The distant, muffled beat of a drum and the cadence of marching feet draws nearer until finally you see them, their fire engine-red tunics and royal blue trousers with red piping, framed by the bright green grass.

They are the Sherbrooke Hussars Centennial Guard who will present throughout August a program of drill and battle tactics employed in the early days of the Unit's history. Supporting them will be the 30 man Sherbrooke Hussars Band which, in addition to martial music, will play popular, jazz and Dixieland numbers.

Watching the manoeuvres, is similar to seeing a kaleidoscope of sight, sound and color. "Right wheel," yells Lieutenant D.A.G. Cruickshank, and the 35-man platoon marches briskly by in a column of twos.

"Right wheel," again yells the lieutenant, and the platoon smoothly forms into a column of fours, the silver buttons on their tunics sparkling brightly in the afternoon sun.

The Centennial Guard staged a rehearsal in the Parade Ground, Queen Boulevard North yesterday afternoon. It wasn't long before little clusters of neighbors arrived on the scene bringing with them the foremost enthusiasts of any kind of parade — their children.

Then from out on the field comes the command of the lieutenant. "Guards will fix bayonets. Guards, fix. Guards, bayonets." The sharp ringing sound of steel on steel reaches the onlookers as the Guards swiftly fix their bayonets onto their rifle barrels.

Then into an arrowhead formation they go, forming two lines which fan out to the left and right. Now, holding their rifles at the hip, they perform a number of thrusts and lunges at an imaginary enemy, concluding with a hearty whoop and a sprint down the field, the naked bayonets glistening in the sun.

Once more the lieutenant barks out an order, "repulse cavalry." The Guards drop on their right knee, extending their rifles in the air like spears. This manoeuvre was used by British troops of the 1800's to get at the soft horses' bellies of the enemy cavalry.

Advance to contact, is another famous method of combat used by the British troops. "Rear rank forward," comes the order, and the second of two lines which have formed across the field moves ahead of the first line, drops to one knee and fires from the shoulder position.

FIRE FOR FIRST TIME

Yesterday was the first time that the rifles were fired in public. The rifles, are .37 calibre 100 year old replicas of the 53rd Battalion of Infantry and the 54th Battalion of Infantry (later the 7th-11 Hussars) used in 1867. They were rented from Baby and Company, a theatrical rental agency in London, England. The uniform the Guard wears was acquired through the department of defense production.

Out on the field once again, the Guard now can be seen going through one of their final manoeuvres, the unbroken square. Quickly, the men form a box, like position standing close to one another. Those in front fire from a kneeling position, bluish puffs of smoke snaking out of the rifle barrels, while the ones behind fire from a stiff erect stance.

Under actual combat conditions, the soldiers would gradually diminish the size of the box formation as their casualties increased. But at no time was the square to be broken.

The first performance of The Sherbrooke Hussars Centennial Guard will be held in Bury at 7:00 p.m. Wednesday evening.

Throughout August one show will be held every Wednesday evening, and two each Sunday in different areas of the Eastern Townships.

TORONTO (CP) — Ontario provincial police today said one crew member is dead and three others are missing in the head-on crash of two Canadian National Railway trains near the community of Dunrankin, 45 miles northwest of Folyst in Northern Ontario.

Folyst is 175 miles northwest of Sudbury.

Canadian National and police officials were proceeding to the scene by helicopter and a special train.

The wreck occurred about 4:25 a.m.

A spokesman for the CNR said the trains were the west-bound Supercontinental passenger train and a freight east-bound out of Winnipeg.

Three locomotives and 26 of 84 cars in the freight train, and three locomotives, two coaches, a mail and two baggage cars of the passenger train, were derailed.

The spokesman said no passengers were killed or seriously injured. Some passengers were shaken up, however.

Tax complexities make talk hard

Premiers eye Carter report

FREDERICTON (CP) — The controversial Carter royal commission report on taxation is expected to top the agenda today as six provincial premiers conclude two days of talks behind closed doors in New Brunswick's new centennial office building here.

The report received some attention from the premiers as their eighth annual conference opened Tuesday, but host Premier Louis J. Robichaud said it is so "complex" it was difficult to even begin to discuss it.

The premiers devoted more time during the opening round to several other issues, at least two of which are highly controversial.

They discussed possible modifications to the federal government's proposed medical care insurance program and took an

other swing at Ottawa for turning the long-debated off-shore mineral rights question over to the Supreme Court of Canada.

Premier Robichaud said his government is of the opinion the provinces will not recognize the Supreme Court ruling regardless of what it is.

EXPECT RULING IN FALL

The decision on whether the federal government or the provinces hold rights to under-the-sea minerals off the coasts is expected this fall.

Premier Robichaud, chairman of the conference, said a Supreme Court judgment would not be recognized "but then there are other avenues that can be taken to overcome the difficulties created by a judgment."

Mr. Robichaud, acting as a spokesman for the premiers, said he believes most premiers are in favor of "some modifications" to the medical care insurance program, but it had not been determined which forms these modifications should take.

There were some reservations in some areas as to whether the federal government and the provinces will be ready by July 1, 1968, to operate the plan as submitted by Ottawa.

Alberta Premier E. C. Manning made it clear his province has not changed its opposition to the program.

Premier Daniel Johnson, who missed last year's conference in Toronto because of the Quebec hospital strike, said he was finding the talks "pleasant."

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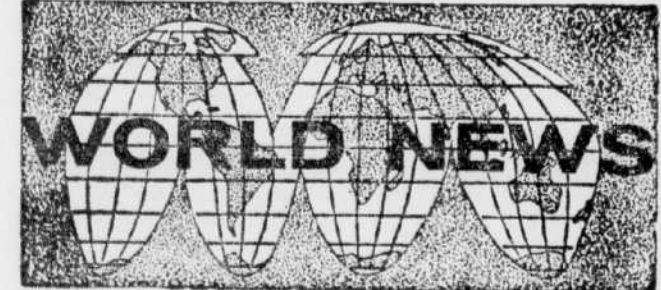

Time enters row on riot troop request

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Ramsey Clark says federal troops were ready to be dispatched to riot-torn Detroit last week hours before Michigan Governor George Romney asked for them.

Clark told a news conference Tuesday Romney did not ask for federal troops to help quell the Detroit riot until 11 a.m. July 24, eight hours after the governor had said he requested them.

Outlining events during what Clark called that "tragic morning in American history," the attorney-general said the first direct contact he had with Romney was at 2:40 a.m. He said the governor telephoned then and termed the situation in Detroit "very bad."

He said Romney reported 80 untended fires and widespread looting and said he thought he might need about 5,000 army troops. But Clark said it was only after hours of back-and-forth telephoning between him and Romney that the governor finally sent a 10:45 telegram requesting the troops.

Romney has said he requested the troops in a telephone call before 3 a.m. He said also Clark told him at first that an oral request would be satisfactory, but later demanded a written request and directed that he specify there was an insurrection in Detroit which he was unable to control.

Romney charged President Johnson with playing politics at the expense of the people of Detroit, and that Clark's demand for a written request was more political than legal.

In announcing he was sending federal troops into Detroit, the president went to some lengths to emphasize he was doing so because of the inability of state and local officials to control the situation.

While it stopped short of directly accusing the French leader of interference, the Pearson statement was unmistakably pointed.

"The government of Canada has noted the statement by the president of the French Republic regarding his recent visit to Canada," it said.

Offer peace plan

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — The Quakers offered today a formula for a ceasefire in Vietnam and asked for a reconvening of the Geneva Conference to work out a peace settlement.

To open the way for negotiations, they urged that the United States, North Vietnam and South Vietnam halt all military operations on a "ceasefire-unless-fired-upon basis."

The appeal was drawn up in nine days of work by a special section of the Friends World Conference meeting here. Quaker representatives from 35 countries are attending. More than a dozen Canadians are present.

The Quaker peace proposal said the National Liberation Front — Viet Cong — in South Vietnam should be represented at a reconvening of the Geneva Conference during the ceasefire.

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Pearson has curtly informed France that Canada will not accept any outside interference in its internal affairs.

In the latest move of the transatlantic ruckus, the prime minister issued a terse, 46-word response Tuesday to President de Gaulle's pledge to help French Canada achieve its freedom aims.

While it stopped short of directly accusing the French leader of interference, the Pearson statement was unmistakably pointed.

"The government of Canada has noted the statement by the president of the French Republic regarding his recent visit to Canada," it said.

"It has already made its position clear on the unacceptability of any outside interference in Canadian affairs and has nothing to add in present circumstances."

The statement came more than 24 hours after de Gaulle, in a statement backed by his full cabinet, said France intended to help French-Canadians "realize the freedom aims they have set for themselves."

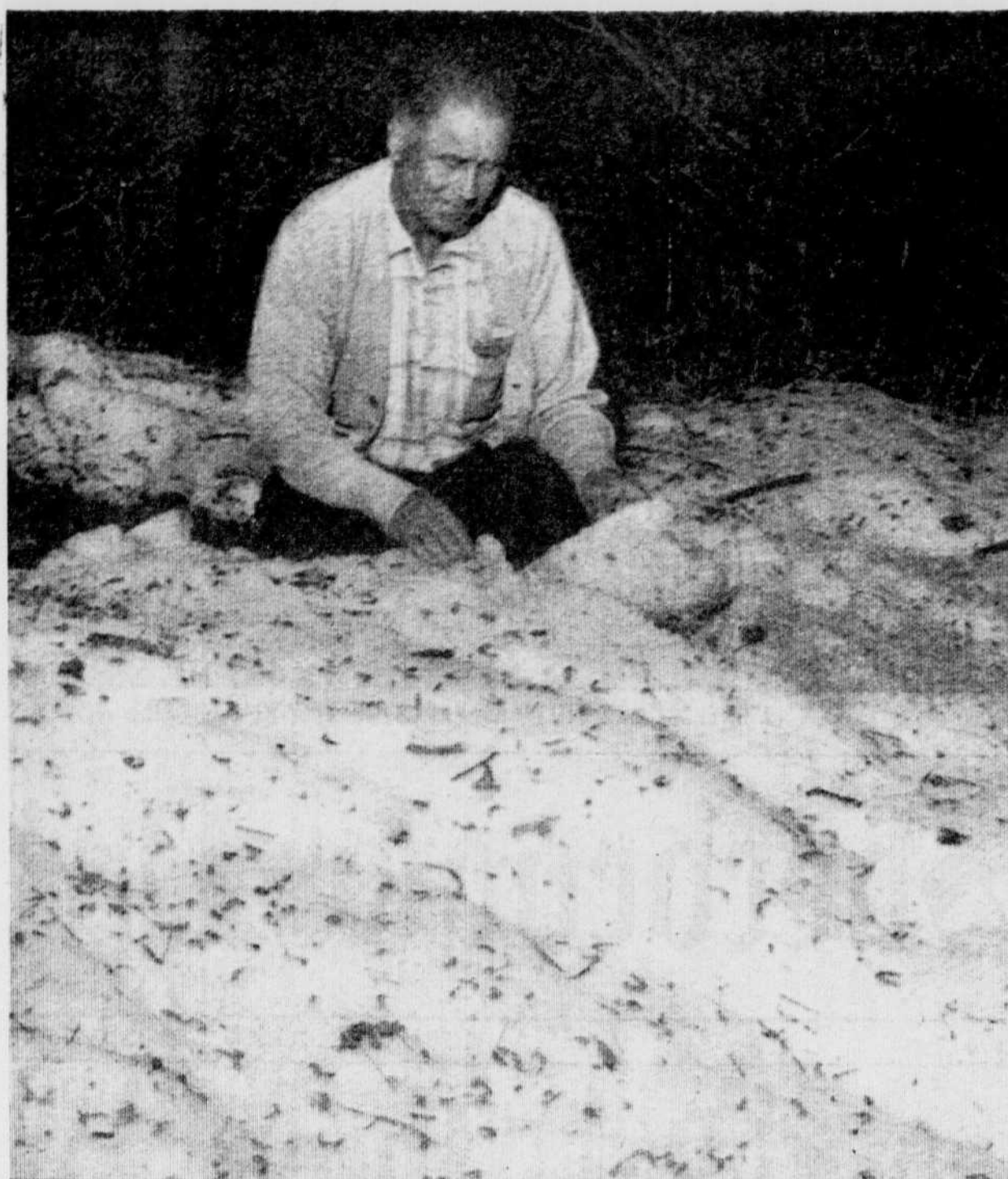
The meeting was chaired by the co-president, Mrs. Nelson Pierce. One new member was welcomed.

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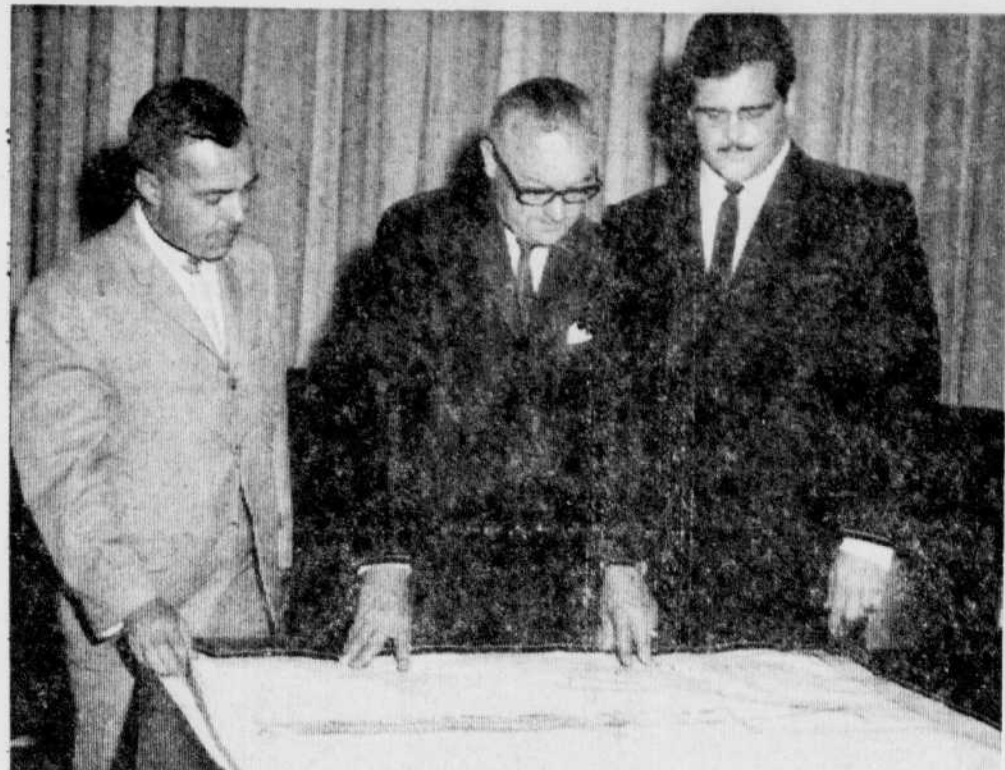
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New industry announcement ends weeks of secret meetings

It was a smiling and happy Mayor Armand Nadeau who ended weeks of secret consultations and secret conferences yesterday morning to announce the proposed construction of a three million dollar factory in Sherbrooke's West Ward.

Manufacturing specialized hospital equipment, the plant will be the only one of its kind in the province of Quebec when it opens its doors at the corner of Galt and Belanger streets in May 1968.

The 160,000 square foot plant will be built on an industrial lot belonging to the city. Ald. Tony Pinard said that the concern has not yet bought the huge flat lot which was once an old parade square.

Ald. Marcel Savard said that the city has given the project an option on the land but no final price has yet been decided.

He told the Record that the city has been conserving the land for a big, attractive new industry and has held out against several offers which were not considered appropriate.

Mayor Nadeau told newsmen, local businessmen, and city councillors that the project had received the full support of the provincial government. The mayor said that Commerce Minister Maurice Bellemare said last Thursday that he was happy that such an industry was opening in Quebec and establishing in Sherbrooke.

Yesterday's announcement followed weeks of talks which involved Mayor Nadeau, Ald. Paul Gervais, Industrial Commissioner Bob Belisle and the head of Martos Trans-Canada Limited, a Montreal firm of project managers and consulting engineers who have been commissioned to complete feasibility and related studies on the establishment of hospital equipment plants.

N. G. Martos, the president of the consulting company and his partner in this project, H. M. Morin, Sherbrooke business-

man, were at yesterday's press conference, armed with plans of the projected building and press releases.

Mr. Morin told reporters that when the factory opens next May it will employ 250 people to start and increase as the demand for the products grows.

He said that about 75 of these employees would be specialists hired from Europe and across North America. The rest would be locally hired.

He made no guesses as to when the plant would reach full employment.

The company which will operate the plant has not yet been formed but Mr. Martos said yesterday that it forms part of large interests in the hospital equipment field.

A press release states that the plant will receive financial backing from local and European business concerns.

In a statement at the press conference Mr. Martos said that Sherbrooke was chosen because of its proximity to major markets, its transportation system, notably the autoroute, the presence of two universities and a large labor force.

Earlier, Mr. Martos told reporters that the factory expects the Province of Quebec to be one of its largest customers. However, he added, as the company's operations grow the products should be sold in all parts of Canada and will eventually be exported.

Specialized manufactured goods, he said, are the major products which Canada is able to export competitively.

Industrial decentralization, he continued, was one of the aims of his company, to find new areas to establish new factories which wouldn't compete or stifle already existing industries.

Sherbrooke industrialist S. W. Hooper, representing Sherbrooke's Consultative Industrial Committee, welcomed the new project "with open arms" and said that since he established in Sherbrooke in 1938 he has found the labor force stable and the city cooperative.

Florent Boivert, a representative of the Confederation of National Trade Unions, said that the new jobs which the project represented are necessary for the city's economic health and the welfare of its growing labor force.

Favors executive committee

The Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce in discussing the August 7 referendum has made clear in a press release that it favors on bloc elections and the creation of an executive committee and a town manager.

The committee makes reference to its former position on such matters expressed in previous press releases, notably one in December 1965 when it advocated "a better division of the number of aldermen in the city wards which would represent about an equal number of electors and real estate value."

In the release the Chamber of Commerce comes out in favor of the establishment of a city manager, a position the council does not want to create for fear the manager would attain too much power.

The release states that the executive committee would not be truly efficient without the appointment of a city manager. However, the Chamber of Commerce points out that its concept of the post of city manager does not necessarily correspond with that of the city council.

The release describes the city manager as someone who would act as a sort of executive secretary and would not automatically be granted the authority and the power that the City and Towns Act applies generally to the position.

"It is understood," the release states, "that in a city as important as Sherbrooke there would be no question of a city manager with the power and the right to act contrary to the decisions taken by the executive committee or the City Council."

The directors of the Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce, the release says, still think that there must be a city manager or executive secretary to act as a liaison between the executive committee and city council and the different departments of the city services.

The release says that the Chamber urges the city to apply for amendments to the city charter to allow for the creation of an executive committee and a city manager whose role, functions, powers and authority are well defined.

History of city police department traced

"Excluding war, our society has no more serious and important problem to face than crime and this from an economic, social and moral point of view."

It is on this urgent note that the report on the administration of the Sherbrooke Police Department begins, putting the necessity of an effective police department in proper perspective.

The crime rate, it points out, is growing just as fast or faster than man's progress in all fields of endeavour.

It deplores the huge sums of money, the vast wasted energy of mankind devoured by the criminal machinery.

But whatever the cost, society must be protected; it must try and rehabilitate those who can

be helped, and the incurable and dangerous must be put away where they can't harm society.

Such is the premise of the report as concerns the reason for the existence of a police department.

The report makes a short hop back in time and gives a brief resume of the Sherbrooke Police Department through the years.

The first recognized lawman was Pierre Couture, a man who was hired by what were then the citizens of Hyatt's Mills (which grew to become Sherbrooke).

Soon after 1871 the Capelton and Eustis mines opened and so several more officers were named to keep the peace in

Sherbrooke.

Pierre Couture, former night watchman whose six-foot, 300-pound frame guaranteed some kind of solidarity was unofficially the first Chief of Police. If education is one of the prerequisites of a policeman today points out the report, physical strength was the most important factor in those days.

One might poke the fun stick a little deeper and ask our-

selves if a 300-pound man at any time in history is any bit as strong as he might look . . . or act.

The point however, is well taken: brains are the essential tool today, police work not excluded. The report comments time and again on the low level of schooling of the city's policemen — some of them in the upper hierarchy — and others in the department.

As things were in 1882 the police chief took on the total protection job which was not only that of protecting people against people, but also protect-

ing them against fire.

The post of Police and Fire Chief was held by seven different men from 1882 to 1944.

Then the post was split into that of Police Chief, Edouard Moreau, and Fire Chief, Percy Donahue who to this day still holds that position.

Staff, under Chief Moreau jumped from 32 in 1944 to 174 in 1966 and of course the problems grew with the staff.

Along with this of course population exploded and costs of operation skyrocketed.

These preliminary thoughts in the Dufresne, McLagan, Daigault study about the growing crime rate, the low educational level of the policemen, the increased costs of operation are introduced subtly but later on become important factors in explaining the failings of the Sherbrooke Police Department.

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July crop growth excellent in E. T.

Crop growth in the Eastern Townships during the month of July was very good, according to the Lennoxville Experimental Farm, while June had been a mediocre month, and May, one that had stunted the growth of many local crops.

Rains during the month of June did much to help the crops which had suffered a below normal May weather, but the month of July has been the best

yet, with the hot and humid weather a significant factor in growth progress.

Again, corn is the best representation of the progress.

Less than a month ago, a field of silage corn at the Lennoxville Farm was not quite knee high, now the same spot in the field has corn to the height of eight to 10 feet.

According to authorities, corn at the farm is doing much better now than at the same period last year, and growth was much better than in June.

The growing season, which started in April, should have seen area farmers depositing nitrogen on their crops, and for those who had not done that

job then, it should have been completed by at least the beginning of June.

In summation, the cool May resulted in slow growth of the crops, but the warm June created relatively normal conditions while the hot and humid July was excellent crop growing weather.

Building permit value doubled

The value of construction issued in Sherbrooke last month more than doubled the figure for July, 1966.

According to City Building Inspector Normand Gauthier's monthly report, Sherbrooke issued a total of 110 permits last month with a total value of \$1,369,175 compared to 78 permits in July 1966 valued at \$625,501.

The report points out two educational permits issued to the Roman Catholic School Commission made up \$645,000 of the total value of permits issued. One permit, valued at \$365,000 was for the Ecole Desjardins in the East Ward, and the other, valued at \$280,000, was to enlarge Ecole St. Esprit in the West Ward.

However, the report shows that the total value of residential permits issued last month represented nearly double the value of residential permits issued in July 1966. In July 1966, 14 permits were issued at a value of \$228,500 while last month the city issued 19 permits valued at \$407,500.

Construction for the first seven months of 1967 was also way up from last year's figure. In 1966 the city issued 592 permits valued at \$6,471,801 while so far this year it has issued 646 permits valued at \$9,000,350.

For both years, however, the rise in the residential permits was far less dramatic. In the first seven months of

1966, the city issued a total of 159 construction permits for residential buildings valued at \$2,268,500 compared to 186 permits this year valued at \$3,259,300.

The East and West Wards, with the two big educational permits, led the rest of the city in total permits issued and in value. The East Ward received a total of 32 permits valued at \$590,400 while 35 permits valued at \$518,975 were issued to the West Ward.

The fewest number of permits was issued for the Center Ward. However, the value for the nine permits issued, \$115,400 was far higher than either the \$38,700 value for the South Ward's 11 permits or the \$85,

700 for the North Ward's 23 permits. No industrial and no religious construction permits were issued last year. The total number of commercial permits was 10 for a total of \$349,000.

Small fire

A small fire in the vicinity of Notre-Dame de l'Assomption Church on St. Michel Street in the East Ward yesterday about 11:30 a.m. occurred when a 10-foot section of electric wire leading into and in the church was struck by lightning and burned. There was no damage to the church itself; only a little smoke inside the building.

Sherbrooke Hussars origins are traced back over hundred years

During centennial year, The Sherbrooke Hussars hope to make citizens of the Eastern Townships aware of the area's historical past. Lt.-Col. James Strickland, CD, told a luncheon meeting of the Sherbrooke Rotary Club yesterday afternoon.

The Sherbrooke Hussars is celebrating its 100th year of service. In September 1866, the Sherbrooke Battalion of Infantry was formed from six local companies. Then in 1867 it was renamed several times and was finally broken down into two units, the 53rd Sherbrooke Battalion of Infantry and the 54th Richmond Battalion of Infantry (later called 7th/11th Hussars). It became the 53rd Sherbrooke Regiment in 1900. The Sherbrooke Regiment was amalgamated with the 7th/11th Hussars in 1965.

A highlight in the history of The Sherbrooke Hussars was the presentation of Guidon to the Regiment by the Queen July 5 in Ottawa. This was the first time in the unit's history that it has been so honored.

"When the Guidon is presented it means putting out a guard that is equal to those of the regular army units," Lt.-Col. Strickland explained. However, despite the many problems that confronted the Regiment, "we decided to go ahead as an honor of this magnitude comes very seldom."

"We were well supported from over 400 Sherbrooke citizens and every man knew and appreciated that the city was behind us," he continued. Among centennial year activities to promote interest in the history of the Eastern Townships, the Regiment will

present The Sherbrooke Hussars Centennial Guard supported by the Sherbrooke Hussars Band. This is a program of drill and battle tactics used by the Regiment in the early days of its history.

This show will be presented every Wednesday evening and twice on Sunday throughout August. The first performance is at 7 p.m. in Bury tonight.

De Gaulle continues double-talk

President de Gaulle's statement issued in Paris on his recent controversial visit to Canada is so filled with diplomatic double-talk that it can be taken to mean almost anything — depending largely on what one wishes to read into it.

For the French-speaking separatists in Quebec, he announces the French government's intentions to support their aspirations for "liberty, equality and fraternity," but he accompanies this with the declaration that France is not directing and not exercising any sovereignty over all or part of Canada — the latter obviously designed to pacify Ottawa.

To those who desire to interpret it as such, the French President's communique may be regarded as a pledge of continued support to the separatist cause. To others it may be regarded as close to an apology as a prideful man such as General de Gaulle is capable of giving.

But whatever meaning the statement may contain, it is to be hoped that Canadians generally will be prepared to keep the whole incident of President de Gaulle's visit here and his remarks in their proper perspective.

Undoubtedly the French President was guilty of a serious diplomatic blunder, for which he was properly chastised by Prime Minister Pearson, but some of the blame must be shared by certain elements within Canada who seem to be more concerned in emphasizing those things which divide the people of this country than the many things which serve to unite them.

Probably the best way for Canadians to handle the situation from now on is to regard the incident as closed. Fortunately there has been no exchange of diplomatic notes or protests so that by a display of good sense it can be regarded as one of those things which now and again crop up in the best circles.

Canada and Quebec would be served best if the politicians would turn their attention to the problems facing the country rather than seeking to make capital out of a few ill-timed remarks by an outsider.

Adult thinking by Canadians seen

Its findings may come as a surprise to most Canadian politicians, but the cross-Canada poll just completed by Heward Graffey, Progressive Conservative Member of Parliament for Bromfield-Missisquoi, appears to confirm what we have thought all along — that the majority of Canadians are a rational people who want to see this country progress and are more interested in the solution of everyday problems than they are with theoretical issues of constitutional responsibility.

For the average Canadian, the problems are the steady increase in the cost of living, water and air pollution, lack of adequate housing for a large section of the population and the difficulty of getting to and from work and of finding adequate recreational facilities for his family near his home — in other words urban planning.

He wants to see the governments do

something about these problems of everyday living and he is more interested in having something done than in which level of government does it.

On constitutional matters his chief concern is that the various levels of government get together to revise the document so that the politicians will be able to face up to the issues of the day rather than hide behind the provisions of the British North America Act to avoid assuming their responsibilities.

And, the survey indicates, Canadians are not basically a provincial people, concerned solely with their own affairs.

They are interested in international affairs and are anxious that this country adopt some coherent policy in the foreign field.

Perhaps the time has come for the politicians to regard the voters as intelligent adults rather than as uninformed school children.

History lessons nobody observes

If there had been newspapers published in fourth-century Rome, the news they printed would have greatly resembled the sort of events that are being reported in the western world today. At home, there would be the same pre-occupation with comfort and pleasure, the same blindness to the increasing violence and ruthlessness of a disintegrating society. Then as now, the state was becoming an increasing burden to the economy, and an all-pervading bureaucracy was stifling the initiative and hardihood on which prosperity had originally been founded. A huge underprivileged class, the descendants of slaves, formed a restless and dangerous minority, then as now, in a society in which it had no established place save that of a menial service. Abroad, all was chaos in a world in ferment; a world in which, then as now, unity is giving way to faction and universality to regional sectionalism, as the civilizing power loses its grip upon emergent tribes resentful of its sway. The disappearance of the martial spirit at home is matched by a vacillating policy abroad, here placating,

there petulant and punitive. The development of new military tactics and sophisticated weaponry coincides in both ages with the decline of a once-firm national will and purpose into a distracted policy of mere opportunism. Giantism in administrative matters, anarchy in social attitudes, decay in politics, morality, religion, the arts, the symptoms of a dying civilization are as clearly depicted in a newspaper as in any history book, but are seldom recognized as such by contemporary society. The race riots in Detroit or Cleveland are of no more significance to us than the troubles in Dacia or Parthia were to the Romans; to us, as to them, the notion that our civilization, for all its passing problems, might someday succumb is quite unthinkable.

It is ideas and ideals, rather than material things, which bind a society together and furnish it with the purpose and sense of destiny needed to spread and sustain its culture. Religious or racial beliefs, political and legal institutions, social or

philosophical concepts; it is no matter how valid they may be, provided they are believed by enough people to impact a common purpose and impose a common discipline. When belief wanes, purpose dwindles and society declines, and no civilization can long be sustained by a disintegrating society.

It is the tragedy of our western civilization that, at its high noon of influence, prosperity and technological mastery, we should have lost faith in the beliefs and principles on which our distinctive society is based — the rule of law, the Christian ethic, and its concomitant belief in individual responsibility in politics, law and business. It is a concept which is paid only lip service today in an increasingly godless society, dominated by the twin giants of big business and the welfare state. It is ironic that the seeds of disbelief in our destiny should have been sown, in large measure, by the school texts and teachers which, in more barbarous states, are used to inculcate youthful fervor for lesser creeds, to less noble ends.

Grim lesson for Canada

UK's national health service is looking decidedly ill now

LONDON — (TNS) — Three seismic shocks recorded this month from deep within the official strata governing Britain's National Health Service have widened the cracks yawning for years in the world's first "free" medical plan.

The plan, inaugurated in 1948, has offered grim lessons to countries like Canada which are considering expanded public medical care.

The lessons have been underlined in recent days by doctors attending the annual meeting of the British Medical Association, by publication of a book called *Sans Everything*, and by the Minister of Health's annual report to Parliament.

Coupled with a constant barrage of criticism from eminent authorities and investigators, they indicate that NHS is threatening to go off the rails completely.

Last year NHS cost the taxpayer \$2,723,000,000, an increase of \$357,000,000 from 1965. In addition, he handed over a weekly cash contribution for the NHS plus another for industrial accident insurance.

For all that, he had the right to "free" hospital care, if he could get into a hospital. The waiting queue, averaging half a million in recent years, lengthened by 19,000 last year. And if he jumped the queue as an emergency case he might wake up in a ward that looked like a setting for a film of *Florence Nightingale*.

Government officials do not deny that many British hospitals are antiquated, badly equipped and under-staffed. Some blame these smelly, old-fashioned hospitals on "the war" without defining which war.

The soaring bill

In his annual report, Health

Minister Kenneth Robinson admitted that free dug prescriptions had soared to just under 262,000,000. The prescriptions bill had increased by \$36,000,000 for a total of about \$414,000,000. He also estimated the total NHS bill for 1967 would be \$4,101,000,000.

But he managed to look on the bright side. Last year there were 2,863 fewer beds available every day than in 1965, but he said the year had been marked by "a striking measure of success." Why? Because 53 major hospital building schemes were started.

Not a moment too soon, as one newspaper (*The Daily Mail*) discovered when it investigated Britain's 3,000 NHS hospitals earlier this year. It found two-thirds were "old Victorian work-houses," that hundreds of wards were closed for lack of nurses, that there were fewer beds than in 1948.

The queue outside them included 80,000 waiting to have their tonsils out and 76,000 waiting for plastic surgery. Some had waited seven years for hernia and varicose vein operations. Ten thousand aged people couldn't get a bed.

And, said the newspaper, "Two patients to a bed is a common practice, according to 32 hospitals out of a random sample of 58 surveyed by the Royal College of Nursing." Patients well enough to sit up moved to chairs while their beds were used for emergency cases during the day. What happened at night was not explained.

Behind this sad tale is a tangle of twisted priorities and bureaucratic proliferation. Britain did not get its priorities straight. It inaugurated NHS before it built

the facilities. Too many hospitals are still on the drawing boards.

In the last 20 years only 12 new hospitals have been built. It has been estimated that it takes 15 years here to take a 700-bed hospital from the architect's plan to opening day.

They can't wait

Hundreds of thousands of Britons haven't waited. They have enrolled as paying patients with their own doctors and their own hospitals. They must still pay the weekly NHS fee and their medical bills are not tax deductible. But it gets them around the bureaucrats and into the private hospitals on time.

NHS patients face a system run by regional hospital boards in England and Wales, five in Scotland; plus 336 hospital management committees; plus 134 executive councils governing family doctors, 173 local health authorities and 36 boards of governors of teaching hospitals. Some committees have 35 members.

The system has left general practitioners, as well as patients, gasping. This month doctors at the annual British Medical Association convention described the NHS as "crumbling," "iniquitous," and "in danger of collapse."

BBC and VOA heeded

Distortion funny, even in Russia

MOSCOW (TNS) — Russia demands a sense of humor. Take, for instance, the reliance of so many Soviet citizens on the radio broadcasts of the Voice of America and the British Broadcasting Corporation.

An intelligent Soviet citizen cannot regard himself as well informed unless he knows what BBC and VOA are saying in their newscasts. As for the not so informed Soviet citizen, he or she often turns out to be addicted to VOA-BBC popular music, particularly jazz.

One reason for this reliance on foreign broadcasts is that the news one gets via Soviet newspaper and radio - TV broadcasts is so distorted as to be downright funny - even to loyal Soviet citizens.

A perfect example was the news treatment given to the Arabs - Israeli War. The official line is that Israel is a monster akin to Nazi Germany and that Tel Aviv has hatched a vicious plot against peace-loving Arabs like Nasser and his Arab flock.

STRAIGHT-FACED LIES

Journalism is supposed to be a respected profession in the USSR but I doubt it. One must really feel sorry for Soviet TV announcers who have to work hard to keep a straight face while they argue the case that fewer than three million Jews had committed a provocation by taking on an Arab world dedicated to the destruction of Israel and supplied with billions of dollars worth of first-rate Soviet arms.

Equally entitled to sympathy are the reporters and editors who must prepare stories which leave out anything that might justify the Israeli position. Although the propaganda machine goes full blast, the ludicrousness of the government line about the Israeli-Arab War is not lost on the average man in the Moscow street. Jokes abound about the Arab debacle.

Contrary to the official line, many Soviet citizens show a grudging admiration of the Israeli victory.

One joke, which certainly will never be carried on any of the Soviet news media, has Nasser phoning Kossygin for more tanks, and Kossygin replying: "And what else does Israel need?"

One positive effect of the VOA - BBC influence — even from the Soviet point of view — is that Soviet TV and radio have been forced to compete to a certain extent with the VOA-BBC broadcasts. The popular music programs on Soviet radio often resemble Western broadcasts, so much so that it's sometimes frightening.

WESTERN NEWSREELS
Soviet radio newscasts are still bad but the TV newscasts often show Western newscasters. There can be no commentary other than the Communist party line but the Western newsreels speak for themselves.

This was particularly true of film sequences of the Israeli victory, replete with captured Egyptians and

Grafftey poll finds Canadians tired of political wrangling

MONTREAL (CP) — Howard Grafftey, MP for the Quebec Federal riding of Brome-Missisquoi, says the results of a nation-wide opinion poll he has conducted indicates the Canadian people are tired of federal provincial wrangling and want fast action on the "gut issues" of Canadian life.

He said in an interview Monday the survey was carried out by travelling across the country and with the help of three university students, asking people in each area: "What do you think are the major issues with which the federal government should be dealing?"

"Cost of living, water and air pollution, housing, urban planning—these are all major domestic problems which are not

being effectively dealt with by any level of government," Mr. Grafftey said.

Another major area of concern among Canadians was foreign relations.

"We've found that the vast majority of people we've talked to across the country want Canada to take a definite stand in foreign affairs and to ensure that all Canadians know what that stand is."

Encouraging minors to burglary a 'heinous crime' nets 6 months

SWEETSBURG WARD — (Staff) — Judge Gerard Normandin ordered Marcelin Roy, of Waterloo to six months in jail for breaking and entering in Waterloo July 29, when approximately \$50 in beer, cigarettes and costume jewelry was stolen. He pleaded guilty.

Crown Prosecutor Claude Noiseux told Judge Normandin that Roy had previously served time for two charges of simple theft. Noiseux added that Roy had encouraged two minors to participate in the burglary, and had to ask for a six month sentence.

Judge Normandin agreed with the Crown's request, adding that dragging minors into crime was a heinous act.

Nicholas Ponkosky, St. Hubert, and John Allen, Montreal, were ordered to the next session of the Bedford District Assizes following preliminary hearing on a charge of car theft.

The duo allegedly stole a Jeep belonging to St. Paul Construction on July 21. The crown produced two witnesses to complete the hearing.

Ponkosky and Allen stood mute at voluntary statement. They were released on \$200 cash, or \$300 property bail, pending their trial.

Claude Landry, Granby, was handed a suspended sentence by Judge Gerard Normandin, in that he had previously pleaded guilty to three charges of cashing false cheques.

Landry had been freed under parole to the Granby chapter

of Alcoholics Anonymous six weeks ago, and had promised to attempt to make restitution by date of sentence.

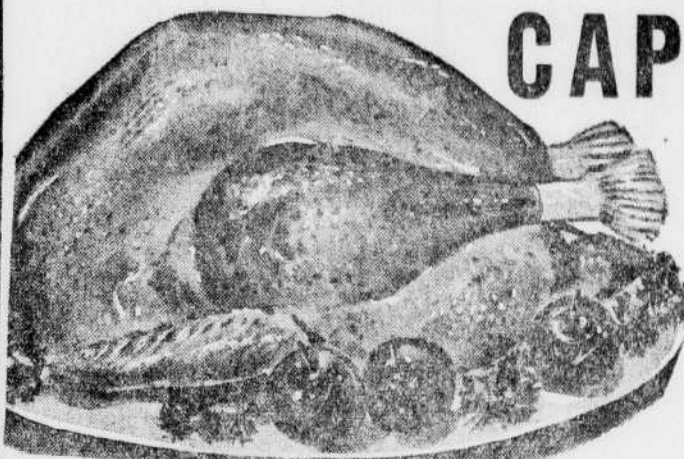

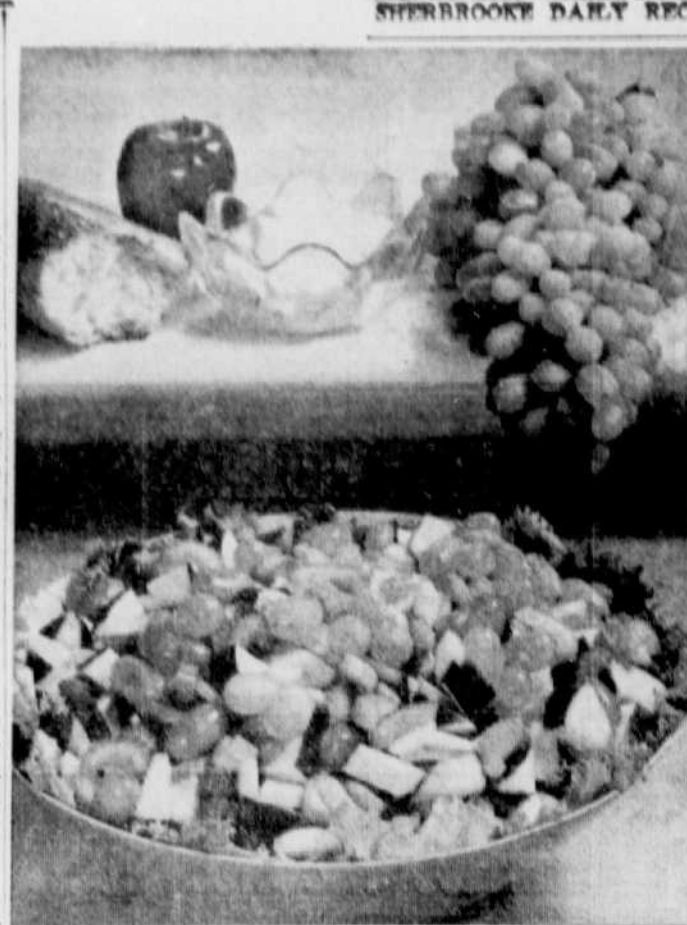

Miss Chanel, who will be 84 Aug. 19, was interviewed by the international Herald Tribune, published here, on the eve of the Paris winter fashion show.

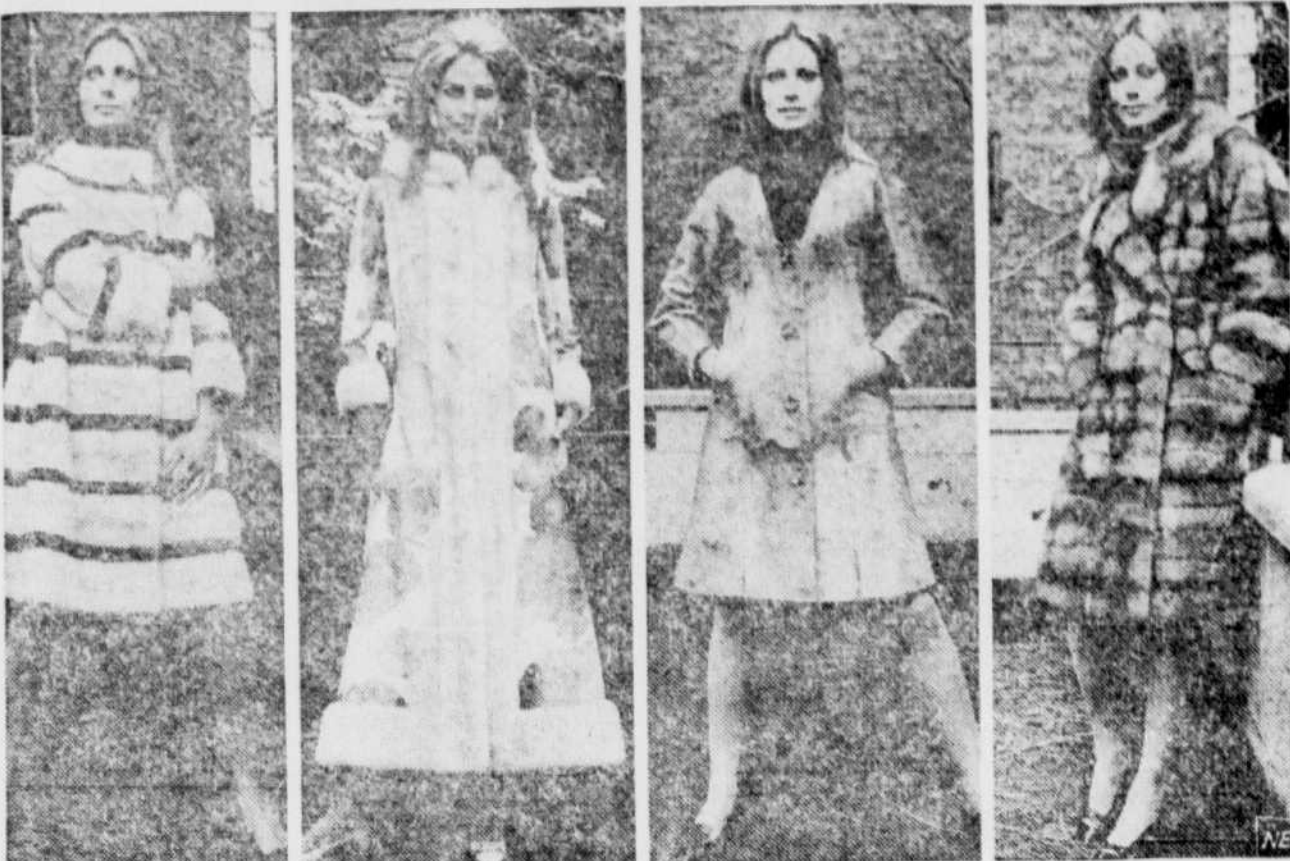
The interview included comments on some of the world's notables.

BUTTERSCOTCH CHOCOLATE BARS

1/2 cup butter or margarine, at room temperature
1/2 cup lightly-packed brown sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
OR 1/2 cup sifted pastry flour
1/2 cup unsifted rolled oats
6 ounces semi-sweet chocolate chips
1/2 cup chopped walnuts or pecans

Cream butter and gradually blend in sugar. Add egg and beat until light. Then add vanilla.

Measure once-sifted flour, add salt and sift into butter mixture. Then mix in rolled oats.

Spread in well greased 9-inch square pan and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, until firm — about 30 minutes. Cool slightly.

Melt chocolate over hot water and spread over partially cooled squares. Sprinkle with nuts. When cold, cut in bars. Makes about 16.

Food science head says

Good eating habits solution of weight problem

TORONTO (CP)—People are overweight because they eat too much, says Dr. Barbara McLaren, dean of the faculty of food sciences at the University of Toronto.

She is a crusader who contends good eating habits can help take weight off and keep it off. She dismisses big bones and physical and psychological problems as mere excuses in most cases with which overweight people kid themselves. She says, too, that people too often think of a diet as something unpleasant to be undertaken for a short time and then dropped.

"I don't think people who are overweight are essentially, mentally disturbed, and only about one per cent have hormonal problems."

"Overweight is not a short-term problem. It is not a three- or four-week deal, it's a rest of your life deal."

Since 1956, the faculty of food sciences has been running a continuing experimental program begun in co-operation with the Women's College Hospital.

Volunteers from the Ontario Heart Foundation agree to follow a balanced diet of 1,100 to 1,200 calories a day and keep score on themselves. They are given training in nutrition, menu and shopping planning, and are encouraged to step up physical activity.

SOME CHEAT

They don't count calories—the scores are kept in plus and minus units of five and 10.

The idea is to break bad eating habits and adopt good ones.

Dr. McLaren says the program works: when people are strongly motivated. Its enemy is human nature. She says people cheat on their food scores, they say they get more exercise than they do, and free from the discipline of the clinic, they backslide.

In general terms, a balanced breakfast would include fruit, bread or cereal, protein, skim milk and a non-caloric beverage. For lunch, protein, vegetable, bread, skim milk, non-caloric beverage. For dinner, protein, vegetable, fruit and non-caloric beverage. A glass of skim milk at bedtime is allowed.

There are a few helpful hints in the program.

One is to eat slowly. If you do your senses will be satisfied and will let you know when you have had enough food. If you eat quickly it is easy to eat too much and still feel unsatisfied because your senses are cheated.

You can use some of the skim milk allowance or some of the vegetable allowance in the form of dill pickles or

cauliflowerettes to help delay hunger.

SPICES HELP

Plan attractive meals and use spices and condiments to give them definite, non-fattening flavor.

You may also use consommé, bouillon, clear broth,

plain gelatin, non-caloric desserts, rennet tablets and artificially sweetened beverages to perk up meals.

You should drink tea and coffee black and avoid sugar-sweetened soft drinks and alcohol.

Broil, bake, roast, simmer

or pan-fry meats without fats.

You can help yourself, too, by choosing the lower calorie foods within various categories. Chicken and fish are lower than meat.

Salad vegetables and asparagus are lower than most other vegetables. In ascending order of caloric value, zucchini, chard, beet greens, sauerkraut, eggplant and cauliflower are at the bottom of the list. Brussels sprouts, carrots, squash, mixed vegetables and canned vegetable soup are at the top.

Dr. McLaren says the nutritional approach to diet will work if you stay with it.

"If we can sell people on the meal pattern that's normal, it will work. If they think this is once a day for a few months it won't."

About television

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Networks' interest in special programs for the coming season dramatically illustrates the flexibility of programming.

A couple of seasons ago, the theory was that a special program—perhaps more expensive and intellectual than the bread-and-butter shows—was a good buy for a sponsor who wanted to associate his name with something classy and it gave the network something to brag about in terms of public service.

Many an expensive special program actually cost the broadcasting network money, and ratings often were poor.

During the past season, however, so many special programs logged high ratings in the Nielsen charts and received such ecstatic critical notices that sponsors now are as interested in underwriting them as the networks are in hunting for good properties.

The old theory was that a show needed a continuing hero to persuade audiences to tune to the same network spot each week.

If you weren't getting the full treatment by the hero, as in the Andy Griffith Show, it was a good idea to have a weekly host as bait, which was Bob Hope's introductory function in his departed anthology series.

During the past season there was a definite swing away from concern with the sheer numbers of viewers and new interest in audience make-up. The result was a number of highly successful programs aimed directly at special audiences.

A household appliance manufacturer was delighted with results of sponsoring a musical show starring Herb Alpert and his Tijuana Brass because it attracted a big young - married audience. A soft drink manufacturer was completely happy with swinging, youth-oriented special event though the audience was shy of Lawrence Welk and Liberace fans.

The sponsors of the Telephone Hour stated frankly at the season's start that they didn't expect to win any TV numbers game, but would be happy if viewers at some 12,000,000 sets—a small number by current standards—tuned in and enjoyed their shows.

During the approaching season, sponsors are eager to take over big chunks of commercial time on expensive dramatic and musical special, some of which will cost \$500,000 and more to turn out.

READING A HAND WITHOUT SEEING IT

East's four - heart bid put a lot of pressure on South but South had the sort of hand that could stand pressure. He simply tried Blackwood to check for aces and went to six spades when North showed one ace only.

South knew that he was taking a chance but it was the sort of chance that any bridge player would want to take. When he looked at dummy he wasn't so sure about the whole thing.

He played the jack of hearts from dummy to start with. East probably held both ace and queen but certainly held the ace so that the king play would be hopeless. East did hold both ace and queen and continued the suit after winning the first trick.

South ruffed and led out his ace of spades. When both opponents followed to that trick he stopped to consider the rest of the play.

He needed two club discards on North's diamonds. One way to get them would be to play

cards and three West cards had been accounted for. It appeared most likely that East would be quite short in diamonds. Then South knew a little about East's style. He had bid four hearts without the king or jack and with a loser in spades. It was very likely that he held only one diamond. This made the odds favor the finesse. South thought awhile longer to work out an alibi if his play went wrong, led a diamond, played dummy's jack and claimed his slam to a chorus of "Well played" from his partner and "lucky stuff" from his opponents.

Show Business

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Remember when 50 cents to a dollar bought a ticket to the movies?

"They're charging \$3 for The Dirty Dozen, which is absolutely ridiculous for something that isn't a reserved - seat show," says Ross Hunter.

"Dr. Zhivago on second run is \$2. Roadshows like Grand Prix and The Happiest Millionaire are \$4 on weekends."

Hunter, producer of another \$4 entry, Thoroughly Modern Millie, offers the ticket buyer little but sympathy:

"For the studios to break even, they have to charge those prices. All the crafts expect too much money. People are way over-priced. I think I am."

Hunter, 41, has been called Universal studio's boy wonder. Also, for his contagious enthusiasm, which he admits is probably his greatest asset, a Pollyanna.

LIKES JOB
"I'm not any of those," he says. "I just love my job."

"And that's to see that all the money that's spent shows on the screen."

Hunter, who started at Universal 15 years ago as a \$125-a-week associate producer—after a fling as an actor in 10 movies—won't say what he's paid now except that it's "too much."

As for others in the film-making process— "The cost of sets, manpower and creative talent have gone so high. In 1954 I made Magnificent Obsession with Jane Wyman and Rock Hudson for \$388,000. Today it would cost \$3,000,000."

"My writer cost \$450 a week then. Today he would get \$5,000 to \$7,500 a week."

"The average set decorator in 1950 got \$275-\$285 a week. Now he gets \$500. An extra worked for \$12 a day but now gets \$30 or \$40. Art directors have gone from \$200-\$300 to \$1,000 a week."

"Some stars get \$1,000,000 a picture, semi-stars \$200,000 to \$400,000. But I don't know of a star who can sell a bad picture."

Financial report from Greenshields Ltd.

Sales for the second quarter 1967 was 2 percent above of 1967 for Dornier Limited and \$8,177,000 (98 cents a share) for its subsidiaries were 4.1 percent higher at \$11,723,000 compared with \$107,270,000 a year earlier. Some of this increase is attributable to advance purchasing by customers, particularly in the Fine Papers division in anticipation of strikes, states T.N. Beaupre, Chairman and President. Construction Materials continues to lag due to the low volume of house construction and strikes at two of its plants. While operating profit at \$82,000 was up \$350,000 or 3.6 percent, operating profit margin in all sectors continue to decrease as a result of continually increasing costs of labour and materials and strikes. The result was that net income was lower at \$4,746,000 or 31 cents per share compared with net of \$8,950,000 or 47 cents per share earned in the second quarter of 1966. Cash flow per common share for the quarter was 77 cents against 88 cents last year. Net income of Trans Canada Paper Lines Ltd. of \$8,357,000 (85 cents per common share) for the six months ended June 30, 1967 was 2 percent above of 1966 (\$8,177,000 or 98 cents a share) for the like period in 1966. Operating revenues at \$382,390,000 were 6 percent above \$77,711,000 reflecting mainly revenues from sale of natural gas imported from the U.S. at a cost greater than that of Western Canadian gas land in Eastern Canadian markets. Preferred dividend requirements were \$1,400,000 against \$345,000. Estimated net income of Texaco Canada Ltd. for the second quarter of 1967 was \$3,779,000 or 38 cents a common share after preferred dividends, up from \$2,882,000 or 29 cents a share for the same quarter of 1966. First half earnings were \$8,365,000, or 87 cents a share compared with \$6,980,000 or 70 cents a share, last year. F. M. Dawson, President, said the higher earnings resulted from improvements in all phases of operations, and from increased sales generated in part by Expo 67. He said the first half increase should not necessarily be regarded as an indication of the rate of increase for 1967 as a whole.

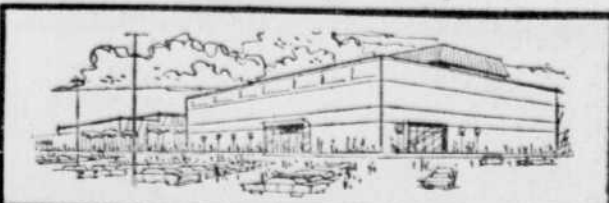

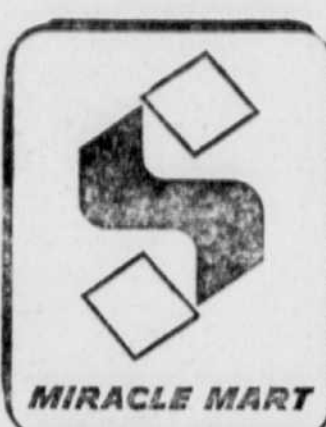
