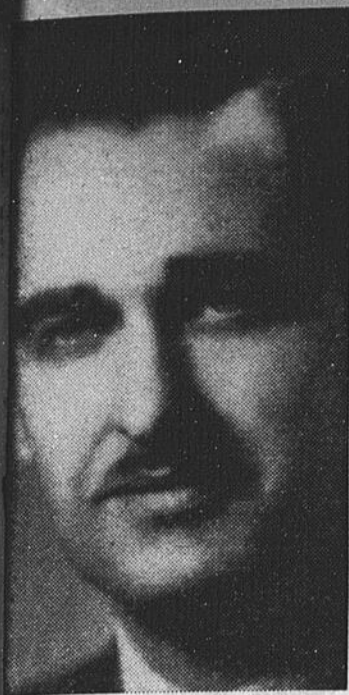


# BLAST KILLS CITY WORKER

Westmount police today are investigating the possibility that a leak in illuminating gas pipes in the area caused the explosion Wednesday that resulted in the death of Mario Bersechino who was killed when a manhole cover struck him on the head. It was his second day on the city job.

The accident happened on Bevedere Road near Summit, when Bersechino was working with Mick Credico who was also injured.

The pair went to the scene in response to a report that the manhole cover was above the street level. They were reported attempting to pry the cover up with picks when the explosion occurred.



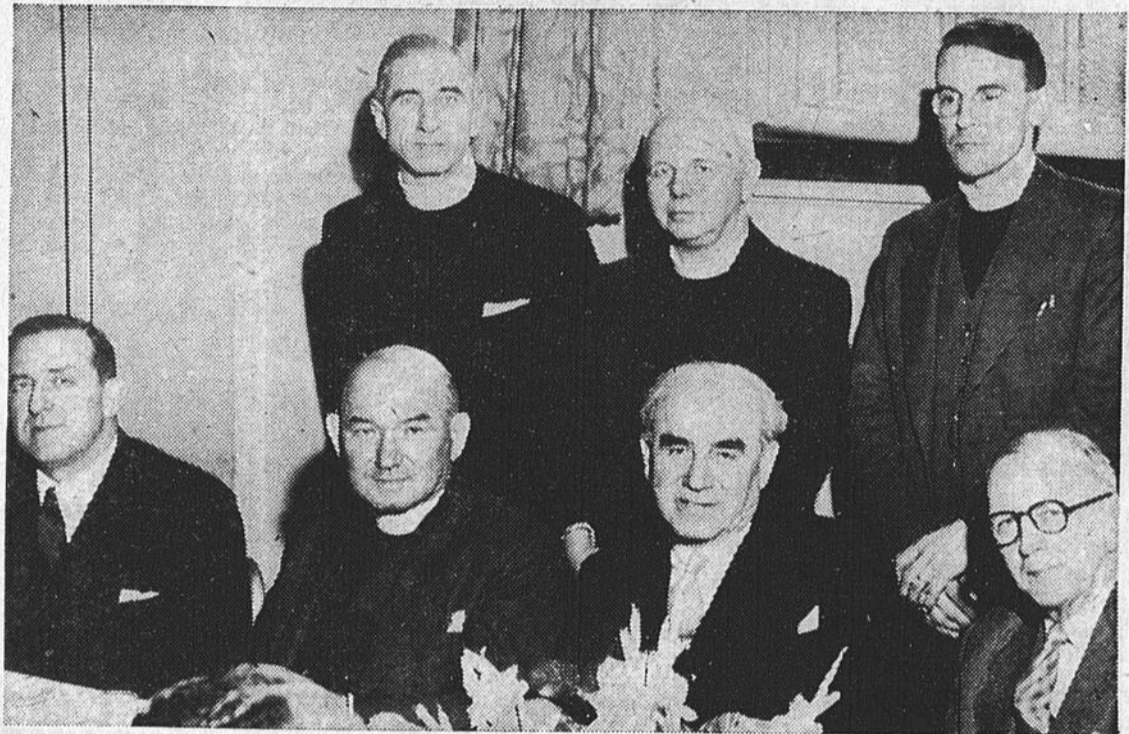

## Ideals Of Scouting Answer To World Ills Moore Tells Rotary

"The Boy Scouts Eighth World Jamboree at Niagara-on-the-Lake this summer is the answer to some of the problems which are facing the world today", Earl T. Moore told members of the Rotary Club of Westmount at Victoria Hall on Wednesday.

Mr. Moore said that to see more than 10,000 boys from 60 different countries living together for 10 days in close harmony and fellowship was a sight he would never forget.

He said that maybe something like this could help solve world problems.

Following the brief words of Mr. Moore, members of the Westmount Club saw a film which was taken during last summer's World Jamboree at Niagara-on-the-Lake.

The film which was in color, traced the activities of the jamboree from the opening day ceremonies to the closing parade through the streets of the city. Scenes of the opening ceremonies, officiated at by Governor - General Vincent Massey were included in the film as was the Scouts visit to Toronto's Canadian National Exhibition.

One of the highlights of the jamboree, recorded by the film was the visit of the Scouts to Niagara Falls.

## Operation Snow Well Under-way Says Westmount

All roads in Westmount were passable 'immediately after' this week's snow storm, officials report, and by week's end snow banks should have been cleared from all thoroughfares in the municipality.

Most of the snow is trucked away — while on some side streets it is blown onto vacant lots and lawns.

Westmount has 37.6 miles of roads to clean and 80 miles of sidewalks and a lot of it is up steep grades. A total of 15 tractors, 6 snow-blowers, 8 road plows, 7 foremen's trucks and a large grader were used to battle the latest snowfall.

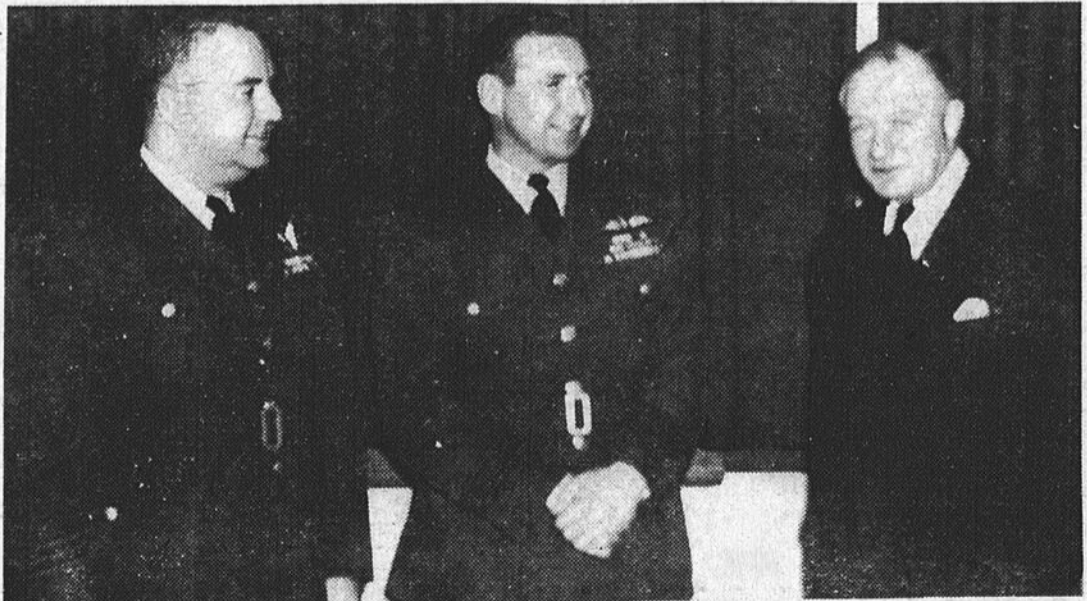
In all about 200 men were at work on the snow, it was reported, 100 from the regular staff and another 75 to 100 hired for the occasion.

Snow removal costs in '54 were \$279,675 officials report and last year the figure was \$263,275. This year's total cannot be guessed at, as yet. However, the first four weeks total is \$60,250 as against \$75,500 a year ago.

## "The Time of the Cuckoo"

West Hill Theatre Starting February 29th

The Montreal Repertory Theatre returns to West Hill Theatre this month for its production of *The Time of the Cuckoo*, by Arthur Laurents. Under the direction of Ramer Henry, the play will run for seven nights, of which four will be open to members and the public, from Wednesday, February 29, to Saturday, March 3.

*The Time of the Cuckoo*, Laurents' fourth play, was originally produced by Canada's Robert Whitehead at the Empire Theatre in 1952, and was the last play to be performed in that historic old "show palace", as one reviewer called it. Shirley Booth, now Broadway's favourite actress, had her first starring role as Leona Samish, the secretary from the American middle west in search of a romantic ideal in Italy.

The scene is set in Venice, in the garden of a pension which borders a small canal. Here Leona, and four fellow Americans, are viewing Italian art, Italian culture and Italian people for the first time. Leona, a spinster verging on middle age, is attracted to a charming Italian shop-keeper who invites her to have coffee with him in the Piazza. Before he calls for her, she is shocked to discover he is married, and torn by her longing for romance and by the strict code of behaviour which she believes is the only way of life.

Arthur Laurents stated in an interview that he saw Leona Samish as typically American — typical, he explained, of a great majority of Ameri-

cans whose sense of frustration and insecurity is the result of "hiding our emotions behind jokes, our inability to believe in very much but the tangible, and the constant fear of being taken."

*The Time of the Cuckoo* will be the first play Ramer Henry has directed for MRT. Its Venetian setting will be designed by Arthur Voronka, who has been responsible for the sets in all MRT's productions this season.

## Local Resident Plays Big Role In Scout Drive

A local resident took a leading role when the Montreal premiere of the Eighth World Scout Jamboree film was held Monday in Victoria Hall, Westmount.

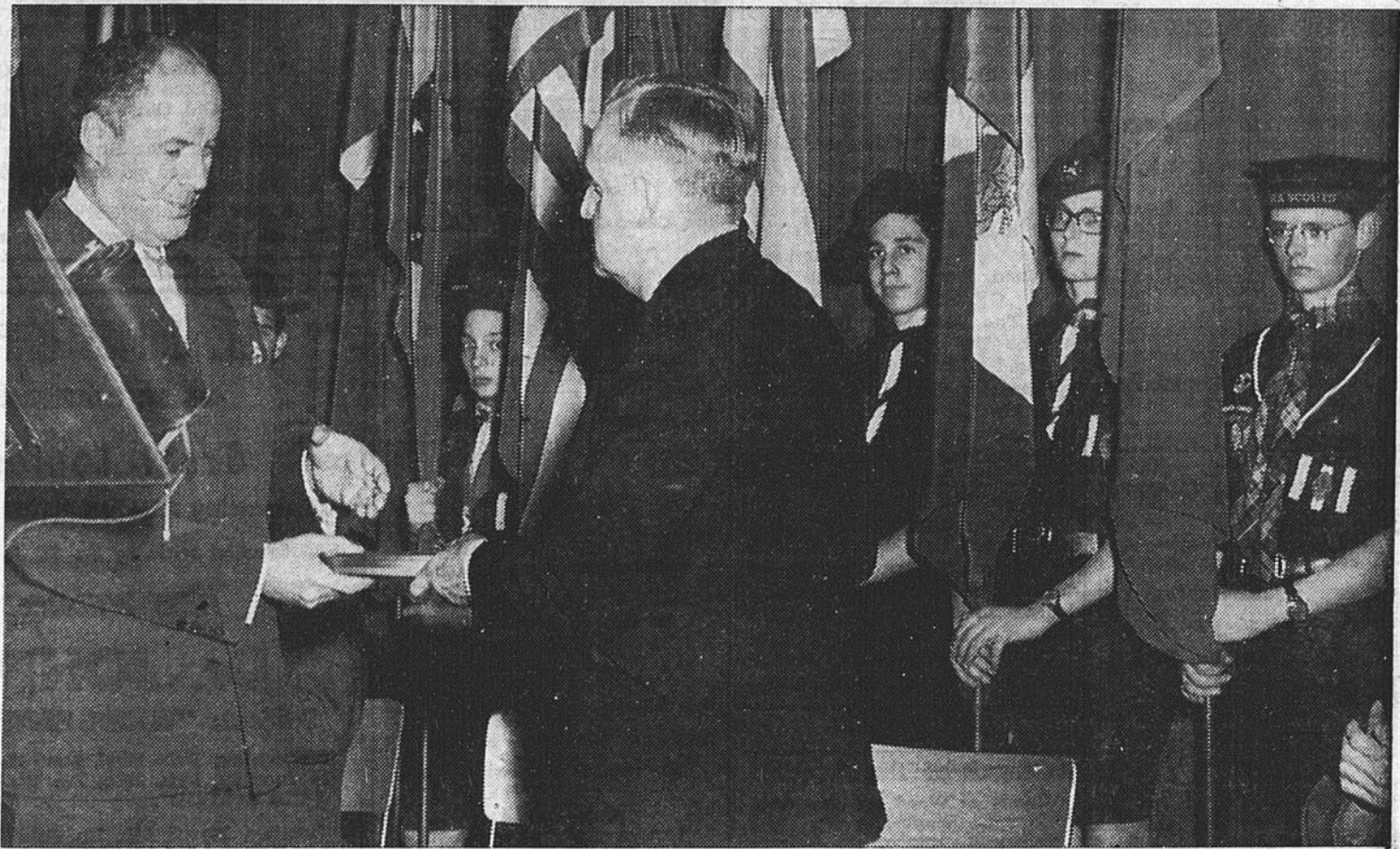
J. W. Eaton, 482 Mount Pleasant Ave., general manager of the T. Eaton Co., presented the specially prepared colored movie to B. W. Roberts, president of the provincial council for the Boy Scouts Association.

Venture for Sea Scouts, \$5,000; expenses of the twelve Montreal districts within their own areas, \$5,000; contribution to the Quebec Provincial Council on a per-boy basis, \$25,000; administration, maintenance of headquarters building, etc., 42,400; contributions from certain companies national in scope who make a single payment through their Montreal offices, which contributions are turned over to Canadian headquarters, \$8,000; and, in reduction of previous deficits, \$24,000.

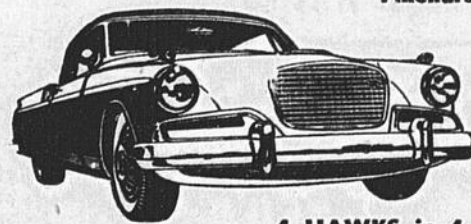

Its aims and objects are to foster a bond of union among the women and children of the British Commonwealth; to care for the widows, orphans and dependents of Service men; to provide an efficient organization by which prompt and initial action may be taken in times of emergency; to preserve the memory of brave and historic deeds and the last resting places of our heroes and heroines, especially those in distant places.

Mrs. L. B. Smart, National President, I.O.D.E., said that the 960 I.O.D.E. Chapters in Canada raise and spend nearly one million dollars each year on their projects, and that the members, who number over 32,000, do a great deal of philanthropic and educational work.

This year, from its First and Second War Memorial Funds alone, the Order is providing 13 post-graduate scholarships (overseas) of \$2,000 each, and 20 bursaries to the value of \$1,600 each, in Canadian universities. These two educational memorials represent only a portion of the \$240,000 assistance given to Canadian students and schools, as Chapters of the Order in every province, and the Yukon, work in their own localities providing books, educational supplies and monetary aid for fees, transportation and hot lunches.

Through the continuous work of I.O.D.E. members, thousands of knitted and sewn articles of clothing, and quilts, are distributed in Canada, Great Britain, Europe and Korea.

A productive year of work with disturbed teen-aged girls was reported recently at the annual meeting of the Girls' Cottage School, held in the Red Feather Building, 1040 Atwater Avenue. The School, located at St. Bruno, Que., gave residential care and training to 63 girls of 11 to 18 years in the course of a year. The average length of stay was 238 days and 32 new girls were admitted to the School.

Reporting for the Board of Directors, Mrs. Gordon Jamieson, Recording Secretary, noted the establishment of an in-town office in the Red Feather Building, from which continuing help is given girls who have been discharged from residential care and returned to a degree of independence. The girls are no longer cut off from the security and guidance they enjoyed at the School and can turn confidently for help in the further work of self-rehabilitation.

Well integrated staff work has made the School an increasingly healthy and happy place, Mrs. Jamieson said. It has also been possible to extend the scope of the work of reorganizing lives in an atmosphere of freedom and trust.

## Norman Holland, Philanthropist, Paid Final Tribute Tuesday

Norman Holland, 3749 The Boulevard, Montreal philanthropist, died here last Saturday at the age of 75. Services were held Tuesday.

A retired paint company executive, Mr. Holland devoted his time to many charitable works one of which was the Shriner's Hospital for Crippled Children.

Born in Montreal on Nov. 20, 1880, Mr. Holland was the son of George Holland and Amelia Munsinger. He studied at Montreal High School and went to Bishop's College, Lennoxville, where he specialized in chemistry.

Mr. Holland organized the Holland Varnish Co. Ltd. in 1910 and he ran it successfully until 1928, when he sold out to international Paints Ltd.

Mr. Holland was for a number of years president of the Last Post Fund for the Province of Quebec and the Dominion of Canada. He retired from these posts in 1955. He was a director of the Real Need of Happiness Toy Shops, an organization which distributes thousands of toys to underprivileged children every Christmas.

He was a life governor of the Montreal General and Lachine General Hospitals and also of the Montreal Diet Dispensary. He was a past president and life governor for the Boys' Home of Montreal and a director of the Dieppe House for Epileptics at St. Hilaire.

Mr. Holland was a fellow of the Chemical Society, London, England, and a member of the Canadian Society of the Chemical Industry, the Montreal Board of Trade, the Newcomen Society of London, England, the Royal Empire Society and the Canadian Authors Association.

## Air Cadet Training Is Lauded In Talk By Squadron-Leader

The training given to Canada's air cadets extends into civilian life, Sqdn. Ldr. A. R. MacKenzie, DFC of Air Defence Command, St. Hubert, told a joint meeting Monday of all Montreal English-speaking air cadet units, in Westmount Junior High School.

The squadrons were guests of No. 1 West Montreal unit. They included 69 and 541 Verdun; 583 and 592 Canadair; 21st Mount Royal; 555 Maple Leaf; and 518 Rosemount.

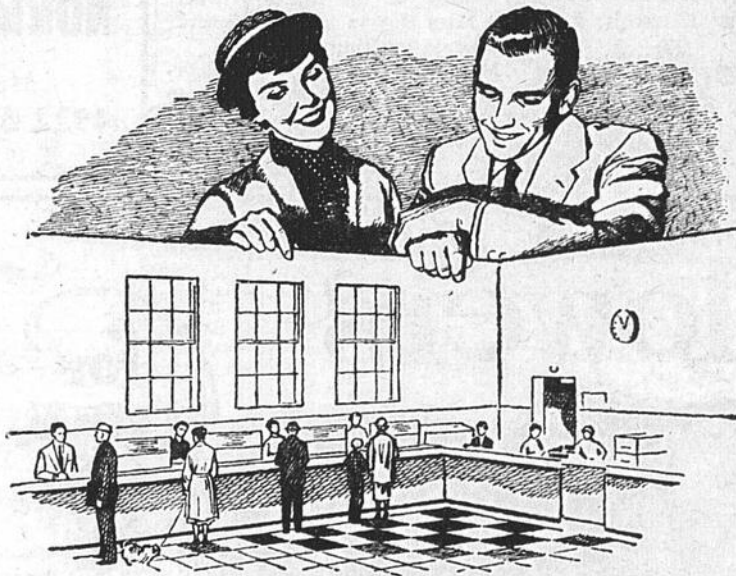
