Robert J. Lindsay and George F. Bourke, both residents of Westmount, were elected respectively President and Secretary of the Canadian Federation of Newman Clubs at the national convention of the Federation held in Fredericton, N.B., from October 25 to 27.

Mr. Lindsay, a graduate of Loyola College and presently in his graduating year in engineering at McGill University resides at 318 Kensington Avenue. Mr. Bourke attended St. Leo's Academy, received his degree from McGill in 1941, and lives at 320 Redfern Avenue.

The Canadian Federation of Newman Clubs is an association of twenty Newman Clubs at various universities across Canada, representing 6000 Catholic students at non sectarian institutions of higher learning. The purpose of the clubs is to care for the spiritual, cultural and social welfare of Catholic students studying at these universities. The Federation serves to unite these clubs, acting as a secretariat for the gathering and distributing of information for its members, and represents them officially in national and international affairs. ## UNWISE TO WAIT

In the closing days of last week, officers of an independent organization, which makes a specialty of accurately measuring public opinion, became curious about the reception which Canadians are giving to the new Canada Savings Bonds. They set their large and widespread staff to work in all provinces to find out, among other things, what percentage of the three million buyers of Victory Loan Bonds and War Savings Certificates had bought the new bonds to date; how many of the remainder intended to buy.

One of the more interesting facts which this survey uncovered was that an estimated 21% of former Victory Loan buyers in urban areas had not yet bought because they were waiting for a salesman to call; and in the rural areas an estimated 11% were also waiting for a salesman. This proved of particular interest to those who planned and are giving direction to the sale of Canada Savings Bonds, in view of the fact that such wide publicity has been given on this very point. While there are a number of salesmen from investment houses in the field, they cannot begin to make the extensive canvass of individuals, particularly in rural areas, which was made by the sales force employed in Victory Loans. The odds are overwhelming that if this 21% in cities and 11% in rural districts continue to wait for salesmen, they will never buy a new bond.

Two other features of the survey show that 27% of those in the rural areas who have yet to buy are going to send in their applications by mail, and that 28% of those in country areas who bought Victory Bonds have not yet decided to secure a new bond and are classified under the column, "Might buy." A good tip for those in the first group would be, "Act now on your good intentions," and for the second group, "End your indecision and buy. You obviously stand to benefit yourself, since it is the finest investment available today. In case of

need you can turn it into cash at 100 cents on the dollar, plus interest, at any time."

## COMING TRAFFIC JAMS

The information, made public recently, that there are ten thousand automobiles in downtown Montreal for every one that can be parked, makes one wonder what is going to happen when all the new cars get on the road. The traffic problem a year or so from now is going to be ghastly. Today, it takes the better part of a half-hour to get from Bleury street to the corner of Peel and Sherbrooke, via Dorchester, during the five o'clock rush; what it will be like when fifty thousand additional cars get on the roads in the Montreal area can hardly be imagined.

We talk about spending millions on a subway system as a solution. That will get folks to and from work faster, but it won't take any cars off the road. The traffic will be just as bad, parking will be just as difficult, with or without subways. Men who can do something about it do not seem to know the solution, which should be obvious — make cars smaller! Present-day automobiles are foolishly inflated — about six or seven feet longer than necessary, some of them more than that. The additional length is unnecessary, being composed of "gingerbread" as they call it in the trade. Cars are built long to make people think they are getting a big car, a lot for their money.

Forty percent of available parking space could be saved, or to put it another way forty percent more cars could be parked in the same cub space if the gingerbread was stripped off. Make cars smaller, by legislation if necessary, or else city auto travel will become almost impossible.

## COMPLIMENTARY, BUT UNPOPULAR

One day we complimented a newspaper writer on the production of a forthright editorial in which certain individuals and corporations were named for merit and extolled for their contribution to the local welfare.

The man smiled wanly and said the article had caused more jealousy and discontent than anything he had written for months. Those not mentioned in the roundup were sore, and said so. Those mentioned kept quiet, no doubt concluding that the nice words said about them were inadequate.

The public often wonders why so much editorial writing is double-talk and hash. The foregoing is the explanation. About the only time a provincial newspaper can really go to town is when a man dies.

# TWO PICTURES OF RIBBENTROP

Ribbentrop was perhaps the most pathetic-looking feature in the big dock of Nurnberg. There was some attempt on the part of the rest of the accused to preserve their old military or diplomatic dignity, although, as one correspondent remarked, they all had a "guilty look." There was, however, no remnant left in the face and bearing of Ribbentrop of that arrogant dignity which he assumed when he was acting as lackey and diplomatic adviser to Hitler. As he sat there in the dock he was not only deflated physically, but his face was a picture of utter despair.

Look on that picture and then on this of the high-and-mighty Herr von Ribbentrop, as presented by Sumner Welles in his book, "Time for Decision," in which he tells of his mission to Europe in 1940 to see if there was any means of stopping the war.

"I arrived in Berlin," says Welles, "in the early morning of March 1. Almost the first thing I saw, as I drove down the familiar Unter den Linden to the Hotel Adlon, was a group of Polish prisoners, under armed guards, shoveling snow from the streets.

"The German government had permitted no word of my arrival to appear in the German press. The time of my reception by Hitler's Minister for Foreign Affairs, Herr von Ribbentrop, had been fixed for noon. . . Every official of the Foreign Office was dressed in military uniform. After we passed the two sphinxes at the portal, we came upon storm troopers in stained uniforms, stationed at the top of the stairs. Their faces were subnormal in their startling brutality.

"My reception by Ribbentrop was in some ways the most astonishing experience of my entire mission.

"Backed by Herr Schmidt, the

well-known interpreter, he received me at the door of his office, without the semblance of a smile, and without even a word of greeting. After a moment's pause, I spoke a few words in English, since I knew that he spoke English fluently.

"Ribbentrop looked at me icily and barked at Dr. Schmidt the German word 'interpret'. We then sat down. The minister turned to me and asked me in German whe-

ther I had had a comfortable journey. I turned to Dr. Schmidt and said in English that I had lost all facility in speaking German and to be good enough to interpret my reply to the Minister.

"I set forth the nature of my mission, emphasizing that my government was solely interested in the establishment of permanent peace in Europe and had no interest in any temporary truce. I concluded by making it very clear that I had no proposals to offer and no commitments whatever to put forward on the part of the United States.

Ribbentrop then commenced to speak and never stopped for well over two hours, except at the request of the interpreter from time to time to translate the preceding portion of his discourse. The Minister sat with his arms extended on the sides of his chair and his eyes continuously closed. The pomposity and absurdity of his manner could not be exaggerated. One could only assume that he envisioned himself as the Delphic oracle."

Compare this pompous and Olympian Ribbentrop, in all his glory in Berlin in 1940, with the miserable, cowed figure sitting in the criminals' dock at Nurnberg in 1946. How are the mighty fallen! One could have pitied him if he had revealed any trace of repentance in his face, or in his speech of defence to the court. But, like the rest of those Nazi mass-murderers, Ribbentrop had no sorrow in his heart for his crimes against humanity.

One thousand and fourteen children were adopted in New Jersey in 1945. We're always pleased to hear about more happy homes.

Our exports for August, 1946, totaled \$409,218,000, the best peacetime month in our history. Our best previous peacetime total was \$383,669,000 for November, 1945. Most of our trade (\$200,000,000 worth) was with our good neighbors the U.S.A.

Here we have a wheat crop of over 440,000,000 bushels, proportionate harvests of coarse grain, bumper crops of fruits, potatoes and practically all food products. Britain has its contract for 160,000,000 bushels of wheat for this year, and because of the rain storms that have played havoc with the fields in that country would like 40,000,000 bushels more. The British want oats from this country to make oatmeal porridge because the oats they have raised this year have deteriorated to the point that they won't produce sufficient of the time-honored standby of the breakfast table.

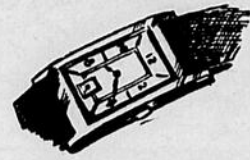

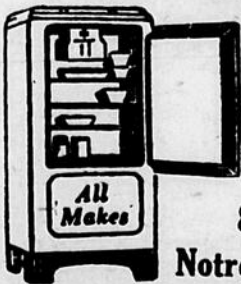

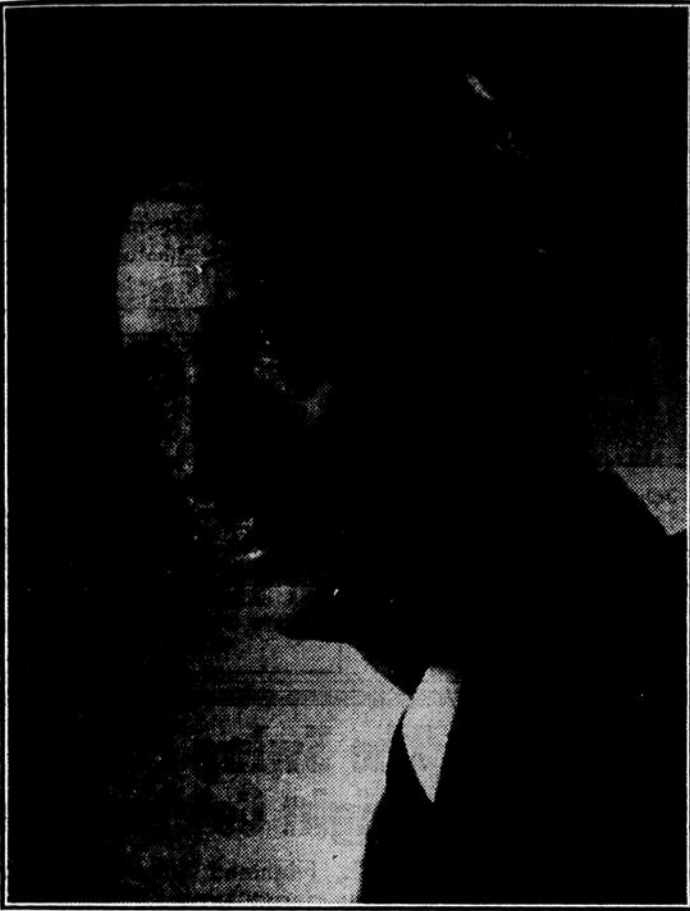

Signor Francisco Manetta was born in Bordeaux, France, of Italian parents. His mother was a noted opera singer, and his father an accomplished violinist.

At the age of 16, musicians and critics who heard young Manetta in his native town, knew he was the possessor of a rich and fine voice. Immediately his parents had him study with great Italian masters, Maestro Francesco Carbonne and Pietro Vallen.

His first appearance at the Milan Grand Opera was brilliant. It was in the interpretation of the first roles in Cavalleria Rusticana, Il Trovatore, La Forza de Destino and Pagliacci that

he obtained his greatest triumphs. The celebrity of this tenor spread all over Europe and he was applauded in the Opera theatres of France, Belgium, Germany, Spain and Italy.

It was in Italy during an engagement that he met the famous impresario Oscar Hammerstein, with whom he signed a contract to sing at the Manhattan Opera in New York. In 1912 he sang at the Boston Grand Opera, where he obtained great success in the principal roles.

In 1914 he accepted engagements in the Keith's circuit, where he sang for five years, and in 1919 Signor Manetta decided to give up the theatre and has since devoted himself exclusively to singing tuition in Montreal. He now resides on Greene Avenue in Westmount.

## BULLETINS FROM BIRDLAND

### GOLDEN PLOVER

We think it extraordinary that birds can be away from home for many months, hundreds of miles distant, and yet find their way to the identical bush or tree where they nested the year before. But far more remarkable is the navigation of the juvenile Golden Plovers when making the first trip of their lives.

Their breeding grounds stretch from Hudson Bay westward. While it is still summer, as soon as the young ones are old enough to care for themselves but not sufficiently feathered to make a long journey, the parents leave, moving at first eastward to Labrador where they stay awhile to rest and feed. After taking off from there, they pass over Nova Scotia and, weather permitting, continue on for some 2,400 miles without stopping. On reaching the coast of South America they again pause for a short time before continuing the journey to their winter quarters in the pampas of Argentina, where they arrive in September.

This flight over the ocean, almost passing belief, must take all of 48 hours. Most birds fly either by day or by night, but this is ceaseless, unless the Plovers rest on the surface of the water occasionally, which is possible. If the weather is not propitious, they come down in Bermuda; otherwise flocks of them are seen passing right over the island. How wonderful to be able to find this tiny dot in the Atlantic, almost 600 miles from any point on the continent!

We learn from aviators why this route is chosen. They are always aided by a tail wind which the men call "the Bermuda high." But this constant wind from the north would be against the birds were they to try returning by the same route. And so in March they come north by an entirely different flyway—an exception to the rule that birds use the same course both ways. Flying in a north-westerly direction they touch Equador, cross the Isthmus of Panama and the Gulf of Mexico, and go up the Mississippi Valley, on to their breeding grounds.

Their children, born in the Arctic, must later take the autumn trip without guidance. They do not follow their elders, but choose the Mississippi flyway by which their parents came north before they were born, and finally join them in the pampas of Argentina. Was there ever a more wonderful case of navigation?

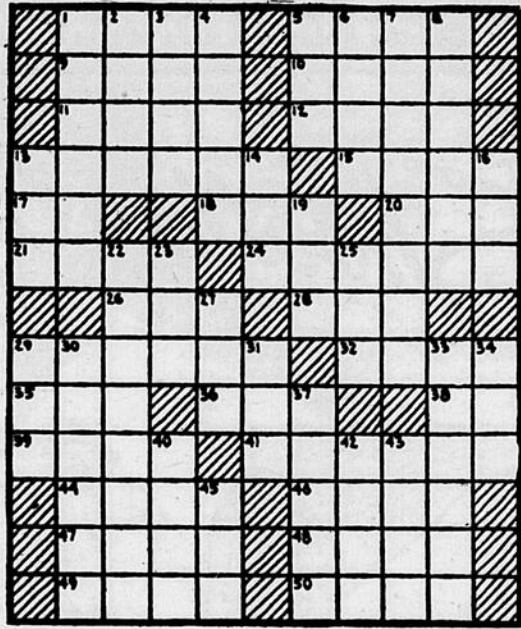

## Westmount High Teacher Second Term President

Kenneth Mactavish, of the Westmount High School staff, was re-elected president of the Association of Protestant Men teachers of Greater Montreal for a second term at the third annual meeting, held Monday at Westmount.

With the re-election of last year's executive, the following also head the association this year: Vice-president, H. E. Wright, High School of Montreal; secretary, J. G. S. Brash, West Hill High School; treasurer, J. H. Ciley, Commercial High School.

Negotiations for salary increases were still under way with the Montreal Protestant Central School Board, it was disclosed at the meeting. Announcement was made of a special meeting on November 12 at 3 p.m. in the High School of Montreal, when the views of the board, as expressed by W. E. Dunton, chairman, and education director Thomas Somerville, will be made public. Attending the meeting, to be under the joint chairmanship of Mr. Mactavish and Miss Isobel Sherman, president of the Federation of Protestant Women Teachers, will be the executive council of the men's federation and all official delegates of both men's and women's groups.

Teachers were invited to submit written questions concerning salaries to be answered at the November 12 meeting. Such questions should be in the hands of L. D. Lawley, of Westmount High School, research committee head, by November 9.

It was understood by the teach-

ers' representatives that a revised salary schedule would be present-

ed to the teachers by the board early in the New Year.

In presenting his 1945-46 report, Mr. Mactavish pointed out that 263, or 96 per cent of the men teachers under the central board, were now members of the Protestant Men Teachers' Association. Results of the year's activities had included "improved relationship" between the men teachers and the school board, and "the putting into practice of what we consider the democratic way of approaching difficulties."

Co-operation with the women teachers had also been achieved "to a degree assuring our mutual advancement." Prestige of teachers was growing, in Mr. Mactavish's opinion, and this increased prestige, "if properly taken advantage of," would gain for

teachers "the high place in our community which I think we merit."

Facing the executive for 1946-47, said the president, would be the questions of continued salary negotiations with the central board, the setting up of regular channels of conference with the board (perhaps the establishment of a system whereby one day a

month could be set aside by the board to receive teachers' delegations); revision of the constitution to allow for such changes as the setting up of an adjustment committee; and an enquiry into extra-mural activities, with a view to providing recompense for teachers who give a major portion of their free time to extra-mural school work.
