and Stanley Cup play-off. It's a matter of power in this case, the Leafs have been geared in high since last November. They don't need to be a destiny team, as they call the baseball clubs in April.

McGILL REDMEN TAUGHT QUEBEC BITTER LESSON

Collegians Plastered Eleven to One Defeat on the Aces in First Fixture of Two-Game Series Last Night—Venue of Second Contest Undecided.

Montreal, March 15.—With a lead of ten goals in hand over the Quebec Aces, the hockey team of McGill University today awaited definite settlement of the venue for the second of the two-game series for the provincial crown and the right to represent Quebec in the Allan Cup play-offs.

McGill, with a display of superiority in all departments, clipped the Aces' wings to the tune of eleven to one last night, one goal being notched when McGill were short two men.

Meanwhile McGill, senior champions of the province, will be formally ordered by the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association to play the Aces, intermediate champions, in Quebec on Friday or Saturday, according to an announcement by A. A. H.A. On behalf of McGill, Dr. A. S. Lamb, director of physical education, announced verbally McGill would not play in Quebec.

Three goals in both the first and second periods and then five in the final frame spell easy victory for the college boys. Allan Cup Holders Smothered Mount Allison Last Night to Come Within Sixty Minutes of Honor of Representing Maritimes for Second Successive Year.

Moncton Hawks, 1933 Allan Cup winners, today were just sixty minutes away from the honor of representing the Maritimes for the second successive year in the senior national amateur hockey play-offs. The New Brunswick team which crossed the continent last spring to win Canadian honors in Vancouver from the Saskatoon Quakers, overwhelmed Mount Allison University by ten to one in the first game of the Maritime final series last night.

Friday they take the nine-goal lead into Sackville, home of the senior "B" division winners, for the second game of the total-goal series, and, unless the impossible happens, will leave shortly after for Montreal to meet the Quebec winners.

While the Hawks were working toward removing another obstacle in their way, this year's Saskatchewan champions were decided in Regina. Winning by six to one last night from Prince Albert Minors and eight to six on the round, the Regina Aces took the provincial title and the right to meet the Kimberley Dynamiters in the Allan Cup play-offs.

The Dynamiters, British Columbia titlists, swept aside Luscar, Alberta representatives, in the first interprovincial play-off decided. They lost by four to three to Luscar last night, but took the round by six to four and will meet Regina in the first game of their series at Calgary on Monday.

Down in Montreal McGill senior champions of Quebec, defeated the Quebec Aces by seven to one, in the first game of a total-goal series that will decide the province's representatives against the Maritime winners.

The Hamilton Tigers, senior Ontario Hockey Association titlists, defeated the Windsor Maroons by five to two last night and eight to five on the round and qualified to meet Falconbridge in Toronto on Friday night in the start of a series that will provide opponents for the eastern Ontario winners.

Westboro won by four to three from the Ottawa Montcalms and by ten to three on the round, gaining the Ottawa District intermediate title and a chance to take a crack at the winners of the series between Ottawa New Edinburghs and Brockville Magdodens.

While the seniors were progressing with their eliminations, little was done to clear up the junior situation last night. University of Manitoba and Kenora played a four-all draw which left them no further ahead after three preliminary semi-final games. Previously Kenora had won by three to one and Varsity by three to two.

The Saskatoon Wesleys and Regina Pats made progress in their efforts to decide a Saskatchewan play-off. Their first total-goal series ended in a four-all tie, but last night the Wesleys edged out a three to one victory and take the advantage into the second game at Regina on Friday.

Montreal, March 15.—Percy "Lunch" Bott—ski champion of Canada at the age of 161. What a record for a boy of that age in the land where youngsters learn to push the runners almost as soon as they learn to walk! But perhaps that's the secret of the boy's success—he's been jumping since he was eight.

This year started out in grand style for the youth. He won the interscholastic title in Montreal in January, and followed that by annexing the St. Maurice Valley title and runner-up position in the Ontario Provincial meet.

The climax came when he won the Dominion Championship at Three Rivers, February 24, defeating the United States titleholder, Ambrose C. Lund, of St. Paul, Minn.

Despite the honors showered on him when he brought the Waagen Trophy back to Canada after his Three Rivers victory, Bott is still a boy, a young stripling who skates, plays hockey, and skis with his pals. There is nothing to indicate a "swelled head" about him, and he positively evades congratulations. "I fail, but with that wry grace that characterizes the true ski jumper, Bott has become known as 'one of the greatest aerial riders of the narrow blades.'"

A misapprehension in the Quebec Provincial meet probably cost him that jump. He led a gala parade down the slope by jumping through a flaming hoop. Just prior to the jump, the take-off had been changed, unknown to him.

Speeding down the ice-covered chute, he was forced to change his jump and leaped down through the hoop instead of up at it as he had planned. He fell as he landed—the first time he ever spilled in a competitive event.

The youngster thinks there's nothing difficult about ski jumping. He did, however, get a thrill out of his first jump. "My stomach kinda jumped up when I left the top of the chute, but that soon wore off," he recalls. Included in the brilliant international field that Bott defeated at Three Rivers to capture the 1934 Dominion title were such prominent jumpers as Karl Baadsvick, Art Gravel, J. Landry, Rolf Silvertsen, Ted Hogan, Len Lehan, H. Baggeley and Ambrose Lund, the 1933 champion from Minnesota.

All these men were his seniors, a few of them by several years. Yet the skill the youth has acquired in the brief time he has been on the runners carried him to victory. It seems that Bott is destined to wear an international crown some of these days.

MAGOG CADETS RANK HIGH IN EMPIRE SHOOT

Canada Has Thirty-Seven Units Among First Hundred in King's Trophy Competition—Winnipeg Led List, With Magog Boys Fourteenth and Magog Girls Sixteenth.

London, March 15.—Canadian boys have again made a clean sweep in the great Empire competition for the King's Trophy for miniature rifle shooting.

Results today showed Canada won the trophy for highest efficiency in the Imperial Shields Competitions, took an overwhelming proportion of silver and bronze medals for individual high scores, captured the Imperial Shield for senior units and the Junior Shield for small junior units.

A total of 34,000 boys the Empire over took part in the 1933 competition in their respective localities. Canada as a whole secured an average of 83.00 against 79.00 for South Africa, 73.00 for Great Britain, 71.00 for New Zealand, Australia and the rest, including India and Trinidad, failing to qualify.

Canada secured a total of 118 silver and bronze medals for individual scores of ninety-nine or better against nineteen for Australia and fifteen each for South Africa and Great Britain.

The Cameron Highlander cadets of Winnipeg won the senior Imperial Shield with the Hamilton Collegiate cadets second and the Woodbridge, Ontario, cadets won the Junior Shield. The Calgary sea cadets took the Earl Haig sword for large units.

Altogether Canada gets thirty-seven units in the honors list of the best one hundred units in the Empire.

The Cameron cadets of Winnipeg rank at the top, the Hamilton Collegiate sixth, Woodbridge seventh, Calgary Sea cadets 10th, Magog, Quebec 14th, the Magog girls 16th, Sacre Coeur of Victoriaville, Quebec 19th, the Anglican Girls of Westboro, Ont., 23rd, Lower Canada College, Montreal, 27th, the Commercial Academy of Quebec 28th, Byng High School of Montreal 29th, King's Collegiate, Windsor, N.S., 67th, Rothesay, N.B. College 90th.

SIGNAL CODES WILL BE USED IN BOAT RACE

Cox's Megaphone Will Be Silent When Oxford and Cambridge Renew Classic Varsity Boat Race on Saturday—Stroke Will Be Set by Signals from a Bell Amidships.

London, March 15.—The Varsity boat race on Saturday will be set to music and the tinkle of bells from the racing craft will indicate the rowing giants are struggling with an ear coked for secret signals.

Who started this thing is not known, but both in the Oxford and Cambridge shells as the classic contest is renewed over the 4-1 mile stretch from Putney to Mortlake, the stroke will be set by signals from a bell amidships instead of the usual lusty "Hup, hup" from the cox's megaphone.

The idea, of course, is to fool the other fellow who theoretically won't know whether his opponent is going to step up the proceedings by increasing the stroke or is going to lay back and wait for the battle to come to him.

The bell and battery are fixed in the middle of the shell, the buzzer is worked by the coxswain's foot, thus indicating to the stroke oarsman that the time has come for quickening or shortening the stroke. Incidentally this will save considerable wear and tear on the lungs of the little steersman.

The genius who figured this out took care of all contingencies. If the other fellow is alongside the tinkle-tinkle doesn't set the stroke in just so many tinkle-tinkles. The buzzer buzzes on a pre-arranged code which is a most carefully-guarded secret in both camps.

What will happen if both crews happen to have hit on the same signals, or the shell ships a damp sea, is not stated. Oxford, however, have it worked out that their bell cannot be heard two lengths distant. Whether this is two lengths fore or aft is also not mentioned. Anyway, it is good, clean fun.

CONVENTION OF LEGION DRAWS NEAR TO CLOSE

Brigadier-General Alex Ross, of Yorkton, Sask., Named President of Dominion Command.

Ottawa, March 15.—Expectations were that the fifth convention of the Canadian Legion, which has been in session here since Monday, will terminate some time today. Most of the business of the conference has been dealt with, and all important resolutions disposed of.

Last night the convention elected Brigadier-General Alex. Ross, of Yorkton, Sask., as Dominion president, and voted into office the other Dominion officers. Of these the active officers were divided equally between east and west. Saskatchewan, British Columbia and Manitoba received one each, Ontario was given two and Nova Scotia one.

The convention was attended by 344 accredited delegations, 24 ladies' auxiliaries and 211 fraternal delegates, the largest convention which the association has ever held. A total of 443 branches were represented, either directly or by proxy.

The Legion endorsed the resolution of the Amputations Association regarding Remembrance Day, and all provincial governments will be asked to introduce legislation implementing the Dominion statute which declares November 11th, a legal holiday.

Today only a few resolutions remained, the great majority of the more important ones having been disposed of.

ANOTHER OLD TIMER FINDS SAFE HARBOR

Adventurous Career of Captain William Chapman on the High Seas Has Come to An End.

Saint John, N.B., March 15.—Another link with the old days of New Brunswick's wooden ships snapped when Captain William Chapman, aged seventy-eight, died at his home here. One of the veterans who could plan, build, rig and sail a ship, he was once known in most of the world's larger ports and was one of the few mariners who could remember the days when Saint John harbor bristled with masts and resounded with the ring of caulkers' mallets.

"But the past is the past," Captain Chapman remarked in the last interview he gave concerning his adventurous career. "Our day is done. The spirit of the great wooden ships has fled with the ebb tide, only, unlike the tide, it will never return."

Although he had commanded both sailing vessels and steamships, Captain Chapman often deprecated the latter, terming them "steam kettles" and "not for real sailors' although "fast and seaworthy."

Volunteering to take a vessel to South Africa and back during the Great War, the veteran mariner made a famous voyage by safely traversing the dreaded mine zones, and "not for real sailors' although "fast and seaworthy."

Born at St. Martins, N.B., he became known familiarly as "Captain Bonny Doone," the nickname arising when he commanded a vessel of that name built by his father. Captain Chapman made several trips around the Horn and was so able a navigator that he acted as pilot at a number of ports. For the last twenty-two years he resided in Saint John.

"Don't be a sailor, my boy," William Chapman's mother said to him in '75, but the then fourteen year old lad bade her farewell on the quay at St. Martins. She presented him with a bottle of home-made preserves for his first trip across the Atlantic and advised him to keep away from drunken sailors and barroom brawls.

Soon after boarding the schooner Alexander Mackenzie, however, he had experience with this type of sailor. The crew became drunk off Yarmouth and a storm blew up. Young Chapman and two others jettisoned the deckload of deals, which took the deck cabins with them. Despite this, eight feet of water entered the hold and the schooner began sinking.

Finding the leaks, Chapman plugged them. He "borrowed" a bottle of rum from the captain and enjoyed the drunken crew until coming on deck and manning the pumps. "That was all there was to that," the old salt said in a reminiscent manner.

While Captain Chapman was master of the barque Elizabeth Doull in '82 he had a premonition he should luff the vessel one point and did despite banter from the mate. When dawn broke they saw another large schooner in distress. Rescue of the crew was effected with difficulty. A cat and Newfoundland dog, taken from the doomed craft at the last moment, were kept by Captain Chapman until they died. "I buried them at sea, like true sailors," he said later.

STERILIZATION OLD ISSUE IN NOVA SCOTIA

Scheme Proposed by a Past President of Nova Scotia Medical Society Twenty-Five Years Ago.

Truro, N.S., March 15.—Sterilization of the mentally unfit though very much to the fore today is a new proposal in Truro. Twenty-four years ago Dr. W. R. Dunbar, past president of the Nova Scotia Medical Society, advocated such a proposal to the town council, of which he was a member, and in so doing "shocked all the members of the council." This information was brought out in a survey of professional opinion on the question of sterilization. Out of a score or so of clergymen, medical practitioners, dentists and social workers queried only one protest was registered against sterilization. This opposing opinion was from Rev. Father Kinsella, of the Church of the Immaculate Conception. He declared, "The Catholic Church does not approve of sterilization of human beings, and consequently condemns it as wrong."

Dr. Dunbar who, in addition to being a past president of the Nova Scotia Medical Society, is also a former mayor of the town and has occupied a number of public health positions, stated he had advocated sterilization ever since 1910. He added, "the number of mentally deficient in institutions is large and is increasing. When we take into consideration the simple operation which is necessary there should be no objection from that point."

Rev. W. McN. Matthews, president of the Truro Ministerial Association and minister of First United Church, Truro, stated that he was in favor of sterilization and expressed the belief that there was a growing feeling in favor of it.

The town's only woman medical doctor, Mrs. Hugh Dickson, M.D., C.M., who is actively associated with the Nova Scotia Red Cross and a well known social worker, stated, "I consider sterilization a suitable method of coping with the menace of the feeble minded citizen."

The question of sterilizing the mentally unfit was brought to the fore in the province of Nova Scotia when Dr. T. R. Johnson of Great Village, in submitting his annual report as County Health officer to the January session of the Colchester Municipal Council, meeting in this town, stated that in a short while we would have to adopt some form to birth control by means of sterilization. "We have only to survey the families," he stated, "that are now producing most of the children today to realize that something must be done."

The report was accepted but no action was taken.

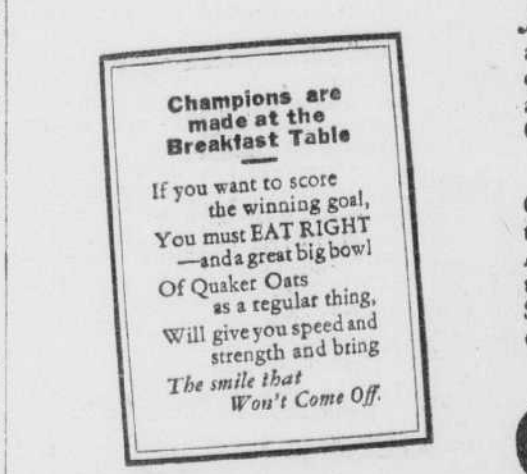

ONTARIO BEER BILL READY TO BE PRESENTED

Long-Awaited Measure to Legalize Sale of Beer in Ontario Province May Make Its Appearance in Legislature This Week.

Toronto, March 15.—Ontario's long-awaited "beer bill" may make its appearance in the Legislature this week.

Briefly, provisions of the bill are expected to include:
Sale of beer by the glass in beverage rooms; with sale of beer and wine by the bottle in dining rooms and guest rooms.

Provision will probably be made for sale of beverages in stores in cases where no hotels or restaurants are located, under permit of the Ontario Liquor Control Board. The Ontario Liquor Control Board is expected to have complete charge of operation of the new system, and places vending beverages would be licensed.

Municipalities would have the right to exercise their present local option privileges. At present liquor cannot be sold in "temperance municipalities" without a vote of the people.

The bill, it is understood, was thoroughly discussed by the cabinet last week-end, and will probably be submitted to the next Conservative caucus prior to its submission to the House. The measure is a very lengthy document, and its provisions are expected to provide considerable discussion in the House. Here it is planned to give the bill the customary first, second and third readings, but withhold it from royal proclamation until after the election, which may take place in June.

As yet, the exact contents of the bill are being kept a closely-guarded secret, but it is learned the document has now been completed.

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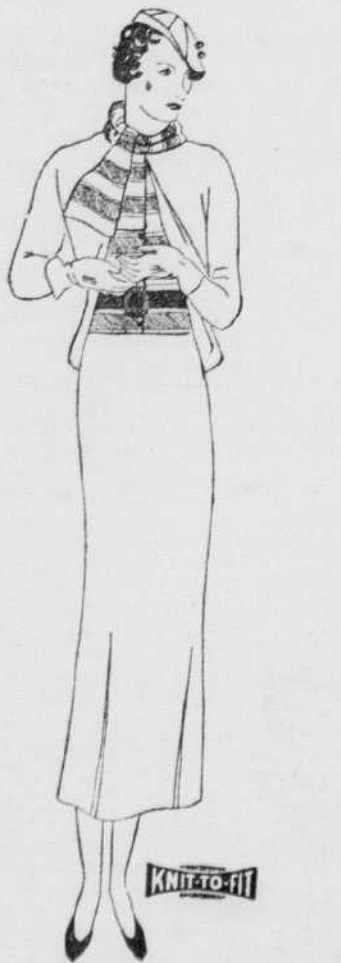
