BOY SCOUTS

(Held From Last Week)

The St. John Ambulance Class met as usual last Friday with insensibility and Poisoning as the topic for the lessons. Dr. Powles first explained the functions of the nervous system and how a reaction would occur and then detailed the various ways a patient could become insensible.

This was followed by various types of poisons and antidotes and what to do. The main stress was that the class were First Aiders only, but it was up to them to handle the situation until a doctor arrived. Sometimes action has to be quick and knowing what to do in the emergency is vitally important.

The lecture session was followed by a review of different methods of bandaging, slings, cuts, broken bones and etc. The class showed considerable improvement along these lines and the result was quite in accordance with instructions. A practical demonstration was given when a chap who had been playing hockey, came in with a badly cut eyelid. The follow through from a First Aid standpoint was demonstrated and the chap went away all bound up like a professional. It is hoped that he lived!

Next week covers various types of accidents including burns and scalds, stings and bites along with various methods of transportation. This will be the sixth and last lecture and will be followed by a general review and then the examination to qualify for the grade the members of the class are trying. Also at this meeting a draw will take place which will indicate on the examiners' sheet the requirement the participant will have to do. Treating some sort of a fracture and a wound are obligatory along with the use of a triangular bandage and a choice made between a method of transport and a type of artificial respiration. These are all practical work and in addition there are two oral questions on different subjects which must be answered correctly. There are 120 marks given for the examination for 6 tests as above and a pass for a Certificate (1st Grade) is 72, Voucher, 78 and Medallion 84.

It is urged that everyone attend these next two instructional periods for last minute check on the work. Study and read your book, practice on friend husband

and come with any questions. We want 100% to pass.

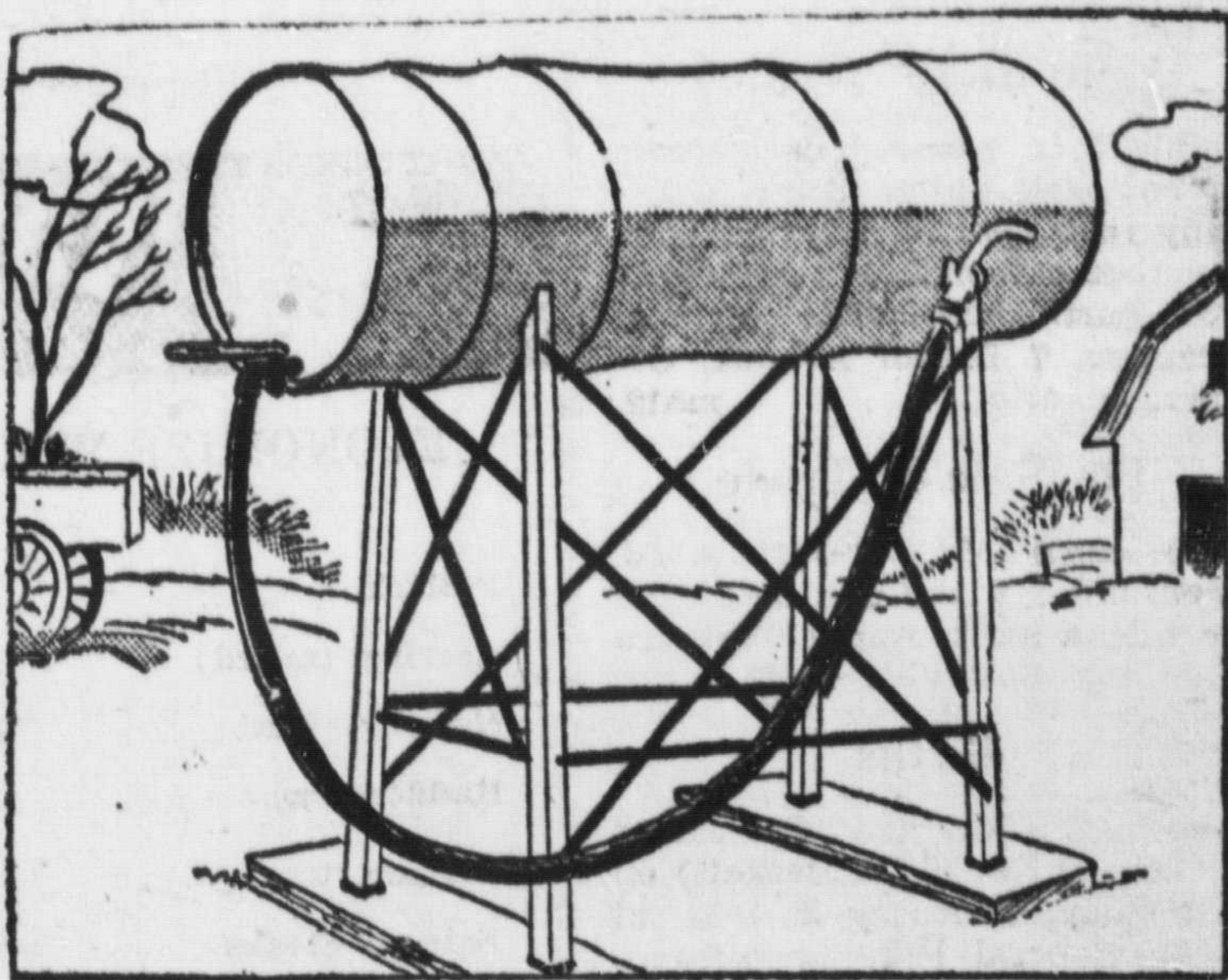


Macdonald Royal On February 24

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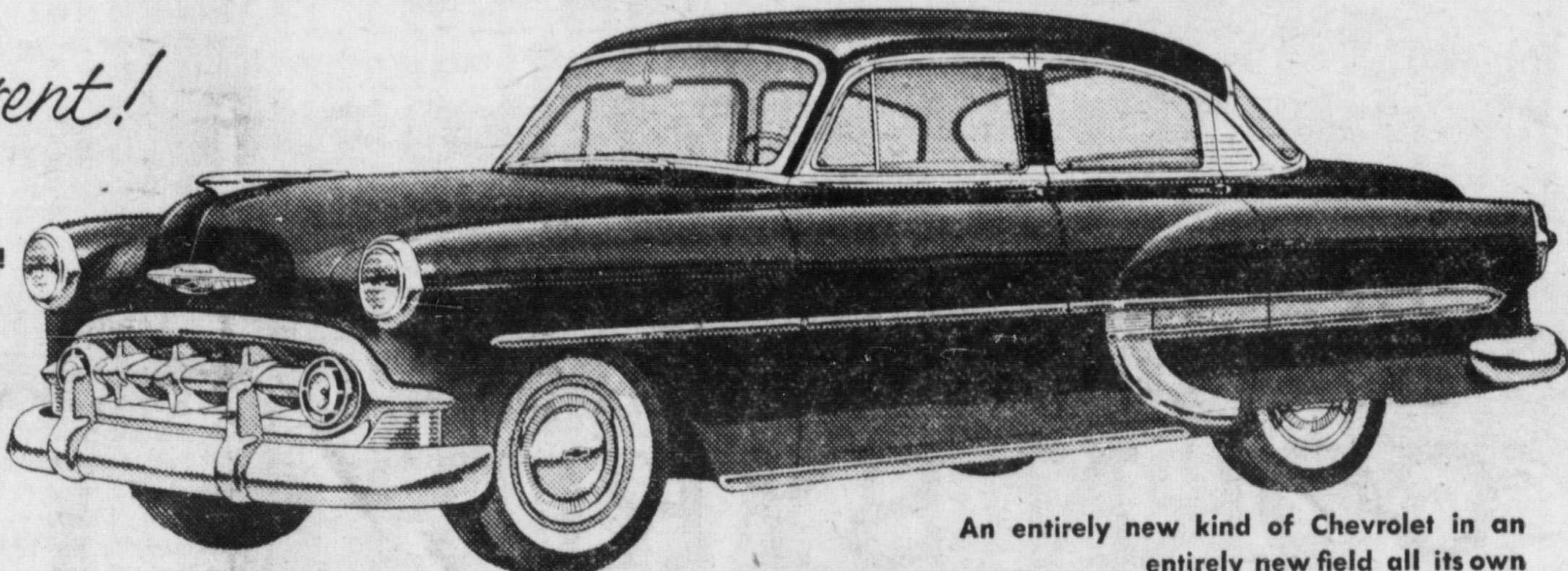
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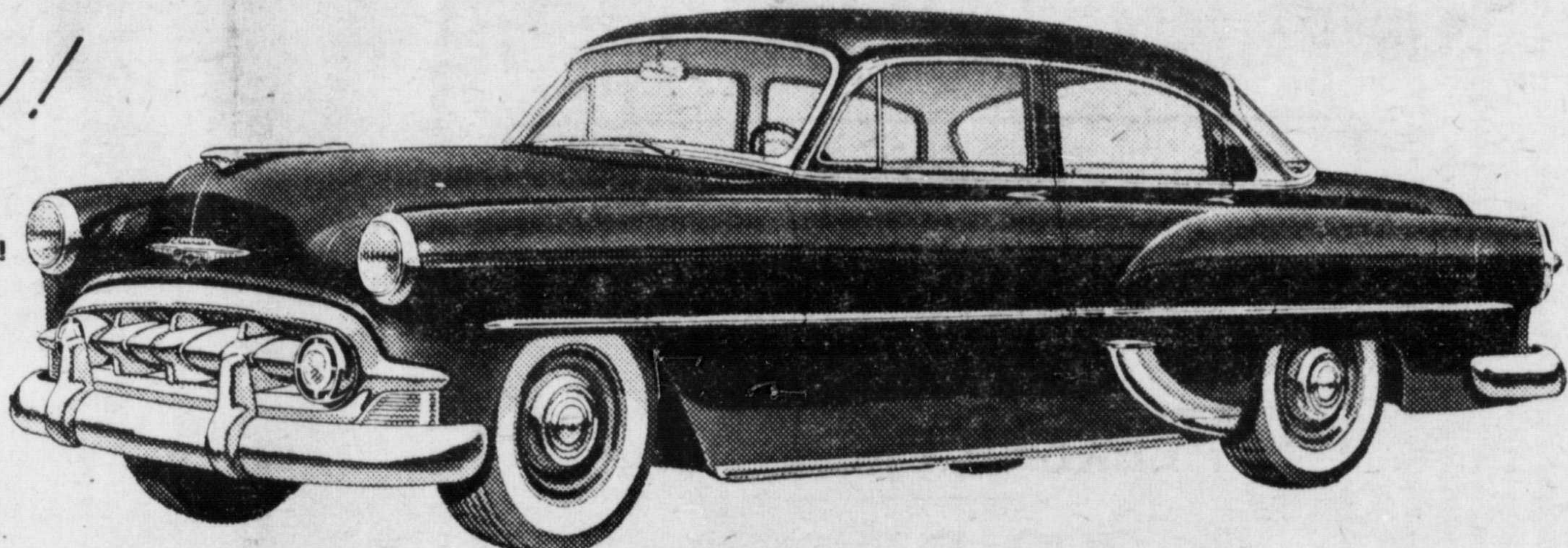

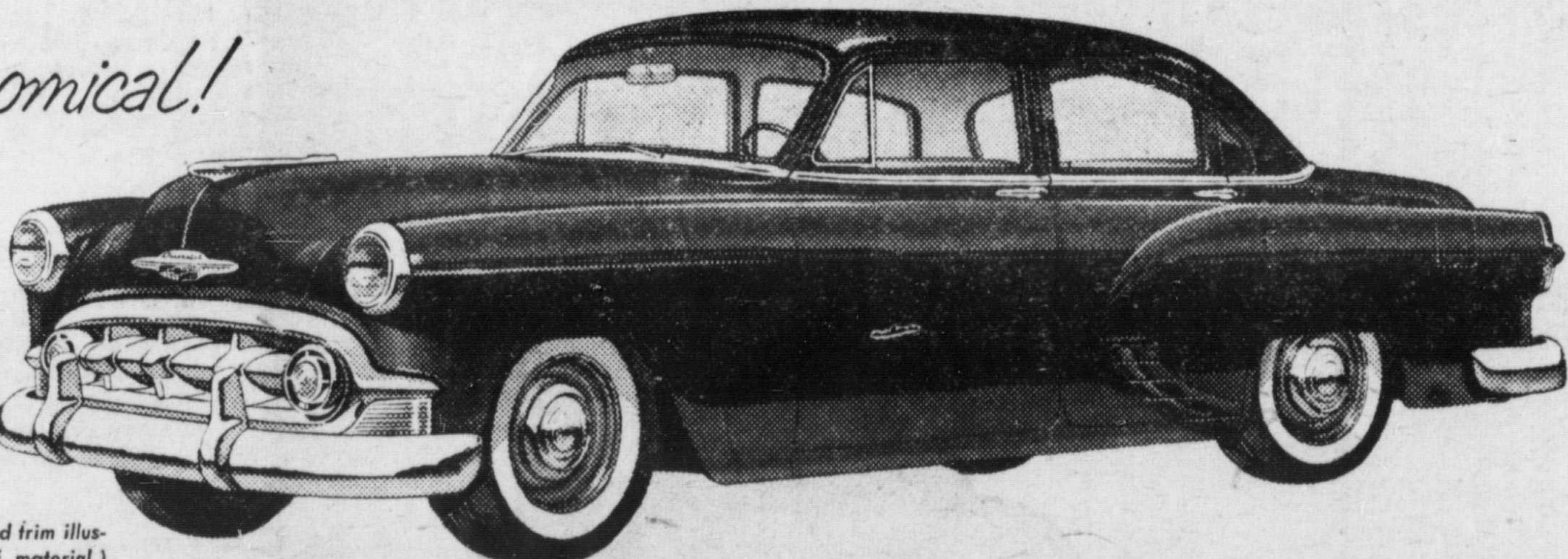

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A CHALLENGE TO QUEBEC EDUCATORS

Everyone agrees that the biggest problem in education today is **TEACHER SUPPLY** — how to ensure that we shall have enough **qualified** teachers for the classrooms of 1955, 1960, and 1965.

The solution must be found and found quickly.

Is it not time that School Boards, the Provincial Authority, and Home and School Associations began to confront this challenge with the foresight, courage and faith in Quebec's future which have been so notably displayed in the current school building programme?

No one has yet produced a better answer to the teacher shortage question than the assurance to young people now in our high schools and colleges that **TEACHING IS A PROFESSION WITH A FUTURE**—a challenging and respected profession, offering salaries comparable to those in other learned professions.

The Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers, whose membership includes all persons teaching in Quebec Protestant schools, believes that its long-term salary policy, approved by the annual meeting on October 10, 1952, provides the kind of assurance that young men and women today will require if they are to consider teaching as a life-work.

This PAPT 1952 scale requests minimum salaries in the three main teacher categories of \$2200, \$2400, and \$3000, rising by from ten to fifteen increments to a maximum of \$4200, \$4400, and \$6000, with allowances above these basic figures for married status and for administrative and special responsibility posts. A statement of the principles on which this scale is based, with suggestions for partial implementation in 1953-54, will be sent to School Boards on request.

The PAPT appeals to all Quebec educators, but particularly to School Boards and the Provincial Authority, to give careful study to this statement of salary policy which aims to stabilize the working conditions of teachers in Quebec for several years to come. In the main, it is an extension of the Association's 1948-49 scale, which has been widely accepted, to meet the needs of the present and the immediate future.

The PAPT further appeals to School Boards outside Greater Montreal to give a fair and friendly hearing to the teacher representatives who will be approaching them at this time with requests for 1953-54 salaries based on their professional association's long-term salary policy and scale.

The PAPT supports these salary negotiations by school staffs and local teachers' associations, believing that a co-operative approach to the problem of creating and maintaining satisfactory long-term working conditions is the best guarantee of an adequate supply of well-trained and competent teachers for the schools of tomorrow.
