300 persons pass by as youth is assaulted

It would seem passersby of our great metropolis can display about as little concern over the plight of a citizen as in other big cities.

There was that classic case of a woman stabbed to death in New York in full view of nearby residents who didn't intervene, a few years ago.

Well, this incident occurred Saturday night, just after the hockey game at the Forum, on the Metro level of the adjoining Alexis Nihon Plaza.

Patrick Nolan, 19, a student who lives at 15 Gladstone avenue, Westmount, was returning home.

While, by his estimate, some 300 persons passed by with apparent unconcern, four "cleancut" decently dressed men worked over young Nolan ostensibly be-

cause they didn't like the longish style of his hair.

One of the four attackers allegedly was armed with a razor blade, Nolan later told Westmount Police who investigated.

Missing in December, local girl is found

A 17-year-old Westmount girl, missing from her home here since December, was found over the weekend in East End Montreal.

License lifted:

Hit-run penalty is \$75

It cost Stone Contractor Louis St. Denis, a resident of the Chateau Maisonneuve, de Maisonneuve boulevard west at Claremont avenue, \$75 and costs or 15 days in prison and loss of his driver's permit for three months for an early-morning hit-and-run accident Jan. 19 outside the "4300". He chose the fine.

The 67-year-old St. Denis, unrepresented by counsel, pleaded guilty Tuesday evening in Westmount Municipal Court when he appeared before Judge A. McT. Stalker.

He accompanied his plea with an explanation that he "remembered nothing" about the collision of his large Lincoln at 1:18 am with another expensive car parked outside 4300 de Maisonneuve boulevard, until he was told about it by police who intercepted him minutes later in the garageway of his own apartment house.

According to Westmount Police, after the crash which did considerable damage to both vehicles, he backed up and drove away with his headlights smashed and not illuminated. When apprehended it was found that he was injured and was taken to hospital for treatment of a broken nose, presumed suffered in the crash.

No insurance

Questioned by the court, he said that he had no insurance on his vehicle. However he refuted the claim of the owner of the other car, General Contractor Isidore H. Morrell, 7915 Cote St. Luc road, that he had inflicted some \$2,900 damage. His own experts, he said, put the figure at \$1,653, and he had offered to make settlement.

Judge Stalker stopped short discussion of the damages, remarking that these were a civil matter; the local court was concerned with the criminal charge of leaving the scene of an accident.

St. Louis denied any previous convictions.

In passing sentence, the magistrate took into account that this was accused's first offence, that he was attempting to make restitution, that he had suffered injury, and concurred in Prosecutor Kelvin J. MacDougall's recommendation of a \$75 fine, to which he added the three-month license suspension.

After sentence and St. Louis' departure from the courtroom, Morrell approached the bar and protested, using the word "tra-

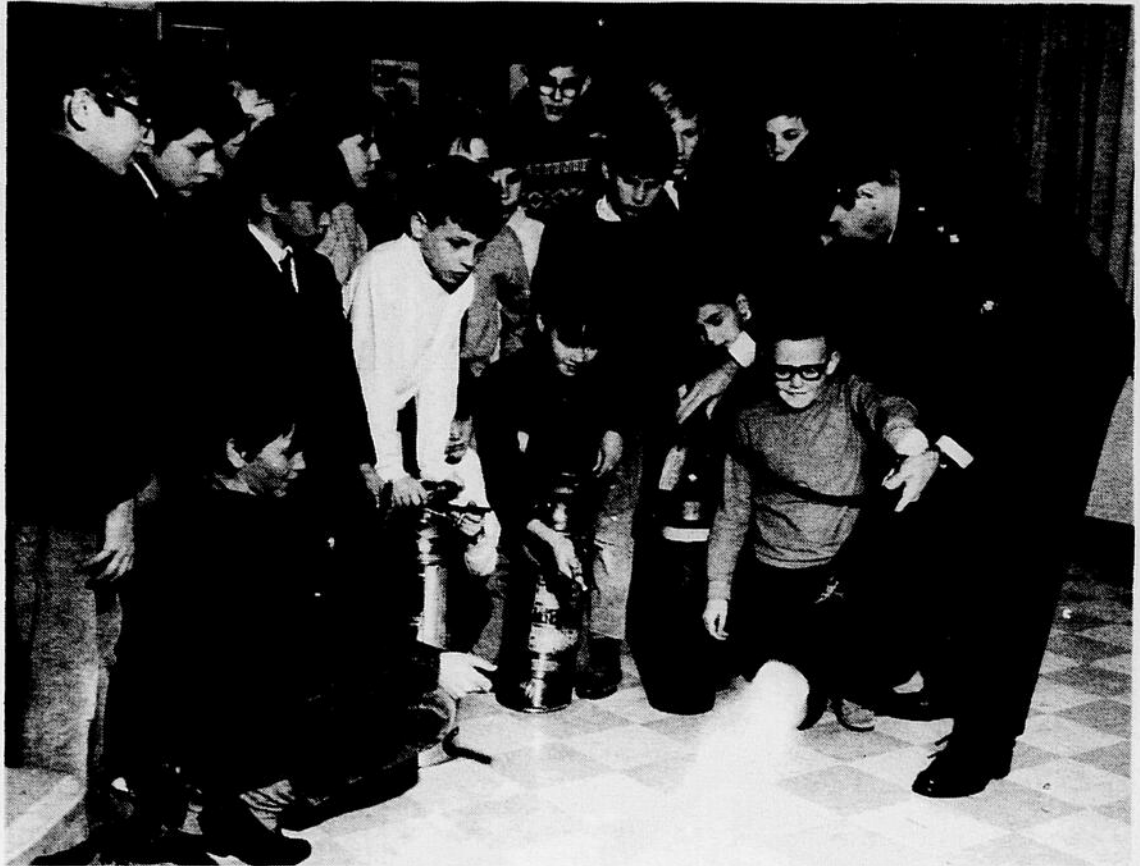

We Say

Keep calm, watchful; defeat these bums

Readers will have noticed that this newspaper seldom refers to bomb threats or scares, even though Westmount has its share aplenty.

We agree, with many other media, that they simply aren't legitimate news.

Indeed, reporting such incidents would be a thoroughly illegitimate use of our columns.

Because the spreading of despair and alarm, as much as if not more than the potential damage caused by real bombs, is the obvious purpose of those responsible.

Likewise, for those threats without such purpose, authorities believe these are the work of perverted, irresponsible cranks and jokesters. Reports of bomb threats simply give that element the idea.

One need not be alarmist, however, to note the general situation whereby, in Westmount alone, there are each week three or four phone calls about "bombs" which our police and firemen must check out — aren't not check out in the event one should prove serious. In the past, this city bore the brunt of actual bombings and experience is a good teacher.

These false alarms are a heavy burden on the time of our police and firemen, of concern to ratepayers and all citizens.

First duty of us all is to preserve calm. The more we talk up these deplorable incidents, the more we create in our own minds and those of others the very hysteria the perpetrators seek.

Equally important duty of all citizens is to be observant. Any extraordinary behavior is worth noting. Any slightly suspicious activity should be reported to the police who, contrary to popular belief, welcome calls which might be considered trivia but which can, in fact, be most valuable leads and clues.

No one wants a public of informers. But good citizens are welcome in any community.

The "other side" of this war of nerves is, after all, an avowedly subversive element which would disrupt and overthrow the society of the majority.

The best service which could be performed for the community at this time is the arrest of one or more persons engaged in this nefarious activity.

It is something in which we should all strive to help, by avoiding hand-wringing and keeping eyes and ears open.

Who wants to be intimidated, much less taken over, by a bunch of bums?

Why new licenses at mid-winter?

A few years ago wise authorities at Québec decided that drivers' licenses would best be issued so as to expire on the holders' birthdays. Thus a mad, annual scramble was dissipated for all concerned.

Remaining is the annual panic, at this time, for vehicle licenses.

Time something was done about this, too.

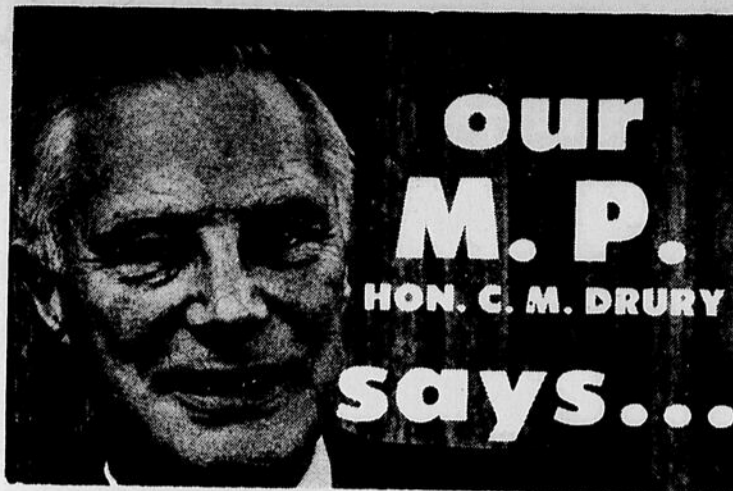
In addition to the scrum at issuing bureaux, there is another consideration of season. Every year we curse regulations which require us to freeze hands on rusty screws, at the front and rear of cars filthy with road muck, installing new plates.

Or, alternatively, lining up at busy service stations to have the job done for us, at a price.

If new markers must all be showing on a certain date, why, oh, why in our climate must it be in mid-winter?

Indeed, why new markers every year at all?

Most everywhere but North America a dignified marker is affixed on a new car and remains with it until scrapped — with the bonus that new numbers do not have to be memorized annually. Indication that annual fees have been paid is by a small windshield certificate, easily checked for renewal by observant police.

A new approach to regional disparity

The Government recently introduced in the House of Commons a bill seeking legislative approval for certain changes in government organization.

The legislation provides, among other major changes, for the establishment of a new department of regional economic expansion.

The creation of such a department was deemed necessary for several reasons. The traditional approach to the problems of regional disparity has been to deal with them on an ad hoc basis in response to the strongest needs and pressures of the moment. This led to the establishment of a variety of programs administered by different agencies, each responsible for a specific aspect of the problem and each reporting to a different minister.

Effective program co-ordination

tion on an overall basis was extremely difficult to achieve, a degree of overlapping and duplication was inevitable, and friction with the provinces sometimes resulted. At the same time, it was becoming increasingly obvious that the current programs for lessening regional disparities were not working satisfactorily in the sense that the difference between incomes of people in the less productive areas and those in the more productive areas of the country has remained constant.

(That a greater difference has not come about is no doubt attributable to the various development and incentive programs offered by the Federal Government.)

Focal point

The new department will provide a focal point for planning, co-ordinating the implementation of federal policies and programs aimed at removing these large economic disparities.

With the demographic trend toward urban centres, a new approach to the twin subjects of economic expansion and social adjustment has evolved.

Rather than spread funds fairly homogeneously throughout a region, why not concentrate financial and technical resources in a "growth centre"?

This should have the two fold effect to fostering greater expansion in an already expanding town or city and producing indirect benefits for the surrounding region. Why, for instance, provide incentives to industry in a mining and lumber town (Chibougamau) when these same incentives would yield much greater benefits if developed in a natural growth centre (Chicoutimi)? To this end, the new department intends to introduce later this year legislation providing for a major incentives program, not only to replace the existing one but to strike out in new directions.

Criticism

Criticisms have been voiced that the creation of such a department will confuse the problem of regional disparity with the problem of (national) poverty. This is not so. The new department will clearly play an important part in any national attack on poverty in Canada. But it will not be concerned with welfare or income maintenance measures, except for transitional arrangements. It will be concerned with raising employment and productivity in regions and areas of Canada that are lagging behind the rest of Canada, with a view to achieving ultimate equality of opportunity for the inhabitants of these regions.

It must be noted that no matter how energetic and industrious is the new department, the responsibilities for economic growth and development are shared between the central and provincial authorities. Hence, co-operation and co-ordination of plans of all levels of government are indispensable conditions for the success of any program of this nature.

The association is concerned at the delay of the Provincial Government in bringing down a comprehensive bill on social assistance. Although the minister of family and social welfare, Hon. Jean-Paul Cloutier, advises that delay is caused by necessary planning for personnel and efficient machinery to carry a prevention and rehabilitation role, this delay has continued for three years and recipients have allegedly suffered during this planning period. Much of this could be averted by immediate increase of allowances to match current cost of living, Mrs. Kerrigan said.

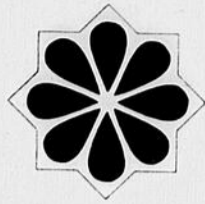

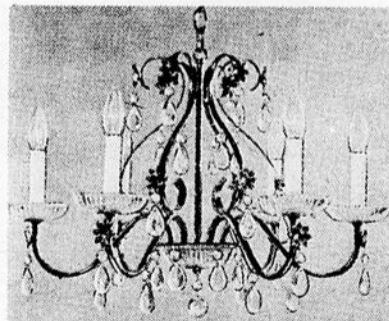

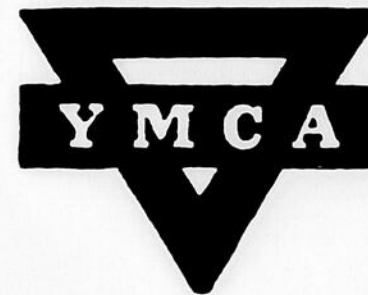
