SEVERAL instances of disorderly conduct and breaches of the Peace having occurred, in consequence of the reprehensible conduct of Tavern-keepers in the Country Parishes, by whom, in disregard of their own Obligation and that of their Sureties, and in contempt of the Law, the sale of intoxicating Liquors is carried on during the Lord's Day, no less than on other days, and even during the hours of Divine Service, which is an aggravation of the offence: **PUBLIC NOTICE** is given of the determination of the Magistrates to use every legal means of bringing to justice all such Tavern-keepers, as may be known to offend in this particular;—and although it be the duty of the Tavern-keepers to be especially acquainted with such parts of the Law as relate to themselves,—it is deemed expedient further to notify them, that the consequence of the Sale of Spirituous Liquors at any time during Sunday, in all cases (those only excepted wherein such sale to a very moderate extent is allowed, for the relief of persons who are actually sick, or for the necessary refreshments of Travellers during their meals,) are:

- 1.—The forfeiture of their Recognizance and of that of their Sureties.
- 2.—A pecuniary Penalty, which may extend to Ten Pounds with costs.
- 3.—The forfeiture of their Licence, and finally inability ever again to obtain another Licence.

And the Tavern keepers are further notified, that all persons who may supply the information necessary for obtaining convictions in such cases, will in so doing, be considered as having performed a meritorious service, inasmuch as they will thereby have contributed towards the maintenance of that good order which it is of such high importance to society to pursue.

And the Church Wardens and Officers of Militia are requested within their several precincts to give publicity to this Notice, by proclaiming the same during three successive Sundays next after it shall have come to their knowledge, and occasionally afterwards when they shall deem it expedient so to do, at the Church doors of their respective Parishes, or other most public places within their Limits.

(FROM ENGLISH PAPERS TO 7th JULY.)

LONDON, June 18 to July 6.

Brussels and German papers to a late date confirm the late signal successes of the Greeks; and the former state, on the authority of a private communication from Madrid, that the Spanish Clergy have again offered to raise an army for the King, on condition of his allowing them the nomination of the Officers, and insisting on the evacuation of the fortified places by the French Troops.

An article from Switzerland in the *Nuremberg Correspondent*, states that there is little prospect of the affairs of Turkey and Greece being entered into at Milan, but they will probably be considered at St. Petersburg, on the return of the Emperor Alexander and the arrival of Lord Strangford.

The exportation of gold still continues. Upwards of £200,000 has been exported from the Port of Dover to the continent within the last ten days.

The *Gazette* contains a promotion in the Royal Marine and East India Corps, and upwards of 200 appointments to Regiments consequent upon the recent promotion of Field Officers.

To assist the shipping interest, Government are now proposing to take off 25s. per load, from the duty on foreign oak plank, and to remedy the loss of revenue, they propose to tax severely the importation of deals. The present duties are to be increased as follows:—12 to 15 feet deals, to pay £22 per 150; 15 to 18 feet, £26; 18 to 21 feet, £30. The public therefore will have to pay heavily for this concession to the shipping interest.

A new coinage is about to take place of gold and silver; the former to consist of pieces of five Pounds, the double Sovereign or forty shilling piece, the Sovereign or twenty shilling piece, and the half Sovereign or ten shilling piece; the latter of the Crown or five shilling piece, half Crown, shilling and six pence, for each of which new dies are preparing.

The *Devenport Telegraph* of the 25th June in calling the attention of its readers to an advertisement of the Rio de la Plata Company, recommends it to emigrants by stating amongst other inducements that "whilst manual labour fetches a higher price than in England, provisions are so cheap that beef and mutton sell at only a halfpenny per pound."

Letters from *Serampore*, East Indies, mention an unprecedented rise in the Ganges, which in that neighbourhood swept away several hundred houses and drowned some thousands of the inhabitants, nothing was said of Calcutta which lies on the opposite side of that River and on somewhat higher ground.

A letter from India has been received at Bath, by the relatives of an Officer in the East India Company's service, stating the capture of the King and Queen of Ava, with immense treasure in a fort where they had taken refuge; the native troops suffered great loss. The writer's share of prize money, as Lieutenant, is said to be estimated at £11,000.—*Bath Chronicle*.

A letter from India mentions that at a village in the Decan, a placard has been posted up, intimating that the war with the Burmese was the commencement of the liberation of India from the yoke of England.

It is currently reported that unfavourable news is in town from India; another report prevails that the Duke of Wellington is going thither.

Major General Turner, has assumed the command of the British Settlement on the West Coast of Africa and has issued a proclamation thanking the friendly tribes for their assistance in the late sanguinary contest, the proclamation concludes as follows.

"If the Ashantee will content himself with governing his own people, and does not stop

the trade of the interior with the Coast or attempt to oppress his neighbours, let him say so to me, and I will make a treaty with him on these terms, but I will not make peace with him on any other terms, nor until he gives up every claim to tribute or subjection from surrounding nations."—The document is dated at Cape Coast, the 2d April 1825.

It is said that more French Slave vessels are now upon the Coast of Africa than at any period for the last 23 years. The ships of war were generally healthy, but the troops on the contrary suffered in a dreadful degree, 217 men, and 22 officers besides women and children had died in the course of the last twelve months, leaving 146 men and 8 officers only, of which the garrison was composed, and it was expected that by the 25th June last, not ten of this number would remain alive. It is remarkable that when once a family becomes infected with the fever of that climate, all its members young and old become victims to it.

According to the last letters from Paris, the rumor of an intention to renew the Censorship of the Press is become general, The *Constitutionnel*, it seems, has been generally prohibited in the Papal dominions, on account of its advocacy of Protestant principles.—*Globe and Traveller*, 22d June.

On Tuesday the 21st June, a dreadful fire took place in Wells-street Cavendish-square, which consumed several houses, &c., amongst these was the factory of Mr. Stoddart the Piano forte manufacturer, which was wholly uninsured, and it is said that this gentleman has sustained a loss of nearly £30,000, indeed it is considered as underrated at that sum, as his stock of seasoned wood, which enabled him to produce such superior instruments cannot be replaced.—A strong detachment of the 2d Regiment Foot Guards commanded by a Captain, under the direction of Mr. Conant, Mr. Dyer, and other Magistrates formed a kind of square, which was not broken in upon and facilitated the operations of the fire-men. The total loss is supposed not to fall short of £200,000.

General Devereux has been released from confinement by order of the Emperor of Austria, and has returned to London.

On the 29th June His Majesty held his third Levee for the season at his Palace Carlton House, it was chiefly designed to afford an opportunity to the numerous Naval and Military Officers, who have recently been promoted, of being presented to His Majesty.

A Brussels paper states, that Mrs. Beecher, late Miss O'Neil, the celebrated actress is now at Paris, deprived of sight and about to undergo an operation for Cataract, we trust there is some mistake in this paragraph.—*Waterford Mail*, 6th July.

New and successful treatment of Hydrophobia.—A Venice paper of the 10th ult. contains a long account of the cure of Hydrophobia, et Formo di Revera, by cauterizing the glands under the tongue after all other attempts at cure had failed. The case was one of the most positive character, and the patient was almost dying when the cauterization was made; during eight days he suffered much fever from the effect of the wound, but he then recovered and was soon able to resume his regular business.—*Ibid*.

The Crops around Edinburgh were never at this season more luxuriant and promising.

The fall in the price of coarse yarn has enabled the manufacturers of Glasgow to employ a great part of the weavers that were idle, and more work is sending to the North of Ireland.

Mr. Blore Statuary and stone Mason in Piccadilly, has recovered £300 damages against Mr. Stockdale, the publisher of the *Memoirs*

of *Harriette Wilson*, for a libel, contained in that notorious book, pretended to be a letter from the Plaintiff, proposing marriage to Fanny Debouchette a sister of Harriette's, Mr. Blore shewed that he was married at the time the pretended letter was supposed to be written—the damages were laid at £500.

LIVERPOOL, June 23.

"We beg leave to advise you of the state & prospects of our market for American produce.

"There has been a very limited demand for ashes for some time past. Montreal Pot have declined 29s a 30s, and Pearls to 34s a 35s per cwt. United States Pot and Pearl ashes are almost nominally 40s per cwt. and at present there is no expectation of improvement in the prices.

"For some time past the Corn Markets of this country have been in a very dull state, an impression prevailing that the prices ere long will be considerably lower, and this opinion occasions the millers and dealers to go on with as small stocks as possible. The Bills in Parliament to permit the wheat in bond to be imported prior to May, 1822, to be used for home consumption, on payment of a duty of 10s per quarter, and to allow wheat the growth of Canada, to be imported for two years, on payment of a duty of 5s. per quarter, have just passed into a law. Wheat for home use now sells at 9s a 10s 3d per lb. and that recently imported in bond at 4s. a 4s 6d.

LONDON, JUNE 21.

The bill to allow newspapers to be printed on paper of a larger size than is now allowed, and to reduce the stamp duties on newspapers, has had a first and second reading in the Commons. The tax on all supplements, filled exclusively with advertisements, and all exclusively advertising papers, to be reduced to two pence per sheet.

A bill has passed the House of Commons, making the crime of throwing on of vitriol and aquafortis upon people a capital offence.

It is reported that Mr. Watt has sold the celebrated horse Memnon to the Duke of Wellington, for the small sum of 9000 guineas.

A meeting has been held, at which Sir Francis Burdett presided, for raising means to erect a monument to the memory of the late reformer, Major Cartwright. £500 were subscribed at the meeting.

A proposition was made in the House of Commons, on the 17th, to restore Sir Robert Wilson to his rank in the army. Many members spoke, and all in his favour—but no positive step was taken.

A National Bank is about to be established at Berlin.

Probert, the son of an Alderman at Norwich, who was more or less intimately connected with the Thurtell gang, has been executed for horse stealing. Great efforts were made to procure a pardon, a commutation of punishment, or even a respite. There were thirty-four prisoners brought at once into the condemned cell!

In the House of Commons, Mr. Huskisson said, he had on a former occasion submitted to the house various resolutions relative to the importation of certain manufactured articles from foreign countries, in which it was not his intention to propose any very considerable alterations. In the great article of cottons, he meant to make no alteration in the duty then proposed of 10 per cent. on importation, nor in the duty of 15 on woollens. The duty on ships built in the colonies and broken up in England would be reduced, the present duty was 50 per cent., and which was the cause of the huge timber ship from Canada not having been broken up there. The resolutions were agreed to.

Mr. Hume had introduced his motion respecting the established Church of Ireland, and concluded his speech with two resolutions, the substance of which was—1st. That church property was public property, and disposable by the Legislature for the good of religion and of the community at large; 2d. That the house would, in the course of next session, inquire whether the establishment of the Church of Ireland was not out of proportion to the services performed.—Motion negatived.

The Scotch shooting and stabbing bill had been read a third time, in the House of Commons, and passed.

PORTSMOUTH, June 27.

Arrival of Lord Cochrane.—This morning's dawn discovered the Emperor of Brazil's frigate *Peranga*, anchored at Spithead, with the flag of Lord Cochrane flying at the main as Admiral of the Emperor's fleet. After the customary salutes were exchanged, Lord Cochrane landed at the King's Sally Port, about 10, when the assembled multitude gave him three cheers, for which he politely bowed. The *Paranga* left Maranham on the 20th ult; the officers report that all the northern provinces of Brazil had been restored to tranquility, and that no hostile vessel had appeared on the coast since the evacuation of Bahia, two years since. The *Paranga* is a very fine frigate, mounting 46 guns; most of the officers and crew are English. A number of naval and military officers waited upon his Lordship at Billett's Hotel. The first question he asked was whether the Catholic Bill had passed.

June 28.—The Marquis of Maranham set off this morning for London. About an hour after, *Lady Cochrane* arrived, and immediately followed for London.

LONDON, June 29, P. M.

Consols have remained all morning at the closing price of yesterday. The foreign stocks and shares markets continue firm.

Parliament will adjourn on Thursday.

SUMMARY.

The Hon. Mr. Rufus King arrived at Liverpool in the ship *Pacific* on the 26th. He was to stay there a few days to recover from the effects of his voyage, he having suffered much from sea sickness. The American Chamber of Commerce intended to invite him to a public dinner previous to his departure for London, to take upon him the duties of Minister Plenipotentiary from the United States to the British Court.

It was reported that an Austrian three per cent loan was to be attempted.

General Canterac had arrived at Bordeaux and addressed a letter to the editor of the *Memorial-Burdelsais*, denying in toto an epistle which had appeared in the London papers from himself to Bolivar. He says he had no other communication with Bolivar, than a mere letter of etiquette, the contents of which were so simple that he wrote it without making a first copy, or even keeping a duplicate."

A French squadron was cruising off Cadiz, says a letter of the 7th of June, for preventing the entry of Spanish vessels from Havana, there being reason to fear that fever prevailed at the latter place. The consequence was, that many of the merchantmen being unable to take refuge in Cadiz, were taken by the Colombian privateers. The French ships could not afford them protection, without committing a breach of neutrality.

So great was the apprehension at Lloyd's from the visits of Colombian privateers to the coasts of Spain and Portugal, that 20 guineas per cent. was paid on the 28th on Spanish property bound to Portugal.

The fifth edition of "Segur's History of Napoleon and of the Grand Army," was publishing in Paris.

The Jury Bill has received the sanction of the King and Mr. Peel has been instructed to give the necessary orders for its being put into execution without delay in every part of the kingdom.

In the House of Commons, June 22, Mr. Brougham asked Mr. Canning if he was aware of the arrest of Gen. Devereaux by the Austrian Government in the Venetian states?—Mr. Canning replied that he had understood so. Mr. Brougham remarked, that it had been his intention, during the last two sessions of parliament, to bring before the house the manner in which English subjects had been treated by the Austrian states and Spain, but that he had been deterred from so doing from the apprehension the warmth of the language that might be used, would possibly compromise the safety of the individuals who might be in those territories.

The Liverpool Advertiser of the 25th June states that the subscription for the service of plate to be presented to Mr. Huskisson already amounted to £3500, a sum beyond which it was not thought desirable to go, and the books were accordingly to be closed on the 1st July.

A public meeting was to have been held in London on the 2d of July, when Mr. Brougham intended to bring forward the scheme of the London University of College.

The tales of the Crusaders, were published in Edinburgh on Tuesday, and on Wednesday, night following a drama, founded on the "Talisman," was brought out at the theatre. The play is said to be a very reputable performance.

The King visited the Duke of Northumberland's Mansion on the 24th, during the absence of the Duke in the most private manner possible. All formal reception was avoided. The only person of the Duke's household who had the honor of attending the King was the Duke's house-keeper. His Majesty ascended the grand staircase, which he considered unique, being of solid marble, and was conducted through the dining rooms, drawing rooms, the Duke's private rooms, &c. which occupied the King about half an hour.

Lisbon papers of June 5, contain a notice from the Secretary of State to certain parties who were anxious to gain the sanction of government for the importation of foreign corn, informing them that such importation would not take place beyond the limits of the existing law.

An article under date of Hydra, May 2d, states that there were twenty-two Austrian vessels in the Hellespont, loaded with provisions which with four others that were shortly expected were destined for Constantinople.

Madame Manson, who in the tragic drama of *Fueldes*, played so memorable a part, died a short time since at Versailles.

The following among other bills, have received the ascent of the King—The Warehousing Corn bill—The Atlantic Steam Navigation bill—The Canada Tenures bill; and the bill regulating the hours of labour in Cotton mills.

JUNE 21.

At the launch of the Lord Blaney Steam Packet at Liverpool, Mr. Clegg, the engineer, gave an explanation of a very important improvement, introduced at the Iron Works, in the construction of the safety valves of the boilers. It is a fact well authenticated by the evidence taken before the Committee of the House of Commons, and on a long list of coroners' inquests, that the explosion of steam boilers has uniformly been owing to the ignorance and rashness of the engineer in over-weighting the safety valves, particularly in high pressure engines. To obviate this serious evil, Mr. Clegg has invented a counteracting safety valve, over which the engineer has no control, and which only acts when the steam is rarified beyond its proper temperature.

COLONIAL INTELLIGENCE.

FROM THE U. STATES MAIL.

Highly Important.—In our article of Saturday respecting the design of France in the West Indies, we suggested the possibility that the next we should hear of the French fleet at Port-au-Prince, would be, that it had passed the Moro, and was in the quiet command of the Havana. It is even so. The U. S. sloop of war *Hornet*, E. P. Kennedy, Esq. commander, has arrived at Norfolk, in 9 days from Havana, having left that port on the 26th ultimo. *An impression had recently prevailed in Havana that the Island of Cuba was ceded to France*, and it was even reported that a French frigate with Spanish troops on board for Havana, had been captured by a British man of war. And in coming out, THE HORNET MET GOING INTO HAVANA, A FRENCH FLEET OF THIRTEEN MEN OF WAR, TWELVE OF THEM SHIPS, FOUR OF WHICH WERE OF THE LINE!—The news of the recognition of Haytien independence had not reached Havana when the *Hornet* sailed, nor was any thing known there of the French fleet which lately visited Port-au-Prince. From this fact, it is a fair inference that secret measures were adopted by the Haytien Government, in connexion with the French Admiral, to prevent any communication with the Havana, until the latter should announce his own arrival at Cuba.—*N. Y. Spectator.*

BERMUDA.

BERMUDA, June 7.

The public works at Ireland Island, are prosecuted with great exertion. The building and grounds, intended for the residence of the Commissioner of the Dock Yard, will, it is supposed, cost Government upwards of £300,000 sterling, when finished. Between three and 400 Convicts are kept in daily employ. Swarms of idle negroes infest the island; their masters having little for them to do, and are not allowed to sell, or send them from it, though it is really shameful to see such large quantities of soil left destitute and uncultivated, while almost every article of provision is imported or smuggled from the United States.

DOMINICA.

ROSEAU, June 29, 1825.

We congratulate our readers on the prospect of the establishment of Steam-Boats amongst us in a very short time. We know that the list is already very numerous and respectably signed; the names of His Honor the President, several Members of the Honorable Board of Council and House of Assembly, most of the first Mercantile-houses in town, and a long list of Country Gentlemen, give stability to the scheme, and assurance that it will be conducted in the best possible manner, and be a guarantee of the proper application, of the funds of the subscribers. We are in great hopes that it will amply repay those persons who embark in it. There can be no positive certainty in any speculation, but as far as we can judge *this* promises to be very profitable; and will certainly be of the greatest benefit to all the Colonies, by promoting a greater intercourse, and be the means of uniting them on all great political questions.—*Dominica Chronicle.*

PRINCE EDWARD'S ISLAND.

Established Church of Scotland.—On the 25th ultimo, a meeting was held at Charlotte Town, to adopt measures for the erection of a place of worship of the above denomination.

next day, Lord LIVERPOOL mentioned in his place, that early next Session he should propose the reversal of several attainders in addition to the peerages already restored.

The Prince Edward Island Register, of the 1st instant, gives an account of the proceedings of the meeting. The subscription list already amounts to £295 16s. 4d. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor gave £25 and His Honor Chief Justice Archibald £10. "At the commencement of the subscription, Mr. Stewart, on behalf of Alexander Birnie, Esq. of London, and William Johnston, Esq. made an offer of a town lot each, immediately adjoining each other, on which to erect the intended church, which were gratefully received."

HALIFAX, July 27.

The population of Nova-Scotia, by the census of 1817, came to 78,345; but as it was confessedly imperfect and Cape Breton has been since annexed to us, our present population is commonly estimated at 100,000; which is probably a very near estimate to the truth.

J. W. Molloy, Esq. Attorney General, has been nominated to the office of one of the "District Judges," and James Simms, Esq. has been nominated to succeed Mr. Molloy, as Attorney General.—Mr. Simms has long practised as a pleader at the Bar of the Supreme Court, with much credit to himself and equal satisfaction to his employers. Mr. Des Barres, the other District Judge, sailed for Halifax in the May Packet—he may be hourly expected.—*Gaz.*

From French Papers to July 1.

FRANCE.

The session of the French chambers was concluded on the 17th June.

Captures on the Coast of Africa.—The squadron on the coast of Africa have captured the following French vessels, for infringing the law prohibiting the slave trade:—Le Telegraphe, La Caprteuse, L'Antonia, La Glaneur, L'Assurance, La Marie-Magdeleine, L'Eugene, and L'Alcide. The two first have been condemned at Cayenne, and the others are to be proceeded against.

The demand in France for English riding horses is increasing in a most unprecedented manner. For two months past, there have been daily arrivals at a restaurateur's in Hay-market of French horse-dealers, who have come hither for the express purpose of purchasing riding and cabriolet horses.

The Duke of Northumberland had given a splendid fête at Paris, of which a gorgeous description is given. All the Royal family, nobility, foreign ambassadors, &c. were present.

"On their arriving at the hotel of the Duke of Northumberland, the Princesses of the Royal Family were saluted with the airs of "vive Henri IV," and of "Charmante Gabrielle." The garden of the hotel was illuminated with coloured lamps, and the arms of England surrounded a brilliant illuminated castle, near which was a white flag. Elegance and grace enhanced this magnificence. The Duchess of Northumberland and all the ladies of her family were adorned with *fleurs de lys*. The apartments were decorated with the greatest splendour; there were several tables; the principal one, forty persons, was entirely covered with gold plate. The vase of Sevres porcelain, which the King has given to the Duke is of extraordinary size, and unrivalled for magnificence and beauty. M. Lequai one of the principal artists of the Royal Manufactory has employed three years' labour in the paintings: it represents the tribunal of Diana. Nine apartments, magnificently decorated, were thrown open. There were not genuine pearls in those nosegays given to the ladies, as a journal says this morning; but all those nosegays in which a lily was observed, were exchanged for fresh two or three times in the evening. The staircase was adorned with flowers, and

surrounded by French and English flags. Among the illuminations we shall notice that of the arms of France and England, and which had the following motto in colored lamps:—"Vivent les descendants de Henri IV." The fête lasted till five o'clock in the morning.

The official part of the Moniteur of the 17th, contains the laws fixing the budget for 1826.

"The expenses of the Consolidated Debt, and the *mortissement* (Sinking Fund) for 1826, are fixed at 241,585,785 francs, £9,663,000 sterling.

"The general expenses are fixed at 941,981,714 francs, or £26,920,000 sterling.

"The revenue for 1826 is estimated at 924,095,704 francs, being nearly thirty-seven millions in English money.

"A Royal Ordinance fixes the meeting of the Councils of Arrondissements for July 1. They are not to sit more than ten days the first half of their session. They meet on the 8th August for the second part of their session, which is not to exceed five days. The Department Councils to meet the 15th July, and sit till the 29th.

A Vienna paper, of the 28th ult. announces the destruction of more than 49 villages and market towns in the country of Neutra, within a single month. The greater part of these conflagrations are supposed to have been caused by incendiaries. No motive is assigned, but some of the perpetrators are said to have been arrested.

PARIS, June 29.—*Stock Exchange, June 28, 5 o'clock.*—The market has been dull, and the price of Stocks has experienced a further decline, notwithstanding considerable efforts are made to keep it up. The five per cents, for money, closed at 102f. 85c.

SPAIN.

It is reported that disturbances have broken out at Madrid. The last letters from thence are of the 18th, which mention that the Ministers of War and Justice have been removed, and that some agitation existed among the Royalist volunteers.

GREECE.

The following is an official bulletin of the Greek Admiral Miaulis:—

"*First Division of the Greek Fleet, May 13th 1825.*

"Yesterday evening, with a favourable wind, we entered, past Sapienza, into the Gulf of Modon where 20 of the enemy's vessels were anchored under the cannons of the fortress. On this squadron our intrepid firemen threw themselves with six fire ships, and with little difficulty, they succeeded in setting them on fire, whilst we, with the rest of our vessels, pursued other ships of the enemy which were in full sail. The vessels burned in the port of Modon, consisted of two frigates, three corvettes, five brigs of war, and the rest transports. We are informed that one of the frigates was a cut-down 54 gun vessel of the Pacha of Egypt, and that the other was a 36 gun frigate; two of the corvettes carried 26 guns each.—The Divine Providence aided us still further, and brought about the entire destruction of the enemy. The fire produced by this conflagration communicated itself to the fortress, and the town of Modon, for five hours, appeared one volume of flames, and then we heard one of the most terrible explosions which ever took place. This leads us to imagine that the powder magazines took fire, and, in that case, every one, and every thing there must have perished."

PARIS, June 24.—(*Extract of a Letter from Trieste, dated June 10th.*)—After the splendid naval victory which the Greeks gained in the

night of the 12th of May, we could not expect to see Navarino capitulate—yet this has happened if we may believe letters from Corfu, dated 30th of May. However it may be, the possession of the place can be of no advantage to the Turks after the loss of their fleet, and their situation in the Morea is not the less critical.

DOMESTIC.

What a contrast do the Colonies of Britain display, when brought into comparison with those of other powers, both as they were, and as they are!—held in a state of bondage for ages, the dependencies of Spain were permitted to drag on a miserable existence, and the unfortunate inhabitants were obliged to toil like so many of the brute creation to maintain in luxurious ease those who continued to persecute them. The Colonists of Portugal were little better treated, and as the system of oppression went on with all its various refinements in cruelty, the spirit of the Enslaved increased in determination to avail themselves of the first favorable moment to break the degrading chains which held them in ignoble bondage. After all, however, they yet have difficulties to encounter that may for a long time retard that prosperity which will ultimately result from their free institutions. They have new laws to frame, ancient prejudices both civil and religious to combat, funds to raise for the accomplishment of these purposes, and a number of other matters which will present themselves, before a complete organization of their Governments can be effected.

On the other hand, when we look at the flourishing situation of British Colonists, we are led to bless the hour when their good fortune placed them under the care of the most enlightened, and tolerant government on earth. Although no country possesses so extensive a Colonial population as England, we need not enumerate the acts of grace and kindness which she extends to all, but as an evidence of her paternal care we may be permitted to notice what she had effected for those in which we have the happiness to live. When Great Britain became possessed of the Canadas by the

conquest, they presented a different aspect to what they do in the present day, and might in all probability have remained in their then wretched situation, even had not the French Revolution taken place, for it is a well known historical fact that the ancient government of France considered Canada merely in the light of hunting ground and that those who were sent out to govern, were needy adventurers or junior branches of decayed families once possessing distinction. It was, however, reserved for England to have the glory of producing a change which places these provinces in so desirable a situation. She has expended vast sums in the accomplishment of this object, and it is a most pleasing reflection that those for whom she had used so much exertion are sensible of the sacrifices which have been already made on their account, and grateful, not only for what has been done, but for the contemplated laws which are now in progress for their future benefit.

We have been favored with English papers to the 7th July inclusive, from which we have made a summary. There is nothing of importance in them. The dates at New York are to the 1st of July.

The Greek contest still continues in its usual uncertainty. Many journals assert that NAVA-

RINO has been taken by the EGYPTIAN fleet, and that REDSCHID PACHA, so far from having experienced reverses, has penetrated into the MOREA, and besieged several fortresses. These reports are on the authority of letters dated 10th June, from TRIESTE, which mention that His MAJESTY'S ship *Hind*, Captain Lord JOHN CHURCHILL, had brought the news thither of the fall of NAVARINO. On the other hand, we have numberless corroborations from other quarters of the most effective success on the part of the GREEKS.

The *Liberal* papers in FRANCE entertain fears of the re-establishment of the Censorship of the press. If so, it must be attributed to their own intemperance.

We are very happy to observe, by the *Courier* of the 5th July, that the result of the examination of the Quarter's Revenue, ending that day, will be most satisfactory. Notwithstanding the repeal of so many productive duties, the excess over the last quarter amounts to £120,000.

It is stated that Mr. PEEL intends next Session to propose a new arrangement with regard to the Sheriffs of counties, they are to be made perpetual, with a salary, and to be elected by the respective counties.

JULY 7.—Mr. O'CONNELL has given notice of a new Catholic Association, to enter upon its duties immediately after the dissolution of Parliament. He solemnly pledges himself that no existing law will be infringed on by this new Association.

Lord COCHRANE, Marquess of MARANHAM, in BRAZIL, has arrived in ENGLAND with his lady, and is living at TUNBRIDGE WELLS.

JULY 5.—There was a grand Ball the preceding evening at St. James's Palace. His MAJESTY had a slight attack of the gout, but was able to mingle with his invited guests on this occasion.

Alderman CROWDER and Mr. KELLY have been elected Sheriffs of LONDON for the year ensuing.

Consols for account, at the close this day, 91 $\frac{5}{8}$.

JULY 1.—A meeting was held at the London Tavern this day, to take into consideration the establishment of a new University for the City. Resolutions were passed unanimous in favor of the measure, and the meeting was pledged to support. Sir JAMES MCINTOSH, Mr. BROUGHAM, and Lord JOHN RUSSELL moved several of the Resolutions.

On the 29th June, His MAJESTY held his third levee this season for the purpose of receiving the numerous naval and military officers who have been promoted by the late Brevets.—Prince GEORGE OF CAMBRIDGE was presented to the KING in the uniform of his father's regiment of Guards. The new King's Aides-de-camp had the honor of kissing hands on appointment.

A reconciliation has taken place between His MAJESTY and the Duke of GLOUCESTER.

A meeting of the British Catholic Association was held on the 25th June.

The new College of Physicians, in Pall Mall East, near the King's Mews, was opened on the 25th June, with great ceremony. The Duke of YORK was present. Sir HENRY HALFORD, Baronet, the President, made a latin oration on the occasion.

The *Cornwall Gazette* mentions that a fine steam vessel, of 500 Tons, was to sail for the East Indies from Falmouth, about the 5th August. It was expected that it would arrive in two months.

The four Battalions of the Guards were reviewed in Brigade by the Duke of YORK, the Duke of CAMBRIDGE, and a superb cavalcade on the 22nd June.

The annual Southwark dinner to commemorate the return of Sir ROBERT WILSON took place on the 21st. A general wish was expressed that both he and Lord COCHRANE should be restored to the service.

MESSRS. TERRY and YATES have purchased the Adelphi Theatre for £4000.

The Marquess of HERTFORD has given a splendid entertainment, at which were all the Royal Family, with the exception of His MAJESTY, and four hundred of the first nobility and gentry.

The DAUPHIN of FRANCE is expected to visit ENGLAND shortly.

The Bill for abolishing Writs of Error passed the House of Lords on the 29th June. The

The Custom laws consolidated Bill was read a second time in the Upper House on the 30th June. The Marquess of LANSDOWN highly approved the Bill, and complimented Ministers on its introduction.

The *Combination Laws Bill* was read a second time in the Upper House on the 1st July, having passed the House of Commons.

His Excellency the LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR will if possible return to ENGLAND by the Herald Yatch, which is expected here about the 10th September with His Excellency the GOVERNOR in CHIEF, and family. We perceive by the newspapers that a meeting is called for Saturday next, to propose an Address to the Honorable Sir FRANCIS BURTON, on his quitting this Province, the Government of which he has administered since June 1824.

The HALIFAX papers seemed to think that the great BOSTON sea serpent had paid them a visit; but it turns out to be a basking shark of the largest size, which has been taken and exhibited in that city. It measures 32 feet in length, and 18 feet in circumference.

From the Mercury of Tuesday last:

The following circumstance lately occurred in this Garrison which reflects the highest credit upon the young soldier who so honorably did his duty.—Private George Dow, 71st Light Infantry, whilst on his post as Sentry, in front of the King's Wood Yard, between 1 and 3 o'clock on the 9th inst. was accosted by a man, whose name, we are informed, is Hugh McGinly, who persuaded him to desert, by representing to him that the soldiers who had deserted from his corps, were all doing well, and further to induce him to go off, he promised Dow plain clothes, and a horse to carry him, if he would accompany him that night. The Soldier, a native of Glasgow and only 19 years of age, pretended to lend a willing ear to the suggestions of McGinly, but on the latter proposing to go for some spirits that they might drink together, Dow seized him and detained him as a prisoner till the relief came round, when McGinly was taken before a Magistrate, Mr. D'Estimauville, by whom he was committed to take his trial at the criminal term in September next for the offence, of persuading a Soldier to desert his Majesty's service.—We understand that Dow has been promoted for his highly meritorious conduct.

We learn that His Excellency Major General Sir Peregrine Maitland has directed the pension of a discharged soldier named William Thoms to be stopped, he having aided and encouraged soldiers to desert from this Garrison. The conduct of this man is particularly reprehensible as the pension had been granted to him for a service of only 14 years and not on account of any wounds received in action.

It came down the main top-gallant-mast, which, with the main top-mast, were torn to pieces, raised up the main deck near the main-mast and injured the long-boat—one man in the act of handing the sail on the top-gallant yard, was so much scorched that he was obliged to be lowered to the deck, and another near the main-mast was knocked down, and his skin much burnt from his neck down his left side, to his feet.

Brought in here yesterday morning by the Pilots, 5 seamen belonging to the Brig Malta, of London, W. Parkinton, from Bristol to Montreal, which was run down in the Channel 25th ult. by the Ship Sally, bound from Havannah to Antwerp, and who providentially saved themselves by jumping on board the said vessel.

SEVERAL instances of disorderly conduct and breaches of the Peace having occurred, in consequence of the reprehensible conduct of Tavern-keepers in the Country Parishes, by whom, in disregard of their own Obligation and that of their Sureties, and in contempt of the Law, the sale of intoxicating Liquors is carried on during the Lord's Day, no less than on other days, and even during the hours of Divine Service, which is an aggravation of the offence: PUBLIC NOTICE is given of the determination of the Magistrates to use every legal means of bringing to justice all such Tavern-keepers, as may be known to offend in this particular;—and although it be the duty of the Tavern-keepers to be especially acquainted with such parts of the Law as relate to themselves,—it is deemed expedient further to notify them, that the consequence of the Sale of Spirituous Liquors at any time during Sunday, in all cases (those only excepted wherein such sale to a very moderate extent is allowed, for the relief of persons who are actually sick, or for the necessary refreshments of Travellers during their meals,) are:

- 1.—The forfeiture of their Recognizance and of that of their Sureties.
- 2.—A pecuniary Penalty, which may extend to Ten Pounds with costs.
- 3.—The forfeiture of their Licence, and finally inability ever again to obtain another Licence.

And the Tavern keepers are further notified, that all persons who may supply the information necessary for obtaining convictions in such cases, will in so doing, be considered as having performed a meritorious service, inasmuch as they will thereby have contributed towards the maintenance of that good order which it is of such high importance to society to pursue.
