OTIS IN WANT OF HORSES.

REQUESTS THE WASHINGTON GOVERNMENT TO FORWARD 2500 IMMEDIATELY—HE WILL ORGANIZE CAVALRY.

Washington, July 13.—A despatch has been received from Gen. Otis requesting that there be sent to the Philippines twenty-five hundred horses in order that a brigade of cavalry may be organized for use at the end of the rainy season. Gen. Otis has tried the horses of Manila and near by countries, but none of them seem to be available for cavalry.

TO BE QUARANTINED.

The Khedive's Yacht to Remain for Twelve Days at Clazomene.

Alexandria, Egypt, July 13.—The yacht Mahrouk, with the Khedive and the Khedivah on board, has proceeded to Clazomene in order to perform twelve days' quarantine before disembarking the Khedivah at the island of Rhodes and taking the Khedivah to Trieste.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

Nine Empty Railway Carriages Tumbled Over a Bridge.

Chicago, July 13.—A train of nine empty cars plunged into the river from the Northwestern Railway Kinzie Street Bridge to-day. The conductor and brakeman saved their lives by jumping, the locomotive staying on the tracks. The train was backing into the yards to carry a crowd of excursionists to Elgin when the accident occurred.

ACCIDENT ON A BRIDGE.

One Man Instantly Killed and Two Slightly Injured.

New York, July 13.—One man was killed and two slightly injured this afternoon in an accident on the Brooklyn Bridge. A horse and wagon were run into by a trolley car on the Brooklyn end of the bridge, and the occupants of the wagon were thrown violently out. The dead man is George A. Slater, 56 years old, a roofer, of Brooklyn. His son, George, and another man were thrown from the wagon, but were only slightly injured.

DEATH OF AN INDIAN.

A Nephew of Dr. Oronhyatekha Passes Away.

Watertown, N. Y., July 13.—Sincere Kerr, a full-blooded Indian and nephew of Dr. Oronhyatekha, Chief Ranger of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, died this morning at the city hospital, aged 34 years.

WON A MILLION ACRES OF LAND.

THE NORTHERN PACIFIC RAILWAY WINS A SUIT AGAINST THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT.

St. Paul, Minn., July 13.—The Northern Pacific Railway won over one million acres of land to-day in the suit of the Government to declare void part of the land grant of that road, which was based on the question whether the terms of that road was at Duluth or at Ashland. The decision of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals was handed down this afternoon, and is in favor of the Company's contention that Ashland is the terminus.

ACQUATICS.

Halifax, N.S., July 13.—The result of the professional double scull race at the Sydney Regatta this evening was a great surprise to the spectators. The Lynch Brothers of Halifax, had been strongly backed and their friends were compelled to give odds. Even up to the turn the money went begging. Then the Toronto pair, Durnan and Aylward, pushed to the front and won by two lengths, while the Lynchs only succeeded in defeating the Bremans, the other Halifax pair, by three feet. The three boats held close together to the turn, but the Toronto men got around first and after that it was easy for them to win. The distance was three miles and the time 19.25.

DECREASE IN EXPORTS.

Berlin, July 13.—Germany's exports to the United States for the quarter ended with June last, were \$21,000,000, as compared with \$24,000,000 for the corresponding period last year.

CANTEENS IN VOLUNTEER CAMPS

Sale of Intoxicants Strictly Forbidden in Them.

DR. BORDEN DENIES A CHARGE

MADE AT AN ALLIANCE MEETING—SIR CHARLES TUPPER COMMENDS DR. BORDEN'S PROMPT DENIAL—HON. MR. BLAIR AFTER A MONTREAL PAPER AND ITS ALLEGED MISREPRESENTATIONS.

Ottawa, July 13.—After the House met, Dr. Borden read a statement about the sale of liquor in canteens. The Minister asserted that while canteens were retained, the sale of intoxicants was strictly prohibited. It was impossible to include more than were contained in the statement of Major Campbell at the Alliance meeting. Sir Charles Tupper commended Dr. Borden for promptly contradicting the charge. It would be most unfortunate if the impression got abroad that young men were exposed to temptation while assembled in camp. He earnestly urged the department to take all possible measures to protect young militiamen from evil influences while gathered together for training. It would be impossible to be too particular in this matter. Hon. Mr. Blair had a complaint to make of the Montreal Star, which, he said, had represented him to have paid \$118,000 for the long wharf property at St. John, though the owners had offered to sell it for \$100,000. The Minister of Railways saw in these statements an organized attempt on the part of the Opposition press to distort and misrepresent facts. Mr. Montague assured the Minister that the Opposition had no need to misrepresent him. The facts were quite bad enough.

TROOPS FOR THE TRANSVAAL.
Colonel Hughes called the Premier's attention to the offer of Queenoalund of a corps of soldiers to serve in the Transvaal if they were needed. THE SPANISH CORTES HAS BEEN VERY LIBERAL IN THE PAST IN PROVIDING FOR EVERY MEMBER OF THE ROYAL FAMILY—THE QUEEN REGENT WISHES TO REDUCE THE AMOUNT.

Madrid, July 13.—The Cabinet to-day, after a long discussion, accepted the offer of the Queen Regent to assist the finances of the country by giving up another two million pesetas from the civil list. The King of Spain, Alfonso XIII., had a civil list fixed by the Cortes, 1886, of 7,000,000 pesetas, or \$1,400,000 exclusive of allowances to members of the Royal Family, the Queen Regent having the administration and usufruct of the said sum until the King becomes of age. The annual grant to the Queen, as mother of the King, was fixed by the Cortes, 1886, at 250,000 pesetas. The immediate successor was assigned 500,000 pesetas, and 250,000 to the second sister, they having been Princesses of Asturias. The parents of the late King, ex-Queen Isabel, and her husband have an allowance of 1,050,000 pesetas, or \$210,000, and the four infants, his sisters, of \$140,000 each, or \$560,000. The total amount of the civil list and allowances to the royal family of the late King was fixed by the Cortes, 1876, at 10,000,000 pesetas, or \$2,000,000. It was recently reduced to 9,500,000 pesetas, or \$1,900,000.

PROHIBITING FRESH BEEF

IMPORTATIONS INTO GERMANY—DECREED ISSUED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE RHINE PROVINCES—AIMED AT THE UNITED STATES.

Berlin, July 13.—The Reichsanzeiger publishes a decree issued by Dr. Strickmann, President of the Rhine province at Aix-la-Chapelle, prohibiting the importation of fresh beef. The decree, which is similar to the regulation adopted by the Oldenburg Government, is due to the fact that Belgium has permitted the importation of fresh beef from the United States for slaughter. The meat found its way across the Belgian frontier into Germany in contravention of existing laws against such importation.

FRENCH SHORE QUESTION.

NEWFOUNDLAND GOVERNMENT TO GRANT MINING LICENSES ALONG THE SHORE—THE FINANCE MINISTER'S STATEMENT.

St. John's, Nfld., July 13.—After other evidence of the determination of the British to force a settlement of the French shore question was afforded by the action of the colonial Legislature in passing a bill granting mining leases along the shore. Mr. Morine, Minister of Finance, in moving the passage of the bill, said he expected that within a few months all restrictions on mining operations along the coast would be removed by the action of the British Government.

DEWEY IN EGYPT.

Port Said, Egypt, July 13.—Admiral Dewey arrived here this evening on board the cruiser Olympia.

SHE GOT THIRTY DAYS.

The woman, Jennie Peters, who entertained the police with vocal selections on Wednesday evening, appeared before the Recorder yesterday and was sentenced to fifteen days' imprisonment. She received an additional fifteen days for insulting the Chief of Police.

The barge man who was arrested on a charge of drunkenness and admitted to jail, was convicted and fined twenty-five cents and costs, and an old man from Hedleyville, who had a home or friends, was sent to jail for two months.

THE TRANSVAAL DIFFICULTY.

Preamble of Franchise Law Adopted by the Volksraad.

REALLY LIVELY TIMES AT THE CAPE

Pretoria, July 13.—The Volksraad to-day adopted the preamble of the Franchise law, which declares that necessity exists for the immediate adoption of the law, thus avoiding the three months previous publication required by the constitution. The discussions of articles of the law is now in progress.

LIVELY TIMES.
Cape Town, July 13.—The Cape Parliament will open to-morrow, and exciting scenes are anticipated owing to the attitude of the Premier, Mr. W. F. Schreiner, on the Transvaal question. A large number of the Opposition members favor his impeachment. In the meantime the Afrikaner party is working up a pro-Boer agitation and doing its utmost in this direction. An attempt to hold a loyal meeting at Worcester this afternoon, was frustrated by the Afrikaners, who precipitated disgraceful scenes, forcibly dragging the loyalist speakers from the platform and expelling them from the hall amid jeers and insults. It is reported that several Dutch members of the Legislature participated.

A MOST PATRIOTIC QUEEN REGENT.

She Gives Up Two Million Pesetas to AID THE NATIONAL FINANCES

THE CHINESE GOVERNMENT DO NOT WANT TO CARRY OUT A CONTRACT WITH THE AMERICANS, SO THE LATTER POOLED ISSUES WITH THE BRITISH—A PECULIAR DEMAND ON WASHINGTON.

New York, July 13.—The Tribune to-morrow will publish the following: A business alliance of American and English capitalists has been recently formed which is of unusual interest and importance because of the leading positions held by these men on both sides of the Atlantic, because of the many millions of dollars involved in it, because the United States Government is about to be asked to give the contract official sanction and moral support because England has already formally approved it, and because the field of its operations is beyond the jurisdiction of both nations. The announcement of this alliance was made yesterday (Thursday) by F. W. Whitridge, of the firm of Cary & Whitridge, who now fill the place left vacant by the death of ex-Senator Calvin S. Brice, as the chairman of the Executive Committee of the American China Development Co. The company is one party to the agreement, and the other is the British and Chinese Corporation. This makes a combination of the most powerful capitalists in the world. The field of their activities is China. The concessions which ex-Senator Brice secured from the Chinese Government for the American China Development Company consists of the right to construct a railway line from Canton to Hankow, exceeding valuable coal mining concessions and other industrial franchises of less individual but great aggregate value. The British company had a contract to build a railway from Canton to Kowloon on the sea coast. The two resolved to pool their undertakings, and their profits. The American Company's engineer, W. Barclay Parsons, of this city, has completed the survey of the railway line from Hankow to Canton, and an agent of the syndicate is now at Shanghai. He reports that negotiations at Peking have reached a critical stage and that there is a disposition on the part of the Chinese Government to present to the United States Government a demand upon the British Ambassador in China to treat the contract secured by the American Company as if it were a British contract, and argue its terms. The American Company sent Mr. Parsons to Washington yesterday to make a formal request that the Government of the United States take a similar stand. Such a demand upon the United States Government is probably unprecedented.

HE BECAME A KNIGHT.

And Now He is Laid Up and Wants Damages.
Jamestown, N.Y., July 13.—Roy Terry is in the Jamestown Hospital in a serious condition, the result, it is said, of injuries received while being initiated in the tent of the Knights of Macabees. Terry has placed the matter in the hands of an attorney and demands financial indemnity for his injuries. It is claimed that he was injured so as to have caused inflammation of the bowels. His spine was injured and one of his front teeth knocked out.

THE RESULT OF AN ACCIDENT.

THE GRAND DUKE GEORGE REPORTED TO HAVE DIED FROM INJURIES RECEIVED WHILE HIDING A RECIPE.
Breslau, July 13.—The Schlesische Zeitung declares the death of the Czarewitsch, Grand Duke George, who passed away July 10, was due to a bicycle accident. While wheeling over the hilly country about Abbas Tuman, in the Caucasus, the paper adds a mishap caused him "a fall" of blood that the Grand Duke died on the spot of the occurrence. IT WAS A BOLD AND CLEVER ROBBERY.

One Hundred and Seventy-Five Dollars Taken.

A MAN ARRESTED ON SUSPICION

THE INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY STATION, LEVIS, VISITED BY A THIEF WHO BOLDLY CARRIED OFF A MONEY DRAWER—HE THEN MIXES UP WITH THE CROWD—THE ACCUSED IN JAIL.

For some time past a number of pickpockets and petty thieves appear to have made Quebec their headquarters, and are doing quite a thriving business, particularly so among the numerous pilgrims who visit the shrine of St. Anne de Beaufort. As a rule, the pickpockets transact their business from the moment the pilgrims leave the boats or cars, and they even travel to St. Anne's, where they have also succeeded in carrying on their trade. Every day complaints are made, and owing to the thousands who daily visit the shrine, it is almost impossible to discover the light-fingered gentry. On Wednesday last there were about 4000 pilgrims at St. Anne's, about half coming from the United States. Naturally this was quite a suitable time for the pickpockets, and several of the visitors had their pockets rifled, the thieves not even leaving them their return tickets, which were placed in a very awkward position. One man lost \$80, another \$15, and another \$10, and in each case the return tickets disappeared.

AUDACIOUS ROBBERY.

Yesterday morning a very audacious robbery was committed at the I.C.R. station at Levis, and the thief watched his opportunity when the passengers from the Carolina and the railroads were purchasing tickets at the station. While the agent, Mr. McDonald, was giving some information to a woman, a stranger quietly opened the office door and placing his hand in a drawer, disappeared with a bundle of bank notes. Mr. McDonald immediately followed the robber, but the thief had unrolled with the crowd outside and the agent could not see him. One of the I.C.R. mail conductors, Mr. Agnelli, however, noticed a man disappearing from the station and identified him in a few minutes sitting in a car. The I.C.R. constable immediately arrested him and brought him to the station, but the thief having a warrant against the prisoner, not having witnessed the robbery, would not receive him. As soon as the train had left the station, Messrs. Began and Ouellette then brought their prisoner to the Police Station, where the Police took him in charge, and he subsequently appeared before Judge Chauveau and was remanded to jail. The accused registered at the Victoria Hotel on last Wednesday afternoon.

NEW YORK LIFE

To Dispose of all its Stock Holdings—Foreign Governments the Cause.
New York, July 13.—The New York Life Insurance Co., yesterday, amended its by-laws so as to provide for the sale of its holdings in stocks. The Company's holdings in this line are about \$4,000,000. The attitude of certain foreign Governments, under whose jurisdiction the New York Life does business, was the primary cause in leading President McCall to take the step governing the investment of the Company's funds.

FOR THE ARCTIC.

A Number of Americans to Leave for the Icebergs To-day.
Princeton, N. J., July 13.—Prof. Charles F. Mearns, Arnold B. Orin, Walter A. Wyckoff, Charles C. Richardson, members of the Peary relief expedition, left Princeton to-day for New York. To-morrow they will leave there for North Sydney, Cape York, where they will join Prof. William Libby, leaving that point for the Arctic region on the 19th.

LATE SENATOR SAN FORD.

THE FUNERAL AT HAMILTON—MANY LEADING MEN PRESENT—NUMEROUS FLOWAL TRIBUTES—LIST OF THE PALL-BEARERS.

Hamilton, July 13.—The funeral of the late Hon. W. E. Sanford took place this afternoon at 2.30 p. m. from his late residence, "Wanamaker." The arrangements were very complete and elaborate, but not ostentatious. The service at the residence was held by Rev. G. S. Salton, Pastor of the Central Methodist Church assisted by Chancellor Burwash, Dr. Potts and Dr. Smith. The route of the cortege was along Jackson to Queen street, thence by York street to the cemetery. The chief mourners were: Colonel E. J. Sanford, cousin of the deceased; W. NORTH-WEST TRADE.

The Grand Truck to Enter Into Competition With C. P. R.
Toronto, July 13.—According to railway gossip to-day it looks as if the Grand Truck railway authorities are about to enter into competition with the Canadian Pacific Railway in establishing a line of steamers to run to Port Arthur. The same authorities say that for the past two days Superintendent Jones and Tippin with a civil engineer have been visiting Goderich and Owen Sound with a view to obtaining information as to which would be the most suitable harbor for them to use. The chief trade would be the hauling of the North-West grain.

A STICKY COMBINE.

It Intends to Invade and Capture the Canadian Market.
New York, July 13.—The organization of the United American Glue Co., with a capital of \$25,000,000, was completed to-day at a meeting of the company. The company announces that it will invade Canada as an endeavor to get a monopoly of the glue business in British America.

IRON ORE BOOM IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

Thousands of Tons Reported Purchased for Philadelphia Capitalists.

SOME VESSELS CHARTERED

To Convey the Ores of the Island to the Smelting Furnaces of Pennsylvania.

THE DEMAND IS TREMENDOUS.

Nearly all Quarters of the Globe are Called Upon to Supply Manganese and Iron Ores.

Philadelphia, July 13.—The announcement has been made in shipping circles that thousands of tons of iron ore have been purchased in Newfoundland by local capitalists for shipment to this port to be manufactured into steel, and that already two schooners with sample cargoes of the ore are now en route to Philadelphia from Newfoundland. The German steamship Claudius, with a capacity of nearly 5000 tons, has been chartered for the Newfoundland ore trade.

The demand for iron ores and manganese ores for the manufacture of steel is tremendous, and not only are these mines in distant British India and on the Black Sea and Mediterranean districts being drawn on to supply this demand, but shipments are being made from Rio Janeiro and other quarters in Brazil. At the present time there are twenty steamers on their way to the port with cargoes of either manganese or iron ore.

CRUSHED BY A GUN.
New Bedford, Mass., July 13.—Ernest Rupert Sherwin, of Springfield, Vt., a gun captain on the Monitor Amphitrite, was instantly killed to-day by having his head crushed as the breach of a gun was being depressed.

THE PREMIER'S SALARY.

The Montreal Gazette, moved by the declaration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the House that he is a poor man, proposes that the salary of the Premier of Canada be increased so as to place the occupant of the exalted position beyond the possibility of want. At present the Prime Minister of Canada receives \$8,000, and a seasonal indemnity of \$1,000. This income should be sufficient to allow the Premier to live on a fairly comfortable scale if he were not subjected to special demands. But Sir Wilfrid Laurier, like those who have preceded him in his office, is representative of the Dominion, just as the Governor-General is the representative of the sovereign. Even with the handsome income of \$50,000, Governor-General not unusually spend more than they receive. It is not surprising, therefore, that the Premier, who is still more closely in touch with the people, should find \$9,000 inadequate for present demands and provision for the future. Under these circumstances no serious objection should be raised to a change in the estimates which will remove from Canada the reproach of being penurious to its first citizens, and at the same time obviate the necessity of supplementing the Premier's income by means of financial testimonials from private sources.

A POSTPONEMENT.

In a couple of weeks, if the Alaskan difficulty had been overcome, the International Conference would have been resuming its deliberations in this city. It is now predicted, however, that a further postponement of five or six months, which will bring us into January, is inevitable. There is reason to fear that the delay till January will mean the loss of what has been accomplished so far and the failure of the commission. Indeed it looks as if the section of the American press chronically hostile to Canada had made the most of the Alaskan trouble mainly for the purpose of preventing a friendly understanding on all the questions at issue. The delay, unavoidable perhaps, has so far contributed to advance their plans which a further postponement till January may crown with success.

THE ABATTOIR PROPOSALS.

The Premier has at last openly declared what has been general rumour for some weeks, that the abattoir proposals have been rejected. Probably the most substantial reason assigned for the refusal is the fact that, as the Government understood them, the proposals called for a guarantee of the principal as well as interest on the investment. Mr. Marchand conceived that the Province might, if the scheme proved a failure, be compelled to pay interest for forty years on a lost investment and at the end of that time make good the capital. This is a liability which those who most ardently favoured the establishment of the abattoir have never desired the Province to assume. The scheme was advocated as a business project, financially assisted by the Province in consideration of special favours to the farmers of Quebec, but not as a public speculation placed under the control of private operators. The projectors naturally submitted at the outset the terms which would give them a maximum of security and a minimum of risk, but professed to be prepared to modify them to meet any suggestions on the part of the Government that might be acceptable. Instead of proposing guarantees and amendments that would have removed the obvious objections, the Government has, after much delay, given a quietus to the scheme by stamping it with complete disapproval. As Mr. Marchand favours the establishment of abattoirs he ought now to proceed to develop his policy, so that those who realize the importance of the dead meat industry to Quebec may understand clearly how far, and in what way, the Province is prepared to assist in establishing it.

A CONVENTION OF DEAF-MUTES IS BEING HELD IN ST. PAUL.

The fact that Sir Thomas Lipton, the Irish challenger for the America Cup, is "in trade, don'tcherknow," has not killed the interest taken in England in the success of the Shamrock. At first there was a rumour that the howling swells who form the yachting community in the old country, would boycott the challenger, but luckily their sporting blood has quenched the prejudice against the wealthy tea merchant.
