Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.
Any person who is the head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on condition that the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

PELL OFF A STREET CAR.

QUEBEC LEGISLATURE
Quebec, May 31.—Most of the sitting in the House yesterday afternoon was taken up with the consideration of Mr. Decarie's resolutions relative to increasing the borrowing powers of the School for Higher Commercial Studies in Montreal, which were finally read a first and a second time, and read for third reading to-day.

Mr. Armand Lavergne, discussing the resolutions, was strongly opposed to the school, which, he said, would be entirely without religious training. Mr. Teller considered that the government should have made a proper estimate of the cost at first, and said that it would be preferable that the subsidy to existing schools be increased.

The resolutions were amended, so as to leave the awarding of scholarships to the governors of the school instead of to the Provincial Secretary. It is provided that the salaries of the teachers shall be between \$1,200 and \$1,800, while the principal will receive \$3,500.

SITTINGS OF HOUSE.
Sir Lomer Gouin's motion to have three sittings of the Assembly daily from Wednesday next was objected to by Mr. Teller, who said there was still work for the permanent committee.

The Premier accordingly agreed to change his motion and to start with two distinct sittings daily on Wednesday next, and to begin the three sittings daily on Friday.

The following were presented and read a first time:—
An Act to declare unassignable and not subject to seizure the annuities created by the Act of Parliament of Canada 7-8 Edward VII., chapter 5.—Sir Lomer Gouin.

QUEBEC CITY BILL.
The Quebec City Bill was taken up in Committee of the House at the evening sitting and all but the last clause were passed, when Mr. Lavergne insisted that the time allotted for private bills was up.

Mr. Lavergne strongly opposed the expenditure of \$200,000 in Limolou Ward, a municipality recently annexed to the city, maintaining that it was only to help the speculation of the Quebec Land Company.

SENATORIAL GRAFT.
Some Searching Investigations Coming.

Washington, D.C., May 30.—The investigation by the Senate of the charges against Senator Lorimer, of Illinois, probably will be much more exhaustive than would be possible under the resolution which the Illinois Senator introduced. There was considerable discussion of the day of the proposed investigation and the opinion was expressed that the resolution would be passed.

FREE LECTURES IN FRENCH.
The first of a series of free popular French lectures, to be delivered by Dr. Leigh Gregor, of McGill University, will be given at the Royal Victoria College. The subject is "Chantrelle" (an interpretation). On June 10, the lecture will be continued.

WINDMILL POINT DOCKS

Basin Being Built to Contain Floating Dry Dock.

Work on the basin to contain Montreal's floating dry dock is proceeding at such a rate that there is little doubt it will be finished before the season ends. But the contract for the actual building of the dry dock has not yet been given out, and will have to wait until the government has come to a decision regarding a subsidy for the local dry dock. A dry dock company formed by the chief shipping men of Canada, including Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, Sir Montagu and Andrew Allan, and Sir Robert Perks, of England, has already obtained promise of a subsidy for dry docks at Levis and St. John, N.B., but the shipping firm behind the scheme to place a dry dock at Montreal is still trying to obtain financial support from Ottawa.

The plans of the Montreal Harbor Commissioners for the first year of improvement contain reservations for a dry dock basin at Molsons Creek, about half a mile on the west side of Dominion Park. At this point there is a bay, and remarkably smooth water. Since the opening of navigation the engineering department of the harbor board has been hard at work on the embankment and has proceeded far in the work. Barge loads of waste material have been dumped until the outer wall is roughly finished. One of the ends of this wall will be joined with the land, and a regular harbor completed for the reception of the dry dock, which is looked for next year. On the embankment on the basin the ship repair company, whose name has not yet been given out, by the Commissioners, will construct shipbuilding shops, and when the dock and yards are opened for work there will be no need to send disabled vessels home, as in the case of the 'Grampian.'

MACDONALD COLLEGE NOTES.

Last Friday night Miss Macmillan, one of the boys' residential, Mr. Macmillan, gave an 'at home' in honor of agriculture class II, who had just concluded their examinations that afternoon. The corridors and reception rooms of the residence were nicely decorated with college bunting and flags. Miss Macmillan, mistress, Mr. A. F. There were ten musical numbers on the programme, followed by light refreshments.

Lectures close in the School of Household Science on Friday, June 10, and from that till June 10 there will be the great warfare with finals in preparation for the awarding of prizes and diplomas on June 15.

Examinations in the first and second years in agriculture ended about May 21 and in the tertiary course the results of these examinations are expected to be posted in a few days now.

NEW P. E. I. GOVERNOR.
Mr. Rogers Succeeds Mr. McKinnon.

Ottawa, May 29.—A new lieutenant-governor of Prince Edward Island has been named to succeed the Hon. D. A. McKinnon, whose term of office has expired. In the person of the Hon. Benjamin Rogers, of Alberton, P.E.I., the new governor of the Island Province was for a considerable period the least visible figure in the political life of his province. From 1900 to 1905, under Premiers Farquharson and Peters, he was provincial secretary and commissioner of agriculture, retiring just previous to the provincial election of 1905. For several years previous to 1907 Mr. Rogers was a minister without portfolio. He never figured in federal politics.

QUEEN COMMISSIONERS.
Windsor, Ont., May 28.—Fearing that the time limit would expire before the license commissioner took action to revoke their previous decision granting licenses to two hotel keepers in the township, contrary to the Ontario liquor law, the Methodists of Windsor district have laid information against Commissioners Ira Fastorius, of Harrow, D. H. Henry, of Amherstburg, and W. Ford, of Staples. The license commissioners, at their last meeting, adjourned till May 31, and the Methodists decided to wait action, but discovered that the purpose of the adjournment was to allow thirty days to elapse in which information could be laid.

EMIGRATION QUESTION.
Want of Definiteness in Canadian Methods of Handling Emigration Children.

(Canadian Associated Press.)
London, May 30.—At an emigration conference to-day, Dr. William Baker, of the Barnardo Homes, while admitting the friendly courtesy of the Canadian officials, complained that there was want of definiteness in the rules respecting the emigration of children. A more definite system, he said, children ought to be practised by colonial representatives, he said. He enlarged on the necessity of supervision of children in the colonies, and recommended the Barnardo methods to other societies.

CYCLONE IN AFRICA. Many Natives Drowned by Sinking of Coaster. Lisbon, May 31.—The newspapers print despatches from Mozambique giving details of a cyclone there, which did an immense amount of damage.
