## CABINET CHANGE FOR ABBOTT

### May Relinquish Finance Ministry For Justice Dept

A well founded Ottawa rumour has it that Hon. D. C. Abbott, member for St. Antoine-Westmount, will shortly relinquish his portfolio as Minister of Finance.

The rumour also goes on to say that Mr. Abbott is slated to succeed the Hon. Stuart Garson as Minister of Justice.

Mr. Abbott is reported as having become rather tired of the finance post, and would welcome a change.

The Hon. Alphonse Fournier's name is also mentioned in the proposed cabinet shuffle, with Mr. Fournier said to be looking for an appointment to a vacancy on the Quebec bench.

The news of Mr. Abbott's move

from the Ministry of Finance is said to be welcomed by some of his closer friends, who feel that he is the logical successor to Mr. St. Laurent as premier.

While one of the most important portfolios in the cabinet, the job of Minister of Finance is probably the most unpopular.

Decisions, which in some cases are not well received, have to be made by the Finance Minister, and naturally the minister is blamed for the legislation.

A point in mind was the furore raised by the hike in rents, and the proposed removal of rent control. Mr. Abbott was the main target for the abuse which was fired at the government, although probably the rest of the cabinet had as much to do with order No. 813, as the Finance Minister.

If Mr. Abbott becomes Minister of Justice, this will make three cabinet posts which he has filled, Defence, Finance, and Justice.

If he is to succeed Mr. St. Laurent as Premier, the training he has received will stand him in good stead.

### One Man Injured In Car Collision At Cor. Lansdowne

John O'Neill, 46, of 2325 Oxford Avenue, Notre Dame de Grace was slightly injured in a three way accident at the corner of Lansdowne Avenue and Sherbrooke Street at 12-17 p.m. on Wednesday.

Mr. O'Neill was taken to the Homoeopathic Hospital where he was treated for injuries to his right side and right leg.

Constable B. Wilson who investigated the accident reported that Kenneth Herbert Sutton, 31, of 12355 Jesmin Street, Cartierville, was driving north in his auto on Lansdowne when he collided with a car driven by John O'Neill at the Sherbrooke intersection.

O'Neill was going east at the time, and the force of the collision bounced his car into another car which was stopped waiting for the children to cross the street.

The auto, which was facing west on Sherbrooke Street, was driven by Maurice Benbow, 20, of 29 Forde Avenue, Westmount, the car received only slight damages.

The two other cars sustained damage. Sutton and Benbow, outside of being shaken up, suffered no serious injuries.

By a curious co-incidence the car owned by Mrs. Nathan Benbow, of 29 Forde Avenue was involved in a collision on Argyle Avenue on Tuesday when a run-away car smashed into two parked automobiles.

### Repaving St. Catherine St. To Cost Westm't \$32,875

The repaving of St. Catherine Street in the Westmount area, was authorized by the Westmount City Council this week, with tender going to the Sicily Asphaltum Paving Company.

The total work to be done under contract and by the City's Public Works departments was set at \$32,875.

### Driverless Car Hits Two Others

Three cars were involved in an accident near the corner of Argyle Avenue and Westmount Boulevard on Tuesday, when a driverless automobile ran down Argyle crossed the Boulevard and hit two parked cars before coming to a stop.

The run-away car was owned by Rev. Father W. A. Rodrigue, of 355 St. John Street, Quebec City.

The two cars with which it collided were owned by Harold W. Miller, of 4990 Lacombe Avenue, Montreal and Mrs. Nathan Benbow, 29 Forde Avenue, Westmount.

The run-away car started from opposite 639 Argyle Avenue, north of the Boulevard and finished up by ramming the two parked cars in front of 612 Argyle Avenue south of the Boulevard on the east side of the street.

Fortunately no one was in any of the three cars.

### Readings Given Draft Loan By Westm't City Council

First and second readings to a draft loan by-law for the paving of sidewalks, lands and buildings in Westmount, was given by the Westmount City Council at its meeting this week.

The total amount of the loan was set at \$446,500, with a third reading still necessary before the by-law becomes official.

Special honor awards went to May Robertson and John Cleghorn, who were voted by fellow students as having performed the greatest service to the school and as having qualities best combining honor, scholarship and sportsmanship.

The presentations were made by Mrs. Frederic B. Coppin and Albert Briggs, president of the Alumnae and Old Boy's Associations.

R. O. Bartlett, principal of the school, said the qualities being honored were "held in just as high esteem as academic standards."

Certificates which went to 148 eleventh grade and twelfth grade students, also showed that the recipients had followed instruction in a given course.

The opening prayer and doxology were given by Rev. J. D. Wilkie, minister of Stanley Presbyterian Church, Westmount.

Certificates to the girls were presented by Miss Dorothy King, biology teacher, and the boys' awards were presented by Parker L. Wearing, English teacher, Donald Savage, gave the valedictory.

It was announced that Miss Jean Hawthorne and Miss Millicent Dyke are retiring from the staff after serving 39 and 33 years respectively with the Westmount board. Dr. W. Patterson is leaving to become principal of the School for Crippled Children.

## Sherbrooke Street Expense \$168,400

The Westmount City Council, this week, authorized a total expenditure of \$168,400 to complete all work on the present Sherbrooke Street project.

A spokesman for the City pointed out that this amount would cover the widening and re-paving of the street, from Clarke to Atwater Avenue, the removal of trees wherever necessary; the installation of new electric light conduits and the installation of new street lights in the area.

With regard to the tree removal, the spokesman pointed out that unfortunately certain trees would have to be taken down. He also stated that wherever possible, young trees would be transplanted along the street, so that the appearance of the area might be in some way maintained.

## Atwater League May Move West On St. Catherine

The Atwater Ball League, who will lose their playing field at Atwater park next year owing to the recent sale of the property and the announced intention of the new owner to start building on the ground just as soon as the present ball season ends, has caused the league officials to start looking around for a new stance.

## Norm. Millington Named Secretary Westmount "Y"

After spending more than 10 years as a member of the Y.M.C.A., Norman Millington of N. D. G. became a permanent staff member and last week was made executive secretary of the Westmount Branch.

Mr. Millington will replace James Carnie, who has been recalled to the Metropolitan Office in Montreal.

Born in N.D.G. 35 years ago, Mr. Millington was educated in Montreal and Ontario schools before taking a position in an advertising firm. He was a steady and active member of the Y.M.C.A. in various Ontario cities before taking the full time job with the organization at the outbreak of the war.

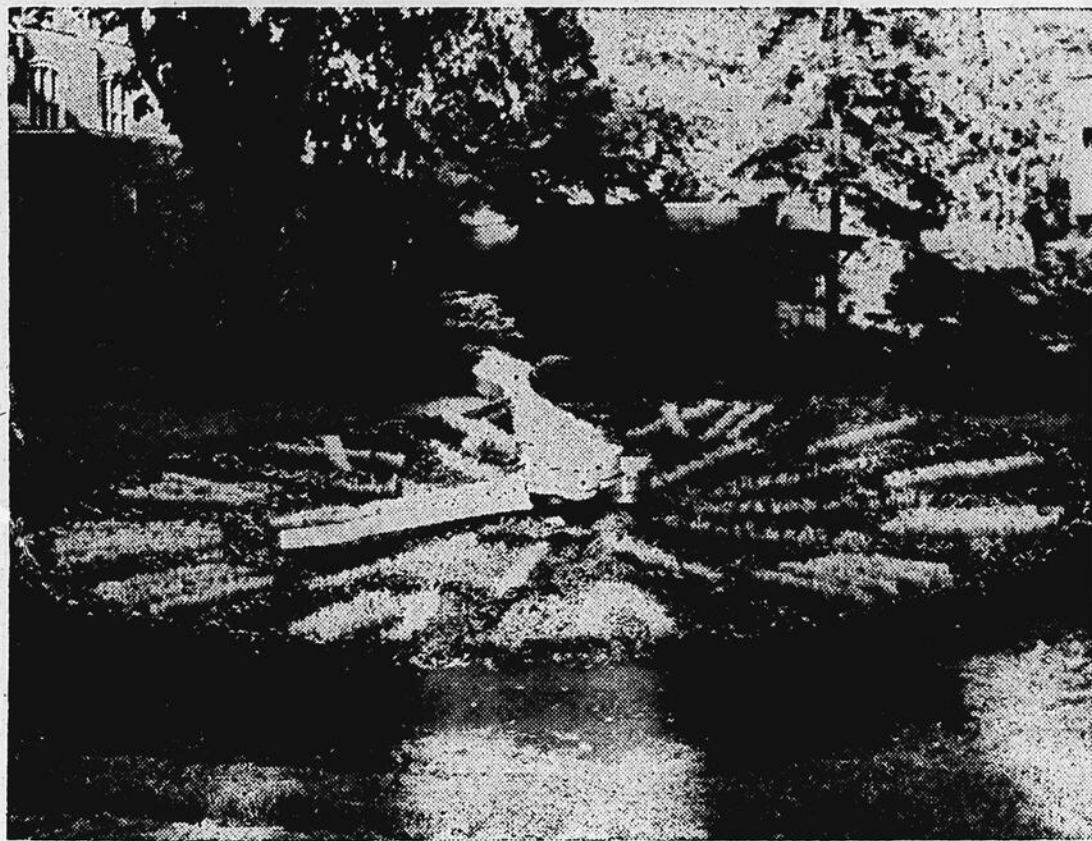
In 1939, he was stationed at Camp Borden, Ontario, carrying out recreational work for the Army, and was later transferred to the R.A.F. station at Mount Hope, Ontario, before being sent overseas in 1942.

After three years service in England and Europe, he ventured to Montreal, where he was appointed membership secretary at the Central Branch, Drummond Street.

## Viewpoints of Management, Labour Stressed at Rotary

The conflicting viewpoints held by labour and management in industrial relations were outlined by Cecil C. Gardner, General Manager of Dow's Brewery, at the regular luncheon meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club, Westmount.

Mr. Gardner, who studied post graduate courses on Industrial Relations at Columbia University, after graduating from McGill, gave four of the major problems and differences held by the two groups, stating that some solution to the problem can be maintained.

"In my opinion," he said, "one of the four viewpoints regards welfare plans. Management feels that the union man should go on a 50-50 basis in outlining and

paying for such a plan, but the labourer or union thinks the entire bill should be carried by management." He said it is a big question when nearly \$1,000,000 is at stake.

The basic difference in wages was a second point stressed by the speaker, who claimed that management thinks wages should be given in accordance with the rest of the area and type of work, and that excess profits be turned into making the firm larger. But unions want the profits to go to their members, which will, in turn, give them added strength.

On the question of work, management expects a normal amount of good work done for a day's pay, while the union feels that work should be spread around so that there is work for all, so there will be no unemployment.

The fourth question concerned the power of the union, with management feeling they should deal only with the problems concerning them.

"But many unions want their feet under the boardroom table, taking part in the discussion on how much should be allotted to advertising, production and procedure by the administration". He cited a case where a union tried to stop the executive from putting new lights in the building.

In suggesting solutions for what he called, "an exceptionally serious problem", Mr. Gardner said that management was partly to blame in many cases. He supported the idea that management should be more professional, and that supervision needs improving.

"The position of labour and industrial relations needs just as much study as any other profession", the speaker said in closing. He was introduced by Robert Clarke and thanked by Ted Harrison of the Westmount Rotary Club.

Another big event will be the Summer Penny Circus to be held July 28th at the Westmount Y. Other Y's in the City will be invited to participate in the program. Planned are swimming events, movies and penny booths in the gym, with the proceeds going to the World Service Work of the Y.M.C.A.

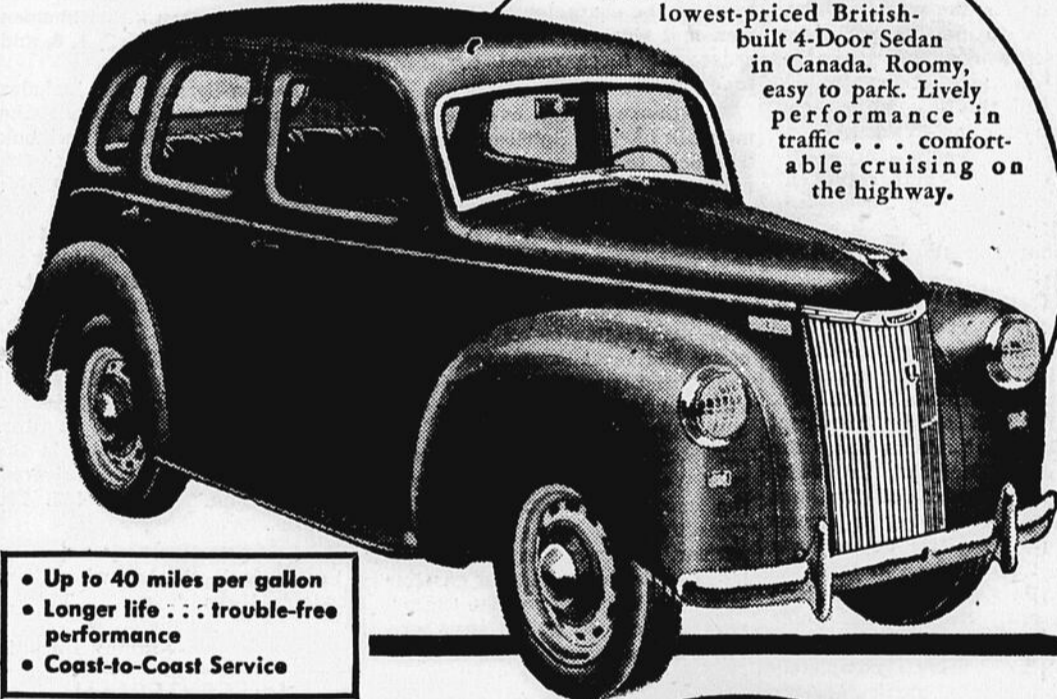

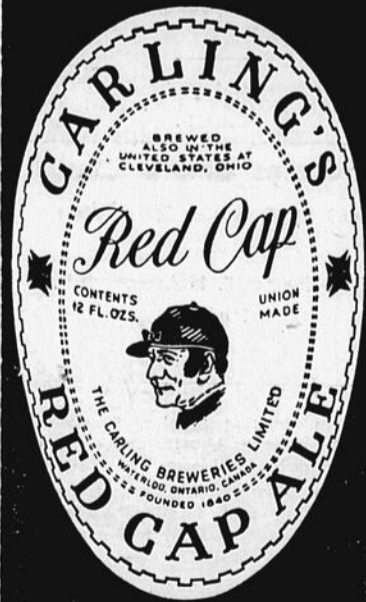

We were a passenger recently in an automobile that was being driven thirty miles and return. In the event of the unexpected we wanted to be in financial shape to bear our share. We tucked away \$20 for emergencies.

What prompts these remarks is the everlasting complaining whenever fares of public transportation systems are increased a few cents, following increases in wages of the operating personnel. Yet the people who yell the loudest about these pennies never murmur about the unexpected outgo of dollars that is inevitable in motoring.

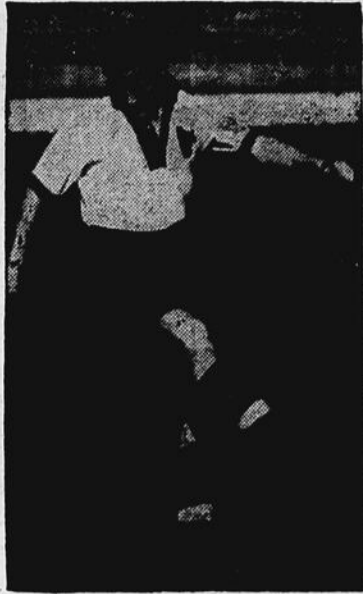

## John Marshall Honored As Great Hockey Player

One of the greatest all-round athletes in Montreal history is John Calder Marshall, of 27 Prospect Ave., Westmount. In the early days of hockey, between 1900 and 1914, Mr. Marshall played for Stanley Cup teams and managed a seventh. Now, at 74 years of age, he can look back with pride over a life time of sporting accomplishments that embraced basketball, baseball, soccer and hockey, as well as hockey.

Mr. Marshall was born at St. Valier, Quebec, and raised in Montreal's Point St. Charles, where he engaged in nearly every sport. But it was as a hockey forward that he really excelled.

In 1900 when he went to Winnipeg and returned to Montreal with the Winnipeg Victorias, when that team defeated the Montreal Shamrocks to win the Stanley Cup.

In 1902 he played for the Montreal club and it was this team that fought the Stanley Cup back to Montreal by defeating the Winnipeg Victorias. On two more occasions they defeated the Victorias in this City for the Stanley Cup. It was at this time that this group of famous hockey players were dubbed "The Little Men of Montreal."

In 1906 and '07 Mr. Marshall played for the Wanderers, and they won the Stanley Cup both years. They won it again in 1908 and in 1910, and he was also on the winning Toronto team in 1914—the first time Toronto won the Stanley Cup.

On Wednesday, Mr. Marshall was the honoured guest of the Montreal Sportsmen's Association when they held their annual golf tournament at the Mount Royal Golf Club. He follows in the footsteps of several other outstanding Montreal athletes who have been honoured.

Mr. Marshall is richly deserving of such an honour, and to mark the occasion he was presented with the Carling's Red Cap of News "The scarlet hunter's cap presented to Mr. Marshall at
