## Beautiful Lisbon Square in Which the King and Crown Prince of Portugal Were Shot to Death

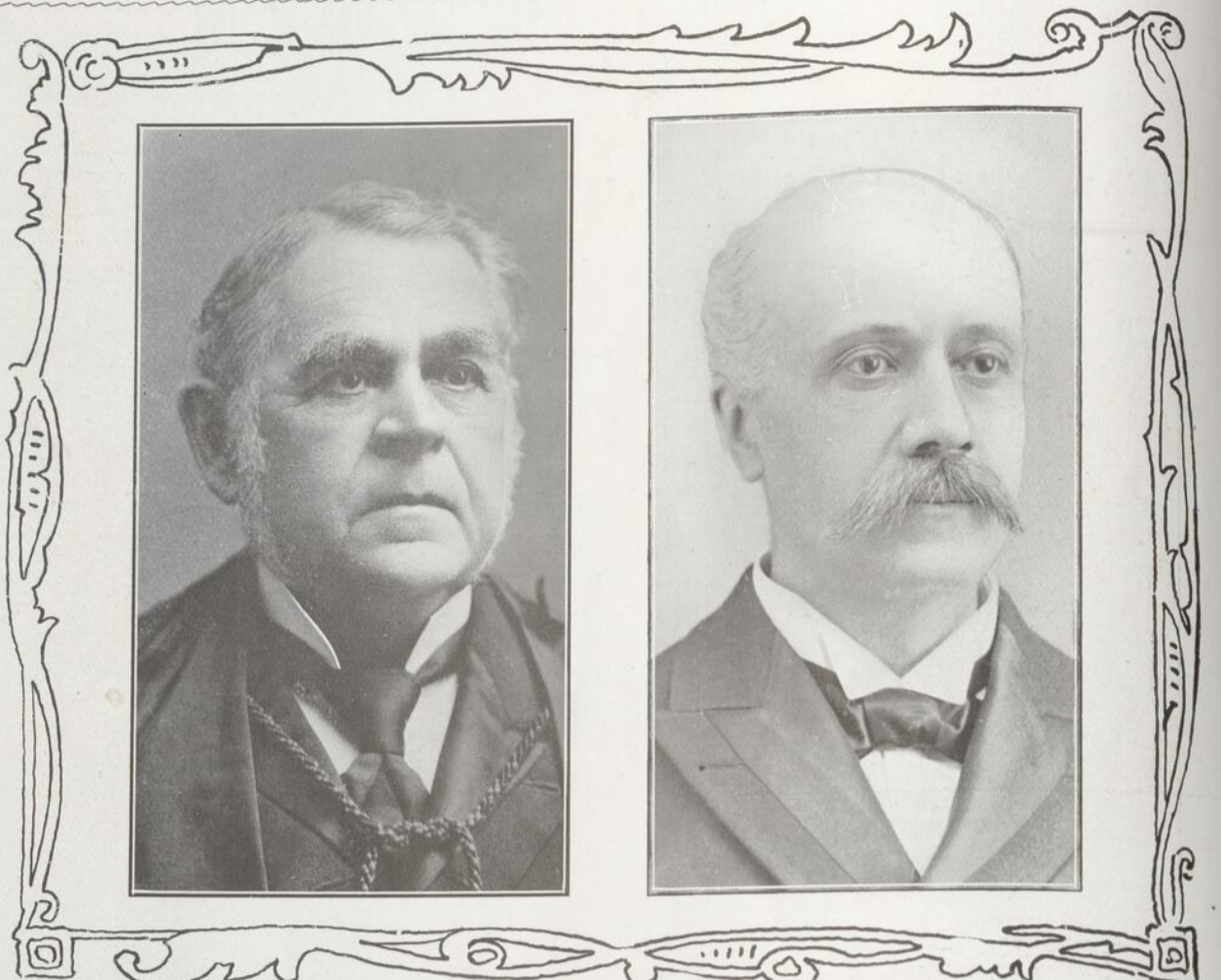


WHERE LISBON'S ROYAL TRAGEDY TOOK PLACE—The first of the above illustrations shows the Praca do Comercio, one of the leading squares of Portugal. This square was the scene of the assassination of King Carlos and Crown Prince Luiz of Portugal, two weeks ago. The Praca do Comercio is open on one side to the river and on the other three is surrounded by the Custom House and Government Offices, including the arsenal, to which the bodies of the late King and his son were taken immediately after the shooting. In the middle of the square is a bronze equestrian statue of King Joseph I, in whose reign the earthquake and restoration of the city took place. At the middle of the north side is a grand triumphal arch under which is a street leading to another handsome square, the Rocio or Praca do Dom Pedro (built on the site of the Inquisition palace and prisons), where stands the theatre D. Maria II. The equestrian statue and arch are features of the first of the above illustrations. The second illustration shows the Tower of St. Vincent, one of the most striking features of the water-front in Lisbon. It is sometimes used for royal embarkations and vice-versa. 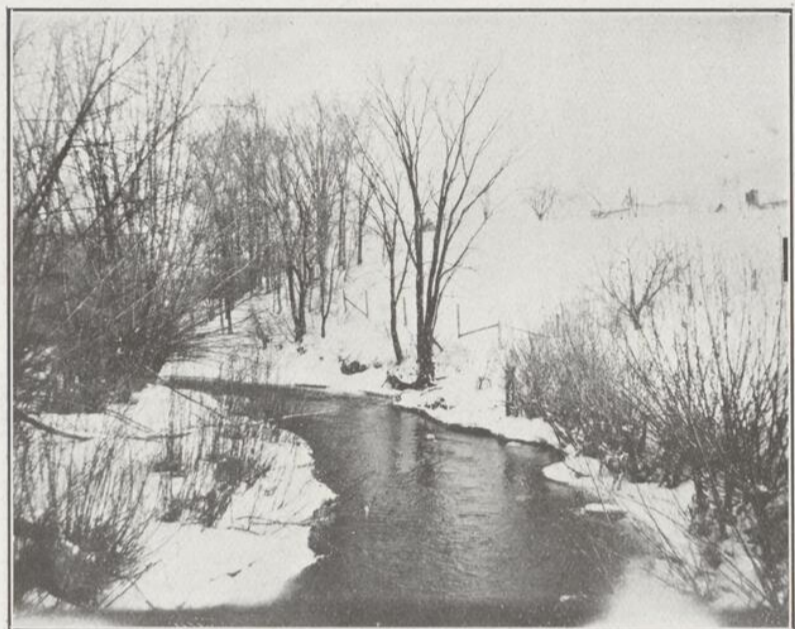
# The Standard's Foreign Travel Series; Flashlight Picture of a Famous Canadian Church Choir

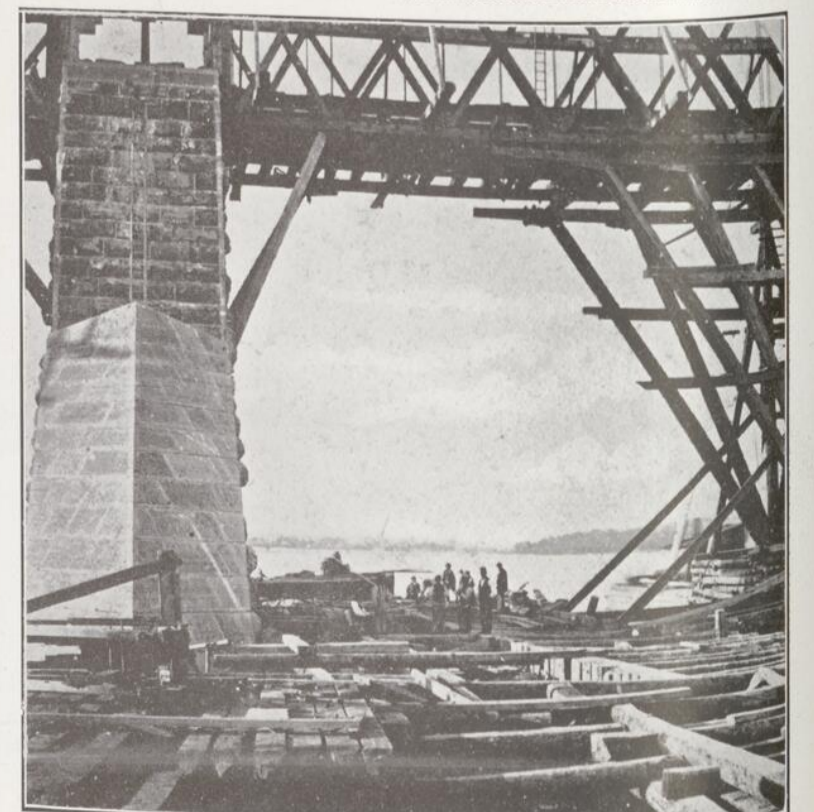

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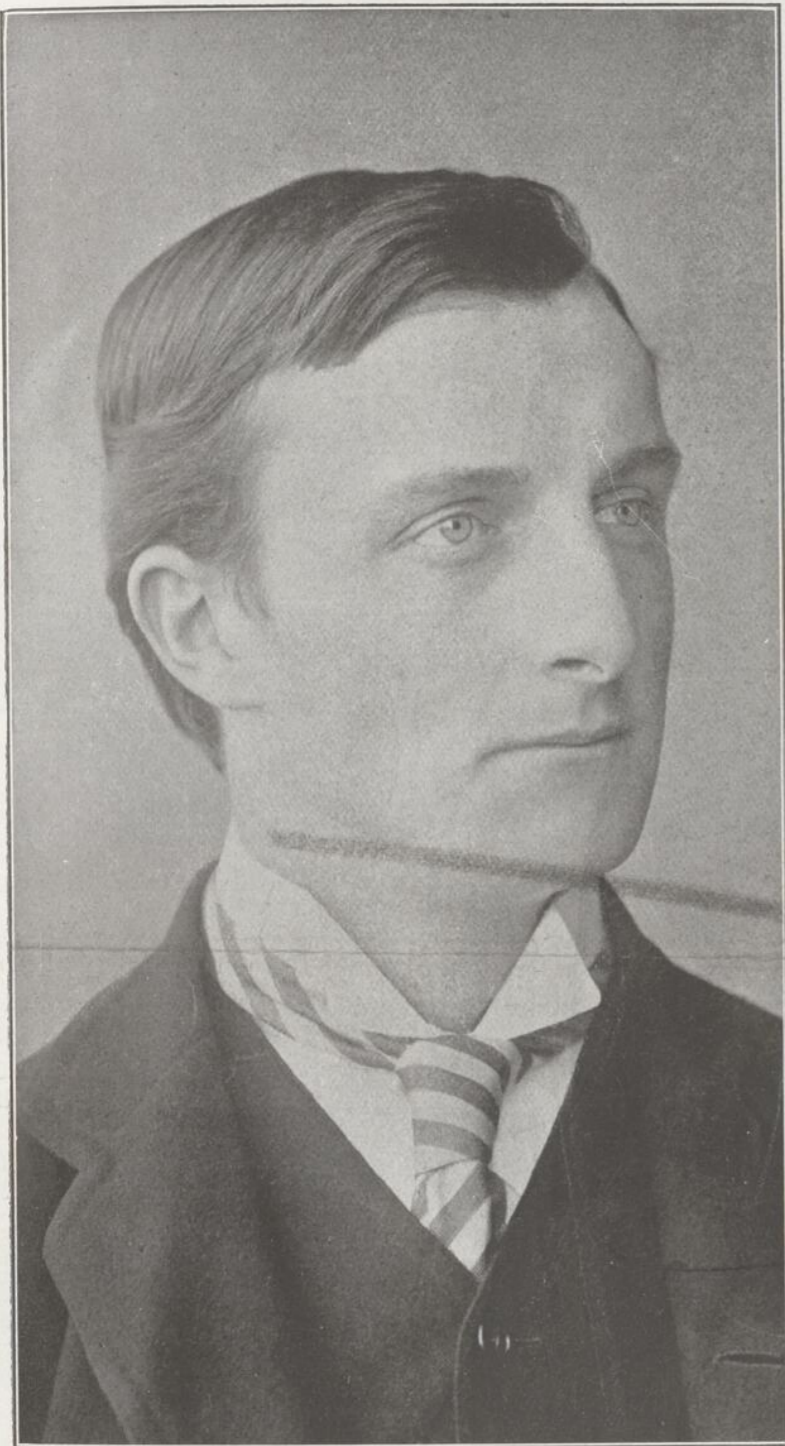
The Standard's Series of Stately Homes of England; Prominent Figures in British Political Life

THE CATHEDRAL OF ST. PETER AT YORK, ENGLAND—This splendid edifice is more popularly known as York Minster. If surpassed by other English cathedrals in certain special features, it, nevertheless, as a whole, is the most striking and imposing specimen of ecclesiastical architecture in England. Its extreme length is 524 feet, its breadth at the transepts 250 feet, and the height of its central and western towers 213 and 202 feet respectively. The choir and crypt were built by Archbishop Roger between 1154 and 1191; the north transept and central tower by John Romanus between 1228 and 1256; and the nave was commenced by Archbishop Romanus in 1285, and completed in 1345. The western towers date, respectively, from 1432 and 1470.

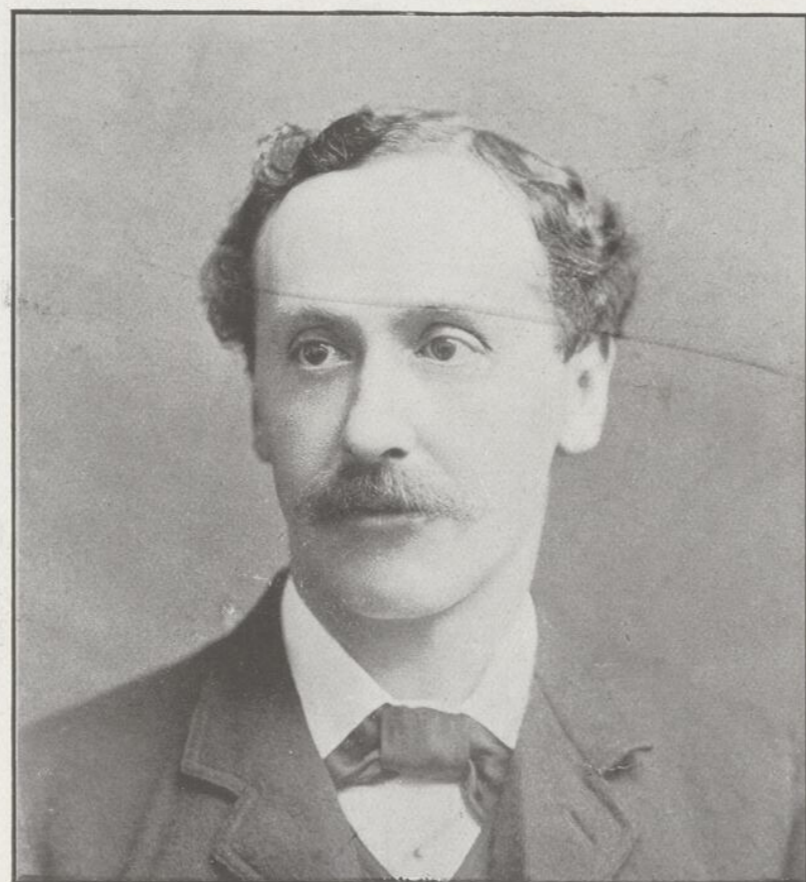


SIR CHRISTOPHER WREN'S GREAT MONUMENT—The west front of St. Paul's Cathedral, London, Eng., where, ten years ago, the imposing outdoor service in connection with the late Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee took place. 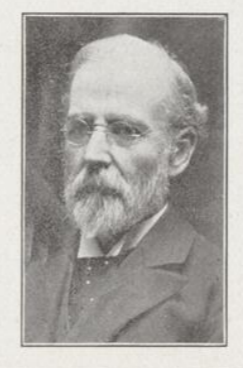

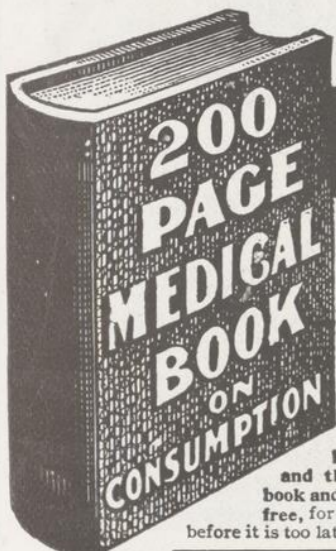

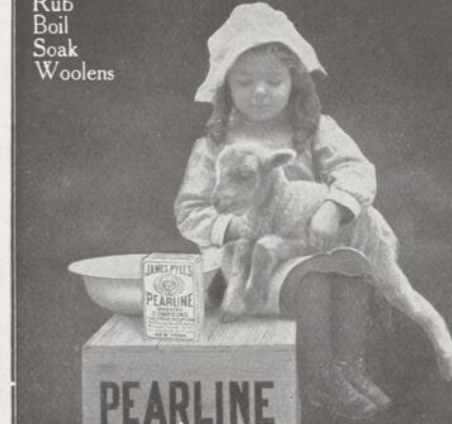

often supplemented with the skin-tight lace sleeve reaching quite to the wrist. Many of these sleeves are of the old-time mitten variety, coming over the back of the hand, and with a slit for the thumb which holds it in place.

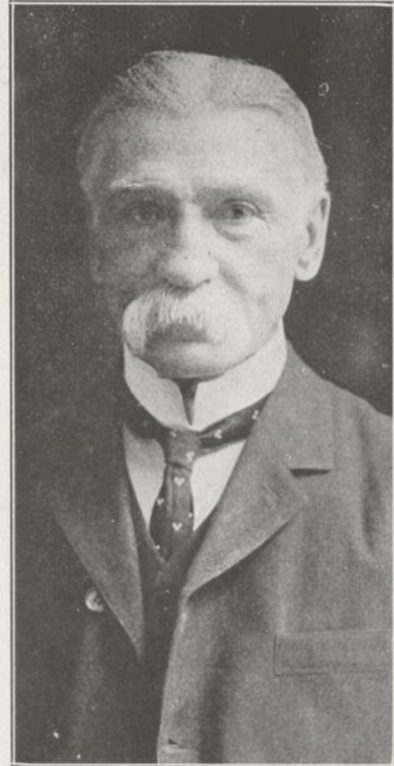
Neither has the long wrinkled glove lost its prestige. It may be predicted that the three-quarter sleeve will take precedence over the quite long ones for the spring and summer.

The early models show that many tailors are returning to the normal armhole, with the sleeves more or less reproducing those of a riding habit; the joining at the armhole is, however, often dissimulated by a narrow stitched epaulet or jockey. Many of these sleeves are of the wrist length, or in the dresser toilette in three-quarter effects. Other Model-makers show the sleeve cut in a piece with the garment, but the tendency is to less baggy effect, the sleeve fitting quite close below the elbow and finished with a flaring French guard cuff or elaborate passementerie ornament.

The short skirt so much in favor almost necessitates plating; women are growing weary of this oft-repeated fashion. Many of the new models are cut en forme, very close at the top and wide at the foot. They show an elaborate pattern of soutache, a design in stitched bias bands of cloth, or sometimes a little embroidery and braid combination. The skirt, be it short or long, is finished with a girde usually

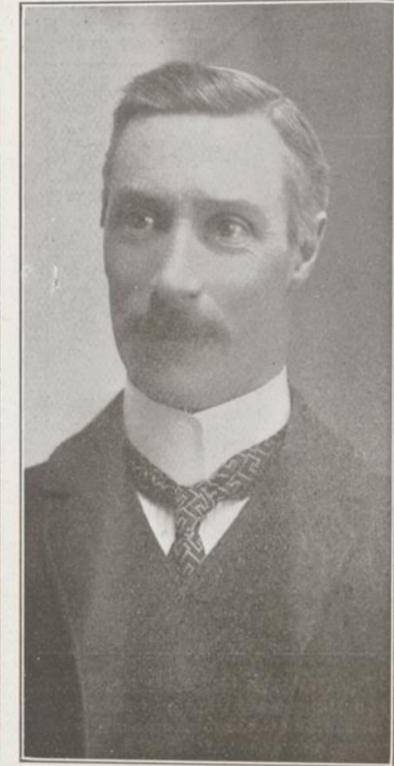

Indian allies. ## Paris Says Sulphur Will Be a Prevailing Tint This Year.

THE Paris establishments are busy evolving the spring styles; the few models shown up to the present follow along the lines formulated during the winter. While it is the rule that the extreme slenderness of contour be preserved, there are a number of styles from which to choose, for it is not every woman who cares to resemble a serpent.

The French woman never adopts an unbecoming fashion, hence the necessity of making models for women of radically differing styles. The princess still preserves its popularity, although it has submitted to a number of variations, one of which has been evolved from the classic costumes of ancient Greece.

The new coat models, reveal more changes in detail than cut. Tailored coats shown at Redfern's are of the jaunty shooting-jacket shape, with belted back and straight fronts, the bias folds simulating a deep yoke. A coat of this description of English heather mixture was finished with collar and cuffs of self-colored cloth and worn over a skirt of dull shadow stripes, so cut that while the top was girth-fitting, it flared out in pronounced ripples crossed by lines of braid dotted with tailor buttons.

The semi-long sleeve will be the note of the spring. This rather loose sleeve reaching half-way below the elbow is

gruous. Skirts of gowns shown for the spring are carefully adjusted to the figure, so that all the fullness is pushed toward the back, the front remaining quite plain. The dip back, evidenced in the long-pointed train first shown by Worth, and the dip coat, are still the dominant note, counterbalanced by the short waist line of the bodice, which in most cases is raised above the normal line in the back, while the front remains in its proper place.

Sulphur is one of the favorite coming tints, having almost supplanted chaudron or copper.

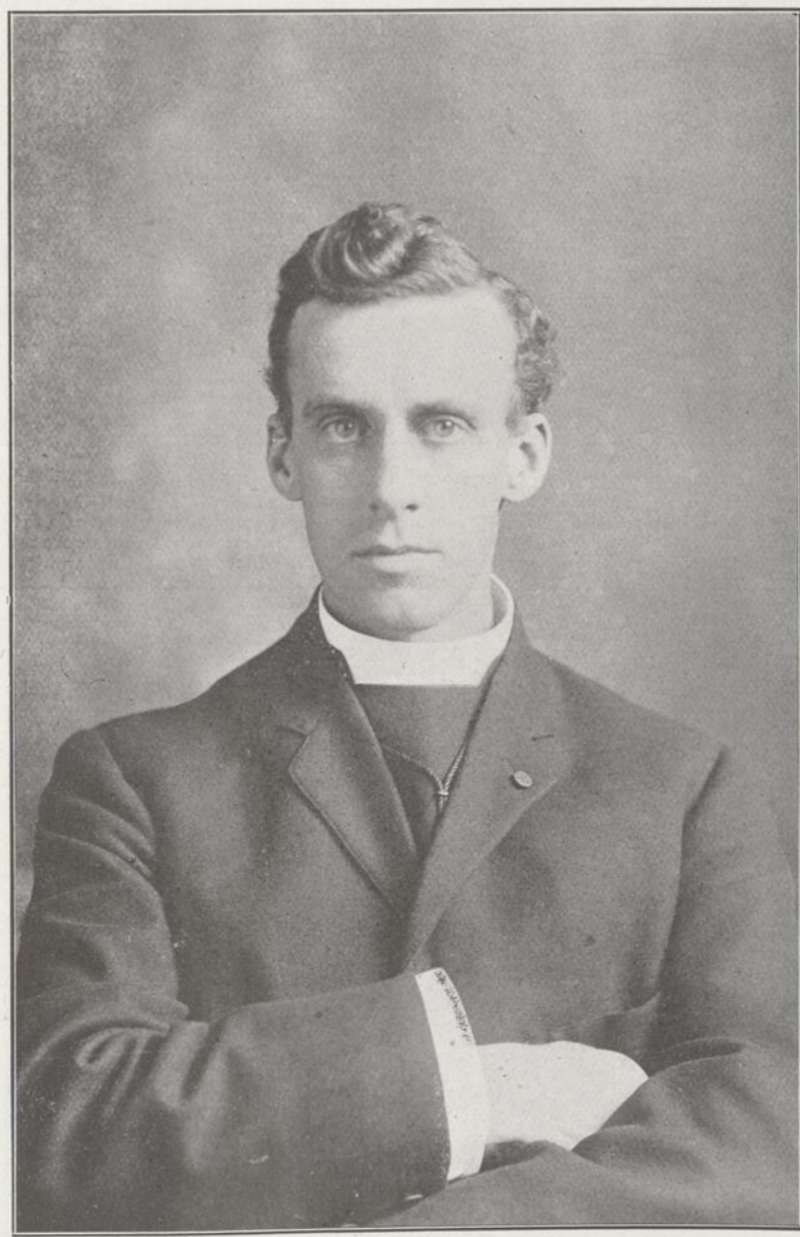

Infinite care has been expended on every detail, not a discordant note in color or cut marring the unity of the whole. ## A New Canadian Baronet.

THE accession of Sir Gordon Johnson, as fifth Baronet, to the family title recalls two incidents: the signal services to the Crown of the founder of the family, and of his son's unselfish devotion to that Crown at the loss of an immense fortune.

William Johnson, of Johnson Hall, near the Mohawk, in the then colony, and now State of New York, an Irish gentleman, was, like Clive, a natural leader of men and of soldiers. He also possessed in a marked degree that secret to which British supremacy has been most indebted for its success with races of all shades of color—his word was his bond—that which Johnson promised to do, he performed, and Britain was respected and obeyed by the Red men.

There were but two Baronets created in America up to the declaration of independence, and, for that matter, for long afterwards. Both were conferred in a large measure for military
