DOBELL OFF FOR ENGLAND. New Effort to Establish the First Atlantic Service.

STATED AT FORESTERS' BANQUET. Where There Was a Good Deal of Talk About Forestry.

The banquet given last evening at the Chateau Frontenac by the Independent Order of Foresters of this District to Mr. O. W. Bedard, High Chief Ranger for the Province of Quebec, was in every respect successful. Over 150 members were present and Mr. J. I. Lavery, advocate, presided, having on his right the guest of the evening and Hon. Mr. Dobell, Hon. Mr. Dechene, Mr. Drapeau, of Rimouski; Geo. W. Craig and Alf. Dumas, and on his left, Hon. Chas. F. Paré, Mayor J. E. Roy, Mayor; Mr. V. Morin, N.P., of Montreal, Vice-Supreme Chief of the Order; Mr. Breton, General Organizer of the Order; Messrs. Emile Trudel and Eric Dorion, Secretaries. After full justice had been rendered to the splendid bill of fare Louis Philippe, the citizen King. It is likely that the title will descend to himself but he does not concern himself very much about that, for he is a close student and a conscientious follower of his chosen profession. The concert is to be under the patronage of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and of His Worship the Mayor of Quebec, and under the auspices of the Ladies' Morning Musicals. The ladies have already sold quite a number of tickets and there will certainly be a most fashionable audience in the hall next Wednesday evening to greet the famous performer. A Boston critic, writing of one of this lady's entertainments said: "The Chopin selections were delightfully played, the second etude and the polonaise being faultless in style, finish and feeling and delicacy. In interpreting her more finely conceived and finely developed etude Miss Aus der Ohe was dazzling with the brilliancy of her playing."

MR. BEDARD SPEAKS. The toast was received with great enthusiasm and in rising to respond Mr. Bedard was cheered to the echo. He began by remarking that he was deeply affected by this spontaneous demonstration, which would always remain an event in his life, and he considered it a great honor to have been elected to the position he now held in the Order. He had great faith in the Order of Independent Foresters and said that the numerous other benevolent societies showed great zeal in rivaling it. Benevolent societies differed greatly from insurance companies, as they had no shareholders, and consequently their rates were much lower. The motto of the I.O.F. was Liberty, Benevolence and Concord, and under that flag all creeds and denominations were welcome. After giving statistics of the Order since its foundation, Mr. Bedard spoke of the Government's attitude towards the Order, and the objects of the Order, and called upon Hon. R. R. Dobell to respond.

MR. DOBELL'S SPEECH. The member for Quebec West, who was received with great applause, began by thanking the I. O. F. for the honor conferred upon one of its members by inviting him to be present at the banquet. When he received his invitation to attend a Foresters' banquet he first expected to meet a number of lumbermen, but his neighbor, Mr. Bedard, had during the evening explained to him the objects of the Order, and he now thought he would join the Foresters. (Loud applause.) Hon. Mr. Dobell then referred to the future prosperity of the city of Quebec, and remarked that he was now on a sprightly of prosperity, and he felt satisfied that all those present were of the same opinion. He alluded to the canals and waterways of Canada, and remarked that although Messrs. Peterson, Tate & Co. had failed in securing a fast line service for Canada, nevertheless the scheme was not abandoned. He, the speaker, had crossed the ocean on three different occasions in relation to the fast line matter, and although he had to admit that he had failed in securing the fast line so far, he had not given up all hope, and he was leaving on Saturday next for the Old Country and hoped that satisfactory results might follow this visit of his to the ship-building world.

Other toasts proposed were that of the Province of Quebec, proposed by Mr. Emile Trudel and responded to by Hon.

Mr. Dechene, Mayor of Quebec and Levis, proposed by Dr. Lord, responded to by Mr. J. E. Roy, Mayor of Levis; the Supreme Chief, proposed by Mr. W. R. Russell, of St. Anne de Beaupre Court, and responded to by Mr. V. Morin, Vice-Supreme Chief, who spoke in both languages. The Press was also duly honored, Mr. P. Corrivin, proposing the toast, which was responded to by Dr. Stewart and Messrs. G. Gale and Girard. The Ladies were not forgotten, and Capt. J. O. Martineau, in a neat speech, proposed their health, which was responded to by Alderman Boulanger. The last toast of the evening was that of the President, Alderman Lavery, which was proposed by Mr. Drapeau and duly acknowledged.

AROUND THE COURTS.

Not Much of Public Interest in Yesterday's Proceedings.

In the Enquete and Merits Court yesterday, Judge Andrews presiding, the case of Madame Chas. Yvonne, nee Engage Hamel, against the executors of the estate of the late Abraham Hamel, was proceeded with and a number of witnesses examined. The plaintiff claims alimony from the executors, basing her claim on her father's will. The defendants plead that the executors of the estate exceed the receipts, and that they find it impossible to pay the allowance. The case will be continued this morning. Mr. L. A. Dionne represents the plaintiff, and Messrs. Malouin, Bedard & Dechene the estate.

Judge Andrews also took under advisement the case of Rousseau against the Corporation of St. Nicholas, and the latter plaintiffs in warranty against Frechette. The plaintiff sues for \$250, for injuries caused to his horse owing to bad roads. The defendants take an action in warranty against Frechette who was the owner of the property opposite which the horse was injured. Messrs. Drouin & Pelletier for plaintiff; Parent & Lefebvre for defendant and Malouin, Bedard & Dechene for defendant.

Who Caseneuve Is.
