**THE BISHOPS WILL BE LATE.**—We regret to learn by a telegram received from Kingston last evening that the Bishops of Nova Scotia and Fredericton, who had been expected to preach on Sunday next in the Cathedral and St. Matthew's church, will be unable to do so, as they will be detained in Quebec. It is hoped, however, that they will be present at the Church Society meeting, which is to be held on Monday evening, in the Tara Hall.

**THE INTERCOLLEGIATE RAILWAY DISASTER.**—Messrs. Choquette and Carrol, who have been representing the victims of the accident at the Intercollegiate at St. Joseph de la Rivière, have reached a final settlement with the Department of Justice. The cheques for the different sums involved were received here on Thursday, and notice has been given to those interested to come and receive the accounts and sign the receipts on Monday or Tuesday.

**ATTEMPTED SUICIDE.**—A. Desbani, an employee of Messrs. Madden & Ellis, coal merchants, attempted suicide at his residence, 250 St. Louis street, St. Lawrence, Thursday night. Desbani, who is stated, being drinking rather heavily of late, was found in a room in an unconscious state, smeared all over with blood. He held a razor in his hand and his throat was cut across with a deep heavy gash five inches long. The wound is still alive, but his life is despaired of.

**QUEBEC W. C. T. U.**—The closing exercises of the W. C. T. U. Band of Hope were held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall last night. The Hall was crowded. A letter was also read from the Secretary of the Great Northern Railway, respectfully asking a reply to the former letter from the same company applying to the city for a guarantee of \$5,000, in order to enable the company to complete a line of railway to Parry Sound. This communication was referred to the Finance Committee.
