Air Ways

Winter is time to watch safety

SAFETY FIRST: Had the opportunity to do a bit of flying, courtesy of the Montreal Flying Club, Saturday afternoon, and I was quite appalled at the situation on a busy day in the Cartierville circuit. In short, somebody's going to get hurt if they're not careful. Firstly, they were using runway 28, which is the long one now being extended. It isn't very often used for light aircraft traffic, but Saturday there wasn't much choice because of the wind. Needless to say, the field was particularly busy because the weather was just about ideal for training flights. It has been my understanding that all aircraft there must have functioning radio now, and especially on the long runway. Since Runway 24-06 is usually used by those in training, the sudden switch to the long runway threw a few people for a loop because they had to re-adjust their values of approaches, glides, etc. and the fact that there are buildings almost on the button — all of which may prove scary to the inexperienced.



THE APPROACH: Coming in on final approach and cleared as number two behind a Cessna 310, I was told at the last minute (almost at touchdown) to go around again. With a super-cooled engine and no flaps down, I hoped nothing would seize as I poured on the power. There was no apparent reason for the go-around, unless the controller wanted to give a few of the aircraft waiting to take off a chance. On the next final, when just a few hundred feet away from the touchdown, a Cessna 172 sideslipped in front of me and continued on to land. The tower told me to go around again, but this time I had 20° flaps, so lift was no problem — only it's hard on the engine. The third attempt was successful, especially when I told the tower that if they didn't let me down soon I'd feel as though I had gone into orbit. The landing was very short and I turned off at the first intersection, but maybe I should have gone right to the end of the runway and tied the whole thing up for a few minutes.

A NEW AIRPORT? We mentioned here a few weeks ago that things were getting rough for the independent operators at Cartierville, and that they should start thinking about moving in the near future. It was a known fact that DOT have been considering building an airport at Ste. Therese, but an announcement this week states they have given up their options. The questions are again before us: where will these operators move, and when? There is some talk about going to St. Eustache, but nobody seems to know much about this. Good locations are getting few and far between with the housing boom on, and it will hurt the flying schools if they are forced to move too far out of town. It's hard to get out to Cartierville, and some place farther would be even worse. However, we can do nothing more than wait and see.

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Obituaries

R. A. DARWIN

Robert A. Darwin, prominent Montreal business man and philanthropist, died Monday in Los Angeles. He was 81.

Born in Latvia, Mr. Darwin came to Montreal in 1899. A pioneer in the ladies' retail ready-to-wear business in this city, he built up a chain of retail fashion stores in Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Quebec City and Sault Ste. Marie. He retired from business in 1938.

An ardent Zionist, he was one of the founders of the Shaar Hashomayim Synagogue and was active in the Jewish Immigration Aid Society. He also helped found the Elmridge Country Club and the Old People's Home on Esplanade ave.

Mr. Darwin is survived by two sons, Sam Darwin of Los Angeles and Harry Darwin, a newsman with the Boston Herald; two daughters, Mrs. N. Simpson (Bertha) and Mrs. S. Baker (Betty); five grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

A. M. GREENBERG

Albert M. Greenberg of Montreal, president of A. L. Green Ltd. Department Stores, died accidentally by drowning in Israel last Wednesday. He was 57.

A native of Montreal, Mr. Greenberg was a prominent member of the Jewish community here. He contributed actively to many charitable campaigns and organizations.

A member of the Canadian Club and of the Brotherhood of the Shaar Hashomayim Synagogue, he also was honorary secretary of the Friends of the Hebrew University and a governor of the Talmud Torah School, the Jewish General Hospital, Camp B'nai Brith and the YMHA. He was also a director of several companies.

Mr. Greenberg is survived by his wife, Celia; two sons, Phillip and Leon; two daughters, Janice and Selma; six sisters, Mrs. Rachel Hendelman, Mrs. Mary Herscovici, Mrs. Sarah Harris, Mrs. Rose Schwartz, Mrs. Minnie Silberberg and Mrs. Evelyn Busner; and three brothers, Michael Greenberg, Dr. Sahler Greenberg and Louis Greenberg.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been announced.

ANDREW S. MAW

Funeral services were held Monday from the William Wray Chapel on University street for Andrew Stewart Maw, for many years a resident of Mont Pleasant avenue, who passed away at his home Friday evening following a lengthy illness.

Born in Howick, Que., he was educated there and at Hemmingford, and came to Montreal when still in his teens to enter the grocery and provision business with his brother. The business expanded and they operated three stores. On the dissolution of the partnership Mr. Maw went into the taxi business and was affiliated with Murray Hill Taxis.

Active in church and community work, Mr. Maw had belonged to the Calvin Presbyterian Church and Calvary Church. He was a counsellor to the late Dr. Albert Cliffe, and was associated with the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, members of which conducted the funeral services.

Mr. Maw is survived by his wife the former Consola Fraid, and a daughter Emily, Mrs. S. G. Hallas. Interment was in Mount Royal Cemetery.

Association charges question needs study

Citizens of Westmount will be faced with a new set of facts and figures regarding the proposed swimming pool when the Westmount Municipal Association holds an open meeting Dec. 13, when Mayor Cushing, City Manager Dawe and the entire Council will be invited to attend and answer residents' questions.

Not a great deal of study was put into the matter of a swimming pool prior to last month's open meeting staged by the City, said recreation chairman Forrester, who is prepared to quote figures to illustrate that a feasible and economical plan for a pool in Westmount is not inconceivable.

"We could put up a small pool for a low cost," stated Mr. Forrester, unequivocally.

Charging that the estimates presented at the meeting of October 25 by the City were too high, Mr. Forrester and his committee have compiled a set of facts and figures relative to pools built and operated in certain of the States with climatical prob-

lems similar to those encountered here.

The City was scored for not having produced a précis at the meeting on the distribution of child population and other pertinent statistics.

"The buck was passed at the last meeting on the pool question, but they (the swimming pool committee) should have an idea by now," said one member of the WMA.

Another man said he felt the swimming pool meeting was so fervently democratic in method that it left everybody in a state of confusion, as it lacked guidance.

"We had endorsed the principle of a swimming pool, but we did (Continued on page 14)



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Tax bill receives 2nd, final reading

Westmount City Council, going through a relatively unimportant agenda Monday night, voted \$6,175 to the Fire Department from the depreciation reserve to buy new fire hose from a firm which did not submit the lowest tender.

Quotations were received from five firms: Wilson & Cousins, Levitt-Safety Limited, Goodyear Tire and Rubber, Dunlop Canada Limited, and B. F. Goodrich Canada Limited, Goodyear submitting the lowest tender.

Alderman Drury recommended to Council that they accept the tender of Wilson & Cousins, \$310 higher than Goodyear (and second lowest bidder) because the Fire Department felt their type of hose would be more suitable.

The purchase was being made, it was said, to bring the departmental stock up to normal requirements.

TAXES AGAIN

The new tax by-law, granting nominal reductions in the mill rate on an increased valuation scale, received second and third readings, thereby preparing Westmounters for an added knock in the pocket-book for the coming fiscal year.

No mention was made of what special tax will be levied to pay the Montreal Metropolitan Corporation's share of the Metro boulevard for the coming year.

OTHER BUSINESS

With a typical wide range of quotations in response to tenders, a list of three firms asking for the job of demolishing two cooling towers at the Glen road power plant was read.

Highest bid for the job came from Britannia Demolition, \$9,440. The lowest, and that accepted, was from Beaver Demolition, \$1,225. Intermediate bid, but still at variance, was from W. Lajeunesse & Company Limited, \$3,350.

It was explained by Alderman

Quimet that it was necessary to remove the towers to provide adequate space for the proposed new snow melting pond.

TOUGH LUCK

With the air that Council must always be impartial, the subject of the recent fire at Mitchell's Electrical Appliances, 1271 Greene, was brought up under the general heading "repair of non-conforming building."

It was stated that the building, valued at \$31,900, would cost \$4,782 to repair after the fire there two weeks ago.

Mitchell's had been burgled just a few days before the fire, and the fire was only one of several they have had this year, it was disclosed.

Alderman Drury, introducing the (Continued on page 14)

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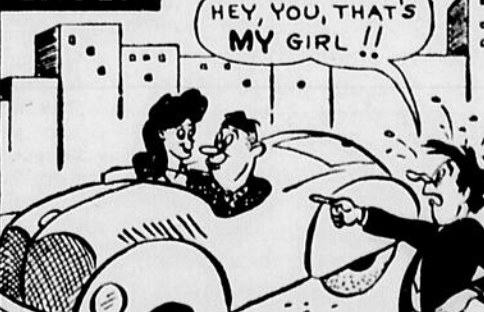


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WE SAY

Let's stop talking way into recession

A DISQUIETING lull hangs over the local business community.

None but the most blind can see that retail trade hereabouts is off; in some lines, off badly.

Merchants are apprehensive. They are saying: "There's no money around," or "Folks just aren't spending just now."

Some, really hanging the crepe, say "A recession is coming."

Well, is it?

We frankly don't know.

But this we do know: We can jolly well talk ourselves into bad business, recession, and worse.

Perhaps our governments, at all levels, started it. The Federal people with their Winter Works Program talk, have the country scared stiff with forecasts of worsening unemployment.

What happens? Folks with good jobs, better prospects, get apprehensive. They hesitate spending as they normally would. The merchant promptly notices and feels this. The salesmen calling on stores find orders trimmed or postponed. The head office notes the drop in deliveries, inventories start piling up. There are warnings of factory layoffs, creating more apprehension; and then the real thing . . . unemployment . . . recession.

Something very real can be done at the local level to counter all this:

First, straighten up, square the shoulders and smile. Next, exude some confidence instead of gloom. If you're a factory worker, put some zip into your job and stop worrying. If you're an executive, keep your pessimism to yourself. If you're a merchant, hang out the sale signs instead of the crepe, shout your bargains, advertise them.

Let's snap out of this blue funk before we sink into real trouble.

Remembrance Day tribute an honor

Sir: The citizens of Westmount can take pride in being given an opportunity to be present and participate in the dignified and touching tribute paid on Remembrance Day to those from their midst who gave their lives to preserve democracy and the institutions they revere.

The numerous beautiful wreaths deposited at the monument to those who gave their all was silent and moving testimony to their memory and sacrifice.

Units of the Army, Navy and Air Force were present giving the ceremony that evidence of patriotism for which it has earned the esteem and respect of sister municipalities. The veterans of two World Wars, wearing their berets and medals, were well represented. They marched with a vigor that showed their pride as former members of the regiments to which they belonged.

Remembrance and the paying of honored tribute to those who made the supreme sacrifice is a reminder that until swords are turned into ploughshares, even the peace loving democracies must count upon the loyalty and patriotism of their citizens to be prepared to prevent and resist any attempt to invade their lands and enslave their citizens.

The several units taking part in the parade were reviewed by His Worship the mayor, the members of the City Council and invited guests. They are entitled to the thanks of the citizens of Westmount for turning out the numbers they did.

The members of Westmount's fine police force under the command of chief Richard Edmonstone and Inspectors Andrew Lowson and Ovilva Arsenault were posted at assigned stations to direct traffic and assist in carrying out the well prepared programme. Westmount is occasionally referred to as Canada's most aristocratic city since it conforms to those standards of excellence that has earned for it the reputation it enjoys as a splendidly administered municipality dedicated to the welfare of its citizens.

In all that it does and plans credit must be given to its Mayor and Council and devoted administrative personnel.

'Your souls shall be where the heroes are'

It is the universality of Remembrance Day—the wish not to forget—that unites the hearts of all who will bow their heads in observance of the traditional two minutes' silence November 11.

Many will remember husbands, fathers, sons or brothers who fell on the battlefield whether on land, on sea or in the air in either of two devastating World Wars. The day is usually marked on a Sunday by appropriate ceremonies held throughout Canadian cities and towns at local cenotaphs.

The very young may see little or no significance in the ceremonies. Two small boys with skates broke through the crowd in the midst of a Remembrance Day prayer at a cenotaph last Sunday, and almost made it across the park through the ranks of soldiers standing at attention. Two policemen restrained them and made them take the long way around. An elderly woman standing nearby looked at the youngsters and slowly shook her head.

Armistice Day, as it is still called in England, is the anniversary of the cessation of hostilities in World War I, November 11, 1918, and the signing of an armistice between the Allies and Germany. It is more often known as Remembrance Day and on that day the fallen of two World Wars are honored.

Not a legal holiday in Canada,

it is one in 23 of the United States and is observed in others by the governor's proclamation.

Special services will be held in Ottawa Friday when mothers whose sons died for their country will place wreaths at the Cenotaph.

It has been said concerning the purpose of this day: "What we are paying tribute to on Armistice Day is the democratic ideal of equality, to the unknown individual, whoever he may be, who gave up his life."

A children's encyclopedia says: "Remembrance Day is observed on November 11, the anniversary of the day in 1918 when World War I hostilities stopped. It is still called Armistice Day in some other allied countries that fought in World War I. On that day we remember with gratitude the men of World War I who fought, particularly those who gave their lives for the honor and safety of our land."

In 1920 Armistice Day was signaled in both England and France by the burial of an unknown soldier in the highest place of honor the country could give, in England in Westminster Abbey, in France beneath the Arc de Triomphe, in the States in Arlington National Cemetery, Washington, D.C.

The tomb of Canada's Unknown Soldier rests upon an altar of black marble in the Peace Tower at Ottawa, with

the Book of Remembrance listing the names of the more than 60,000 sons and daughters of Canada who died in World War I.

The word "armistice" derives from the Latin "arma" meaning "arms" and "stitium" meaning "stopping". It was originally spelled "armastitium" and was defined in 1644 as "a cessation from arms for a time, a short truce." Later, in 1733, it became "armistice" and was defined: "a cessation of hostilities when all parties instead of fighting, fall to intriguing." This seems apt today in view of the modern world's cold war atmosphere.

It seems an armistice may be general or particular, according to this indisputable reference. In a general armistice there is a "complete cessation of hostile operations in every part of the dominions of the belligerent powers," while a particular armistice refers to a sort of temporary truce allowing besieged forces and besiegers to collect the wounded and bury the dead during a very limited period of time.

There is a handful of poems about wars and their heroes which have been quoted and re-quoted on Remembrance Day, but perhaps one of the simpler and seldom heard poems is Joyce Kilmer's

High conviction rate

Court cases in Westmount in September totalled 1,057, including 1,026 traffic offences. And, as usual, there was only one dismissal, in keeping with the average over the past 10 months.

Of the total number of court cases, 944 were on court tickets, 74 arrests, 38 summonses and one warrant. In addition, 793 cases were carried over from August.

Convictions totalled 1,047, one dismissal and 802 put over until October.

Caution tickets issued for traffic infractions numbered 740 and summonses issued as a result of caution tickets totalled 36.

Figures indicate it certainly doesn't pay to be caught speeding in Westmount! 102 speeding tickets were issued, and 102 speeding cases were brought before the court. Two arrests were made on the spot.

Total accidents within the City during the month totalled 95 with injuries to 25 persons. There

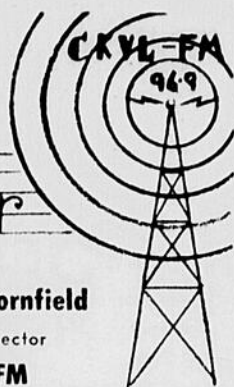

The annual Choir Festival of the Town of Mount Royal will be held in St. Peter's Anglican Church, 8:15 p.m. Four choirs will be participating. Ayla Erudaru, violinist and Guy Fallot, cellist, will be heard in a joint recital for Les Jeunesses Musicales at Plateau Hall on Friday, 8:30 p.m. The Ice Capades opening at the Forum Sunday feature 'Operama' — something the masters of yore had surely not envisioned. The National Ballet opens Monday at Her Majesty's and pianist Leon Fleisher is the soloist in Beethoven's Third Concerto in the Montreal Symphony concert Plateau Hall, Tuesday and Wednesday. Josef Krips is the conductor and other works on the program are Mozart's Eine Kleine Nachtmusik and Brahms' Second Symphony.

ON THE AIR

NEW RECORDS

Dvorak — Symphony No. 4 in G, Op. 88/Carnaval Overture, London Symphony Orchestra, Antal Dorati/Mercury MG 50236 (Monaural).

A beautiful sounding record of this lovely, melodious opus by Dvorak. Individual instruments stand out clearly and if the Stereo version is as good as the mono, it should prove to be a sonic blockbuster.

Mussorgsky — Pictures at an Exhibition/Prokofiev — Sonata No. 7 in B Flat, Op. 83, Sviatoslav Richter, Piano/ARTIA ALP-154 (Monaural).

Soviet pianist Sviatoslav Richter is currently in the U.S. on his first tour beyond the Iron Curtain and this is his latest release. By unanimous critical acclaim, he is the pianist 'who has everything' — an astounding technique coupled with the uncanny ability to infuse each note he plays with feeling. On the present disc he plays the original Mussorgsky score of the 'Pictures' better known to all in the brilliant orchestration by Ravel, as well as the immensely difficult Prokofiev Sonata in B Flat, both with breathtaking virtuosity.

Tchaikovsky — Concerto No. 1 in B Flat Minor, S. Richter, piano and Czech Philharmonic Orch., Karel Ancerl/Parliament PLP-120 (Monaural).

The budget-priced Parliament label (a cultural exchange presentation) is a terrific bargain. Gilels was my favorite for this concerto — until now. As for sound, I find this disc comparable to the very best, with excellent orchestral support from the Czech Philharmonic, one of Europe's finest orchestras.

The organ is glorious

The organ is a glorious instrument, ethereal and sonorous. Few people perform on the instrument at the advanced age of 87. Yes, indeed to reach four score and seven is remarkable but to still play the organ at that age is a real achievement. Mrs. R. N. Mitchell plays two to three hours every week in Trinity Memorial Church.

There are not many people in Montreal who can recall all the important organists, their work and know the history of most of the fine organs of this city as well as Kate Verity Mitchell L.L.C.M., F.I.G.C.M. (Eng.).

I have before me a treatise written by Mrs. Mitchell that relates some of the events of musical life from the year 1892. Not only is it interesting because it tells about a musician who is dedicated to the organ with a love for music that keeps her life rich in her twilight days but enlightens the reader about the various church organs, their makes, tone and organ performers of renown in this city who have passed on and several who are still in the foreground.

Mrs. Mitchell has much to say about Trinity Memorial Church, where she has been voluntary assistant organist since 1931 and still practises three hours weekly through the kindness of the Rector, Archdeacon R. Kenneth Naylor and wardens.

Her career as a church organist began in St. Stephen's Church, Chambly Canton where Mrs. Mitchell (at that time Kate Verity) played for five years. It is of historical interest to know that this House of Worship is one of the oldest Anglican Churches in Canada, having been built during the military occupation of Fort Chambly.

The young organist went to study with J. Edgar Birch at Christ Church Cathedral. She tells in detail about the fine organ and how much she enjoyed her lessons and practise periods when she came in to Montreal twice a week from Chambly.

Among the fine organists mentioned that she heard and knew are Mr. Hilton of Dominion Square Methodist Church; Mr. Reed, blind organist of American Presbyterian Church; Octave Pelletier, St. James Cathedral; Professor Fowler, at St. Patrick's; John Norton,

who replaced Mr. Birch at Christ Church Cathedral; H. W. Reynier, at St. James the Apostle; Dr. Alfred Whitehead and Mr. C. V. Frayn at Trinity Memorial Church.

Mrs. Mitchell is alert and finds that her music is her greatest comfort. Let us hope that this remarkable lady will continue to enjoy her music for a long time.

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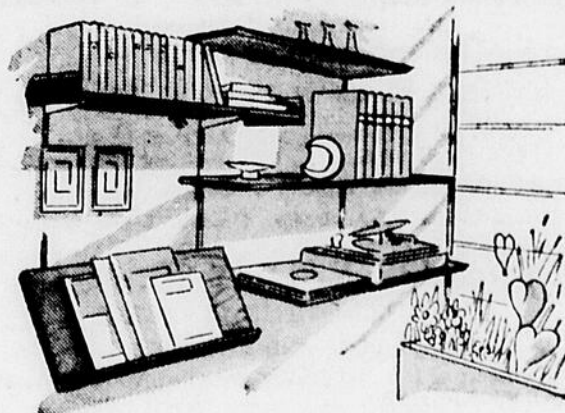

The Chickens

The internal policy of the Anglo-Saxon-Celtic world has never been more unfortunately displayed than at the present time. The moral stature of the West has never diminished so disastrously.

For decade after decade we have said in effect, "We are the people and wisdom will die with us." It was a very distinguished Anglican who asserted a generation ago that there are lesser breeds without the law, and we are their superiors. The English have never been able to shake off their superiority in regard to those races. The Americans have never recovered from their slave-owning mentality. It is a century since Lincoln invoked civil war to free the slaves but it is only now that de-segregation is slowly taking effect. And even now the heads of African States have difficulty in finding accommodation when they attend the meetings of the United Nations. It may not be any great loss materially to the United States to lose the privilege of housing the United Nations, but it will be a tremendous blow to their prestige in the sight of the new nations of Africa and Asia, and even South America. We Canadians do ourselves little credit by trying to bolster up that prestige. We had a place of honor among the smaller nations, but it is doubtful if we still have it; and that at a time when new nations are most in need of our disinterested help.

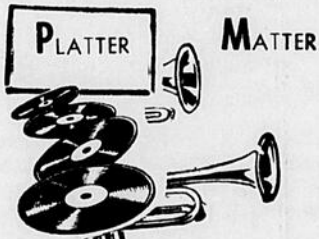
Every time that the western nations force their will on the rest of the world the prestige of Russia rises; not because Russia is disinterested but because she does not pretend to be. The combination of high claims for righteousness and the exhibition of anti-color sentiment will turn nations against us in spite of our generosity in material things.

Perhaps if we remembered a little more of the world's history we should exhibit a little less

pride. Civilization grew up in the eastern end of the Mediterranean. The great primary discoveries were made there—the wedge, the lever, the sail, the wheel, the use of stone for building, the making of brick, the domestication of animals and the cultivation of grain, the use of an alphabet and the recording of annals. All these and much more are the gifts to us of nations whom we despise. It was in that great civilization square and to the east of it that the major living religious of the world grew up. It was there that the human spirit took its first step forward. It was a North African Deacon who saved orthodox Christianity in the Fourth Century, and a North African Bishop who set the pattern of Christian civilization in the Fifth Century.

It is true that the western nations have made their contributions in politics and in Science and Technology, but those give us no authority to lord it over nations that are older than we and that have their gifts and their needs. At any rate, with each of the new nations exercising a vote in the United Nations, they are not likely to tolerate our dictation. The continued exclusion of China is a case in point. I hold no brief for China, and I fear what may happen to the Nationalist army in Formosa, but I also fear that the only way to exercise any influence on China is to give her a place in the United Nations. It will be very strange if this last rebuff is not followed by fresh pressure on India; and it is India whom we have offended most deeply by our exclusion of China. We sometimes say that our morality has not kept pace with our technology. Unfortunately our politics suffers under the same condemnation.

Since this was written a big taxi company has exercised discrimination against its negro porters on the ground of bilingualism. Again a black eye to our sense of fairness.

London: Giuseppe Di Stefano Operatic Recital. 5488. One of the finest and most thrilling operatic tenors of the day is young Giuseppe Di Stefano whose debut was made but fourteen years ago. At that time he sang as *des Grieux* in Massenet's *Manon* at the Teatro Municipale in Reggio Emilia, and within six months was singing on the stage of the famed La Scala. Mr. Di Stefano has a powerful voice which he can control equally well in a full bel canto or a crooning falsetto, amply demonstrated in this superb collection of operatic arias. Of the group the most popular and appealing are two great arias from Tosca, 'Recondita Armonia' and 'E Lucevan le Stelle,' 'Nessun Dorma' from Puccini's last opera Turandot, 'Le Reve' from Manon, 'The Flower Song' from Carmen and 'Salut demeure' from Gounod's Faust. Other selections are from the operas Andrea Chenier, Werther and Les Pecheurs de Perles, and the orchestras used are those of L'Accademia di Santa Cecilia, Rome, and the Zurich Tonhalle under conductor Franco Patane.

On 5482 'La Voce D'Italia' we again hear Mr. Di Stefano in some light Italian songs which are enhanced by this great voice and the excellent musical accompaniment of an orchestra under Dino Olivieri. We particularly enjoyed 'Come E bello,' 'Fili d'oro,' 'Chitarra Romane.'

MD campaign opens Nov. 20

November 20 will mark the opening day of the 1960 March for Muscular Dystrophy, a week-long campaign for funds to help medical science defeat one of childhood's saddest diseases.

Muscular dystrophy wastes leg, arm, shoulder and other voluntary muscles, leaving the victim so weak that a slight respirator infection can prove fatal. It is estimated that in Canada alone there are about 20,000 victims, two-thirds of them children.

Symbol of their plight is 11-year-old Michael DuBreuil, who has been chosen by The Muscular Dystrophy Association of Canada as Junior Chairman for its 1960 campaign in Quebec. Michael has had MD since infancy and faces a bleak future if science is not able to find a cure for MD within this decade.

As in previous years, the honorary campaign chairman will be Bernard Geoffrion, member of the Canadian hockey team.

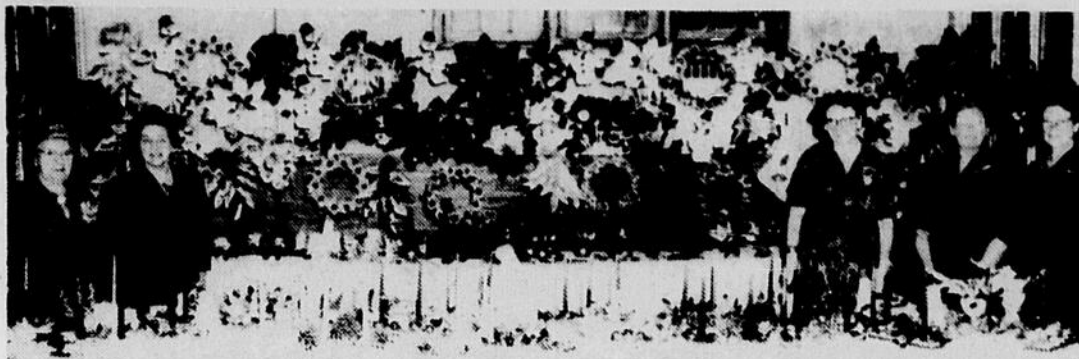

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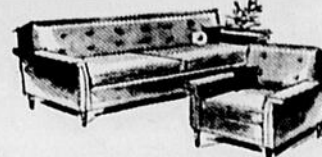
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National Ballet Guild gala opening on Nov. 15

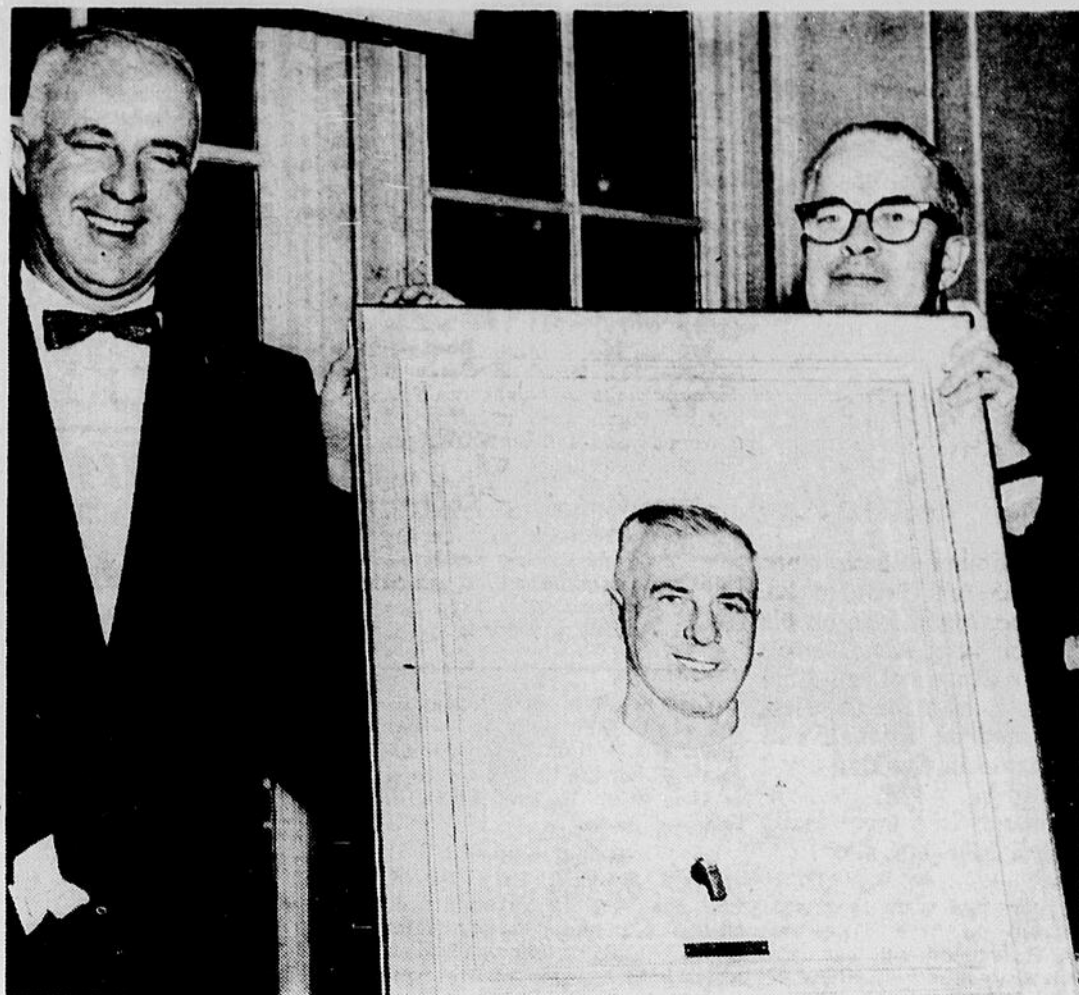

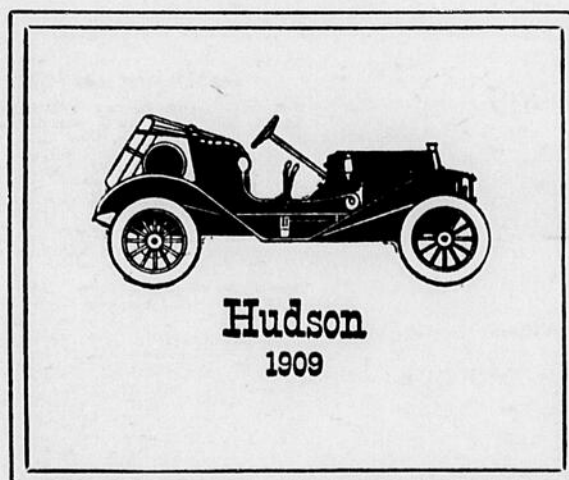
