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THE COUNTY AND THE RAILROAD

The current controversy about passenger service on the CPR may seem to outsiders to have little or nothing to do with the history of the old PPJ but actually it has everything to do with it. The people of Pontiac have a real proprietary interest in their railway and every right to be given the service they desire.

The very nature of the farms and homes throughout our County today are a reflection of what it cost our antecedents here to get their railway. Plenty of people still farming today can well remember the 7 mill extra tax placed on the fruits of their labors in order to pay the railway bonus.

The County Council bungled through indescribable confusion first passing By Law 15 (of ill repute) to give the PPJ a Bonus, then fighting at exhausting expense in Supreme Court and the Privy Council, England, to have By Laws declared worthless, illegal null and void.

Losing the battle, Pontiac County nevertheless had to pay the legal fees and the railway went forward, although not to the satisfaction of these from the west townships. When the PPJ got to Waltham it stopped, short by quite a lot of its original promise.

Trying to nullify the debentures under By Law 15 cost such a lot the County wasn't able to pay its obligations to the PPJ as well, so another bond issue went out under By Law 29. This was paid, at the expense of every farm and woodlot in Pontiac County, in forty years.

Early in the process of paying the Bonus off, the CPR bought out the PPJ. We hope it was a bargain. They still would not extend the line west of Waltham despite repeated pleas by County Council.

The cancelled bonds of the Pontiac Bonus were cremated in solemn ceremony with all the big wigs of the area in attendance. But the debt ridden farms in a debt ridden County weren't at all satisfied that their condition was justified — the railway still didn't go to Pembroke as originally promised.

In this day and age we hear a lot of quiet grumbling about the inadequacy of the passenger service on the train but not until the CPR requested permission to terminate this altogether has the County gathered up its forces to try to have a say in the matter. The hearing on Tuesday will provide this opportunity. The Board of Transport Commissioners will then decide whether the railroad actually owes any regard to the wishes of those who lost so much to get it started.

This Little Bug Can Take It !

A small, blood-sucking insect from the rain forests of South America is helping Chalk River scientists in their quest for information on the effects of radiation on living cells. Its scientific name is *Rhodnius prolixus*, but the insect has been nicknamed the "kissing bug" because it apparently considers the lips of human beings to be particularly good sources of blood.

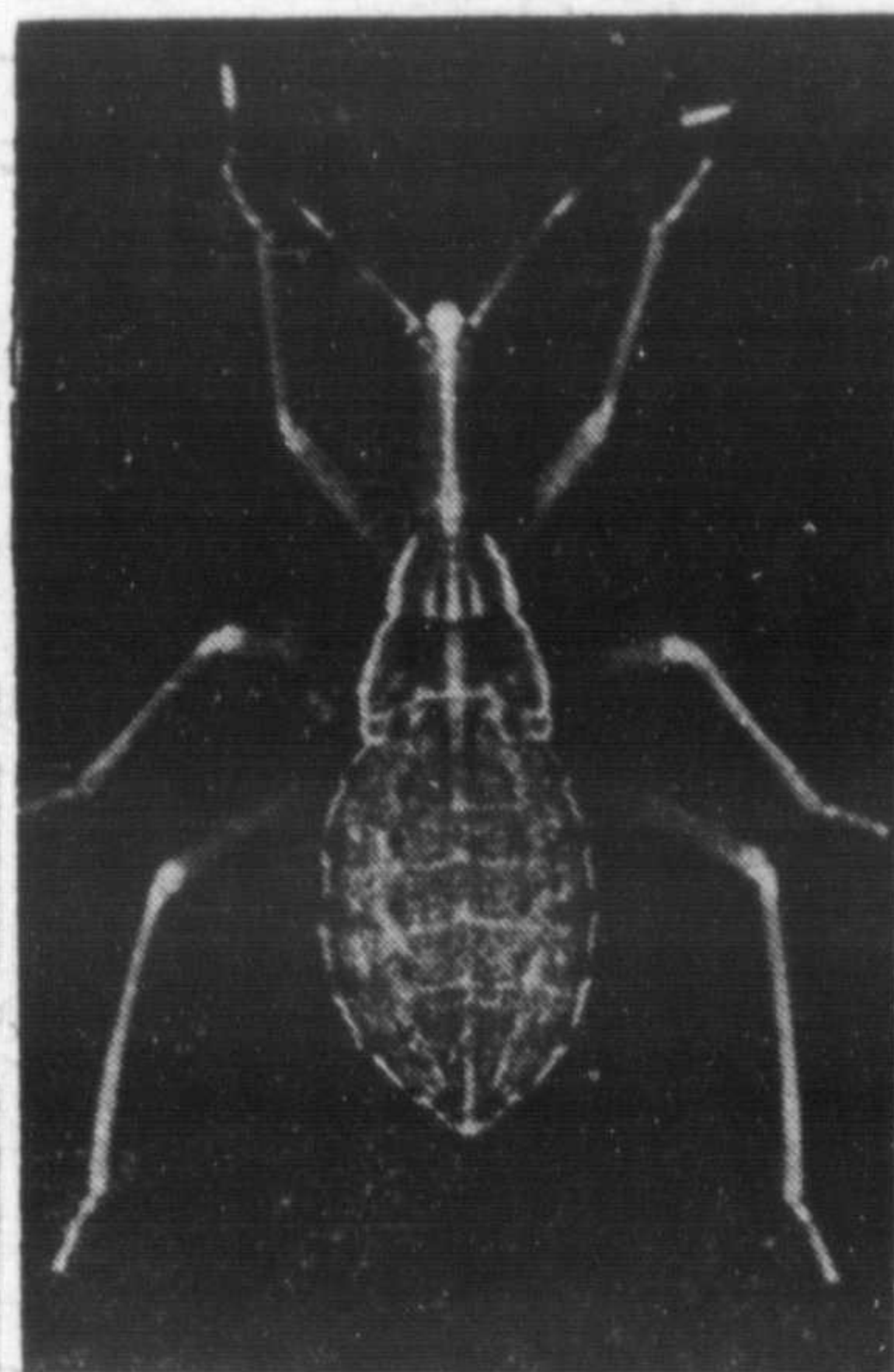
Dr. W. F. Baldwin and T. N. Salthouse became interested in *Rhodnius* when they read of the extensive studies of the insect's growth hormones carried out by Prof. V. B. Wigglesworth of Cambridge University in England. It appeared to these researchers in the Biology Branch of Atomic Energy of Canada Limited that *Rhodnius* might have particular characteristics suitable for providing a solution to the mystery of why insects are especially resistant to radiation. Some insects can survive doses of radiation two or three hundred times the amount required to kill a human being.

Dr. Baldwin obtained half a dozen of the insects from Prof. Wigglesworth about a year and a half ago and has since bred thousands of them in incubators at Chalk River. He has a thousand of the bugs on hand at any one time but he and Mr. Salthouse will use about 5,000 of them in experiments during the course of a year.

Although it is a poor traveller (it dies when taken out of its natural habitat unless the high temperature and humidity of its homeland are provided artificially), the insect's modest "per diem allowance" requirement should be a delight to cost accountants for it can live as long as a year without food.

About a sixteenth of an inch long and pink when it emerges from its egg, *Rhodnius* is about half an inch long and dark brown when full-grown. Its body is oval-shaped and flat; its head is elongated and carries two antennae and two bulbous eyes; and it has six, fairly long legs. It has a beak through which it sucks blood, its only food. An adult *Rhodnius* can take twelve times its own weight of blood in one feeding and does not hesitate to "hijack" blood from another *Rhodnius*. Adults poke their beaks into other adults which have refuelled and drink their fill. A lifetime for a *Rhodnius* can be as long as two years, depending upon how many meals it has been able to obtain.

But the characteristic of *Rhodnius* which has special interest for the A.E.C.L. scientists is its coat-changing habit under certain conditions of food supply and exposure to radiation. Other researchers had guessed

that the remarkable resistance of insects to radiation might be due to the absence of cell divisions. This was difficult to prove with any of the ordinary members of the insect world.

Like some other insects, *Rhodnius* sheds its coat (that is, "moults") several times in growing to adulthood. *Rhodnius* is unique, however, in two ways. First, all the cells under the body wall of *Rhodnius* must divide simultaneously when a new coat is being formed; second, cell division and moulting occur only after the bug gorges itself on blood sucked from an animal. After a feeding *Rhodnius* can then wait as long as a year, with its cells in a non-dividing or resting state, before it must have another meal. In this state *Rhodnius* is very difficult to kill with radiation and small areas of its

body can be exposed to high doses of radiation without any burn or other damage appearing.

The Chalk River researchers have exposed small spots on young kissing bugs to two-million-volt beams of X-rays and have found that the resting cells have remained completely normal in function and appearance indefinitely. The damage is there in hidden form, however, and when the insects eat again the parts of the body which have not been exposed to X-rays moulting normally but the exposed patches develop blisters due to the failure of the cells in those parts to multiply and produce a new skin.

The cell behaviour seems to explain why in man and other mammals a radiation burn often takes a few days to show itself — the cells can continue to function until the need for cell division arises. It also explains why adult insects are so resistant to radiation, for their body cells never have to divide once the insects are fully grown.

While some control of radiation damage has been possible in *Rhodnius*, there is little chance that man can imitate the insects and make himself highly resistant by stopping his cell divisions, but he might be able to reduce the effects of radiation. Much remains to be learned about the chain of events in the damaging of living cells exposed to radiation, but knowledge of the subject is being advanced by such experiments as those carried out on *Rhodnius* at Chalk River.

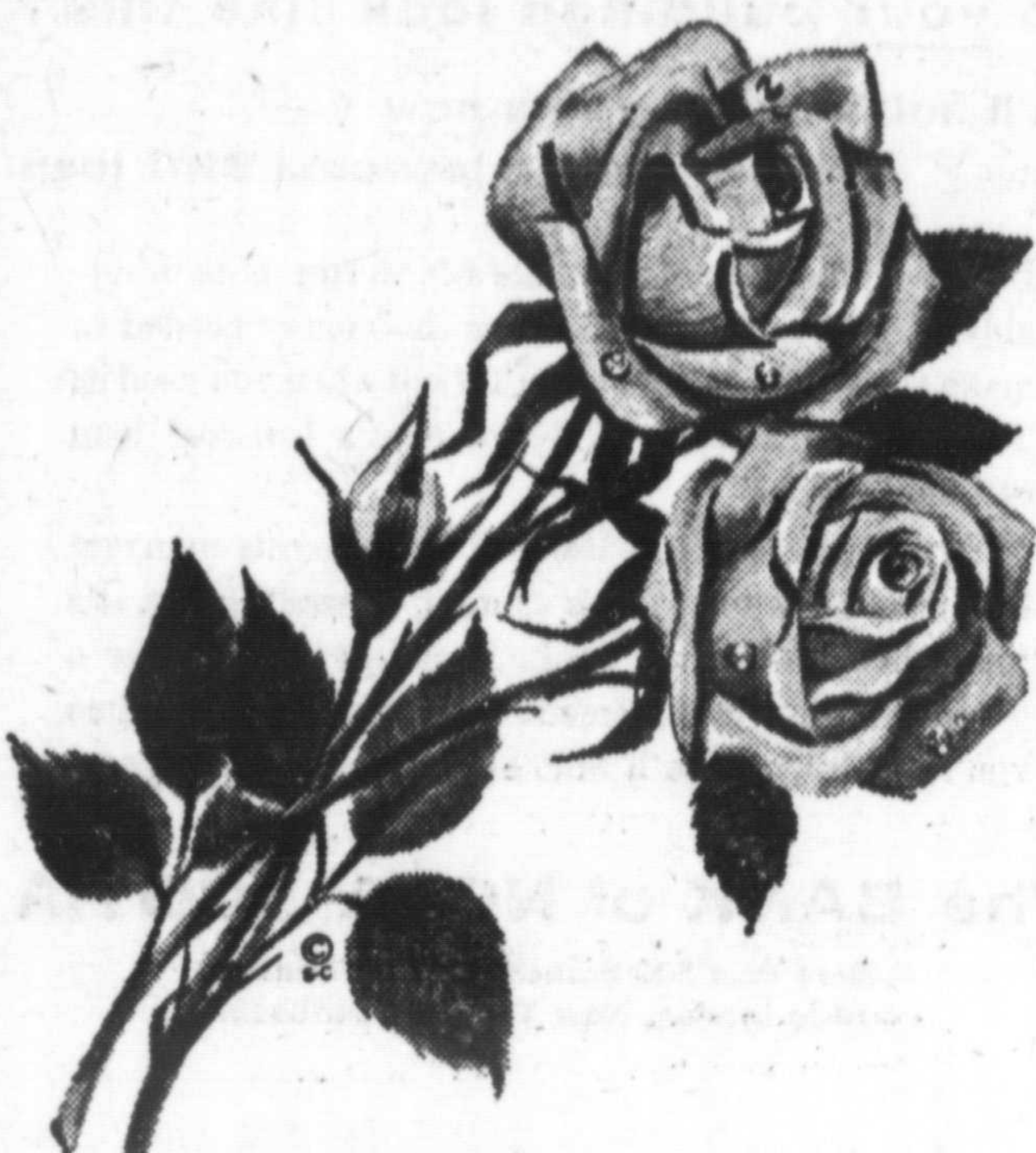

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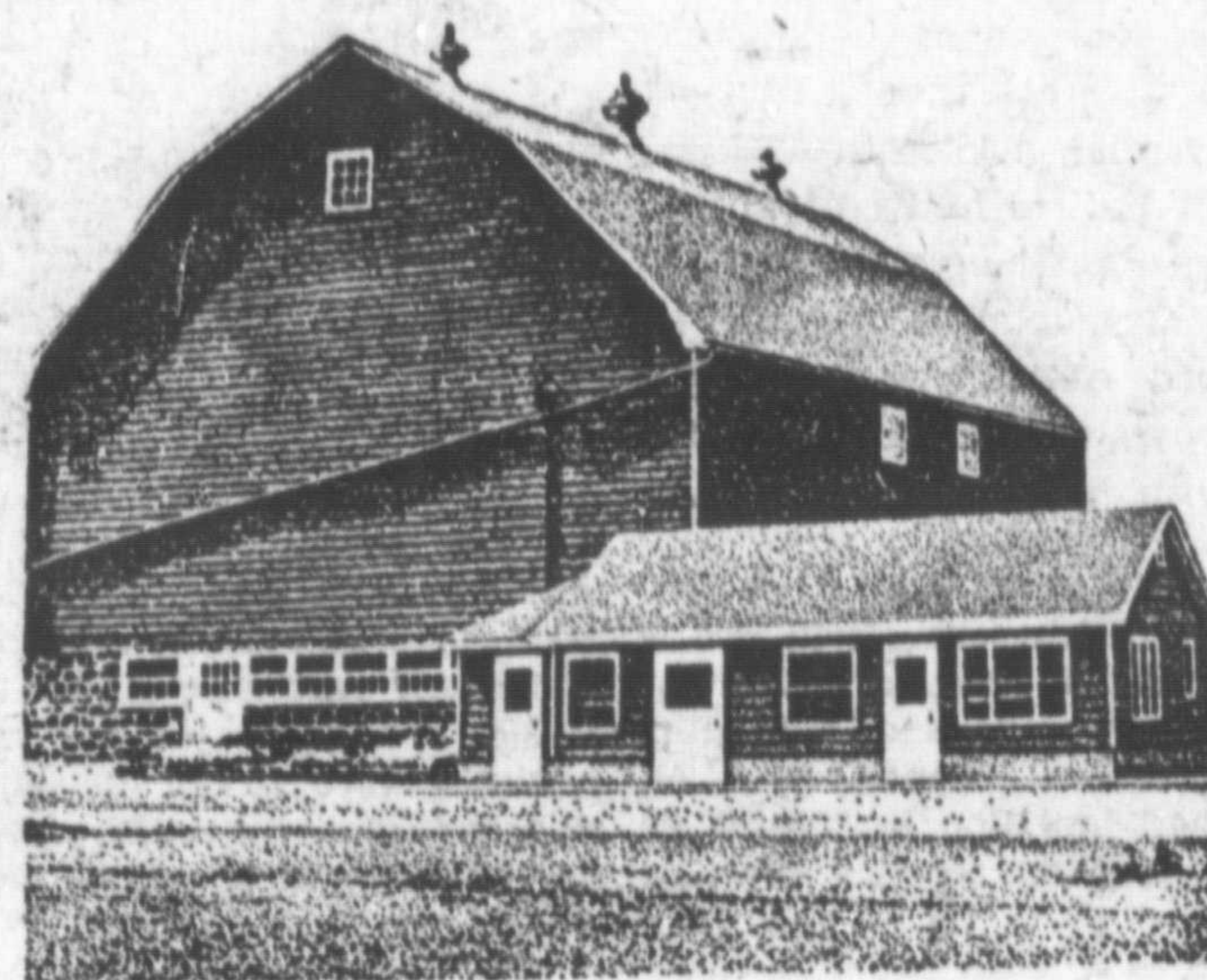

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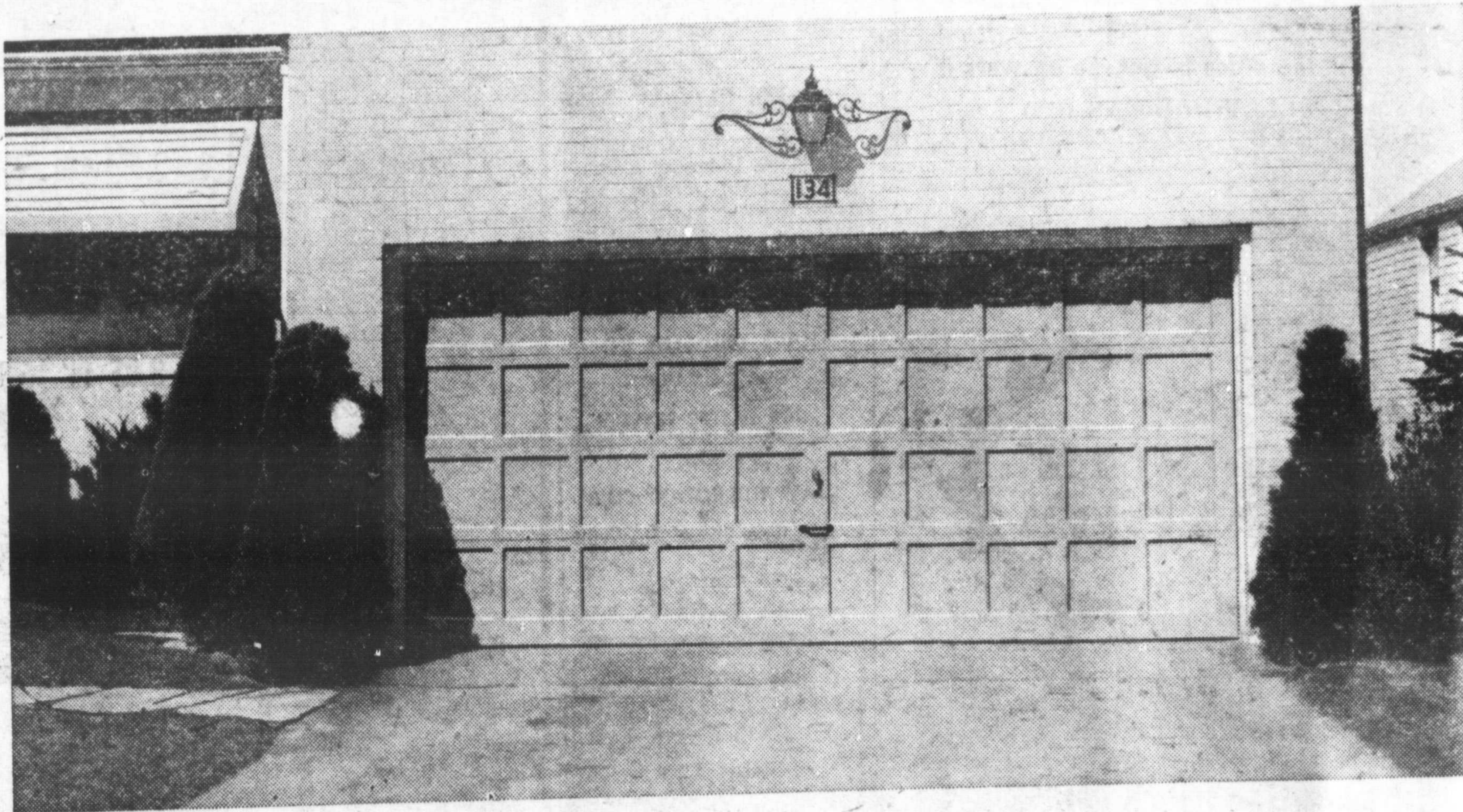

Board is opposed to moving a third grade class from the old school to the new school.

Another motion was adopted to advise the Central Board that the Clarendon Board was opposed to moving a sixth grade class from the new school to the old school.

The Board discussed matters relating to the maintenance of specific school buses.

The matter of the hearing at Campbell's Bay next Tuesday on the subject of the removal of the passenger service on the CPR came up for discussion. It was decided that no action should be taken by Clarendon regarding submitting a brief at the hearing. It was felt that since it is children coming in from outside the township who will be affected by removal of the train service, an agency other than the Clarendon Board should submit the brief on this subject. Walter Kilgour, who as well as being a member of the

Board, is Chairman of the Home & School Association, thereupon made arrangements for the preparation of a brief by Home & School, and was able to hand it over to Lee Hodgins, Board members and Mayor of Shawville, who is attending a special meeting of County Council today during which he will turn the Home & School brief over to Paul Martineau.

The matter of landscaping the school grounds was mentioned, but no decision was reached about it. Further discussion on this subject is planned for the next meeting. The intention is to landscape the school grounds this year.

We had the opportunity of being included in a group of seventeen girls going to a RCAF dance at an air base on Vancouver Island. We were horrified to learn that part of our trip would be made by airplane as neither of us had ever been in one. It had been my life time dream to go up in an airplane but Doris had always been terrified of having any more than one foot off the ground at a time

The night prior to the dance found both of us equally scared and sleepless. When the hour arrived for us to meet the bus we were barely able to walk to the station. A big RCAF bus was waiting at the hospital to take us to the air port, but needless to say we didn't enjoy the drive. Our stomachs felt as if they had been twisted into a hard rock and we had to swallow furiously to keep them in place. Every time an innocent wee bird flew by our hearts sunk about two inches because in less than half an hour we expected to be winging across the sky like they were.

Eventually, we reached the airport much to our distaste. We were barely able to stumble off the bus as our knees were like jelly and were reluctant to carry us. The other girls were gayly talking and laughing as they dashed into the station. Doe and I crept along stone-faced. What was there to be gay about? We might never be walking on the ground again! Oh, how I wished that mom and dad knew that I might never be returning home. It was too late to turn back or I'm sure we would have.

If we could have boarded immediately it would have been so much easier. The plane we were to go up in had some trouble so we had to wait two and a half hours for another and you can imagine how we felt when we learned we were going up in a little transport! I was shaking so badly that I doubted if I'd ever be able to walk to the plane. Doris was nearly green, everytime a plane took off I unconsciously ducked my head and our hearts rapidly increased their rates. By this time our tummies were slowly turning over.

Finally, a huge plane trotted up to the wee station and they started to test its engines. Suddenly I wasn't afraid any more. It was a wonderful sight to see the gigantic monster trembling and roaring like an angry lion. I could hardly wait to go up but poor Doris looked even greener. I attempted to cheer her up but only got a polite

We flew about 250 miles travelling at 160 miles per hour at an altitude of 8000 feet. This we learned when we

et. This we learned when we had the opportunity of visiting the cockpit. Leaving Vancouver we cross the Georgia Strait to Comox. From Comox we flew over a mountainous area to Johnstone Strait following the Strait to Port Hardy where we landed. Of all the beautiful scenery we've seen since coming to British Columbia none can be compared to the sight of those mountains from above. Looking out one side of the plane the ground was buried in snow while that on the other side was bare except for the very peaks of the mountains. It is impossible to find words to fittingly describe their beauty. Some places we were above the clouds. It was fabulous to see the white peaks appearing in the midst of an ocean of pink fluffy clouds. It was a sunny day which added greatly to the beauty of the surrounding scenery.

On reaching Port Hardy we found a rickety old school bus waiting to take us fifteen miles through rough bush country to Coal Harbour. There we were welcomed by a committee from the air base and moving pic-

tures were taken. Sitting in the Harbour was a big tug boat waiting to take us to Holbery, our destination.

For two hours we cruised through the tranquil waters of Holbery Inlet between eye-towering mountains. They served us tea and sandwiches which were devoured in minutes as we'd been from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. without eating. We were fascinated by twenty seagulls which flew tirelessly over head during the twenty mile trip. We enjoyed sharing our sandwiches with these hungry birds as it was a breath-taking sight to see the twenty of them swoop down to get one wee piece of bread. Somehow they never collided.

Arriving at Holbery another RCAF bus awaited us. We were taken five miles along bumpy roads which are familiar to residents from Quebec. Reaching the air base we were shown to our quarters which consisted of bunk beds set up in a theatre used for a church on Sundays. Touring the station we were greeted by 400 men hanging out windows and doors, waving and shouting. Numerous parties were given in our honour.

The dance started at 9 p.m. and we began dancing. During the entire evening we were only allowed 15 minutes to sit down—much to the sorrow of our aching feet. In this short rest period we were served a chicken supper. We danced squares, rounds, jives and polkas until 1 a.m. Just as we'd be wearily returning to our tables we were spied by another guy and whisked back to the dance floor. Most of the guys had been up there for 6 to 9 months without ever being out. Some of them were very young and it seemed unfair for these kids to be so isolated from their homes.

However, it was a wonderful relief to crawl to the top of those rock-hard beds. Needless to say we didn't waste any time going to sleep.

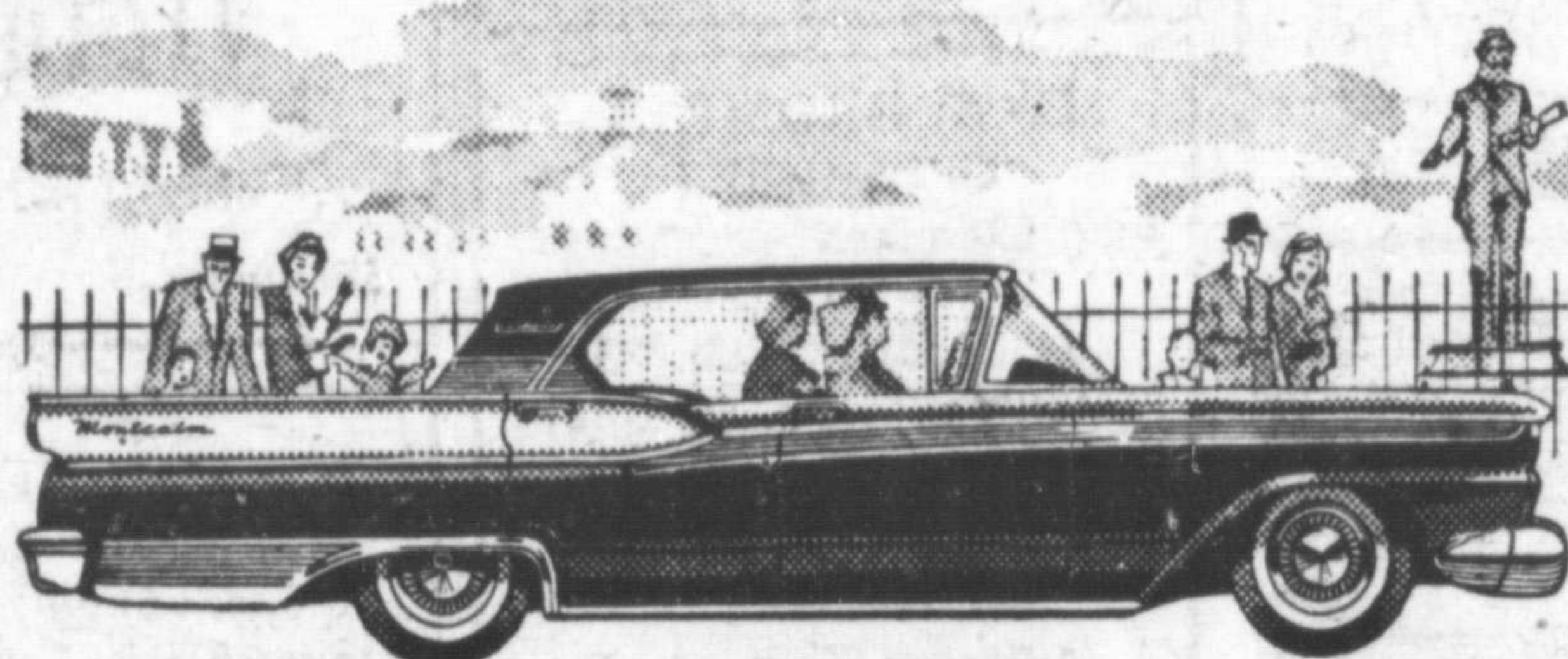
