CENSUS WILL BE A DISAPPOINTMENT

Population of Dominion Expected to Fall Short of Seven and a Half Million.

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 8.—(Special to The Chronicle.)—Information is accumulating to the effect that the census is about to prove a great disappointment. The population has been placed at eight millions in the estimates given out by the Laurier Government. It is certain that it will fall materially short of that figure, and it may fall short of seven and a half millions.

In addition, it is beginning to be known that the cost will outrun all expectations. Mr. Fisher ran his department on the severest principles of parsimony, and the result of committing the nomination of enumerators and higher officials to the Liberal members and defeated candidates has been to provide a staff at once numerous, expensive and inefficient. The job will prove exorbitantly expensive, as well as disappointing as to results. The formal announcement is held up by the delinquency of a very few localities to send in their returns. These are Cumberland, N. S.; Battleford, Sask.; part of Regina, Sask., and part of Yale-Cariboo, B. C. The census commission has reported the officials concerned to the Department of Justice to take action.

WILL BUILD TO

CANADIAN LINE.

Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 7.—Newman Erb, new director of the Minneapolis and St. Louis Railroad, to-day made the first authoritative statement regarding the plans of the company. He said:—

"We will build to the Canadian line and we will rehabilitate the Minneapolis and St. Louis Road and Iowa Central. We will do our own developing and do not contemplate selling out to any Canadian road."

GOVERNOR WILLING

TO HOLD CONFERENCE

Jackson, Miss., Oct. 7.—Governor E. E. Noel announced tonight that President Markham of the Illinois Central, has indicated his willingness to meet the Governor "and any persons who that official may invite to be present," to explain the position of the railroad and discuss questions pertaining to the questions of the Illinois Central shops and clerks which do not involve recognition of the employees of the federation. The conference will be held in the office of the Governor in Jackson on Monday.

WILL REPRESS ROYALIST

OUTBREAK IN PORTUGAL

Paris, Oct. 8.—The Portuguese Premier, Jose Chagas, has notified the Portuguese legation here that the Government has taken all necessary steps to repress the Royalist rising in the north and that "tranquillity reigns throughout the country." The Premier's dispatch states that an armed band yesterday had made an attempt against Braganca, but without success, and is now close to the frontier. The government has reinforced the Braganca garrison. The Premier adds that he wishes the press to be informed that the Portuguese Government is not exercising any censorship over telegrams, and is permitting even the most mendacious reports to be transmitted.

A GROWING TOWN.

Waterloo, Ont., Oct. 7.—Waterloo's assessment will be shown to have increased during the past year to the extent of \$57,023, almost 25 per cent of the total, and the population figures show a gain of 180, bringing the number of residents to 4800.

CHRISTIANITY AND SOCIAL PROBLEMS

Talked Of by English M.P.'s and United States Vice-President at Methodist Conference.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 8.—Papers on "Christianity and Social Problems" by two members of the English Parliament and by a former Vice-President of the United States were among those which today proved to be of special interest to the delegates attending the sessions of the Ecumenical Methodist Conference in this city. The status of the laborer as seriously affected by vital changes in modern social and industrial conditions and the duty and opportunities of the church in dealing with the various resultant problems were among the topics dealt with from both practical and ethical points of view.

"The keynote of the church should be more religion in business and more business," said Charles W. Fairbanks, former Vice-President. "Inequality of wage for men and women, working under like conditions, is an affront to the spirit of christian religion."

"The progress of nations in the last analysis is measured by the real progress of woman herself. The laborer has become merged in the machinery of which he is such an important part. And he has come to feel, too frequently, that the great church is not sympathetic toward him. Industrial peace will come through the influence of the christian religion."

A paper by Arthur Henderson of London, member of Parliament, who was detained at home by government duties, was read by T. R. Ferens, member of Parliament. "The Laborer is worthy of his hire, but not infrequently the hire is not worthy of the employer," was one of Mr. Henderson's striking sentences.

The time of domestic war is over and gone, but the time of commercial war is come. Like the Venetian campaigner our whole social structure is in danger of collapsing. We are feeling today the full fruits of new discoveries. They are altering the world's relations. You are unloosening the savage and the uncivilized man. You are keeping them from flying at each other and pressing your industrial civilization upon them. You will have China and Africa to deal with as labor problems. These are but the first rumblings of the storm. But you have true power with which to meet it—the gospel of love. We have got to face this new problem from an entirely new angle.

"We English-speaking peoples have given to the world many a priceless idea, and the labor world is listening for a message to the under-world of unrequited labor and toil. When we are willing to take commercial failure rather than to rob our fellows in God's good time there will come a better day for those who toil. Let us be faithful in the ante chamber to the great responsibility."

NEW ARCHBISHOPAL SEES IN ENGLAND

Rome, Oct. 8.—An important reorganization of the Catholic Church in England has been decided upon and a papal bulletin will shortly be issued dividing England into three ecclesiastical provinces, with archiepiscopal sees at Liverpool, Birmingham and Westminster. Two new dioceses will also be formed, one out of a portion of Liverpool, and the other out of the actual diocese of Northampton, with its see in Cambridge. Thus the great see of Westminster will be considerably reduced in dignity, as, instead of having fourteen suffragan sees, as now, it will have only four.

EARL GREY AT

FAREWELL SERVICE

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 8.—Earl Grey attended a farewell service at All Saint's Church today at which the rector, Rural Dean A. W. McKay, officiated. The sermon was one of farewell to His Excellency and the service was unusual as a fine send-off to His Majesty's representative. The Governor-General chose the hymns, which were the Old Hundredth and Kipling's Recessional.

A special prayer was said at the close and the whole congregation sang the National Anthem, which had been rung on the church bells as the vice-regal party first entered the church.

Earl and Countess Grey afterwards drove to the residence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier on a farewell visit.

VOTED TO OUST

THEIR VICE-PRESIDENT

Providence, R. I., Oct. 7.—Alleging that he took the stump in Canada in opposition to reciprocity, in the name of the company, unwarrantedly, the stockholders of the Credit Foncier Canadian—a French-Canadian lumber and real estate corporation—today voted to oust Arthur Laberge, of Montreal, as their vice-president. Only twenty of the eighteen hundred stockholders voted in person, others being represented by proxies voted by the secretary, Joseph W. Trinquet. Mr. Laberge attended the meeting, and made an extended speech, claiming that his campaign work in Canada was done entirely as an individual and not in the name of the company. Of the 1,800 stockholders, 1,600 reside in New England and the others live in Canada. The company owns timber tracts in New Brunswick and Quebec.

FATAL ACCIDENT ON RAILROAD

Two Men Killed and Eleven Injured in a Collision in Michigan.

Rochester, Mich., Oct. 7.—Two people were killed and 11 injured, one probably fatally, early to-night when a Detroit United Railway work car attached to two cars loaded with cinders crashed into the front end of the north bound Detroit United Railway Flint Limited about a mile north of Rochester. The dead:—

Daniel Fallon, aged 50, a Flint grocer.

R. E. Lee, 35, Oxford, Mich.

Eight of the injured were taken to Detroit and the others are being cared for here.

The limited was crowded with passengers and almost without warning the work-car plunged through the front vestibule nearly to the rear of the smoking compartment. How more people were not killed is a mystery.

Conflicting reports have been received regarding the speed of the cars and of who disobeyed orders.

SPANISH TROOPS

ATTACK THE MOORS

Madrid, Oct. 8.—Operations by the Spanish forces against hostile tribes in Morocco have been resumed, according to official dispatches from Melilla. Covered by the fire of warships, two columns yesterday advanced ten miles inland in the Kert river region, burning many houses and driving the tribesmen from their positions, in spite of determined resistance.

The battle lasted ten hours, and was directed by the Minister of War, General De Luque, in person. Details of the Spanish losses have not yet been received, but they are believed to have been heavy, exceeding 100. Colonel Primo de Rivera is among the wounded. The operations continue today.

HAZEN WILL ENTER

DOMINION CABINET

St. John, N. B., Oct. 8.—J. D. Hazen, Premier of New Brunswick, left for Ottawa tonight to accept a seat in the Dominion cabinet. He said he was not sure what portfolio he would get. It is believed he will be the next Minister of Railways.

FROM WEALTH TO POVERTY

Now Under Indictment for Improper Dealings With a Bank.

Vancouver, B.C., Oct. 7.—Barney F. O'Neill, formerly a director of the Carnegie Trust Company of New York, and a candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor of the State of Idaho at the last elections, is under arrest in Vancouver, charged with improper dealings while President of a bank in Wallace, Idaho.

O'Neill's case is a curious one, for from a position of great wealth he has by a series of hard luck adventures gone broke in the last couple of years. The failure of the Carnegie Trust Company cost him hundreds of thousands of dollars and he declares that all the money he had left was swept away in the wreck of the bank of which he was president. He had been indicted by a grand jury over in Idaho and will probably return there for trial. Several other indictments against prominent men of Washington State have also been returned regarding the same bank failure.

O'Neill was one of the chief owners of the Inland Herald of Spokane, a newspaper which lasted a little over a year and lost over one hundred and thirty thousand dollars.

SMUGGLING CONSPIRACY.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 7.—Another conspiracy to smuggle goods from Canada is scented by the special agents of the customs service in the arrest of an express messenger at Pembina, N. D., reported to Chief Wildlife today. The man, whose name was not disclosed in the official report, was arraigned before a United States Commissioner at Grand Forks today, charged with smuggling and assisting in smuggling. The Canadian border is being watched by the special agents to detect smugglers.

MONTREAL AVIATION MEET UNLUCKY

Another Machine Was Smashed And Event Had to Be Postponed.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—Montreal's second aviation meet at Delorimier Park came to a temporary halt this afternoon and the managers postponed the event a week, when Roman Gressier, in his aeroplane, crashed into the fence which runs along one side of the track, smashing the machine to pieces. Gressier escaped unhurt, but, as Charlie King smashed his machine yesterday, and as none of the other entrants were ready to take the air, the meet was postponed until King and Gressier could make repairs.

There were about 2,000 people at the park and they expected much from Gressier who made two good flights yesterday. The steering gear on his machine was out of order, however, and instead of proceeding directly along the track prepared for the machines, it swerved to one side before leaving the ground and tore along the fence nearby for about 20 feet. The engine was not injured, but the planes and propellers were wrecked.

Fileux was scheduled to make a flight from Cartierville to the city, but he disappointed the waiting crowd as he was not even able to make a start, his aeroplane refusing to take the air.

ELECTRIFICATION OF

C. P. R. LINE

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 7.—In connection with the probable ultimate electrification of a portion of its line in the mountains, the Canadian Pacific Railway has acquired a water power on the Adams River, which flows into South Thompson River near the west end of Shuswap Lake, and the title has been vested in the name of J. S. Dennis, land commissioner of the company. The Adams River flows out of Adams Lake, and experts have reported that it is capable of developing a hundred thousand horsepower at two different points between the lake and its confluence with the South Thompson. It is in a heavily timbered country where extensive lumbering operations are now being carried on. Water powers in British Columbia are acquiring a com-

mercial value they did not possess a few years ago. During a recent visit to the Okanagan Valley, Sir Wm. MacKenzie, president of the Canadian Northern Railway, bought the Coteau water power and a charter for building an electric tram line through the fruit growing belt on both sides of Okanagan Lake. The Coteau is capable, it is said, of developing 7000 horsepower, a volume sufficient to operate the proposed tram system. If built it will prove a feeder to the steam road which the company proposes to build into the Okanagan from Kamloops.

HORSE INJURED.

A horse belonging to a carter named Antoine Fortier was injured in Lower Town on Saturday morning by collision with a street car. Fortier was just turning into Dalhousie street after descending Mountain Hill, when an electric car proceeding along Dalhousie street, struck the horse, knocking it down. It was feared that one of the horse's legs was broken, but this proved not to be the case, although the animal suffered serious injuries.

THE C.P.R.'S PROGRESS.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has an enviable record for progress and the programme of progress set forth at the recently held annual meeting of the shareholders shows that the rate of increase will be well-maintained in the near future. Calgary is to be the location of the railway shops in the West, the western main line is to be double-tracked with all rapidity, much work is to be done by branch lines; two new steamers will be added on the Pacific route, and irrigation in southern Alberta will be largely extended.

All this means the rapid development of the country and the faith entertained in the future prosperity by the heads of the greatest transportation system in the world. That system has already performed miracles of accomplishment for Canada and the Dominion owes it a much larger debt than is generally realised. It has a great deal to do yet, and everyone knows that the same will be done both and well.

WILL THE "WAR" BE SHORT?

There is a somewhat general idea that the war between Italy and Turkey will be of short duration for several reasons, the most weighty of which is that the other nations of Europe may possibly succeed in bringing about a settlement before hostilities proceed much further. That Turkey is looking for the same result appears evident.

Such a war is a disturbing factor in international politics. A conflict between two such nations carries with it the constant possibility that it may lead to a far greater one that will involve a number of other countries, a result that would be regarded with the greatest apprehension. This is a factor that has, on various occasions, been the means of avoiding a war between nations that would have engaged in it had not the influence of others been exerted against it. Furthermore, there is continual jealousy lest one nation should gain an advantage over another in the matter of acquiring territory or a commanding influence over it.

Another reason leading to the conclusion that the war may be of short duration is the disadvantage at which Turkey is fighting. To get its army to Tripoli is a matter of considerable difficulty and it seems impossible that any considerable force can be landed while the Italian navy is in the Mediterranean. The superiority of the Italian over the Turkish fleet makes a battle a thing to be avoided by the latter, and it is also a question whether the loyalty of the Turkish army, made up of diverse and somewhat discordant elements, could be depended upon in a field distant from Turkey.

AN IMPETUS TO INDUSTRY.

The truth about reciprocity is beginning to be known now that it is rejected and it is very plain that the rejection has given an impetus to industry in many quarters. While there was a chance that the agreement would be endorsed, the heads of big American concerns already having branch works in this country kept silence. Now they are talking.

For instance, the Hamilton Spectator cites the case of Sarnia. In that town the Standard Oil Company has for some years operated a very important refining enterprise which has given employment to many citizens of the place and added materially to the wealth. Today it is announced that something like three-quarters of a million will be spent by the company in enlargements and improvements at the Sarnia plant. It is also stated that, had reciprocity been carried the Sarnia branch would, in all probability, have been abandoned.

The people of Sarnia returned a pro-reciprocity member to Ottawa in the elections. Thanks, however, to the sense of other parts of the country, they have been saved from the consequences of their own short-sightedness or partisanship. And what is true in their case will doubtless be found to apply to other constituencies as time passes.

FIRE PREVENTION DAY.

The suggestion of an American fire marshal to the effect that one day should be set aside in the year to be observed as Fire Prevention Day is one that might well arouse some interest on this side of the line also. Considering that our per capita fire loss is some eight or ten times as much as in European countries, the public should be made to realise the importance of doing all possible to minimize the risk of fire and the observance of such a day would undoubtedly contribute to this end.

The fire marshal in question sets forth a very comprehensive and effective method of observance in his appeal. He suggests that all families and householders should contribute by their efforts to the movement by clearing their premises of debris, waste material and inflammable mat-

ter. He recommended that all public and private institutions, hotels, theatres, halls, factories and their establishments, where people congregate in large numbers should be inspected to see that they possess everything that is necessary to protect life in the moment of danger.

He also requests every public and parochial school to hold fire drills on the proposed days, and to instil upon the minds of the young the necessity of being prepared at all times to meet the dangers of fire, to remove that which would contribute to its progress and provide that which could prevent it.

As there has been a great development in the science of protecting public health during the past quarter of a century, so is there now in progress a great stride in the guarding of life and property from fire. At one time medical science devoted itself to the cure of disease and fire-fighters to the perfection of their apparatus. Now medical science devotes much of its time to the removal of the causes of disease and the protection of the healthy from its ravages, while those entrusted with the subjugation of the consuming element are putting forth every effort to educate the people to do that which will diminish the danger of fires and make their extinction a simpler matter.

Millions of dollars are consumed annually in this country through fires which would never have occurred if proper care and forethought had been exercised. The movement to observe a Fire Prevention Day is, therefore, most laudable and should meet with widespread encouragement.

AN OPPORTUNITY NEGLECTED

When Lord Strathcona crossed the Atlantic the other day on his hurried visit to Canada he did not choose to make the passage on a Canadian vessel, a fact which has caused some comment, which, while not bearing severely on the High Commissioner, suggests propriety of officials of the Dominion Government availing themselves of Canadian transportation facilities wherever possible.

Perhaps as fine vessels as ply the Atlantic are controlled by Canadian interests. It will be noted with satisfaction that the Duke of Connaught is sailing on a Canadian ship, now that he comes to succeed Earl Grey, and that the retiring Governor-General has engaged passage for England on a Canadian steamer. It would seem eminently proper for those honored by the Dominion Government with high positions to support Canadian enterprises, and all things being nearly equal, to give preference to Canadian routes of travel.

Lord Strathcona seems to have missed an excellent opportunity to testify to his belief in the progressiveness of the country which he honors as High Commissioner.

MR. BORDEN AND THE PUBLIC INTEREST.

The public may now consider Mr. Borden's policy of a positive policy in behalf of better government for the people. First and foremost, he stands for the National Policy which was inaugurated in 1878—a fiscal policy which the Laurier Cabinet, with no trade policy of its own, have been amending during their fifteen years of office to its injury, rather than to its betterment. Of all their amendments, the Fielding reciprocity pact was the last straw that broke the camel's back; and now the people, having got rid of the most corrupt government that ever has been, have before them the following policy of Conservative rule in posse to keep track of, as they watch the progress of events in the new Cabinet and Parliament. First, Mr. Borden proposes to give us a thorough reorganization of the method by which public expenditure is supervised. The increase in what is known as ordinary controllable expenditure from \$21,500,000 in 1896 to nearly \$74,000,000 in 1911 is proof of extravagance beyond any possible denial.

2. The granting of their natural resources to the Prairie Provinces.

3. The construction of the Hudson Bay Railway and its operation by independent commission.

4. The control and operation by the state of the terminal elevators.

5. The necessary encouragement for establishing and carrying on the chilled meat industry.

6. The establishment of a permanent tariff commission.

7. The granting of substantial assistance towards the improvement of our public highways.

8. The extension of free rural mail delivery.

9. The extension of civil service reform.

10. The granting of liberal assistance to the Provinces for the purpose of supplementing and extending the work of agricultural education and for the improvement of agriculture.

And, lastly, to a course of policy and administration which will maintain independent and unimpaired the control of our own affairs by the Parliament of Canada; a policy which, while affording no just cause of complaint

to any foreign nation, will find its highest ideal in the autonomous development of Canada as a nation within the British Empire.

Most of these threats of a "holy war" usually end in holy smoke.

It looks as though the war would be over before the correspondents arrive there.

The fact that Turkey has not developed a single aviator should attract popular sympathy.

Were Turkey a strong nation, Italy might have counted a hundred before deciding to go to war.

Typists and stenographers are now recognized officials of the Royal household in England.

War may be terrible, but at least it gives us some news from Italy other than reports of the Camorrist trials.

The high cost of living has now reached Hungary. That place will, therefore, have a chance to live up to its name now.

Liberal papers are now discoursing most sanctimoniously on the evils of the patronage system. Another case of "when the devil was sick."

New York has refused to appropriate money for the celebration of Columbus Day. The great discoverer made a mistake by not landing in New York first. He will never be forgiven by the people of that town.

This Turco-Italian war may fizzle out in a short time, but at least Europe will have some sleepless nights caused by the knowledge that at last there is a real fire very close to the powder magazine.

Doubtless the Powers won't be in a hurry to intervene in that Turco-Italian war so long as there is a chance that Italy will use aeroplanes in her military operations. They are all too anxious, to see how the new invention will work in actual time of war.

In 1908 the late Government majority of forty-five represented a popular majority of 16,969 votes. As nearly as can be estimated from the returns of the recent election, Mr. Borden's majority of forty-seven or so seats in the next House will mean a popular majority of about three and a half times as large.

Speaking of the defeat of reciprocity on September 21, the Cleveland Press says that it was a great day for Canada. A great day for the world. Not because it saw the defeat of a particular measure of legislation, but because it asserted the right of the many to rule the destinies of a great nation. There is no higher law on earth than the will of the majority.

Says the Ottawa Journal: "In the letters of a self-made merchant to his son, the old gentleman was forced to express admiration for a former employee for whom he had hitherto had little use, simply because the employee had been sharp enough to see what was coming, and so resigned five months before the boss found time to 'fire' him. Which somehow recalls Hon. Mr. Parent, both in connection with the Railway Commission and the Quebec Premiership, each of which positions he vacated a few hours before they would probably have left him."

An event of importance to all Catholic Americans took place yesterday in New York, when a bronze tablet was unveiled in the old St. Peter's Church in honor of Thomas Dongan Earl of Limerick, and first Catholic Colonial Governor of New York. Governor Dongan may be said to have been the first great exponent of civil and religious freedom in New York colony. He gave it its first popular legislative assembly, which passed the "Charter of Rights and Privileges," granting popular government, religious toleration, trial by jury, immunity from martial law and freedom from arbitrary taxation. It also provides laws for the naturalization of foreigners and a complete system of courts. According to his historians he was "the wisest and best Colonial Governor of New York."

OPENING OF THE RUGBY SEASON

The accidents gave the McGill students a chance to see two old favorites, who had announced their retirement, but were persuaded to change their minds, Dan Gilmore and Mike Turnbull, in line again.

Dan came on to fill a gap on the wing line and Turnbull also got in on the wing. Gilmore, who was being held in reserve for Toronto next Friday, met with a nasty accident, breaking his thumb bone and had to retire. It may mean that the Toronto boys will line up against a McGill team minus its most formidable line plunger.

Rasmussen expresses the fear that Mikkelsen and his party have perished.

Fruchen, another Danish explorer who accompanied Rasmussen, obtained from Cook's Eskimo assistant Etukishuk, the box which Cook alleged contained the instruments and papers which would prove his polar discovery claims. The box contains only a broken sextant and other instruments, but no papers. According to Fruchen, Etukishuk said that Cook's story of the trip to the pole was absolutely untrue.

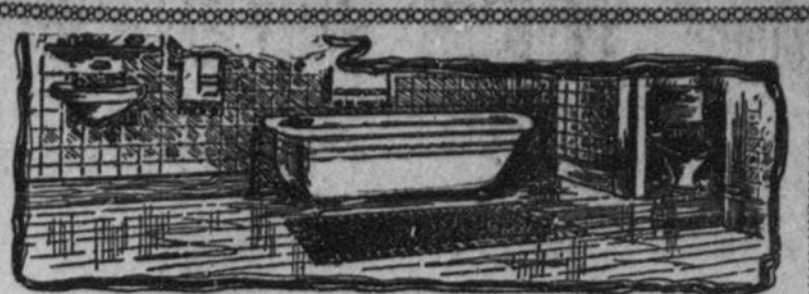

Three times he was marched to the fence for the five-minute limit and Bob Cheney, referee, met with a storm of groans from the grand stand on each occasion. Rowntree fell from exhaustion in the final quarter. He batted Phelan over the head when the ball was forty feet away and then tried to rub some dirt into the face of the prostrate Vancouver player.

The keen pace told on the players, and the fourth period was listless with no scoring. Play was tough and penalties frequent.

DISASTROUS FIRE

IN NEW YORK CITY

New York, Oct. 8.—Fire, which threatened for a time to raze the entire block bounded by Wall, Front, Water and Pine streets, this morning, wrecked the six-story building at No. 127 Water street, doing damage estimated at \$350,000. Three alarms were turned in, and the firemen, together with a fire boat and an automobile water tower, had a stubborn fight for more than two hours before the blaze was brought under control.

The fire, which started in the cellar of the building, had evidently been smouldering since Saturday. The building was chiefly occupied by wholesale dealers in tea and coffee. Their entire stock was practically consumed. The cause of the fire was not determined.

NEW LIFEBOAT

WAS LAUNCHED

Toronto, Oct. 8.—The new Harry Fisher life boat was successfully launched at Painsons Iron Works Saturday afternoon. It was dropped from two heights, and demonstrated its self-righting principle in both. The first drop was made from an iron cradle ten feet high. Although the boat was nearly upside down, it righted itself in a few feet and fell in the water right side up. The boat was next raised 20 feet and dropped to the water. It landed right side up.

The boat is of steel, shaped somewhat like a cigar, and inside has a steel boat working on pivots, so that it is always in proper position. It is claimed that it is fire proof, non-sinkable and non-capsizable. It has capacity for fifty persons and with the aid of running boards on the sides and top could, if necessary carry another fifty. It is propelled by a screw operated by a crank.

Mr. Fisher, who is from New Zealand, will ship the boat to New York, where an exhibition test will be made from one of the ocean liners. The boat will then be carried over to England and tested before the British Board of Trade.

THIS IS A WHALE OF A STORY

Ocean City, N.J., Oct. 8.—Joseph Norcom, a surfiner of the Ocean City Life Saving Station, while patrolling the beach before daybreak to-day discovered a huge whale about 500 yards from shore, evidently striking bottom. Unable to turn around it gradually worked its way ashore where it died during the forenoon. It measures 85 feet in length and about 12 feet broad. It is of the sperm species, rarely seen in this vicinity. Representatives of the Academy of Natural Science of Philadelphia were notified and they are expected to come here to dissect the mammal to-morrow.

SLAVERY HAS BEEN ABOLISHED

Italian Authorities at Tripoli Have Issued Proclamation to This Effect.

Rome, Oct. 8.—(Via the Frontier.)

—The Italian authorities at Tripoli today issued a proclamation suppressing slavery. Tripoli was the only remaining port on the coast of Africa where slavery still prevailed, notwithstanding the efforts of Great Britain on the one side and France on the other to prevent the traffic.

General Spingardi, the Minister of War, went to Naples today to supervise, in conjunction with the Duke of Aosta, the organization of the troops for the expedition.

Advices from Tripoli say that groups of Turkish soldiers are coming in at various times to surrender. The Arabs, armed at the last moment by the garrison with Mauser rifles, landed by the steamer Derna, are gradually returning to Tripoli and offering their submission. Their only condition is that the Italian commander purchase their rifles for a few francs, which seems to show that not only are the Arabs—those at least in the vicinity of Tripoli—not ready to fight for Turkey, but also that condition of starvation prevails among the natives. More than 20,000 of these, it is reported, will soon be forced by hunger to return to the town.

It is not known how the Turkish soldiers comprising the garrison are off for supplies, but it is believed they are near the minimum. It is possible, however, that they may proceed into the interior for the purpose of arousing the Senoussi tribes and have them proclaim a holy war against the invaders.

The attitude of the Turkish Government with regard to the Italians in the Ottoman Empire is viewed with some concern, and the order of expulsion and the abolition of the capitulations, if carried into effect, may be the cause of serious complications. It is expected that Germany, which now has the Italians in Turkey under her protection, would raise an objection to such action.

Various reports are being received of anti-Italian riots, particularly in Saloniki, where the Italian consul is said to have been threatened with a revolver in his own house. Vice-Admiral, the Duke of the Abruzzi, left Taranto today aboard the armored cruiser Vettor Pisani, after having been in communication with the King and the Minister of Marine.

The armored cruisers Giuseppe Garibaldi, Francesco Ferruccio and Varese, which participated in the bombardment of Tripoli, were greeted enthusiastically by the people of south-eastern Sicily on their arrival yesterday at Agosta. After coaling the squadron left this morning under sealed orders.

HON. MR. PUGSLEY

MAKES EXPLANATIONS

Montreal, Que., Oct. 8.—Hon. William Pugsley, late Minister of Public Works, spent today at the Windsor.

In regard to the letting of contracts by the outgoing government, he said as far as small contracts of his department were concerned, those for which tenders had been asked previous to the elections had been awarded; but the department had thought it best to leave large matters like the St. John harbor contract to their successors.

The contract for the railway from Halifax eastward, as well as a small extension in Prince Edward Island had also been granted.

As to appointments, he declared that no appointment should be made. The statement that the outgoing administration had made a judicial appointment in Prince Edward Island resulted from a misunderstanding. All that had been done was to approve the judicial appointment of the local government.

Mr. Pugsley stated that he would practice his profession in St. John. He returns to Ottawa tomorrow to make arrangements to move back to St. John later on.

SASKATOON RETURNS.

Saskatoon, Sask., Oct. 8.—Final and complete returns for 137 polling subdivisions give McCraney, Liberal, 5,338; McLean, Conservative, 3,756; Baumunk, Independent, 674. McCraney led the poll in 102 of the 137 divisions. He had a plurality of 1,582 over McLean and a majority of 908 over both opponents. McCraney's majority in 1908 was 1,477, two candidates only.

DIED AS HIS FATHER DID.

Toronto, Oct. 8.—Dr. Chas. Trow, aged 55, of 43 Wellesley street, died suddenly of neuralgia of the heart this morning. He was professor of the eye and ear department in Toronto Academy of Medicine. His late father, Charles Trow, of Stratford, for many years M.P. for South Perth and chief Liberal whip, died of the same disease on a Toronto street car some years ago.

SPORTING WRITER DEAD.

Calgary, Alb., Oct. 8.—William Grant, sporting editor of the Calgary News-Telegram, died in Calgary to-night. He was at one time on the Ottawa Citizen, Port Hope Guide, and other eastern papers. He was city editor of the Edmonton Journal before coming to Calgary. He was a son of Rev. Dr. Grant, school inspector of Orillia, Ont.

BRITISH AUTHORITIES RETURN THANKS

For Presence of Canadian Contingent and Praise Appearance of Troops.

Ottawa, Oct. 8.—Militia orders to date contain among other things a copy of the despatch from the imperial authorities to His Excellency requesting him to convey to his ministers an expression of the gratitude of His Majesty's government at receiving representatives of the military and naval forces of the overseas dominions for the purpose of taking part in the coronation festivities, which have just terminated. The despatch also stated that the amassing of the contingents from all parts had a good effect in bringing together men from the widely separated portions of the empire.

"A most favorable impression was created by the appearance of the troops on the coronation days as well as at the parade at St. Paul's Cathedral on June 18, and also at the parade on the 30th of June when His Majesty was pleased to present them with coronation medals," he states. The detachment from the 79th Highlanders of Canada were inspected by H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught at Aldershot. This detachment was granted the coronation medal in the same proportion as was adopted in the case of the regular army. The despatch concluded: "His Majesty's government trusts that the troops will carry back with them a pleasant recollection of their visit."

CHARGED WITH HORSE STEALING

Woodstock, Ont., Oct. 7.—William Trehun, the local man who bought a horse in this city and went to Guelph, where he was arrested after he had sold the horse and failed to settle in the Woodstock deal, with the proceeds, was found guilty of stealing by the magistrate. He was not sentenced and was sent back to jail where he will conduct some correspondence with a view of getting the horse back to its original owner in Woodstock.

WILL BUILD NEW RINK

Brantford, Ont., Oct. 8.—Shareholders of the Brantford Rink Company were unanimous at a meeting here to erect a large new rink for this city. It is planned to build a cement and steel structure, the most modern of its kind in Ontario, plans for which will be formulated by the directors. Local curriers are making an effort to secure one of the exhibition buildings at Agricultural Park for curling this winter.

PERU'S PROTEST.

Lima, Peru, Oct. 8.—The Foreign Minister has sent a message to the Peruvian Minister at Bogota to present an energetic note of protest to the Colombian Government because of the recent attack on the Peruvian legation at Bogota. The minister has been instructed to demand full satisfaction.

NEW CATHOLIC COLLEGE.

Washington, Oct. 8.—With a mass celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Domedico Falconi, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, the Sisters College of the Catholic University of America was formally opened to-day in St. Benedict's Convent at Brookland, D. C. The college is designed to fit Catholic sisters as teachers for Catholic academies and schools throughout the country. Twenty-four sisters from various parts of the United States, Canada and England form the nucleus of the college.

AUTO DRIVER ARRESTED

Toronto, Oct. 8.—Arthur McBride, 55 Havelock street, was arrested Saturday charged with drunkenness, after his automobile had run down and painfully injured William C. Dunford of 578 Ossington avenue. A charge of doing grievous bodily harm will be laid against McBride. The accident occurred at the same corner where Edward Jacobs was killed by an automobile last summer.

CHOLERA SITUATION IN ITALY.

Chiasso, Switzerland, Oct. 6.—The official bulletin issued by the Italian Government on the cholera conditions in Italy shows that for the week of September 24-30 there have been 450 cases and 116 deaths in the whole country. The detailed report shows: City of Naples, 11 cases, 1 death; province of Naples, 4 cases, 1 death; Palermo, 14 cases, 4 deaths; Catania, 11 cases, 4 deaths; province of Catania, 24 cases, 4 deaths; Bari, 64 cases, 8 deaths; Cagliari, 21 cases, 5 deaths; Caserta, 41 cases, 14 deaths; Caltanissetta, 22 cases, 7 deaths; Carrara, 10 cases, 2 deaths; Girgenti, 37 cases, 3 deaths; Messina, 25 cases, 1 death; Trapani, 13 cases, 1 death; Venice, 4

cases, 4 deaths; Rome, 3 cases, 3 deaths.

An epidemic broke out in an asylum for the insane at Rome, resulting in 44 cases and 2 deaths. In the provinces of Rome there were 17 new cases and 7 deaths.

WILL GIVE \$30,000.

Toronto, Oct. 8.—Rev. Dr. Elmore Harris, former pastor of Walmer Road Baptist Church, has agreed to donate \$30,000 to a new Sunday school provided another \$30,000 is raised by subscription.

PORTUGUESE MINISTER OF WAR RESIGNS.

Lisbon, Oct. 8.—The Minister of War, General Pimenta Castro, has resigned. The Government has decided to ask President Arriaga to summon parliament in extraordinary session in order to secure the consent of the parliament to certain measures for the speedy trial and punishment of the conspirators in the attempted revolution. In an interview Premier Chagas declared that the republic up to the present has treated the Monarchists with forbearance, but henceforth no indulgence would be shown. The country,

**TRIPOLI NOW
REPORTED TRANQUIL**

Europeans Are in No Danger—

Italian Mission May Be
Considered Ended.

Malta, Oct. 8.—Prof. Arthauer, chief of the Austrian scientific mission, who has arrived here from Tripoli, says that the town is now tranquil. Europeans are not endangered and only 1,000 Turkish soldiers remain in the hinterland, but the Arabs, he says, are already organizing guerilla bands and intend to put up a dogged resistance.

Prof. Arthauer expresses the opinion that if Italy is content with the occupation of Tripoli her mission might be considered ended, but that if she intends to embark upon a campaign in the hinterland it will take years to subdue the natives.

Rome, Oct. 8.—Official despatches received here to-day say:

"Early this morning the ships of the first Italian squadron entered the roadstead at Tobruk, in Bomba Bay, where they found no Turkish warships. They summoned the garrison to surrender, but the Turks replied with a flat refusal and hoisted the Turkish flag.

"The battleship Vittorio Emanuele opened fire. The first shots carried away the flag and made a large breach in the fort. Rear-Admiral Aubrey, commander-in-chief of the fleet, then landed several companies of marines, who, after a short struggle, overcame the resistance of the small Turkish force. The Italians occupied the fort and hoisted their flag. A few Turkish soldiers, who refused to abandon the fort without further fighting, were made prisoners."

Athens, Oct. 8.—The Corinth Canal Company has decided to close the canal to both Turkish and Italian vessels during the continuance of the war. This canal connects the Gulf of Corinth with the Aegean Sea.

Constantinople, Oct. 7.—The Government has decided to establish a censorship on all press telegrams, particularly those dealing with military matters. Code messages will be prohibited. The Turkish commander at Tripoli reports that the Italian bombardment destroyed numerous houses and killed many inhabitants, including several women and children.

Lucknow, British India, Oct. 7.—Council of Moslems of all India has appealed for the intervention of the British Government of Turkey. It has advised also a boycott of Italian goods.

Rome, Oct. 7.—A despatch from Brindisi to the Messagero says that the two Italian destroyers Artigliere and Fulciere stopped an Austrian mail steamer near St. Jean de Medua. Commander Biscaretti went aboard the steamer, his boat carrying a white flag. On the return to the Artigliere the white flag was blown away, and Turkish soldiers opened fire from the cliffs. The boat reached the Artigliere in safety and the Italians returned the fire, not less than 200 shots being fired. The Turkish batteries, two encampments and a barracks, were destroyed and a large number of Turks were killed or wounded.

London, Oct. 8.—Most of the Constantinople correspondents agree that Turkey in renewing her efforts to secure peace, but they differ as to the procedure to be followed—whether by arbitration through an European conference, or by other means.

According to reports from Rome, Italy, which at one time was ready to pay Turkey a large compensation, will now pay nothing to Turkey, although she would not impose a war indemnity, if peace were concluded forthwith. If hostilities are prolonged, however, the reports say, Italy will insist upon a heavy indemnity.

Italy reports tell of the sinking of two Turkish torpedo boats with a loss of 300 Turks at San Giovanni di Medua, but the Turkish versions minimize the affair.

The Chronicle's Constantinople correspondent says that there is great activity on the part of the Italian warship through the Archipelago and in the Ionian and Red Seas. It is believed that their intention is to blockade the Dardanelles.

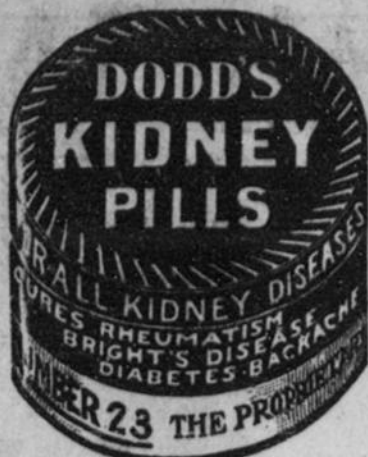
Reports are current that Said Pasha will resign and that Kiamil Pasha will become Grand Vizier. There are indications throughout the Turkish dominions of an energetic spirit in favor of a holy war, but in Constantinople the people pray constantly for peace.

According to the correspondent the American ambassador, W. Rockhill, has been instructed from Washington to use his influence for peace. The ambassador will have an interview tomorrow with Said Pasha. Russia is joining with the United States in this action. Turkey has sent another note to the powers asking for intervention and offering to grant every reasonable concession to Italy.

Constantinople, Oct. 8.—The Chauvinist press still demands severe anti-Italian measures, but the Moderate press and the general public realize that the only possible course is to end the war without delay. It is understood that the Grand Vizier and the Minister of War are inviting mediation by the powers to secure the completion of peace and that in the meantime the execution of the decree of expulsion relating to Italians will be postponed.

Constantinople, Oct. 8.—One hundred Fenian Raid veterans will travel to Ottawa next Saturday from Montreal to offer the honorary presidency of their association to His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught on the occasion of the reception to be tendered him by the citizens of the capital. On Saturday evening Captain Joseph H. Paterson of Ottawa met 350 veterans in the Armory and explained the action taken by the association during the recent elections. After the elections he had an interview with the new Prime Minister, who gave him promises for the future welfare of the veterans. An interesting feature of the celebration next Saturday is that the new Governor-General is himself a Fenian Raid veteran.

**WILL FIGHT NE
TEMERE DECREE**

Protestant Inter-Denominational Movement Has Been Started in Toronto.

Toronto, Oct. 8.—With the church courts of every denominational body of Protestantism pledged to resist the Ne Temere decree, a powerful movement to influence the federal government was inaugurated Saturday afternoon at a meeting held in this city. There were present representatives of every denominational section, Anglican, Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist, Congregational. After a spirited discussion, the alliance decided to send immediately to ten thousand clergymen and editors in Canada a document setting out the conflict of the Ne Temere decree with Canadian civil rights. Public educational meetings will be held in every centre of Canada. A series of monster petitions will be organized from all Protestants and as many Catholics as possible, demanding government action. These petitions will go to Premier Borden and to the legislature of British Columbia and Prince Edward Island, which control their own marriage laws. The alliance will also ask the Ontario government to send a stated case to its court of appeal to determine the control of the province over marriage.

Reported Purchase of St. James Methodist Church in Montreal Not Yet Accomplished.

Montreal, Que., Oct. 8.—St. James Methodist Church, the largest home of Methodism in the world, has not been sold as yet, despite reports to the contrary; but it is announced that Major John T. McBride has been authorized by parties in close touch with the Canadian Northern interests to offer the sum of \$2,000,000 for the property.

No sale can take place without the sanction of the trustee board, backed up by the approval of the Methodist Conference. A few months ago both went on record as opposed to any sale; but at that time no offer had been received.

The St. James Church was opened in 1889, as a matter of fact, belongs to Canadian Methodists as the General Conference some years ago, when the church was in serious financial difficulties, established a St. James Day, and every Methodist Church in the Dominion on that day came to the relief of the magnificent temple in Montreal.

Mr. A. C. Dawson, the treasurer of the church, when interviewed tonight, said that the responsibility of rejecting such an offer would be a great one, especially as the Canadian Northern intended to build its station either on the church's present site or on adjoining land, if the church would not sell, and the close presence of a station would deteriorate the value of the property for church purposes.

The church, including the site, cost \$386,000.

Toronto, Oct. 8.—Sir Donald Mann when asked tonight regarding reports that St. James' Methodist Church, Montreal, had been purchased for a site for the Canadian Northern Railway depot in Montreal, said: "This purchase is not for the Canadian Northern Railway. I heard the rumor that the church had been bought, but I can neither confirm it nor deny it."

**CHILD SHOT BY
PLAYMATE FRIEND**
Gloversville, N. Y., Oct. 8.—Shot by a bullet from a target rifle in the hands of his playmate yesterday, Ralph Spencer, 15 years old, died at his home in North Broadland, near here, and James Knight, his playmate, also 15, is under arrest. Knight's relatives say the shooting was an accident.

**ROYALIST LEADER'S
FATE UNKNOWN**
Madrid, Oct. 8.—A despatch from Chaves says that quiet prevails there, but the fate of Captain Couceiro, leader of the Royalists, is unknown. Couceiro is supposed to have been at the head of the Royalists who have been actively engaged in the neighborhood of Chaves and other towns in the north of Portugal in trying to overthrow the republic. Government forces sent to the assistance of the Republican troops are reported to be near Vinhais.

FATHER CARR UMPIRE.
Toronto, Oct. 8.—St. Michael's College and Toronto Amateur Athletic Club opened the senior Ontario Rugby Football Union season locally Saturday afternoon at Varsity field before a fair crowd. St. Michael's proved the better team by a final score of 13 to 7.

The Toronto's had the weight but St. Michael's at the start appeared to have the speed.

**CHARGED WITH
GIRL'S MURDER**

Cherokee Indian Had a Narrow
Escape From Being Lynched
by Mob.

Asheville, N. C., Oct. 8.—Ross French, 21, a Cherokee Indian, living on the Birdtown, Swaine county, reservation, was safely locked in the county jail here tonight charged with the murder of Ethel Schuler, a 14-year-old farmer's daughter. His arrival here was effected after an exciting escape from a mob of 100 men bent on lynching the prisoner.

The body of the dead girl was found Friday in the woods near the town, with her throat cut. No trace of her assailant was found until this morning, when Deputy Sheriff Beck arrested Ross French near Sylva. Beck made the arrest on the strength of blood stained finger prints on the Indian's hat.

The news of French's capture spread quickly to the neighboring towns and a mob of 100 men followed the deputy sheriff to Wainessville, where French was lodged in jail. As the mob continued to grow Beck took his prisoner through the back door of the jail and brought him to Asheville. The Indian tonight made a partial confession, but would not give full details of the crime.

TAXES CHICAGO FUNERALS.

Village of Forest Park Blocks Way of Five Cemeteries.

The village of Forest Park has cut off access to five large cemeteries west of Chicago. The village council recently passed an ordinance authorizing a toll to be charged for every vehicle which traverses the streets of Forest Park. The cemeteries can be reached now only by the payment of a vehicle tax, which will place a prohibitive cost on every funeral procession going that way. The rates are as follows:

For single-horse vehicle, \$4; for double horse vehicle, \$8; for single seated automobile, \$10; for double seated automobile, \$20. In accordance with this schedule drivers of hearses must pay \$8 to use the streets of the village. Every vehicle in the procession will have to pay from \$4 to \$20. The ordinance, which is said to amount to a measure of spite, is believed to be aimed at the Chicago city administration, which refused to co-operate with Forest Park in the late traction fight affecting the suburb—Chicago Dispatch in New York Sun.

SHOT WITH GOLD BULLETS.
Bullets of solid gold were used by Yaqui Indians in fighting against the Porfirio Diaz regime in the recent revolution, according to passengers arriving here recently on the steamer Curacao from Mexican ports.

New York, Oct. 7.—Trading in stocks was again in light volume during today's session, and movements were narrow. The market showed further heaviness during most of the short session, but toward the close recoveries were general and most of the active stocks made small gains.

Trading was restricted almost entirely to professional operations.

There was further heavy pressure against United States Steel but bear efforts met obstinate resistance. The stock at its low price showed a loss of less than a point and ended the day with a fractional gain. The list manifested a tendency to divide itself, with the greater strength in the standard railroads. Some minor stocks particularly those whose movements derive their impetus from pool manipulation, exhibited a degree of activity.

American Beet Sugar and Pacific Telephone were among the strongest of the industrials. American Tobacco issues showed further strength and American Snuff pfd advanced more than two points.

The conspicuously weak spot in the list was Allis Chalmers. The five per cent bonds broke more than seven points, the preferred stock three points and the common 2½. These issues sold at the lowest prices on record since the company was formed in 1901 with no authenticated information to account for the decline.

American stocks were fractionally lower in London where a more hopeful feeling prevailed as a result of relaxation from the recent strain. British trade reports for September show an increase of almost \$11,000,000 in imports with a slight decrease in exports.

Advices as to domestic commercial conditions were conflicting. The middle west reported a normal demand, while the mercantile agencies noted a further halting. Announcement that one of the large money lending institutions has stopped making loans to finance building operations, on the ground that the building boom in certain directions has been overdone is interesting in its suggestion that this city has been suffering from fictitious real estate conditions.

The expected loss in cash by the banks was revealed in the bank statement. In addition to the decrease occasioned by exportation of \$3,500,000 gold, the banks lost on operations with the interior. The cash decrease as shown in the average table was considerably in excess of estimates, amounting to \$10,769,000. Surplus reserve fell off by \$8,713,000.

The weakness of Allis Chalmers bonds did not affect the general bond market. Quotations were steady.

United States bonds were unchanged on call for the week.

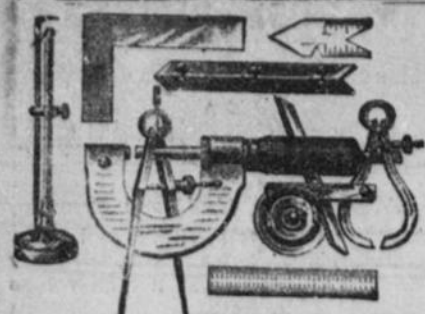

NEW YORK LADY KILLS LARGE MOOSE

Gets Quarry on the Reserves
of the Rowley Brothers at
Lake Edward.

One of the finest heads of moose
secured in this neighborhood so far
this year was a fine specimen secured
by Mrs. Stern, of New York, a few
days ago in the splendid hunting re-
serves of the Rowley Brothers at
Lake Edward. The head had a
spread of 62 inches and would have
made several inches more had it not
been for a very sharp turn at the
end of one of the horns. One of the
horns had twelve tines and the other
only ten. The moose was shot about
four o'clock in the afternoon at
about 300 yards and killed instantly
with a single shot.

This is not the first one by any
means that Mrs. Stern has killed at
Lake Edward. Another magnificent
head which she got was unluckily
burnt in a big fire a couple of years
ago. She has many trophies of the
chase of all kinds and as she spends
a great deal of time in the bush she
has taken a large number of photo-
graphs of game of every description.
Every year she passes about six
months at Lake Edward. During the
summer she fishes and in autumn she
has her own camp away in the bush.
She has now gone back for some car-
ibou hunting and next month will go
shooting in the Rockies and various
parts of British Columbia.

Another fine head measuring 63
inches was also obtained on the Row-
ley reserves by Mr. Quintard, of
White Plains, N.Y. In fact every
day parties are returning from suc-
cessful trips and many are fitted out
every day. The advantage of these

accommodated to suit the time at his

PRETENDER TO THE PORTUGUESE THRONE

Vienna, Oct. 7.—Dom Miguel Bragan-
za, pretender to the Portuguese
throne, announces that he has agreed
to accept the programme laid out by
Captain Couceiro, leader of the Royal-
ists. Dom Miguel says that the
Cortes will have to decide between
him and Manuel. He will not pro-
ceed to the Portuguese frontier but
will remain neutral to the last mo-
ment, although he has allowed his
sons to enter the Monarchist ranks
under assumed names as volunteers.
"The republic of Portugal," said
Dom Miguel, "has, through its disre-
garded all traditions and religious
convictions, made itself so hated, es-
pecially among the country people,
that the prospects for the restoration
of the Monarchy are not unfavorable."

MANY LIVES LOST IN STORM IN MEXICO

Nogales, Ariz., Oct. 7.—A railroad
operator at Torres, Sonora, estab-
lished communication with this town
today long enough to report that 15
or 20 people had been killed or
drowned in the storm which raged
from Tuesday to Thursday on the
Mexican west coast. Most of the loss
of life occurred at Ortiz, a settlement
near Torres. Colonia, another village
also was virtually wiped out and four
or five lives were lost.

Lieutenant Anderson Won It
With a Possible on Saturday
Last.

There was a large attendance of
the local marksmen at the ranges on
Saturday last on the occasion of the
R.C.G.A. open match and some re-
cord shooting resulted. The match

8th R.R., who put all ten shots into
the bullseye at 600 yards. This is the
first time, the ten shot possible has
been made in competition on the local
ranges. The veteran, Pte. Goudie,

ITALY'S POLICY TOWARD TRIPOLI

Views of the Premier, as Well
of Those of the Socialist
Leader.

Rome, Oct. 7.—Premier Giolitti, in
a speech at Turin today, outlined the
policy of the government with refer-
ence to Tripoli, which seems to have
the support of most of the members
of the Chamber of Deputies and a
great majority of the people. Signor
Bislati, leader of the Socialists in
the chamber, however, writes to the
Secolo, giving the view of a section
of the Democrats and Socialists, dif-
fering from that of the nation at
large. Signor Bislati was the first of
his party to be received by the King,
when during the last ministerial crisis
the premier offered him a portfolio.
In his letter to the Secolo he says:
"Now that the occupation is accom-
plished, it must be decided whether
Tripoli will be considered conquered
territory unconditionally, or whether
Italy is ready to compromise—stop-
ping the war, sparing Turkish ex-
cessive humiliations and offering her
political and material satisfaction, and
this rendering resumption of the good
relations between the two states pos-
sible."

Signor Bislati expresses the opin-
ion that it would be necessary for
Italy "to adopt a less brutal and dan-
gerous solution," so as to remove the
impression that violence has been
used against Turkey and that Italy
should show a spontaneous conciliat-
ory disposition, thus avoiding "such
measures as may be proposed, if not
imposed, by the powers."
Despatches reaching here from Tri-
poli indicate great activity among the
Italian forces at various points along
the coast in preparation for the land-
ing of troops. It is even reported
that the natives are sympathetic in
their attitude. The Turkish soldiers
in Tripoli are said to be in a de-
moralized state and although some of
them are camped five miles from the
city and are protected by small forts
on the hills they have not even at-
tempted to molest the invaders.

and Day Bank of Memphis, now in the
hands of a receiver, late last night was
arrested on a charge of obtaining the
sum of \$6,000 under false pretences.
The charge was preferred by Charles
Eckert, secretary and treasurer of the
Western and Southwestern Insurance
Company of Oklahoma.
