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DOGS BIT A BOY

Together With His Quarry.

THE RECEPTION TO LORD CHIEF JUSTICE RUSSELL.

Dead Body Not Yet Recovered—An Interesting Competition—Fire in St. Sauveur—Fatally Injured in a Saw Mill—Anglers Report splendid sport.

News came from Labrador to the effect that an Esquimaux lad, 14 years of age, who had killed a seal at Hebron and was returning with it to his home, was attacked by dogs and eaten together with his quarry.

The Lord Chief Justice.

Lord Russell and party, we understand, arrive here by special train to-day. The reception by the Bar takes place on Monday, when the Chief Justice of the Superior Court, Sir L. N. Cassels, will be the patron of the district, will wait upon Lord Russell, at the Chateau Frontenac, and conduct him and his party down to the Queen's wharf, where all will embark on the steamer "Druid," at 10 a.m., and sail down to St. Anne's. After visiting the shrine and surroundings, the party will re-embark and visit the falls of Montmorency, lunch being served while on the way. All members of the Bar will present their cards on getting on board the "Druid." Rooms have been reserved for the party at the Chateau Frontenac. The Lord Chief Justice's party consists of Lady Russell, Mrs. Russell, Sir Frank Lockwood, Q.C., M.P., Mr. Lockwood, Montague Granger, Esq., Q.C., and James Fox, Esq.

Body Not Yet Recovered.

Although more than a fortnight has elapsed since the fatal yachting accident of St. Pierre de la Riviere du Sud took place, the body of Edward Boyd, who was yet been recovered. There is unfortunately small reason to hope that he escaped, and moreover, about a week ago when the bodies were recovered, a corpse, the description of which seems to tally with his, was seen near Baie St. Paul, not far from the River St. Francis. Moreover, there are at present no other killings than his suspected.

Fire in St. Sauveur.

At an early hour yesterday morning the gables of Mr. J. Lachance, at the corner of St. Sauveur and St. Louis streets, were partially destroyed by fire. Mr. Lachance was in the house when the fire broke out and had to give the alarm himself. The firemen were quickly on the scene and soon doused the fire. Mr. Lachance lost \$1,000 and has \$200 insurance on the stock. The building was owned by Mr. Joseph Julien and is insured for \$500.

Competition for the Best Kept School Grounds.

Dr. J. M. Harper, Inspector of Superior Schools, leaves next for the districts of the Province that have entered upon the competition for the best kept school grounds and the prizes which the Protestant Committee of the Council of Public Instruction have decided to award in this connection. The regulation the Committee have passed is to be found in their minutes, and in the effect that these prizes be offered for competition among the Superior Schools of the Province for the school premises most neatly maintained, a first prize of one hundred dollars, a second of fifty dollars, and a third of twenty-five dollars; adjudication to be made by the Inspector of Superior Schools, and the amount of the prize to be awarded on condition that the school premises have been properly maintained in the interval. This year the competition takes place for the first time, and it is known that the places most frequented are Sherbrooke, St. John's, St. John's, Fredericton, and St. John's.
