

HOME RULE FOR WALES.

Welshmen Demand the Right to Govern Themselves.

The First Roman Catholic Home Secretary Since Elizabeth's Time—Honors Recommended by Mr. Gladstone.

LONDON, July 30.—Handbills demanding Home Rule are being circulated throughout Wales. The circulars say: "The time has arrived when the Welsh people should have the right to govern themselves. The Parliament at London makes laws not for the benefit of the Welshmen but for the enrichment of landlords and idlers. Welshmen demand the privilege of making their own laws. They demand free education, the abolition of landlordism and the disestablishment of the church."

HORRIBLE STORY OF SUFFERING

Natives of Labrador Forced to Resort to Cannibalism in Order to Live.

Boston, July 30.—A St. John's, Nfld. special says: Hergott's Yr. one of the Eskimoes who arrived here on the "Nancy" from Oklahek, Labrador, says the population of that settlement was nearly 130. When left with his wife and four children in the month of March, he found every drop of oil and food of sea-uk was used up. On June 1st a bear was killed and on June 2nd a seal was killed. On June 3rd the Eskimoes were exhausted. On June 4th they had eaten nothing for six days and the whites and a few Indians that had been killed by the Eskimoes were their only food.

A TERRIBLE STORM. Great Destruction of Property and Loss of Life in Massachusetts and Connecticut.
