## Next week's weather

September 25 to October 2

This week closes the warm portion of the autumn, so although days are sunny and warm, nights will be frosty. Killing frosts in southern counties. Very cold with a little snow in the north and both shores of the Gulf.

Days pleasant and warm through the middle of the week, then windy with intermittent showers, possibly mixed with snow. This is equinoctial gale week.

Forests put on their autumn show at this time, although many trees were already red in August and have not lost their leaves. Mainly sunny for the weekend.

## Pre-inspection aids fighters in flash fire

Fire raged for 15 minutes this week on the 11th floor of the uncompleted high-rise building, Chateau Maisonneuve, at the corner of Claremont and Western avenues.

There were no injuries reported during the fire although flames could be seen from long distances.

The fire broke out at 1.19 p.m. Tuesday in a large pile of insulating material on the 11th floor.

The walls on that floor have not yet been put in and the wind fed fire ran wild for a few minutes.

Firemen were on the scene in minutes and due to a previous inspection of the building, they had fire under control and extinguished quickly.

A by-law in Westmount requires all building under construction to have a Standpipe System installed on every floor as the floors are added to the building. The system comprises of pipes running up the building to which the firemen can connect hoses and by opening a valve, be supplied with water.

Westmount firemen knew where the pipe openings were, how to get to them and by using the pipes on the 10th and 11th floors played two streams on the fast burning fire.

Smoke was a factor in the early minutes of the fire and the winds blew in freely.

Fire officials said later that they are more worried about these high-rise buildings when they are under construction rather than when they are completed. There are more inflammable materials around when the building is under construction.

## Local doctor endorses Immunization Week

Dr. Alan Ross, Physician-in-Chief, Montreal Children's Hospital in endorsing National Immunization Week, September 19-25, states, "The Health League of Canada has organized a concerted program through radio, television and the press to bring before all Canadians the vital importance to the health of this country of the prevention of disease by immunization.

"The prevention of disease, it must be emphasized, is the fundamental aim of the whole medical profession. The work going on in research in our laboratories, the teaching of medical students and the study of disease at the bedside are all part of the great movement to discover how disease can be prevented as well as cured.

"Through painstaking research in numerous medical centres in many countries, it is now possible to prevent a number of diseases. For Canadians these are smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles and, to some

extent, tuberculosis.

"Safe immunizing agents have been produced in amounts to meet the needs of every Canadian child. Health clinics and family doctors are standing waiting to administer these agents.

"The Health League of Canada in essence is reminding us all that every case of poliomyelitis, for example, is a national disgrace. To see that children are made and kept immune to these diseases is the personal responsibility of every parent."

## Christmas, Reyno RCAF's only actives left from "Battle of Britain"

Of the hundreds of Canadians who fought during the Battle of Britain both on the ground and in the air, only two who served in the RCAF are still known to be active in the Air Force today.

One of those two, Group Captain Beverly Evens Christmas, was born and brought up in Westmount.

Christmas was among the Canadian pilots who downed or damaged 200 Luftwaffe fighters.

In the past several years, he has lived in St. Hilaire, P.Q., where he was stationed at the local air base.

On Sept. 2, he moved to Winnipeg where he took over as commander of the RCAF station there.

The only other member of the RCAF in the Battle still in active service is Air Vice Marshal Edwin Michael Reyno, 48, of Halifax. He is now deputy chief of personnel, Canadian Forces Headquarters.

For the RCAF, the Battle of Britain had special significance. It was the force's baptism of

fire. It was then that Canadian airmen flew into action as a force for the first time against an enemy, won their first victories, and suffered their first casualties.

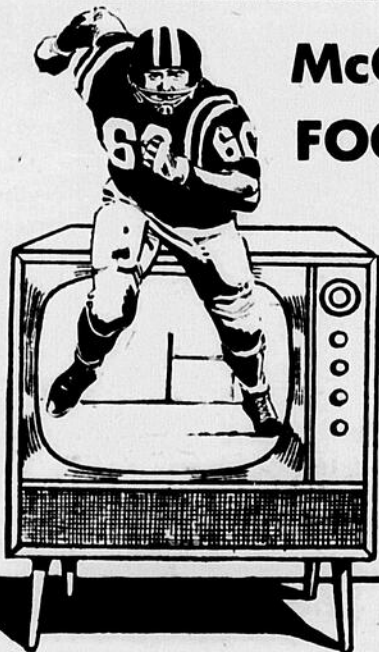

# Star Night set gazers wanted

Rain or not, amateur astronomers will hold their annual "Star Night," Thursday Sept. 30 at 7:00 p.m., it was announced this week. Activities take place in Westmount Park near the corner of Western and Melville or, in case of rain at the nearby Artificial Ice Rink.

The program is presented by the Montreal Centre of the Royal Astronomical Society. Master of Ceremonies will be W. A. Warren, president of the Montreal Centre.

In the programme will be an illustrated talk by **Donald D. Davies** on the "Wonders of the Autumn Sky," along with a two part film on the "Earth and Sky." A question and answer period will be conducted by **Dr. T. F. Morris** and a final illustrated talk on "Canopus, Guide to Mars," will be given by **Bryan Rawlings**.

**THE MOON**

No observation program would be complete without the Earth's own satellite, for no photographs of the Moon, not even those taken by Ranger VII, convey the same impression as a "live show." Look at the Moon through several telescopes, for some will show the whole image while others, using higher magnification, will bring individual craters up close.

**SATURN AND JUPITER**

Twice during Saturn's revolution period of 29½ years its beautiful ring system appears to open out widest; then the rings slowly close until, midway between maxima, they are presented edgewise to the earth and be-

come invisible. The rings are now closing in but still very lovely to behold.

Jupiter is a fine object for a telescope, for many details of its cloud belts are visible and its four largest satellites, Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto, are a source of continual interest as the revolve around the planet. Only three are visible during the early part of this evening but Io will reappear from behind the planet's disk at 10.53 E.D.T.

**DOUBLE STARS**

Many of the stars that appear as single to the unaided eye are actually double stars, binary systems revolving about a common centre of gravity. When the components are of a different spectral classes, they present a pleasing color contrast. Note the colors of Albireo and its companion, Mizar and Alcor, the optical pair in the handle of the Big Dipper, are both binaries which can be resolved with a small telescope.

**OPEN STAR CLUSTERS**

Throughout our galaxy are many irregular aggregations of stars referred to as open clusters. Three have been selected for this evening's program — the Pleiades, a familiar group visible to the unaided eye but unbelievably lovely through a small telescope; the Double Cluster in Perseus, considered the most beautiful cluster in northern latitudes; and a less familiar but lovely cluster, M39 in Cygnus.

## Jewish Blue Box Cavalcade set

The local Progressive Conservatives show no signs of life as yet another week toward Nov. 8 polling day passes by.

The Liberals may be excused for taking their time getting to a nominating convention. For after all Mr. Drury, incumbent and cabinet minister, is their obvious choice.

Even so, they've now said they'll meet next Thursday to name their man.

But something's gone wrong in the Tory camp. Perhaps Mr. Pearson's election writ caught them in disarray. There's not so much as a good rumor of their intentions.

This is not good strategy. It is bad political gamesmanship not to expose your hopeful to the electorate for as long as possible. The NDP's Geoffrey Adams was named months ago.

Tory faithful and non-faithful alike can be forgiven for suspecting that Westmount is being kept open by national party chiefs for a possible Hess-like figure to jump into the fray.

Or behind the scene "pre-nomination nominating" is going on.

In either case, it is bad democracy. Choosing the people for or against whom we shall vote is too serious a business to be left to professional politicians and/or party hacks.

The local P.C. organization should, without further dilly-dally, call a regular, open, unrigged nominating convention. Let's see who Westmount Tories have got to offer.

# Biographical notes on Drury and Adams

The Honourable C. M. Drury, P.C., C.B.E., D.S.O., Q.C., M.P., Minister of Industry, was born on May 7, 1912, at Westmount, Quebec. He was educated at Bishop's College School, Lennoxville; the Royal Military College, McGill University and the Sorbonne.

First elected to the House of Commons for the constituency of St. Antoine - Westmount in 1962, Mr. Drury was re-elected in the April 8, 1963 election and appointed Minister of Defence Production on April 22, 1963. He was appointed as the first Minister of Industry on July 25 of the same year. Mr. Drury is Chairman of the Privy Council Committee on Scientific and Industrial Research, and, as such, he is responsible to Parliament for the National Research Council and Atomic Energy of Canada Limited. He is also responsible to Parliament for Polymer Corporation Limited, among other crown corporations and agencies. Mr. Drury served overseas with the Canadian army in the Second World War and attained the rank of Brigadier. He was Chief of the UNNRA Mission to Warsaw, Poland, from 1945 to 1947, and was associated with the Economic Division, Department of External Affairs from 1947 to 1949. From 1949 to 1955, he served as Deputy Minister, Department of National Defence.

He is a former President of

the United Nations Association in Canada and was President of the Montreal Board of Trade 1961-62, as well as President of the Canadian Centenary Council and Chairman of the Montreal Branch of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs. He also served as a member of the Northwest Territories Council.

Immediately prior to his appointment to the Cabinet, he was President of Avis Transport of Canada Limited and President of Needco Frigistors Limited.

Mr. Drury is married to the former Jane Ferrier Counsell of Hamilton, Ontario, and has four children; Diana, Leith, Victor Montague and Charles Gibbons.

Geoffrey Adams, the NDP candidate for St. Antoine-Westmount, was born in Toronto in 1926.

He studied at the University of Toronto where, in 1947 he received his B.A. and in 1947 his M.A.



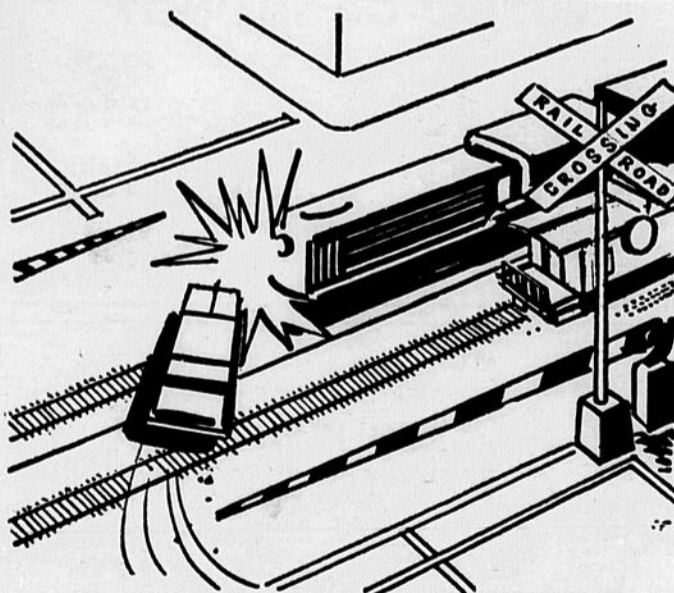

He furthered his studies at the University of Chicago where after two years of research in France and a thesis based on the struggle of the French Protestants for Civil Rights 1750-1789, he received his Ph.D.

His teaching career is a wide one, beginning in France where he taught in two French lycées, at Lyon and St. Cloud.

From 1953-1960 he taught at Waterloo College, University of

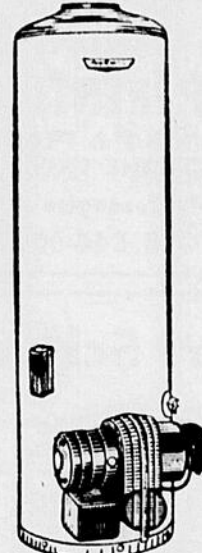

# Lone wolf administrator of \$6 million project

"It's not usual in our set-up," Dr. H. G. Tuttle of the Department of Pensions commented dryly, "to have a woman in charge of a program involving millions of dollars."

It is not usual, either, to find a woman like Mrs. Gordon McKay, 4694 Grosvenor avenue, the sparkplug behind United Church care for the elderly in Montreal, who was once described by a hard-headed businessman as "the best darn administrator in all of Montreal."

The church just opened the latest concrete evidence of her energy, ability, and dedication, and of the generosity of the late J. W. McConnell, who gave close to \$6,000,000 to the work she directed: a 14-storey, 144 bed addition to the Griffith-McConnell Home.

### Woman of many talents

Mae McKay is a woman who can shop for land for a million dollar building as matter-of-factly as she might shop for a hat; who can negotiate with town councils and planning commissions; who can make money raising speeches every week and control a public meeting with an unruly and hostile crowd, and who can steer a 14-storey building to completion from checking the first blueprint to ordering the last bathmat.

But she is also a woman who takes pride in always having done her own house-keeping and cooking, although her husband was a business executive; who wielded both paint brush and scrub brush to prepare some of the old folks' homes for their guests; who shopped for the homes in the public market to get the best buys; who is a little nervous about having her picture taken, and doesn't dare drive a car.

When exhausted by days of committee meetings and business conferences, she goes home and cleans house.

In on the job, as an official put it, "from the first sneeze," she has been board chairman of every one of the church homes for the elderly in Montreal.

Until a year ago, she was, as well, full-time, five-day-a-week administrator of the Griffith-McConnell Home, responsible for 164 guests and a staff of 34.

"She has done a monumental piece of work. Our church owes her a great debt of gratitude," says the Rev. Callum Thompson of Westmount Park.

started in 1930 as a secretary to what was then the Bethany home for unmarried mothers. But needs changed; unmarried mothers moved out of the home and old folks moved in; and Mrs. McKay was into senior citizen work.

It was a challenge that brought out her keen business sense and tremendous efficiency in organization and administration.

### Started from scratch

"She started from scratch; she studied the needs of aged people, investigated what was being done in other areas, and then with faith and courage went forward, and it was uphill all the way," says her minister, Dr. D. M. Grant of ill-fated St. Andrew's.

Some men resented Mrs. McKay's influence and authority. She knows it, and her face clouds when she talks about it.

She has enough initiative for six or seven.

### A \$1 million shock

Mr. McConnell's interest in the work Mrs. McKay directed began when he helped with the purchase of the Dun-Edin home. As its chairman, she kept him informed about plans for expansion. One day she received a telephone call from his secretary, Mary Clarke, who advised her to sit down to receive a shock. Mr. McConnell was giving \$1 million to

build a new home for 100 elderly people.

"At first I almost turned hand-springs," she says, "but I had no idea, then, how difficult it can be to keep within a budget of even \$1 million."

This gift built the first unit of the Griffith-McConnell home (Griffith was Mrs. McConnell's maiden name). As the work progressed Mr. McConnell and his wife became as deeply interested as Mrs. McKay. He later gave the money for two additions, for a 35-bed infirmary — the first to be connected with a United Church home for the elderly — because, as he said, "we'd better see some of these people to the end of the road," and finally, shortly before he died in 1963, he approved the plans for the 14-storey addition which now makes it possible to accommo-

date 308 elderly folk. For the present, at least, that should meet the need.

"Her secret is singleness of purpose," said St. Andrew's Dr. Grant, and he added, "of course she's Scottish."

# Educational aids stock shelves at our library

The Library has recently added the following periodicals on microfilm to its holdings: Current History, 1945-1957; Foreign Affairs, 1927-1957; Nation, 1947-1957; Saturday Review, 1951-1957 and Time, 1923-1957. These back issues may be consulted on the Microfilm Reader in the Library.

Some recent additions to the Reference collection are **Burke's Landed Gentry** - 18th edition, this first volume of the three projected ones, is a wholly new book, reflecting the immense changes, social, economic and political, since the first edition was published in 1836-37. Accounts of over 600 distinguished families of England, Scotland and Wales, with biographies of 10,000 members; about 500 armorial illustrations, introductory articles of special interest and an index of families.

**Sir Charles James Jackson's** English goldsmiths and their marks; a history of the goldsmiths and plate workers of England, Scotland and Ireland, 2nd edition, revised and enlarged, has now been reprinted from the 1921 edition which has been bringing premium prices. This is the standard reference work on the subject.

### National Units

A small but valuable book is **Elsivier's Lexicon of International and National Units**; English/American, German, Spanish, French, Italian, Japanese, Dutch, Portuguese, Polish, Swedish, Russian. Here we find polyglot, poly-national units of measurement defined in English plus their equivalent values in the U.S., British and metric systems.

Index to reproductions of American paintings, first supplement: a guide to pictures occurring in more than four hundred works. This supplement is a list of paintings by artists whose works have been reproduced in general books of art, in museum catalogues, in monographs and in certain special exhibitions. As in the original index (owned by the Library) the selections have been made with great care, and a thorough coverage of works, and even pamphlets, has been achieved. One particularly valuable aspect is the listing of obscure American artists.

**of Mathematics** is a new, complete and compact encyclopedia of mathematics from the elementary high school level through college calculus. It does an extremely good job of elementary definition and explanation, so that the student or the knowledgeable layman can follow it easily. The book is also useful as quick reference for forgotten concepts or definitions by teachers and other professional users of mathematics. The comprehensive collection of formulas and tables at the end of the book is one of its most attractive features.

### Jazz

**A Jazz Lexicon** by Robert S. Gold covers terms associated with and spawned by jazz from its beginnings to the present. Each entry (alphabetically arranged) contains the origin, definition, and part of speech; gives quotations; and notes currency.

**Poisonous plants** of the United States and Canada by John M. Kingbury who is Associate Professor of botany at Cornell University describes informatively and accurately the most significant plants which poison man and livestock. Good descriptions of

specific toxic species are alphabetically arranged by scientific name within their respective botanical family, taxonomically listed. Of particular merit is the excellent introductory matter citing numerous other sources on toxic plants.

**The Handbook of Research on Teaching** is a project of the American Educational Research Association and provides theoretical orientations, methodologies, major variables and areas, and research on teaching various grade levels and subjects, in a series of articles by qualified university professors. These selections review earlier research, and give findings in some cases, such as "good teachers are more than usually talkative, cheerful, placid, frank and quick". Extensive lists of references to these and journal literature are appended. It is a fine supplement to the Encyclopedia of Educational Research also owned by the Library.

### Dictionary Of Clocks

**The Collector's Dictionary Of clocks and terms used in horology** is a beautiful publication of Country Life Limited. Besides listings alphabetically the various types of clocks and terms used in horology, it introduces descriptions of all the more important pieces, together with short biographies of prominent makers all over the world. Geographically its scope is unparalleled, covering as it does the clocks of Austria, Bohemia, China, Denmark, Egypt, England, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Japan, Malta and the United States of America. There are over

500 photographs and diagrams. The revised edition of Fowler's Modern English Usage is by Sir Ernest Gowers and he has destroyed none of the flavour of the

original author. Useful among the 373 added articles are the many new comparisons between British and American usage and pronunciation.

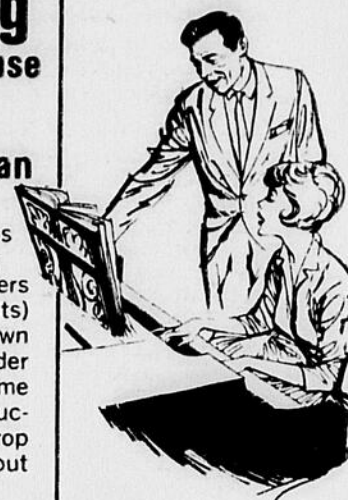

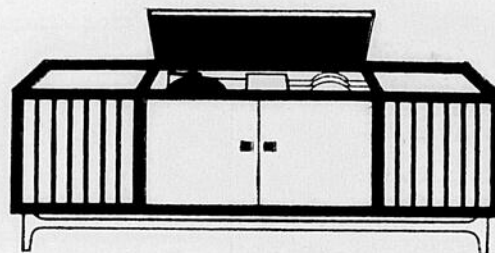

# L. G. Ogilvie heads Montreal Association for the Blind

Leslie G. Ogilvie, of 6 Willow Ave., Westmount, was re-elected President of the Montreal Association for the Blind at its 57th Annual Meeting after reporting to its members on a year in which significant progress has been made by the Association in aiding blind people and in which plans have been adopted for future development of both the property and the services.

After acknowledging the generosity of private donors, Mr. Ogilvie said "there is an operating deficit for the year of almost \$64,000. Most of this is attributable to the School, which is the only school in the Province where blind pupils can receive an elementary education in English. In the face of our Government's

repeated declarations that schooling is a Provincial responsibility, it is disappointing to report that no Government aid was received during the year. The School has been inspected and commended by Government officials and educators and operates at per capita costs comparable to Canada's other five schools for the blind, two of which are located in the Montreal district and where pupils are taught in the French language only. Our School is the only school for the blind not provided for by provincial funds. We are hoping that the Government will, in the near future, agree to pay the tuition costs and at least part of the cost of maintaining these deserving children in our Residence."

Mr. Ogilvie continued "we are presently negotiating with a Health and Welfare Center to sell a portion of our land. They would then be close neighbors whose valuable services will be extended to such of our blind who need them. We believe this close liaison represents a forward step in the treatment and rehabilitation of blind people, which coupled with our own direct services ought to improve the self-sufficiency of many of our sightless friends.

In addition, the proceeds from the sale of the land will be used to erect badly needed facilities to service the increased number of blind people relying on the Association for help, including more

accommodation for elderly blind people, a combined gymnasium/auditorium for use of children and adults and additional facilities for the training of blind adults. With some help from the Province and other public bodies we hope this construction program can be accomplished without going to the general public for capital funds."

In closing Mr. Ogilvie thanked the Directors, the staff, the many volunteers, the press, radio and television, indeed all friends of the blind who have given of their time and substance to provide help where it is so greatly needed.

The guest speaker, Dr. Thomas E. Caulfield, M.D., Director-Administrator of St. Paul's Rehabilitation Center for the Blind in Boston, told the meeting "Rehabilitation aims at the restoration of a handicapped person to a place of dignity, hope and productivity in the general community."

Speaking of blindness and the emotional impact of sight in particular Dr. Caulfield mentioned that experience of St. Paul's had produced the conviction that "Blindness is not simply one loss, but a matter of many losses of which blindness is the primary and crucial one."

He insisted that proper rehabilitation can only come from a community effort that entails close co-operation of several different types of agency. He added that the contribution made by volunteer workers in both the past and the present is much too significant to be passed over lightly but volunteers frequently need to change their attitudes to blindness.

"Rehabilitation is not a task to

be undertaken lightly. Once begun it must be followed through with courage and with great patience. It can test the resources of the community but the realization of what is being done can

provide most worthy satisfactions to all concerned."

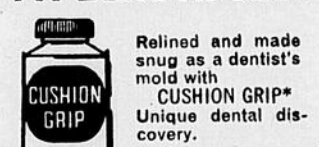

## Yellowthroats have more family spirit

Late summer brings a quiet period in Birdland. Parents have finished looking after their offspring, and all are feeding up — either preparatory to migration or to remaining in Canada's cold. But the Yellowthroats have not yet deserted their juveniles. After most family groups have broken up they generally stay as a unit, travelling around from bush to bush in, or just outside, their nesting territory.

Mr. Yellowthroat's flight song — a wonderful jumble of melody and noise with an occasional "witchity" from his ordinary spring and summer song thrown in — has long ago ceased; but no member of the family can be described as silent. You may not see them at all, because it is their habit to keep low under cover, but you are quite likely to hear their characteristic, hoarse little voices talking to each other. We hear them say only "tchep," but they apparently understand each other.

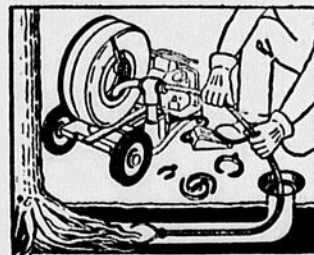
If you get a glimpse of a tiny bird with very yellow throat and wearing a black mask over his eyes, that would be the head of the family. His wife and children are, like him, brownish on top, but their yellow is not as vivid as his either on their throats or under their tails.

As we tended our garden in June just two pairs of bright eyes watched us from the shrubbery. Now there are six pairs, all very inquisitive, peeping out. Yellowthroats both look and act like Wrens, but are really members of the very large Warbler family, classed in with a small group known as "ground Warblers" because they nest on or very near the ground and feed low.

Most Warblers live entirely on an insect diet, but a few take some seeds and a small amount

A spot, believed by most to be truly the last peaceful retreat on earth, will soon be gone.

Well, not really gone, but the sense of tranquility and listlessness will leave and never return.

The French are building a nuclear bomb site on Tahiti.

Word of this comes to us from Dr. Mary Winspear, principal of Weston School, Tenern road, who has just returned from a tour of the East and stopped off at Tahiti on her way home.

"I had always pictured the South Sea Islands as a type of heaven," she said, "and I was really hurt to hear what the French are planning to do there."

The French consul in Montreal said that France did indeed intend to build a nuclear site there.

If this happens, a vision held by many, as by Dr. Winspear, of the South Sea Islands, will be split down the middle, and those islands may find the tourist trade a little meek in the

near future.

The United States consul in Montreal had "no comment" to make on the matter.

Dr. Winspear left on her trip July 10 and returned from such countries as Japan, Australia, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Singapore and Thailand on Sept. 10.

"In Hong Kong," she said, "mainland China is now supplying the water. It would seem too, that they hold life or death over the people in that country. It must be a difficult position to be in, water all around you but you have to rely on China."

"In Thailand, I visited two temples recovered from the jungle. Experts state that they are at least 450 years old."

## Foster Home Recruiting Centre formed by three main agencies

Each year thousands of Montreal's children end up as wards of the city's child welfare agencies.

And each year it is getting more difficult to find foster homes for these children whose own families can't take care of them.

To tackle this growing problem in child care the three major English-speaking agencies — the Catholic Welfare Bureau, the Children's Service Centre and the Jewish Child Welfare Bureau — have joined forces to form the Foster Home Recruiting Centre. It is under the auspices of the Montreal Council of Social Agencies and is the first such integrated effort in Montreal social welfare circles.

It is also believed to be the first in Canada.

"These children are not legally adoptable," said Miss Eileen B. Griffin, executive director of the new city-wide recruiting centre. "They are just taken on a boarding basis. This means, of course, that a foster parent may have to give up a child after having had him for a few weeks, or months or what might even be for the major growing up years of the child."

### SHARING PROPOSITION

"It's really a sharing proposition," she said. "The foster parents are taking the child into their homes and giving him daily love and care. It calls for a good deal of wisdom, patience and tolerance because children who have lost their homes are unhappy children.

"They have witnessed physical or mental illness or death. Often they have been frightened by drunken and quarrelsome parents. They have lived through separation, desertion and neglect. They are hurt, confused and billigent.

"So foster parents in addition to providing domestic features of a home, like proper meals, comfortable bed and pleasant surroundings, have to have great patience, understanding and willingness to wait for the child to make his overtures because he has lost his faith and his trust in adults. He does have to regain his confidence."

What with the pace of modern living; its pressures and tensions, broken homes are becoming more prevalent. Children of all ages are affected and the Foster Home Recruiting Centre is looking for foster homes for infants and children right up to 18-year-olds.

### DEARTH OF FOSTER HOMES

"Too often a child has to be placed where there is not enough selection of foster homes

to find one that meets his particular needs," Miss Griffin said. "There should be a matching of child and home but since there is a dearth of foster homes this is extremely difficult.

"One of the most urgent needs right now is for homes for babies. There is also a pressing need for homes for adolescents, homes for brothers and sisters together and very particularly for homes for children with special problems. For instance, emotionally and physically handicapped children. There is always a lack of homes for children of mixed racial parentage.

"It's important for all children to have close relationships and to know parent-child relationship," said Miss Griffin. "And so often good foster homes can provide this. Certainly babies and pre-school children need an abundance of maternal love, otherwise they are going to be deprived children and warped adults."

The Foster Home Recruiting Centre is helped and financed by donations from a Montreal Foundation, the Rotary Club of Westmount, the Rotary Club of Montreal, Jewish Junior Welfare League and private donations.

**THE RING NEBULA**

The Ring Nebula is an outstanding example of the planetary nebulae, so called because of their shape. Do not expect this object to be startling bright, for you are looking 5,400 light years into space at an expanding gas shell, the remains of a supernova. Under good conditions the Ring Nebula looks like a smoke ring.

**GLOBULAR CLUSTERS**

On the outskirts of our galaxy are about a hundred close aggregations of stars, spherical in shape and known as globular clusters. Each contains about 100,000 stars. Fine examples are M13 in Hercules and M15 in Pegasus. When you look at these through a telescope, remember that you are looking over 30,000 l.y. into space.

**EXTERNAL GALAXIES**

Beyond our own galaxy, the Milky Way, which contains some 200 billion stars, are numberless other galaxies. One of the closest, in fact, one of the local group to which our galaxy belongs, is the Great Galaxy in Andromeda which is a mere 1,600,000 light years away.

as well as insects that the Yellowthroats are able to stay so long in Canada, when birds wholly dependent upon flying insects have been obliged to leave for warmer climates. It may be until near the end of October that they start off on their long journey. How amazing it is that birds no more, and often less, than five and a half inches can battle the elements for hundreds of miles! The Yellowthroats winter anywhere from North Carolina down to the Gulf of Mexico or Central America. Some species of Warblers actually travel into South America.
