Vinton meeting wants school "a few miles below Coulonge" for all Protestants and Catholics

On Sunday April 17th, Vinton Parish Hall was the scene of a giant rally of the Catholic school boards of Pontiac. Present were members representing Sheenboro, Chapeau, St. Joseph's, Waltham, Davidson, Fort Coulonge, Vinton, Campbell's Bay, Otter Lake, Calumet Island, Bryson, Portage du Fort and Quyon-Bristol. Each board brought to the meeting the results of long months of study of its own needs and what would be best for Pontiac as a whole. The meeting agreed unanimously on the following:

Need of Unity

Pontiac is composed of three main groups, about equal in size namely: French-speaking Catholics, English-speaking Catholics and English-speaking Protestants. To get the best education possible these three groups should unite and aim at a central composite school.

As regards the French, the government has announced a school for them "in the Fort Coulonge area". Since the site has not yet been determined, it is proposed that it be a few miles below Fort Coulonge near the centre of the county, yet "in the Fort Coulonge area".

English-speaking Catholics are spread from Sheenboro to Quyon. It would be unreasonable and impossible to expect Sheenboro to come past a central point, and likewise impossible for Quyon to travel up past a central place. Thus a central school is the solution.

As for the Protestants, the meeting did not wish to appear importunate, yet as an impartial onlooker, it dared to make this observation: Although most of the Protestants are in one place, there is a considerable number scattered from Portage to Waltham whose needs would be best looked after in a central location. Also to provide best education for all, Protestants and Catholics alike, one central school is most feasible. Thus the Catholic Boards respectfully invite the Protestants to study this idea.

Location

The meeting made no mention of any specific site, for fear of

infringing on the rights of location experts. (It is common knowledge amongst the boards that there is a central location where seventy-five acres of land can be obtained free.)

Plan

Each of the three parties would have control of its own school on a common campus. Each would be far enough removed to preserve integrity of language, religion, and culture, yet close enough to share common facilities.

Committee

A member from each board is formed into a committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Lloyd

Kensley. Its function is to co-operate with Mr. Eugene Pigeon, the official representative on the Outaouais (Catholic) Regional Board, to diffuse information to and from the local boards and Educational authorities.

Publicity

The meeting agreed unanimously to send the report of the meeting to the newspapers, the Outaouais (Catholic) Regional Board, and the Department of Education. They agreed to ask for an appointment with the Department to try to speed up the matter. All the above-mentioned boards endorsed in writing the decisions.

As winners of this round, Karen and Maydon will take part in the Western Quebec finals at Hull later this month.

In the senior section Jane Bretzlaff, speaking on qualities of leadership, was tied for first place with Bruce Lewis, talking about Canada and her relationship to the United States. Jane and Bruce were recommended by the judges to represent Shawville at the finals in Hull.

There were ten speakers in each division and the audience was made up mainly of the teachers and families of the contestants. Doing the judging were Mrs. Donald Paul, Mr. Brough of the Guidance Department, and Mrs. David Dickson.

Judging of the speeches was done on an objective basis with 50 per cent for material and organization and 50 per cent for presentation. In each category points were assigned for particular items such as choice of sub-

ject, research and study, knowledge of subject, originality of treatment and plan. Ten points were allowed for correct English usage and choice of vocabulary and in this category all the Juniors and most of the Seniors got high scores. Fluency and expression, platform appearance and manner and voice and diction were each allocated points so the totals arrived at by each of the judges were not too dissimilar. As both Junior and Senior divisions ended in ties, Shawville will have four entries in the finals.

Lorna Barber, Lee Carswell, Bert Connolly, Susan Dods, Lynn Hodgins, Lorraine Murray, Donna Rutherford and Linda Wickens each presented a very good speech in the Senior section. There were no bad ones, though there was a great deal of difference in maturity of approach, in knowledge of the subjects and in the research done. 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DENYING THE VOTE

Quebec has proposed a Provincial election for Sunday, June 5. Minutes after this announcement was made, S. Wyman McKechnie, one of the staunchest Liberals in Pontiac County and for the past six years the President of the Provincial Liberal organization in Pontiac, tendered his resignation from the Pontiac Liberal Association. A letter of resignation from Mr. McKechnie will also be sent to Mr. Lesage.

Wyman's resignation would seem to reflect the feelings of a number of people, particularly in this district, on the subject of a Sunday vote.

It is not a matter of deciding whether it is or is not a good thing to vote on Sunday but the principle of holding a public election on a day which will exclude a large number of the population.

Government is supposed to be for the people and by the people. In this Province, of all Provinces, where the example of consideration for minorities has been held up as an example for all the world to see, we would like things to be done in the best interest of all.

That a lot of people will not vote on Sunday is a fact. It is not debateable. It is not to be talked about and written about with a hope that it will change.

Holding an election on Sunday will predetermine that those who will not vote on Sunday will thus be denied the vote. When this happens we can never again call Quebec Province a democratic state.

Voting for Sunday sports, supporting efforts to allow hotels to open on Sunday, or permitting anything else on Sunday is not in the same category. These things are all a matter of free choice and those who do not wish to play ball or watch a ball game or drink beer or go to the movies on Sunday do not have to do these things, while those who wish to may.

But voting is supposed to be a privilege of all, and nobody in Quebec city can claim to be ignorant of the fact that there are a lot of people whose religion forbids them to vote on Sunday.

There was a time when women didn't have a vote. We can't say the vote was denied to them because they had never had it. Women just hadn't been taken seriously as people who could be useful at the polls. They finally got the vote and that was a big step in the right direction. Even Quebec women were allowed to vote!

But this disenfranchisement of certain individuals because of their religious beliefs is a giant step back and will take a giant struggle to regain. It could be hoped by some in Quebec City that the struggle would not be made, but men being what they are, the struggle will be made.

"This is the way they do it in France" we are told, "they always have their elections on Sunday there". So what? Quebec is not France. Ask any Frenchman.

Quebec is our Province, and we are in it, and we have helped to make it what it is. Without Wyman McKechnie and his ancestors and his descendants, Quebec would not have been and will not be Quebec. Wyman has been singled out among Quebec farmers to receive a Gold Medal for achievements in Ayrshire breeding and he and his sons have taken heavy responsibility on their shoulders for all good purposes of commerce and civic affairs through changing years of difficulty and progress in this community.

Add to the McKechnies a hundred other local families who just happen also to be among those who will not vote on Sunday and an important sector has been ruled out of the electorate.

A while ago we, in The Equity, said that if Quebec decided to opt out of Canada, we in Pontiac would like to opt out of Quebec first. We see that for school purposes the people in the top end of Pontiac are already taking steps to join with Ontario and now it transpires that we are being opted out anyway by being, many of us, denied the privilege of the vote.

Assistant Project Manager (services) Creighton K. Steeves, B.Eng.

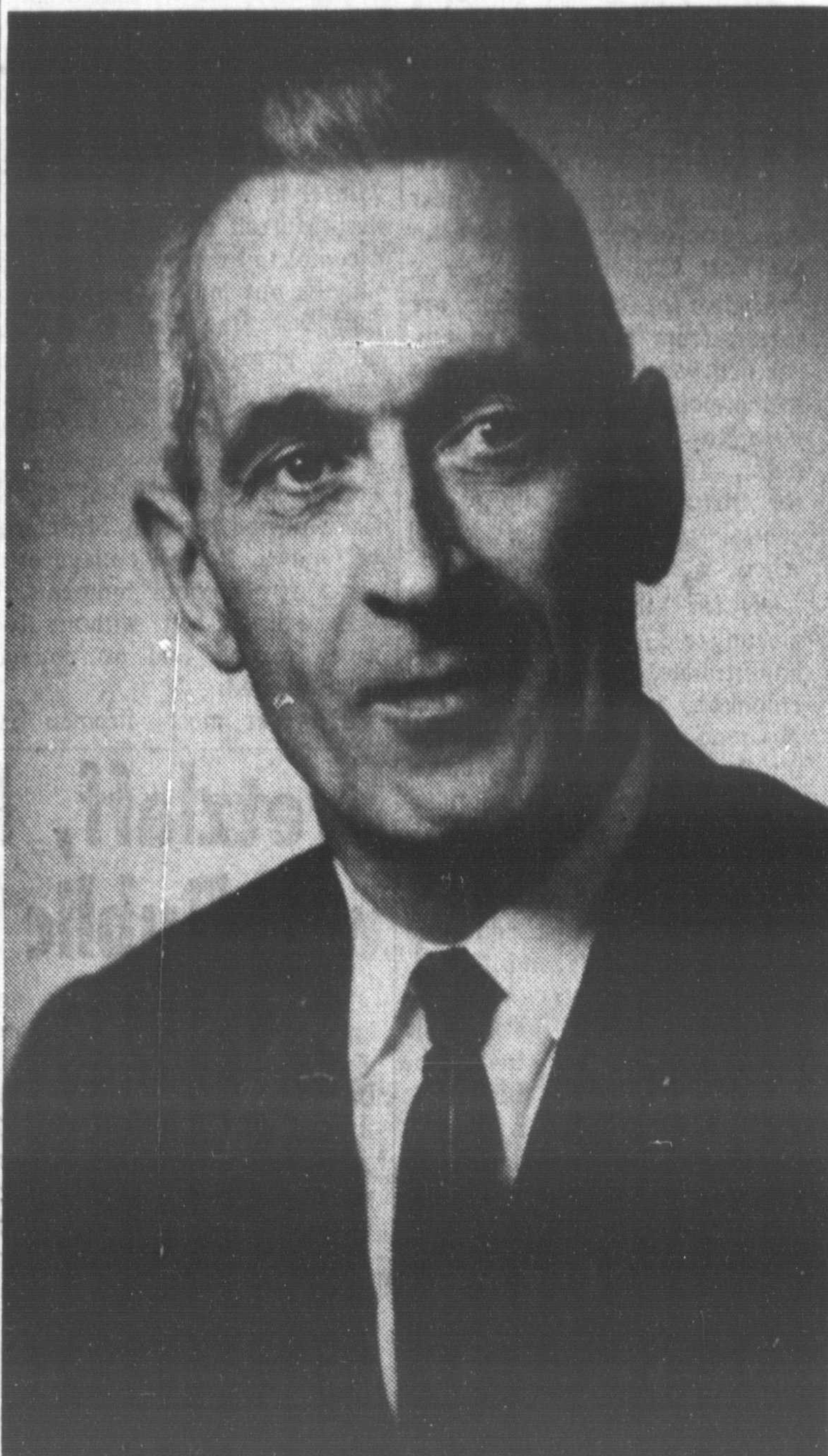

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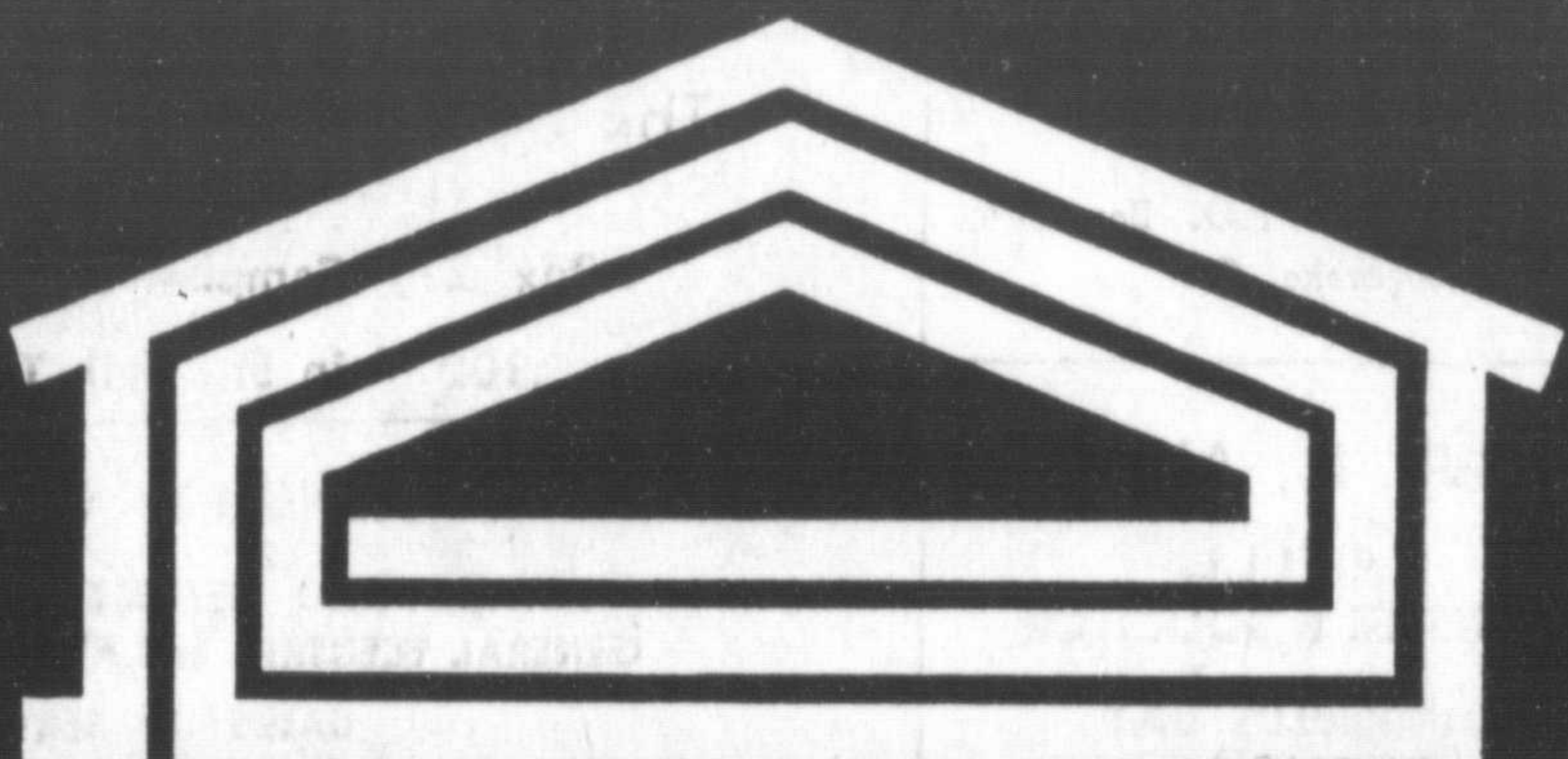

Government assistance for Quebec farmers

The Agriculture and Colonization Department of the Provincial Government has passed an Act authorizing the Minister to acquire lands at a maximum price of six thousand dollars in order to promote the establishment of farmers thereon and encourage the enlargement of farms.

This could be a benefit to farmers who are already established and wish to enlarge their farms through the purchase of additional land and qualified people who wish to establish them-

selves on farms but are not able to take advantage of the benefits of the Quebec Farm Credit Act.

The land which is to be acquired must be suitable for purposes of enlargement or establishment and must be situated within a radius of not more than three miles from the farm where the applicant has his residence.

The amount paid by the Government will not exceed the market value of the property as determined by the Department, and will not be more than \$6,000.

There are more regulations regarding this Act, all of which can be obtained at the Agronomist's office in Shawville. There are also other assistances available with details of how to apply and who is eligible.

The Agronomist's office in Shawville is upstairs over the Stonehaven Flower Shop, in the Cowley Building, across the street from the IGA on Main St.

OBITUARY

Dr. Kenneth McDowell

Dr. Kenneth McDowell one of Renfrew's most prominent and respected citizens for nearly half a century was buried Sunday April 10 in an impressive ceremony attended by hundreds.

Dr. McDowell who was 71, died April 8 in Renfrew Victoria Hospital. He had been in failing health for some time but continued his practice until he was stricken with the illness which led to his death. He entered hospital two months ago.

He was born in Shawville and received his early education there. His studies took him to university and a few years after he graduated and started practice in Renfrew, he married the former Mary Carter of Renfrew. She predeceased him seven years ago.

Dr. McDowell was devoted to his work and an inspiring figure in the community, an active member of the congregation of Renfrew Presbyterian Church, for years a keen golfer and curler and he was known throughout the entire area, having practiced dentistry for 49

They had one son, Thomas, who is owner of McDowell Motors in Renfrew, also two grandchildren Pattie and Jane McDowell; three brothers, Manson of Shawville, Arnold of Nanaimo, B.C., and Franklin of Vancouver, and one sister, Mrs. Maude Manley of Ottawa. A brother Goldwyn, predeceased him in 1965.

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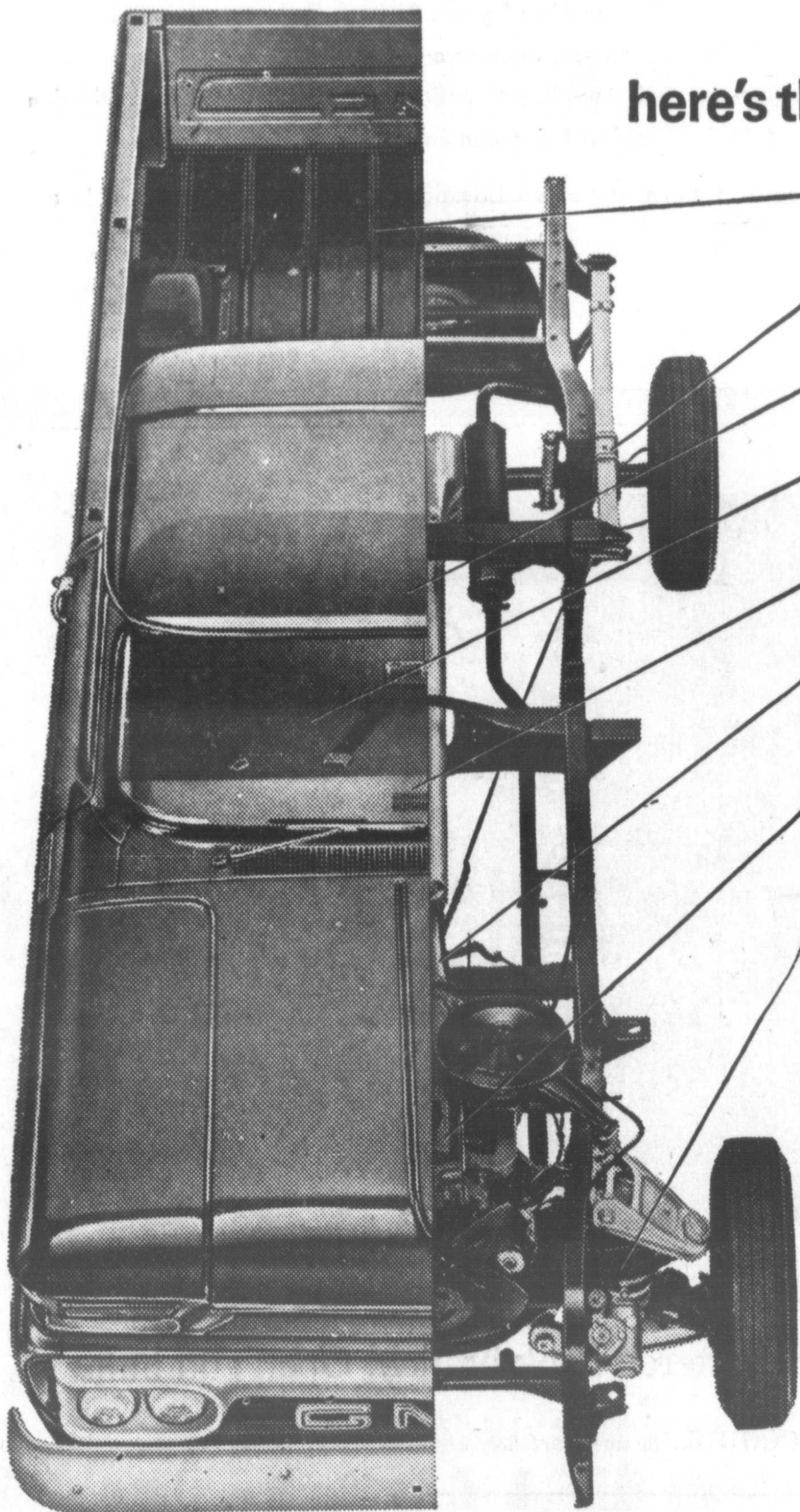
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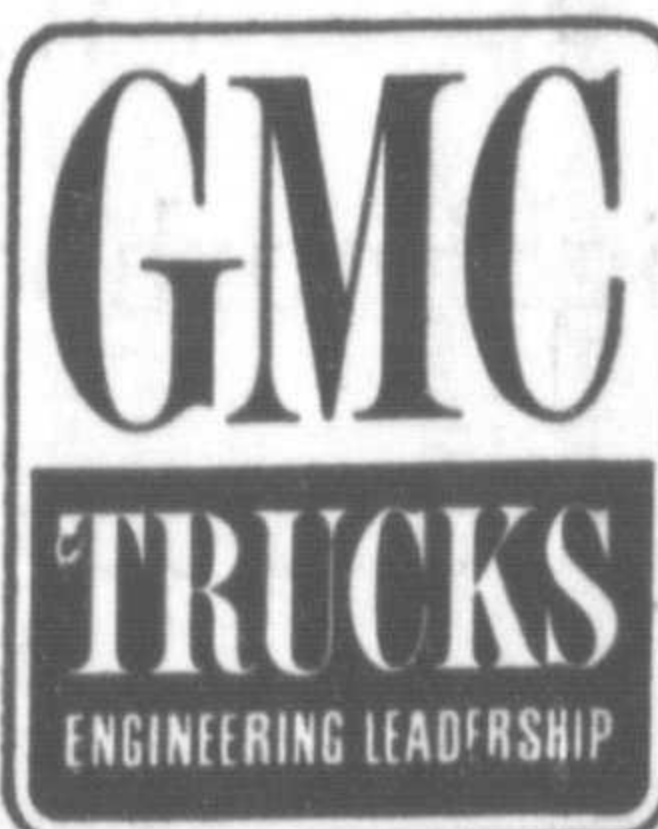

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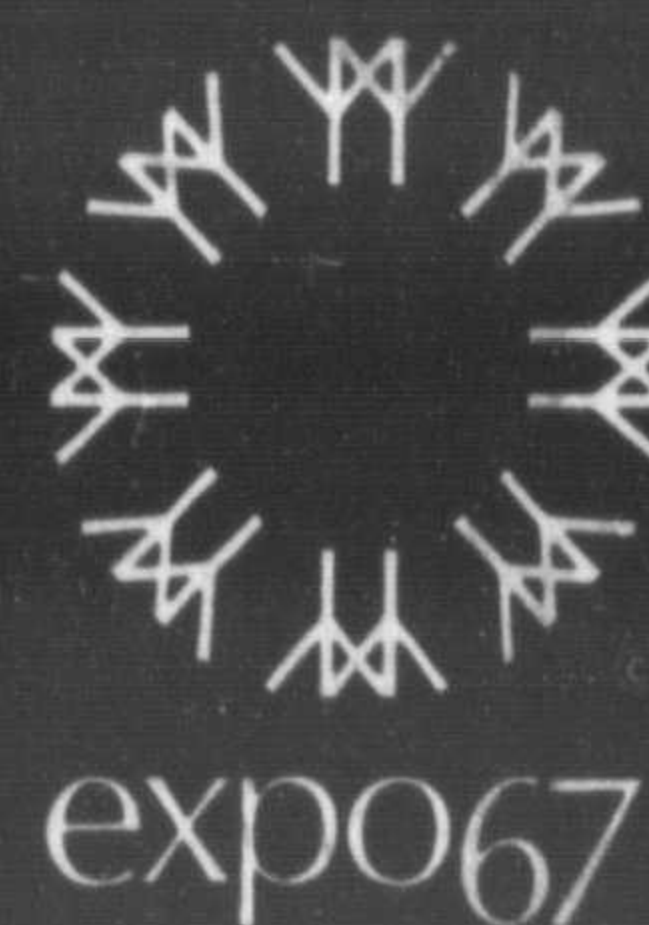
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Pastoral comment...

Rev T. G. Klatt, Quyon
When God created the world, He had no intention of abandoning it to its own destiny. He loves His creatures too much for

that. As a good father, He provides for each one of us, even to His tiniest creatures. Understanding the Wonderful Provisions of God, Matthew warns us to be not solicitous for our life, what we shall eat, nor for our body, what we shall put on. Behold the birds of the air. Our

heavenly Father feedeth them. Are we not of much more value than they? And if He provides for our bodies, much more would He be willing to provide for our souls, and for all the necessary things for our salvation. He created us all for Heaven. It will be our own

fault if we fail to make proper use of the means He has given us, or if we abuse of the freedom bestowed on us, bestowed for the sole purpose of making our love for Him voluntary and therefore meritorious. God does not want the love of us as slaves, but He wants our love freely given and joyfully given, so that we will love Him with our whole hearts, our whole souls with all our minds and all our strength.

I believe there was nothing that pleased Him more, when he placed a challenge before those who walked after Him and asked them to accept a hard teaching, which would show that they were worthy to become His disciples, than when Peter called out and emphatically declared that he would not leave his Master: "Lord, to whom shall we go? Thou hast the words of eternal life. And we believe and we are sure that thou art the Christ, the Son of the Living God". Peter was ready to accept everything that Christ would ask. Peter, who had remarkable faith, the kind of faith God loves to see in a soul, on another occasion was asked: "But whom do you say I am?" His answer was praised by God Himself as coming, not from flesh and blood, not from his own weak thinking, but as a gift from His Father who is in Heaven, from Whom only can we get the fulness of faith. It was then that Christ conferred on Peter marvelous powers.

We should all, not only admire these profound acts of faith, but we should imitate them, knowing how pleasing they will be to God. To be sure to win the race, we should always try to be one step ahead of those running with us. Strange to say, but this is the step that is hardest to take, and if taken, hardest to keep.

Christ is the greatest teacher the world has ever known. He spoke with absolute and final authority, because He is the Son of God. He knows all truth. He cannot mislead, because He is Truth. "I am the way, the truth and the life". Peter might have had his faults, but on this point, Christ and he agreed. We cannot help but admire such faith. Can we afford not to imitate it?

The Providence of God, out of love for us, sent us His only begotten Son, with a message of capital importance for our salvation. We cannot do otherwise but accept the views of Jesus, for they are final and absolute. "He that followeth Me, shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life." says John in his eighth chapter. Moses could have said these same words, when he was chosen to lead God's people. Both were in the plan of God, one to succeed the other. There was no contradiction between these two leaders. Christ did not come to destroy. Although Christ did not always agree with the way the Law of Moses was understood and was being applied, He distinctly states that He did not come for that purpose, in His Sermon on the Mount: "Think not that I came to destroy the Law, or the Prophets; I am not come to destroy but to fulfill".

It is interesting to see just how Christ fulfilled each one of the Laws and the Prophets, that is to say: each part of the teaching of the Old Testament, without destroying a single one of them. This would help us to understand how God intended the Primitive Church to be but a preparation for the Christian Church, for all that was predicted or symbolized in the one would be accomplished and finalized in the other.
