E. T. AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION. ANNUAL MEETING HELD TO-DAY.

N. T. Dussault Was Elected President and Alex. Ames Vice-President.

The annual general meeting of the shareholders of the Eastern Townships Agricultural Association was held this forenoon in the Council Chamber. There was a very good attendance. Mr. N. T. Dussault, president, presided. After the reading of the minutes of the last meeting the secretary,

Mr. W. M. Tomlinson then read the eighteenth annual report of the directors. He said Gentlemen:—Your Directors have again the pleasure of informing you that in spite of adverse circumstances, the past Exhibition, both in exhibiting and attendance surpassed all previous years.

The uncertainty about the Government Grant made the holding of an Exhibition doubtful until late in the season, and the weather during Fair week, with the exception on Wednesday, was very unsettled. The total paid admissions, however, were 30,448 against 29,623 last year and all departments were well filled.

The evening performances seem to be growing in popularity with our visitors, the total receipts being \$1,842.25, an increase over \$352.25.

It was fully expected that arrangements would have been made to raise a certain sum of money for the purpose of erecting new buildings, by means of an issue of debenture bonds, and on March 10th, a special meeting of the shareholders was called to approve this scheme but the Exhibition Bill, as it passed the House, was utterly valueless to this Association, consequently the same problem of providing means for absolutely necessary buildings will have to be faced by the new Board Directors.

The Quebec Government grant was reduced to \$3,000, but the City of Sherbrooke increased their Annual grant from \$1,000 to \$2,000. Special mention must be made of the Dairy Exhibit. The generous prizes offered by the Eastern Townships Bank, attracted one of the largest and best exhibits of butter and cheese ever seen in Canada, not only from this Province, but also from Ontario and New Brunswick, the first

Farmers sons was also inaugurated this year, and for a first attempt was a decided success. In order to protect Exhibitors in the Main Building a large portion of the roof had to be re-shingled, and the growing needs of the Poultry Department were recognized by the addition of a temporary building increasing the accommodation by 200 coops. A large amount had also to be spent on temporary stabling for horses and cattle, which would have been avoided, if it had been possible to erect new buildings as intended.

The second Bench Show was a slight improvement over last year's, from attendance and entry fees being \$226.00 and the expenses including prizes, wages, etc., \$202.25. It is to be hoped that a fresh impetus may be given to this department by the recently formed Kennel Club.

Turning to Exhibition account, the total receipts were \$23,595.65 or \$351.95 less than 1901, which considering the decrease in the Government grant and the uncertain weather must be considered very satisfactory.

Gates and Turnstiles show an increase of \$234.00 and Grand Stand \$449.21. The number of Grand Stand reserved seats were again increased and the returns amounted to \$1,100.25 compared with \$818.55 last year. Entry Fees are \$31.05 larger and Privileges \$323.58. As before stated the grant from the Quebec Government was reduced to \$3,000 and the City of Sherbrooke giving the same amount as last year, but whereas last year the \$1,000 additional had to be expended on permanent improvements, this year it was given unconditionally.

The amount received for special prizes, including the \$500.00 from the Eastern Townships Bank was \$1,209.59 more than last year. The Local Society net grant was \$281, an increase of \$75 but the returns from the Parcels Office were \$120 less.

Smith, The Massey Harris Co., The Creamery Package Co., The Merchants and Hotel Keepers of Sherbrooke and others for the grants and special prizes, and to the Directors of the Local Society for their valuable aid during Exhibition week.

Advocates Reform in Civic Administration.

Toronto, January 12.—Mayor Uquhart's inaugural address this morning advocated many reforms in the administration. He would give the Board of Control still larger powers, making it the supreme executive head of the new council, the function of the council to be purely legislative, and thus abolish all the standing committees. He advocates taking strong measures against the Street Railway Company in an effort to make it live up to its agreement with the city, also to acquire the works of the gas company, to secure more parks and playgrounds in the city. It asks the city to cooperate with the exhibition board to secure an all-Canada exhibition for Toronto this season. He also advocates allowing every facility to every railway to enter the city. He would allow the electors to intervene in the administration of affairs if they consider the interests of the city are being sacrificed.

HELD FOR GRAND JURY.

Miss Richardson, Accused of Poisoning, Remanded.

BAIL FIXED AT \$5,000.

Chelsea, Jan. 12.—In the Chelsea district court today, Judge Bosson announced that he had decided to hold Miss Katherine V. Richardson, charged with attempting to murder her mother-in-law, at Revere, for the February grand jury. The amount of bail was placed at \$5,000, the same fixed at the time of the defendant's arrest.

Shortly after the delivery of the judge's opinion on the case, Wm. L. Woodard and Harry H. Richardson qualified as bondsmen for Miss Richardson and she continued at liberty.

While Judge Bosson was giving his decision the defendant appeared ill at ease, but when the decision was made known, she laughed and chatted freely with a number who sat in a seat among the spectators.

In giving his decision, Judge Bosson said he was satisfied if the evidence given by the prosecution in itself was sufficient to cause the belief that a crime was committed, the evidence of the defence was not to be taken into account to any extent. The facts on which the finding was arrived at were as follows:

Mrs. Dr. Kenney found Mrs. Richardson ill and diagnosed the case as one of arsenical poisoning. Later after the doctor had seen Miss Richardson give Mrs. Richardson tablets, the older woman had another ill turn, and the doctor diagnosed this also as arsenical poisoning. The finding of arsenic concealed with bromide on Miss Richardson's person when arrested, or partially confirmed, the doctor's diagnosis. The evidence presented by the experts was conflicting and the court would not pass on that point.

In view of all these facts the court is convinced that a crime has been committed and that reasonable cause has been shown why the case should be passed upon by a jury.

As order was read direct in Miss Richardson to furnish surety in \$5,000 for her appearance before the Suffolk county grand jury which will meet on the first Monday in February.

CORRESPONDENCE.

To the Editor of THE EXAMINER.

Sir:—In view of the persistent misrepresentation of our charges for electric light, and noting the item "Give us Information" in yesterday's issue of the Record, I am directed to make as public as possible what our rates really are, and take the liberty of giving same as stated below.

As regards the comparative costs of operating steam and water power plants, the best authorities do not find the difference to be as great as commonly supposed, especially when coal can be had by water transportation, and where the meter rate is made compulsory, as in the case of the two towns quoted below.

SHERBROOKE RATES. This Company has three forms of rates, viz: The Meter rate, the Maximum Demand Rate and the Open Flat Rate; the last mentioned being the least patronized and used. It has not been repealed because some of our clients still desire it, and customers are perfectly free to take whichever plan they desire.

METER RATE. (Domestic and Commercial). Ten cents per K.W. hour net and meter rent \$3.00 per year, with free renewal of lamps, the only restriction regarding meter is that a meter will not be put in for an installation of less than six lamps. Other places this limit is placed at from 10 to 25 lamps.

MAXIMUM DEMAND FLAT RATE. 50 cents per month for a maximum demand of one 16 c.p. lamp, regardless of lamps in installation. 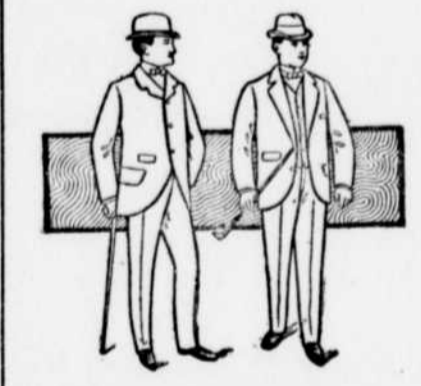

Gentlemen,—I believe it is my duty at this hour to define my position in connection with the present contest. It was with reluctance, I must admit, that I consented to be put in nomination and I now state that had it not been for the great principle of the Electric Light and Power in which principle I am a strong believer, I would not be today a candidate for municipal honours.

On general matters, I have had entire confidence in Mr. Jenckes, but on this important question he is, despite his semi-denial, an adversary of the project. He voted against the purchase of the Westbury Power and he admits that. He voted against demand being made to the Legislature for special power to enable our City to carry out this great project. He stated in a letter to the Record (January 8, 1908) he would have favoured the appointment of a Committee to wait upon the Company and ascertain if they would furnish the citizens with light at lower than existing rates and he concluded his letter by saying: 'If this question of cheaper light is taken up in the proper way, I believe that something can be accomplished.'

It seems to me that it would have been of the greatest importance had Councilors endeavoured to obtain a date, estimates, &c., and what was likely to be accomplished. Evidently he has strong reasons to abstain from making such declarations.

Now it would also be very interesting to know why councillor Jenckes is so hesitating, and why he is obtaining dates, estimates, &c., and that he, Mr. S. W. Jenckes, as a citizen is, or at least was, ready a few days ago in company with another citizen who was also at the same time councillor, sufficiently informed upon this great question to make an offer to the Company for its plant, the same as they show beyond any doubt, that Mr. Jenckes in his capacity of councillor spared no effort, though detrimental to the City as it was, to keep the way perfectly clear in favour of Mr. S. W. Jenckes as a speculator. Gentlemen, let me state here, that if I am a candidate today, it is to protest against this policy of delay on the one side and the policy of speculation on the other, and that by a man whose oath of office made it a duty to defend only those of the citizens.

I may furthermore state that no efforts were spared on our part to avoid this contest. We went so far in that direction so as to delegate men of high standing, and let me name them right here, as every thing is perfectly honourable about this, it was Mr. J. P. Royer and Mr. L. E. Paneston,—to wait upon Mr. Jenckes with a view to ascertain his opinions in the matter, and to state on our behalf that the contest would be avoided if he would pledge himself to the effect that he would favour the purchase of the existing Electric Plant by way of mutual agreement, or failing so to do, to resort to arbitration; and, in the event of the refusal on the part of the Company to proceed to the establishment of our own plant by utilizing the Basin Power. This manly and honourable position was met with an absolute refusal on the part of Mr. Jenckes.

We therefore felt it was our imperative duty in order to protect the interests of our citizens, to stand as a candidate in favour of municipal ownership.

Now, Gentlemen, if I voice the sentiment of our citizens in this matter, allow me to ask you for your free and honest support. And if I am elected, I should do all in my power to render myself worthy of your confidence.

The Prosperous Farmer.

The farmers of Canada are enjoying a period of prosperity. Not only are they growing more grain and cattle, producing more butter, cheese and bacon, but they have had a good market for their products. The good times, the greater volume of trade and the sound conditions of business generally are chiefly due to the fact that the farmers are making money. This fact was emphasized the other day by the Hon. S. A. Fisher in a speech at Guelph. He said in part: 'In this Dominion agricultural interests are paramount; they supply the greater bulk of our exports. It is the payment for these exports, with which we pay our bills all over the world. It is our agricultural production which supplies the great bulk of the things which our transportation companies carry, which our mercantile agencies have to handle, and by which our people have to make their living. As long as this is the case, it is well that our people should be generous and wise in their expenditure in the interests of this great country. I am disposed to urge our farmers to produce more and more, because our exports in the last year or two has been the only limit to our sales has been our own capacity for production, and the more rapidly and the more earnestly we can increase that capacity the greater will be the prosperity, not only of agriculture, but of our whole Dominion.'
