Hondurans Claim An Invasion

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras — (P) — Hondurans charged that Nicaraguan soldiers struck across the border Tuesday with machine-guns and hand grenades but were thrown back.

A statement from the military junta governing Honduras said Nicaraguan national guardsmen in undisputed strength attacked a Honduran garrison on a hill north of Cifuentes at 5 a.m.

"Our troops drove them back without a single casualty on our side," the communique said.

The report of the new attack came as Latin-American diplomats tried to bring peace to the troubled border strip along the Mosquito coast.

CONFIRMATION LACKING

Confirmation was lacking in Nicaragua. President Luis Somoza denied in a telephone interview with the National Broadcasting Company in New York that his troops had crossed the border. He said only five Nicaraguan policemen were in the area.

The Honduran report jolted efforts of a three-man committee from the Organization of American States to bring peace to the riverlands and mountains that make up the disputed frontier.

INTEGRATION OF EUROPE TOPIC OF DISCUSSIONS

Wheat Surplus Will Be Sold Says PM

REGINA — (P) — Prime Minister St. Laurent, winding up a fast-moving, 12-day western campaign, has expressed a belief that Canada's wheat surplus will be sold for "real money" in the "not-too-distant" future.

But his government, he told a rally of Liberal supporters in this province Tuesday night, will not entertain any measures that would break world prices for the bread grain.

He stated also, before a crowd of about 1,200 that gathered on a rainy night in the armories where 2,300 seats had been set up, that he believed the South Saskatchewan irrigation and power project had substantial indirect benefits for the economy.

But his government would not approve of federal aid for the multi-million-dollar project until he was convinced the economy would get more out of the proposal than was put into it.

HOPES TO SEE IT

And the 75-year-old Liberal concluded with an expression of hope that when the time came that the project was found to be of benefit to the national economy and undertaken, he may be able to get back out here and see what indirect benefits have been produced by it.

While he spoke at the armories in support of Liberal candidates, Solon Low, Social Credit leader, also addressed a meeting in a dance hall in another part of Regina.

Diefenbaker Pledges Support To Provinces

HULL, Que. — (P) — John Diefenbaker has ended a two-day swing through Western Quebec with a pledge of Progressive Conservative support for provincial rights and an appeal to the area's farmers and lumbermen.

"Over the years... under the excuse of emergencies and the like, the Constitution has been invaded and provincial rights diminished," he said here Tuesday night.

The Conservative party had founded Confederation "and today it is the Conservative party which will save it." The federal system was necessary to "maintain the diversity within the unity which must be preserved."

Earlier in the day at Kazabazua, 42 miles north, he said agriculture has been hurt by heavy imports from the United States of foods which are also produced in Canada.

He said Prime Minister St. Laurent had spoken of riding a golf cart with President Eisenhower last fall, when the president had expressed surprise at Canada's trade deficit of more than \$1,000,000,000 with the U.S.

"The ride the Canadian farmers are getting from this government is nothing like the ride Mr. St. Laurent got at the hands of President Eisenhower."

In the last session of Parliament every Liberal member had voted against the Conservative proposal for flexible price supports for farm products—a program requested by farm organizations themselves.

Turning to the lumber industry, he said the government's tight-money policy has reduced house building and "struck a deadly blow" to lumbering.

Anti-inflation moves were necessary, but the most important steps should be to reduce unnecessary government spending and cut taxes to encourage greater development and production.

Macmillan, Adenauer In Last Day

BONN — (Reuters) — European integration loomed today as the major topic of discussion between Prime Minister Macmillan of Britain and West Germany's Chancellor Adenauer as they began the last day in their current round of talks.

Macmillan's view is expected to be essentially that which he expressed Tuesday night at a dinner given in his honor by Adenauer.

In his speech he said Britain had "rejoiced at the signing of the Rome agreements for the common market" which will make a customs-free area involving six Western European countries — West Germany, Italy, France, The Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg.

"For reasons which I know you understand," Macmillan said, "we could not ourselves become members of this inner ring."

Apparently he was referring largely to the commitments which Britain already has with other members of the Commonwealth.

"But we sincerely believe," he added, "that the project of the common market can only serve the main purposes of European unity if it is associated with it and growing up side by side the completion of a wider free trade area."

FIRST DAY

The first day's talks which took place between the two leaders Tuesday were believed to have been given over largely to a discussion of proposed cuts in British military expenditures. The German view is one of alarm that Britain plans to cut her NATO forces in West Germany from 62,500 troops to about 50,000 this year, and to concentrate defence on the production and use of atomic arms.

It was for this reason, observers said today, that Macmillan agreed in his speech that conventional forces are still necessary to repel minor attacks in Western Europe.

World News In Brief

DALLAS, Tex. — (P) — Flood waters of the muddy lower Brazos River, already swirling over a 100-square-mile area of Texas' coastal plains on the Gulf of Mexico, continued today to menace rural areas and towns. Total damage estimate has been set at \$85,000,000.

VIENNA — (P) — Seven more Hungarian rebels were sentenced to death Tuesday for their roles in the revolt last fall.

MONTREAL — (P) — The city executive committee, in an effort to bring the number of traffic fatalities to the public's attention, Tuesday decided to place black flags on police cars and motorcycles each day a fatality is reported. A white cross will also be painted on the street at the site of every fatal accident.

LONDON — (P) — James Armand de Rothschild, 78, millionaire racehorse owner and former member of Parliament, died Tuesday. He was reputed to have won almost \$1,000,000 in betting on his horse Brigand to win the Cambridge shire in 1919.

BOSTON — (P) — Two 15-year-old Boston girls were killed Tuesday when they fell four storeys from the House of the Good Shepherd, a Roman Catholic institution for wayward and underprivileged girls.

TEL AVIV, Israel — (Reuters) — The Israeli newspaper Maariv said Tuesday fast Soviet aircraft are making regular flights over the Middle East, apparently engaged in air photography.

WINSFORD, England — (Reuters) — Mrs. Betty Hulme, 26-year-old mother of a 10-week-old girl, was accidentally drowned in a bowl containing 1½ inches of water. Mrs. Hulme was hanging washing on a clothes line when she tripped and fell unconscious into the bowl.

CCF Leader Calls For Over-All Health Plan

OTTAWA — (P) — CCF leader Coldwell said last night in a television broadcast that introduction of a comprehensive national health insurance program in Canada would not mean the expenditure of vast new sums of money.

Mr. Coldwell said a national health insurance plan giving over-all coverage to all Canadians cannot be provided through private or voluntary insurance schemes.

"It can only be done on the initiative of the federal government," he said.

LIMITED PLAN

Mr. Coldwell described the federal government's proposal to pay half the cost of standard hospital care and diagnostic services as a "partial and very limited hospital insurance plan." It fell short of what the Liberals had been promising down through the years.

Mr. Coldwell said the federal plan will be available to scarcely more than half the Canadian people. The CCF would continue to fight for a comprehensive plan and for the financing by the federal government of a sufficiently large proportion of the costs so that all provinces will enter and all Canadians will be covered.

LOW HITS PC LEADER

Last year's bitter Commons pipeline debate re-entered the campaign at Estevan, Sask., where Social Credit Leader Low criticized John Diefenbaker for promising to abolish debate-limiting closure in Parliament.

Man Charged With Murder Attempt On Six Children

TORONTO — (P) — Six children ranging in age from two to 13 narrowly escaped death by asphyxiation and police charged their uncle early Tuesday with attempting to murder them by turning on a gas burner before quitting the house.

William A. Wood, the 31-year-old uncle, was remanded to May 14 when he appeared on the attempted murder charge before Magistrate W. W. McKeown.

Mr. and Mrs. Wray Annis, the parents, were on a trip to Oshawa 30 miles east of here, when Wood's brother-in-law phoned police and reported a man told him the Annis home was filled with gas and on the verge of blowing up.

THREE CONSTABLES

Three constables raced to the spot. One turned off the hissing gas burner—which sat on a lighted coal stove—while the other two policemen rounded up the children and bundled them into the street.

The children were Eleanor, 13, Barbara, 7, Bruce, 6, Susan, 4, Patrick, 3, and Edna, 2. None suffered prolonged ill-effects. They were taken by police to a Children's Aid Society shelter.

When Annis and his wife returned from Oshawa early Tuesday they found a note pinned to their rundown, two-storey brick home. It read: "Family is o.k. Contact No. 3 police re children."

Pola-Cola Too Strong For Poles, City Bans It

WARSAW — (P) — City authorities have banned Pola-Cola, a fizzy soft drink intended as communism's answer to an American drink of similar name.

Pola-Cola was due on the market in two weeks. It even had pretty girl advertising to push it.

But the Warsaw sanitary and epidemiology department stepped in, declaring Pola-Cola contained caffeine in a quantity bad for the heart.

The decision aroused protests from Warsaw newspapers, Pola-Cola's makers, the Warsaw peace defenders' co-operative, which produces another fizzy drink called Fructovit, and the city's anti-alcoholic committee, which has been seeking ways of getting Poles off vodka.

Murdochville Strike Community Suffers Great Harm

MURDOCHVILLE, Que. — (P) — The two-month-old strike of 800 United Steelworkers of America (CLC) men here has done great damage to this Gaspé Peninsula community's economy, civic officials said Tuesday.

The men walked off their jobs at Gaspé Copper Mines Limited March 11.

Robert McKenna, community manager, said the strike has arrested Murdochville's development and that provincial police were brought in at the request of civic officials.

Mr. McKenna said that before the area provincial police detachment was brought up to the present 110 two weeks ago there had been several incidents involving property damage.

CARS DAMAGED

Three cars had been overturned and damaged heavily and 21 other automobiles had sugar put in their gas tanks. Seven homes had windows smashed and at least three telephone lines were cut, he said.

Many women working in the community had asked for increased protection and this was sought after consultation with the three or four resident provincial police officers, he added.

USWA representative Roger Bedard said the incidents reported were minor considering the scope of the strike. In disputes of this size there generally are many more incidents.

The company, in a full-page advertisement in today's Montreal Gazette, accused "union hoodlums" of attacking and beating two company employees engaged in snow-plowing work near here.

CCCL SUPPORT

Gerard Picard, president of the 100,000-member Canadian and Catholic Confederation of Labor, said Tuesday his organization fully supports strikers at the Gaspé Copper Mine in Murdochville, Que.

In a prepared statement, Mr. Picard said the CCCL joins with the United Steelworkers of America (CLC) and the Canadian Congress of Labor in hoping for an early and equitable settlement of the strike.

Mr. Picard added:

"The CCCL hopes the premier of Quebec will agree to the request of Claude Jodoin, president of the CLC, and call a meeting of the parties in an attempt to settle the strike."

Beaver Pelts Will Be Handed Out As Canadian Citizenship Awards

OTTAWA — (P) — Canada's first Citizenship Awards are distinctively Canadian. They're plush beaver pelts.

Ten of northern Quebec's finest beaver skins will be awarded next week to national, non-governmental organizations which have made outstanding contributions to citizenship during the last 10 years.

Sponsored by the Canadian Citizenship Council, the awards are to be presented for the first time May 16, during the council's annual meeting here May 16-17.

Award winners have not been announced.

But John Kidd, council director, said 10 winners have been chosen from 70 nominations by a five-member judging panel headed by Dr. John E. Robbins of Ottawa, editor of the Encyclopedia Canadica.

The pelts, about 20 inches long and 16 inches wide, have an inscription and the winner's name printed on the skin side in red, black and green ink.

Working on the oily, flexible skin has been a painstaking job for Ottawa artist A. P. Crichton, Mr. Kidd said in an interview.

Each completed pelt-certificate cost about \$50, Mr. Kidd said. The council expects to make beaver-pelt citizenship awards annually. Mr. Kidd said the number of awards may not be as large as this year. These 10 awards commemorate the council's 10th anniversary as an information and clearing centre for 60 national member organizations doing citizenship work.

MUNICH, West Germany — (Reuters) — Adolf Hitler foamed at the mouth and acted "like a madman" during a quarrel with Nazi storm troop leader Ernst Roehm, a court was told Tuesday.

The description of Hitler's furious outburst shortly before a purge of SA storm troop leaders June 30, 1934, was given at the trial of former SS general Sepp Dietrich and former SS colonel Michael Lippert.

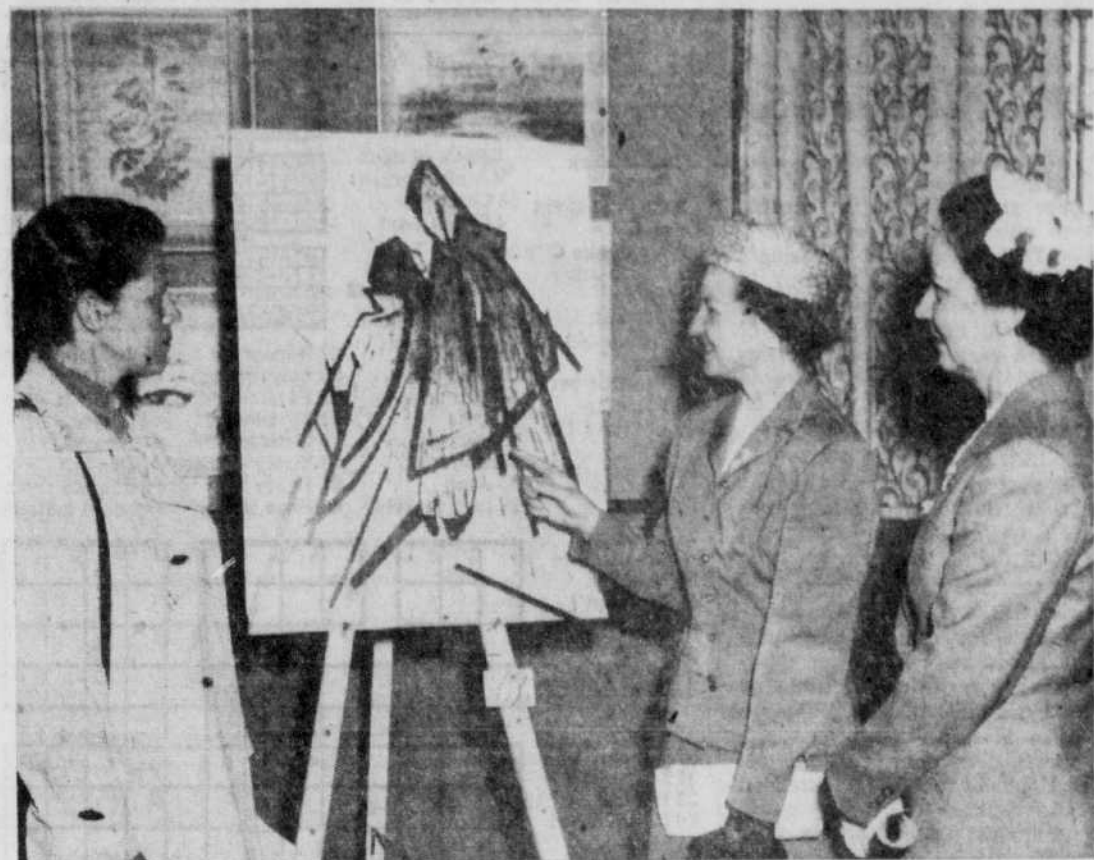

Urges Canadians Receive More Hungarian Refugees

An appeal was made last night at the Sherbrooke Rotary Club for Canada, and the other countries of the world, to keep their doors open to Hungarian refugees who have fled the Red regime, and are still in Austria.

The appeal was made by Miss Marguerite Wilson, Director of Public Relations for the Canadian Red Cross, who, last November and December, was an on-the-spot observer in Austria of the famous "flight for freedom" made by some 200,000 Hungarians. Miss Wilson was loaned last year to Red Cross International to set up the Red Cross publicity

Promotions Of RCMP Officers Are Announced

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police announces that three of their officers in the Sherbrooke detachment have been promoted. Cpl. H. H. F. Patenaude has been given the rank of sergeant and remains the officer in charge of the detachment. Sgt. J. C. E. Dubord was named Staff Sergeant and Const. E. R. Robitaille was promoted to the rank of corporal.

Sgt. Patenaude joined the RCMP in Jan. 1941 and took a training course in Regina until May of the same year. Transferred to Montreal from Regina, he was sent to St. John's until Oct. 1942 when he received additional training at Rockcliffe, Ont. In Jan. 1943 he returned to Montreal and five months later was sent to Fort Smith in the North West Territories.

In Nov. he once again returned to the Province of Quebec and was stationed at Chicoutimi until Sept. 1944. Sgt. Patenaude was then sent to the Bersimis detachment and to Roberval in Nov. 1946 where he remained until May 1950. After being in Granby for almost six years Sgt. Patenaude was named officer in charge of the Sherbrooke detachment in Sept. 1956.

Staff Sergeant Dubord was born in Beaumont, Alta., and joined the RCMP at Edmonton on Nov. 14, 1932. After training in Vancouver, Sgt. Dubord remained there until 1935. He was transferred to different groups, such as Montral, Lacolle, Sutton, Mansonville and Sherbrooke. For seven years he was stationed in Drummondville. He was promoted to the rank of corporal and stationed at Rimouski until Aug. 1956, after which he was posted to Sherbrooke as second-in-command.

Cpl. Robitaille completed his training in Regina after joining the RCMP in Dec. 1946 and was posted to the narcotics squad in Montreal. He was also assigned to St. Jerome and Ste. Agathe, returning to the narcotics squad in Montreal in 1949. He joined the Sherbrooke detachment in Sept. 1956. Before joining the RCMP he was a member of the Chaudiere Regiment in the last war.

E. O. Gingras To Continue In Richmond-Wolfe Fight

"I accepted with the greatest zeal and eagerness, believing that their action supported the decision of my superiors, confirmed by a telegram from Jacques Vadnais, organizer-in-chief for the District of Montreal, published in a Sherbrooke newspaper on April 27."

"I wish to thank all those who have offered their support in setting up a capable organization in all parts of the county to carry the official Liberal candidate to victory on June 10."

Indications to date are that there will be at least a three-way fight in Richmond-Wolfe, with Mr. Gingras facing opposition in his bid for re-election from Albert Nicol, Progressive Conservative, and Raymond Noel, who was nominated as an Independent Liberal ten days ago.

Another triangular fight is anticipated in Compton-Frontenac where Dr. Curtis Lowry has entered the lists as a Social Democrat, or C.C.F., candidate. Dr. Lowry was Liberal candidate in

Splitting The Vote

The possibility of a minority government following the June 10 election has been discussed on the public platform by the leader of the smallest party in the last Parliament, Solon Low of Social Credit.

The issue is interesting, not because a minority government in terms of elected members is so likely after polling day, but because the existence of the splinter parties in the last two general elections has made possible a low-sided majority government which does not truly represent the division of opinion among Canadian voters.

The Canadian Parliamentary system was evolved out of a two-party system and works best with that arrangement. The parties may change in name or character but, basically the division of opinion and philosophy between two parties produces the best result.

In Britain, where the parliamentary system originated and where parliamentary traditions are respected

more than they are by some politicians in this country, the rise of a third party (Labor) after the turn of the century did not lead to a multi-party system. Instead, one of the older parties practically disappeared as political opinion crystallized around the poles of conservatism and socialism. In France, where individual and sectional interests are carried to their logical extreme, the result has been chaotic.

One of the underlying premises of our parliamentary system is that the government of the day is faced with an opposition which provides an alternative administration. But where parties are split on regional lines, the formation of clear-cut policies on major national issues is difficult. The issues themselves become confused.

The result would be, as in France, the shifting of allegiances around a central group, vacillation, failure to tackle problems boldly. The lesson for Canadian voters is obvious.

They Don't Scare Easily

The little countries are supposed to tremble in their boots at the mere mention of nuclear weapons. But some of them just refuse to quake.

The newest example is tiny Denmark, which not long ago got one of those nasty Russian notes warning it would be suicide to allow NATO atomic installations on Danish soil. The Kremlin raised the usual bogey of nuclear annihilation in event of war.

But the tough Danes are going to tell Moscow in sharp terms that NATO

is not an aggressive agency but a purely defensive alliance. And they are emphasizing the intent of NATO countries big and little to stick together no matter what the threats.

This is the stuff of which real strength is built. So long as NATO's members show the kind of spirit the Danes and the Norwegians are exhibiting, the alliance is in no danger of cracking and Russian communism is unlikely to bulldoze its way westward through Europe.

LAVISH PROMISES FOR FARMERS

(Editorial in Kitchener-Waterloo Record)

The farmer has been occupying the caboose in the prosperity train. Whenever the cost-of-living index sagged the drop was usually due to declining food prices.

"Farmers in this country represent 15 per cent of the population, but they receive only 6.9 per cent of the national income, a decline from about 11 per cent in the record farm income year of 1951. They have become caught in a price-squeeze of rising costs and decreasing farm prices.

The Federation of Agriculture claimed at the last federal-provincial farm conference that farm prices in 1956 were six per cent lower than in 1949 while costs of goods and services had risen by 20 per cent.

Now that the politicians are back on the hustings, the farmer is no longer the forgotten man. At least that is the impression one gets from the lavish promises that are being made to the sons of the soil. Each policy speech or statement has something in it for the farmer who, of course, is fully aware that such talk to win votes needs to be subjected to a discount.

It would be foolish to become too enthused over promises of parity prices and price supports. Such programs have not worked miracles in the United States and can hardly be expected to do so on this side of the border.

After pouring money and planning into the farm problem the Eisenhower administration appears as far from a solution as ever. U. S. statistics show that today farm prices are 13

per cent lower than when Eisenhower took office, that farm surpluses are three times as great as when he took office, that the U. S. government has spent more on agriculture during the past four years than in the previous 20 years.

All of which goes to show that farm problems are not easily solved. What's more the Canadian treasury couldn't stand the proportionate strain that the support system has exerted on the U. S. treasury.

In order to arrive at a workable arrangement, the government would have to put controls on volume production. In peacetime, no economy wants to apply such controls because they are incompatible with our way of life. If there is to be anything even near parity in price support programs, it would seem that the farmers, themselves, must apply those controls on production first. And this can only be done by farm organization.

Tories Pick Up

Macmillan's Fortunes On The Rise

By ED SIMON

LONDON (C) — When Harold Macmillan took over the reins of Britain's divided Conservative government in mid-January, the most likely prospect was that his party's fortunes would get worse for some time before they got better.

The disastrous Suez adventure had just driven the ailing Sir Anthony Eden from office, leaving a cloud of smouldering resentment over relations between Britain and the United States.

The government was committed to the necessary but politically unpopular rent bill. A strike threat loomed over several major industries. Queues of prospective emigrants were forming in front of the offices of Commonwealth high commissioners. Gas and oil were rationed and the pound sterling was precarious.

There was trouble with Greece over Cyprus, trouble with India over Kashmir and trouble with almost everyone over the Middle East. The weather completed the setting — it never seemed to stop raining.

Today most of the problems remain unsolved — although the strikes have come and gone, U. K. — U. S. relations have improved and the rain has stopped. But in spite of all his difficulties, plus a string of unfavorable by-election results, Macmillan's fortunes are clearly on the rise.

Reluctantly at first but with increasing enthusiasm the Conservative party is beginning to pull together. Its sullen right wing, unhappy when the Suez intervention ended, has come to terms with its conscience-stricken left wing, unhappy when the intervention began.

The renewal of Conservative harmony can be attributed in approximately equal degree to good luck and good management.

The shrewdest party strategist could not have anticipated that Macmillan would return with the dubious fruits of his Bermuda conference to find the Labor party too preoccupied with its intramural dispute over testing the H-bomb to deal adequately with the

prime minister's rather shaky claim that the conference had been a success.

And despite the patience and diligence of Labor Minister Iain Macleod, the shipyard and engineering strikes could have led to economic disaster if labor and management had persisted in their determination to force a showdown.

Buoyed by these favorable developments, Macmillan was temporarily spared from further difficulties with his left wing over the rent bill, safely tucked away in committee, and was able to persuade a diehard Tory group of MPs to withdraw a resolution vigorously denouncing American foreign policy.

The prime minister proceeded to exploit his gains. He produced his defence white paper, drastically reducing Britain's conventional military establishment and shifting the emphasis to guided missiles and atomic weapons. Labor grumbled about the atomic gamble but the reduction in defence spending was favorably received.

With the defence cuts promising better things to come, the prime minister was able to get away with a budget that

offered little in the way of immediate tax relief. Again Labor grumbled but was unable to offer effective criticism.

There is general agreement that Macmillan is unlikely to test his strength in a general election for another two or three years — and it remains highly doubtful that he could stay in power if he tried it today.

But even political enemies are coming to the grudging conclusion that Macmillan's chances look a lot better than they did in January.

SECOND LANGUAGE.

(Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph.)
Canadians fail their country when they turn their backs on the second language. They are also blocking their own progress, for their cultural development would be extended considerably if only they would undertake a study of the other tongue.

That might be a worthy project for the Canada Council, to find some workable way to encourage the voluntary learning of French by English-speaking Canadians, and English by French-speaking Canadians.

We cannot run away from bilingualism. We must face up to it.

CAGEY SQUEEZE IN SMALL SLAM

LARCENCY LOU himself could have done no better than today's South.

The opening club lead was won by dummy's king. East dropped the deuce. The queen of hearts lead lost to West's king. West had a single-track mind and continued clubs in spite of his partner's discouraging deuce.

South won this trick with the queen, entered dummy with the nine of trumps and discarded the eight of diamonds on the ace of clubs.

His next play was the five of diamonds and it was up to East to make a decision. He counted South's hand to the extent that South had started with seven hearts, two clubs and four other cards. If those cards had been three spades and a diamond the ace of diamonds play would lose the hand.

Then East went one step further and reasoned that a low diamond play could not hurt him. Even if South sneaked in a singleton jack he would only have 11 tricks. Hence East played low and the roof fell on him.

South won with the jack and proceeded to run his entire heart suit, discarding down to the ace and queen of spades in dummy. East had to hold king and one spade so that the last trump lead squeezed him out of his ace of diamonds whereupon South made the last two tricks with his seven of diamonds and dummy's ace of spades.

Even though East failed to see the possibility of the squeeze he could well have afforded to go

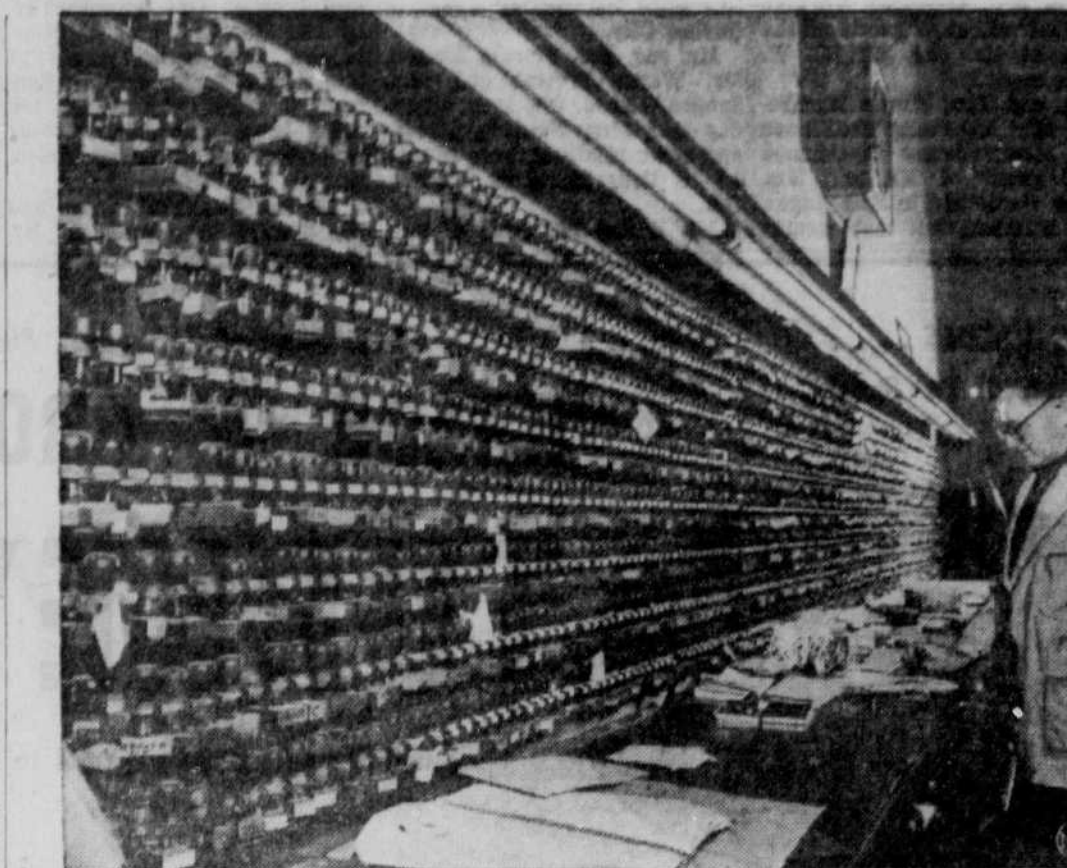

Safety Not Jeopardized Says CPR VP

OTTAWA. — R. A. Emerson, CPR vice-president of operation and maintenance, said Tuesday safety would not be jeopardized in any way by the removal of firemen from freight and yard diesel locomotives.

Safety remains the cardinal principle of railroading, Mr. Emerson said before the Kellogg royal commission investigating the union company dispute over the CPR's proposal to reduce its diesel firemen.

Mr. Emerson said the CPR carefully considered the safety factor before proposing to remove firemen from freight and yard diesel service.

Mr. Emerson disagreed with a union claim that safety practices on the CPR are governed by the "cost factor." The CPR had made costly installations of safety equipment and engaged in other expensive practices aimed at safety.

Mechanically, Mr. Emerson said, the introduction of diesel power has left nothing for firemen to do in yard and freight service. Their removal would not "adversely affect the efficiency of our operation."

JERUSALEM. (P) — A Jewish agency official today said the entire Jewish community 40,000 in Egypt will be resettled in Israel or other countries by September.

Mrs. Mitchell told how Lord Baden-Powell had chosen the name of "Guide," saying that in 1919 a group of girls attended a Boy Scout Rally in England, asking him if they could not become Scouts. He said he would name this group "Guides" after a Corps of Guides, stationed in

India.

Mrs. J. Jennison thanked Mrs. Mitchell for her most interesting address.

Mrs. Rotherham, mentioned that the Guides had prepared Easter baskets and taken them to Mrs. Duncan's Home for Retarded Children. They had spent several days during their Easter vacation cleaning the Pettes Memorial Library and now were making a scrap book of Knowlton, which would deal with the past history of the village, as well as the present.

The Brownies, under the direction of Brenda Harmon, "White Owl" sang two numbers, after which the Guides led by Patrol Leader Sandra Staples also sang two songs.

The event was brought to a close with the singing of "God Save the Queen" with Mrs. Elton Bockus at the piano.

Birdie Tebbetts' Faith In His Pitching Staff Has Begun To Pay Off

Aces' Big Line Sparks Quebec Squad To Close 4-3 Victory Over Brandon; Lead Edinburgh Series 4-1

QUEBEC — (CP) — Three aces can often win a poker game but Tuesday night they did it in hockey.

Orval Tessier, Marcel Bonin and Skip Teal, the first line of the powerful Quebec Aces, accounted for all Quebec goals as Aces edged Brandon Regals 4-3 in overtime to take a 4-1 lead in their best-of-nine series for the Edinburgh Trophy.

Tessier, high scorer in the Quebec League during the season, netted two in the first period, Bonin added his in the second and Teal got the winner at 14:24 of the sudden-death overtime stanza.

The scrappy Regals, who have dropped three games to the QHL champs by a single point, kept the crowd of 5,200 roaring as they came back from a 3-0 deficit in the third period to knot the count. Elliott Chorley, Les Colwill and Les Lilley scored for the Western League winners.

The victory gave Aces a chance to wrap up the series when the clubs meet here Thursday.

The westerners opened powerfully in the first period as they tried to come back in the series but Tessier's two goals set them back. The Quebec right winger batted in a rebound at 9:43 after Regal goalie Lucien Dechene blocked his first attempt then counted again just over a minute later on a 20-foot screen shot.

Bonin made it 3-0 in the second stanza when he took a pass from defenceman Joe Crozier who was deep in the corner and poked it into the Regal net.

The westerners launched another attack early in the third

period and this one clicked for two fast goals. Elliott Chorley tallied with a partly-screened 15-footer on a pretty pass from centre Norm Johnson and Colwill gathered in a pass from winger Len Haley to score from close range just over a minute later.

A drop pass from defenceman Bill Bucyk set Lilley up for the tying marker at 6:59. He netted a partly-screened 10-footer.

Both clubs came close in the overtime period and only quick work by Dechene and Quebec netminder Al Millar kept the contest alive. Teal got the winner during a scramble in Brandon territory. Crozier grabbed the puck just inside the blueline and slapped a shot toward the Regal net which clicked in off Teal's pads.

Only three minor penalties were issued by referee Len Coriveau during the hard-checking contest. Aces drew two. Dechene blocked 32 shots for Brandon, Millar 22.

Ottawa And Flin Flon Clash Tonight In Deciding Game Of Memorial Cup; West Complains Of Hold-And-Grab

REGINA — Ottawa Canadiens and Flin Flon Bombers meet tonight in the seventh and possibly deciding game of the Memorial Cup junior hockey final.

The seventh game of the best-of-seven series was forced Monday night when Ottawa scored a come-from-behind 4-2 win here.

If tonight's contest ends in a tie after 10 minutes of overtime the eighth game Thursday will be played to a decision.

Flin Flon is the first western club to win three games in the series since 1948. Bombers

scored 3-1 wins in the first and fourth games and took a 3-2 decision in the fifth. Ottawa won 4-3, 5-2 and 4-2.

Bob Birk, usually mild-mannered Flin Flon coach, blasted Ottawa tactics in the sixth game Monday.

"We have always tried to play a clean, clever type of game and we've won our share of games that way."

"But if we have to adopt those eastern clutch and grab tactics to help us in this all important game, we'll do it. We're not going to back down from the Canadiens one bit."

Indians Ace Lefty, Herb Score, Hit In Eye By Gil McDougald's Liner; Won't Know Result For A Few Days

CLEVELAND — (AP) — Not for two or three days — possibly longer — will doctors be able to tell how seriously Herb Score, Cleveland's southpaw strikeout king, was injured Tuesday night when a line drive struck him in the right eye.

The ball, hit by Gil McDougald, veteran New York Yankee infielder, knocked Score to the ground, but he remained conscious. Two cuts were inflicted — one along the eyebrow and the other on the side of his nose, and he bled profusely from the nose and mouth.

He could distinguish light from dark with the damaged eye, Dr. Don Kelly, Tribe physician, said after a preliminary examination. The bleeding prevented additional testing, and Kelly said:

"He could be perfectly all right, but we just won't know for two or three days."

His eye swathed in bandages, Score listened in a Lakeside Hospital bed to a radio broadcast of the late innings in which the Indians won their initial 1937 game with the Yankees 2-1. And he gave interviews to several newspaper men.

As his eyes swelled shut and he soaked up blood with a towel, the 23-year-old pitcher ace maintained the poise which has characterized him since he came up to the major leagues in 1935. On the trainer's table he cracked jokes to team mates who were fighting to keep back tears.

The crowd of 18,386 was stunned when Score went down. Many heard the thud of the ball hitting him. Prayerfully the fans waited for what little news could be given them on the public address system about the injury.

The pitch McDougald hit was only the twelfth one Score threw and came on a 2-2 count. Score said: "I didn't see the ball until it got a foot or two from my face. Then I saw too much of it."

He said the liner may have "just ticked the edge" of his glove, but not enough to deflect it. "It hit me solid," he said.

McDougald, who lined one off pitcher Frank Lary's hip in Detroit last week, wiped his eyes with a towel in the corner of the Yankee dressing room and sat worrying while other players dressed. He didn't want to talk.

PORTLAND, Ore. — (AP) — Nino Valdes, the Cuban ranked ninth among heavyweights, hopes to improve his rating in a nationally televised bout against Johnny Holman of Chicago tonight.

Valdes is established locally as a 2½-to-1 favorite for the bout, scheduled to start at 10 p.m. ADT (ABC-TV).

The bout is scheduled for 10 rounds, but both fighters predicted it would not go the limit, each announcing he was going for a knockout.

The Redlegs picked up a full game on the Braves who dropped an 8-4 decision to Philadelphia Phillies as Robin Roberts stopped them with six hits. New York Giants whipped St. Louis Cardinals 8-5 and Chicago Cubs took a 14-inning 10-8 decision from Pittsburgh to dump the Pirates into the cellar.

Cleveland Indians nipped New York 2-1 to snap the Yankees' six-game winning streak but lost the services of Herb Score for an indefinite period.

Bob Lemon took over and held the Yankees to six hits for his second victory in six decisions. Tom Sturdivant, the loser, walked Rocky Colavito in the eighth with the bases full to force home the winning run.

Despite their loss, the Yankees retained their half-game first-place lead over Chicago White Sox who were beaten 4-3 by Boston Red Sox. Ted Williams drove in three runs with a single and his sixth home run to provide the batting support for Tom Brewer who hurled a three-hit victory.

Charlie "Chuck" Dressen Fired As Washington Manager; Lavagetto Takes Over; Offered Office Job

DETROIT — (AP) — Charlie (Chuck) Dressen, bounced from his job as manager of Washington Senators, remained up in the air today about his future. Should he take a front office post with the last-place American League club or look elsewhere?

"So far," Dressen said, "I have no other offers."

Club president Calvin Griffith, who came here from Washington Tuesday to replace the 58-year-old manager with his No. 1 coach, Harry Cookie Lavagetto, offered Dressen a new position as co-ordinator of player personnel.

"I'm definitely interested," Dressen said, "but I told them it would have to be for more than one year."

Griffith said he planned to return to Washington Thursday to talk with the club directors about a long-term pact for Dressen.

Dressen made it clear he would listen to any big league managerial offers he might get. "I'm not asking for any," he emphasized. "I never have gone shopping in my life, but a front office job would be something new for me. Managing a ball club is something I know. That's another reason I'm demanding a long-term contract in this new post."

Dressen, manager of Brooklyn Dodgers when they won the National League championships in 1952 and 1953, took over the Senators in 1955. He has been in and out of the big leagues as a player and manager since 1925.

The 44-year-old Lavagetto was nearing the end of his 18-year playing career when Dressen, 28, manager of the Oakland club in the Pacific Coast League in 1950, picked the one-time world series star as his aide. He has been with Dressen ever since.

The managerial change was a drastic move to shake the Senators out of a nine-game losing streak. The club hasn't finished in the first division in 11 seasons and is off to the worst start of its 57-year American League history, losing 17 of 21 starts this season.

Tribute To Catherine Mackenzie

Because of many requests from readers, the Sherbrooke Daily Record is reprinting a broadcast tribute to the late Miss Catherine I. Mackenzie. The broadcast was made by Mrs. Elbert Embury, president of the Stanstead County Women's Institute and was written by Record correspondent Ivy Hatch.

As Stanstead County President, I feel honored to have been chosen to make this broadcast in tribute to a great and influential woman, a member of the Stanstead North Women's Institute Branch. Miss Catherine I. Mackenzie of Stanstead who passed away at the dawn of Sunday, April 14th. The funeral held at the church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, Montreal was attended by nearly 500 friends paying a final tribute to this highly respected person.

Miss Mackenzie as a member of the Stanstead North Branch was its immediate past secretary. She was convener of education for the County and for the Province of Quebec.

Of Scottish descent, Miss Mackenzie was born in Montreal in October 1882. She lived a happy childhood and girlhood, of which in later years she often reminisced. She graduated from

the Montreal High school for girls, where later she was destined to become a teacher, attended McGill University and the Lycee des Jeunes Filles in Agen, Lot et Garonne, France. With the opportunities afforded for study in France, Miss Mackenzie returned to Canada perfectly fluent in both the French and English languages, which was to be a matter of great value to her throughout her whole life. Her chosen career was school teaching, and for two years she taught at the Aberdeen school in Montreal and at Granby. In 1911 she began teaching in the Montreal High school for girls where for twenty years she was French specialist. In 1931 she was made Head Mistress of the school, a position she held until her retirement.

The year 1936 was perhaps for Miss Mackenzie the proudest of them all, for she was given the

coveted award, "The Order of Scholastic Merit" by the Protestant committee of the Council of Education of the Province of Quebec. This is awarded only to those who have contributed outstandingly to the field of education.

That same year, Miss Mackenzie was named "Woman of the Year" by presidents of several of Montreal's organizations in recognition of the part she had played in arousing interest among the women of the city in re-organizing Protestant education in the Province of Quebec. In 1941 she was elected President of the Zonta Club of Montreal.

In 1944, Miss Mackenzie retired from a most successful teaching career, but not from active life. The summer of that year she came to Stanstead and purchased the Willoughby property. This she immediately proceeded to remodel and redecorate, completing with modern and Victorian style furnishings and with beautiful hand paintings adorning the walls. She improved the gardens and painted the exterior of the house a brilliant pink.

That autumn she moved in, and since then until only a short time before her final illness en-

tertained her many friends from the cities across Canada and abroad and locally in a royal manner, making them all feel at home.

Miss Mackenzie added to her household a beautiful black full blooded cocker spaniel dog, naming him "Mr. Groggins" and lavished him with love and care. She then settled down to a life of leisure but not idleness. Oh no, far from it.

She soon learned there were young people of the communities who were desirous of having extra French tutoring, this language being so necessary in the Province of Quebec for the young graduate cannot receive their diploma unless she or he can qualify in this subject. She also taught adult French afternoon classes to those of the communities who wished to improve on the language or were beginners, and taught this subject for several years at the Adult Community school.

Always believing that women should take their place in the world with the men of today, with equal pay for equal work, Miss Mackenzie became the first woman in the Eastern Townships to seek and be elected to public municipal office, but there was no pay in this for her.

In January of 1936 she was elected with a majority of 58 votes over a Stanstead male nominee for Stanstead Municipal Council seat no. 4. The evening of her election, she returned to her home and was overjoyed to find a large number of friends awaiting her arrival and to offer congratulations, this was truly another great day for Miss Mackenzie. A woman of many talents, Miss Mackenzie contributed several articles of her own composition to the Macdonald College farm magazine which is received and read by every Women's Institute member in the Province. As education convener she was the happiest when making the announcement of the Institute scholarship award, so that it is only fitting that upon her death a memorial scholarship fund was established in Montreal and locally.

Miss Mackenzie along with other Institute members of the various branches of the County and Mr. MacDougall of the Lennoxville Experimental farm have done much to improve the annual autumn held County school fairs at Ayer's Cliff, and on several occasions, Miss Mackenzie acted as a judge of exhibits and for the Public speaking contests. Not only was she active in the field of education and the work of the Women's Institutes but she was active, as a member on other committees of numerous organizations.

She was much in demand as a public speaker at social and educational events in the Province of Quebec and the State of Vermont and had given many radio talks over this Newport station, in Sherbrooke and in Montreal.

Miss Mackenzie loved youth. She advocated education for the parents of retarded children and help to the afflicted child or adult, stressing their need for love and attention through which comes a greater understanding to the parent or guardian. She gave advice to the young boys and girls, she gave them a worth while vision in life.

Now Miss Mackenzie is gone from our midst, we believe to the glorious heaven where we feel sure she is receiving her just reward, we who are left

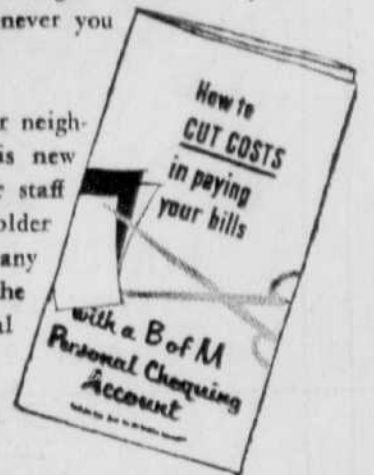
