Federal, provincial differences are seen

OTTAWA (CP) — Basic differences among the federal and provincial governments on language and other questions have been disclosed in advance of next week's constitutional conference.

Results of a year's study by officials since last February's federal-provincial conference were made public Monday, indicating agreement may be farther away than when the round of discussions opened.

A briefing paper prepared by the continuing committee of officials set up last year reported on a number of "propositions" put forward by the various governments.

The paper did not identify which governments had advanced which propositions. And it stressed that they were not firm or final positions.

But even with the stipulations, the differences were reported to be "sharp" and "marked". On language, for example, one government said an objective of Confederation should be to "assert the multi-racial character of Canada." Another one or more governments argued

that constitutional linguistic provisions should be kept in their present form.

SOME OPPOSE DUALITY

One view "indicated outright opposition to any concept of

"two founding linguistic communities" or "linguistic duality", the report said.

There were also differences on whether Canada should consider becoming a republic, or

whether the advantages of a congressional system of government "should at least be explored."

Prime Minister Trudeau, however, indicated the differences did not surprise him.

He told reporters the aim of the discussions had been to establish the various points of view.

The officials on the committee were not empowered to negotiate compromises, he said. It now was up to the politicians to "hammer out agreement."

Mr. Trudeau also indicated that the federal government may consider referring its official language bill, or parts of it, to the Supreme Court for a ruling on constitutionality.

HAS NO DOUBTS

He said his government has no doubt itself about the constitutionality of the bill, but that if some provinces insist on a court reference, Ottawa will consider it.

Premiers of the three Prairie provinces urged during the weekend that the measure be

Council wants to ease artists' burden

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canada Council today urged the federal and provincial governments to take a number of tax measures that would ease the financial burden on artists and encourage Canadians to provide more money for the arts.

The council is the agency administering the money that the federal government makes available for promotion of all performing and visual arts.

The council announced in a statement these key recommendations resulting from an independent study undertaken for it: —The individual taxpayer should be permitted to average his income over a period of five

years. —Charitable donations, which in legal terms include donations to the arts, should be made deductible for both individuals and corporations up to a level of 20 per cent of income, instead of the present 10 per cent.

—Gifts other than cash that are worth more than \$500 should be fully deductible if they are made to qualified organizations.

—A deduction of 150 per cent of the value of any donations of a capital nature to approved arts projects should be allowed for income-tax purposes. The council suggests a five-year

Commons gives approval to changes in Canada Evidence Act

OTTAWA (CP) — The Commons gave final approval Monday to changes in the Canada Evidence Act — affecting all courts in the land — but only over combined opposition objections.

Despite disagreement at almost every point on debate on that bill and three others, the Commons chalked up a respectable batting average:

—The evidence act amendments were approved and now require only royal assent.

—The report of the transport committee on proposed amendments to the Navigable Waters Protection Act was approved.

This legislation now needs only third-reading approval and royal assent.

—Another transport committee report on proposed changes in the Aeronautics Act also won approval and now awaits third reading.

—Third reading was given proposed changes in the Veterans Land Act that would remove the five-per-cent interest ceiling on some loans under the act.

Today the House returns to debate on the Prairie Grain Advance Payments Act.

The most contentious item of business was the proposed

amendments to the Canada Evidence Act, which along with the navigable waters and aeronautics changes already has Senate approval.

SEES DANGER NOW

Eldon Woolliams (PC — Calgary North), a criminal lawyer, led the attack. Although the proposed changes had been known for some time, only recently had he come to see a danger in them.

The amendments facilitate the hearing of so-called expert witnesses, revise hearsay-evidence rules and allow for cross-examination of one's own witnesses under circumstances not

now permitted.

It was this latter proposal that drew Mr. Woolliams' ire.

"This measure gives the Crown too much power,"

He argued for a delay in giving the bill final approval until Justice Minister John Turner — not in the House Monday — could answer members' questions. Stanley Knowles (NDP — Winnipeg North Centre) supported the suggestion and proposed a motion to that effect.

The Liberals voted down the proposal 89 to 60 against a combined opposition. Debate then

resumed on the third-reading motion.

Marcel Lambert (PC — Edmonton West), another western lawyer, demanded that either Mr. Turner appear or that members be provided with transcripts of the standing committee's proceedings on the evidence act.

Donald Macdonald, government House leader, conceded that the transcripts were not available. But he had been led to believe there was agreement to proceed with the bill since the committee approved it

unanimously — and Mr. Woolliams was a committee member.

FORCES SECOND VOTE

Liberals were forced to a second recorded vote on the bill at third reading when the Speaker said the dissenting voice votes outnumbered those in favor. Again the Liberals, with NDP support, beat down opposition 90 to 41.

Standing in the 264-seat Commons: Liberal 155, Conservative 72, NDP 21, Creditiste 14, Independent 1, vacant 1.

Wallace Nesbitt (PC — Oxford) attempted in an amendment to exclude certain man-

made waterways from proposed changes in the Navigable Waters Protection Act. His motion was defeated on a voice vote.

The bill proposes extending provisions of the act to include artificial barriers to navigation, such as land fill. Mr. Nesbitt contended the proposal violates the intent of the British North America Act and goes too far in covering small facilities.

James Richardson, minister without portfolio, said opposition fears are unfounded. Small docks and diving platforms would not be affected unless they obstructed navigation.

Gerald W. Baldwin (Peace

River), Conservative House leader, also failed on a voice vote to win approval for his amendment to the committee report on proposed changes to the Aeronautics Act.

The amendments increase the regulation-making authority of the transport minister and deputy minister, and of the Canadian transport commission.

TAKES POWER AWAY

Mr. Baldwin argued the government is moving aggressively to take more and more power away from Parliament and place it in its own hands and that of its agencies.

Ceremonies will be simple

QUEBEC (CP) — A legislative informant said Monday ceremonies marking the opening of the national assembly Feb. 25 will be simple, resembling the ceremonies opening sessions at Ontario's legislative assembly.

Gone with the abolition last

Dec. 31 of the legislative council, last of the provincial upper houses, is most of the parliamentary pomp that accompanied sessional openings here.

The informant said an assembly rules committee decided last week that the house would open under its new name of na-

tional assembly with the lieutenant-governor reading the speech from the throne.

Lt.-Gov. Hugues Lapointe is to read the throne speech, outlining the Union Nationale government's legislative program, while he is seated in the chair of Speaker Gerard Label.

The fourth session of the 28th legislature marks the first time the house meets as "the national assembly of Quebec."

The name was changed from legislative assembly at the last session by legislation abolishing the legislative council.

Since 1967 one house rules committee or another has considered several proposals, in-

cluding these, gleaned from a "confidential report" never made public:

—The throne speech would be called "the opening address" or "legislative program" and read in the assembly by either the speaker or premier.

—Bills would be sanctioned in the lieutenant-governors' office with the premier and opposition leader, or their representatives, present.

—Debate on the legislative program would be limited to 25 hours, with speaking time for all members except the premier and opposition leader limited to 30 minutes.

Grenade kills boys a few minutes after Moshe Dayan goes by

Two Arab boys were killed and 10 other persons were wounded Monday by a hand grenade thrown at an Israeli military vehicle a few minutes after Israeli Defence Minister Moshe Dayan drove past on a tour of Gaza, the Israeli army reported.

The Arab refugee centre has been the scene of several bitter confrontations between Arabs and the Israeli occupying force during the past two weeks. Dayan and several of his top military officials were making an unannounced tour of the area.

In Cairo today, the semi-official newspaper Al Ahran reports that Yasser Arafat, official spokesman for the Al Fatah guerrilla organization, has been elected chief of the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Arafat succeeds Lawyer Yehia Hammouda as head of the coalition of Palestinian organizations. He vowed to escalate guerrilla activities against Israel until they become "an all-out liberation war encompassing the whole of our occupied Palestinian homeland."

CONFESSES TO MURDER

The Iraqi government announced a 20-year-old Iraqi soldier had confessed to the murder of a left-wing army officer whom Syria claims was assassinated by the Iraqi government.

The officer, Col. Abdul Karim Mustafah Hasrat, was found dead in his Baghdad apartment Jan. 27. He had been a supporter of the Syrian wing of the Baath Socialist party. Feuding Baath factions rule the two nations.

Baghdad Radio said the soldier, Khudayer Alfahed, confessed that he got drunk in Hasrat's apartment and stabbed the officer to death.

At the United Nations, the United States called on Israel to respect the 1949 Geneva Convention in its treatment of inhabitants of Arab territories occupied by Israeli troops following the 1967 war.

News in brief Will tell

MONTREAL — (CP) — Mayor Jean Drapeau will tell Montrealers later this week whether he will resign.

Details of a live television broadcast to deliver the announcement are being worked out, he said Monday night.

Mr. Drapeau announced last Wednesday that Man and His World would not reopen this year and that he was thinking of resigning as mayor of Montreal.

Nixon plans

WASHINGTON — (CP-AP) — President Nixon plans to start a new diplomatic investigation later this month into the possibility of improving U.S. — Red China relations.

Nixon is considering proposing to the Chinese regime that, as a first step, the two countries relax travel and communications barriers somewhat. Easing of the U.S. embargo on trade with the Chinese mainland might eventually follow.

Hijack

MIAMI — (AP) — A knife-wielding Cuban hijacked a jet airliner with 93 persons to his native island Monday. But the passengers and crew of a second huge jet were spared a similar detour when their pilot decided a long-haired youth lacked the nerve to carry out his threat.

Ugly men

LONDON — (AP) — Britain's first model agency for ugly men has been opened.

"We advertised for ugly models in a London newspaper and the response was tremendous," said Robin Wight, a director of the new agency. "The trouble was, most of the applicants weren't ugly enough. Out of 1,000 we tested, we only signed on 100. Some of those who failed the ugly test were pretty disappointed."

Canada could sever relations

TOKYO (AP) — A Japanese government source said today Canada has indicated to Japan it would be prepared to sever diplomatic relations with Nationalist China in exchange for establishing similar ties with Communist China.

The sources who asked not to be identified, said Canada took this stand following reports that Peking would reject any offers of diplomatic relations if Can-

ada continued to maintain ties with Nationalist China.

Some officials here say the Canadian move, if followed through, could cause some embarrassment for Japan, which maintains diplomatic relations with Nationalist China but allows its businessmen to trade with Communist China.

They noted that Premier Eisaku Sato's government last week urged Nationalist China

not to act hastily and sever diplomatic ties with Canada or Italy if either formally established ties with Peking.

Prime Minister Trudeau said in the Commons Jan. 24 that Canada planned to enter consultations with the Peking government but until these talks had begun, "we do not want to take a position on the government" of Nationalist China.

The movie column

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — She is like a modern Juno, both in figure and style. She is Irene Papas, a living symbol of Greece, a country to which she dares not return.

The dark-eyed beauty is back in Hollywood after an absence of 12 years, this time playing a Greek-American in A Dream of Kings opposite the noted Zorba the Greek, Anthony Quinn, who is actually Mexican-Irish.

Irene Papas is Greek, no doubt about it. She has her countrymen's curious combination of ebullience and sadness, though she has more reason to be sad nowadays. The reason: Control of her native land by a military junta with which she disagrees.

Like Melina Mercouri, she has been outspoken in her opposition to the Greek regime. Unlike Mercouri, she has received no retaliation.

STILL HAS HOUSES

"I still have three or four houses in Greece, as well as 200 olive trees which will soon be producing oil," she said. "They have not been confiscated, unlike Melina's property. I figure that such a big fuss was raised over Melina that they do not want to risk more trouble."

"They try to win me over. Every six months I must renew my passport, and when I go to the consulate, they say to me, 'You are a patriot, Irene; please go to Greece and meet these people. You will like them.' And I reply, 'No doubt they are marvelous, but why don't they let the Greek people vote

for the government they want. Perhaps they even want a Fascist regime, but at least give them the chance to voice their opinion.'"

WON'T RETURN

So far the actress has resisted all invitations to return. She even declines to fly on Olympic Airlines owned by her friend Aristotle Onassis—"I actually know his wife better"—lest the flight be misdirected to Athens. She says she will not return to Greece until free elections are held.

Her return to Hollywood appears to have pleased, though not overjoyed her. Asked if she had been able to renew acquaintances with friends, she responded: "I have no friends."

After making an impression with her classic beauty and intense dramatic style in European plays and films, she came here for a contract at MGM. The timing was poor; the studio and the industry in general was entering a period of turmoil. Her one film was the ill-fated Tribute to a Bad Man.

"We went on location in Colorado, and then Spencer Tracy withdrew from the picture," she recalled. "He claimed it was because of the altitude—then he went and made The Mountain in the Alps. After he was replaced by James Cagney, another cast member, Robert Francis, was killed in an airplane crash."

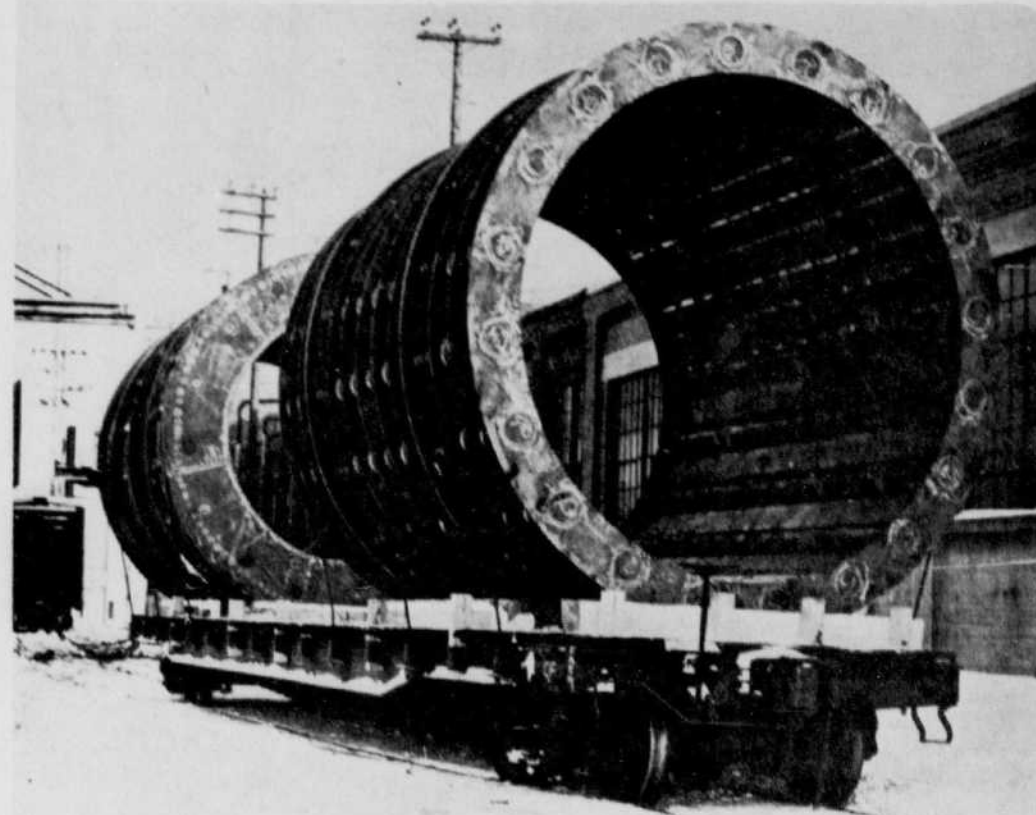

The report recommended and council approved that no parking be allowed on the west side of Wellington Street North until after 9:30 a.m. to allow trucks to park on that side of the street.

Judge postpones sentence to give youth a second chance

A nineteen-year-old youth before Mr. Justice William Mitchell yesterday after he had pleaded guilty to three serious charges and listened as he was given a new chance in life.

Michel Simard, of Ville St. Michel, had his sentence postponed until June 15, by Mr. Justice Mitchell to give him a chance to prove himself.

Simard had pleaded guilty to attempted armed robbery, complicity in attempted murder and wearing a disguise in the Dec. 4 attempted robbery of the Caisse Populaire of St. Adolphe du Sudwest.

Simard's attorney, Michel Lemieux, told Mr. Justice Mitchell before sentence was passed, that Simard was not a criminal and he had become involved with the wrong kind of people. He said Simard had superior grades in school and that a long sentence would not help him at all.

Mr. Lemieux asked that the youth be put in his father's custody after his sentence and that he be given a chance to prove himself.

Andre Langlais, crown counsel, agreed that Simard was not a criminal and he recommended that sentencing be postponed until June. He noted Simard had already spent three weeks in jail.

Mr. Justice Mitchell questioned the youth about his grades and told him that sentence would be passed on June 15.

Two other men, charged in the same case, Denis Gingras and Etienne Sarasin, sat at the back of the court listening to the proceedings.

After Simard's case had been heard, counsel representing the two men asked for a reduction of the \$8,000 property or \$4,000 cash bail. They were refused, because, Mr. Justice Mitchell said, he needed very serious reasons to reverse a magistrate's ruling.

Richard Blass and Robert Alard appeared in court yesterday, heavily guarded after hav-

ing been transported from Bord-deaux Jail in Montreal.

Blass and Alard, are charged in connection with the March 27 armed robbery of the St. Esprit Caisse Populaire in Sherbrooke, had their trials postponed until the next sitting of the Assizes.

Earlier in the day Andre Langlais, crown counsel, questioned English and French speaking jurors and excused eight of them for various reasons.

Yvon Lapointe, 37, of Ascot, was fined \$50 by Judge Benoit Turmel in Court of Sessions Thursday after he pleaded guilty to assault on his wife and his son, Raynald Frechette, representing Lapointe, told the judge that the accused had been drinking the night of the incident and his wife and son had verbally abused him.

He noted that Lapointe, father of five, and his wife were currently assessing their marriage and that the problem would be soon resolved one way or the other.

Normand Pomerleau, 21, of Stoke, was fined \$50 and ordered to post a \$500 bond to keep the peace for one year after pleading guilty to joyriding, by Judge Turmel.

Rene Lapierre, 27, of Sherbrooke, was fined \$100 and had his driver's licence suspended for six months, by Judge Turmel, after he pleaded guilty to impaired driving.

Careless youngsters play for high stakes

Monday's heavy snowfall, starting shortly before noon, brought about the recurrence of a form of "chicken," a game popular among certain thrill-seeking youngsters.

With the near-blinding snow storm cutting down visibility for the car drivers and making driving exceptionally hazardous, motorists turning from main thoroughfares into cross streets have to slow down to a crawl.

This seems to offer an opening for school children as they leave school or wait for a bus for the return journey to jump on the rear fenders for a short ride.

There were several instances Monday of children losing their grip because the car body was slippery and falling into the street in the face of oncoming traffic.

With motorists finding it almost impossible to effectively control their cars, especially in the hilly areas, it was only by a miracle that this silly game did not result in tragedy.

School authorities can only exercise supervision when these pranks take place around the school buildings, placing a responsibility on parents to warn their children about the deep risks involved by such thoughtless acts.

It is so easy to wreck a promising young life; and it is too late to cry when the deed can no longer be undone.

Cities which seem to have no climatological flaws or other drawbacks usually have very hep Chambers of Commerce.

Tax protest effective

Apparently an aroused public opinion, when directed to the proper quarters, can still have some effect on the thinking of governments.

At least this may be read into the announcement by Finance Minister Benson that important changes will be made in his estate tax amendments first published last fall.

After declaring for weeks that his proposals would stand and arguing that claims of possible injustice to heirs were exaggerated, Mr. Benson is tabling his legislation Thursday backed away and announced several important concessions.

Among other things, estates up to \$50,000 will not be taxed as compared with the \$20,000 exemption proposed in the original draft; gift taxes to children will be eased and estate taxes may be paid on instalments.

The Minister said that the Government is not backing down on its original proposals but rather the modifications reflect its response to representations — a rather thin difference.

Obviously he means that protests directed so vigorously to the cabinet and, of more importance, to the individual Liberal MP's showed the earlier changes contained too much in the way of political dynamite.

Thus if Canadians are prepared to act with vigor and determination, especially at the level of the local M.P., when they deem certain taxes unfair and unreasonable they might be able to make the Government reconsider its decisions.

And this is particularly the case when the ministers produce legislation that is unsound in the first place.

Lennoxville man responds to biblical letter of citizen

Dear Sir:

An article written by Mr. Frederick Dix from Lennoxville appeared in your Jan. 23 edition.

In this article Mr. Dix seems to imply and corroborate through scriptures and the sayings of some prominent men that God's word endorses that eternal torment after death is the lot reserved for the sinner.

God is being judged by his own words, seemingly approving the hell-fire doctrine, so if God is being judged then let us follow Paul's counsel and let God's own word come to his defense turning your Bible to Romans chapter 3: 34 this is what it reads: "For what if some did not believe? shall their unbelief make the faith of God without effect?"

"God forbid: yea let God be found true, but every man a liar, as it is written, That thou (God) mayest be justified in thy sayings and mightest overcome when thou art judged."

Referring to paragraph five of Mr. Dix's letter he quotes partially from John 3:36 to show that the anger of God would extend itself beyond the realm of death. Let us examine this scripture from the emphatic dialogue which contains the original greek text of what is called The New Testament, this is how it reads:

He believing into the son, has life age — lasting; he but disobeying the son, not shall see life, but the anger of God abides on him.

I am sure reasoning on this verse one can see that what is extended for obedience to the son is life and for disobedience — the anger of God remaining on him until his death, "not in a fiery hell".

In paragraph six of his letter Mr. Dix says that Hell is real where the souls of the wicked go after death to await judgment before the great white throne.

If according to Mr. Dix's letter paragraph four God's attributes are equally balanced and cannot conflict with each other, then paragraph six cannot be used to say that Hell is a place set aside by God to further His wrath on that person because if one has been judged to go to Hell according to Mr. Dix's version of Hell, that person has been judged so how can he await judgment before the great white throne.

In paragraph eight of his letter he quotes from Paul's letter to the Hebrews saying "it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God."

Hebrews 10: 31: again the falling into the hands of the living God cannot corroborate "Hell" as being a place of torment because Paul there is encouraging the Hebrew Christians to greater faith and he does not wish any to fall under God's wrath while they live, the next verse says (Heb. 10: 22).

But call to remembrance the



former days, in which, after ye were illuminated, ye endured a great fight of afflictions — and verse 39 says "But we are not of them who draw back unto perdition; but of them that believe to the saving of the soul". So the words of paragraph eight of Mr. Dix's letter quoting from Paul's words "that it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God" were to people alive, applied to those who would lack faith in the underserved kindness of God, therefore not to the dead was to be applied, but to the living.

In this same paragraph eight Hebrews 9:27 is used which reads "and as it is appointed unto men to die, but after this the judgment"; this being used by Mr. Dix to back up the Hell inferno as part of the judgment after death.

This is not letting God be found true, please turn your Bible to the record of John Chapter 5 verses 28, 29 it reads: "Wonder not at this because an hour comes in which all those in the tombs will hear his voice; and will come forth; Those having done good things to a resurrection of life; and those having done evil things to a resurrection of judgment" again the same rule of justice established by Mr. Dix in paragraph four of his letter.

Implied in Mr. Dix quotation of Heb. 9:27 that there is a judgment after death then why the need of a resurrection. In paragraph 11, Mr. Dix uses Luke 16:31 to back up statements made by prominent persons concerning their beliefs in torments after death, these statements made in paragraph nine and 10 of his letter. This is not letting God be found true.

Luke 16:31 reads: If they hear not Moses and the prophets neither will they be persuaded though one rose from the dead.

Although these men believed in torments after death, let's see what Moses says as he recorded as an accepted servant of God what happened to the greatest sinners in human history that is Satan, Eve and Adam.

The record is found at Genesis Chapter three starting at verse 15 "And I will put enmity between thee (Satan) and the woman (God's heavenly organization) and between thy seed (Satan's offspring) and her seed (Jesus Christ) it shall bruise you in the head (not condemned to fiery Hell) and thou shalt bruise his heel.

Verse 16: Unto the woman he said, I will greatly multiply thy sorrow and thy conception in sorrow thou shalt bring forth children; and thy desire shall be to thy husband, and he shall rule over thee. (No hell fire condemnation).

Verse 17: And unto Adam he

said, because thou hast hearkened unto the voice of thy wife, and hast eaten of the tree of which I commanded thee, saying, thou shalt not eat of it; cursed is the ground for thy sake. In sorrow shalt thou eat of it all the days of thy life.

Verse 18: Thorns also and thistles shall it bring forth to thee and thou shalt eat the herb of the field.

Verse 19: In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread, till thou return unto the ground (not fiery Hell) for out of it wast thou taken for dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return (not fiery Hell).

God's word at Ezekiel says Chapter 33: 11: "Say unto them, as I live, saith the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked; but that the wicked turn from his way and live; turn ye, turn ye, from your evil ways for why will you die, (not Hell fire torment but loss of life) O House of Israel.

Through the offering of his Dear Son Christ Jesus, extended to those who wish to accept God on the accurate knowledge of his word we can gain everlasting life on this earth, if Adam had not sinned he would not have died, neither would we today. The record that John gives us is good counsel for all of us, this at John 17:3.

And this is life eternal, that they might know thee the only true God and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent.

To know God and his son means studying God's word which does not support the Hell fire doctrine.

OTTAWA — (TNS) — One thing has not changed in the new year: We still do not have a foreign and defence policy.

The reassessment, announced by the Government last spring, is still under way behind closed doors of the Trudeau-appointed task forces and, apart from the announced intention to establish diplomatic relations with the Peking regime, we don't know what the results will be.

With the powder keg of the Middle East crisis wired for another explosion which, as President Nixon pointed out at his first press conference, could lead to a confrontation of the nuclear powers, this policy vacuum in Ottawa is inconceivable.

So is the spectacle of Cabinet ministers going around the country advocating diametrically opposed concepts of Canada's posture in the world.

The Prime Minister explains the contradictory statements on what Canada's international role should be (such as those made recently by Postmaster General Eric Kierans and Defence Minister Leo Cadieux) as expressions of personal views designed to stimulate a public debate of foreign and defence policies.

His assumption is that the clash of views, i.e., Cadieux' thesis and Kierans' antithesis, will lead to the emergence of a generally acceptable synthesis.

This Hegelian methodology which is the hallmark of Marxist dialectics, may have its place in academic philosophizing, but it is totally unsuitable for the determination of Government policy, especially in such a vital area as national security.

The requirements of national defence cannot be decided by the clash of possibly uniformed views.

A realistic defence posture depends on two basic factors: The military capability of the potential enemy and the likelihood of his use of that capability for furthering his political, ideological or national ambitions.

The first of these factors is not a matter of opinion and debate. Even allowing for marginal errors in intelligence estimates, there can be no doubt that the military capability

of potential enemy is quite impressive.

Western defence experts, including our own, tell us that the armed forces of the Soviet Union and its satellites are now larger, better trained and better equipped than at any time since the end of World War II.

Moreover, they continue growing at a rapid rate, and with new bases in central Europe, the Mediterranean, the Middle East and the Indian Ocean, they are now better placed for a surprise attack than ever before.

The second factor is, of course, open to speculation. But who among responsible Western statesmen can say that, after last year's Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia, the free world may safely contemplate the slightest weakening of its collective defence system?

I know of no one. In his address to the Rotary Club of Ottawa, Defence Minister Cadieux put it this way:

"The Soviet Union gave ample illustration of its position when it invaded Czechoslovakia last August. If we had any doubts before, we can have none now, that the Soviet Union will not hesitate to use force in the most blatant fashion to preserve what it considers to be its vital interests."

Quite apart from the tragedy of Czechoslovakia, there is ample documentary evidence that the men in the Kremlin regard expansion of the Soviet system until Communist world domination is achieved as their vital interest.

WORLD ALMANAC FACTS

Ramses II (1298-1235 B.C.) ruled Egypt longer, 63 years, and built more monuments than any other Pharaoh. The World Almanac says. His monuments were as numerous as his sons of which there were over 100. Ramses razed the monuments of some of his predecessors for building materials, but to those he liked he added his name. His temple, Abu Simbel, is fronted by four images of himself, each 67 feet high.

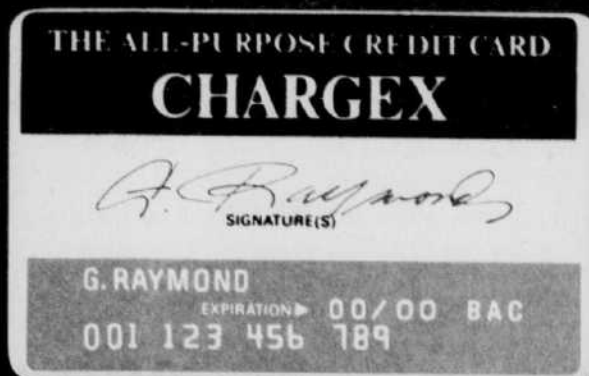

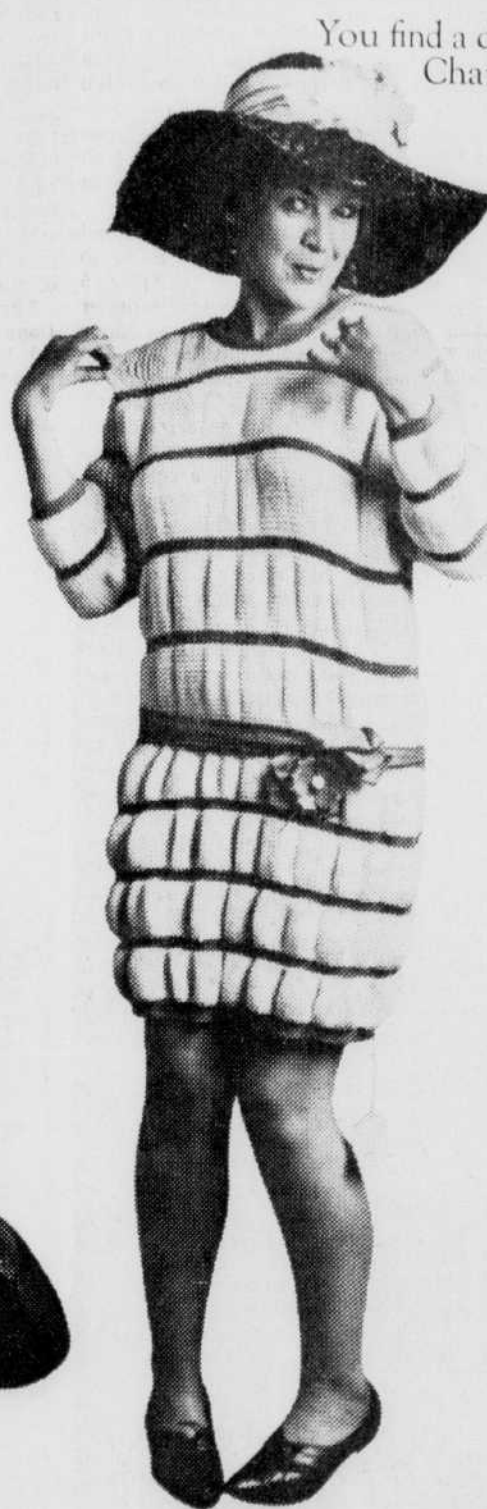

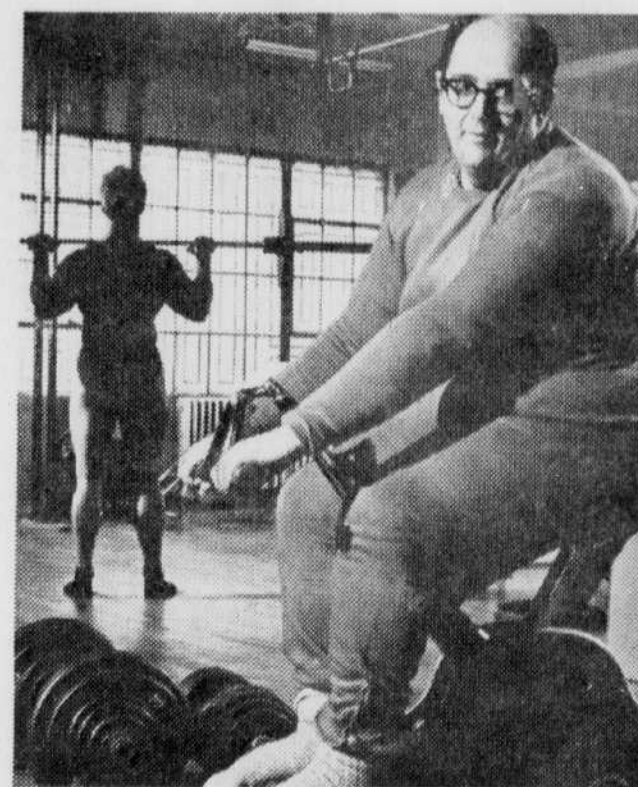

Top designers turn to off-the-rack boutiques

MONTREAL (CP) — Talented Canadian designers, following the trend in Paris and New York, are finding the haute couture business on the wane and turning to lower-price off-the-rack boutiques.

Many of the top names also are designing collections for ready-to-wear houses, several of which are gambling on Canadian names and Canadian designer labels. For a long time Canadians in the field, as in the other art forms, have had difficulty in receiving recognition at home until they win acclaim in the United States or abroad.

A pioneer in the field of designing for boutiques and Canadian ready-to-wear houses is John Warden. Born in Niagara Falls, Ont., he now lives in Montreal and has a French-Canadian wife, Lise. In 1966 he opened a boutique called Pour Homme which features his designs in men's clothing, and now designs Warden collections for two ready-to-wear firms in Montreal and Toronto.

The Auckie Sanft firm of

Montreal started it all, when they asked Warden to come up from New York where he was working then to design a small collection for Sanft. He did three for them before branching out with his own boutique.

Then the Croydon firm in Montreal asked him to do seasonal collections of rainwear and last year Hudson of Toronto retained him for a fall collection.

This marked the first time that an Ontario firm had given not only carte blanche to a Canadian designer but also label credit in the garments. Then Warden became the first Canadian to be approached by Eaton's for a label collection. And he is the only designer to have won two Canadian Cotton Council awards in one year.

Warden's rise to fame in his own country is, by Canadian standards, spectacular. At school in Niagara Falls he took to art enthusiastically and his first job, in his teens, was selling dresses and helping with displays in a Niagara Falls department store.

Urged on by customer interest, he made the big decision and took off for New York and a four-year course at the Parsons School of Fashion Design. He graduated as an honor student.

After a few months in Europe he returned to New York and worked for three couture houses and a Seventh Avenue ready-to-wear. It was at this point in his career that Auckie Sanft invited him to Montreal.

Warden is creative, with smart innovations in every new collection. This spring it is the turban with everything, "They're chic and practical," he explains. And he's introduced a triple-breasted coat and a double front-buckle belted look for coats and dresses.

TOKYO (Reuters) — Japanese wives no longer put up with husbands who flirt with geisha girls, spend housekeeping money on wild living and answer wifely complaints with a slap.

Love and marriage have changed in the land of geishas and cherry blossoms in the half-century since Japan's present prime minister, Eisaku Sato, and his wife were told to marry.

But Mrs. Hiroko Sato's story of an arranged childhood engagement and flowing tears after marriage caused no stir here when it appeared in a Japanese magazine over Christmas.

"If I were a modern girl of late, I might have run away from him or got a divorce," she said bluntly.

She told the interviewer, Shusaku Enno, a writer known for his humorous interviews with beautiful women, that the present premier had been slow about getting ahead, spent half his salary on pleasure and stayed out at night.

Teased by the interviewer about whether she was beaten, she said, "I was beaten so often."

The interview appeared in the 600,000-circulation weekly magazine Shukan Asahi, with a big smiling picture of Mrs. Sato.

Asked to comment on it, Japanese said they considered Mrs. Sato full of humor in her frankness.

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Bandits knew what they were after

MONTREAL (CP) — Four hooded bandits who "knew what they were after" hit a downtown Bank of Montreal branch in a lightning raid Monday and escaped with canvas bags estimated to contain more than \$100,000.

Police said the hooded intruders, armed with machine-guns, were in the branch for only "about 80 seconds."

They forced employees and customers to lie on the floor, went to a back room and grabbed the canvas bags which had been delivered moments earlier from the Forum, across Atwater Avenue from the bank branch in the Alexis Nihon Plaza.

Ignoring money in cashiers' drawers and an open vault, the bandits fled in a stolen car which police later found abandoned in suburban Westmount.

The bags contained box office and concession stand receipts from three weekend hockey games at the Forum which drew a total attendance of more than 52,000.

A reality

QUEBEC (CP) — The threat of rotating or spot strikes by Quebec teachers became a reality Monday when 362 teachers in five regions of the province walked out of their classrooms.

The walkouts—in Joliette, Rouyn, Amos, Sept-Îles and Matapédia—interrupted classes for an estimated 9,000 students.

It was not known when the walkouts in these areas would end, although the Quebec Teachers' Corporation, representing 60,000 teachers, said the strikes would close a few classes or a few schools each day without warning.

The corporation said this action could continue until the end of the school year.

More rotating strikes are to

take place later this week. The system or walkouts is aimed at applying pressure on the school boards and provincial government to agree to mediation in contract talks.

STRIKE CALLED ILLEGAL
The Quebec Federation of Catholic School Boards issued a statement Monday calling the strike action illegal.

Meanwhile, in Trois-Rivières, an estimated 4,500 of the area's 6,000 teachers rejected strike action.

The 8,000-member Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers has said it will not take part in the rotating strikes but has urged teachers not to apply for positions in the province next fall until contract negotiations have been settled.

tested in the courts. Premier John Robarts of Ontario said Monday "if there is any doubt it would probably be more satisfactory if its legality were tested."

Mr. Trudeau said he fears that this attitude would confirm the belief of some Quebecers that a bilingual country can't be built.

It would be "really retrogressing" if the premiers didn't allow progress even in this area.

This comment appeared to be linked with the "consensus" of last year's conference that French-speaking Canadians outside Quebec should have the same rights as English-speaking Canadians in Quebec.

The federal language bill is an attempt to implement this objective, at least in part.

SETS UP DISTRICTS

The bill would make English and French official languages in the federal administration and provide for bilingual districts where federal services would be supplied in both languages.

J. T. Thorson, former president of the Exchequer Court of Canada, last fall urged Mr. Trudeau to submit the bill to the Supreme Court, arguing that it would mean in effect an amendment to the British North America Act by Ottawa alone.

Both Mr. Trudeau and Justice Minister John Turner rejected the suggestion.

But on Monday they both appeared to hint that a court reference is a possibility.

Mr. Turner, in Edmonton on a tour to press the federal case for embodiment of language and other fundamental rights in the constitution, said Ottawa will take the language bill to the Supreme Court if necessary, although it believes the bill to be constitutional.

He also said he believed the bill "will not unduly disorder the life of anyone in Alberta."

"It will not affect Albertans very much, but it is extremely important in some parts of Canada."

WANTS NO ROADBLOCKS

Mr. Trudeau, meanwhile, told reporters he would be disturbed if anything intervened to prevent progress on the bill.

"I feel that it is very important now to make the French-Canadians feel that the federal government at least is serious when it talks about bilingualism."

If even this step cannot be taken, he said, "we might as well all go home and that's the end of the ball game."

In the Commons, however, Mr. Trudeau said consideration of the language bill will be deferred at the request of the provinces until after next week's conference, lasting from Monday until Wednesday.

Federal sources said Ottawa wants to proceed with implementation of the proposed bilingual districts, if necessary allowing individual provinces to come in on their own timing.

trial period for this measure.

The council-commissioned study of taxation relating to the arts was undertaken over a period of months by Montreal lawyer Philip Vineberg and two chartered accountants, Marcel Caron of Montreal and Michael Mackenzie of Toronto, both attached to the firm of Clarkson, Gordon and Co.

Mr. Caron and Mr. Vineberg are past presidents of the Canadian Tax Foundation.

Certain changes that they recommend in income-tax legislation would apply to everybody but be of particular benefit to people earning income in the arts, the council stated in a 32-page brief.

If a taxpayer were allowed to calculate his average income over a period of five consecutive years, or less, this "would be of great benefit to several categories of artists whose incomes fluctuate considerably from year to year."

The council follows the example of the 1967 royal commission report on taxation by Kenneth Carter, a Toronto accountant, in

recommending that taxpayers be allowed to average their incomes and also that employees be allowed to deduct expenses incurred for the purpose of earning income.

ENTITLED TO DEDUCT

Again, while the council says that all wage-earners should be permitted these deductible expenses, "it feels that artists, by the nature of their work, are particularly entitled to this treatment."

"More specifically, the part-time artist who suffers seriously from present tax legislation should be given the right to deduct all expenses involved in exercising his profession as an artist."

The council asks for exemptions from the federal sales tax on purchases made by qualified artistic and cultural organizations, on purchases of materials by individual artists for use in their work, and on sales of works of art by these artists.

It asks for exemptions from import duties for all works of art imported by Canadians and for all materials, supplies and equipment imported by Canadian artists or arts organizations for use in the arts.

WANTS MORE SUPPORT

Appealing for stepped-up private support of the arts, the council says the arts now account for only two per cent of corporate giving in Canada.

The "relatively small number" of wealthy individuals and firms now giving the maximum 10 per cent allowable for charitable purposes could give even more if the ceiling were raised, the council argues in its brief. These were the firms and individuals most likely to continue contributing to the arts.

Asserting that even a 20-per cent ceiling might not cover major single donations, such as an important art collection, the council suggests that donations over this ceiling in any one year be carried forward and allowed as deductions during the next five years.

A number of other recommendations are designed to encourage donation of works of art to museums and galleries serving the public, and to stimulate the commissioning or purchase of art by business firms.

In addition, the brief calls for amendments to federal and provincial succession duties and estate taxes to encourage bequests to the arts, and for removal of amusement taxes on artistic performances subsidized by federal, provincial or municipal governments.

Many complaints

MONTREAL (CP) — A Quebec Rental Board official says his office received 38,000 complaints last month from tenants who said their rent was increased following a city decision to raise property taxes by 23 per cent.

Marcel Lamoureux, administrator of the board's Montreal district branch, Monday predicted that the number of court cases involving rents in 1969 will more than double to 15,000 from last year's 7,000 cases. Rent increases vary from \$10 to \$25 a month, he said, but in one case, a landlord told his tenant he was raising the rent to \$240 a month from \$120.

"The main reason that has been given tenants is the increase in taxes. The 23-per cent tax hike hasn't been specifically blamed, but landlords will have to justify their decision in court."

Mr. Lamoureux said he expects even more complaints this month since many notices of rent increase were mailed late in January.

FORT CHIMO, Que. (CP) — Provincial police in this northern-most detachment near Ungava Bay will leave by motorized sled to rescue seven stranded Eskimo hunters, it was learned Monday.

The seven hunters left Jan. 4 with two week's supplies and were reported missing by their families Sunday.

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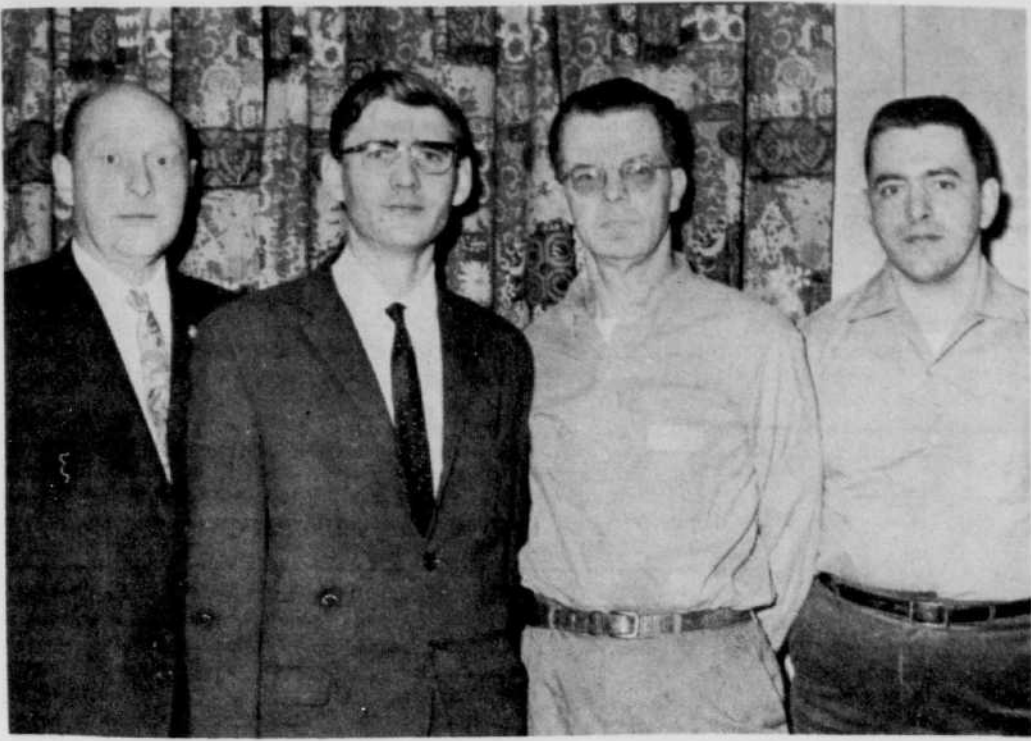

The Russian National hockey team was at the Sports Palace last evening and gave a demonstration why they are the World Amateur hockey champions and are rated strongly to repeat in March at the World Hockey championships in Stockholm, Sweden.

As was expected they ran away to post a 14-4 score over the reinforced Sherbrooke Beavers but the majority of the

4,465 fans were on hand to witness the Russians in action and the outcome was only secondary. Local fans knew the outcome before the game.

The Russians put on a top-performance in passing, shooting and skating and at no time were they in trouble. The Beavers went in spurts while their opposition turned it on at the start and kept skating until the end of the game.

Sports Palace. Ragulin, veteran defenseman and Lutchekko, (3), chased Cartier but didn't catch up with him in time.

Nine of the Russian players here last evening played against the Sherbrooke Beavers in Moscow three years ago but they are a much improved crew since then.

The passing and positional play was a treat to watch. Once they secured possession of the puck there was always a player or two away on the fly and immediately they would get the puck from the defense. They covered their positions well while some of the Beavers wandered away from their spots and they couldn't catch up with them.

Another big factor the Russians have learned and that is to shoot. They would pass the puck around in the attacking zone but once there was an

opening the shot was on target with a player around waiting for the rebound. Several of the players have adopted the slap-shot and have good ones.

The Russians fired a grand total of 48 shots at the Gagnon-Rexie duo while the best the Beavers could do was get 17 away at Konovalenko and Zinger. Which proves the only way to score goals is to shoot at the goalie.

Time after time some of the local players would try to break through the defense, which was impossible, but still Bill Dupre kept trying and each time he tried to slip the puck through the defenseman's legs he lost possession. They were too smart to try and outplay them in that manner.

Boris Mikailov and Vladimir Petrov tallied hat-tricks in the tilt while Vladimir Vikulov picked up two with singles going to Alexander Yakushev, Boris Maroyov, Vlachoshev, Starchinov, Anatoly Firsov, Alexander Maltsev and Yerveny Paladiev notched the others.

For the Beavers Rene Pepin, Yvon Lacoste, Gaston Bouchard and Gilles Cartier were the marksman. Gilles Cartier set up Bouchard's marker when he outplayed the defense and made a perfect pass for the tally.

Andre Gagnon gave up six goals for his thirty minutes of work while the Nationals' Steve Rexie had eight get by him. The two goalies, despite the score, came up with some key saves as they were left alone several times at the

mercy of the high-flying red-sweatered gang.

Rexie once came out to clear the puck figuring that Coach Poliquin was going to toss on another player but things happened quickly and he was forced to go back and in doing so made two quick saves. He blocked several tough shots in the final frame as the Russians were going all out to run up the score.

Luc Tessier played a strong game for the Beavers on defense to prove once again he must be considered a strong contender for a post on the league's All-Star team. Claude Houde from Granby and Lionel Robidas both came up with good efforts.

Coach Lou Poliquin worked with several different duos up front in an effort to try and achieve something but it all

failed. No doubt the local pilot and players must have learned something from the game which can be a help in their league battle.

It was the Russians' final game of their extended tour and some of the players were beginning to feel the effects of the long trips across Canada. They leave this afternoon from Dorval for Moscow and home.

The Russians have proven to all that conditioning is a very important factor in hockey. At no time last evening were they straining and each time they completed their trips on the

ice at full speed without a let-up.

They stayed with them in the first period but then the conditioning began to tell and in the last two frames it was impossible to stay with them. The Russians practice hockey eight months of the year and the other few they play soccer which is part of their training. The majority of the players with the team this time are students and some of them won't play in the World Hockey championships, stated Coach A. Tchernishov, head coach, after the game.

Poliquin hopes defeat won't spoil team's winning streak

Lou Poliquin, coach of the Sherbrooke Beavers, refused to comment on the Russian 14-4 romp over his sparsely reinforced lineup last night at the Sports Palace but said he hoped the loss would not affect Sherbrooke's chances of winning a playoff berth in the Quebec Provincial Senior Hockey League.

Sherbrooke Beavers tonight play host to the St. Hyacinthe Gauls at 8:30 p.m. at the Sports Palace, weather permitting.

Going into tonight's game the Beavers are tied for fourth place with the St. Hyacinthe Gauls and two points behind third placed Granby Vics.

Even though last night's game was an exhibition match, Coach Poliquin hinted after the game that he hoped the loss would not hinder the current Beavers' winning streak.

St. Hyacinthe Gauls, he said, have been resting for the last week and the Beavers must be ready if they hope to win. The hassle involving St. Hyacinthe could well spark the Gauls while the Russians might have worn down the edge on Sherbrooke's play.

Bernard Brodeur, public relations officer for the Granby Vics, announced last night that Jean-Paul Gladu, Vics' mentor, has been released by the team.

Gilles Cartier will take over the coaching of the club while at the same time will continue to play as well. Bedard previously ran the club on three occasions this season, winning two and losing one game.

Granby are still awaiting word on the suspension of Roger Belisle who was ejected from a game, one week ago Sunday, for striking a game official. Granby is in third place, two points ahead of the Beavers and Gauls. The Vics have 13 games remaining to play.

Commenting after the game, the Russians made it clear that at no time would they approach the NHL. The world amateur

hockey champions made it clear that they expect the National Hockey League to come to them.

Hockey has existed in Russia for the past 23 years and rates as the country's second sport—soccer is the most prominent Russian sport.

Coach Arkady Tchernishov said he would like to meet stronger opposition, not mentioning the NHL by name. "To find the true value of the Russian Nationals".

The Russians played 10 games in Canada, winning them all, nine against the Canadian National team and one against the Beavers. In the ten games Russia scored 73 goals and were scored upon 28 times, averaging a remarkable 7.3 goals per game.

The Russians leave today on their return trip home.

Injuries may hurt Bruins long undefeated streak

A growing casualty list has put Boston Bruins' lengthy undefeated streak in jeopardy.

The Bruins, in first place in the Eastern Division of the National Hockey League despite suffering numerous injuries this season, added two more casualties Monday.

It was announced that the Bruins will play at Chicago Wednesday and at St. Louis Thursday without all-star defenseman Bobby Orr and right winger Johnny McKenzie.

Orr is suffering from a slight strain in the left knee, which was operated on last June. He missed his first game of the season Sunday when the Bruins stretched their unbeaten streak to 17 games with a 4-2 victory over Detroit Red Wings.

McKenzie is suffering from "strained knee ligaments" and has a cast on his leg. The stocky forward was injured Sunday when he collided with team-mate Johnny Bucyk during the third period of the Detroit game.

Orr and McKenzie joined wingers Ron Murphy, Eddie Shack and Tom Williams on the sidelines for Boston.

CLOSE TO RECORD
The injuries come at a time when the Bruins are zeroing in on a NHL record for the longest undefeated string. That mark of 23 games was set by the 1940-41 Boston team.

Ahearne tells it like it is Canucks need conditioning

OTTAWA (CP) — John (Bunny) Ahearne, the outspoken European director of the International Hockey Federation, had a few things to say Monday about Canadian hockey.

"You haven't learned anything, have you?" the 68-year-old Ahearne said in an interview.

He was referring to Canada getting clobbered at its own national game for seven straight years and not being open-minded enough to learn from its former pupils.

Ahearne, in Canada on a five-day visit, says he feels Canada is going through the hard-headedness that Britain went through when other countries started beating her at soccer.

BRITISH CHANGED STYLE

Until the British realized they had to re-adapt their style of play and be in good physical condition they were getting beaten by teams from other countries at the game they invented. When they saw the light, they won the World Cup.

This doesn't mean he feels better physical conditioning is the secret for beating the Rus-

sians at hockey. For moments later he said athletes can be "over-conditioned."

He disagrees with the whole concept of concentrating on one national team.

"You're giving them (our international players) their spurs before they earn them," he says.

What Canada should have is something like the pre-war situation, where there are several top-calibre non-professional teams competing against one another.

One or two of these teams could even compete in an international league, which would include clubs from Russia and European countries. Canada's national team would be picked from the best of these teams.

PLAYERS AVAILABLE

Canada would have no trouble getting players the calibre of the Russians to play in this league, because "you have something like 250,000 hockey players, and only a few of them are going to the NHL each year."

Ahearne's point is that the international team would end up

as a better unit because the young men who played for it would fight their way to the world tournament. Since the government owns Air Canada, it could transport the teams back and forth for national competition.

Some other points he made: The centre red line should be removed to encourage stick-handling; the Russians would finish in the playoffs in the NHL; Canadians are wasting their time trying to forecheck against the Russians—they have to come down the ice to score anyway, so why not wait for them?

Ahearne said the Russians have never applied to his International Ice Hockey Federation to play against the NHL.

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Bruins' Esposito making run for NHL scoring championship

MONTREAL (CP) — Phil Esposito, Boston Bruins high-scoring centre, is making a spirited run this season to win the National Hockey League's individual scoring race and in the process stands a good chance to shatter a team record — one he set himself last season.

Esposito currently is seven points away from an all-time Boston scoring record. He set the mark with 35 goals and 49 assists for 84 points.

Statistics released by the NHL Monday show Esposito still atop this season's race with an increased margin of nine points. In 49 games this season Esposito has counted 32 goals and assisted on 46 others for 78 points.

Bobby Hull of Chicago Black Hawks is second with 69 points, including 32 goals, which ties him with Esposito for the lead in that department.

Stan Mikita of Chicago took over third place with 66 points, including a league-leading 47 as-

sists, while Gordie Howe of Detroit Red Wings slipped to fourth place with 65 points.

The scoring title has been the sole property of Mikita and Hull since 1964, with Mikita winning it four out of the five years since that date.

HEADING FOR RECORD

Howe and his linemates, left winger Frank Mahovlich and centre Alex Delvecchio, however, are going at a pace which, if continued, will give them a record number of points for a line and also a record for most goals by a line.

The trio now has 164 points and 73 goals, an average of 3.2 points a game and 1.4 goals per game.

Projected over the remaining 25 games, this would give the three a total 243 points and 114 goals. The point record was set by Howe, Norm Ullman and Ted Lindsay of Detroit in 1956-57 when the three collected a

total of 226 points. Ullman now is with Toronto Maple Leafs and Lindsay has retired.

The record for most goals by a line is 105, established in 1944-45 by Montreal Canadiens Punch Line of Maurice Richard, 50 goals, Toe Blake, 29 goals, and Elmer Lach, 26 goals, during a 50-game schedule.

Clustered behind Howe in this season's race are Montreal's Jean Beliveau with 60 points and fifth place, and Red Berenson of St. Louis Blues with 56.

Montreal's Yvan Cournoyer, Ken Hodge of Boston and Detroit's Delvecchio all have 54, while Jim Pappin of Chicago has 52. Ullman and Chicago's Dennis Hull each have 51.

WIN DEFENCE INTEREST

While scoring records are threatened in nearly all categories, St. Louis goaltenders Jacques Plante and Glenn Hall are generating defensive interest.

Hall recorded his sixth shut-out last week, most in the

league, and combined with Plante's five, give the pair 11. This total is the best by a team since 1955-56 when Hall had 12 while with Detroit.

Their combined average in the goals-against department is nearly half a goal a game better than that of runner-up Ed Giacomin of New York Rangers.

Buster Mathis gets nod after slugfest over George Chuvalo

NEW YORK (CP) — There was no love lost between George Chuvalo and Buster Mathis during or after their 12-round heavyweight slugfest at Madison Square Garden Monday night.

Mathis got the better of the rugged battle, cutting the Canadian heavyweight champion over both eyes, on the mouth and on the right cheek on the way to a unanimous decision.

Chuvalo opened the fight by rushing at Mathis and hitting the massive 232-pound fighter

with a left hook as the first round opened.

The veteran Toronto fighter later connected with a low left hook in the same round. As the referee warned Chuvalo, Mathis grabbed the official and angrily pushed him out of the way to get at Chuvalo. Mathis then landed a low left of his own.

After the fight, Chuvalo charged Mathis with butting him while the Grand Rapids, Mich., fighter was angry over low blows by Chuvalo.

COMPLAINS ABOUT BUTTS

"I fought a very bad fight," Chuvalo said after the fight in his dressing room, "but I didn't get too many breaks from the butting that was going on."

"I would definitely like to fight him again," Chuvalo said. Chuvalo is rated fourth by Ring magazine and eighth by the World Boxing Association. Mathis is ranked eighth by the WBA and is not ranked by Ring.

Mathis was enraged at the low blows in the opening round. "He hit me low and said 'I'm sorry,'" Mathis said later. "I was hurt and I told the referee, 'Let me hit him low and tell him that.'"

Mathis knelt in prayer as the decision was announced. "I said a prayer for George," said Buster in his dressing room. "I'd hate to be in his room now. I know how it is. I've been in that situation."

There were no knockdowns in the 12 rounds. In a co-featured 10-rounder, Emile Griffith, former world middleweight and welterweight champion, won a unanimous decision over Andy Heilman of Fargo, N.D., an 11th-hour replacement for Doyle Baird of Akron, Ohio who was injured in training.

LOSSES BIG ONE
The battle was a big fight for the 31-year-old Chuvalo who was on a six-fight winning streak after a fourth-round technical knockout at the hands of Joe Frazier in July, 1967.

A victory would have given him a fight with Jerry Quarry in the garden March 10. Instead the fight will go to Mathis.

Despite the defeat, Irving Ungerman, Chuvalo's manager, said after the fight he still has some offers that the Canadian battler could accept.

"We have offers to fight Sonny Liston, Billy Walker of England and Bob Cleroux of Montreal, but I'm going to let George have a rest and then decide for himself what he wants."

Chuvalo's personal doctor, Dr. Joe Greenberg of Toronto, said Chuvalo was not seriously injured in the fight. The battered right cheek was the same one that was broken in the fight with Frazier. Dr. Greenberg operated on Chuvalo after that fight.

The rugged first round set the pace for the fight, with Chuvalo, who weighed 208, pressing throughout against his larger opponent and Mathis catching the Canadian fighter coming in with left hooks and left uppercuts.

CAME AFTER MATHIS

Chuvalo came at the massive Mathis throughout the fight and staggered him with left hooks at least three times.

Chuvalo had trouble holding the big man in the corner when he tried to work him to the body. Chuvalo said after the fight Mathis's elusiveness was due more to his size than to his boxing ability.

Chuvalo started to bleed over the right eye at the last part of the second round. His mouth and forehead above his left eye were cut later on. After the 11th round Dr. Edwin Campbell of the New York State Athletic Commission checked Chuvalo's right eye but decided to let the fight go on.

Mathis's nose bled several times after the third round but the injury did not appear serious.

Jealousies between baseball league making it tough job to find a new commissioner

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Baseball owners will try again today to pick a new commissioner but the prospects of an election are not considered bright because of the jealousies between the two major leagues.

Charles Feeney, vice-president of San Francisco Giants, has been the National League choice since the leagues met in December at Chicago.

Mike Burke, president of New York Yankees who withdrew in Chicago after some early ballots, apparently is back in the running again as an American League candidate.

Unless the two leagues can get together on a change in the rules, it is not likely that a successor to William D. Eckert will be named at this time. Eckert resigned under pressure at the annual baseball meetings in San Francisco in December but is serving until his successor is picked.

Under the rules, a commissioner must get a 75-per-cent vote—nine out of 12—in each league.

BASEBALL MAN FAVORED

Although most of the owners

who spoke out in San Francisco favored a baseball man for the job, the failure to elect one of their own at this Florida meeting may well send them searching for an outside figure of stature. That was what happened last time when they came up with Eckert, a retired air force general.

Among the candidates who received votes at the December meeting were Feeney, Burke, Lee MacPhail, vice-president of the Yankees; Joe Cronin, president of the American League; Judge Robert Cannon of Milwaukee, former counsel for the players; Supreme Court Justice Byron Whizzer White; Bob Reynolds, president of California Angels; Gabe Paul, president of Cleveland Indians and Frank Cashen, executive vice-president of Baltimore Orioles.

John McHale, president of Montreal Expos, received 15 votes at Chicago before he withdrew. In answer to pressure to reconsider, he wrote all the owners Jan. 30 eliminating himself as a candidate because of his financial connections with the Expos.
