



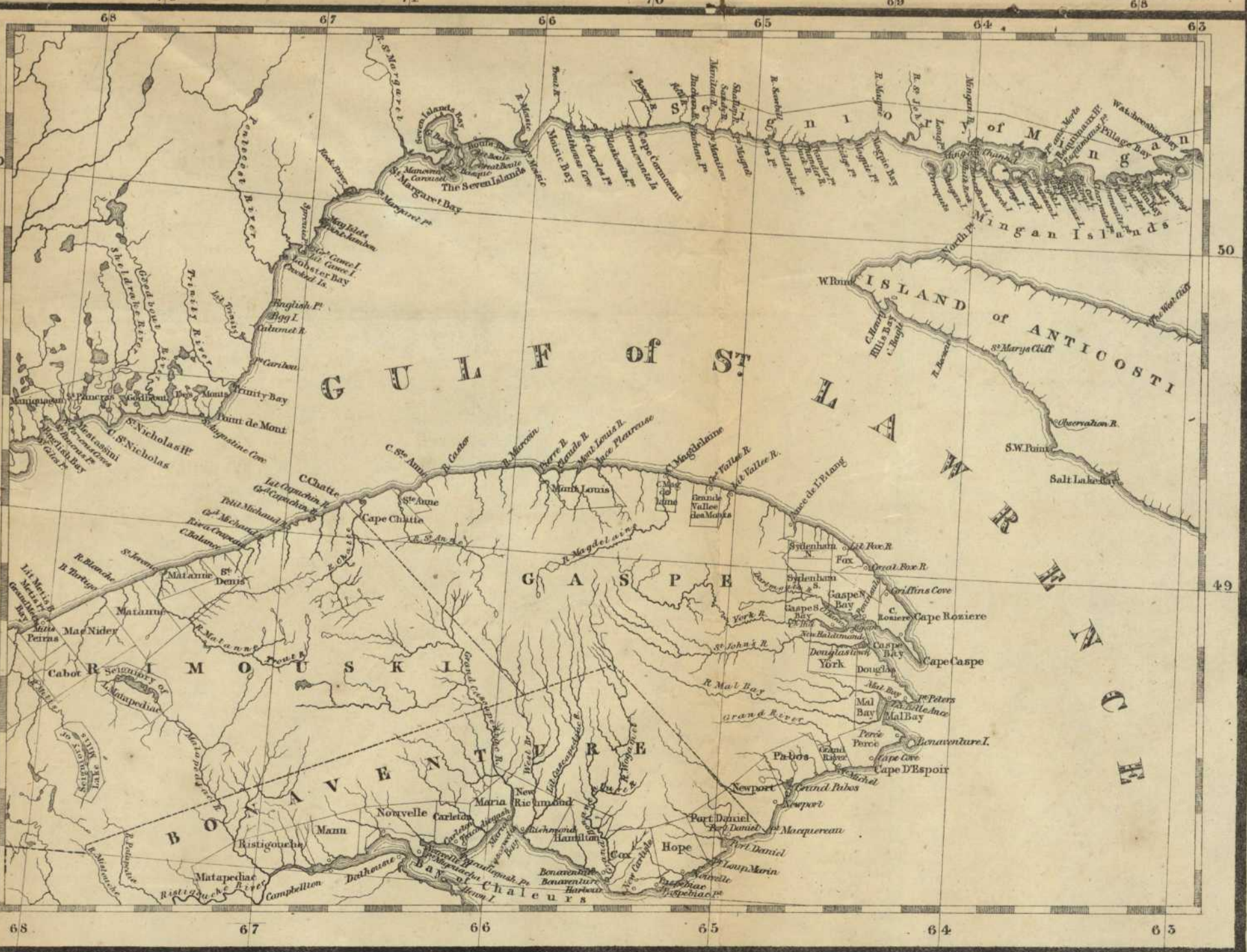

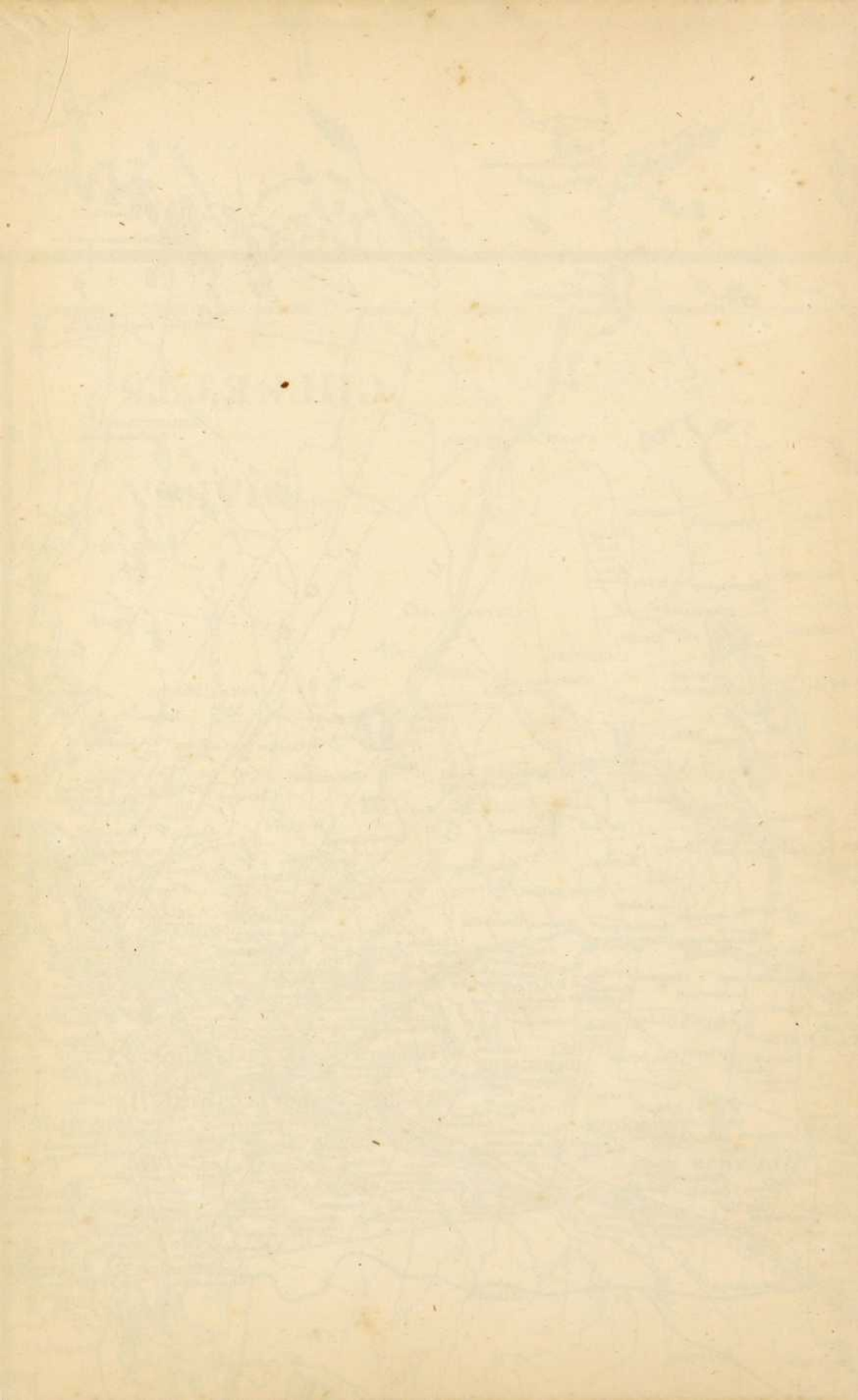

## REFERENCE TO MAP.

**T**HE boundary between Canada East and the United States has been laid down from Latitudes and Longitudes determined by the British and United States Commissioners during their Survey of the Boundary-Line. The Great Lakes Superior, Huron, Erie, and Ontario, and the River St. Lawrence, have been taken from Bayfield's Charts, with the exception of the Straits of Mackinac and part of Lake Erie, which have been deduced from the Trigonometrical Survey of the Northern and North-Western Lakes, now being carried on by the United States Government; the geographical position of the Lakes as surveyed by Bayfield being made to agree with the position as given by the latter Survey, and the position of the City of Toronto as lately determined by direction of Sir W. E. Logan.

The undermentioned have been taken from Surveys made by and under the direction of Sir W. E. Logan:—Rivers Tessalon, Missisauga, Spanish, French, Wahnapiatae, and their Lakes; Sturgeon River, Lake Nipissing, Mattawa River, Ottawa River from River Du Moine to and including Lake Temiscamingue, River Maganetawan, Muskoko River, Petewaweh and Bonnechère Rivers, in Canada West; Rivers Matanne, Chatte, Ste. Anne, St. Johns, Grand Bonaventure, and Grand Cascapédiac, in the vicinity of Gaspé, Canada East.

The remainder has been obtained from Bouchette and other authorities.

## P R E F A C E .

---

THE labour and expense attendant upon the preparation of a work professing to be a Directory of Canada were of so serious a nature that the Publisher shrank from assuming the responsibility until he had inquired whether there were not many besides himself who, having experienced the want which he had felt, would assist him to produce a remedy for an admitted evil.

With a view to arrive at the general sentiment on the subject, and also to discover the amount of positive encouragement that such a work would receive, a Prospectus of "THE CANADA DIRECTORY" was published, and very generally distributed throughout the Cities and Towns of Canada. The answers which he received to these circulars were of a character so encouraging and complimentary, as to induce the Publisher to take immediate steps to accomplish the end which he had proposed to himself, and inaugurate a work which should prove alike useful to the Province and creditable to the Press.

Of the way in which the duty has been discharged it does not become the Publisher to speak. He may however be permitted to say that neither pains nor expense have been spared to render the work accurate and complete; and also that, in regard to the style and manner of its execution, "The Canada Directory" will compare most favorably with publications of a kindred character which have received the approval of older countries.

It may be remarked that the title of the book conveys but an inadequate impression of the information which will be found in its pages. It is commonly supposed that a Directory is but an index to the places of business or private residences of the individuals whose names it records. The reader, however, will at once discover, upon referring to the General and Miscellaneous Index, that the work before him contains a much larger fund of useful matter than its name imports. It is no exaggeration to say, that it is a Directory for the man of business and a Guide-Book for the man of pleasure, an Index for the immigrant and an Instructor for the settler, a Gazetteer for the student and an Army-List for the militia officer, while for the statesman and others connected with official life it is a Statistical Chronicle of the progress of the country in all departments of enterprise.

It will thus be seen that the Canada Directory occupies a large space in the field of local information. In its projection it was designed to meet popular favor; in its prosecution this desirable end has been kept steadily in view. And now, believing that he has performed his part, the Publisher trusts that he may not look in vain for the support of an enlightened public.

Dependent not only upon the fidelity of paid agents, but also upon the voluntary assistance of many other gentlemen for the information which his work contains, the Publisher would be wanting alike in duty to his own feelings and their services, were he to permit the present occasion to pass without expressing his sincere acknowledgments. To the Officers of Government, of Private Companies and Public Institutions, he is deeply indebted, not only for the valuable information they were good enough to communicate, but for the kind manner in which it was conveyed. Their generous assistance has indeed facilitated his labour, and immeasurably augmented the value of his work. In returning his grateful thanks for these voluntary services, the Publisher believes that he is not only expressing his own feelings, but also the sentiments of those who warmly encouraged him to enter upon the responsible undertaking.

Where assistance has been general, it may seem almost invidious for the Publisher to particularise the sources whence it has been received. Still there are gentlemen in regard to whom the sense of gratitude presses so seriously upon his mind, that he cannot deny himself the pleasure of giving it expression.

To the Officers of the Post Office Department, the Publisher desires to return his sincere thanks. Indeed, the spirit of good-will and courtesy which animated the authorities at Toronto appeared to pervade all the Branches; for the Postmasters throughout the Province, of whom enquiries were made, manifested the greatest readiness, not only to afford information, but by personal attention to secure the accuracy of the matter submitted for their review.

The Statistical and Militia information which the work affords will best illustrate the Publisher's obligations to the gentlemen connected with the Bureau of Agriculture, with the Crown Lands, the Inspector General's, and the Adjutant General's Departments.

The important articles on Education, while they add to the attractions of the Directory, impose upon its Publisher the duty of making grateful acknowledgment of the services thus rendered by the gentlemen superintending the Educational interests of Eastern and Western Canada; nor should he omit to mention at the same time his indebtedness to Mr. Hodgins' Canada Educational Directory for large and valuable extracts on these interesting subjects.

In printing a work which it is the intention of the Publisher to re-issue at stated intervals of two years, and in claiming for its mechanical features a more than ordinary amount of credit, it is but just to state that the book is of Canadian manufacture; for the excellent type with which it has been printed was made by Mr. Palsgrave of Montreal, and the paper by Messrs. Alex. Buntin & Co., at the Valleyfield Mills, Beauharnois; while the beautiful Map engraving was executed at the establishment of Mr. George Matthews of Montreal.

The Publisher should, perhaps, hesitate to print the names of gentlemen from whom he has received much private assistance; still he cannot deny himself the gratification of offering his respectful acknowledgments to Sir W. E. LOGAN, for much information, prepared from the notes of his own most valuable Geological Surveys. And also to THOMAS C. KEEFER, Esq., his warmest thanks are especially due for the beautiful Map which accompanies the work, and which that gentleman has generously presented to beautify and illustrate "THE CANADA DIRECTORY."
