## Westmount "Y" Fosters Return To Gymnastics

Tumbling and twisting their way to the forefront, a trio of gymnasts from the Westmount Y.M.C.A. have started something in Montreal which may end up at the next Olympic Games.

Part of the Montreal Y's team, Westmounters John Cooper, Don Le Clair and Jack King with the other two members, Gordon and Len Mather, from the International Y are the city's champion gymnasts.

These enthusiasts of the high bar, mats and parallel bars; flying rings and pommel horse have something more in mind than winning championships. Their horizon is a hope that they, through

their efforts, can foster a rebirth of interest in the sport.

The Westmount "Y", under the vigorous leadership of Claire Buckley, physical director, otherwise known as "Buck", has been the spearhead of a popular return to gymnastics.

During December "Buck" called a city-wide gymnastic get-together at the Westmount "Y". Out of this meeting a team was welded with the five best men and himself as coach.

### Test of Ability

The first real test of strength came for the boys in the open city championship recently. They crashed through to prove their capabilities as a competitive team, winning by a tidy margin of 245 points. At the present time they are conditioning themselves for the Eastern Canadian championships to be held at McGill in early spring.

Timing and co-ordination must be exact if one is going to try a cross-hand change not to speak of the stamina required. A most spectacular number comes when the performer twirling around in giant circles suddenly lets go, does a somersault and lands on his feet. This is called a fly-away and is not for people who have flat feet.

It is estimated that it takes from 10-15 years to make a competitive gymnast. The only thing that will produce one is constant practice and conditioning. At the Olympic Games in 1948 the average age of the contestants was 34 years. The boys on the "Y" team have been at it from 5-10 years.

So the next time you see one of them on the parallel bars bobbing up and down, flipping around rapidly in an intricate pattern, it may look as though he is trying to tie himself into a pretzel, but more likely he is performing a peach basket that has taken a good many years of practice to learn.

## Westmount High Old Boys To Meet

The 16th annual banquet of the Westmount High Old Boys' Association will be held in the Spanish Room of the Queens Hotel next Thursday. Some 500 former students of the school are expected to attend.

Feature of the gathering will be the reunion of the famous Westmount High hockey team of the 1921-22 season which, after sweeping all Montreal honors, went on to win the provincial junior championship. Their exploits will be recounted by G. P. Smith, who mentored them.

Entertainment has been arranged by the organizing committee with Max Ford, former principal of King's School in Westmount and now a member of the Montreal legal fraternity, serving as emcee. Comedy and music will highlight the program.

During the evening John Cleghorn, 1950 winner of the Old Boys' Award of Honor, will receive a bronze medal. The award is made annually to the boy in his graduating year who in the opinion of his classmates, best combines the qualities of scholarship and sportsmanship. He is chosen by secret ballot. Cleghorn is at present studying at McGill.

Bud Briggs, president of the Westmount High Old Boys for the past year, will be in the chair. A new slate of officers will be elected.

John Anderson, Jr., has been chairman of the banquet committee in charge of all arrangements.

The fourth annual Old Boys vs. School hockey game will be played at the Forum from 5 to 6 p.m. the afternoon of the banquet. Gordie MacNeil, captain of the 1950 Canadian Davis Cup team, will captain the Old Boys. G. P. Smith, who retired as Westmount High's athletics director in 1945, will serve as coach.

## Raise Living Standards Says U.S. Consul Here

Hon. Cecil M. P. Cross, United States Consul General, spoke to a meeting of the Western-Montreal Branch, United Nations Association, held in Westmount Junior High School on Thursday evening and showed how raising the standard of living in backward nations must be undertaken, not by private capital operating in those countries, but by the organized efforts of groups of governments, such as is being done under the Technical Assistance Plan of the United Nations.

It is true that some private companies are doing considerable work toward better living conditions for the people in direct contact with their operations, but the betterment of whole countries is not possible for private funds.

Poor soil, lack of water power, oil and coal; excess population, oligarchic rule and religious interference are all contributing factors to lack of progress in a backward state. Medical aid, extending the span of life without a method of increasing food supply to take care of the greater population, and without industrial expansion to supply a means of support, is worse than useless.

It has been realized by the more advanced nations that the very existence of the huge population of the backward nations exerts an increasing pressure which will eventually lead to World unrest unless something is done to alleviate the conditions. It is contrary to the ideals of the advanced nations to allow such conditions to continue.

There are two plans in existence. The first is the United Nations Technical Assistance Plan, and the second, The Commonwealth (Colombo) Plan. This latter plan covers the contact of Government with Government for the construction of roads, bridges, canals and power-plants. The United Nations Plan is concerned more directly with health, food sources, education and the establishment of industry.

Even on a dollar and cents basis these plans should both yield good dividends in increased trade through an extension of markets.

The speaker was introduced by Mrs. G. G. Wakeman, President of The American Women's Club, and thanked by Mr. H. G. Ferrabee, Secretary of the Western-Montreal Branch, U.N.A., G. F. W. Kuhring, president of the branch presided at the meeting.

## Campaign Starts To Furnish Mess

The Military Engineers Association has opened a campaign to raise funds to furnish the officer's mess of the new armoury adjacent to the Westmount Athletic Grounds.

The new buildings will constitute a first class Engineer armoury, including training facilities, a library, orderly room, showers and mess quarters for officers, N.C.O.'s and men. Mess furniture for these rooms is not provided by the Department of National Defence and the Military Engineers Association has undertaken to secure the necessary funds at an estimated cost of \$10,000.00.

Working closely with the Third Engineer Regiment the Montreal Branch of the Association has certain privileges to use the Regimental Officer's Mess, which provides not only a meeting place for military and civilian engineers but up to date information on Military Engineering in general.

## Westmount Officer Takes Northern Tour

Wing Commander H. C. Ledoux, of Westmount, a staff member of the R.C.A.F. Staff College, Armour Heights, has been selected to travel among a party of 31 senior Air Force, Army and Navy officers on 15 day tour of Canadian and American air bases in the north.

In order to give an intimate picture of the conditions and problems of northern operations, the tour will cover 8,000 miles of northern territory including stops at Rivers, Manitoba; Edmonton, Alberta; Watson Lake in the Yukon and Fairbanks, Alaska.

## Westmount Pilots In Mock Air Duel

401 (City of Westmount) Squadron, RCAF Reserve, have been selected to take part in the largest assimilated air operational program to be held by RCAF Fighters in peace time. Leaving St. Hubert Field on Saturday morning, 18 reserve pilots will fly three Vampire Jets and light Harvards on a non-stop run to Toronto.

En route they will be intercepted by three combined squadrons from Toronto, Hamilton and London, total "enemy" force of 35 planes. The Westmount jets will complete the trip in 50 minutes and should successfully evade any interception. Their comrades arrive in 2 hours 20 minutes, and will probably bear the brunt of the "attack."

The Westmount Squadron, commanded by Wing Commander J. W. Reid, D.F.C., although weekend flyers are all experienced ex-war operational fighter pilots. They will add to their experience this week-end with the programme which follows, a massed fly-past over Toronto on Saturday morning, with continuous air interception exercise lasting until Sunday night.

Ground crews of the Westmount Squadron numbering some 45 men will accompany their own fighters in two Dakota transports.

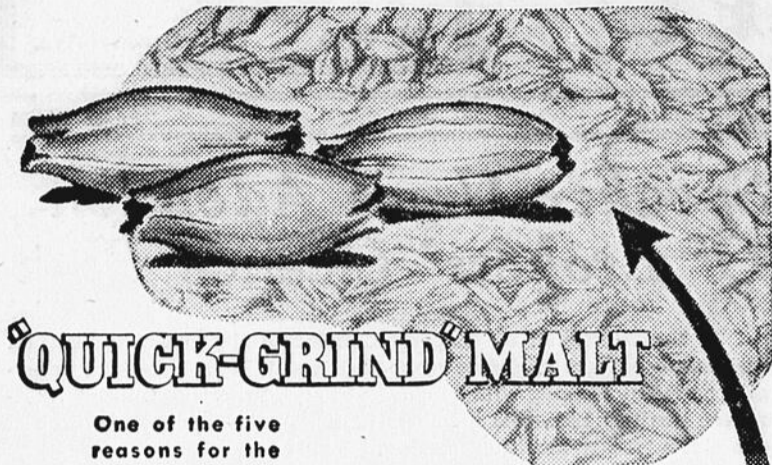

## Mock Council Make Decision to Raise Mayoral Salary

"Mayor" Alan Wileman, of Westmount, steered the mock city council of the Montreal Board of Trade, Young Men's Section when they decided the salary of the Mayor of Montreal ought to be raised.

They set the figure at \$20,000 with a round increase of \$10,000 a year, quite a bit more than the \$8,500 increase to which the Quebec House agreed.

Meeting in the City Council chamber, they gave the ordinary members of the City Council quite a shock, when they decided to reduce the honorarium of \$600 to a \$1 a year.

This was quite a contrast to the raise to \$1,500 decided on at the Legislative Assembly in Quebec. There was quite a lot of talk about reducing the yearly remuneration to a mere five cents.

Pseudo-councillor T. W. Doyle asked, "Did we come to this council to get a salary or to represent the people?"

"This is only a part time job," "Councillor" Doyle continued, "We should consider ourselves honored enough to sit on the council of Canada's largest city."

"The mayor, on the other hand, one of Montreal's main tourist attractions, should receive full support, both morally and financially," he concluded.

### FULL TIME JOB

Seconder D. Young declared, "Being mayor is a full time job. We are able to do other jobs on the side." Member E. Morris would have none of this and said the councillors' dollar would work out to 3/4 cent an hour, a ridiculous reward.

Further debate led council leader Sidney Phillips to advocate five cents a year, another member to intervene, "To pay \$10,000 a year for a tourist attraction is rather ghastly."

It appeared to the House as though the motion was lost, but "Mayor" Wileman and "Executive Committee Chairman" Norman V. Waldron went into a huddle, then the "mayor" ruled it was carried.

When Mayor Camilien Houde entered his council chamber he greeted his colleagues and, referring to the Quebec awards, said, "We got a very substantial increase. Your mock parliament will give you a chance for training which we of my generation did not have."



## SUPPORT SCOUT DRIVE

Valuable Work Among Our Youth  
Must Be Maintained

The Montreal District Boy Scouts Association appealed three weeks ago for \$101,000 to be collected by canvassers. Unfortunately, the extreme sub-zero weather of early February made this work very difficult, and this was followed by the near-epidemic of flu which has since resulted in bringing the canvassing almost to a stand-

still with the objective slightly more than 50% achieved.

There is no doubt that funds for 1951 activities are badly needed. Very wisely, Scouting has always expected each Troop and Pack to be self-supporting by collecting dues of five or ten cents a week from each Cub and Scout. There is, however, the cost of maintaining and operating three camps which provide training for some 1600 Scouts, Cubs, Sea Scouts and Leaders; the cost of maintaining three sizable buildings; and the expense of the Headquarters' organization and Field Staff for Montreal and District to be defrayed.

That an organization like the Boy Scouts Association should face any curtailment of its valuable work with boys is unthinkable; and yet if canvassers and potential subscribers are not given an opportunity to meet, this could happen. Montreal has an outstanding record for achieving its Class "A" appeals, and, in this particular instance, we feel that the Scout Association will eventually succeed. It is recommended that in all cases where prospects are not canvassed, the true friend of Scouting send in his or her subscription to Scout Headquarters on Bishop Street.

There are pleasant surprises ahead in the Montreal fashion picture. Something new has been added — something very different and subtle, some thing that breathes of the beauty of old Benares, the Taj Mahal and the pageant of Indian color

and tradition. One of these days you'll be seeing a fashion-leading Montrealer in a sun dress made from an exquisite printed sari, or wearing a shawl from Cashmere draped over a summer dress. For these lovely things are being imported into Canada by Mme. Berthe Charton, proprietor of a small treasure shop called Frivolites at 1026 Sherbrooke Street, who not only sells these so "different" materials, but advises on how they may best be made up for western use. Also in her collection are sheer blouses and

linens, hand embroidered in South America, and made in the latest Paris modes.

Evening blouses are either in gauzy wisps of Indian material or in pure gold thread Indian brocade, either fine enough to crush into one hand, and made up from her Paris style book. Zari scarves are in two sizes, both reasonably priced, in lovely colors with lines of pure gold thread in the uncrushable wisps. There are the printed silk saris, for sun dresses, and the gauzy very beautiful and exclusive ones ornamented with pure gold and jewels which can

be worn as evening gowns over strapless slips.

Cream-colored wool, so fine that it feels like a kitten's ear, is used in the Cashmere shawls with their hand embroidered borders in peacock blue and tan, and other combinations of colors. These, Madame Charton advises, will be worn draped over the shoulders of summer frocks, as light coats, no cutting being done, but a couple of stitches holding the shawl into a loose-sleeved coat effect.

Madame Berthe Charton had no idea of going into business when she made her first trip to India with her husband. But while there she bought many of these beautiful Indian materials which were so much admired upon her return to Canada that she decided to bring the east and the west closer together to the mutual benefit of both by opening "Frivolites" and showing Canadians the beauty of Indian art in weaving, thread embroidery, carvings, etc. You can see that she has a flair for her "Frivolites" — she even took time to show me how to put on a sari properly, demonstrating with her own which is a cloud of white, hand embroidered with real gold and crystal motifs.

Most of her cocktail and evening bags are of black velvet, hand embroidered in Indian classic designs with gold and silver — very distinctive.

Madame Charton, the only importer of the Benares and other typical Indian materials as well as the South American line, also has a display of Indian hand-carved ivory brooches, with matching earrings, necklaces, etc., and Paris-made wool flowers to add a colorful accent to an Easter suit lapel.

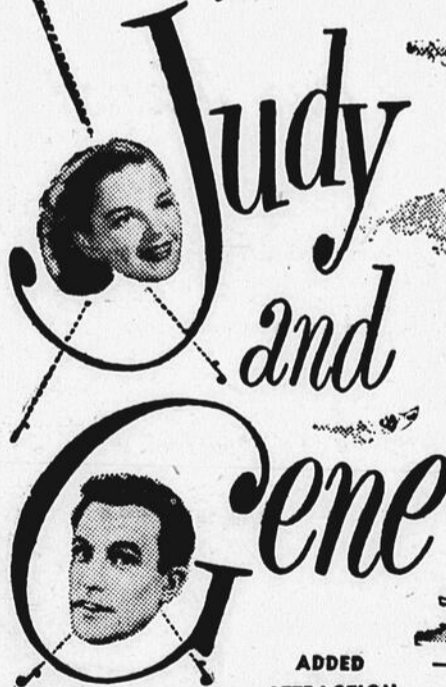
