

THE PRESBYTERY OF OTTAWA

HOLDS A VERY IMPORTANT SESSION—A RETIRING PARTON HONORED—SOME INTERESTING REPORTS—A VOTE OF CENSURE UPON THE DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

(Correspondence of the Witness.)

CUMBERLAND, Ont., March 16.—An adjourned meeting of the Presbytery of Ottawa was held in St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, at two p.m., on Tuesday, March 14. There was a large attendance of both ministers and elders.

HOME MISSIONS.

The chief business of the day was the resignation of the Rev. F. W. Farries, of the pastorate of Knox Church, Ottawa. Before, however, dealing with that Mr. Farries, as Convener of the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee, presented the report as to the augmented congregations and mission fields within the bounds of the Presbytery. There are eight of the pastoral charges augmented, but as two of them are at present vacant no very definite grants could be asked for these, for the other six the sum required is \$1,050. There are fourteen mission fields, and for these ordained missionaries or students are arranged as supply for the summer and the usual amounts are asked to assist in defraying expenses. The Rev. Andrew Miller is appointed to Avilvin for two years.

RESIGNATION OF THE REV. MR. FARRIES. After disposing of this report the resignation of Mr. Farries was taken up, and the rest of the afternoon session was devoted to it. The commissioners from the session and congregation were Mr. George Hay and Mr. J. McMillan, B.A. On being called to address the Court, Mr. Hay read the following resolutions of the session and congregation of Knox Church:—

That this session having learned with the deepest regret that its Moderator, the Rev. F. W. Farries, has placed his resignation of the pastoral charge of our congregation in the hands of the Presbytery, desiring to record its high appreciation of his worth as a man and of his ability as a faithful minister of Jesus Christ. During a pastorate of eighteen years he has preached with great clearness and acceptance the glorious doctrine of the gospel of salvation through Jesus Christ. He has entered heartily into all the schemes for the good of the congregation and ministered abundantly to the wants of the sick and dying. By his uniform courtesy, his kindly sympathy and his loving helpfulness he has endeared himself to the hearts of his people. We regret that the Chief Shepherd may speedily use him in caring for another flock, and that wherever he may be called to labor he may come among his people in the fullness of the blessing of the gospel of Christ.

Resolved, that while deeply regretting the anticipated close of the extended pastorate of this congregation by the Rev. F. W. Farries, this meeting in testimony of the ability and fidelity with which he has performed the onerous duties thereof, hereby authorizes the Temporal Committee to pay him the sum of \$1,050, being equal to six months' stipend, the same to take effect from the time when he may be released from his charge by the Presbytery.

After reading these documents, Mr. Hay said that these resolutions but faintly showed the esteem and love that they all felt for their pastor. He was not authorized to oppose the acceptance of the resignation, but he was sure that it was with a feeling of intense pain that the congregation would separate themselves from one who had served them so long and so earnestly, in leaving, he would wish with the fondest hopes of every member of the congregation for his future happiness and prosperity.

Mr. J. A. McMillan stated that he had probably been more closely connected with the Rev. Mr. Farries than any other person in the city of Ottawa, and could endorse every statement made by Mr. Hay. Many other things could be said of Mr. Farries' pastorate, but such was unnecessary. His work had been done faithfully unto God and not to men. While recognizing the great loss the congregation was about to sustain, it was their wish that he would speedily obtain other work, and have the strength of God to sustain him in his difficulties.

After Mr. Farries had intimated that he still adhered to his determination to resign, Dr. Moore rose to second that resignation be accepted, and in doing so said that he had been closely connected with Mr. Farries for the past eighteen years in the Presbytery, and he would say that they could not but esteem him for his arduous and earnest labors. For the last fifteen or sixteen years he had been connected with the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee, and his successful way in which the work of this Committee had been carried on, was almost entirely due to Mr. Farries. He could assure him that when he left them he would leave no shadows on the friendship of his brethren here, and he carried with him their best wishes and earnest prayers for his future happiness and success.

In seconding the motion Mr. Beatt said that Mr. Farries' work in this Presbytery had been such that it was hard to think of having to do without his great geniality and sound judgment. After several other brethren had expressed their appreciation of Mr. Farries, and their sorrow at the prospect of losing him, the motion was put and carried.

Mr. Farries thanked the brethren for their kind words and wishes, and then, in tendering his resignation of the pastorate of the Home Mission Committee, he begged to nominate the Rev. Dr. Armstrong as his successor. The nomination was unanimously accepted by the Presbytery.

The Moderator, the Rev. Dr. Armstrong, then, in the name of the Presbytery, presented Mr. Farries with

A BEAUTIFUL ILLUMINATED ADDRESS, which read as follows:—

To the Rev. F. W. Farries:—
DEAR BROTHER,—Though shut up, as it seems, to the unwelcome duty of accepting your resignation of the pastorate of Knox Church, we, the members of the Presbytery of Ottawa, desire to express our profound regret with which we view the prospect of your departure from us. Your devoted labors in this city for the past fifteen years have been crowned by the blessing of God with large success, and you leave behind you, not only in the congregation to which you have ministered, but throughout the whole community, a host of grateful and admiring friends who will cherish your memory as long as you live.

In this Presbytery you have rendered most useful service to the Church as Convener of the Home Mission Committee, and your genial spirit, joined to a character of unswerving purity, has won the esteem and affection of all. In bidding you farewell we seek to temper our sorrow with hope, for while your place cannot be easily filled amongst us, or our hearts us, the sense of loss destroyed under circumstances in the future, yet we earnestly pray that you may find elsewhere, as we believe you will, still greater comfort and prosperity in your Christian work; that each year of your remaining life may be brighter and more peaceful than the last, and that when the end comes there may be ministered to you an abundant carouse into that blessed home where the wicked cease from troubling and the weary are at rest.

This address was signed by the Moderator and Clerk and by some 25 other members of the Court.

MR. FARRIES' REPLY. In his reply Mr. Farries said: "I thank you for this unprecedented mark of esteem, for never before to my knowledge has a member of this Presbytery, in departing, been presented with an address, and for this reason I consider you have done me a great honor. I thank you for the kindness that has prompted you to do so. It would be impossible for me to forget the many happy years I have spent within the bounds of the Ottawa Presbytery. I will never forget the kindness of the brethren in this Presbytery, nor shall I fail to remember those who were formerly of this Presbytery, but are now gone to other fields of labor. Language is inadequate to express my feelings. My heart cannot go on more fully than to use the brief, old, and simple Saxon phrase, 'I thank you.' I consider this form of expressing esteem preferable to any other. I do not expect to go beyond the reach of communication and shall be glad to hear of the prosperity and progress of the work in the Ottawa Presbytery. As to the address I shall esteem it as one of the richest treasures I possess."

The pulpit of Knox Church is to be preached vacant by the Moderator, the Rev. Dr. Armstrong, on the first Sabbath of April.

The Rev. W. T. Herridge, B.D., was appointed interim moderator of session.

At this point the Presbytery adjourned till the evening, when it resumed its sitting for the transaction of the rest of the business.

Dr. Campbell gave in the report on Systematic Benevolence, which was received and adopted.

INTERESTING FIGURES.

Mr. Beatt presented the report on statistics, showing that we had lost four brethren, two resigning through illness and two removed to other Presbyteries; that we had welcomed five pastors during the year 1892. The membership of the congregations in the Presbytery shows an increase of over 100. The number of young people attending Sabbath-school and Bible classes increased by 50 over the year 1891. The amount contributed for the support of the Gospel ordinance in the Presbytery is nearly \$1,000 less than in 1891, but this is more than accounted for by there being no large sums for church buildings, as in the previous year. For the schemes of the church there is really an increase of about \$2,000, when allowance is made for an extra gift of \$3,000 in the year 1891. For all purposes there is fully \$6,000 less this year than last, but although this is so the real funds of the Church are benefited more than in 1891. The giving per member are over \$10 in fourteen congregations, one of these giving fully \$40 and other two giving over \$20.

In the discussion following it was found that some of the brethren thought that some of the columns might well disappear and others substituted, and it was finally agreed, on the motion of Mr. Tuffis, seconded by Dr. Moore, to recommend to the Assembly's Committee that there be two columns provided in their report for the enumeration of families; one showing the total number of families connected with the congregation and the other the number contributing. It was also agreed to prepare a synopsis of this report for printing, so that copies might be distributed through the Presbytery.

Mr. Gamble next presented the report on French work, and after considering its various recommendations it was received and adopted.

THE DOMINION PARLIAMENT CENSURED.

Dr. Moore brought the subject of Sabbath observance before the Presbytery so that by conference he might the better draw up the Presbytery's report, but on account of the lateness of the hour it was agreed to defer the whole matter till the May meeting, but before passing the subject, Mr. Doudiet moved, seconded by Dr. Moore, that the Presbytery have learned with regret that the Parliament of Canada has declined to support a proposition to close on the Lord's Day the Canadian exhibit at the World's Fair in Chicago, and earnestly protests against the said action of the House of Commons as an expression of the moral sense of the country regarding the respect due to the Lord's Day.

This was unanimously agreed to.

The Presbytery then adjourned to meet in St. Paul's Church, Ottawa, on the first Tuesday of May (2) at 10 a.m.

METHODIST CHURCH RE-OPENING.

(Special to the Witness.)

BOWMANVILLE, Ont., March 22.—The re-opening services of the Methodist church, Newcastle, were held on Sunday and Monday last. On Sunday the Rev. E. Roberts, President of Conference, preached in the morning and evening. The sermon in the afternoon was preached by the Rev. T. W. Jolliffe, chairman of the district. The congregations were large at all the services and the collections amounted to \$72. On Monday evening a sumptuous supper was served in the new school room to more than five hundred people. A little after eight o'clock, Mr. H. A. Massey, of Toronto, was called to the chair. The total cost of the new school room and renovation of the church footed up to about \$2,300, and there was only \$400 on hand. Mr. Massey, in an inspiring address, said if the congregation was willing to lift the indebtedness he was prepared to help them. His contribution, however, would be gauged by their offerings. The Ladies' Aid pledged \$100, the Sunday-school \$100 and Mr. A. E. Wallbridge, \$100. The Rev. T. W. Jolliffe and the Rev. G. Brown appealed to the congregation to wipe out the debt. The subscriptions came pouring in in sums from \$50 down, at times taxing the ability of the secretary to keep track of them. Mr. Massey gave his check for \$285. The total amount raised reached \$1,907. Thus the outlay was all provided, and the congregation joined heartily in singing the doxology. The Revs. R. T. Courtice and W. F. Allan gave good addresses and the choir enlivened the proceedings by excellent music. The Methodists of Newcastle are to be congratulated on their new school room and the renovation of their church.

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NEW IMPERIAL COINAGE.

DESIGNS ADOPTED BY THE BRITISH TREASURY.

The Jubilee money heralded with such a flourish of trumpets was not appreciated as a work of art. No sooner had it made its appearance than adverse criticism from all sides condemned it in unmeasured terms. The portrait of the Queen, only possible, had the neck too long, while the crown perched on the top of the head further elongated the bust out of all proportion. This crown, too, left an uncomfortable impression as if it were about to fall off. A new coinage has, therefore, been in contemplation for some time and the work of designing it has been entrusted to two artists named Brock and Poynter. As will



be seen by the cuts they have produced something more original and artistic than has appeared on the British coinage since the days of Victoria. The obverse is by Mr. Brock, and he has given us a portrait of Her Majesty somewhat older but much more striking, with a pleasing expression and decision of character, making it far more acceptable than the insipid face on the former issue. The bust, too, has not that disagreeable length, being fuller it covers more of the surface of the coin, which thus with all its parts more fully balanced has a highly agreeable effect. The attention to these minor details, which cannot well be described, requires that the coin artist should have special



aptitude to turn out a thing of beauty. The old Strauss coin artists well knew how to secure such surpassing beauty in their coinage. For the first time the Imperial money will bear the new title "Empress of India," conferred on the Queen by Disraeli. The reverse is by Mr. Poynter, but only those of the half-crown, shilling and shilling are new. The former has a shield, similar to that of the spade guinea, surmounted by a crown and surrounded by the collar of the garter. The shilling and shilling have an arrangement of three shields bearing the arms of Eng-



land, Scotland and Ireland, in which the effect is good. The reverse of the five pound piece, sovereign, half sovereign and crown will bear a beautifully executed reproduction of "Pictorial," St. George and the dragon, while the reverse of the smaller silver and copper coins remain as before.

Now that a new departure is to be made in Canada by substituting nickel for the old family bronze cents, would it not be well to give us a change in design, something new and artistic? An improvement can easily be made in that which has served us for twenty-three years.

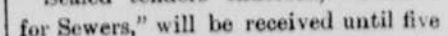
