THE TALK OF THE DAY.

Resuming our examination of the annual report of the Hon. J. H. HOGGART, Minister of Railways and Canals, we have, this morning, to deal with the canals of the country. The canal systems, under Government control, in connection with the lakes and navigable rivers, are as follows: 1. The River St. Lawrence and lakes. 2. The Richelieu navigation, from the St. Lawrence to Lake Champlain. 3. The River Ottawa. 4. The Rideau navigation, from Ottawa to Kingston. 5. The Trent navigation. 6. St. Peter's Canal, Cape Breton.

The following list shows the total amount charged to capital account, expended by the Government for construction and enlargement of each of the canals of the Dominion; embracing the period prior to Confederation and extending down to the 30th June, 1894: Lachine Canal, \$9,731,029.65; Beauport Canal, 1,611,690.20; Soulanges Canal (under construction), 987,032.95; Williamsburg Canals (being largely completed), 3,438,941.30; Cornwall Canal (under construction), 5,054,564.57; St. Lawrence River and Canals, 958,900.02; Murray Canal, 1,247,470.26; Welland Canal, 23,763,866.39; Sault Ste. Marie Canal (under construction), 2,791,873.74; Ste. Anne Canal, 1,170,215.63; Carleton and Grenville Canals, 4,025,338.55; Culbuck Canal, 579,494.46; Rideau Canal (under construction), 4,560,285.60; Trent Canal

UNION OF CHRISTENDOM.—In the different Anglican churches in this city yesterday, in accordance with a request made by His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, and also by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese in his late Synodical charge, the prayer for Christian unity was used. A general resolution to the various branches of the Christian Church and to the modern movement unionism was made last night by the Revd. Canon Williams, M.A., in his sermon in St. Peter's Church.

INFANTICIDE.—A verdict of "wilful murder" has been returned against a person or persons unknown, by the Coroner's jury in the case of the newly-born male child found dead in St. Roch's on Friday, as described in Saturday's issue of this paper. The jury is working up the case with a view to the discovery of the author or authors of the crime. The child, which was a fine, healthy one, had been suffocated by birth and its body wrapped in a bath towel.

LA BANQUE NATIONALE.—There is a movement on foot on the part of certain shareholders of La Banque Nationale, for the remaining vacancy on the directorate of the bank filled by the appointment thereto of Mayor Villeneuve, M.P., of Montreal. During the session of the Legislature here, the shareholders believe that Mr. Villeneuve would be a valuable man here for the bank, and some of them, as later years appeared in Montreal, would it be believed, profit largely by his supervision thereof.

JUVENILE PICKPOCKETS.—For some time past an organized gang of little girls in St. Sauveur have been engaged in picking the pockets of worshippers at the services, and their depredations during the last fortnight have amounted to upwards of \$100. They are extremely difficult to catch, as they throw away the proceeds of their depredations, and on Saturday they were seen with the money. On Saturday from 8 to 12, by name Eva Simard, Philomène Morrissette and Rosanna Lepine, were brought before Mr. E. Brunson, J.P. The first was committed and sentenced to two years in the reformatory; the second was acquitted and restored to her parents with a caution, and the charge is proceeding in the case of the third.
