From London Papers to the 15th May.

London, May 15th.—It is confidently rumored that a sweeping measure of retrenchment will be introduced into Parliament; that all offices without exception and without regard to tenure, to which no duties are attached, will be abolished, and that every channel of unnecessary expense will be closed.

The success of the Reform Bill in so far as the House of Commons is concerned may now be considered as certain. The only question, the King being a reformer, is how the Peers will act, and if they will dare to incur the responsibility of a rejection. By some the majority is estimated at 200 but it may fairly be said to be 150.—(Dispatch.)

The deeply lamented but not severe or dangerous indisposition of our great and good King alone has prevented His Majesty to fix a day for his royal visit to the city. Lord Melbourne has written a letter to that effect to the Lord Mayor.

The Gazette of Friday contains the dignities of Baron Viscount and Earl of the Kingdom of Colonel George Fitzclarence, under the title of Baron Tewkesbury Viscount Fitzclarence and Earl of Munster.

A conspiracy at Frankfurt to put down all German despots has been discovered and 25 persons arrested, and letters state that a rising took place at the same hour in six different towns on the Rhine and Rhine.

Accounts from Boyle in Ireland, relate repeated disturbances in that neighbourhood. Of 555 members returned up yesterday 209 only are against the Reform Bill.

The accounts posted at Lloyd's respecting the taking of St. Michaels and Fayal, appear to have been premature, yet little doubt was entertained that the latter island would soon fall to the Patriots.

A silly report has been spread that the Reform Bill would be delayed by Ministers. The story we need scarcely say is altogether without foundation.

The notices which have reached us of the Russian and Polish armies, clearly shew that the Russian General-in-Chief has been defeated in two successive plans of operation: the first in that which he attempted to force his way to Warsaw by a direct attack: the second by which he extended his line and attempted to cross the Vistula to the south of the city. In these operations he has lost great numbers of men, and he now returns to his first plan of attack with less strength and we believe with less strength than with a more formidable enemy to oppose him than when he first attempted to execute it. The Cholera Morbus had appeared at Warsaw.

Consols closed yesterday evening at 81 after having advanced in the week as high as 82. There is a general rumour that the bankers intend to raise the price of consols.

London, May 15th.—The Polish army receives daily reinforcements. Thousands of combatants proceed to the provinces to join the Polish Army. The cholera morbus is still extending, but the deaths are not so numerous.

The London Courier says, the public may rely that the Reform Bill will be introduced immediately after the meeting of Parliament without a single material alteration.

Sir John Byng is shortly to be succeeded in the command of the troops in Ireland, by Sir Hussey Vivian.

There was an affray on Sunday at Clondegad in Clare, between the peasantry and the military, when a sergeant of the 5th foot was killed, and five or six privates wounded. Three of the insurgents were apprehended.

Plymouth, May 14th.—The accounts from the country concur in stating the injurious effects of the frost. On the night of the 6th inst, the thermometer fell to six degrees below freezing.

The freeholders of Cornwall have achieved a great victory. Sir Richard Vyvian, the great Jupiter Tonans of the borough-mongers, and Lord Valletort, are at the bottom of the poll. The Cornish elections will close the elections for England and Wales. Leaving Ireland to neutralize, we now have from what may be considered as a good estimate, 287 for reform, and 190 against it. It is a singular feature of the elections, that scarcely a thorough going anti reformer is to be heard of; all now are "moderate reformers."

The Carron government steamer, arrived here 12th inst, having sailed from the Tagus on the 5th. The Carron had taken out dispatches to the British Consul and Capt. Markland, the object of which was to demand satisfaction from Don Miguel for an insult offered to Mr. Roberts, an English merchant, and also for the capture of the St. Helena by the Portuguese frigate Diana.

Ten days were allowed for consideration before reprisals would be made, but on the eighth day nothing satisfactory had been done, when an official Gazette was published. This did not come up to the instructions given to Capt. Markland, and he demanded that the terms which had previously been submitted should be explicitly fulfilled. This was done in the Gazette of the 4th, the Portuguese government having gazetted every condition. Capt. Markland then with the British squadron, consisting of the Briton, 46, Windsor Castle, 74, Ariadne, 28, Dispatch, 18, Childers, 10, and Nautilus, 19, again entered the Tagus. The city was perfectly tranquil, but arrests were taking place daily, and the prisons were crowded with victims. A French corvette was the only French vessel of war in the Tagus, and much anxiety prevailed as to the intention of the French Government and the nature of the force expected to appear off the bar. Nothing could exceed the firmness of the British Consul and Capt. Markland, in conducting the negotiations.

The following dismissals are part of the satisfaction returned to England:—

The Marquis de Silva, Criminal Judge, for the insult offered to Mr. Roberts, a British subject.

Commodore de Miranda Everard of the Royal Navy of Portugal, for having improperly captured the British packet St. Helena.

An Ensign of the Police Guard, named Verissimo, for an insult to Mr. O'Hara, British subject.

Leonardo, a Groom of the Royal Stables, for entering the rope yard of Mr. Callary, British subject, and taking the foreman into custody.

The Tyrion with the North American mail sailed from Falmouth for Halifax on the 9th May.

EMIGRATION OF CHELSEA PENSIONERS.—A correspondent states that a number of Chelsea out-pensioners are about to emigrate to Van Diemen's Land and to the United States. Those who wish to emigrate (he states) are furnished with instructions and different papers from the Commissioner's Office, and on quitting this country two years' pension is paid them, after deducting the freight. On arriving at their destination, another two years' (full) pension is paid them, after which all future claims on the British government for their past services terminate. A number of those pensioners sailed last week, in the Dew Dron, from the London Docks. Two ships are now lying in St. Katharine's Docks, bound for Van Diemen's Land, and two for the United States, where a great number of pensioners are engaging births. It is understood that a certain portion of land will be allotted to each man in Van Diemen's Land. The charge made upon each individual proceeding to Van Diemen's Land is 5s. including a limited portion of provisions. The charge made for the passage to the United States is from £4 to £5 without provisions. [It is Canada and not the United States to which these pensioners have emigrated. They have arrived at Quebec in part.]

12,000 of the Warriors of July have refused the cross of the Legion of Honor, have joined the students and gone over to Lafayette party.—(Paris Paper.)

London, May 15.—A great excitement prevails in Paris in consequence of an apparently unimportant affair. A law was some time ago passed for presenting the decoration of the cross of the Legion of Honor to those who had distinguished themselves in the battles of July last. The King has ordered that the cross shall bear the words "given by the King," and all who receive it shall swear allegiance to him. Almost all have refused these terms. They say that they fought the battles of the nation and not of Louis Philippe; they declare they will wear the ribbon prescribed by the Ordinance without the cross. The affair has made the government extremely ridiculous.

From the 5th inst, the anniversary of Napoleon's death to the 10th, the sisters of the Column of the Place Vendôme in Paris had been very considerable. They came to scatter flowers and chaplets. On the 9th the steps and every projecting part of the pedestal was absolutely covered with these fading tokens of respect. To the chaplets and flowers however, were added numerous manuscript inscriptions. At two of the angles cypresses in tubs were placed. Some of the inscriptions related to the youthful son of the great Emperor, and called for the repeal of the law which excluded the Bonaparte family from France. All these circumstances naturally attracted immense crowds, which were augmented by throngs of flower sellers, criers of pamphlets, &c. The people remained on the ground till late last night. About 10 o'clock this evening (9th) a large mob proceeded down the Rue Neuve towards the place Vendôme, where they danced round the column and then knelt down and sang the Marseillaise. This done they shouted *Dieu la République! vive le souverain peuple!* and they directed their way to the Palace de la Concorde where they repeated their dance round the pedestal there. They afterwards set out for the Palais Royal and in passing the guard house at Rue Florentine cried "*vive la ligne!*" but on reaching the hotel of the Minister of Finances, the National Guard turned out and dispersed them. On the morning of the 10th numerous groups again assembled in the Palace Vendôme, upon which strong detachments of National guards were directed, and they were dispersed, the flowers were taken away and a strong party stationed as a guard round the railing of the column to prevent all persons from approaching.

Louis Philippe is about undertaking his tour to the South and West of the Kingdom. The unhappy dispute about the crosses of honor for the battles of July has more than any thing tended to cast odium upon his character among the lower classes of the Parisians, and he needs some Provincial applause, which no doubt the voyage is chiefly intended to obtain.

The last accounts from Poland are of the 3d May and are favorable. The Russians in their extremity have offered battle to the Poles, who were too wise to be entrapped; and the former have been compelled to retreat and occupy their late position. The head quarters of Diebitch are at Mordy beyond Seidice, and

the Polish army have advanced opposite to them. The country in the rear of the Russian army is totally destitute of provisions, and before it every thing is also desolate. In such a position it will be impossible to get supplies, and retreat must be resorted to.

The Brussels papers of the 13th have arrived. A disturbance in that city had been quelled. The mob had collected round the regent's house and demanded a republic. It was necessary to have recourse to force. These disorders are charged to the French and Anti Leopold faction. Speculation is still on the rack respecting the decision of Prince Leopold's acceptance of the Crown; he is said to have gone to Paris to ascertain to what extent the French King would admit his claim or his daughter receive his address. It is not probable that Prince Leopold would make the concession of a change to the Catholic religion which the Belgians loudly ask for. The French papers state that a new protocol has been signed by which Belgium will be left to its fate, if the preceding protocols are not accepted in a fortnight. If this is correct the affairs of Belgium are drawing to a close.

The Warsaw Gazette of the 26th April, says yesterday we received news that General Dwernicki has obtained a victory at Luck, over General Rudiger, taking 12 pieces of cannon and a large number of prisoners, among whom is said to be the Russian Commander. Rudiger's corps may be said to be annihilated.

Warsaw, April 28th.—Since yesterday affairs have taken a turn favorable to the Poles. The Russians suddenly stopped their march near Dember Wiekli, when General Skrzynecki offered them battle. This the Russians declined and fell back. General Untuch has been reinforced by several excellent regiments, and is now marching upon the Russian Guards in order to unite with the patriots in Samogitia and Lithuania several members of the Diet have set out for the head quarters of General Skrzynecki from whence it is inferred that a decisive battle will be fought in a few days. It is ascertained that 20,000 men who have already answered the call to insurrection in Lithuania are fighting with the greatest bravery.

Warsaw, May 2nd.—We have had the Polish army at Milosna again, two miles distant from Warsaw. The following is the substance of a dispatch from General Skrzynecki:—

General Diebitch had concentrated all his forces and in person attacked on the 25th our rear guard at Kullow. Col. Dembinski commanded the Polish troops in a battle of 2 hours against the enemy's overwhelming force. The Russian Field Marshall endeavored to surround our right wing with his main army. Not intending to give battle in that part of the country the situation of which is disadvantageous, orders to retreat to Kostryza were effected. A reserve guard formed at Minsk, which was attacked next morning. The enemy presented a great mass of Infantry, Cavalry, and Artillery, but all his attacks were repulsed. Not a prisoner was made by the enemy.

QUEBEC:

WEDNESDAY, 15th JUNE, 1851.

The Hebe having sailed from the Downs on the 17th ult, arrived here on Monday night, the 15th, bringing London papers of the 15th. The St. David has also brought Plymouth papers of that date.

The advices from Warsaw are of the 3d May. The Polish army had fallen back to within a few miles of that place. Marshall Diebitch having disposed his forces for a general battle and the Poles avoided it. When the Russians took up a disadvantageous position, the Poles in their turn threatened to attack them and they were forced to appear to withdraw near to their first positions. Some decisive battle may be expected soon.

Don Miguel has made entire reparations to the English Government, and would no doubt have been handled rather roughly if he had not.

Paris continues in an excited state, but the Government easily dispenses the mobs with the aid of the National Guards. Louis Philippe is becoming more and more unpopular.

The friends of Parliamentary Reform will be gratified at the great accession of strength to the cause obtained in the late elections, which were all terminated in England with the exception of three or four on the 14th.

Advices from New-York by private channels to Thursday evening last, have been received; there were no later dates from Europe than the 8th May.

Major Wolff, of Valenciennes, who is employed in superintending the opening of the road from Metis to Ristigouche, arrived in town last night, from Lake Matapedia. He has about fifty men employed there, but had got short of provisions and money, expecting a supply by the river from the Commissioners at Ristigouche. We are sorry to learn that in an attempt to communicate with Ristigouche, or a party from thence, Mr. Erick Fournier, a son of Mr. Fournier, Surveyor, and late M. P. for l'Islette, was drowned on the 6th inst. by the upsetting of a raft in a rapid part of the river, a few miles from the outlet of Lake Matapedia.

We understand that Mr. Christie has gone down to Chaleur Bay in the Bon Vivant, which sailed from Quebec in the first week in May and was off Cacona on the 15th, with a supply of tools, &c. for the Commissioners, and this supply was expected by the River Matapedia.

The discharged Soldiers arrived in the Hebe, have come out on the principle mentioned in the extract in another column. The instructions for granting them lands, and the remainder of their pay have been sent by the English May Mail. It is understood that they will not receive the whole of the money coming to them until they have made actual settlements.

The works on the Citadel on the Cape are we understand almost at a stand, waiting instructions by the May Mail. Only a few of the old hands are kept at work until further advices are received.

There is a rumour that the ministry will again, in the month of July, propose a duty on North American timber.—(Mercury.)

Liverpool, May 11th.—Since this day's night prices of the best wheat must be noted 3d, & inferior 3d, per 70 lbs. lower, at which there was this morning a better bid than an excessive demand. Several parcels of United States flour were sold at about 25 to 28 1/2, which is a decline from last Tuesday's rates of 27 to 28.

London Corn Exchange, May 11th.—The trade in wheat remains in a dull state & Monday's prices are with difficulty supported. Last average 70 1/2; foreign duty 7 1/2.

PORT OF QUEBEC. NOTICE TO MASTERS OF VESSELS.—Whereas the provisions of the Law for preventing the introduction of pestilential diseases into this Province, have been, in many cases, infringed by masters of vessels, mostly under pretence of ignorance of them, the following extracts of the Law of last Session, are hereby made accessible to all, and all Masters of vessels who, after this notice, may be found in fault, shall be prosecuted as the said Law provides as well as that of the 53th, Geo. III. Cap. 5th, commonly called the Quarantine Act.

IV. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the Master of every Vessel shall, by every means in his power, assist the Health Officer in his visit, inspection and operations; and such Master for every refusal or neglect to give such assistance or to cause to be conveyed to the Hospital any person so infected, found in his Vessel, or to comply with any lawful order of the Health Officer to him given, in pursuance to this Act, shall for every such offence shall incur a penalty of twenty five pounds currency.

V. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the Health Officer when in the execution of his duty, shall be entitled to the like treatment and protection as the Harbour Master of Quebec, when in the execution of his duty, is entitled to, under the laws and regulations of the Trinity House.

VI. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that no Master of any Vessel arriving in the Harbour of Quebec, shall permit any steerage passenger, mariner, or apprentice, to land or leave his Vessel, until he shall have obtained from the Health Officer a certificate that there is no contagious disease in his Vessel, under a penalty of ten pounds currency.

All Vessels arriving with passengers, or having any sick persons on board, are required to anchor at a reasonable distance from other vessels and from the wharves, and to keep their colour hoisted, until the Health Officer shall have boarded them.
