A UNITED STATES OF INDIA MAY BE FINAL RESULT OF CONFERENCE

While There Are Prospects of a Federation Being Agreed Upon, There Still Seems to Be Much Ground to Cover Before This Is Realized—Special Committee May Be Appointed to Study Federal Relations—No Conclusion Reached by Conference Itself—Number of Amendments Were Submitted.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The Round Table Conference advances towards Indian federation, a United States of India, but there is much ground to be covered.

The business committee of the conference today laid before the plenary session recommendations for the creation of a special committee of thirty-two members. This special committee would study federal relations. The conference proper did not reach a formal conclusion, for a number of amendments were submitted and the recommendations, therefore, went back to the business committee for further consideration.

In the terms of the business committee's recommendation, the federal relations committee "would consider the structure of a federal system of government in India, as regards relations between the Indian states and British India; and relations between the provinces of British India and the centre; and recommend the main principles to be applied."

It proposed that R. H. Wedgwood Benn, Secretary of State for India, should preside over this special committee, and that its membership should consist of six members of the British delegation; ten from the Indian states delegation and sixteen from the British India delegation. The services of a skilled draftsman should be placed at the disposal of the committee.

The federal relations committee should also, it was recommended, be empowered to suggest, if necessary, the appointment of sub-committees, not necessarily confined to members of the main committee, to consider special subjects.

Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald intimated that various proposed amendments to the structure of this special committee had been submitted. Until these were considered by the business committee he did not propose to put its conclusions formally before the conference. No objection was raised to this course and the recommendations consequently went back again.

The Maharajah of Alwar, ranking native ruler of India, who always wears a circlet of diamonds in his turban, was not enchanted with the word "Federation" as a mere form of expression. To him the "United States of India" sounded more grand, he said.

"The problems of India are more complicated, and more momentous than the problems of any other country," he continued. Race, religion, language, government, all add to the complexities. But a United States of India, united in a common way to work out Indian national aims, would form the shortest and quickest route to dominion status in the British Empire.

Lord Peel, one of the British Conservative delegates and former Secretary of State for India, thought "we should attempt perhaps to lay some stones immediately on which that great federal idea can be built." He cited a statement by Lord Irwin, Viceroy of India, before the Indian Legislative Assembly last January, and declared that declaration held no promise of immediate translation into fact of the full measure of dominion status. Dominion status was pointed out then as a goal "which might be attained in a swift way or in a shorter time if things go well with the political development of India."

"While, therefore, we are united on the goal we may differ as to the pace or rapidly with which we may attain that goal," Lord Peel said. He declared that apart from legal and constitutional rights founded on acts of Parliament, Great Britain's position in India, and her services to India, have given her a strong claim for consideration on moral grounds.

MANY INJURED AT PATNA AS POLICE AND RIOTERS CLASH

Police Forced to Fire on Mob Celebrating Jawaharlal Day—Stones Thrown at Officials.

PATNA, India, Nov. 18.—Many police were injured and three civilians were wounded by police shots in charges growing out of celebration yesterday at Muzaffarpur of "Jawaharlal Day" in honor of the imprisoned pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, President of the All India National Congress.

Three thousand persons formed a procession which was declared unlawful and was ordered to disperse, but, according to official report, refused to do so, the participants stoning the police. The police charged the gathering, firing seven shots before the disturbance was quelled.

FERGUSON MAY BE NAMED HIGH COMMISSIONER

Rumor Says that Premier Bennett Has Discussed Appointment of Ontario's Premier for London Post With British Prime Minister and that All Details Have Been Arranged.

TORONTO, Nov. 18.—It was reported this morning that reliable information had come from Ottawa to the effect that Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Premier of Ontario, would be appointed as High Commissioner for Canada in the United Kingdom.

It was stated that Premier Bennett discussed the appointment with the British Prime Minister during his sojourn in London and that the necessary preliminaries have been completed.

"An announcement is not made by Sir George Perley, acting Prime Minister, in the meantime, it is understood the Prime Minister will make a public statement shortly after his return from England at the end of the month.

LEVINE LAUGHS AT CHARGES OF MONEY FORGING

Noted American Aviation Enthusiast Held by Vienna Police on Charges of Intended Counterfeiting.

VIENNA, Nov. 18.—From his prison cell, Charles A. Levine, who, Vienna police say, is a United States aviation enthusiast, today ridiculed allegations of suspicion of intention of forgery which yesterday brought his arrest.

Levine was taken into custody at Semmering Spa, where he was resting, and brought to Vienna. Police said they found a ticket to Venice in his possession at the time of his arrest.

The Vienna police president said that Levine had given orders to a Vienna engraver for metal dies and matrices to enable him to counterfeit French two franc, one franc, and one half franc pieces as issued by the French Chamber of Commerce.

He said also that in Levine's baggage had been found correspondence revealing an order at Leipzig for machinery serving to forge money and other letters discussing an order for counters to be used at international gambling resorts.

The police president said that since the bare preparations for forging money constitutes a crime in Austria Levine must stand trial in Vienna.

ATTORNEY HINTS AT POSSIBLE REVENGE

PARIS, Nov. 18.—The Paris edition of the Chicago Tribune in a Vienna despatch today said that Dr. Koretz, Charles A. Levine's Vienna attorney, had stated that the charge against his client was laughable and that today's investigation would bring his exoneration and freedom.

It was out of the question, Dr. Koretz said, "for a man of such position and such wealth to undertake counterfeiting notes of such a small unit as two francs, or twenty francs. He told me emphatically that he was innocent and suspected someone of seeking revenge against him."

VANCOUVER PIONEER HAD MANY RELATIVES IN EAST

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 18.—Lemuel G. Munn, sixty-six, one of the pioneers of Vancouver, brother of D. J. Munn, of Montreal, died here suddenly Saturday. Mr. Munn was a native of Prince Edward Island, and came to British Columbia in 1888. Besides his brother in Montreal, he has two other brothers, Angus, of Vancouver, and H. H. of Victoria. He is also survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. Alice McLennan, of Prince Edward Island.

DOCTOR GOES INSANE AFTER CAUSING CHILDREN'S DEATH

Thirty-Three Youngsters in Colombia Hospital Have Slight Chance of Recovery Following Mistake.

MEDELEN, Colombia, Nov. 18.—Gonzalo Ramirez, a young hospital interne, said by officials to have administered diphtheria toxin which caused the deaths of sixteen children in a private hospital, has become insane. Ramirez had just completed his training as a physician, and hospital authorities said he mistook toxin for anti-toxin. Thirty-three other children inoculated were still alive today but physicians said they had small chance to survive.

WILL REBUILD MOTORS BEFORE ATLANTIC TRIP

Dr. Dornier Denies Report that Twelve German Motors Were to Be Replaced by British Engines.

BORDEAUX, France, Nov. 18.—Dr. Claude Dornier, inventor and builder of the DO-X, giant German seaplane, today said that it had been decided to take down the twelve motors of the ship when it reached Lisbon and have them replaced carefully and fully inspected before the plane proceeds across the Atlantic to New York.

He said that his plans call for no alteration in the number or type of the engines. The explanations were in answer to reports from England that he would replace the present twelve motors with eight 900 horsepower British engines.

Experts here believe that the difficulty the DO-X has been having is not so much with the motors as with the magnets, a report which is lent some color by departure of an engineer of the firm which made the magnets for Lisbon to be on hand when the seaplane reaches there.

LLOYD GEORGE ATTACKS LABOR ON PALESTINE

Liberal Leader Characterizes White Paper as Having Been Written by Anti-Semitic Officials.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Administration of the British mandate in Palestine was vigorously attacked in the House of Commons yesterday by Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, Liberal leader, and as vigorously defended by the Laborite Government.

At the conclusion of the debate between the former Premier and Dr. Ramsay MacDonald, Under-Secretary of State for the Colonies, Premier Ramsay MacDonald reaffirmed the Government's intention to carry out the mandate's terms in full.

Mr. Lloyd George, in an attack on the Government's recent white paper on its policy in Palestine, declared he could only understand it on the supposition it was written by anti-Semitic officials.

He contended the Jews were made responsible for Palestine's unemployment troubles, and even were held to blame when they were murdered. He asserted the white paper has been generally regarded as a practical revocation of the mandate, and declared "if the Government cannot work the mandate it should be handed back to the League of Nations."

Quoting the text of the Balfour declaration, he said the idea was not only to give an opportunity to the Jews for colonization and settlement, but the dominant idea was the establishment of a Jewish national home in Palestine.

"It was an idea accepted at a critical moment in our fate," he said. "It was a pledge of honor by some of the greatest nations on earth, including the British Empire, which we are called upon to honor."

NEW YORK MAN CONFESSES TO BRIDGEPORT SHOOTING

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Nov. 18.—Jerome Melville, thirty-eight, of New York, last night confessed, State's Attorney William H. Conkey announced, that he shot and critically wounded Sergeant Amos R. Anderson yesterday in Darien.

At the same time, police said they had established after five hours of questioning that Melville, who Norwalk police thought might be Frederick Burke, notorious midwest gangster, was the proprietor of a battery station in New York.

POINCARÉ WAS DENOUNCED BY SOVIET PRESS

Attack Is Apparently Aftermath of Indictment Last Week of Eight Alleged Counter-Revolutionary Leaders and Publication of Their "Confessions."

MOSCOW, Nov. 18.—The government-inspired Soviet press today launched a bitter double-barreled attack on Raymond Poincaré, former French President and Premier, and "French imperialism."

The attack apparently is an aftermath of indictment last week of eight alleged counter-revolutionary leaders and publication of their "confessions" of negotiations with M. Poincaré, Briand and other European political figures for foreign intervention in the U.S.S.R.

Practically the entire space in today's issue of Izvestia and Pravda, official organs, is devoted to a scathing denunciation of M. Poincaré and to publication of two articles by him appearing in the Paris Excelsior of October 30th and November 15th.

The Russian papers' editorials point to the first article as proving M. Poincaré's hatred of the Soviet Government and to the second article, which appeared after the counter-revolutionary indictments as revealing a "change of tone in order to conceal his leading role in the preparation for intervention in the U.S.S.R."

Newspapers refer to M. Poincaré as "Poincaré-war," and it would appear exhaust their vocabularies in describing the French statesman, whom both accuse, not only of planning intervention in Russia, but of being the principal instigator in the Great War.

Izvestia says: "No Arabian perfume nor seas of topographical paint will wash the blood from M. Poincaré's hands, or wipe from his forehead the brand 'Poincaré-war.' He is now the shadow of the future, the shadow of bloody events of the future."

FIFTH DAY OF FOG TIES UP ALL TRAFFIC

Sea and Air Traffic from Canadian Border to Florida Virtually Suspended, While Land Vehicles Crawl on Slippery Pavements.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—New York and the Atlantic seaboard entered their fifth day today of low-lying fog and wintry rain and the end was not yet.

From the Canadian border to the tip of Florida, traffic on land and sea and in the air was crippled by the misty mantle and its sister element. Points as far inland as Pittsburgh were affected by fog, and Boston and Jacksonville, Fla., were under continued bombardment from the clouds. Sea commerce moved slowly, land vehicles crept on slippery pavements and flights were held to a minimum.

FORMER KING HUSSEIN, ONE-TIME RULER OF ARABIA, DIES IN EXILE

Death of Romantic Figure, Who Was So Closely Associated With Lawrence of Arabia and Gave His Support to Allied Forces, Occurred on Island of Cyprus—His Two Sons Now Rule Irak and Trans-Jordan—Downfall of Hussein Followed Revolt of Ibn Saud, Powerful Wahabi Chieftain.

BAGDAD, Irak, Nov. 18.—Former King Hussein of the Hedjaz, one of the most romantic figures in the Arab revolt against Turkey in which Lawrence of Arabia played so prominent a part in World War days, died today in exile on the Island of Cyprus.

At the moment of his death, his son, King Feisal of Irak, was roused to his father's side, having received word of the former king's grave condition.

Hussein, who was one of the most picturesque and powerful rulers in Arabia in many years, threw his support to the allied powers in the Great War.

Thrones were found for his sons, Feisal and Abdullah, who now rule Irak and Trans-Jordan, but fate was not so kind to Hussein himself. In 1924 Ibn Saud, the Wahabi chieftain whose power had been rising rapidly, revolted and drove Hussein from his throne and into exile.

Little was known of the Arab chieftain, Hussein, until largely influenced by the famous Lawrence of Arabia in 1917, he led a revolt against Turkey and declared the independence of his country with himself as king.

His forces, under his sons, Feisal and Abdullah, had been respectively kings of Irak and Trans-Jordan, and valuable service as auxiliaries of the British army which conquered Palestine and Syria.

After the war Hussein became King of the Hedjaz, and later assumed the title of Caliph, which brought the enmity of the famous Ibn Saud. Ibn in 1924, raised the banner of revolt and marched on Mecca, inciting revolts on the way.

Meanwhile the Government with Hussein's family had been removed to Jeddah, the port of Mecca on the Red Sea where he appealed to both the British Government and the League of Nations to be saved.

In October, 1924, King Hussein resigned from both the Hedjaz Kingdom and the Moslem Caliphate throne. He said it was his chief desire to protect the holiest of holy Moslem cities, Mecca, from being a centre of strife.

Since then Hussein has been in exile and lately was living on the Island of Cyprus.

FINAL TRIBUTE OF RESPECT TO LATE SPEAKER

Many Representative Citizens from Various Sections of Province and Elsewhere Attended Funeral of Late Hon. Adolphe Turgeon.

QUEBEC, Nov. 18.—Citizens of the Ancient Capital, joined by sorrowing friends from many other sections of the Province and elsewhere in Canada, paid their final tribute of respect yesterday morning to the memory of the late Hon. Adolphe Turgeon, Speaker of the Legislative Council, as the body was carried from his home in the Parliament Buildings along the Grande Allée to his parish church of the Sacred Heart of Mary.

The body was received by Rev. Father de la Cotardière, parish priest, Mgr. E. C. Laflamme, chaplain of the Council, and Mgr. Joseph Roy, as deacon and Rev. Father Marie Louis Belleau, Rector of the Louis College, Rev. Father of the Levis College of which Hon. Mr. Turgeon had been a student. At one of the side altars low mass was celebrated by Rev. Father F. X. Lefebvre, parish priest of Beaumont, a little village in Bellechasse County where Mr. Turgeon was born. In the choir were Mgr. Plante, Auxiliary Bishop of Quebec; Mgr. J. Halle, Apostolic Vicar of Northern Ontario; Mgr. Omer Cloutier, Mgr. François Pelletier, Mgr. Elias Roy, Superior of the Louis College; Rev. Father R. P. Charland, Rev. Father Arsene Roy, and others of the local clergy.

There was a full choral service, admirably rendered by Wilfred Dubéau, choir master, and George Chouinard, organist, the selections being the Mass of P. A. Yon and Le Libera de Perosi. R. Blanchet sang "Miserere Mei" by Steinman at the Sanctus, and at the close of the service, Romeo Faguy and Louis Gravel sang the "Crucifix de la Paix." Madame Athanasie Guy also sang the "Ave Sainte Demissa."

THICK BLANKET OF SNOW TODAY COVERED UTAH

Storm Was Cause of Wrecking Aeroplane, Injuring Pilot, Trapping Woodchopper and Forcing Hunters to Shelter.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Nov. 18.—A thick blanket of snow covered Utah today, spread by a storm which yesterday wrecked an aeroplane and injured the pilot, trapped a woodchopper on a mountain road and drove hunters to shelter.

Ray Peck, pilot of the National Parks Airways, crashed his plane on the shore of the great Salt Lake during the storm. Cut and bruised he wandered for hours in the swirling snow before finding his way to a farm house.

Fear was felt for the safety of Allan Larson, twenty-five, woodchopper, who was last seen walking in a snow storm between Thistle Junction and Springville.

CREW WORKED ALL NIGHT TO SAVE VESSEL

Sea Quieted Somewhat During Night, Which Made Outlook More Encouraging for Freighter Harry Bowen, Which Grounded in Fog Yesterday.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—The Freighter Harry Bowen, which went aground in a heavy fog yesterday, still was perched on a rocky shelf off Montauk Point today and her crew of thirty-five still was aboard.

Coast guardsmen planned to refloat the ship at high tide today. The crew manned the pumps all night and declined to leave the ship, although a breeches buoy had been rigged as a precautionary measure. The sea quieted during the night and offered hope that the craft could be removed without further damage.

Two other vessels went aground yesterday. Twenty-two fishermen were taken from the trawler Petrel, stranded off Block Island and a score or more were rescued from the fishing steamer Tatler, which grounded nearby as it was answering a S.O.S. from the Harry Bowen.

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 18.—Premier John Bracken, of Manitoba, who acted as spokesman for the Prairie Premiers who conferred here yesterday with banking interests, declined to comment upon a report that he and his colleagues would seek a bonus from the Federal Government, as a means of relieving the plight of the farmers in western Canada. Neither would Mr. Bracken confirm nor deny a report that the Dominion government would be urged to set up a grain stabilization corporation, similar to the one now functioning in the United States, as another emergency measure.

NICKEL COMPANY SPENDING LARGE SUMS FOR WORKLESS

Hundred Thousand Dollars Appropriated for System of Civic Improvements at Copper Cliff, Ont.

SUDBURY, Ont., Nov. 18.—Expenditure of \$100,000 for unemployment relief purposes, has been authorized by the board of directors of the International Nickel Company, it was announced yesterday by J. L. Agnew, vice-president.

A programme of civic improvement, involving road widening, and sewer construction in the town of Copper Cliff, will be undertaken immediately, while other projects are under consideration, it was stated.

COPPER ISSUES SHOW STRENGTH ON MINES LIST

In Spite of Strength of Noranda and Amulet, Index Figure of Mining Issues Fell from 59.9 to 59.3 During Week.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 18.—The weighted index number of seventeen mining stocks computed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on the base 1926 equals 100 was 59.3 for the week ending November 13th as compared with 59.9 for the previous week.

Eleven gold stocks fell from 57.7 to 56.1. Gold copper stocks represented by Amulet and Noranda rose from 76.3 to 80.4. Four silver and miscellaneous stocks remained at 26.2.

Among the gold stocks the weekly average prices were: Premier fell from 78 to 75; Dome from \$8.62 to \$8.30; Hollinger from \$5.82 to \$5.76; McIntyre from \$17.79 to \$17.76; Lake Shore from \$21.18 to \$21.02; Sylvanite from 60c to 58c; Teck Hughes from \$5.98 to \$5.82 and Wright Harrogate from \$1.69 to \$1.65.

Average weekly prices were higher for both of the gold copper stocks. Amulet rose from 29c to 31c and Noranda from \$15.67 to \$16.53.

In the silver and miscellaneous group, Mining Corporation rose from 94c to 98c. Nipissing fell from \$1.12 to \$1.03.

PARTLY CLOUDY AND MILD

The area of high pressure over the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the deep maintained stationary, while the depression centred near Churchill yesterday has moved northward, and another depression now covers the Southwestern States. RATHER BRIEF MEETING WAS HELD BY CITY ALDERMEN LAST EVENING

Question as to Whether or Not City Should Insert Advertisement in Local Paper Brought Forth Various Opinions—Aldermen Newton and Fortier Express Same Ideas as on Former Occasion—Other Members Appear to Have Changed Their Views—Recommendations of City Treasurer and City Clerk Regarding Closing of City Hall Offices on Saturday Afternoons Adopted.

AUSTRALIAN TO ATTEMPT TRIP OVER PACIFIC

Kingsford-Smith Planning 4,800 Mile Trip in Newly Constructed Plane.

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 18.—R. H. Kingsford-Smith, Oakland shipping executive, announced today that his famous brother, Wing Commander Charles Kingsford-Smith, was planning a non-stop flight across the Pacific from San Francisco Bay to Tokyo.

The plans were revealed in a letter from the Australian flier, who said he expected to have a new plane named the Southern Cross to negotiate the 4,800 miles. The new plane would be designed to have a cruising radius of 6,000 miles to allow sufficient margin for possible adverse winds.

Kingsford-Smith's westward flight across the Atlantic several months ago was followed by an announcement that in view of his forthcoming marriage he would do no more ocean flying. He recently flew from England to Australia over the eastward route.

As the Record had done several months ago, La Tribune addressed a letter to the City Council, asking that the City insert a page advertisement in a special edition which is to be issued at the end of the present month. BANK CAUSES RESIGNATION OF MINISTER

Failure of French Financial House Leads to Opposition Attacks on Minister of Justice Raoul Peret.

PARIS, Nov. 18.—The savage attack of which he was the target in the Chamber of Deputies last Friday resulted yesterday in the resignation of Raoul Peret, Minister of Justice in the Tardieu Cabinet.

Senator Henri Chéron, Minister of Finance in the Poincaré Cabinet, accepted the post of Minister of Justice.

Spokesmen for the Opposition made a direct charge of malfeasance in office Friday during debate on the Government's financial policies, accusing the Minister of accepting appointments to the Poincaré Cabinet on the basis of the Ostric Bank, which recently failed, after he had permitted listing of Ostric stocks on the Bourse while he was Minister of Finance.

He explained his connection with the bank and his personal friendship for Albert Ostric, its head, to the satisfaction of the Chamber, and Tardieu himself gave the Minister his unqualified support.

Through the week-end the Premier had been urged to revamp his Cabinet to get out from under the burden of opposition becoming overwhelming, but Tardieu, whose clever management of Friday's debate won a vote of confidence for his Minister of Justice, was reluctant to remove him.

Pressure became so strong upon him, however, that he accepted Peret's resignation when it was offered last evening.

Alderman Fortier pointed out that he had favored granting the request made by the Record, as he thought that this was a good means of advertising and he was again ready to take the same stand and support La Tribune. The local newspapers were serving the city well, he said, and there was no reason why the City Council should not co-operate and assist the papers in anything which was to the benefit of the city.

Alderman Newton also took the same attitude he had taken when the Record's request was discussed. He opposed having a page advertisement inserted in the Record, because he did not see that the city derived much benefit from advertising of this kind, and whether right or wrong, he was prepared to take the same stand in connection with La Tribune.

Alderman Newton took advantage of the occasion to again remind his conferees of the five hundred dollars which the city had spent a short time ago to have an advertisement inserted in a Montreal paper, from which he felt, little benefit had been derived.

Alderman Fortier, who is acting chairman of the Finance Committee during the absence of the chairman, also opposed the request, saying that he had voted against the Record's request and he felt the same way in connection with the other local paper.

Alderman Bradley did not express his views to any extent, but he said that in his opinion it would be wise for the Finance Committee to study this question of advertising the city and try to find out just what was the best method to adopt.

Alderman Hebert was of the opinion that at the present time the city should not go in for advertising too heavily. There were many people out of work and by bringing before the public the advantages of Sherbrooke, some people might be induced to come here expecting to find employment, which would simply increase the number who are at present seeking work.

The matter was finally put to a vote and it was decided by a four to three majority that the advertisement would be inserted in La Tribune. Those supporting the motion were Aldermen Lacombe, Bradley, Fortier and the Chairman of the Parks and Real Estate Committee, who was the original proposer of the motion. Those voting against were Aldermen Newton, Hebert and Forest.

The only other matter of importance to come before last evening's brief meeting was the question of closing the City Hall offices on Saturday afternoons. This is a matter which has been the cause of considerable comment and a division of opinion among the aldermen.

This matter was discussed at several previous meetings and it was

COUNCIL HELD BUSY SESSION AT B. CROSSING

Power Contract Submitted to Council at Regular Session—Dudswell School Board Met.

BISHOP'S CROSSING, Nov. 14.—At a regular meeting of the Municipal Council, which was held recently, it was decided that the contract submitted by the Shawinigan Water and Power Company, to furnish electric current to the municipality of the village of Bishop's Crossing, would be more fully considered by the council. The following change was advised, that the minimum charge of the house lighting be seventy-five cents per month and that other changes suggested by the municipal attorney be considered.

The council also approved the report submitted by Mr. B. A. Gilbert, caretaker of the town hall, which showed the total receipts and expenditures for the building during the month of October.

School Board Met.

A special meeting of the Protestant Board of School Commissioners of Dudswell, in the County of Wolfe, was held in the Town Hall, Bishop's Crossing, when it was decided that the following changes be made in the valuation roll of the school municipality of Dudswell, namely: Lot 17d, range 3, value \$4,000. Lot 2B, range 3, value \$420, be changed from John L. Matheson to the City of Sherbrooke. It was moved that the secretary-treasurer of this school board be authorized to call for tenders for twenty cords of two foot long blackwood, good sound hard wood of maple, beech and birch to be fifty per cent or more of maple, to be delivered at the Bishop's Crossing Intermediate School building, Bishop's Crossing.

It was moved that there be levied upon the real property situated in the school municipality of Dudswell, an assessment of thirteen mills on the dollar to pay the current expenses of this school board, for the scholastic year of 1930-31. The assessment becomes due when called for by the secretary-treasurer of this school board.

It was moved that the rate of school fees for the attendance of school pupils to the Protestant schools of the municipality shall be as follows: Grades one to five inclusive twenty-five cents per month; grades six to seven, forty cents per month and grades eight, nine and ten seventy-five cents per month. A fee for pupils who live outside of this school municipality and attend school in this municipality shall remain at the same rate as for the scholastic year of 1930-31.

It was moved that all arrears of school taxes and school fees due this municipality and paid on or before November 15th, will be given to the bailiff for collection.

MAN KNOWN IN BEDFORD DIES FROM INJURIES

Hon. Julian P. Rixford, of San Francisco, Cal., Whose Family Was Connected With Early Industrial Life of Bedford, Passed Away Following Accident—Bedford Notes.

BEDFORD, Que., Nov. 18. — A telegram was received by the Rixford family, of East Highgate, Vt., telling of the death of the Hon. Julian P. Rixford, of San Francisco, Calif. The late Hon. Rixford was of a family well known in this district and closely associated with the early industrial life of Bedford.

Mr. Rixford was born in East Highgate ninety-two years ago, being the eldest son of Luther Rixford and the eldest brother of the late Hon. Oscar S. Rixford, of East Highgate. Julian Rixford was the father of Dr. Emmett Rixford, Mrs. W. W. Sargent, L. P. Rixford and Mrs. B. C. Byrd. He was a former expert of the United States Department of Agriculture and the oldest member of the Commonwealth Club. He died at a Palo Alto hospital from injuries received when he was struck by a south bound Southern Pacific train at Los Altos station. The immediate cause of his death was shock, due to his advanced age, and a brain concussion.

With Mr. Rixford, at the time of his death, was his son, Dr. Emmett Rixford, of San Francisco, who had been hastily summoned to his bedside and three other physicians, Drs. Blake C. Wilbur, eldest son of the late Secretary of the Interior Wilbur, Russell V. Lee and E. P. Roth, all members of Stanford University Medical School staff. Mr. Rixford, whose home was at 1815 Pierce street, San Francisco, was injured when he stepped to board a north-bound train for San Francisco. He was struck squarely by the pilot of the engine and hurled some distance.

Julian Rixford was a leader in California agricultural affairs. He graduated from McGill University in 1864. He went to California three years later, and from 1868 to 1899 was connected with the San Francisco Bulletin. Mr. Rixford's interests in the outdoors and plant life led him to edit a horticultural column. At the age of seventy he entered the Government service. He introduced the pistachio nut commercially into California. He also brought the Smyrna fig to California and was given the gold medal of the Fig. Mr. Rixford retired from the government service last year. He was a brother of the late O. S. Rixford, who established a plant for the manufacturing of axes and scythes in Upper Bedford, which he afterwards moved to East Highgate, Vt., where the plant is in operation at the present time.

ALDERMEN LAST EVENING

The opinion of some aldermen that
the City Hall employees should have
a holiday on Saturday afternoon,
while others favored having the of-
fices open on Saturday as on any
other day of the week. The sugges-
tion had also made that the munici-
pal offices be open on Friday
evenings, but closed on Saturday af-
ternoons. It was finally, however,
decided to ask for a recommendation
from the City Treasurer and the City
Clerk as to what was the best proce-
dure to adopt, without causing any
inconvenience to the citizens.This report, which was submitted
to the Council last evening, favored
having the City Offices open on
Saturday afternoons with four em-
ployees on duty. This would give
the majority of employees a half
holiday and at the same time the
offices would be open to serve the
public as usual. It was also recom-
mended that the offices be closed on
the principal religious and national
holidays of the year.Before this report was adopted the
Chairman of the Parks and Real Es-
tate Committee made an amend-
ment that the matter be referred to
the Finance Committee for consid-
eration, but as this amendment was
defeated by a vote of four to three
the original motion, made by Alder-
man Fortier and seconded by Alder-
man Bradley, that the report of the
Treasurer and City Clerk be adopted
was carried. Those voting against
the amendment were Aldermen La-
comb, Bradley, Hebert and Fortier,
while those supporting it were Alder-
men Newton, Forest and the Chair-
man of the Parks and Real Estate
Committee.After this motion had been passed
the recommendation was adopted by
the Council that in addition to the
four employees to be on duty at the
City Hall on Saturday afternoons,
that one member of the Engineering
Department also be at the Engineer's
Office during the half holiday.

A clause in the report of the Gas

and Electric Committee's report also
brought forth some discussion. This
report favored the expenditure of
\$150 for a broadcast over the radio
in which the advantages of the city
would be explained and during which
the newly-appointed Industrial Com-
missioner would speak.The Chairman of the Parks and
Real Estate Committee, who favored

cessive speed at which many taxis
drove through the city streets. The
fact that the car belonging to Alder-
man Forest was struck by another
automobile on Saturday might have
prompted him to take this action.
The cost of repairing his car, he
said, would amount to about two
hundred dollars.The report of the Finance Com-
mittee recommended that the Pres-
ident of the Sherbrooke Board of
Trade and the Industrial Commis-
sioner be members, ex-officio, of the
Finance Committee in matters of an
industrial nature.Last evening's meeting was a very
brief one and was conspicuous by its
lack of discussions. Only a few mat-

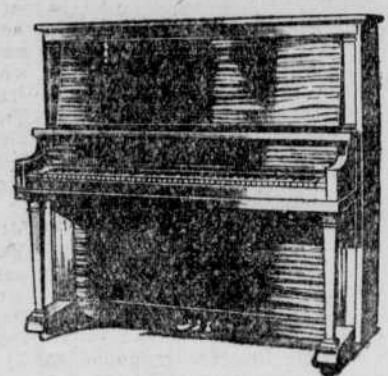

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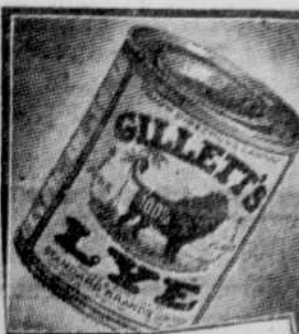

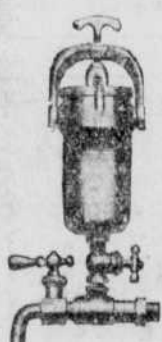

HATLEY CHURCH STAGED ANNUAL SOCIAL EVENT

"Men's Night" Observed in United Church—Interesting Debate Was Conducted—General Notes from Hatley and Surrounding District.

HATLEY, Que., Nov. 18.—"Men's Night," which has become an established feature and annual social event in the United Church, was observed on Wednesday evening, November 12th. In addition to the regular congregation, friends motored in from outside points, the surrounding towns and villages being well represented. The first item on the evening's programme, the supper, spread in the church's dining-hall, was given close attention.

Upon adjourning to the auditorium, after the congregational singing of the hymn "The Church's One Foundation," a second attraction was offered in the way of a spirited debate, between the Church Boards of Ayer's Cliff and Hatley. Resolved: "That the farmer is of greater value to the community than the statesman." The affirmative view of the question was opened by Mr. D. W. Vaughan, of the Hatley United Church, and was met by a well-equipped antagonist in the person of Mr. Hugh McFadden, of Ayer's Cliff. Nothing daunted by Mr. McFadden's logic, Mrs. (Rev.) Seaton rose to the occasion, and not only upheld Mr. Vaughan in his views, but, from a personal stand-point and experience, strongly maintained that the farmer was the spinal column of the entire community. While craftsmen of every kind might eventually perish, all would be well did the farmer alone remain, to minister to the every-day necessities of the household. These arguments met with unbounded applause and from this time, it required no Janus to see how the affair would end, especially as the veteran debater, Mr. J. F. Woodman, was in perfect unison with these remarks. In fact, the combined efforts of Messrs. Arthur Slack and Churchill Moore, of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Ayer's Cliff, were as the dew before the sun.

The judges, who comprised Miss Rogers, principal of the Public School, Messrs. Grant Kendall, of Ayer's Cliff, and Luke Colt, of Massawippi, announced that the affirmative view was doubtless the correct one by status of 37 to 28. NINETY-TWO YEARS AGO.

Long since gone from us and laid to rest are those who figure in the early copy of the Sherbrooke Gazette, bearing the date of March 29th, 1838, and then edited and published by Robert Armour, junior.

There may be those among our subscribers who can recall hearing of the people, and the incidents recorded in this issue of the Gazette, which was a small five-column four-page weekly paper, in which Sword's hotel and Deane's Green House figured as the hotels of the day.

The year 1838 was a momentous one in Canada, and the paper records the measures taken by the Government of Britain to correct the faults which led to the insurrection of '37, so speedily suppressed. Efforts referred to were dealing with an alleged correspondence of the two leaders of the rebellion, William Lyon Mackenzie and Louis J. Papineau, but copies or originals were not forthcoming when Lord Glenelg urged corrective legislation and a new plan of Government for Canada, which passed the House of Lords on February 10th. In this Canada Government Bill the existing conditions were modified so as to ensure their working better hereafter.

But whilst Lord Durham was en route to Canada new trouble was brewing in Beauharnois, and a body of troublesome adventurers awaited their spring rising at Lacolle, which second insurrection was in process of forming whilst Robert Armour was writing about the latest news from London.

Lord John Russell is quoted as replying to those who asked for sanguinary punishment that His Majesty's Government supposed that Sir John Colborne had been informed that the Government did not approve of any capital punishment on occasions of this nature. They had advised clemency. Sir Robert Peel wanted to know if the murderers of Lieut. Weir were to go Scot free, and be pardoned. Viscount Melbourne's administration was in power in England, and the Duke of Wellington took part in the debate on the Lower Canada Bill.

At this time Lower Canada's status as a British province was in question, and the constitution was suspended pending an enquiry into the causes of the insurrection. The Editor of the Gazette urged a speedy resurrection of the constitution in the interests of the affairs of the Eastern Townships, where "we are likely to suffer for want of a Legislature. He urged the preparation of petitions and their speedy presentation."

The story of the loss by fire of Mr. Hughes' home and the narrow escape of C. F. H. Goodhue's residence and also the store of W. Brooks & Co. is told. "How comes it that the town of Sherbrooke has not within its limits a single fire engine, hose, buckets, not even a ladder that could be of service?" This is the question he asks about the glaring deficiency and of the inefficiency of a City Council which persists to this day.

THE MINTAGE OF UNWISDOM.

Because a judge in a minor court in this city tried a case in which he had been financially interested is no reason for us to demand a revolution or recall of the judiciary.

Even though the culprit being tried was a wretch in a wretched calling, it is no palliation of impolitic conduct on the bench.

If a man in a high position is guilty of malfeasance in office he should be punished and this without reflection on the honourable men who serve with the higher principles.

To burn a barn in order to kill all the mice in the granary would be effective, but it would not be wise.

Because two of our railways in Canada were under bad management is no reason why the entire country should be made to suffer the loss of ten millions or more each year, whilst the taxpayers groan under forty different samples of taxation. Nor should the fact of this enormous railway deficit persuade us to put all the other railways and transportation companies under a bread-and-milk diet, and have their enterprises killed by a useless Board of Railway Commissioners.

One man, coming down the Court House steps, after losing his case, was just as sensible when he exclaimed in his wrath, "Let's kill all the lawyers!"

AMATEUR AND PROFESSIONAL EASE ON THE STAGE.

With active living actors on the stage there is always the greater appeal which even the gorgeous talkie-movies can never fulfil to the satisfaction of those who have seen the great celebrities on the dramatic stage. It is a pleasure to hear the real dramatists and actors in their life presentation, and we are sure that the people will not let the drama die because of the stifling competition of the movies. Admit that there has been a falling off in the attendance at the real play, with the resultant reaction of lesser support and the absorption of the players by the great movie corporations. Then shall we have to cultivate the drama through our amateurs. I was at a play in Lennoxville the other evening, and the need of the renaissance came home. The

three playlets were well-selected, and under competent and experienced direction by A. T. Speid, the acting was away above the average looked for on the amateur stage. It was a production such as a larger city would greet with acclaim. One playlet was written by Mr. F. E. Hawkins, a talented member of the staff of Bishop's College School, who displayed his versatility by taking a leading part in the play.

F. R. Pattison, another of the galaxy of teaching skill which the trustees of Bishop's College School rightly claim, was the leading man in another playlet, and in this Mr. Pattison gave a splendid presentation of his skill on the stage.

Others who took part in the crowded Church Hall of St. George's Church on the two evening were: William Watson, leading man in the charming farce, "The Bathroom Door," Lennox Ames, Alex Ames, Miss Catherine Speid, Mrs. McFadden, Mrs. Messenger.

Other neat performances of their particular parts were Wayne Hall, Douglas Christie, Miss Eileen McMurray, Miss Marjorie Hall, Miss Nancy Roberts.

The members of the St. George's Dramatic Society should be invited to borrow a theatre in Sherbrooke for a week, and devote the proceeds of their splendid skill equally between their Lennoxville Church and the Sherbrooke City Library. We could promise them crowded houses, as the fame of their histrionic ability gained the ear of the citizens.

EDITOR'S NOTE BOOK.

General Depression won another victory in the United States. The Democrats, roundly beaten in almost every State a few years ago, made wonderful gains in the elections last week. The dates of the State elections are automatically fixed by law, and the Republicans did not have the advantage as we have in Canada of choosing the date when they should go to the country for a verdict. It is an unwise tactician who will rush his party to the polls in a year of trade depression. The only verdict such a leader can expect is on the issue of whether or not it is time for a change.

When one reads Harry V. Haight's splendid review of engineering development in Canada and the Eastern Townships and considers his talents and endowment as an outstanding consultant in all engineering problems, the reaction should be a presentation of a pumpkin head to each member of the City Council who went outside for the engineering advice they bought and paid for and ignored. The pumpkin would be a good crest for some members of the City Council.

THIS DAY THIRTY YEARS AGO

From the Files of the Sherbrooke Record,
November 18th, 1900.

The British losses in the Boer War were 553 officers and 10,145 soldiers killed and died; 827 officers were missing as prisoners. The Boer losses were estimated at 30,000, of whom 15,500 were prisoners, and their forces in the field had been reduced from 60,000 to 10,000 up to this date.

LISTED STOCK PRICES SHOW SLIGHT DROP

Index Figure of Canadian Industrial Stocks Stood at 122.2 on November 13, Compared With 123.4 on Previous Thursday.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 18.—Investors and traders weighted index numbers of security prices, computed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on the base that 1926 equals 100, were slightly lower for the week ending November 13, as compared with the previous week.

The index of industrial common stocks was 122.2, as compared with 123.4.

The index prices of the twenty-five best selling industrial and public utility common stocks, on the Montreal and Toronto exchanges, was 600.3, as compared with 601.5.

The index of domestic utility common stocks was 104.1, as compared with 105.8.

The index of common stocks of companies located abroad in which Canadians are heavily interested was 82.7, as compared with 84.9.

The index for all three groups of common stocks combined was 109.0 as compared with 111.0.

Average weekly prices were lower for twenty and higher for five of the twenty-five stocks included in the traders' index. Shawinigan fell from \$52.1; C.P.R. "new" from \$42.6 to \$41.1; Montreal Light, Heat and Power "new" from \$54.4 to \$53.8; Dominion Bridge from \$55.0 to \$53.9; Power Corporation from \$52.1 to \$51.0; National Breweries from \$25.7 to \$25.1; International Nickel rose from \$17.5 to \$18.4; Consolidated Mining and Smelting from \$130.9 to \$133.1 and Steel of Canada from \$38.2 to \$40.6.

The five day rally of last week carried the industrial averages, as measured by Dow Jones, forward more than fifteen points. The decline of yesterday cancelled out quite half of this advance. The conclusion to be drawn therefore from this is that stocks should be purchased again today after the selling has been brought to a halt in the early trading. There is a disposition at the present time to look upon the market as having completed a turning movement last week. It is pretty generally believed that the low prices seen at the beginning of last week will furnish the low prices for some time to come. At least purchases can be made with this idea in view. Word continues to come to hand of the excellent type of buying that has made its appearance in the stock market. 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FOUR GAMES IN NATIONAL LOOP THIS EVENING

Leadership of American and Canadian Sections at Stake in Games This Evening.

TORONTO, Nov. 18.—Tonight's National Hockey League schedule of four games should give supporters of the "fastest game on earth" a fairly good indication of the merits of the eight teams engaged.

Toronto Maple Leafs, perched at the top of the Canadian group as the result of three points garnered in a victory and tie at home, battle on foreign ice with their arch rivals, Montreal Maroons. Each team has played two games and from the result of these, indications point to a close struggle. The Maroons played both games away from their home town, losing to Ottawa and New York Americans, respectively. Toronto drew with the Americans in a scoreless match but decisively defeated the weak Philadelphia Quakers.

Last year these teams provided both Montreal and Toronto fans with some hectic exhibitions of hockey and apparently they will continue their rivalry. With King Clancy on their line-up, the Leafs are expected to be a better road team this year, as the dynamic Ottawa product fights as hard on foreign terrain as in his own rink.

The game which many fans have been waiting for takes place in Boston where the Bruins, National Hockey League champions, entertain Montreal Canadiens. Stanley Cup holders, The Flying Frenchmen trounced the Bruins in the world's championship final last season, after the Bostonians had emerged from a grueling series with the hard-hitting Maroons to win the N.H.L. title. Supporters of the Boston team have always claimed Maroons "softened" their favorites so that they were not able to withstand the hurricane rushes of the Bruins.

Both teams appear equally as formidable as last year. Each expects to win the only game played to date. Canadians defeated Ottawa at home, while the Bruins squeezed out a victory over the Americans at Boston.

The Ottawa Senators take to the road when they travel to Philadelphia for a game in that city with the Quakers, formerly the Pittsburgh Pirates. The latter have lost all three games played so far due to the weakness of their defense which has been further weakened by an injury to Roger Smith, which will keep him out of the game for several weeks. It is understood.

Ottawa won their first game by defeating Maroons at home, but lost their second engagement with Canadians. However, they have a fast, well-balanced team and should keep in the running by winning tonight.

Bitter intra-city rivals clash in their first meeting of the season at New York tonight, when Manhattan's representatives in the league Americans and Rangers, clash not only for league honors but for the championship of the city. The team winning the most points in these clashes wins the title, synthetic as it may seem to outsiders.

The Americans are tied for the leadership of the Canadian group at present, having beaten Maroons and tied with the Leafs in three games. Rangers are in second place with three points in the American group.

BOBBY JONES RETIRES FROM COMPETITION

Nowhere on Horizon at Present Time Does There Appear Any-one Who Can Duplicate Jones' Unprecedented Feat of Winning All Four National Titles in a Single Year.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Bobby Jones, master golfer of all time, has retired from competition and left, as a heritage, a wide open battle for the four British and United States national championships he holds.

Nowhere on the horizon at present does there loom any amateur with the golfing gifts needed to duplicate Bobby's unprecedented feat of winning all four national titles in a single year. Perhaps there never will be another Jones. The stocky Atlanta lawyer, alone among amateurs, consistently has beaten the professionals at their own game. Four times he won the United States open against the best pros and amateurs in the game and thrice the British open fell to his amazing skill.

With his retirement, it seems certain that the pros again will dominate both open tournaments, for certainly amateur ranks contain no figure even approaching Jones in shot-making ability or in steadiness under fire.

It is a coincidence, and an odd one, that in the last few months George Von Elm and Johnny Goodman, the only players who have beaten Jones in the United States amateur in the last seven years, both have announced their retirement as amateurs. Von Elm beat Bobby in the final round at Baltusrol in 1926, and Goodman eliminated him in the first round at Pebble Beach in 1929. In every other year the Atlantic emerged the victor.

Jones' retirement, announced in a carefully worded statement, stirred up as much excitement in sporting circles as did that of Gene Tunney as heavyweight champion in 1926.

ATTEMPT TO LIMIT POWER OF SALVATION ARMY HEAD

Understood that Resolution Submitted by Commissioner Lamb Defeated by Narrow Margin.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Morning papers state that the forty-two Salvation Army commissioners now meeting in London defeated by a narrow margin last night a proposal which would have limited the complete autonomy of the general commanding the Salvation Army.

Details were not obtained because of the secrecy with which the conference is conducted, but it was said that the meeting was stormy and that the margin of victory was only four or five votes.

The proposal, it is understood, was submitted by Commissioner Lamb and supported by Evangelist Booth, commander of the Salvation Army in America. Other supporters were all of the Canadian, United States and Australian delegates, along with most of the other non-English representatives.

BIG INCREASE IN VOLUME OF BUTTER STORED

Substantial Increases Also in Quantity of Eggs and Cheese in Warehouses on November 1.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 18.—Increases of practically forty-five per cent. in the amounts of butter in cold storage of November 1st compared with the totals for the same date in 1929, were noted in a report issued by the Dominion Bureau of statistics. The amount of creamery butter in storage this year was 33,844,099 pounds and of dairy butter, 527,299 pounds.

Eggs in cold storage amounted to 12,385,275 dozen, an increase of 36.3 per cent. over last year. Cheese stockpiles totalled 24,800,773 pounds, an increase to 1.65 per cent. over 1929 figures.

MORE WAR TALK SPREADING IN UNITED STATES

Former Ambassador to Turkey Urging Postponement of Debt Payments as Assistance Towards World Peace.

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Nov. 18.—Henry Morgenthau, former ambassador to Turkey, believes another European war is imminent. He suggested that the United States propose a postponement of payment of war debts by the various European countries to the United States for, possibly, a five year period with the stipulation that any country which is the aggressor in a war shall sacrifice this right of deferment.

France, the former ambassador said, is preparing to repel an attack and is arranging alliances with Poland, Jugoslavia, Rumania and other countries.

Germany, he said, is not content without her colonies and territories and war talk is general.

In Italy, he said, Mussolini can hope to retain his personal domination only by some successful venture outside the country.

CASHIER USES REVOLVER FOR FAKE HOLD-UP

Sentence Reserved in Case of Montreal Nurseryman Charged With Attempted Robbery.

MONTREAL, Nov. 18.—Audley Escaffrey, cashier in a west end nursery, who reported to the police Saturday that he had been beaten unconscious by an armed man and his employer's cash register robbed of \$700, admitted to Judge Cusson in arraignment court yesterday that he had staged the robbery himself.

Detectives who investigated the robbery questioned the cashier and secured a confession from him, and he was arraigned yesterday.

Escaffrey told the court he had struck himself over the head with his revolver with sufficient force to cause him to lose consciousness, in order to make the story as realistic as possible. He gave a detailed description of the supposed robber to the police but broke down under questioning. When the accused asked for full restitution, and it was learned that he had no previous police record, Judge Cusson reserved sentence until consultation with the man's employers.

UZCUDUN CAUSE OF SMALL RIOT AT BARCELONA

Police Mistook Demonstration in Favor of Spanish Hero for Another Communist Outbreak.

BARCELONA, Spain, Nov. 18.—Paulino Uzcudun, the Basque pugilist, caused a small riot of his own in this strike-ridden city yesterday.

He and Primo Carnera, the Italian heavyweight whom he is to fight next Sunday night here, were taking a walk together on the "Rambla," principal boulevard of the city, when the crowd, recognizing a Spanish athletic idol, surrounded them and began to cheer.

The applause was intended only as a tribute to the fighters but at that moment labor riots were under-way in many localities and the police thought that this was the beginning of another. The police charged, firing their pistols into the air. Some of the crowd began shooting back at the police and Carnera and Uzcudun found themselves in the midst of a little battle.

Both broke and friends say: if their race had been clocked they would have been credited with a very fast sprinting time down Barcelona's main street.

CLAIMS THERE IS NO REASON FOR PESSIMISM

In View of Possibility of Continued Negotiations, There Is No Cause for Pessimism at Result of Imperial Conference, States P. E. Coleman, M.P.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 18.—While deploring the failure of the Imperial Conference in its efforts to find a solution for the economic problems of the Empire, P. E. Coleman, M.P., a representative of the Australian Government at recent conferences in Europe, yesterday declared that there was still no cause for pessimism, in view of the possibility of continued negotiations.

"I stand for the principle of extended reciprocal preference," he declared. "That is my view of the simplest way of cutting the Gordian knot and preventing a tangled economic skein from becoming even more complicated and unworkable." He did not wish to comment fully on the failure of the delegates to the Imperial Conference. "Obviously it is very regrettable that a solution was not found," he said, "but certainly a unique opportunity presented itself for the development of closer economic relationships between nations of the British Commonwealth."

Mr. Coleman was in Geneva as the Australian delegate to the International Labor Conference last year. He also represented the Government at the meeting of the Mandates Commission. In London, he presided over the economic session of the British Commonwealth Labor Conference and was chairman of the Australian Labor Conference last year.

POLICE SEEK PENSIONS
QUEBEC, Nov. 18.—Official notices have been given by three former Montreal police officers that when the Montreal bill is before the Legislature they will ask for an amendment to compel the city to pay them pensions. Emilien Trepanier, former police captain, asks for \$2,500 a year, while former inspector of detectives R. Lemire and A. Tremblay, another officer, do not specify the amount which they will ask.

WORKMEN KILLED IN CLASH
BARCELONA, Spain, Nov. 18.—Two striking workmen were killed and four were wounded in a pistol battle with police just before noon today. Mobs fought with the officers near the Columbus monument.

MALE TEACHER ARRESTED FOR BEATING YOUNG GIRL

Rodney, Ont., Girl Found Unconscious Beside Road With Fractured Ribs Following Thrashing.

RODNEY, Ont., Nov. 18.—Reeling from the schoolhouse and falling to the roadside on her homeward journey, Jessie Lamont, thirteen-year-old pupil of Oakgrove School in Aldborough Township, was found last Thursday by an older sister and carried to the Lamont home.

Today, Harvey Gillies, twenty-one, teacher of the school, was placed under arrest and charged with inflicting severe injuries on the girl who, medical examination revealed, was suffering from four fractured ribs and other injuries caused by a brutal beating.

Several hours after being placed in St. Thomas Jail Gillies was released on bail of \$4,000. When he appears in court he will face a charge of assault and occasioning actual bodily harm.

EARLY MORNING DISPLAY IS SEEN BY ASTRONOMER

Yerkes Observatory Official Declares Atmospheric Conditions Last Evening Perfect for Photographing Meteorites.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—The earth's collision with a swarm of celestial fireballs streaked early morning skies today with a brilliant display. Astronomers said that the earth had entered the path of the Leonids, a large group of meteors, and waxed happy over the splendor when they said augured well for November, 1933, when they expect another meteoric display rivaling that of 1833.

The Leonids appear every thirty-three years. Astronomers found atmospheric conditions last night ideal for observing them and Dr. C. Crump, secretary of Yerkes Observatory, Williams Bay, Wis., said that much of the night was spent photographing and counting the fiery particles which struck when the meteors hit the earth's protective atmosphere and burn themselves up in the friction producing a harmless glow. They counted 170 meteors each hour, Dr. Crump said.

TEXT OF EIGHT HOUR DAY BILL IS ANNOUNCED

New British Measure to Implement Washington Convention Does Not Apply to Seamen, Managers or Clerks.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The Government today made public the text of its "hours of industrial employment" bill, which is to implement the Washington Working Hours Convention of 1919. The bill, which is not restricted to rigid limits, sets the statutory working hours of industrial workers at eight a day and forty-eight a week, with certain exceptions. Overtime must not exceed thirty-two hours in a period of 28 days. Before it is concluded, the Minister of Labor will consult organizations affected.

The provisions of the bill do not apply to seamen, managers or clerks.

CONSUMPTION OF MORE FISH RECOMMENDED

Hon. E. N. Rhodes Says that Remedy for Problems of Fishing Industry Lies Within Power of Canadians Themselves.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Nov. 18.—A remedy for the problems of the fishing industry lies within the power of Canadians themselves, Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Fisheries, said here yesterday in an interview following his arrival in Vancouver. "Data shows us," he said, "that Canadians consume twenty-two pounds of fish per capita annually. In Britain, where they are traditionally given to roast beef, they consume annually forty pounds of fish per capita. If we in Canada can increase our consumption by half, bringing it to a per capita figure of thirty pounds, we will do much to improve conditions in the fishing industry."

Mr. Rhodes announced his intention, following the next session of Parliament, of coming to British Columbia again to visit all the fishing districts.

The Minister addressed a meeting of the Canadian Club yesterday, giving an interesting outline of Nova Scotia history.

JUDGE PASSED AWAY
WORCESTER, Mass., Nov. 18.—Judge Samuel Utley, for forty-seven years justice of the Central District Court until his retirement a year ago, is dead after a five months' illness. He was eighty-seven years old.

WATERWAYS TO BE DISCUSSED AT MONTREAL

Special Meeting of Montreal Board of Trade to Study Resolution Favoring Postponement of Scheme.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 18.—A special general meeting of the Montreal Board of Trade will be held on November 26th to discuss the Saint Lawrence Waterways Project. A resolution on the subject has been drafted by the council which will be the basis of the discussion.

The resolution states that the Montreal Board of Trade considers that the entire project should not be undertaken at one time and that no substantial part of it should be undertaken immediately, though the board favors, in principle, the ultimate deepening, widening and general improvement of the waterway and believes that the Port of Montreal will greatly benefit thereby. The resolution further argues that development of power should be proceeded with as and when required and should provide navigation channels conformable to the general scheme of the project, but that when the improvement is proceeded with, "the United States which, according to traffic estimates, will reap by far the greater share of the benefits, should contribute proportionately in such manner as will not alter or qualify the sovereignty of the Dominion."

VINEYARD HAVEN SOCIETY LEADER COMMITS SUICIDE

Fear of Losing Mind Cause of Drastic Action on Part of Mrs. Francis Marshall Norton.

VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Nov. 18.—Mrs. Francis Marshall Norton, fifty-three, leader of Vineyard Haven and Martha's Vineyard society, committed suicide last night by drowning in the harbor here.

The impression that she was about to lose her mind, caused by an illness of long standing, led her to take her life. The body was found at the spot indicated in a note she left.

CHARRED COLLARBONE IS MUTE WITNESS TO TRAGEDY

Finding of Bone Substantiates Claims of Railwaymen that Person Was Asleep in London Farmhouse Fire.

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 18.—With the finding of a charred collar bone during a search yesterday of the debris on the farmhouse of Andrew McDermid, swept by fire early Sunday, belief that an unknown person died in the ruins are substantiated. Police stated, however, there is still doubt as to whether the bone found was that of a human or an animal and further examination is to take place. Two railwaymen, who watched the house burn Sunday, while the McDermid family was absent claimed they saw a body lying on a bed in the room where the fire started, but were unable to enter the house.

INCREASE IN FOREIGN TRADE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—October foreign trade of the United States increased as compared with September, but was markedly less than in the same month last year. Commerce Department figures placed total October exports at \$328,000,000, which compared with \$528,514,000 a year ago.

MADRID STRIKE ENDED WITHOUT DEMONSTRATION

Construction Workers and Carpenters Returned to Tasks, While University Classes Are Resumed.

MADRID, Nov. 18.—The general strike here was definitely ended today when construction workers and carpenters went back to their tasks. The Central University and the Medical University re-opened and students appeared at classes, without demonstrations.

BATTLE IS RENEWED
BRUSSELS, Nov. 11.—A bitter battle over the famous balustrade on the new Louvain library as designed by Whitney Warren, reopened before the First Appeal Chamber here.

The case was raised in the form of an appeal by Rector Ladeuze, of Louvain University, against the decision of the Louvain tribunal that the Whitney Warren balustrade with the much mooted inscription should be placed on the facade of the edifice.
